Burel Block Has Completed Course

Burel Block, Muleshoe High School teacher has successfully completed the curriculum of the Summer Foreign Language Institute in Spanish at the University of Florida. The institute program was carried out in cooperation with the U. S. Office of Education under the National Defense Education Act and it included 58 high school teachers of Spanish, mostly from the state of Florida.

The course of study stressed two main objectives: instruction in the audio-lingual methods of teaching a foreign language improvements of the participant command of the language, and knowledge of the culture of the foreign area. During the seven weeks of the institute program, in one of the dormitories on campus they ate their meals together and Spanish was the official language spoke. Several Spanish movies and other cultural events were included in the program. A demonstration class was carried on as part of the cultural and the participants and an opportunity to observe the methods they were learning in the institute class.

ANNE CAMP NEW LIBRARIAN

(EDITORS NOTE: The following is a story written by Anne concerning her interest in books, Library and background.

Let me say first, that I am happy that the Muleshoe Area Area Library is to be opened to the public and that I feel honored to be a part of the worth while undertaking. I want to thank the Library board for giving me the opportunity to serve as your librarian. I just hope that you will be patient with us, if things aren't thoroughly organized when it opens, but I will do my best to work out all the details as we go along. I hope too that we can all cooperate; the Library board, The City Council The Friends of the Library, the State Bookmobile staff, and you the reading public, and that we might work together to make this, not just a successful venture, but to put the roots of a good library deep into our community life.

As for my background: my love for books, and self education thru reading was implanted in my early home life. Without telling my age I can remember the family all sitting around the old kerosene lamp at night, taking turns reading aloud. We laughed at stories of Mark Twain, we wept with David Copperfield, and Oliver Twist. (I was so moved at the cruel fates of latter, I wanted to go out and find these poor wretched orphans and give them a home.)

Then were the exciting times once week when our copy of The Saturday Evening Post arrived and the continued stories were read aloud. I remember so vividly one about this family, who traveled from place to place in a wagon, with a goat, rooster, and hens. (I don't know if you get very far from the standpoint of miles, but week in and week out we delighted in their very humorous sheenigans. We felt that it was privilege to read.

I was asked why I was interested in Library work in particular, I said that it must be because I grew up, literally in a Public library, and now where some people might be reminded of home by the smell of roses or honeysuckle, I always get home sick or nostalgic when I get the musty smell of old books in my nostrils. Bro. Perry asked me to tell this part of my life: During the depression years, we lived in town with no library. About the only reading material available was funny papers (not even comic books yet) My

mother, who had taught school many years, longed to see a good library. So being a very determined person, and with no funds available she simply opened a room of our home to the public to be used for a Free Library.

So with no salary, and with just our own books (round 200) which included several reference sets such as the old "World Book," she made cards, kept a ledger with readers names and invited everyone in town to come in. From this small beginning, the library grew and grew. As soon as we could manage to get one set of shelves built, it was filled, and we needed another. Most who came once to visit came many, many times, donated books, periodicals, and dropped pennies nickles, and times in a fruit jar we had on the table to buy "Brand new books." Our little room just bulged at the seams and many times you could find 8 to 10 children sitting on the steps or grass looking over books my sister and I always helped, and there was always plenty to do. We mended books, we checked in and out, kept the shelves straight or just any of many little jobs that need to be done. We even had a childrens story hour, taking turns at telling the stories. Then after we had to enclose the front porch and it too became crowded.

The city offered to provide a building downtown for the library. So after 5 years of having lived with a library, in our home we moved it, about 5000 books See Librarian Page 5

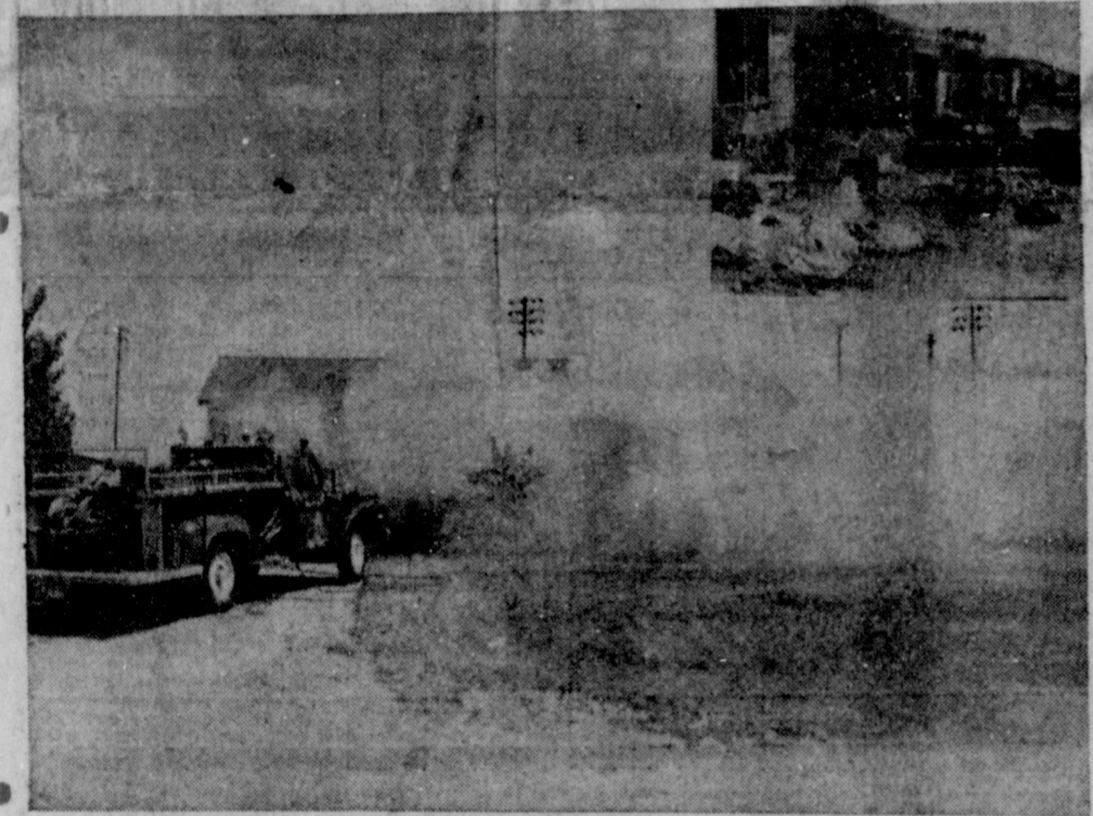

Fire Razes Burris Home Wednesday

home of Z. N. Burris was almost completely destroyed by fire. Damage was estimated at \$5,000 to the home and \$4,000 to the contents. The fire apparently started as Burris and his wife were painting a room in the house and Mrs. Burris went out side and as Mr. Burris turned to go outside also, he evidently knocked over a small can of gasoline

used to clean the brushes, the fumes from the gasoline ignited by the hot water heater quickly engulfed the home. Burris tried to call the Fire department from his home but the intense heat drove him from the house before the call could be completed. Mrs. Burris then ran to a neighbors home and found no one at home. Burris then drove to the Fire department to report the fire, but by that time another neighbor had spotted the flames and smoke and notified the fire men. By the time the firemen got to the residence, the flames were shooting out from the front window and door. Several fire men entered the home wearing gas mask and tried to save part of the clothing and furniture, altho little was to be saved due to the intensity of the blaze, and the fast spreading of the flames firemen were aided in the battle of the fire by the firemen road blocks set up by City Patrolman Harold White and Deputy Sheriff Bob Henderson and County Constable, J. Chicago Plans Second Art Museum

A sedate graystone center of jurisprudence on swank Lake Shore Drive may become a center for the creative arts if a group of Chicago art lovers has its way.

The building, soon to be vacated by the U. S. Court of Appeals, is under consideration as a site for a gallery of contemporary art to supplement and complement the city's only major art museum - The Art Institute of Chicago.

"The idea of setting up a second museum in Chicago has been kicked around for a long time," architect Danforth Rockwell Brenner said, "but the idea has been crystallized" with the possible acquisition of the building. Brenner is temporary treasurer of the group, which was incorporated as a nonprofit, educational organization by the State of Illinois in April. Its official name is "The Gallery of Contemporary Art of Chicago."

The three-story structure, just beyond the northern edge of Chicago's Magnificent Mile of North Michigan Avenue, was built in 1922 as headquarters for an insurance company. It was taken over by the federal government in the late 1930s. It will be left empty with the consolidation of all Chicago federal offices into a newly completed downtown skyscraper.

Surplus federal buildings can be given to nonprofit, educational organizations if the GEENER Services Administration decides they are no longer useful to the government, said Brenner, who also heads the organization's site selection committee.

"We have been working very on this project," Mrs. Doris Land Butler, temporary president of the organization, said. The group, which actively involves nine Chicago area art critics, collectors, teachers and civic leaders, has been working closely with the Mayor's Committee for Economic and Cultural Development and with the Art Institute.

Mrs. Butler is a correspondent for Art in America and a former Chicago Daily News art critic. President of the Art Institute's board of trustees, has fished the project "Good speed and good luck," Mrs. Butler said.

When the organization first met with the Mayor's Committee in April, it asked for a show of support for the enterprise. So the group sent 1,000 letters ex-

plaining the aims of the museum to art lovers across the United States. They could boast 800 endorsements of the project by the time of the second meeting with the committee in May.

The gallery will not acquire any vice president and also a former art critic for the Daily News, reported. The emphasis, she said will be on contemporary art from all over the world. The exhibits will change constantly.

"Public edification and enlightenment" will be one of the aims of the gallery, Mrs. Butler said. Lectures, films, displays, exhibitions by artists will be sponsored to make the public aware of the artist as "a serious individual and a serious citizen," she said. As for financing the gallery, Brenner said the organization has already received several unsolicited offers from major foundations but they will not be accepted until the board of directors is selected in about a month. The board is expected to include men, Brenner said, and there are also "some well-heeled collectors" around town who might contribute financially.

"We want the board of directors to be a very democratic institution," Mrs. Friedlander said. "We want people on the board are interested in art and who care about art." Its membership of 28 or 30 persons will include an artist and an architect.

Another 1,000 letters have been mailed to the same persons who were requested to endorse the project. This time they were asked for names of persons who might make effective directors. The response has been very good so far, according to Mrs. Friedlander.

The establishment of the gallery would "make Chicago very important as a contemporary art center," Mrs. Butler said. "It would focus attention on the creative arts, attract more artists and collectors and inspire the establishment of more galleries."

Tourists Trade Brisk This Year

Business is brisk at tourist attractions across the state, a mid-year survey by the Texas Tourist Development Agency has disclosed. And it is expected to get even better during the last half of the year when most Americans vacation.

Attendance records for the first six months of 1964 show an increase of 15 per cent over the same period last year.

A breakdown of the figures reveals that, although Texans themselves still account for most of the business, an increasing number of out-of-state visitors are discovering the state's appeal.

In fact, gains ranging from 10 per cent in the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Farris in Lovington.

three to eight per cent in non-Texas business were reported. At least one said more than half its customers are now coming other states.

Included in the study were 16 state parks selected for their the state.

Together they reported serving 10,123,359 persons, an increase of 1,518,503 in comparison with the first half of 1963.

Largest single increase was reported at Lake Tawakoni by the Sabine River Authority that northeast Texas attraction, still relatively new, drew 1,040,000 during the first half of this year - an increase of 77 per cent over the same period last year.

In contrast, giant Lake Texoma on the Texas-Oklahoma border, grew only .02 per cent in attendance during the same period. But it still attracted 3,396,109 visitors, said the U. S. Corps of Engineers, to lead the list in total numbers.

"Business is better this summer, particularly in regard to gross dollars," said the Lake Texoma Association.

Among the leaders was Six

Flags Over Texas, the theme park between Dallas and Fort Worth, with a six-month attendance of 1,035,102. The increase was 25 per cent above last year.

Six Flags also reported an 8 per cent of total business in the first six months. "But," they added, "the ratio is climbing tremendously now that we are entering our peak season."

Up sharply too was the Buckhorn Hall of Horns at the Lone Star Brewery in San Antonio. It recorded a 21 per cent increase for the first half-year, hosting 249,838 visitors.

The Caverns of Sonora between Sonora and Ozona counted some 30,000 visitors for a 20 per cent increase.

San Marcos' Aquarena played host to 266,000 visitors, up nearly 16 per cent. Officials there estimate 20 per cent of their guests are non-Texas.

The Alamo, which said 129,973 visitors signed its register during the first six months, posted a 14 per cent increase.

"And July is showing a much heavier traffic than June, hinting further increases," said Alamo officials.

A 12 per cent gain was recorded by the Padre Island Causeway at Corpus Christi, having Padre Island.

Causeway officials, noting that 53 per cent of their visitors non-Texas traffic was up 3 per cent for the first six months Traffic described as "local" posted a 7 per cent gain, while that from the remainder of Texas shot up 52 per cent.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be

appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 59 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection which reads as follows: "(d) No law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless notice of the intention to introduce such a bill setting forth the general substance of the contemplated law shall have been published at least thirty (30) days and not more than ninety (90) days prior to the introduction thereof in a newspaper or newspapers having general circulation in the county or counties in which said district or any part thereof is or will be located and by delivering a copy of such notice and such bill to the Governor who shall submit such notice and bill to the Texas Water Commission, or its successor, which shall file its recommendation as to such bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker

of the House of Representatives within thirty (30) days from date notice was received by the Texas Water Commission. Such notice and copy of bill shall also be given of the introduction of any bill amending a law creating or governing a particular conservation and reclamation district if such bill (1) adds additional land to the district, (2) alters the taxing authority of the district (3) alters the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alters the qualifications or terms of office of the members of the governing body of the district." Section 2. 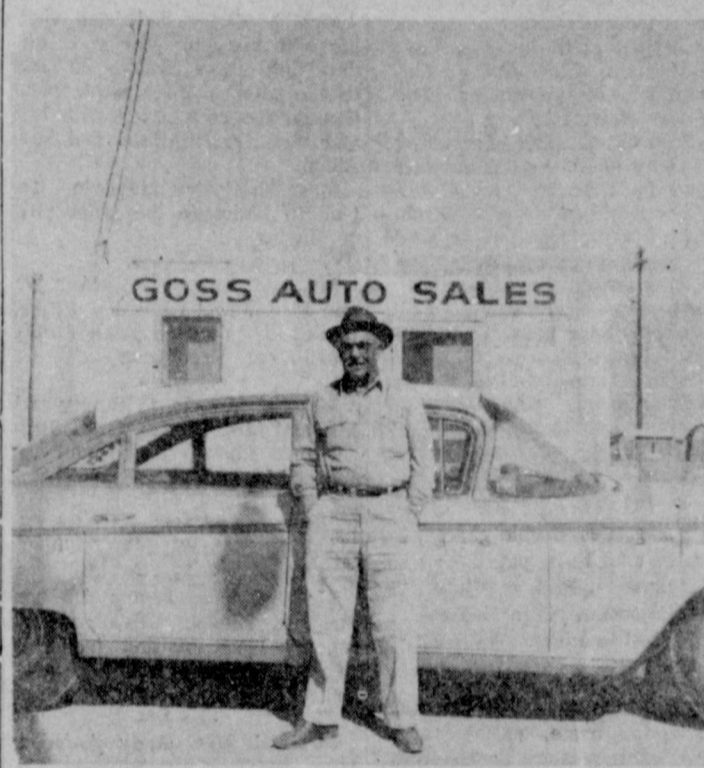

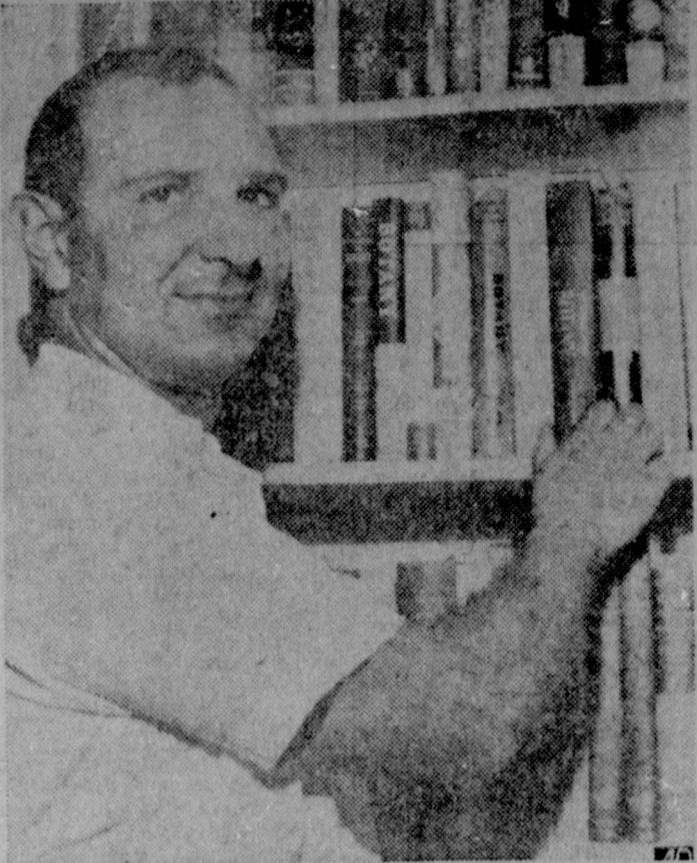

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10 proposing an Amendment to Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Subsection to be known as 51a-2; giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States for such medical payments; providing that the amounts paid out of state funds shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; providing that certain means relating to the correction or remedying of abnormalities of vision shall be included within such medical care service or assistance; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Subsection to be known as Subsection 51a-2, which shall read as follows:

"Subsection 51a-2. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws and to make payment for same, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for direct or vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; provided, further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States, such financial aid in the form of medical assistance on behalf of the needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age or over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services, as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care on behalf of needy individuals sixty-five (65) years of age and over who are not recipients of Old Age Assistance, and who are unable to pay for needed medical services; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such medical assistance; and providing that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided, further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and the laws of the State of Texas.

The payments for such medical assistance on behalf of such needy individuals shall be in such amounts as provided by the Legislature; provided, however, that the amounts paid out of state funds for such purposes shall never exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds for such purposes; provided, further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision.
