# Wagon Train to camp here Thursday

The Texas Wagon Train, scheduled to arrive in Hereford about 2 p.m. Thursday, is transporting across the state a diverse group of people ranging in age from 17 months to 81 years. with a group of people who came from the heart of Texas or as far away as Wisconsin, according to wagon train business manager Quentin McGown IV.

McGown, interviewed in Lamesa Monday, said the 46 wagons in the train at present represent 27 states. He expects the number of wagons to

pick up as they get closer to the conclusion of the tour in Fort Worth. A maximum limit of 150 wagons has been set in order to keep things manageable, and they will allow up to 300 outriders on horseback.

McGown, talking to a Lamesa Press-Reporter writer, said the wagon train has gone smoothly, without any major crises. The train encountered dust storms and gusts of winds up to 45 mph at Guadalupe National Park, but the weather has been more favorable than what was


Traffic has also proved to be less troublesome than was anticipated, thanks mainly to the courtesy of motorists and the cooperation of highway troopers, sheriff and police departments, said McGown. One of the few problems they've had, said McGown, was a flu virus which was passed from wagon to wagon.

Taking care of the animals is a major exercise in logistics, since the 300 horses and mules currently with the wagon train consume about 450 bales of hay and more than 4,000 gallons of water every day. A 6,500-gallon tanker is used by the wagon train to tap water from local water supplies and four 1,000-gallon tanks are distributed around the camping

McGown said the camp site in Lamesa was a "Godsend because of the many shade trees and the grass underfoot." The train camped at Forrest Park, and apparently shade trees have been a rarity in parts of West Texas.

McGown said the train has been received favorably all along the route, "but the biggest welcomes seem to have come from the smaller towns." He said it was the intent of the Wagon Train Association to bring the event to the "grass roots" level, rather than confining it to the major population centers.

With each stop along the way, said McGown, comes a different infusion of energy and enthusiasm, especially when the school children turn out. He estimated that by trip's end, they will have attracted as many as 110,000 school children.

When the Texas Sesquicentennial Wagon Train makes its historic appearance here Thursday, at approximately 2 p.m., it will come in from Dimmitt on US-385 and enter Hereford on Country Club Drive. It will proceed east to S. Main Street, then go north to New York Avenue. The train will take New York Avenue to the Bull Barn

area for an overnight camp. Entertainment for the visitors and all interested citizens is planned at the Bull Barn from 7 until 10 p.m. Concession booths will be manned at the Bull Barn, and some colddrink stands may be located along the parade route.

# 'Hands' needs help

Update: Hands Across America is way behind

According to Robert Chavez, chairperson for Hereford, registration has been sluggish for the human hand-holding chain hoped to link New York City to Los Angeles on Sunday, May 25, to raise money for hungry and homeless in America.

"The people themselves are what's making it so behind," said Chavez, who is so disappointed. "They don't believe it's going to happen and we've got to have more people if we're going to make it flap-

Chavez explained that one person can't stand out there and represent 90,000 people. "We've got to have the 90,000 people in order to make it hanpen... Please, we do need their help..." Chavez said.

Chavez and other supporters held a skating party Sunday to raise funds for HAA. Only 10 people participated, paying \$3 to skate.

The group also participated in skating games and the three winners recieved a free helicopter ride.

In the past two weeks, Chavez said they've only had about 200 people sign up to participate in the human chain.

Chavez said he couldn't say locally how many people are going to be in the chain because registrations mailed to the national headquarters and there's no way to keep track of how many are from here.

The local count is out of his hands, but Chavez has signed up approximately 50 people from Hereford. "And more are eded," he added.

"We're going to need more people than what we're getting," said Chavez. "We're going to need more people to sign up if the chain's going to come together like we want it

He half-joked that they need another 10,000 people but said they are having people sign up every day so it's helping to cut

The minimum donation to participate in the human chain is \$10 and the person receives a certificate of appreciation. For \$25, people will receive an offical Hands Across America T-shirt and the certificate. A \$35 donation purchases a T-shirt, lapel pin, sun visor, and the certificate.

The deadline for registering in the chain is May 15. But Chavez said everyone needs to sign up now so they can receive their gifts in time to wear on May 25.

Chavez advised against try-ing to register on the day of the event. "It will be hard to do that. On the 25th, there will be people there and if you're going to be a part of it you should sign up now," explained Chavez.
"Beside's you'll get your gifts."
Participants in the chain will

just go to the line on the day this happens. "The line will be on I-40. As far as on the south side or the north side, we don't know yet. It depends on what the event does," said Chavez.

The agenda for May 25 will include singing three songs, "We Are the World", "Hands Across America", and the traditional "America the Beautiful", while holding hands to form the human chain. Celebrities also will be in the chain.

Chavez said Kenny Rogers has donated just about all that day to support HAA.

"Kenny Rogers has already picked where he's going to stand but you'll have to come out and look for him because I'm not going to tell," he said. He mentioned their also might be another big celebrity on the Hereford part of the chain.

"But if people don't get out there and participate this is not going to happen," Chaves said. Brochures to register can be picked up at local stores in Sugarland Mall and KPAN.

"One person's \$10 is not going to feed all the hungry and the iomeless in America," said Chavez. "We're going to need everybody's \$10 to make it hap-

# Business owner miffed about vandals

According to Gilbert Arellano, owner of Lithographics, the vandalism has occurred many times before. This time the damage was estimated at \$200.

"We have to play clean-up every

Monday morning picking up beer cans and trash they leave for us. Instead of going to work on Mondays we have to spend 30 to 45 minutes every week cleaning up before we can really start to work," Arellano

Arellano said he got a phone call around 10 p.m. Sunday from his cousin who said some kids had a water hose attached to his faucet to spray at passing vehicles.

"It looked like a car wash out there last night," Arrellano said Monday. "The kids were filling water coolers and throwing the water at cars, having a water fight."

Arellano called the Hereford Police Department after he got to the shop. The HPD said it couldn't do anything about it unless he had signs posted, but Arellano showed them his

The two signs posted, which are 20x28 inches, read "No littering, no tresspassing, violators will be prosecuted." Arellano said the signs have been posted since the first of

The police then told Arellano that they couldn't do anything about the vandalism unless he filed charges - which he did Monday morning.

"We have to start getting someone arrested and fined for somebody to learn," said Arellano. "I wouldn't care if they parked there and do whatever they do, except don't mess

"This is just the beginning of summer- it's going to be a long summer and there's going to be some vandalism if we don't stop it now," he concluded.

#### State mascot has fractured back

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — The state's Sesquicentennial mascot, a 1,524-pound longhorn with a Texas-shaped mark on its forehead, has lost the use of its hind legs and may have to be destroyed.

The animal, named Texas USA, disappeared last Wednesday on a ranch where he had been kept near Jacksboro, about 60 miles northwest of Fort Worth. He was found on the ranch Saturday, injured and unable to move.

The bull was moved to the Texas A&M large animal clinic for treatment.

Dr. Jan Cornick, a veterinarian at the clinic, said the bull may have fallen or been involved in a fight and suffered a broken back. Large bulls sometimes receive such injuries during breeding season and the injury probably occurred the day he disappeared, she

"The bull is a parapalegic and unable to use its hind legs," said Dr. David L. Morris, associate professor of large animal medicine and surgery at Texas A&M University's veterinary school.

Morris said a decision on keeping the animal alive would be made in three to five days.

# Oil dependency could be threat

HOUSTON (AP) — The balance of payments deficit for petroleum imports alone could reach as much as \$130 billion by 1990 unless the United States takes action such as imposing an oil import fee, the chairman of Houston-based Mitchell Energy & Development Corp.

"Enactment of an import fee on oil, gas and petrochemicals is essential. The fee is the quickest and best solution to this serious national problem," George Mitchell said at a news conference Monday with Gov. Mark White.

"If structured to encourage natural gas development, an import fee will permit us to be 80 percent self-sufficient by the end of the

Mitchell and White said an import fee of \$10 per barrel would restore the nation's ability to develop its resources as well as offset deficit spending.

"Our national security is threatened, our balance of payments deficit is headed toward deeper waters — as much as \$130 billion by 1990 for petroleum imports alone — and the nation's banking system is under pressure," Mitchell said.

Within a few years, Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, and the United Arab Emirates will set oil prices where they want them - and I assure you that level will not be \$15 per barrel," he said.

The United States paid \$117.7 billion for foreign imports in 1985. If the Middle Eastern countries in a few years set oil at \$40 a barrel, the U.S. would be faced with a \$160.6 billion bill.

# Man dies after second transplant

ST. LOUIS (AP) - Robert Ottinger never lost his will to live, even after he had to undergo a second transplant operation when he was mistakenly given the wrong heart, says his oldest son.

Ottinger, 47, of Bonne Terre, Mo., died at Barnes afternoon, a little more than a month after receiving his second

"None of us knew this was coming," his son, Robert, said Monday. "It was a complete surprise. We thought he was making progress." Ottinger underwent a second heart transplant at Barnes on April 4

after doctors learned during the first transplant, on March 21, that the donor heart had been mismatched for blood type at Wichita Falls, Texas, General Hospital.

Ottinger was discharged from Barnes on April 25, but was readmitted after a routine biopsy indicated some rejection of the second heart, said Barnes spokesman John Miller.

Earlier this month Ottinger filed a \$20 million lawsuit against the Texas hospital, claiming that it had "carelessly and negligently provided a B Type blood heart, but, in fact, represented that said heart was an A Type blood heart."

## Bill would lift oil rig sales ban

WASHINGTON (AP) - A declassified CIA report suggests that the 1979 embargo on oil equipment sales to the Soviet Union was futile and only damaged the U.S. oil industry, says Sen. Lloyd Bent-

Bentsen said Monday he was introducing legislation, cosponsored by Sen. John Heinz, R-Pa., to lift the embargo because the Reagan administration had failed to do so.

The Bentsen bill would leave in place restrictions based on national security.

The embargo was imposed by the Carter administration after the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan and has been maintained by the Reagan administration.

"The current controls on the export of oil-field equipment to the USSR are useless in terms of foreign policy impact and very damaging to a key U.S. industry that is in deep trouble," Bentsen said. He said the embargo did not work because it was not matched by

other key nations and resulted only in loss of sales and jobs for the United States. "The futility of these controls has been documented by the Central

Intelligence Agency in a study entitled, 'Soviet Needs for Western Petroleum Technology and Equipment,'' said Bentsen. He said the CIA released a declassified version of the report at his request.

# Drug trafficking increases sharply

WASHINGTON (AP) — A sharp increase in narcotics trafficking from Mexico is causing strains in U.S.-Mexican relations, with each country accusing the other of not doing enough to resolve the pro-

State Department deputy spokesman Charles Redman said Mon-day that "deeply entrenched corruption among (Mexican) officials nominally engaged in anti-narcotics programs" is partly responsible for the increase. But Mexican Embassy spokesman Leonardo Ffrench said his

government is doing its best to fight drug trafficking and pointed out that 300 Mexican agents have died or been wounded in the struggle over the past decade.

The two countries normally try to resolve differences in private, but one U.S. official said Redman's statement reflected a conscious decision to be more open in discussing problems with Mexico.

Given the magnitude of the drug problem and other issues, "We're going to look pretty stupid if we soft-pedal too much," said the of-

ficial, who spoke only on condition of anonymity.

# **Nuke site** would be on Indian land

TOWNSHIP 4ND, Maine (AP) -The Passamaquoddy and Penobscot Indians are gradually regaining ownership of their ancestral hunting grounds from the white men, but a new takeover threat has them joining forces with whites to fight it.

The 92-square-mile area of rolling hills, forests and lakes in remote northern Maine has attracted the U.S. Department of Energy, which is seeking a site to store high-level radioactive wastes generated in the East.

"Why do they always pick on the Indian reserves?" asked Lola Sockabasin, 75, a tribe member who said he hunted and trapped on the land since he was a child. "Why? That's what I'd like to know."

The Indians are regaining ownership of much of the area through a land-claim settlement with the state and federal governments that was negotiated in 1980 to compensate the tribes for land they say was stolen and cheated from them by white set-

But part of the land, which the DOE calls the Bottle Lake Complex, is one of 12 candidates for the nuclear dump, and although no decision is expected before the turn of the century, preliminary work has already drawn the wrath of Indian leaders.

Passamaquoddy Indians made their feelings known earlier this year by ordering DOE officials off one of their two eastern Maine reservations, abruptly ending a briefing on the nuclear dump planning.

"We will not tamely submit to federal tyranny any more than our ancestors did to the tyranny of King George III," Glenn Starbird told DOE officials at a hearing last week. "We are united and we will fight this

White people who live near the Bottle Lake Complex, and those who cater to sportsmen who fish in nearby Grand Lake for its celebrated landlocked salmon, say they share the Indians' anger.

Another site in southeastern Maine is also under consideration.

# Soviets provide details

MOSCOW (AP) - The Soviet Union said today that six people had died in the Chernobyl nuclear disaster, and that the stricken reactor's white-hot core had threatened to burn through the earth and into a water reservoir before experts cooled it.

In a report from Chernobyl, the Communist Party newspaper Pravda quoted physicist Yevgeny Velikhov, one of those leading the cleanup effort, as saying a crisis developed 10 days after a chemical explosion rocked reactor No. 4 which

caught on fire. According to his report, the crisis would have developed on May 6.

"The reactor was damaged. Its heart was a white-hot core, a scorched, active zone that was somehow 'hanging,' " Velikhov, vice president of the Soviet Academy of Sciences, told Pravda.

Velikhov said scientists feared that a massive shield of sand, lead and other material dropped on top of the reactor to reduce radioactive emissions would force the burning core downward into a reservoir of water below, Pravda reported.

"Would we manage to keep it intact or would it go down into the earth? No one in the world has ever

been in such a complex position," Velikhov told Pravda.

Scientists decided to pump out the water and then began drilling holes to create a "cooling zone" that would carry heat away from the reactor. It was not clear where the holes were drilled, but Velikhov said the experi-

ment was a success. The government newspaper Izvestia has said topsoil in a "danger zone" is being removed and the area paved over with concrete. It did not say how big the zone is.

# Seal failure possible

NEW YORK (AP) - Nearly six months before the Challenger explosion, NASA was told of a test that showed the spacehip's booster rockets could fail at temperatures of 50 degrees or lower, The New York Times reported in Tuesday editions.

Ruptures of booster rocket seals are blamed for the Jan. 28 disaster, which killed the seven astronauts aboard. The Challenger exploded 74 seconds after being launched in 36-degree weather, much colder than any previous shuttle launch.

# Talk to professional

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I'm a 30-year-old professional male with a problem that is ruining my life. I recently joined a health club but I'm unable to use the sauna or swimming pool. I get heart palpitations, break out in a cold sweat, and can't breathe. The problem is getting

I can't sit in my car if there are raindrops or snow on the windshield. I get this feeling of panic and am terrified of suffocating. At night if the bedcovers or pillows cover my face I go crazy. I now find it very difficult to get into an elevator or sit too close to anyone in a car or a restaurant booth. I always have to sit near the aisle in the theater or sports arena. When I get on an airplane I have to sit on the aisle or I feel trapped.

I know I have a form of claustrophobia but I don't want to go for counseling because I'm afraid if people find out I'm seeing a therapist, they will think I'm unstable and it will hurt my career.

My mother told me that when I was

2 years old we were in a blizzard and our car ran out of gas. She and Dad left me in the car while they went to get gas. The snow was piled up all over the windows and I was alone, crying for four hours until they returned.

i know most phobias stem from fears of abandonment and am pretty sure this is where my problems began, but how can I help myself?-BREATHLESS IN CONN.

DEAR CONN.: You have a clear understanding of your problem and what caused it, but knowing something intellectually does not help when a person has been serious traumatized. Reading about it isn't enough. You must talk about it with a professional until you have worked through all those childhood fears.

Get over the notion that people will think you are crazy if they find out you are in therapy. More to the point. they will think you are crazy if you exhibit the fears you described and DON'T get professional help. As your phobias become more intense and widespread you will become more emotionally crippled. I urge you to check with the Phobia Society of America, 133 Rollins Ave., Suite 4-B, Dept. # Calcium important to many

try to drink a smaller amount at one time, eat yogurt or cheese, or drink milk with lactase, advises a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutritionist.

Lactase is an enzyme that breaks down milk sugar, says Dr. Symple Cooksey. You may find milk already containing lactase in the grocery store, or you can buy lactase in a drug store and add it to your milk.

If you don't drink milk because you simply don't like it, the nutritionist suggests eating more of other foods that provide calcium.

High calcium foods include those made with milk or cheese and tofo, a soybean product that is often made with calcium sulfate. A half cup of

If you have trouble digesting milk, tofu made with calcium sulfate has about the same amount of calcium. protein and fat as a cup of whole

> Dark green leafy vegetables and tortillas made with cornmeal also provide some calcium. Canned or dried fish with eible bones, such as salmon, will also contribute calcium to the diet, she notes.

> "Getting enough calcium is especially important for children, teenagers, pregnant and nursing women and people at risk for osteoporosis," says Cooksey. "So if you don't drink milk or eat milk products, check with a dietitian, nutritionist or physician to help you plan ways to get this important mineral."

# A&M economist uses rodents to test theories

(AP)- Even as you think about putting away some cash for a rainy day, there are rats here making the same choices. Thinking of changing brands of gasoline to get a better price? Ray Battalio, a Texas A&M University economist, has rodents mulling over a similar decision.

People deal with checking accounts, money market funds, savings accounts and income taxes. They buy gasoline, frozen dinners and cigarettes.

For the rats used in Battalio's economics research laboratory, the choices are different - food pellets, root beer, and tonic water - but the behavior is the same as people involved in the rat race.

"There are very few behavior patterns that are species specific," Battalio says, meaning rats, pigeons, monkeys, and even amoeba will do the same things as humans given the same choices

Economics is an old field, but economics research - the testing of theories to see if they're true or can be proven - is relatively new. A meeting of economics researchers 16 years ago had 16 participants. A meeting last month drew nearly 100 researchers.

Most of them, however, use humans in their experiments. Battalio and colleague J.H. Kagel of the University of Houston may have the only rat lab in the country devoted to

Battalio began using rats in the early 70s while at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. A psychologist suggested rats because they're cheaper and easier to con-

"It would be difficult to get a person, cut their income by 25 percent, for example, and study how they react," he said.

They began with one rat. Now there are 22 rats in the lab, located in an office building in the center of the A&M campus. Kagel, a former A&M

Battalio and Kagel get ideas for experiments from articles in economic journals. They read aabout new theories, interpret them and model an experiment to fit the interpreta-

A recent two-year experiment, for example, tested a theory that low income workers spend money rather than save it, while high income workers save money.

To simulate a human environment, researchers created two classes of rat: poor and rich. The poor rats were slightly underfed while rich rats were fed normally.

Each was put in a cage with a computer-controlled food dispenser. One lever was timed to pay off with one pellet after a six-second wait. The second lever gave the rats four pellets, but only after a 20-second

The result was that the poor rats waited for more food, symbolic of ! their desire to save, while the rich rats couldn't wait, meaning they went for the fast payoff.

The conclusion? Poor people are willing to invest in their futures.

Another theory tested showed that rats, given the choice between paying more for a favored food or making another choice, would rather work less for their second choice.

In this case, the choices were root beer, which they love, and tonic water, which they didn't like as much as root beer. Cost was a few times meant a low cost. Pushing it several times meant a higher cost. When given the choice of pressing the lever a few times for tonic water of many times for root beer, rats choose the tonic water. When the root beer cost the same, root beer won out four to one.

The conclusion is that in hard times, people are willing to like what they can afford.

The studies, which include limited testing on humans, are funded through National Science Foundation grants. That fact earned Battalio and Kagel a Golden Fleece award from Sen. William Proxmire several years ago for experiments done with pigeons to test a labor-supply curve theory.

But Battalio isn't discouraged. saying that the experiments, although directed at testing economic theory, can be applied to other disciplines.

One use may be with environmental impact statements required in large construction projects. One consideration is the impact the project will have on animal habitats and food supply. Using the techniques

#### DR. GOTT Medication won't cause addiction

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT — After 37 years of being told "it's all in your head," I've finally been diagnosed as having Meniere's Disease. I keep the dizzy spells under control with Meclizine and niacin. Are these addictive, and do they have any long-term side effects?

DEAR READER — Meclizine and niacin have no long-term side effects.

DEAR READER — Meclizine and niacin have no long-term side effects of consequence. They are not addictive and may enable you, at long last, to enjoy a normal life.

DEAR DR. GOTT — Is it possible for the afterbirth to be left inside a woman without causing any major health problem? About one year ago,

after my son was born, I began to have a terrible body odor. I wouldn't have considered the afterbirth until a couple of months ago, when my sister-in-law had a baby. The doctor told her she still had some afterbirth left from a previous child. Is there any way to

diagnose this without surgery?

DEAR READER — Portions of the placenta (afterbirth) can remain em-bedded in the uterine lining after de-livery. Because the placental pieces cease to function at birth, they can cause bleeding and infection unless they are removed. Ultrasound examinations can help the doctor identify large placental remnants, but usually a dilatation and curettage (D and C, or scraping) is necessary both for diagnosis and treatment.

DEAR DR. GOTT - I've heard that high cholesterol levels can cause heart attacks. Is there any danger in low levels? If so, how low?

DEAR READER — There is no danger in a low-level of blood cholesterol unless this level reflects malnutrition. In a suitably nourished adult, the lower the cholesterol, the better. Even if a person were to eat no cho-lesterol at all, the liver would produce enough for metabolism.

DEAR DR. GOTT - What's the best way to stop biting my nails? I've tried everything.

DEAR READER - This is a tough question; you wouldn't be asking it if there were a generally accepted way to stop nailbiting. Behavior modification, putting adhesive tape on what's left of your nails, counseling and hypnosis are helpful for some people, but am not aware of any sure-cure from readers. do of the standing we

DEAR DR. GOTT - I'm 23 and have a dreadful time with acne on my face and back. I'm through with dermatologists, who give me useless topical creams, and I hate the idea of taking antibiotics the rest of my life. My eating habits are good. I take codliver oil and rub vitamin A oil on my skin at night. What else can I do to help?

DEAR READER - There are many new treatments for acne. Ask your dermatologist to refer you to the skin clinic at a teaching hospital. Per-haps super-specialists can help you.

DEAR DR. GOTT - What is your opinion about the theory that osteoar-thritis and rheumatoid arthritis are caused by an amoeba? I heard that this is being researched at three medi-cal schools, but that the Rheumatoid Disease Foundation and the American Medical Association doesn't

approve.

DEAR READER — Osteoarthritis is caused by the natural wearing away of joints that occurs with age. Rheumatoid arthritis is a form of joint inflammation. I am not aware of the AMA's position on amoebas as a cause of rheumotoid arthritis. Although there is a study in progress to investigate this possibility, I believe that the reports are, as yet,

inconclusive.

DEAR DR. GOTT — It seems that my liver does not expel iron. I am a moderate drinker, but my doctor thinks I'm a real lush. What causes this type of liver ailment and what

damage can be done?

DEAR READER — Toxic levels of iron can build up in the liver and in other structures. Iron overload can result from the faulty regulation of iron absorption and from repeated blood transfusions. If you are a heavy drinker, your liver problem is more likely to be caused by alcohol than by iron. Often the people in a drinker's environment are more reliable judges of the amount consumed. Listen to your doctor and get off the booze.

#### **POLLY'S** Turn maple syrup **POINTERS** into maple sugar

make maple sugar from maple syr-up? — LINDA

DEAR LINDA — Yes, you can make maple sugar from real 100 percent maple syrup by boiling the syrup. The following method comes from the New York Cooperative Extension

program: The syrup must be cooked at a hard boil until it reaches a temperature of 25 degrees above the boiling point of water at your altitude (find this by using a candy thermometer to measure the temperature of boiling water). Since the syrup will boil up quite a bit, you must use a large pan to prevent boilovers. Allow the cooked syrup to cool to 155 degrees Fahrenheit, then stir it with a wooden spoon to form crystals. While still semi-liquid, pour the sugar syrup into a pan or molds. This will form a soft maple sugar cake. You can make hard crystalline sugar by bringing the syrup tempera-ture to 26-to-28 degrees above the boiling point of water, cooling to 150 degrees, then stirring to form large crystals. Pour into a pan or mold to

tightly wrapped to protect it from moisture. — POLLY

DEAR POLLY - Here's my easy method for preparing fresh pineap-ple. Cut off the top and bottom. Using a vegetable brush, wash and brush the pineapple, then dry it with a paper

Place the pineapple upright in a low pan or container to catch any juice as you work. Trim the outside of the pineapple with an electric knife (or any large sharp knife), not cutting too deep. Then cut out the eyes or in-dentations with a grapefruit knife. This sound like it takes a lot of time, but it really doesn't and saves a lot of the fruit and juices. When completely trimmed, cut the pineapple in quarters and remove the hard center. It's ready to dice. Be sure to use the juice you've collected in the pan. — MRS. O.P.K.

DEAR POLLY - What types of

DEAR POLLY — What types of playpens are safest for babies? I've heard that some kinds can cause accidents. — MRS. S.D. — The No. 1 cause of death in young children is accidents, many of which are caused by using unsafe baby equipment, or using any baby equipment incorrectly. Here's the lowdown on playpens.

Be wary of net playpens with sides that collapse down toward the floor. If the sides accidentally collapse, a baby could become caught in the mesh side. A better choice would be a playpen with sides that fold together vertically or one with special safety features that prevent accidental collapsing.

collapsing.

A mesh-sided (net) playpen must pings some pings than one-quarter of an inch. Mesh larger than this can be used by a climbing baby for toeholds. In addition, if the baby falls, a button could become caught in larger mesh, leav-years.

no farther apart than 2% inches. The best advice is to only use a

playpen for occasional instances when you have no other safe place to put the baby. Babies are much better off being allowed to explore freely provided the house is safe and childproofed. Never confine a baby to a playpen for hours at a time, and never leave a baby completely unattended

### In remote West Texas

# Officers recall battles for law, order

ALPINE, Texas (AP) - Law and order along the border in this rugged West Texas territory has co-existed with a fierce personal independance that spurred on founding settlers nearly 100 years ago.

Brewster County, the state's largest, is a frontier cut from mountains and deep canyons in the Rio Grande's Big Bend area, equal in size to Connecticut and Rhode Island.

About 8,000 people populate the 6,169 square miles that extend from Alpine southward to the town of Lajitas bordering Mexico.

It is a widespread area where the law of the land is survival.

Residents have always depended as much upon themselves as they do on the lawmen whose job it is to protect the isolated interiors and the hundred miles of river front.

On the Brewster County Courthouse grounds stands a memorial to the pioneers; called "Explorers and sons of the soil."

The hallway walls inside the courthouse, built along with the adjoining jail in 1888, are lined with photographs depicting the history of the territory.

Since the time of John M. Flint, remembered as a Brewster County rancher, cattle rustler and train robber, bandits have been chased by posses from Texas across the border to Mexico.

Flint and his gang were known for rustling cattle in neighboring counties, driving them to hideaways on the Mexican side of the Rio Grande, altering the brands and later shipping the cattle for sale.

In 1891, Flint's career as a bandit came to an end following a long trail of pursuits by Texas Ranger Capt. Frank Jones, leading a posse of five Rangers and five citizens.

Jones and his posse pursued the gang on both sides of the river for several days before the bandits were finally taken captive after a running gun battle.

Flint, who was badly wounded, committed suicide with his own gun. Brewster County Sheriff George Jones and three deputies still follow the long-established trend set by lawmen in the past.

Detailing his pursuit of a Mexican national accused of raping and robbing a woman in south Brewster County, Jones called the area, "The end of

"There's nothing there, just the river," Jones told the San Angelo Standard-Times

Jones and his deputies pursued the man about 18 miles from Terlingua to the Brewster County line on the Mexican border, where the suspect abandoned a pickup truck belonging to the victim and escaped across the river into Mexico.

Several months later the suspect was seized in a commando-style raid of the Ojinaga, Mexico jail and returned to Brewster County, where he was found nude and tied to a tree at a roadside park. The incident made international headlines.

"We get a lot of problems here with Mexicans coming across the border and stealing, then going right back," Jones said, attributing economic problems to the increase in crime along

"We're really getting more and more problems with thefts. Cars. trucks and anything left lying around," he said. "There's just a lot of territory here to cover."

Former Texas Ranger Arthur Hill of Alpine recalls many pursuits across the border during his 27 years with Company E. He worked as a Department of Public Safety trooper for 33 years prior to becoming a Ranger.

Hill, 72, retired in 1974 after working major crimes in five counties including Brewster, Presidio, Jeff Davis, Reeves and Pecos. "That's an awful lot of square miles. I worked from El Paso to Del Rio and I worked many, many times in Mexico.

"I worked most of that river company along the Mexican border," he

Hill said the low numbers of law enforcement officials to cover the vast area has long been a problem. 'We could use a lot more, especially at times.

"We don't even have a Ranger, right now and we sure need one. There's a lot of dope and thefts that come from across the border.

"Not everyone is qualified to work the Mexican border because you've got to have connections on the other side. It takes a while to make contacts," he said.

Hill investigated, and caught the murderers of two sheriffs in neighboring Presidio County during.

The first, Sheriff Otis "Blackie" Morrow, was killed March 11, 1950.

"A wetback Mexican shot and killed him. Blackie had him under arrest and the man grabbed his gun and shot him," Hill said.

"I trailed him into Mexico in hot pursuit. Two or three days later I arrested him near Coyame, Chihuahua at his home."

But Hill said the suspect continued to elude him.

"I never could get him back to Texas. The Mexicans would not honor extradition.

"I went across time after time and once I got him back to Ojinaga, but they took him back to Chihuahua." Hill said. Hill also investigated the murder

of Sheriff Ernest "Hank" Hamilton who was killed April 27, 1973. George S. Duckworth was convicted in the killing.

The sheriff had been called by a Presidio rancher to investigate a suspicious vehicle parked on his ranch-property.

"Hank tried to get (Duckworth) out of the car but he locked the door. The sheriff ran to the other side of the car and opened the passenger door and when he did, Duckworth started shooting," Hill said.

Hill said Duckworth had a tape recorder running inside the car at the time of the shooting.

"That's what convicted him," he recalled.

"You could hear it all. The sheriff begged him to get out of the car. You could hear the shooting and Hank apparently fell onto the microphone. "You could hear him breathe his

last breath." On July 13, 1973, Duckworth was

sentenced to life in prison, Hill said. Hill retired the following year. "There was not so many cattle thefts as you might think but there were a good many murder cases. I

never ran from them," Hill said. "A whole lot of them were Mexican shootouts - beer joint killings." Hill said there have been many

changes in law enforcement since

"Now, there are too many restrictions on the peace officer. Used to, you could take a suspect in and question him. Now, you have to give him all kinds of warnings.

"We were trained to interrogate suspects and that has done away with interrogation," he said.

Now, Hill said he enjoys the open land, which he describes as, "the quietest part of the state.

"I like the people. They are usually dependable, honest and trustworthy. Most of them are friendly and accommodating."








# Mexico considered 'greatest national security problem'

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Because of its proximity to the United States, Mexico in the past has gotten special treatment for its economic troubles and likely will have an edge in working out its latest financial woes.

Aftershocks of economic and political problems in Mexico have often been felt across the border, prompting more sensitivity in the United States to the concerns of its neighbor than there might be toward nations with similar economic troubles farther south.

Riordan Roett, director of Latin American studies at Johns Hopkins University's School for Advance International Studies in Washington, D.C., considers Mexico to be the United States' "greatest national security problem."

Robert Pastor, a Fulbright professor at the Colegio de Mexico in Mexico City and a former aide to President Carter, said, "The United States should be sensitive and helpful to Mexico because if Mexico fails, we will share in the consequences."

Even so, bankers and other

analysts report a growing impatience with Mexico because they argue it has been slow to implement changes needed to restore its economy to health. The economy is burdened with a foreign debt of \$97.6 billion, the second largest in the developing world after Brazil.

"There's a very negative attitude in Washington and New York City that the Mexican government is not doing anything (to solve its financial problems)," said Roett.
A U.S. banker in Mexico City, who

spoke on condition of anonymity, said, "We all felt more confidence in 1983 than in 1986."

Still, analysts argue that Mexico should get top priority in resolving its problems.

"Mexico stands out as Numero Uno," said Allen Sinai, chief economist at the New York financial concern of Shearson Lehman Brothers.

"Mexico is the key case for management of the world economy," he said. "If Mexico can be finessed over its difficulties, then so can the other (Latin American) countries be finessed through."

Industrialized nations and the international financial community are expected to put together a package of about \$6 billion to \$6.5 billion for Mexico this year.

The commercial banks are likely to come up with an estimated \$2.5 billion in fresh money and agree to further postponement of \$950 million in principal payments. After last September's deadly earthquakes, bankers postponed the payments for six months and granted an additional six-month delay in March.

According to government officials and bankers, the debt package might also contain as much as \$3 billion in credits, assistance and concessions from industrialized nations and international financial organizations like the World Bank.

The debt package is far from complete. Bankers insist that before any discussions on new loans, Mexico work out an agreement with the International Monetary Fund on a fresh economic program.

The IMF and Mexico, according to one analyst, have been unable to agree on an austerity goal for reducing the federal budget. The analyst, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said IMF technicians are pressing for a sharper cut than Mexico so

far has been willing to commit to.

Up until last year, Mexico had been considered the model for other heavily indebted countries by imposing belt-tightening measures that reduced the inflation rate and revived the ailing economy.

But its efforts suffered a serious setback last year. Consumer prices soared nearly 65 percent, the peso currency weakened roughly 100 percent, and the budget deficit was double government projections.

The outlook for this year is just as gloomy.

The economy has been badly battered by the collapse of prices in the world oil market. The government depends on crude sales to bring in about 70 percent of its foreign revenues, which go mostly to pay interest on the debt.

With the sharp plunge in oil prices, analysts worry that Mexico will ha%e trouble meeting its interest payments.

But a high Treasury Department official, who demanded anonymity, said the government is current on its interest payments, paying \$5.5

billion from October through March. It is scheduled to pay \$7.5 billion in interest in all of this year, a sum that has been reduced from earlier projections by the recent fall in world interest rates

In August 1982, Mexico sent shock

waves through the financial com-munity when it announced it couldn't meet payments on its foreign debt.

U.S. government officials worked with the international financial community to come up with a rescue plan that required Mexico to impose austerity measures in exchange for financial help.
