Investigation of DOE security revealed production plant were found to be AMARILLO, Texas (AP) - The drug users.

Pantex nuclear-weapons plant was one of several Department of Energy plants around the nation with security problems including allegations of sexual misconduct, a Seattle newspaper reported.

But officials at the plant northeast of this Panhandle city deny the report which appeared in a copyright story in Thursday edition's of the Seattle Times.

The newspaper reported the problems were revealed during a closed hearing by the U.S. House Committee on Energy and Commerce in

The newspaper said the problems included:

-Guards at Pantex, the DOE's highest-security weapons production facility, were found to have taken sex partners up to watch towers.

-Several pounds of plutonium, used to make hydrogen bombs, were "lost" in a mock terrorist raid at the department's Savannah River, S.C.,

-As many as 30 workers at the

Clyde alley, Pantex assistant plant manager, said the allegations of sexual misconduct were rumor. 'That was investigated and there

is no substantiation at all for that," he said. Alley told the Amarillo Globe-

News the rumor was started by a man who never worked at the plant. He refused to identify the man.

The times said the information came from a recently declassified copy of a special oversight and investigations subcommittee's transcript.

Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., who has been investigating the DOE's security problems for four yeras, had harsh words for two of the department's officials.

'At the subcommittee's first hearing in September 1982, we were assured by a former assistant secretary for defense programs and the current manager of the Savannah River operations office that the facilities could withstand a baseline DOE's Oak Ridge, Tenn., weapons terrorist attack," said Dingell.

"That was a lie. It was not a question of judgment or a question of differences of judgment - they knew

that their statements were not true." Dingell pointed out that systems at the plant officials claimed were adequate had failed a mock attack exercise miserably.

"The 'aggressors' were able to disappear into the woods with significant quantities of plutonium because one machine gunner was not trained to load his gun," he said. "Another had not been trained to unjam his machine gun, and a helicopter was dispatched with no weapons aboard."

"It has always been my contention that our biggest threat is not from nuclear war, but from free-lance nuclear terrorists," said another subcommittee member, Rep. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., adding that months after the March 6 hearing, the DOE had still not confirmed that security problems at the plants had been

Wyden has introduced a bill that would establish an independent, outside agency to monitor DOE safety and security at its nuclear plants. "As it is now," he said, "The same people who produce (weapons materials) are the ones who assure you it is safe."

The hearing last spring did not discuss operations at the Hanford nuclear resevation, where plutonium handling was criticized in internal audits. Hanford will be the subject of a separate series of safety, health and security hearings next year, according to sub members.

Though Dingell alluded to sexual activities in the Amarillo guard towers, all other references to the incident were apparently edited out of the document. However, some of the details of drug activity at Oak Ridge came out in testimony by former deputy assistant secretary for security affairs, Edward Badolato, whom the DOE announced Thursday had been replaced by former Air Force Col. Michael Seaton.

One employee at Oak Ridge was arrested for drug dealing, while some users were disciplined and others were fired. Civilian employees of a DOE contractor at Amarillo were also allowed to forego drug tests by claiming they were unable to urinate, though they were

In his testimony, Balodato referred to maps of the DOE's Livermore,

Debate on Honduran contra role rekindled

Gramm attacks amnesty provision

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) - The capture of an American flying supplies to Contra guerrillas in Nicaragua has revived debate about the presence of the U.S.-supported rebels in Honduras. Many say it is time for them to go.

Just as in neighboring El Salvador, where the Contras' use of Ilopango Military Base is an open secret, the presence of the Nicaraguan rebels is something the government would rather not discuss.

American Eugene Hasenfus said at a news conference organized by the leftist Sandinista government last week in Managua, Nicaragua's capital, that he participated in 10 supply runs to the

Hasenfus, 45, of Marinette, Wis., was captured in southern Nicaragua Oct. 5 after the plane he was aboard was shot down. He said that of the 10 runs, four originated from the Aguacate air

base in Honduras and six were from Ilopango. Aguacate is near Catacamas, about 70 miles east of Tegucigalpa. Honduran President Jose Azcona Hoyo immediately denied that

his government lets national territory be used for clandestine flights. Maj. Jorge Alberto Arguello, the armed forces' spokesman, The leader of the National Assembly, Carlos Montoya, of the Liberal Party now in power, said the time has come for the Contras

In addition to the clandestine flights believed to be concentrated at Aguacate, the Contras have maintained bases in southern Honduras near the Nicaraguan border since the start of their 4½-year war.

Honduran military sources say about 18,000 Contra rebels operate from their bases on Honduran territory.

"We do not agree with the policy or ideology of the Sandinista

government, but but as soon as they (the Contras) leave Honduras, the better for us," Montoya said one day after the plane carrying Hasenfus and three other people was shot down.

President Reagan gave his qualified endorsement to the immigration bill on Thursday. Chief Senate sponsor Alan K. Simpson, R-Wyo., said after a meeting with Reagan he was conviced the president would sign it.

Simpson admitted the controversial amnesty program "seems to stick in the craw of Americans. It's an issue filled with emotion, fear, guilt and racism."

But without it, Simpson asserted, "The hunt would be on" for illegal aliens. "I say, are you going to be part of the group that goes to a Mexican-American in Brownsville (Texas), taps on the door and says 'Are you deportable?"'
Gramm bitterly attacked legaliza-

tion as unfair to 1.9 million current applicants who "sought to come through legitimate channels to wait for years, to hope and pray for the opportunity to come to America.

"You're going to say, 'People who came here illegally are going to be given preference over you."

Even more "absurd" than the general amnesty, Gramm said, was the special legalization program for foreign agricultural workers who harvest perishable fruits and

The program would give temporary resident status to aliens who have worked at least 90 days in agriculture from May 1, 1985, through May 1, 1986. Aliens who have worked 90 days a year for three years could adjust to permanent resident status after one year; those who worked 90 days only between May 1985 and May 1986 would have to

"There's nothing right about that and everybody in this body knows it." Gramm said., "If the American people knew this was in the bill it would be laughed out of the country and laughed out of this body. If this one does not turn your stomach, then you have a different perspective than

California tops Texas in ag cash receipts

WASHINGTON (AP) - California remains the nation's top farm state in terms of cash receipts with \$14 billion last year, the Agriculture Department says.

The figure was contained in a preview released Thursday of a state-by-state financial ranking of the U.S. farm sector that the department will publish in December.

Other top farm states in terms of cash receipts in 1985 were Texas, \$9.3 billion; Iowa, \$9.2 billion; Illinois, \$7.8 billion; and Nebraska, \$7.2

The same states basically topped other lists such as crop receipts, with Florida placing fifth in that category behind California, Illinois, Iowa and

Wisconsin was fifth in livestock receipts behind Texas, Iowa, Califor-nia and Nebraska. Earning the most from major com-modity sales were Texas for cattle

and calves, Wisconsin for dairy products, Illinois and Iowa for soybeans, corn and hogs, Kansas for wheat, Arkansas for broilers and California for eggs, hay and lettuce.

National[®] Pentagon finds 1,500 AIDS cases

WASHINGTON (AP) - The military has tested 1 million men and women on active duty for exposure to the disease AIDS and encountered the same 0.15 percent "positive rate" seen earlier in the testing of recruits, Pentagon sources say.

As a result, roughly 1,500 men and women have been identified as having an antibody associated with the deadly disease. Of those, just over half have begun showing "symptoms indicative of progressive clinical disease," grounds for a medical discharge, the sources say.

In a related development, Congress — in approving the Pentagon's fiscal 1987 budget authorization - inserted language forbidding the use of information obtained from medical interviews "to support any adverse personnel action," including discharges.

That directive would overturn part of the Pentagon's confidentiality policy. Currently, if a serviceman acknowledges drug use or homosexual activity in the course of AIDS screening, that information is not supposed to be used as the sole grounds for punitive actions such as courts-martial. But it can be used as grounds for a discharge.

At the same time, Pentagon officials say they have begun debating whether the department been too lenient toward active-duty personnel who test positively for exposure but who show no signs of the ac-

Such individuals are now allowed to remain on active duty, although they face continuing medical screening and restrictions on duty assignments and overseas deployments. Some military leaders argue the policy should be changed and any individual testing positively be given an honorable discharge, the sources say.

Zakharov admitted to spying

WASHINGTON (AP) - Gennadiy Zakharov, after admitting he was a Soviet spy, named a KGB station chief at the United Nations and the head of Soviet military intelligence in New York, administration officials say.

One official said Thursday that Zakharov identified Valery Savchenko, listed as a Soviet U.N. mission counselor and said to be the KGB station chief at the mission, and Vladislav Skvortsov, a senior counselor said to be the New York chief of the GRU, the Soviet military intelligence.

Zakharov fingered three Soviet spies in all, but the official, who spoke only on condition of anonymity, was uncertain who the third Soviet was.

All three were among the 25 Soviets at the U.N. the United States recently ordered to leave the country, the official said. The last of the 25 Soviets, who worked at U.N. headquarters in New York, left the United States on Tuesday.

On Wednesday, another U.S. official said Savchenko and Skvortsoy were among the last five of the 25 Soviets to leave, along with Gennadi Tarasov, a Mideast specialist reputedly in the KGB; Viktor Sbirunov, a first secretary; and Valery Anikeyev, a counselor.

ABC News on Thursday night said Zakharov, who until his arrest was a scientific affairs officer for the Soviet Union at the United Nations, made the admissions during a four-hour interrogation.

"He sang like a tweetie bird," one U.S. official told The Associated Zakharov, 39, was questioned following his arrest on Aug. 23 on a New York subway platform as he allegedly tried to pay an FBI infor-

mant \$1,000 for classified documents on military jet engines. Within a week after Zakharov's arrest on spying charges, the

Soviets arrested American journalist Nicholas Daniloff in Moscow on espionage charges.

Zakharov pleaded no contest to three counts of espionage and was returned to the Soviet Union on Sept. 30, the day after Daniloff, a U.S. News & World Report correspondent, was released by the

OPEC leaders cite progress

GENEVA (AP) - OPEC oil ministers, meeting behind a cloak of secrecy, today resumed their search for at least a tentative agreement on production controls that could push petroleum prices back The cartel leaders made no public comments as they arrived for a

12th straight day of talks at a Geneva hotel.

The outcome of what has become one of the longest meetings in the 26-year history of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries remained in doubt, even after Thursday's intense deliberations.

The oil ministers have been trying to construct a formula, based on a statistical profile of each member country, that would be used to calculate oil production quotas for the 13 members.

The aim is to restrict the cartel's production in order to dry up the world oil glut and boost oil prices.

A makeshift OPEC accord on production restraint that took effect

Sept. 1 is due to expire at the end of this month. There has been no final decision on whether to extend it or replace it.

Rilwanu Lukman, the OPEC president and the oil minister of Nigeria, said after Thursday's meeting that the ministers had agreed on "tentative definitions" of seven or eight elements of the

Missing Israeli pilot in captivity

SIDON, Lebanon (AP) - A missing crewmen from an Israeli fighter-bomber shot down during a raid on Palestinian guerrilla bases was reported alive today and in the hands of Shiite Moslem

"The captive has a fractured arm. Otherwise he is well," said a spokesman for Justice Minister Nabih Berri's mainstream Shiite Amal militia, who refused to be identified further.

The spokesman also declined to disclose where the Israeli airman shot down Thursday was being held, although sources said he had been moved to Beirut overnight.

It was not immediately possible to verify the claim. Berri had denied in a statement Thursday that Amal was holding any Israeli. Israeli jets raided the bases near this ancient port city earlier that day, apparently in retaliation for a grenade attack Wednesday in

Jerusalem that killed one Israeli and wounded 69. A shoulder-fired missile downed the Israeli Phantom F-4E and its two crewmen bailed out, landing in an olive grove four miles southeast of Sidon, and 25 miles south of Beirut.

Israel's military command in Tel Aviv said helicopter-borne Israeli troops landed in the rugged terrain southeast of Sidon and rescued one of the two crewmen of the downed jet.

The Israeli command listed the other flier as missing, and vowed

Initial reports from Lebanon had said the second airman was dead, but the Amal spokesman today said the flier was captured on Sidon's southeastern outskirts by Rafik Ibrahim, a 19-year-old Amal militiaman, minutes after the Phantom was shot down.

Ibrahim told reporters at his native village of Zeghdraya that the

Israeli captive spoke a little Arabic, but with an Egyptian accent.
"I jumped out of the bush and ordered him to stick his hands when he landed by parachute in the olive grove yesterday. He raise only one arm," Ibrahim said.

He said, however, that many of his countrymen will journey to the United States.

"There are a lot of Salvadorans who have family and friends here and that's why I think they will be coming soon," he said.

Celaya Cruz and hundreds of other Central Americans are restricted to a nine-county area in South Texas that church officials have called a giant detention center. The travel restriction has caused overcrowding at the church facility.

The Central Americans have been documented by U.S. Immigration and Naturlization officials, but they are not able to leave the area without posting a \$1,000 cash bond that most do not have.

They are not allowed to work while they are out on their own

recognizance. Church officials, attorneys for Central Americans and immigration officials will meet on Friday to try to work out a solution to the bond problem, said Silvestre Reyes, chief of the Border Patrol sector in McAllen.

The McAllen sector annually records the highest number of arrests of Central Americans trying to enter the United States.

Most of those arrested during the last fiscal year that ended Sept. 30, were from El Salvador, Reyes said.

He said the earthquake in El Salvador would trigger an eventual influx of illegal aliens, much like the earthquake in Mexico City last year caused thousands of Mexicans to go north.

"Barring some other occurrence, for instance, additional turmoil within the country, politically, I don't think we're going to see an immediate impact from the earthquake itself," Reyes said.

"I think it will probably be several months down the road. Six months is a good estimate," he said.

Casa Oscar Romero, named after the slain archbishop of San Salvador, gained notoriety over the last two years because of trials involving its workers.

Former director Jack Elder served five months in a San Antonio halfway house in 1985 on a conviction for transporting Salvadorans. Also in 1985, Elder's replacement, Lorry Thomas, was sentenced to two years in prison after pleading guilty to transporting a Nicaraguan in the trunk of her car.

Shelter volunteer Stacey Lynn Merkt is appealing a 1985 conviction of conspiring to transport Salvadorans. Her 1984 conviction on transporting charges was overturned and those charges were dropped.

Casa Romero now houses between 700-800 Central Americans a month, Gonzalez said.







NEW YORK (AP) - Pro football has it. Hockey is considering it. But so far, the baseball establishment has frowned upon the use of instant replay cameras to call disputed plays.

However, in light of two controversial plays in recent postseason games, it's a viable issue now during the World Series, former pitching star Jim Palmer said.

"I know it (the use of instant replays) would cause a lot of problems," said Palmer, now a television broadcaster, "but you would get the best call. It's a must for the playoffs and the World Series."

Palmer's comments come in light of the controversial call in last year's World Series involving umpire Don Denkinger and the controversial situation with umpire Fred Brocklander in the 1986 National League playoffs between the New York Mets and Houston Astros.

In the 1985 World Series between Kansas City and St. Louis, Denkinger called the Royals' Jorge Orta safe at first in the ninth inning of the sixth game. After watching the replay, many observers thought he was out and Denkinger later went on record as admitting his mistake. The Royals capitalized and went on to win the game and then, the Series.

This past Tuesday, Brocklander was involved in a controversial situation, in the fifth game of the National League playoffs. The play came in the Houston second inning with two Astros on base, one out and Craig Reynolds batting.

Reynolds hit into a questionable double play, a play in which he appeared to have beaten the throw to first base. The TV monitors later appeared to confirm it, but Brocklander refused to change his decision under a storm of Houston protests.

ENMU Coach Don Carthal said about the loss to Abilene Christian, "It was a disappointment. I didn't do a good job of getting them ready to play. We didn't do a good job of picking up their blitzing linebackers."

Carthal, speaking of this week's game, stated, "Angelo State is an awfully good ballclub, but we'll match up with them real well. Pierce Holt, their defensive tackle, is a genuine pro prospect and one of the best pass rushers in the nation. We'll also have our hands full trying to stop their quarterback, Ned Cox."

What is a farmer?

DEAR ANN LANDERS: Will you please print this essay in your space? It was the last column by Bud Lee, who retired Dec. 27, 1985, after 28 years as county director and farm adviser, University of California.- A GREAT ADMIRER OF HIS AND YOURS IN L.A.

DEAR GREAT: You bet. With pleasure. It's a honey.

WHO IS THAT **EXECUTIVE IN** OVERALLS?

What is a farmer? Farmers are found in fields - plowing up, seeding down, rotating from, planting to, fertilizing with, spraying

for and harvesting if. Wives help them, little boys follow them, city relatives visit them, salesmen detain them, meals wait for them, wether can delay them, but nothing can stop them.

A farmer is a paradox. He is an overalled executive with his office in his home. He is a scientist who uses fertilizer attachments, a purchasing agent in an old straw hat, a personnel director with grease under his fingernails, a dietician with a passion for fresh fruits and vegetables, a production expert faced with a surplus, and a manager battling a price-cost squeeze.

He manages more capital than most of the businessmen in town.

He likes sunshine, good food, county fairs, dinner at noon, auctions, his neighbors, his shirt collar unbuttoned and above all, an above-average annual rainfall.

He is not much for droughts, ditches, freeways weeds, the eight-hour day, dusty roads, development, insects, diseases, freezing weather or helping around the house.

Nobody else gets so much satisfaction out of modern plumbing, good weather, automatic furnaces, electric blankets and homemade ice cream. Nobody else has in his pockets at one time a three-bladed knife, a checkbook, a billfold, a pair

of pliers and a combination memo book and general farm guide.

A farmer is both Faith and Fatalist. He must have faith to meet the challenges of his capacities amid the ever-present possibility that an act of God (a late spring, an early frost, flood, drought) can bring his business to a sudden halt. You can reduce his acreage but you can't diminish his optimism.

Might as well put up with him. He is your friend, your competitor, your customer, your source of food and fiber. He is your countryman-a denim-dressed, business-wise statesman of stature. And when he comes in at noon having spend the energy of his hopes and dreams, he can be recharged anew with the magic words-"The market's up!"

If my memory serves me, years ago (during the Depression) it was considered poor taste to do this. The implication was that the recipients would not or could not spend their own money on postage. Have times changed? Please let me know. Our daughter's wedding is coming up and we don't want to offend anyone.-MOTHER OF THE BRIDE IN GRAND RAPIDS

DEAR MOTHER IN G.R.: During the Depression who had money to send invitations? Today, a stamp on the return envelope is considered not only socially correct but an elegant touch.

By all means, do it.

sun heats salty water at the bottom of the pond. Because it is lighter than salt water, fresh water layers remain at the top, serving as insulation to prevent the heat from escaping back into the air.

The hot salty water is used to boil freon which produces a vapor that goes through a turbine, making it turn to produce electricity.

"The engine is like a refrigerator working backward," Reid said, explaining that whereas a refrigerator expels useless heat through its back, the solar pond engine uses the heat to turn the turbine.

Using the sun-heated water is an alternative to buring coal or other fuels to run a turbine and make electricity. Reid said. In areas of abundant sun, such as the Southwest, solar ponds are an attractive alternative.

The solar pond power system works on simpler technology than a photovoltaic plant, one using silicon cells to produce electricity from the sun. Installation of one of those systems began Wednesday in Austin.

Israel's 60-acre solar pond at the Dead Sea has been operating since 1983 and produces 5,000 kilowatts, Reid said. Australia's solar pond generates only 25 kilowatts.


