#### Precinct cuts considered, too

### **Automatic counting** system reviewed

By SHAWN COCKRUM Staff Writer

Under a plan devised by County Clerk David Ruland, the 12 polling places in Deaf Smith County would be reduced to eight and ballots wuld be counted by six automatic

Ruland presented the plan to the county commissioners Monday during their regular meeting.

The tabulators would cost between \$2,000 and \$4,000 each.

Ruland said if the county invested in the machines, the county could save \$2,176.07 per election.

"The machines would reduce the needed labor costs that we usually have during elections, and it would not take us until 1 or 2 in the morning to count the election returns," said

Voters would use a special ballot which would be marked with lead pencil, then "read" by the tabulator much the same way standardized scholastic tests are graded.

Under Ruland's plan, voters in Precinct 1 would vote at the Bull Barn, Precinct 2 at the courthouse, Precinct 3 at La Plata Jr. High, Precinct 4 at the Community Center, Precinct 5 at Palo Duro Baptist Church near Wildorado, Precinct 6 at Ford, Precinct 7 at the Simms Community Building, and Precinct 8 would vote at the Walcott School.

The voting machines would be placed at the four city polling places for the amount of \$3,150 to go to the

and two additional machines would be used to count the rural voting

Ruland will report again to commissioners on Sept. 22 to discuss the exact costs of the plan.

In other business the commission: -Elected to transfer \$100,000 from the Road and Bridge Fund to the General Fund in order to pay

September bills. -Signed a resoultion supporting a national energy security and conservation policy regarding import fees on crude oil and petroleum products.

-Heard from Jeryl Baker concerning public officials liability insurance. Baker told the commissioners that he could find only one company which would be willing to provide this insurance to the county but it would cost \$5,393 per year. The cost of the current policy, which expires Sept. 13, cost the county \$2,202 per year. Baker said the company that now provides the county with this policy will no longer be willing to insure the county

Commissioner Troy Don Moore asked the commissioners if it would be feasible for the county to become self-insured.

County Treasurer, Vesta Mae Nunley, told the commission she would look into the legal aspects of becoming self-insured and report to the commission at the next meeting.

-Accepted a criminal justice grant



### Momentum slim for sales tax bill

AUSTIN (AP) - Some House members say they see momentum building in support of the temporary tax hike pushed by Gov. Mark White.

But the chairman of the House taxwriting committee says support is so slim he does not plan to hold hearings on the measure.

"What is the purpose in having a hearing if the bill is not going anywhere?" said Rep. Stan Schlueter, D-Killeen, adding that only three of the 13 members of the Ways and Means Committee would vote for a tax bill.

As the second special session on bills that would do that. the budget crisis opened Monday,

two House members said they are sponsoring bills that call for a temporary sales tax increase. Both bills would raise the levy from the current 4% percent to 5% percent until Aug.

In a speech to a joint session Monday, White reiterated his call for the temporary increase in conjunction with spending cuts.

Reps. Tom Uher, D-Bay City, and Al Luna, D-Houston, said they are convinced that's the best 'plan

members support the tax hike, Luna

"We thought it was important that we show there is significant support in the House for a tax bill. I'm not saying that we have the votes to pass it," Luna said.

Uher said, "It was obvious by the end of last week that we weren't going to resolve our problems with just budget cuts and the other manipula-

Asked if he could get the House votes needed to pass the bill, he said,

Speaker Gib Lewis said a tax hike might prove necessary, although he still thinks his spending cut plan could get the state through the cash flow crisis until the January regular

legislative session.

'From the first day that we met here, the statement I made is that the first obligation we had was to make budgetary cuts, which we have tried to do," Lewis told the House after White's speech.

"My statement at that time was once we have examined those proposals ... and we were short at that time and would have a cash flow problem then I would be supportive of a tax bill, but not until we were able to get to that conclusion, and I haven't changed my mind as of today," he said, drawing applause from House members.

Lewis later told reporters, "I'm not for a tax today because we haven't got there yet. Once we get there, if we're short, I'll be for a tax."

### Former First Lady asks Texas voters to elect a businessman to solve woes

Calling on Texas voters to "elect a businessman" to help solve the state's economic and budget problems, Rita Clements spoke to about 30 interested citizens here this morning in the Friendship Room at Hereford State Bank as she made her 83rd visit to a rural county to seek support for her husband's candidacy as governor of Texas.

"Bill believes Texas is really at a crossroad and that's why he decided to seek office again. The problem is not declining revenues-they are higher than ever before; the problem is excessive government spending and Bill wants to cut back on spending without new taxes. He thinks we

should cut the cloth to fit the pattern," said Mrs. Clements.

The former first lady of Texas was introduced at the meeting by Debe Graves, co-chairman of the Republican Party along with her husband, Ike. John Thames, county campaign chairman for Clements, also spoke at the gathering and introduced Ronnie Hathaway, GOP candidate for Precinct 4 commis-

"We are pleased about Bill being ahead in the polls, but we are running scared," stated Mrs. Clements. "We got overconfident in 1982, but we're going to stress a get-out-thevote campaign this time." She said

pears to be one based on negative comments about her husband. "We're going to run a positive campaign and ignore attempts to

discredit Bill." Mrs. Clements said the media

made a big thing out of Gov. White's statement about Clements having a "secret" plan to solve the state's problems. "The fact is," said Mrs. Clements, "Is that Bill sent Gov. White two letters to suggest ways to help solve the budget problems. Those June and July letters are a matter of record, but Gov. White ig-

She said the state, over the past three years, has had almost \$3 billion more in revenue each year and yet there is still a deficit. "We have an impasse in Austin with Speaker Gib. Lewis against tax hikes, Lt. Gov. Bill Holly wanting to raise taxes, and Gov. White in the middle."

Mrs. Clements said she loved the Panhandle weather. "You have a well-kept secret on your weather. As I travel, it's like being in four different states as far as the weather goes." She was moving on to Canyon at noon and was to make an address at West Texas State University.

### Reagan says Soviets spoiling summit with Daniloff case

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan, warning Moscow it is risking "a major obstacle in our relations," is turning up the heat on the Soviet Union to free American journalist Nicholas Daniloff, accused of

On his first day back at the White House from a 23-day vacation, Reagan arranged bipartisan meetings today with leaders of Congress and with his Cabinet to discuss the arrest of Daniloff, the first American reporter jailed in Moscow since the Stalin era.

Secretary of State George Shultz was to brief officials at both meetings on the Daniloff case, which has soured superpower relations and cast a question mark over chances for a U.S.-Soviet summit this year.

Reagan's advisers are studying a variety of steps to put pressure on Moscow to release the U.S. News &

World Report journalist.

The proposed measures include the expulsion of Soviet functionaries at the United Nations, a few at a time; a general reduction in the size of the Soviet embassy staff in the

later this month between Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze.

In the days ahead, Reagan also faces a struggle of wills with Congress over its approval of sanctions against the white-minority government in South Africa and attempts to enact protectionist trade legislation.

Reagan, breaking his silence on Daniloff's case 10 days after the correspondent was arrested, publicly vowed there would be no trade for a Soviet physicist arrested on spy charges recently in New York.

"Through several channels we've made our position clear — the Soviet Union is aware of how serious the consequences will be for our rela-tions if Nick Daniloff is not set free," Reagan told a cheering crowd at a political fund-raising event Monday



#### Rain may have stemmed 'red tide'

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) - A "red tide" that left hundreds of thousands of dead fish along the Texas Gulf Coast may have broken up because of lower temperatures and rain over the weekend, state officials said.

A plane sent out Sunday by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department spotted dead fish along the shoreline of Matagorda Island, said Leland Roberts of Parks and Wildlife.

But the Texas Water Commission and the Texas Department of Health planned to fly along the coastline of the Gulf of Mexico today in an attempt to locate any evidence of the red tide, said Buddy Stanley of the district office of the Water Commission in Corpus Christi.

Thunderstorms in the area prevented the plane from going up Monday, Roberts said Monday.

Roy Spears, a chemist with the Parks and Wildlife Department in Rockport who was on the plane Sunday, said the fish kill ended near the junction of San Antonio and Espiritu Santo bays.

They were unable to land and count the number of dead fish, Spears said, but "there were a lot."

During the flight, observers were unable to find any of the red tide in the Gulf of Mexico between Aransas Pass and Port O'Connor, he said.

"We think the rain and the drop in temperatures may have knocked it out. We did not see anything of it," Spears said. A ban on the harvest of oysters, clams and mussels, which was

placed Friday by the Texas Department of Health, will probably remain in effect for two or three weeks, said Richard Thompson, director of the division of shellfish sanitation of the Texas Department of

"There is a certain amount of cleansing action that must take place before we can lift the ban," Thompson said.

#### **New England income prospers**

WASHINGTON (AP) - New England led the country in income gains over the past three years while five energy-producing states had income gains so weak they did not even keep pace with inflation, the government reports.

The Commerce Department said Monday that Americans' personal incomes have risen 20.9 percent since the end of the last recession in 1982, climbing to an average of \$13,867 for every person in the country last year.

But this gain since the depths of the last recession masked widespread regional discrepancies.

New England outperformed the rest of the country with a 27.3 percent increase in per capita incomes from 1982 to 1985 as the region's high-tech and defense industries enjoyed substantial growth.

New Hampshire residents enjoyed the biggest increase of any state, a 30.6 percent gain, followed closely by Massachusetts and Connecticut with gains of 28.5 percent and 26.9 percent respectively.

During this period, consumer prices were rising 11.9 percent so after adjusting for inflation, the average American saw his income advance by 9 percent from 1982 through 1985.

#### Public supports breast feeding

WASHINGTON (AP) - Women who want to breast-feed their children at work can count on support for the practice from most of their colleagues, U.S. Surgeon General C. Everett Koop says.

Koop joined leaders of the Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies Coalition on Monday in releasing a national survey that found almost three-quarters of adults believe breast-feeding is the best way to feed a baby.

A majority of those polled also felt that employers should provide facilities for women to collect milk or nurse their babies at work. Fifty-three percent said employers should make such accommodations, 36 percent said no and 11 percent were unsure.

A working mother can collect milk in a bottle, freeze or refrigerate it and give it to her baby later.

"The working woman can be confident that more of her coworkers will support her decision to breast-feed," Koop said at a news conference. Men are even more supportive of breast-feeding than women, he added.

#### **International**

#### Pinochet says war is on

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) - President Augusto Pinochet, slightly injured in an assassination attempt, threatened to expel or jail human rights activists as part of what he called the military government's new "war against Marxism."

On Monday, the government closed six of eight opposition magazines, sent army tanks into slums, arrested at least five foreign priests, and rounded up leading dissidents under a 90-day state of siege imposed after the president's motorcade was ambushed Sun-

The government also banned dispatches from Chile by the Reuters news agency. Three of the detained Roman Catholic priests are from France and two are from the United States.

The government today planned to bury the five bodyguards who died in the ambush and then to stage a mass rally in support of Pinochet. Ten other bodyguards were wounded in the attack.

Pinochet has sought to play down government newspaper ads billing the rally as aimed at drumming up support for his candidacy for another eight-year presidential term starting in 1969. However, he is widely believed to be seeking re-election.

#### Contras claim foreign volunteers

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) - Nicaragua is issuing weapons to foreign civilian volunteers, thereby converting them into potential targets for Contra rebels, the military commander of the largest

"They are part of the enemy. We have warned them not to go into the war zones or carry weapons. We cannot be responsible," said Enrique Bermudez, one of seven directors of the Nicaraguan Democratic Force rebel group.
"These people are at risk of being killed by our forces, especially if

they are wearing uniforms, carrying weapons and riding in military vehicles," he said in a weekend interview.

Bermudez, leader of the U.S.-backed Contra group known as FDN

from its Spanish-language initials, was referring to thousands of volunteers, mainly from Europe and the United States, who work in Nicaragua building houses, health clinics and schools.

He buttressed his charges by showing documents including gun permits he said were taken from thre foreigners killed in a July 28 Contra attack on a government military installation near Zompopera in northern Nicaragua.

### Cyclist recovering but still paralyzed

HOUSTON (AP) - Despite a cyclying accident that left him paralyzed from the waist down, a 27-year-old man says he hopes to learn a trade even if it means being confined to a wheelchair.

Doctors have told Robert James Bruyneel his chances for walking again decrease the longer he can't move his legs. Bruyneel, who spent more than 14 hours lying in a bayou after an Aug. 17 accident, now is able to sit propped up in bed.

"I am going to keep praying, and, maybe by the grace of God, I'll get my legs moving again," he said from his bed at Hermann Hospital. "I don't have any feeling or nothing."

The muscular roofer said he often rode his bicycle as many as 10 miles a day before the crash. He was on his way home from a Sunday night ride

when he rode his 12-speed up a hill and discovered the road abruptly ended.

"The Lord was good to me," Bruyneel said. "He got me out quick. From here, it's to rehab and catch up on some high school. I did not graduate from high school. I'd like to do that, and train myself how to use a wheelchair and maybe crutches. Maybe I can pick up a trade."

Bruynell fell about 10 feet from the road's edge to the bayou and was unconscious for about an hour. When he came to, his bicycle was on top of him and hundreds of ants covered him.

Bruyneel said his used his arms to pull himself into deeper water to escape the ants before collapsing from exhaustion and pain. His screams during the night caused dogs to bark, but failed to attract help, he said.

"The thing that bothered me most was having to drink that bayou water to keep my strength up," Bruyneel said. "It wasn't the best tasting water in the world but it worked."

Children from a nearby apartment complex finally discovered him more than 14 hours after the crash.

Bruyneel said Harris County crews installed barricades three days after the accident on both sides of the bayou where it cuts off the road.

'Somebody had to pay the price to get them to put new ones," he said. "I'm just glad it wasn't a kid."

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - Gunmen. today kidnapped the American director of a Lebanese school in Moslem west Beirut, police and private radio stations said.

The reports identified the victim as Frank Reed, a U.S. citizen and the director of the Lebanese International School.

A police spokesman, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said Reed was abducted at 11:15 a.m. in the Bir Hassan district of west Beirut.

The Moslem-run Voice of the Nation and the Christian Voice of Lebanon radio stations said Reed has been director of the school for four soever that an American citizen was kidnapped," said an official at the U.S. Embassy in Christian east

'We do not have any office in west Beirut, we are trying to verify the report," said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

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### Today's woman has special nutrient needs

To meet the many demands placed on them at home and in the workplace, you'd think that most women would want to be in the best possible state of health. But evidently, this is not the case.

Research studies indicate that today's woman is not getting sufficient amounts of certain vitamins and minerals, including calcium, iron, vitamin B-6 and folacin.

Although women are smaller than men, those of child-bearing age need about twice as much iron is a mineral required to form hemoglobin, the oxygen-carrying part of the blood. Without enough iron, iron-deficiency anemia results. Symptoms of iron-deficiency anemia include fatigue, paleness, dizziness, weakness, sensitivity to cold and reduced work capacity.

Foods rich in iron include meats, dry beans, green leafy vegetables and enriched breads and cereals. Iron is absorbed better from meals when a soure of ascorbic acid is also included, such as tomatoes or citrus fruit. Some women who don't eat enough iron-rich foods may need an iron supplement.

Many women take in only half of the recommended 800 milligrams of calcium each day. This is of special concern, since many experts believe that the 800 milligram recommendation is actually too low.

Too little calcium over a long period of time is one of the main factors linked to the painful, crippling condition called osteoporosis. Calcium is lost from bones, so they become very fragile and break with the slightest movement. The condition most often shows up in elderly

Osteoporosis may be prevented by a calcium-rich diet and regular exercise. Milk and milk products are the best sources of calcium. Two and three-fourths cups of milk provide enough calcium to meet the current recommendation for 800 milligrams per day. Non-dairy sources of calcium include collard and mustard greens and salmon and sardines with

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Many women may be lacking in some vitamins in their diets which affect their health and well-being. Folacin, a vitamin needed to build red blood cells, has been shown to be low in some women's diets. This vitamin is found especially in liver, yeast and deep green leafy vegetables.

Another vitamin often in short supply is vitamin B-6. It is needed to form enzymes that help the body use proteins for building and repair. Vitamin B-6 is found in meat, liver, wheat germ, whole grain cereals, soybeans, peanuts and corn.

The best source of all these nutrients is food-not vitamin pills or supplements. Eating a variety of foods from the basic food groups daily can help every woman insure that she is not missing any of these necessary nutrients. Nutrition: Cooksey, Summer 1986.

ZUCCHINI "LASAGNA" ½ pound ground beef

1 small onion, chopped

1 15 oz. can temato sauce ½ teaspoon oregano leaves

4 teaspoon basil 1/8 teaspoon pepper

4 medium-sized zucchini (about 8 oz.

1 8 oz. container creamed cottage

cheese (1 cup)

2 Tablespoons all-purpose flour 1/2 8 oz. package mozzarella cheese, shredded (1 cup)

About 11/2 hours before serving:

1. In 10 inch skillet over mediumhigh heat, cook ground beef and onion until all pan juices evaporate and meat is well browned, stirring frequently. Spoon off fat. Add tomato sauce, oregano, basil, pepper, and 1/2 teaspoon salt; heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low and simmer 5 minutes to blend flavors, stirring oc-

2. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Meanwhile, slice zucchini lengthwise 4-inch-thick slices. In small bowl, combine cottage cheese with egg until well mixed.

3. In bottom of 12" by 8" baking dish, arrange half of zucchini slices; sprinkle with 1 tablespoon flour. Top with cottage-cheese mixture and half of meat mixture. repeat layering with zucchini and flour; sprinkle with mozzarella cheese; top with remaining meat mixture.

4. Bake, uncovered, 40 minutes until cheese melts, mixture is hot and bubbly, and zucchini is fork-tender. Let stand 10 minutes for easier cutting. Makes 6 servings. About 255 calories per serving.



### Glanville savors Oilers' 31-3 victory

HOUSTON (AP) - Jerry Glanville says he has the best job in town this week but he also confesses the Cleveland Browns could change that on Sunday.

"We're going to enjoy this a little until we have to go back to work tonight looking at Cleveland film." Glanville said Monday, savoring Sunday's 31-3 season opening rout of Green Bay.

The Oilers face AFC Central Division foe Cleveland in the Astrodome

"Right now I've got the best job in town, regardless of the money," he said. "Unfortunately if we lose, I've got the worst job."

Sunday's victory was Houston's third road victory in five years and their biggest blowout since 1977. The season opener came on the

heels of a 4-0 preseason and Glanville gave much of the credit for the victory to Warren Moon. Moon threw an interception on his

first pass of the game but recovered to hit 14 of 21 passes for 218 yards. He ran e yards for a touchdown and passed 29 yards to Butch Woolfolk for another score. "Warren read every defense cor-

rectly, even on the interception he had it right but the wind caught it." Glanville said. Moon, starting the third year of a

five-year \$5.5 million contract, is off to his best start as an Oiler. "He played that good in the

preseason, too, but he was in there for only a half," Glanville said.

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
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
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
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
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
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

























### 'ALF', CBS' 'The Wizard' new for fall

CBS captured 12, PBS 10 and ABC five as the TV networks headed for the Sept. 21 nationally-televised Emmys presentations in 32 mostlyacting categories.

The awards in categories for programs and individual achievement in the creative arts were presented Saturday night by the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences at the Pasadena Civic Auditorium.

"St. Elsewhere," the hospital drama, received awards for art direction in a series, costuming for a series and sound mixing for a drama

"An Early Frost," the NBC movie about a homosexual dving of AIDS and how his family deals with it, won for cinematography, editing for a miniseries or a special and sound mixing for a miniseries or a special.

"Amazing Stories," a weekly series created by director Steven Spielberg, took Emmys for achievement in hairstyling for a series, cinematography for a series and sound editing for a series.

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### \$10 billion space station a fuzzy dream

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) America's space station exists only in volumes of drawings, miles of computer tape and the minds of engineers who still disagree over it.

But by 1994, NASA plans to have a structure as long as one and twothirds football fields orbiting 280 miles above the Earth, and housing eight crew members for up to 90 days. The goal is to have astronauts in a space outpost for science every day of the year.

The cost: about \$10 billion, 80 per cent from the United States, the rest from Canada, Japan and the European Space Agency.

As with nearly every plan in the American space program, the space station has been sent back to the drawing board by the Challenger explosion. The loss of one of the nation's four shuttles has crippled plans to launch, supply and maintain the space station.

And the accident gave new clout to internal critics of the safety of the station's design just when the space agency was ready to draft final plans.

361-foot vertical booms connected by two 146-foot booms to form a rectangle. A transverse boom through the middle of the rectangle and extending out on either side would measure 503 feet.

Attached to the center of the transverse boom would be two 44-foot-long modules, each 13 feet in diameter. These modules, connected by tunnels, would house crew quarters and a laboratory. A 24-foot supply craft would be docked to the station and exchanged every 90 days.

Japan is to build a laboratory module; the European Space Agency, a laboratory and two orbiting platforms.

The shuttle could dock at either of two ports. Other spacecraft and platforms would link up at five locations

on the booms. Robot arms would manuever payloads.

NASA's plans call for spacewalking astronauts working as orbiting steeplejacks to build the latticework of booms from components delivered by the shuttle. It was thought 15 shuttle flights would be

needed to lift the parts into orbit. When Challenger exploded, these plans started unraveling.

In June, astronaut Gordon Fullerton completed a report outlining serious safety flaws. He pointed out the station had no "life boat" - a crew would be stranded there if the shuttles were grounded again.

Fullerton said it would take 672 hours of space-walking to assemble the station, and 391 space-walking hours each year to maintain it. No other project has required so much of this very risky activity.

And Fullerton noted that design changes resulting from the Challenger accident will reduce the

weight the shuttle can lift. This will force NASA to use five more flights to assemble the station.

It was time to return to the drawing board, so there are 55 NASA experts huddled at the Langley center reviewing the project.

Andrew J. Stofan, recently appointed space station chief, said the review is concentrating on reducing the space-walking and on launching the parts with the reduced shuttle payload.

"It looked like we would have to do more EVAs (space-walks) than have ever been attempted," he said. A new space suit would be required.

A final report is expected next month. Stofan hinted it will not resolve all criticisms but will keep the station on schedule and within budget.

"I don't think anything drastic is going to come out of this study," he said. "Too much work has gone into
