

WDIC seeks to 'moderate' influx of DOE personnel

The Deaf Smith County Waste Deposit Impact Committee Thursday night approved a recommendation which will seek to "moderate" personnel to Hereford.

meeting Thursday night, WDIC approved the resolution with only three of the six committee members voting. Frank Zinser made the motion; Troy Sublett seconded, and Troy Don Moore voted with the pair. Tom LeGate abstained and alternate Kathy Moore, sitting in for John Fuston, did not vote. Dennis Brown was absent and had no alternate.

The purpose of the action is to slow down or stop contract personnel for the Salt Repository Project office from moving into the community until WDIC's Executive Director Phil Niedzielski-Eichner can conduct baseline studies he has deemed are necessary to determine impacts to the area from the presence of the project and associated personnel.

Eichner lists the expansion of the project personnel from Environmental Assessment figures as a prime downers within the nine square mile

According to Eichner, initial EA estimates stated the potential size of the Department of Energy's plans the project's workforce would peak for transferring more contractor at 480. More current estimates show as many as 1,375 people may be During the regular monthly employed on the site at the peak of activity.

Eichner also pointed out that cooperative efforts with the State's Nuclear Waste Programs Office will begin June 22 and will be completed in September. The proposed program is designed to gather information about the community which will provide baseline data for the determination of impacts.

Among those potential impacts, Eichner lists social impacts related to, "substantial conflict and stress within the community which may still exist today," and which he states occurred as a result of DOE's February, 1987, announcement that Deaf Smith County was one of three national sites chosen for site characterization studies.

Under economic impacts, Eichner lists positive impacts of expenditures by the project totaling \$337,000 in Hereford. He did not include dollars spent by personnel for lodging, food or other necessities in his figures.

> Labor pricing and supply are another area Eichner lists as potentially impacted. Citing 20 positions which have been filled by local hires Eichner stated, "Additional demographic information regarding this group has been requested but as yet has not been received." The information Eichner desires relates to previous employment histories and salary levels of the individual employees.

> Eichner also stated, "...sufficient concerns have been raised by local employers to identify that projectrelated groups are attracting away valued employees." When questioned about the local employers who have expressed such concern, Eichner admits, "The only one I have actually heard from, in terms of specific experience, is the courthouse." As of Thursday a total of four Deaf Smith County employees have resigned their jobs to accept positions with project contractors.

> In a phone interview this morning, DOE's Linda McClain, manager of institutional relations, responded: "We put out a job advertisement and anyone who wishes to apply certainly has that right. Of course we want to hire the most qualified and the best

person for the job, but we are not going after any particular people."

Service-delivery impacts Eichner will be taking a look at include the school system. "As yet, it does not appear that the Repository Program has substantially impacted service delivery provided by local governments and special districts," he said.

Overall, Eichner presented the belief that the community is not prepared for site characterization in a, "manner that would reduce negative impacts nor allow it to realize the maximum economic benefits." Today he will be filing a report with DOE's Project Manager Jeff Neff requesting that the projected additions of staff members be moderated to allow time for the committee to prepare baseline studies and for the community to prepare for the influx of people.

Personnel projections for DOE and its contractors estimate an additional 35 added in June, 30 in July and 50 per month afterwards. Not all of these people would be living in Hereford. Currently, in fact, only nine of 50 transfers have chosen to reside here.

A recommendation to request approval for the WDIC to join with the Mid-Columbia Consortium of Governments to establish an Association of Situs Governments was tabled pending further investigation. "There is a need for a strong, cooperative and independant

Reagan tries rhetoric on budget, Democrats seek bargaining table

budget dispute between President Reagan and the Democraticcontrolled Congress is blooming into a full-fledged fight, with Reagan firing his rhetoric and lawmakers maneuvering to force him to the

bargaining table. The president issued a harsh statement and sent forth his aides Thursday to denounce the fiscal 1988 budget the Democrats produced. The \$1 trillion plan envisions a \$19.3 billion boost - \$64.3 billion over three years - and attempts to put Reagan on the spot by tying that to a

modest increase in defense spending. "Their price for meeting our national security needs is this: for

every \$1 of defense it will cost \$10 in new taxes," the president said in a statement. "That's an offer I can "Our national defense is at risk,

and we simply cannot agree to a plan that will plunge us into another decade of neglect," Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger said in a statement.

Reagan, seeking to turn public attention away from his administration's scandals in foreign policy,

plans to begin a series of road trips spending restraint must be combined next week. He's asking the public to pressure Congress to give him more control over the budget.

But Democrats blame the huge federal deficits on Reagan's unwillingness to work with Congress. During Reagan's tenure, the national debt has more than doubled to \$2.3 trillion. Interest on that debt is expected to cost taxpayers \$140 billion next year.

The Democrats note that Reagan's own budget included some \$5 billion in tax boosts, and they contend that

Defense minister working on behalf of kidnapped newsman

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - The defense minister today asked religious leaders and Syrian officials to help free his son and U.S. journalist Charles Glass, whose abduction brought to nine the number of

Americans held hostage here. Glass, a 36-year-old Los Angeles native, was kidnapped Wednesday along with Ali Osseiran, the 40-yearold son of Lebanese Defense Minister Adel Osseiran. Their abduction was sed Thursday.

The two men were riding in the ounger Osseiran's chauffeur-driven Volvo sedan in a suburb of oliced Moslem west Beirut nmen stopped the car, ss, beat him and stuffed

him into the trunk of another car, police said. They said Osseiran tried to intervene and was also abducted, along with car's driver.

The gunmen, who were traveling in four cars, staged the kidnar only 350 yards from a Syrian army

heckpoint, police said. Adel Osseiran, 79, "stayed up all effort be spared to gain the release of the two unharmed," and won pledges of "unlimited assistance" from commanders of Syria's peacekeeping contingent in Moslem west Beirut said an aide to the minister. Study shows

Husband-wife teams change face of ministry

HOUSTON (AP) - Ever since the Apostle Paul worked with Aquila and Priscilla with a struggling church in the Greek city of Corinth, there have been clergy couples.

Modern marriages between ordained ministers became more commonplace on the American Protestant church scene when women started enrolling in seminaries that were formerly male domains. Women now comprise up to 50 percent of the student body at some seminaries.

When the twain meet, the inevitable - minister marrying minister - happens. The result is a double qualified couple. The dilemma is: Where should they both work? Not every church can afford two pastors, and not all churches want a woman in the pulpit. Clergy couples ly.

The United Methodist Church has 400 clergy couples. The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has 700.

The phenomenon also has been evident in Judaism since women were ordained to the Reform rabbinate beginning in 1972 and, more recently, in the Reconstructionist and Conservative rabbinates. Rabbi A. Stanley Dreyfus of the Central Conference of American Rabbis in New York City says approximately 33 Reform rabbinical couples and two rabbinicalcantorial couples exist.

The only transdenominational study on the issue is a National Council of Churches survey of 112 clergy couples done in 1979. Fifty-one percent of those couples worked in the same ministry or church; 26 percent worked in separate ministries; 4.5 percent had one or both partners in secular work; 10.7 percent had one partner doing graduate work or in seminary; and 6.3 percent had one of the spouses unemployed.

The study estimated the 1,000 clergy couples existed then in 12 mainline Protestant denominations. That number has grown since, says the Rev. James Gunn, director of the

NCC office for Professional Church Leadership, but no agency has compiled a definitive listing of current couples. Gunn adds that the percentage of couples serving the same

"Many of these clergy couples discovered they were spending time on the job working on their marriage and time at the breakfast table working on their church," he said. "It's caused a lot of stress. It's been easier not being related to the same church.'

All but one of the clergy couples in Reform Judaism work in separate congregations, which makes for headaches in terms of placement, says Dreyfus, who directs the rabbinical placement commissions for the Reform movement.

It makes for a great deal of worry when we're trying to find them two congregations nearby," he said. "But it's always worked out with happy results."

Three Houston-area clergy couples have come up with varied approaches to being married and ministering simultaneously.

The Revs. Vicky and Winfield 'Casey'' Jones, share pastoral duties at the First Presbyterian Church in Pearland, each working part time and splitting one salary.

Vicky Jones has a favorite cartoon: a husband and wife dressed in clerical garb surrounded by their children wearing pint-sized clerical

collars. It shows the tendency of the parents' occupation to rub off on the youngsters, which is part of the reason that the Joneses devote a large amount of time to their two children, ages 3 and 5.

"A lot of people face the choice of both working and earning more money, or making less but taking care of their children," said Casey Jones.

The Joneses are glad they have the option of keeping their children out of day care except for a few hours each

"I like hearing Vicky," he said, "and I feel that God speaks to me through what she says. Our understanding of ministry is that it is joint. God doesn't only have to speak through me or work through me."

The Joneses estimate that together, they spend at least 70 hours a week on church business. A solo pastor would spend 50 or 60.

"Often the pastor's wife resents the time the church takes her husband away from her," Mrs. Jones said. "With us, when someone calls us, they don't just dismiss me and ask for him."

The Revs. Ismael Sanchez and Daisy Machado of Iglesia Cristiana El Redentor in Houston are a clergy couple who have crashed through a number of barriers in their quest to evangelize Houston's Hispanics. They are the first Hispanic couple in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) denomination to co-pastor a church, and they are also heading the first denominational Hispanic mission in Houston.

Signing of the bill, which Clements' aides said takes effect immediately, capped efforts begun in 1977 to close the law's loopholes.

The current law allows governmental bodies to meet in private, "executive" sessions to discuss a variety of matters, including personnel matters, litigation and property acquisition. The bill would require them to keep certified agendas or tape recordings of such closed meetings.

Under the bill, the tape or agendas could be made available to members of the public who challenge action by a governmental body, and any action taken by public officials who violate the law could be voided.

The bill also guarantees that television news crews can take their cameras into governmental meetings and videotape the sessions. The original act guaranteed that meetings could be covered by reporters taking written notes or using tape recorders or by still photographers.

Passage was sought by a variety of groups, including Texas Media, a coalition of seven state news media organizations interested in freedom of information issues.



But Sax would not join the scuffing

"He has quite a fork ball," Sax said. "I've never said Dave Smith scuffs the ball. He has an outstanding sinking ball."

Smith said Dodger requests to check the game balls did not bother

"It doesn't bother me what they do," Smith said. "It's not a distraction to me."

The Astros led 3-0 after three innings on a wild pitch by Dodger starter Bob Welch in the first inning and a 2-run homer by Glenn Davis in the third inning.



Ochiltree dig may be oldest Indian complex

PERRYTON, Texas (AP) - Archaeologists who descended on Ochiltree County by the hundreds have unearthed new insight into the largest - and perhaps oldest prehistoric Indian community in

The Panhandle site is one of the most significant in the nation, but little was known about the lifestyle of the people who left the buried city 800 years ago, Oklahoma freelance archaeologist David Hughes says.

With 340 participants in the Texas Archaeological Society's annual field school working last week under the supervision of experts led by Hughes, the pieces of the puzzle have started to fit.

The students - ranging in age from 6 to 89 - crawled over, under and around dig sites to gain practical field experience.

"I was in shock when I heard how many people would be here," Hughes said. "I was expecting about 150 people at the most.'

Keeping hundreds of men, women and children organized was no easy task, he said. But pandemonium has its payoffs.

"In the last eight days, we nearly matched what we accomplished in eight weeks last year," Hughes said.

"What we have here is an archaeological siting that's not duplicated in North America, with the possible exception of Chaco Canyon in New Mexico, a national monument," he said. "We estimate there were 30 village complexes on this site and all were little towns with 300 people each."

All the villages might not have been inhabited at exactly the same time, Hughes said, but he's fairly certain he knows what kept the Indians in residence from about 1150 A.D. to 1450 A.D.

here that they looked for and it wasn't the abundant water and it'. wasn't the buffalo. It was the trees," he said, pointing to the still-plentiful cottonwoods lining what is now Wolf Creek State Park.

"It's a culture we've had no understanding of until now," said Bob Malouf, Texas' state architect. "It appears, because of their trading and migrating, that these people were influenced from the north to northeast, not the south like we had thought."

Artifacts found at the site came from the Pacific Ocean and Montana, which were major trade contacts for sedentary buffalo hunters who inhabited Ochiltree County, he told the Amarillo Globe-News.

Other finds include pottery with designs not seen before in this region a bison skull, sea shells, fish bones, corn, beans, hunting and knapping tools and jewelry.

This was the third consecutive summer archaeologists have combed the banks of Wolf Creek searching for clues to unravel mysteries behind the artifacts owned by the ancient dwellers who inhabited the Texas Panhandle.

The sites were explored in 1907 and 1920, but five years ago, Harold Courson of Perryton bought most of the land and the digging became intense.

Courson, who owns an oil company, granted archaeological easements and financed previous digs on the property. This year he supplied wells, generators, pressure tanks, booster pumps, pipes, hoses and air conditioned trailers for the

"We're trying to apply a little oil field technology to the dig site," said Kirk Courson, Harold Courson's son.






