### High-tech camera catches speeders

FRIENDSWOOD, Texas (AP) -Galveston County constables in Friendswood are taking traffic enforcement to a new electronic plateau.

radar-using computer in an inconspicuous truck parked on the shoulder of busy Interstate 45 south of Houston triggers a camera that photographs speeders and their license plates

"It shoots a picture like a flashlight beam," Lt. Danny Vinning

Friendswood officials send out traffic violation notices to the owners of the vehicles photographed. The owners then can pay a fine that begins at \$60, ask for a court hearing or identify the person behind the wheel if not the owner of the car.

The Texas constables are believed to be the first police in the nation to use the high-tech equipment although Switzerland and other parts of Europe have used it for years.

The machine can catch a speeder each half-second, compared to a police officer's average of 14 tickets

a day, clerk Barbara Gerlach says. Friendswood constables say it has slowed traffic and improved safety on the busy route between Houston and Galveston.

"This is so much safer than the high-speed chase," Vinning says. "It's a good piece of equipment."

The county has a one-year lease with a Friendswood business, Traffic Monitoring Technologies, Inc. that imported the \$35,000 equipment, the company's president Manuel Fustes says. But the lease can be broken at any time, he said. The county pays \$20 to the firm for each ticket paid. The company processes the film and maintains the equipment.

Galveston County Judge Ray Holbrook says he anticipates a debate among the four commissioners when they discuss the fate of the high-tech machinery at the end of a six-month probation period later this month. The commissioners originally were not unanimous in favor of using the device.

Other officials have more philosophical concerns.

"I think there are some Big Brotherism in that particular system," Galveston County District Attorney Mike Guarino says.

Part of his worries are eased by officers being at the scene when the equipment is used to ensure it is working properly, he said.

So far, about 70 percent of some 1,750 violation notices have resulted

motorists have challenged the violation notices — and they all have been found guilty by juries, he says.

Woltz, a lawyer, says juries seem to trust the equipment and do not view it as an invasion of privacy.

But he says officials are careful not to send out a violation notice unless the driver clearly can be identified. The day and time of the alleged violation and the speed are printed on the picture. The machine is set to catch motorists traveling at least 65 mph - 10 mph over the legal

Some owners have thanked officials because they have discovered relatives or friends have been speeding in their cars, Woltz says.

The device even beats the popular radar detectors, because the pictures are taken before a motorist can react to the buzz of the detector, of-

"When I first started working it, I had 548 violators in a four-hour motorists. period," Deputy George Smith says.

"It has proven to be a lifesaver, statistically," he says.

The company president says the system is not a speed trap because it does not discriminate against

"To me, this system is a lot more and not just the one pulled over by an officer," Vinning says.

### Veterans now eligible for new loan programs

Texas veterans can now participate in all three loan programs of the Texas Veterans Land Board, expanding the loan amounts from \$20,000 to \$55,000.

After a four-month trial period, the board made permanent the dramatic increase in benefits. "The best veterans programs in the U.S. just got better," said Garry Mauri, chairman of the land board.

'What this means is Texas veterans can now get a \$20,000 loan to buy land, and a \$20,000 loan to buy a house, and a \$15,000 loan for home improvements," Maura said. In the past, veterans were limited to only

one loan with the land board.

The Texas Veterans Land Program will loan eligible veterans up to \$20,000 for the purchase of five acres or more at 8.75 percent interest. The minimum number of acres had been 10. Reducing the number of acres is expected to make it easier for veterans to buy land closer to an urban area. Term of the loan is 30 vears

Mauro reported that more than 90,000 Texas vetrans have received land loans since the program began

The Texas Veterans Housing Assistance Program offers eligible

veterans up to \$20,000 at 9 percent interest to use toward the purchase of a home. The loans formerly carried a rate of 9.5 percent. Mauro stressed that the program offers the best deal for veterans in Texas because of the lower rate, there are no points charged on the loans, and the closing costs are lower.

The Texas Veterans Home Improvement Program loans are availble up to \$15,000 at 11.5 percent for 15 years to make improvements to existing homes. The minimum loan amount is \$5,000. If the loan is \$7,500 or less, the maximum term of the loan is 10 years. No down payment is required and all loans are FHAinsured. More than 15,000 Texas veterans have already been certified to participate in this program.

The loans can be applied to singlefamily attached and detached houses, town houses, units of a condominium development or planned unit development, as well as 2-4 family residences constructed at least five years prior to the closing date of the loan.



HOUSTON (AP) — Developer H. Milton Howe pulled off what some said would be impossible: he managed to hush the blaring Houston traffic with his 10,000-square-foot studio of modern soundproof design.

"It's the only sound studio in the country where you can run air conditioning while shooting," Howe boasts of the mammoth room in his Houston Studios complex.

Many of his associates warned Howe that a soundproof studio couldn't be built adjacent to a freeway, but he says, "What they meant is I couldn't do it reasonably.'

The 39-year-old developer poured \$750,000 into the project.

A person entering the studio is swallowed by its size and transfixed by its stillness. Hanging 10 feet from the 40-foot ceiling is a wooden grid catwalk, where lights can be hung, accessible only by a steep set of stairs.

The soundproofing was made possible through a foundation consisting of 18 feet of sand, covered by a 11/2 feet of concrete, a layer of rubber pads, two-by-four spacers, plywood and a final layer of particle

The roof also has sand and insulation to prevent even rain from being heard inside. The walls consist of six inches of concrete, insulation, two layers of sheetrock, and another layer of insulation. Howe, who owns about 10 acres in a

warehouse district near downtown, first started developing the area into an artists' haven. Before the studio was built, he said

the technical question of actually having a sound studio next to Interstate 10, along with its location having the reputation as a bad neighborhood, haunted him.

"It's been a nerve-racking experience," Howe says of the project he started two years ago.

Howe said his lifelong friend Derik Rawson kept telling him Houston needed a motion picture studio. "I didn't want to mess with a

business I didn't know anything

about. But they all kept saying the same thing — Houston had the potential for movies but no facility. I finally became convinced," he said. Howe said he hopes to attract the

motion picture industry to Houston and help diversify the city's oildependent economy.



### Merit selection

Texas should shift to merit selection of Supreme Court and appellate court judges. The system, as observed in several other states, involves appointment of judges by the governor on the recommendation of a top-flight nominating committee. In these states, public accountability is assured by giving citizens a vote on rejecting or retaining each judge.

Integrity and experience are really the only issues in a race for judge. All that a candidate can promise is that he will be a fair interpreter of the law.

Is justice served when a potential judge has to posture himself for campaign contributors — or votes? No. Texas should take its Supreme Court out of the campaign arena.

### States benefit from tax reform

WASHINGTON - Sometimes it seems as if the world is governed by some immutable law of unforeseen consequences.

The tax reform plan recently enacted by Congress and signed by President Reagan is a good example of that law at work. During debate on the bill, politicians from states with high tax rates raised a ruckus. New York Senator Daniel Patrick Moynihan and Governor Mario Cuomo were particularly outspoken, insisting loss of the federal deduction for state income taxes would make it more difficult for them to raise needed revenues.

What Moynihan and Cuomo failed to realize-what most people failed to realize-is that the new tax system will bring a major windfall to most states. For example, New York can expect to gain an additional \$1.9 billion under the new system.

The reason is so simple and obvious it seems incredible no one realized what was about to take place. New York, like most states, bases its income tax on the adjusted gross income shown in federal returns. Now that Congress has eliminated many deductions, most tax returns will be showing higher gross incomes.

Of course, most federal taxpayers will come out ahead under this scheme because when Congress eliminated deductions it also lowered

tax rates. But the states haven't cut their tax rates. They will be collecting the same percentage as before, but from larger adjusted gross incomes. Thus, many taxpayers who are expecting a break from Uncle Sam will see a large chunk of it gobbled up by the states.

It seems like only yesterday that President Nixon launched his famous revenue sharing plan, which funneled federal money to state governments by the barrel. That was at a time when the federal budget was healthy and state coffers were

Now the reverse is true. The federal budget is knee-deep in red ink and many state treasuries are in

### Lung disease facts provided by ALA

Lung diseases are the third most common cause of death in the United States today, says the American Lung Association of Texas-the Christmas Seal people. Besides the cost in human suffering, the direct economic cost of lung disease to the nation is expected to reach a staggering \$40.9 billion in 1986.

bung cancer remains this country's most deadly form of cancer. Only 13 percent of lung cancer patients live five or more years after diagnosis. It is a frightening fact that the incidence of lung cancer in American women has risen 380 percent in the last 35 years. Already the leading cancer killer among men, lung cancer has now surpassed breast cancer as the foremost cancer killer of American

According to the ALA of Texas, much of the premature death and disbility caused by lung disease is unnecessary and can be prevented. Cigarette smoking causes 80 to 90 percent of deaths from chronic obstructive pulmonary diseases such as emphysema and chronic bronchitis. Other lung diseases-including respiratory distress syndrome (RDS) in infants and acute respiratory distress syndrome (ARDS) in adults-are still not fully understood and require additional research to find improved means of prevention and treatment.

The American Lung Association was founded in 1904 to combat tuberculosis, then the nation's greatest health menace. Today its mission is to control and prevent all lung diseases and some of their related causes, including smoking, air pollution and occupational lung hazards. -Asthma, the most common serious disease of childhood, is also the major cause of school absenteeism due to chronic disease, responsible for the loss of 6.5 million school days annually.

-Occupational lung disease-such as byssinosis, which is caused by textile dust and has disabled an estimated 35,000 Americans, and asbestosis and silicosis, which endanger an estimated 106,000 workers-are the number-one cause of work-related disease and injury.

-Chronic sinusitis, a condition of the upper respiratory tract, afflicts more than 27 million of our citizens as of 1986. And hay fever, whose symptoms make the warm weather a miserable time of year for its sufferers, affects more than 19 million

-Pneumonia is the leading cause of death by infectious disease in the U.S. It is particularly dangerous to those over age 65 and those with previously existing lung illness or heart conditions. Pneumonia is expected to strike over three million Americans this year.

-Influenza, which can be prevented in most cases with annual vaccination, can also be a life-threatening illness to the elderly and those with chronic heart or lung conditions. Americans are expected to suffer about 75 million bouts of flu in 1986.

-Though tuberculosis is no longer the leading cause of death in this country, it has yet to be eradicated. In 1985 22,201 new cases of TB were reported in America and the incidence rate seems to be rising

### Dental problems being studied

at hiding their disorder. Their friends and reltives may not know. Their doctors may not diagnose bulimia until their health is ravaged. Their dentists or dental hygientists could be the first to suspect the pro-

"We've found that many bulimics have severe dental problems. Some of our patients have spent \$5,000 or more having their teeth repaired," says Dr. David Waller, psychiatrist and co-director of the Eating Disorders Clinic at The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas.

The damage is caused by repeated violent vomiting by a person who binges and purges. "The worst damage is caused by the high acid content of the vomitus. Stomach acid contains hydrochloric acid, and it just eats the tooth enamel away," explains co-director Dr. Bettie Hardy, a psychologist.

Recently the multi-disciplinary Eating Disorders Clinic added a dental hygienist to its team that evaluates new patients. Barbara Altshuler, instructor and "clinical coordinator at the Caruth School of Dental Hygiene in Dallas, not only checks new patients for dental problems but also evalutes the condition of their mouths using recognized dental indexes. Over a period of time, she will try to determine if there is a relation between the severity of bulimia and the amount of damage to the teeth, and whether the patient's dental hygiene habitsbrushing, flossing or using mouthwash-can help to control the

purge themselves to avoid the conse- term says Altshuler, the following quences of overeating are very good dental problems are proving characteristic of people who binge and purge.

-Enamel erosion: The high acid content of vomitus dissolves tooth enamel and leaves teeth sensitive and vulnerable to decay. Enamel erosion first appears as an opaque line near the gums.

Altshuler hopes her study will reveal whether changes in the patient's habits of brushing or using mouthwash immediately after vomiting could slow or stop this damage.

-Sensitivity: One hundred percent of the bulimia patients I have examined said they have sensitive teeth, whether or not they had other dental problems," says Altshuler. Sensitivity to hot or cold foods is most common. Very sweet or acidic foods also may cause teeth to hurt.

-Cavities: The person who overeats and vomits is likely to get cavities because of the enamel that is weakened by erosion. The type of food he or she binges on can con-

tribute to the problem, too. -Vomiting three or four times a day is devastating to teeth. The upper front four teeth bear the brunt of the damage since the tongue protects the bottom teeth," says Altshuler: "Some people's teeth are a patchwork of fillings and caps. The sad part is that this type of reparative work frequently can't hold up under the stress." Teeth erode around the edges of metal fillings, leaving the fillings raised above the surface. Composite fillings used for appearance can be dissolved by the

People who binge on food and then Although her study will be long- cause cavities. "Naturally, binging on sweets is bad for the teeth, but some cases are more unusual. I remember one woman who binged on fruit--oranges, lemons and grapefruit. She thought these foods were healthier than cakes and candy, but the excess acid in the fruit was also causing destruction of her tooth enamel."

-Dry mouth: Normally, saliva bathes the teeth constantly, providing a cleansing and protective effect. If the mouth is dry, this protection against cavities is lost. In addition, drugs that may be helpful in the treatment of bulimia can contribute to dry mouth.

Because a dry mouth is uncomfortable, bulimics sometime will change their oral habits to relieve the problem. Chronic chewing of sugared gum or mints is not unusual and can contribute to cavities.

A dry mouth may be coupled with general dehydration. "Some patients purge themselves with laxatives, thining they are getting rid of calories," says Waller. "Actually, laxatives have a diuretic effect, and the loss of water is what makes the patient feel thinner."

-Gum disease: Gingivitis, or inflammation of the gums, results from plaque accumulation. The poor nutrition that results from binging and purging leaves the gums more susceptible to gum disease. Altshuler says the gum tissue of bulimics overreacts to plaque buildup, resulting in gingivitis. If neglected, the problem can lead to abcesses and loss of bone around the base of the tooth, or periodontal disease.

Treating bulimics poses a special

erosion that undermines the work already done. However, the stomach acid also dissolves the cement that holds temporary crowns and orthodontic bands on teeth. "In one case, a teenaged girl had to have the bands of her braces re-cemented six times within the first two months.' says Altshuler. "I asked if she binged and purged, and she couldn't imagine how I guessed."

In treating damaged teeth, dentists often prescribe a flouide mouthwash. Altshuler says that dentists should be sure to prescribe a neutral sodium fluoride mouthwash if they suspect bulimia. The more frequently suggested stannous fluoride mouthwash has a high acid content and could compound the pro-

The Eating Disorder Clinic at UTHSCD, sponsored by the Department of Psychiatry, offers a comprehensive evaluation and treatment program. At the same time, these professionals are doing research into the sleep and metabolic problems of patients with psychosocial issues in eating disorders.

Ninety percent of bulimics are women. The onset of bulimia is frequently from the teen years through the early twenties. "This is a period of various stresses for women," says Hardy. "They are undergoing hormonal changes, deciding on college and careers, getting out into the world. Society tells them they can have it all - an education, a career, a home and family. Society also tells them they should be thin to be attractive. It's all too much. They may binge in part because of the stresses. challenge for dentists. The main pro- and then purge to remain thin



### An update on 1-4A football race

The District 1-4A football race had 15 mathmatical possibilities for the final standings among the top four teams, going into last week's games, barring upsets by the bottom five teams and barring tie

Now the number of mathematical possibilities is down to four after Hereford lost to Lubbock Estacado 28-18 on Thursday and after Canyon edged Borger 21-20 on Friday.

The district won-loss records for the top four teams are now these: Estacado 5-0-1, Hereford 6-1, Borger 5-1, and Canyon 4-2.

Here are the four mathematical possibilities, going from the best one for the Hereford Whitefaces to the worst one:

1. If Borger beats Estacado and Hereford beats Borger: Hereford wins the District 1-4A championship with a 7-1 record, Estacado finishes second at 6-1-1, and Borger and Canyon tie for third place at

2. If Estacado beats Borger and Hereford beats Borger: Estacado wins the district championship with a 7-0-1 record, Hereford finishes second at 7-1, Canyon third at 6-2, and Borger fourth at 5-3.

3. If Estacado beats Borger and Borger beats Hereford: Estacado wins the district championship with a 7-0-1 record, and Hereford, Borger and Canyon finish in a three-way tie for second place with 6-2 records.

4. If Borger beats Estacado and Borger beats Hereford: Borger wins the district championship with a 7-1 record, Estacado finished second at 6-1-1, and Hereford and Canyon tie for third place with 6-2

Barring an upset by Pampa over Estacado on Nov. 14, Estacado would qualify for the playoffs. An upset, however, would give Hereford a district title also in mathematical possibility No. 2 above, and in possibility No. 4 above, Hereford and Canyon would finish tied

for second place with Estacado placing third with a 5-2-1 record. Concerning Canyon, all the mathematical possibilities above would be correct if Canyon wins its last two games over Pampa and

Frenship. Borger scored a touchdown with nine seconds to pull to within one point of Canyon on Friday, 21-20, and Bulldog Coach Butch Hender-

son opted for a two-point conversion attempt. Borger failed in the conversion attempt and lost the game. What if the Borger coach had chosen to go for a tie game? Here is how the

mathematical possibilities above would have turned out: 1. Hereford 7-1, Estacado 6-1-1, and Borger and Canyon both 5-2-1.

2. Estacado 7-0-1, Hereford 7-1, Canyon 5-2-1, and Borger 4-3-1.

3. Estacado 7-0-1, Hereford 6-2, and Borger and Canyon 5-2-1.


4. Estacado and Borger both 6-1-1, Hereford 6-2, and Canyon 5-2-1. What do all these mathematical possibilities come down to? It means Hereford and Borger, as well as Estacado, all have their destinies in their own hands, but Canyon does not.

And that's exactly what the Cowboys' offense is doing this season. They have scored 30 or more points in 6 of 8 games and lead the

conference in both total offense, 374 yards per game, and passing yards, 245.4 per game. Danny White, who is expected to start, is the leading passer in the NFC, while newcomer Herschel Walker is second in the conference with 898 total yards from

scrimmage. Dallas manhandled the Giants' defense in the fourth-quarter of the season opener to rally for a 31-28 vic-

The Giants, who got a 181-yard rushing performance from Joe Morris against Washington, rank eighth in the NFL on offense, while Dallas ranks seventh in the league in total defense.

Dallas has won three in a row against New York and has won nine consecutive games from NFC East opponents.

The Dolphins can sympathize with the Oilers on that point. They've been behind more than they've been ahead this season.

Shula said he was encouraged by Sunday's 17-13 victory over Indianpolis, partially because the Miami defense came through with several clutch plays near the end of the

Hopefully, the monkey is off our back, we'll start to get some breaks and we can go from here," he said.

The Oilers have given up hope for this season, but not the individual

"We're just going to try to get some wins," Moon said. "We're going to put the first eight games behind us and try to see what we can salvage from this season.

### Texas' NFL teams go in opposite ways

DALLAS (AP) - Once again, Texas' two professional football teams are headed in opposite direc-

The Dallas Cowboys are rocketing toward a possible NFC East division title, while the Oilers spiral toward the basement of the AFC Central.

The Cowboys are fueled by the innovations of a new offensive coordinator, Paul Hackett; two fifthround draft picks, running back Herschel Walker and quarterback Steve Pelluer; and a classy firstround selection, wide receiver Mike Sherrard.

The Oilers are being pulled toward an earthbound crash by the gravity of front office fumbles and coaching decisions that burned the team out in the preseason.

At mid-season, the Cowboys had compiled a 6-2 mark and the Oilers.

Remember August? Houston was 4-0 and Dallas 0-5. The Oilers were talking how they had turned the corner after an exhibition victory over

In the NFL, talk doesn't block and

New Coach Jerry Glanville had Houston primed for the regular season in August, much too early with a 16-game campaign on the

The Oilers flattened out in September and October, despite a weak schedule that included the likes of Green Bay, Detroit, Kansas City, Pittsburgh and Cleveland

Dallas Coach Tom Landry took his time piecing together his puzzle of newcomers into NFL regular-season fighting shape. He listened to

Hackett's advice and juiced up the Cowboys' offense with special plays for Walker, lining the former USFL star up at six different positions.

And if you believe Hackett has helped the Cowboys, can you imagine what he would have done for

The Cowboys went after the San Francisco 49ers' offensive mastermind in the off-season. They even called a full-scale press conference - normally reserved for the signing of first-round picks - when they brought him aboard.

But the Oilers had first shot.

Hackett, who groomed San Francisco quarterback Joe Montana into one of the best in NFL history, was one of three finalists for the job vacated by Hugh Campbell, who was fired with two games left in the

Glanville, the Oilers' defensive coordinator, was named the interim

Ladd K. Herzeg, the Oilers' executive vice president and general manager, announced an "exhaustive search" for a coach. He interviewed former USFL Coach Dick Coury, Hackett and Glanville

Herzeg, who fired Burn Phillips after the 1980 season even though he got the Oilers into two AFC championship games, ignored Hackett to keep Glanville.

History will chart Herzeg's decision not to hire Hackett, and also will log Walker's performance for the next decade or so.

Remember, Herzeg - and any other NFL team - could have taken Walker in 1984 before the Cowboys drafted him in the fifth round.

#### Accent on Health

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) has confirmed that four cases of dengue fever, sometimes called "breakbone fever", recently occurred in South Texas. And while the cases are not cause for alarm that a serious outbreak of the painfull illness is on the way, officials warn the mosquito-borne illness can spread rapidly.

Since modern mosquito controls have been in use, dengue has joined many other semi-rare diseases which used to be common in Texas. In the five years before the latest cases, only four cases were confirmed in the state. But in 1980, 62 cases were confirmed.

Christie Reed, Acting Director of the TDH Infectious Disease Division, said that most cases of dengue, including one of this year's cases, are 'imported" by infected persons returning from Central America and the Caribbean. However, one of the new cases was contracted by a Cameron County resident who had not been out of his own county for more than a month.

Fourty-four percent of the cases reported in 1980 also were indigenous (locally acquired) and were the first such cases confirmed in the United States since 1945. Before modern mosquito controls, dengue epidemics struck annually. Some 41,000 Texans had the disease in 1922-23.

"The significant thing about indigenous cases is that where you

have mosquitos transmitting the disease, any number of people can be affected," Reed said. "Texas' most common domestic mosquito, Aedes aegypti, as well as Aedes albopictus, which accidentally arrived in shipp-

ing from Asia, can carry the illness. Dengue is not considered lifethreatening in the Western Hemisphere, but its stymptoms can be seriously debilitating. Symptoms are persistent headache and fever (101 degrees or more) that can be accompanied by muscle and joint pain, eye pain, cough, sore throat, diarrhea, or a blotchy rash. The illness usually lasts about five to seven days and may be followed by a week or two of general weakness.

Victims with mild cases of dengue often assume they have some common virus. Dengue may be mistaken for typhus or flu, unless the patient's blood is tested for dengue virus, Reed said.

Reed explained the most effective means of controlling the disease is to eliminate sources of water where mosquitoes may lay eggs. Pet bowls, water hoses, and gutters should be drained frequently, and holes in trees should be filled with sand. Window screens should be in good repair.

#### POLLY'S **POINTERS**

DEAR POLLY - I have several ice cream recipes that are cooked mixtures with eggs in them. The recipes say to strain the cooked ice cream mix through a fine strainer before freezing it. Is this necessary?

DEAR ALICE - If the ice cream mixture has curdled or lumped at all, straining will remove any unpleasant lumps that will ruin the smooth texture of your ice cream. However, I've found that if you've been careful in cooking the custard so it does not curdle or lump, straining is not really necessary. To prevent curdling, beat the eggs, then slowly pour half of the hot cream into the eggs while continuing to beat with an electric mixer. Then the egg mixture can be put back into the rest of the hot cream and gently heated just until slightly thickened. Never allow the eggs to boil. This is the same procedure that is used for making stirred custards and egg puddings.







more than a month. Fourty-four percent of the cases reported in 1980 also were indigenous (locally acquired) and were the first such cases confirmed in the United States since 1945. Before modern mosquito controls, dengue epidemics struck annually. Some 41,000 Texans had the disease in 1922-23.

"The significant thing about indigenous cases is that where you

have mosquitos transmitting the disease, any number of people can be affected," Reed said. "Texas' most common domestic mosquito, Aedes aegypti, as well as Aedes albopictus, which accidentally arrived in shipping from Asia, can carry the illness.'

Dengue is not considered lifethreatening in the Western Hemisphere, but its stymptoms can be seriously debilitating. Symptoms are persistent headache and fever (101 degrees or more) that can be accompanied by muscle and joint pain, eye pain, cough, sore throat, diarrhea, or a blotchy rash. The illness usually lasts about five to seven days

and may be followed by a week or two of general weakness.

Victims with mild cases of dengue often assume they have some common virus. Dengue may be mistaken for typhus or flu, unless the patient's blood is tested for dengue virus, Reed said.

Reed explained the most effective means of controlling the disease is to eliminate sources of water where mosquitoes may lay eggs. Pet bowls, water hoses, and gutters should be drained frequently, and holes in trees should be filled with sand. Window screens should be in good repair.

#### POLLY'S **POINTERS**

DEAR POLLY - I have several ice cream recipes that are cooked mixtures with eggs in them. The recipes say to strain the cooked ice cream mix through a fine strainer before freezing it. Is this necessary?

DEAR ALICE - If the ice cream mixture has curdled or lumped at all, straining will remove any unpleasant lumps that will ruin the smooth texture of your ice cream. However, I've found that if you've been careful in cooking the custard so it does not curdle or lump, straining is not really necessary. To prevent curdling, beat the eggs, then slowly pour half of the hot cream into the eggs while continuing to beat with an electric mixer. Then the egg mixture can be put back into the rest of the hot cream and gently heated just until slightly thickened. Never allow the eggs to boil. This is the same procedure that is used for making stirred custards and egg puddings.

CHINA GROWING AS TOURIST ATTRACTION

TOURIST ATTRACTION
PEKING (AP) — China is on another "long march" and is attracting an ever-growing number of tourists, reports Travel Agent magazine.

Last year the capital city received some 930,000 overseas visitors, contrasted with just a few thousand who entered China when it was opened once again to the world 12 years ago. Two million foreign visitors are expected to visit the city annually by 1990, and 4.3 million by the end of the century.

By 1990, 40,000 hotel rooms will be available in the capital for tourists, 23,000 more than were available last year, according to the publication. In addition, some 4,900 apartments and 4,200 offices will be available for overseas residents in the city.

### Texas doctors testify on crises

Rising liability insurance premiums, larger settlements and awards, and fear of lawsuits are having negative effects on the health care of Texans. These and other insights to the professional liability crisis were part of Texas Medical Association testimony before the House/Senate Joint Committee on Liability Insurance and Tort Procedure on Saturday (Oct. 25) in

According to a recent TMA member survey, this fear of being sued has forced 69 percent of family doctors to limit the services they provide, said Dr. Jim Bob Brame, TMA president and a family physician from Eldorado. He added, "Thirtyseven percent said they no longer deliver babies. This means many people in Texas are not getting the services they need or they must go far from home to get them."

The survey also revealed that up to 38 percent of family doctors give patients more care than they may need because of the threat of a suit. Commonly referred to as defensive medicine, 38 percent of family doctors always order more consultations, 33 percent always order more x-rays, and 31 percent always order more lab tests. "Defensive medicine has added \$15 billion to the nation's health care bill," said Dr. Brame.

Alarming increases in liability insurance premiums are necessary because of increasing numbers of suits, larger settlements, larger awards, and changing theories of recovery, according to Dr. E. Donald Webb, a Houston general practitioner. He told the committee, "You are in a position to preserve the tort compensation insurance system for those who are victims of true negligence. Sanity and predictability in the insurance mechanism must be restored."

TMA also believes that the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners, which is authorized by the Medical Practice Act to license and discipline doctors, could better protect the public from the small percentage of incompetent or negligent doctors if it had more staff and funding.

"TMA asks that those dedicated funds currently being held--but unappropriated--be immediately made available to the board to improve its ability to investigate these complaints in a timely and prudent manner. These are public funds from licensing fees paid directly by the doctors of Texas," said Dr. James Winn, a family physician from

Uvalde and former member of the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners. Dr. Winn told the committee that when a doctor testifies against an unskilled or negligent physician and then is sued by that physician, the message is loud and clear-don't get involved. TMA suggested that enhanced protection against civil lawsuits of this kind would encourage rather than discourage physicians from reporting negligent doctors.

"Although good physicians are not always able to yield perfect results, this does not necessarily mean a physician is negligent," said Dr. Charles Neblett, a neurosurgeon from Houston. Dr. Tad Davis, an obstetrician/gynecologist from Austin explained, "Physicians strive for perfect babies, but when this is not the case, people blame the physician as the only reason for not having a perfect infant...but many problems are beyond the physician's control."

The House/Senate Joint Committee on Liability Insurance and Tort Procedure was appointed by Lt. Governor Bill Hobby and House Speaker Gib Lewis to study the problem of professional liability and recommend solutions to the 1987 Texas Legislature. The hearing was held in the Old Supreme Court Room of the Texas State Capitol.



By BEVERLY HARDER County Extension Agent **Brown Bag Lunch News** 

Once carried only by school kids and construction workers, the brown bag is now a symbol of status for millions of Americans. In fact, according to the Brown Bag Institute, 249 million lunches are packed each week, and at least 50 percent of all American households brown bag at least once a week!

Why the surge in brown bag lunches? The reasons are many: time, money, convenience and an increased interest in health and good nutrition, to name just a few. People pack lunches to save money. It is estimated that the average brown bagger saves approximately \$1.80 a day. Lunches are packed for dieters, fitness fans who exercise at noon and picky kids, too, as well as heavy eating hard hat workers. It is estimated that 50 percent of brown baggers are white collar workers with higher educations and incomes of over \$30,000.

Brown bag lunches can be hearty or low-cal, special diet or special taste, simple or fancy. And for most carried lunches, sandwiches are the first choice. Credit for the sandwich goes to John Montague, an Englishman who lived during the reign of George III. Legend has it that he refused to leave his gambling table for meals. His servant, therefore, brought him pieces of meat tucked between slices of bread. And, because Montague happened to be the Fourth Earl of Sandwich, others soon began to call for "the same as Sandwich!"

Sandwiches are the number one lunch choice because they can combine grain bread with meats or other protein foods, vegetables, fruits and cheeses or other dairy products needed for a wellbalanced diet.

#### Secrets To Successful Sandwiches

Spread bread slices with softened margarine to "seal" them and help keep the sandwiches from getting soggy as they wait in your brown bag. Cream cheese, processed cheese spreads and peanut butter are other spreads that seal the

Wrap crisp or moist sandwich ingredients separately, to add when you sit down to eat.

Seasoned spreads: blend prepared horseradish, mustard, chili sauce, seasoning blends or herbs into margarine or butter for an easy way to give new zest to small favorite dwiches. Blend some basil into margarine, for example, and use for Mozzarella cheese and tomato sandwiches; or add a pinch of tarragon to make a marvelous herb spread for. chicken sandwiches. Horseradish and margarine go great with beef or ham and dill flavors tuna or salmon. Minced parsley or green onion can add color and flavor to the spread for almost every sandwich.

When combining sandwich filling ingredients, consider looks as well as taste and texture. Chopped radishes or green pepper can add a bright note to a sandwich filling. Or try leaf lettuce instead of iceberg, or deep green romaine leaves. Parsley springs, with most of the stem removed, make a good sandwich green with a peppery flavor.

You can use frozen bread for brown bag sandwiches. Just prepare sandwiches as usual and pack. The bread will be thawed by noon. Starting with frozen bread also helps

keep the filling cool. To freeze bread and retain its

quality, overwrap the plastic bag in foil, heavyduty plastic wrap or plastic bag. Press the wrap tightly to the bread and seal tightly. Be sure to label and date the bread. Use within 2 to 3 months.

If you pack sandwiches in plastic bags, be sure to gently press out all the air before closing the bag. This will help sandwiches stay fresh and moist. Special note-commercial mayonnaise is an acidic substance which is a hostile environment in which bacteria do not thrive and in experiments at the Food Research Institute at the University of Wisconsin showed that mayonnaise actually prevented bacteria growth. This should not be interpreted to mean that a spoonful of mayonnaise in a sandwich will provide total and absolute protection against any kind of abuse. Food poisoning can grow in a normal mixture of food and mayonnaise, but they grow even better without it. So just because you take your lunch in a brown bag does not mean that you have to 'hold the may' on your sandwich. Education pro-

### Personality traits relate to ulcers

Is there an "ulcer personality?" Do some people have personality traits that may predispose them to form peptic ulcers?

Recent research suggests that the answer is "yes", according to gastroenterologists Dr. Charles Richardson and Dr. Mark Feldman, who jointly hold the Patterson Professorship in Internal Medicine at The University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas. Besides their affiliation with UTHSCD, Richardson is chief of staff at the Dallas Veterans Administration Medical Center and Feldman is associate chief of staff for research at the Dallas VAMC.

Conducting studies both separately and together at the VA medical center, the two clinical investigators have found an entire gamut of psychological disturbances in those who form peptic ulcers, as well as an identifiable set of behavioral risk

Peptic ulcers are defects or holes in the lining of the stomach (gastric ulcer) or upper small intestine (duodenal ulcer). Originally all ulcers in the upper gastrointestinal tract were believed to be caused by the aggressive action of hydrochloric acid and pepsin on the mucosal lining of the stomach. Therefore they became known as "peptic ulcers."

Feldman reported in the issue November "Gastroenterology" that in groups of ulcer patients and normal control volunteers, the ulcer patients experienced approximately the same number of potentially stressful life events as normal subjects. But the ulcer patients perceived the events as having a far more negative impact on their lives.

'Feldman's studies also confirm that there is a higher incidence of personality disorders in ulcer patients than controls although no one ulcer personality disorder was found consistently. The most prominent personality disorder in his study was 'hypochondriasis"; that is, the ulcer patients tended to be hypochondriacs and were often complainers, preoccupied with their own aches and pains, and pessimistic.

He found that ulcer patients, as a group, are excessively dependent. Yet his study shows that ulcer patients have less social support than others, an area which haa been large-

ly ignored in past ulcer research. Finally, Feldman showed a much higher frequency of emotional distress, in the form of depression and anxiety, in ulcer patients than in

flow.

While the mechanisms by which emotional stress contributes to ulcer disease are unclear, it is known that certain emotions, such as hostility, resentment, guilt and frustration are associated with increased gastric acidity. Studies also show that, when stress is alleviated, acid secretion may diminish and symptoms of ulceration may disappear.

Behavioral risk factors for peptic ulcer disease, according to the doctors, include the use of tobacco, alcohol, coffee and aspirin. Smoking cigarettes, they say, is additionally harmful once ulcers form since it delays ulcer healing. Death due to peptic ulcer disease is more likely among patients who smoke than those who do not.

In their search for a cure, Feldman and Richardson found that a chief factor separating ulcer patients from the average person is a profound overproduction of stomach acid. They discovered that duodenal ulcer patients secrete twice as much acid into the stomach over a 24-hour period as do normal persons, and the amount of acid secreted is elevated both during the day and night.

The reasons for overproduction of acid in some individuals with duodenal ulcers and not in others remains largely a mystery, but the doctors have identified several mechanisms by which acid is

For example, thinking, seeing, smelling, tasting and chewing food can trigger acid secretion, their studies show. And when these factors stimulate the vagus nerve, originating in the brain, parietal cells in the stomach are given the signal to secrete acid. In addition, endocrine cells in the stomach are stimulated to release the hormone, gastrin, which then further stimulates acid secretion. Richardson and Feldman have measured increased acid and gastrin levels in normal volunteers when appetizing food was either discussed with the subjects or actually placed in front of them so that they could see, smell, and think about the food.

Peptic ulcer disease is likely caused by several different factors. For example, increased acid secretion and emotional stress may be important mechanisms leading to ulcer formation in some patients while smoking or ingestion of drugs such as aspirin may play a major role in others. Genetic predisposition may be a factor in ulcer formation in certain "ulcer famlies."







#### Nosebleeds and DR. GOTT

DEAR DR. GOTT - I got nosebleeds for no reason from age 5 to 37. Finally a new doctor came to town reading and has had me on high-bloodpressure pills for the past 40 years. and I've had no more nosebleeds. I

hope this helps some of your readers.
