

Reagan optimistic about economic summit

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, denying that he came home empty-handed from the Venice summit, says a congressional "lapse of faith" is threatening progress that he and other world leaders made toward economic health.

"The truth is we came home from this summit with everything we had hoped to accomplish," the president said in an 18-minute nationally broadcast speech Monday night from the Oval Office.

"I was particularly gratified, for example, for the support our allies gave to our Persian Gulf policy; it was extended without hesitation,"

the president said, although the support was limited to diplomatic rather than military backing.

Reagan answered critics of his plan to protect oil tankers in the Persian Gulf with American warships by saying, "If we don't do the job, the Soviets will" and said U.S. national security would be jeopardized if the Kremlin becomes the guardian of gulf oil.

Reagan disputed reports that "nothing was really accomplished at the summit, and the United States in particular came home empty-handed" while saying he "felt among the other six summit leaders a sense

of unease about America's commitment to a consistent, enforceable plan to reduce our deficits."

He said he had "a special message, one that is about our own economy, about actions that could jeopardize the kind of progress we made toward economic health last week in Venice as well as the prosperity that during the last six years all of us here in America have worked so hard to achieve.

The president recalled the passage two years ago of the Gramm-Rudman deficit reduction legislation which he supported, but added, "And what's happened to that restraint on

wasteful domestic spending solemnly promised under Gramm-Rudman-Hollings? It vanished. And to pay for this lapse of faith you, the taxpayers, are going to be saddled with an approximately \$100 billion bill over the next four years."

He renewed his plea for a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced federal budget and for congressional action to permit him to veto specific items in appropriation bills. He said he would spell out other budget reforms, which he called "an economic Bill of Rights."

Following the speech, Democratic leaders in Congress attacked his

fiscal policies and said his Persian Gulf plans are deceptive.

Senate Majority Leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., said the president's budget picture "was like his early explanation of the Iran-Contra misadventure. It was long on rhetoric, short on facts and left a misleading impression."

Sen. Sam Nunn, D-Ga., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, said Reagan "is a master at delivering these speeches and he gave his usual performance." Reagan's remarks on the gulf held "nothing new," Nunn said. Senate Republican leader Bob

Dole of Kansas said Reagan's emphasis on the federal budget "was right on target."

"We need all the tools the president talked about — a constitutional amendment to balance the budget, the line-item veto and budget process reform — but we've also got to make the tough choices. We've got to cut spending," Dole said.

On arms control, Reagan noted that NATO foreign ministers agreed, in a post-summit meeting at Reykjavik, Iceland, to support the United States in formally proposing to the Soviet Union "the global elimination of all U.S. and Soviet land-based shorter-range INF (or intermediate range) missiles."

City to assess property owners for road work

In an unanimous decision during Monday night's regular city commission meeting, commissioners and Mayor Wes Fisher voted to begin the required process to assess property owners along North U.S. Hwy 385 for road improvements made last summer.

City Attorney Earnest Langley noted that statutory regulations allow up to 90 percent of the cost of paving previously unpaved roads and all of the cost of installing curb and gutter may be passed on to property owners.

Curb and gutter charges totaling \$39,000 have been passed down to the City of Hereford from the state, which contracted the massive road work. At a cost of \$5.44 per foot a property owner with a 150 foot lot will be assessed \$810 for the improved roads.

Langley noted that other ordinances must be passed, public hearings held and the property owners must be notified as a part of the assessment process. He also advised the commission that, by statute, the owners may choose to pay the total amount in one payment or may choose to pay four equal installments in the first year and then complete payment in three annual installments with a charge of eight percent interest.

Local property owner Ruth Williams addressed the commission concerning her desire to place a mobile home on a vacant lot next to her home. The lot is plumbed and wired for a mobile home but has not been occupied since 1985.

The commissioners informed her that they cannot help her with the problem. Citing new zoning ordinances, passed in February, which prohibit mobile homes from being placed in residential areas other than specified mobile home parks, Mayor Fisher and Commissioner Emory Brownlow advised Williams of her right to appeal for a change in zoning which would allow her to use the vacant lot in this manner.

Failure to mend Texas budget may send bad message to Wall Street

AUSTIN (AP) — Failure during the Legislature's special session to enact a permanent solution to Texas' continuing money woes would send a bad signal to Wall Street, State Treasurer Ann Richards warns.

"It may be that (in) this session of the Legislature, the best thing we're going to get is some temporary address to our problems. I'm sorry about that if that turns out that be the case," she said after a budget briefing conducted Monday by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby.

Another temporary solution, Ms. Richards said, "undoubtedly is going to result in a very long, hard look at the dedication of the leadership of the state of Texas to deal with the problems that the state is facing."

During his briefing for about 50 business leaders, Hobby urged that the state's fiscal crisis not be solved by slashing spending on human services or education programs.

"We cannot afford to balance our budget at the expense of human services and higher education," Hobby said. "Recent budget cuts have damaged our colleges and universities. So far, it is not irreparable, but another round of reductions might be."

Hobby said some business leaders discussed the possibility of a state income tax during the hour-long

meeting, but he said he doubted that would be enacted.

The lieutenant governor said he expected the Legislature's answer this summer would be a temporary tax surcharge, on the sales tax and other levies, to get the state through the 1988-89 budget period.

"I doubt that there's going to be any major revision of the tax structure this summer. I think what we'll see is probably...a surtax on the

sales tax and all other taxes to get us by a difficult period," Hobby said.

"Surtaxes are kind of the traditional way of avoiding thinking through a problem," he said.

Hobby said he would propose a "starting point" for budget negotiations in the special session beginning June 22 that would require a \$6.7 billion tax increase for 1988-89.

"That is an enormous amount of money to raise," Hobby said.

"Therefore, reductions most likely will be made in this starting point budget in the next few weeks."

But during his news conference, Hobby declined to say where cuts might come. He said he considered the proposal totaling about \$39.3 billion too low.

"I think this is below an acceptable middle ground," Hobby said. Hobby noted that lawmakers also failed in two special sessions last summer to permanently repair the state's tax-and-spending structure.

"Very little has changed except that our circumstances are even more urgent," he said.

Ms. Richards said that between \$1 billion and \$1.5 billion in state notes need to be sold soon to provide a shot of cash when the new fiscal year begins Sept. 1, and to sell those notes lawmakers must enact a budget by Aug. 1.

Hobby said maintaining the current level of state services would require an additional \$4.6 billion in new tax revenue, but he said that isn't enough.

Among those attending the meeting was Secretary of State Jack Rains, a close ally of Gov. Bill Clements. He sounded the spending-cut theme Clements has urged for months.

U.S. may use force if attack imminent

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger told Congress today the U.S. vessels in the Persian Gulf protecting Kuwaiti tankers will be authorized to use force "in the face of attack or hostile intent indicating imminent attack."

Weinberger maintained that risks to U.S. naval forces from protecting the reflagged vessels are "moderate."

"There are some risks, particularly from unconventional threats, such as Iranian terrorism or sabotage," he said.

Weinberger publicly released an unclassified version of an administration proposal sent to Capitol Hill late Monday describing plans to provide Navy protection to 11 Kuwaiti oil tankers which are being allowed to fly U.S. flags.

Presenting the report in a closed session of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, Weinberger defended the administration's gulf policy and called the decision to reflag the Kuwaiti tankers and defend them from possible Iranian attack "a limited response to a very real threat."

Federal Land Bank attorney to appeal bankruptcy order

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — An attorney for the Federal Land Bank said he will appeal a bankruptcy judge's order that allows a Texas Panhandle couple to pay back their farm loan at 9.5 percent instead of the 10.5 percent the agency sought.

An order, entered Monday by bankruptcy judge John Akard, also scaled down the FmHA debt of Leland and Frances Smith of Dimmitt from \$814,000 to \$120,000.

Stephen Sakonchick II, senior Federal Land Bank attorney, contacted Monday, predicted that the 9.5 percent rate would result in higher interest rates being passed on to future FLB customers in order to cover costs.

Sakonchick said he will appeal the Smith case, and any others like it, to U.S. District Judge Halbert O. Woodward.

The Smith case was the first filed in the Northern District of Texas under Chapter 12, which took effect in late November. Chapter 12 allows family farmers owing \$1.5 million or less to reorganize for three years and protects creditors up to the fair market value of collateral.

Sakonchick claimed that Chapter 12, now embraced by more than 100 farmers in the Northern District, could have a chilling effect on lenders wary of continuing business with a farmer on the verge of reorganization and reduced collateral values.

"Everybody is filing Chapter 12 to keep hanging on to what they have rather than liquidate and face reality," Sakonchick observed.

Lubbock Attorney Bruce Magness said most Texas farmers who face bankruptcy are victims of mismanaged federal farm policy, not inefficiency.

Magness had asked, during the Smiths' bankruptcy hearing last month, that the interest rate on the loans against their 900-acre Castro County property be reduced to 8.5 percent. In an apparent compromise, the judge opted for 9.5 percent.

Akard also granted Magness' request for a 30-year amortization period, which Magness said would lower the Smiths' payments, and gave Sakonchick a "balloon" (balance due or refinance) payment

in 20 years.

Those terms apply only to three notes totaling \$136,500 the Smiths owe Westex Federal Land Bank in Dimmitt. The debt is not being reduced, but the terms must be renegotiated if the land is sold.

Akard's order also set out terms for paying the Smiths' other creditors.

District Chapter 12 trustee Walter O'Cheskey, a Lubbock financial consultant, said Akard's ruling is the first to deal with FLB interest rates in a contested plan confirmation.

In his view, the real issue is the type of rate, not the amount. The FLB usually offers variable, not fixed, interest rates, he noted. O'Cheskey pointed out that, in recent Chapter 12 negotiations, farmers chose the FLB's market rate because of the likelihood of an appeal of a lower rate.

FNB welcomes new president

First National Bank's new president, Don Graham, didn't even have time for a taste of punch during the Sunday afternoon reception in his honor. An estimated 350 Hereford residents turned out to meet the new president who began his official duties on Monday.

Delighted with the friendly welcome he has received, Graham says, "The reception was to begin at 2 p.m. and at 10 'til people were lined up outside the doors."

Graham succeeds James Sears, who left the bank earlier this year. Jonny Cloud has served as acting president.

The warm Hereford welcome has continued with Graham devoting much of his time this week to getting acquainted with bank customers.

"I have no plans for immediate changes of any significance," says Graham. "The staff had already begun to make some needed changes before I came."

Graham asserts that the number one responsibility of the bank will be to protect its depositors. "We are going to treat depositors' money just like it was ours and to safeguard it as if it was our own," he stated.

Citing inadequate gathering of information in lending money as one of the primary reasons so many Texas banks have closed, Graham said, "A bank has to make sure that any loans on its books are collectible. Increasing credit needs now involve big dollar demands and the time of 'handshake' banking is no longer feasible."

Graham, who grew up in Childress, asserts that FNB will continue to work with loan applicants, and in particular with ag related businesses, but adds, "Over a period of years the customer base has grown so a banker can no longer know all he needs to know about a customer without appropriate financial statements."

Stressing that bank regulators now require more documentation prior to loaning money, Graham adds that FNB will comply with the regulations in order to safeguard its depositors.

Graham also notes that he will be monitoring the loan department in terms of expansion. "Loan officers here are handling a greater volume of business than it has been my experience is normal, due to the type of credit they are processing," he states. "In time we will probably address a need for increasing the staff in the loan department and for applying methods for better time utilization."

Though he holds no degree, Graham has accrued 34 years of experience in the banking industry and has participated in numerous courses and seminars related to the banking industry.

Graham and his wife, Pat, have purchased a lot on Liveoak street where they plan to build a home. "The home will be complete in the November-December timeframe," he says. "Until then I will continue to commute from Amarillo each day."

The couple has two grown children.

Tasty seasonings add to dressing

DEAR POLLY — Can you give me a good oil and vinegar dressing recipe? I can't get the right proportions to make it taste good. I think maybe garlic and sugar should be added to it. — E.L.S.

DEAR E.L.S. — Seasonings are important to a good vinegar and oil dressing, but I think the most important factors are the proportion of oil to vinegar and the quality of the ingredients. A good wine vinegar or fresh lemon juice and excellent olive oil will make the best tasting dressing.

The following garlic vinaigrette dressing tastes good on a variety of lettuces. The recipe is from "Salad Dressings!" by Jane Marsh Dieckmann (\$7.95, The Crossing Press, 1987).

Crush two garlic cloves along with some salt. Beat 1 egg into 2 cups oil, then stir in the crushed garlic, 1 tablespoon dried fines herbs (available as a bottled mixture or blend 1 teaspoon each, parsley and chervil, and ½ teaspoon each, tarragon and chives), 2 teaspoons Dijon-style mustard and salt and pepper to taste. Beat this mixture well. Then add the juice of two lemons and grate some lemon rind into the mixture. Beat well again. This keeps well when stored covered in the refrigerator. Mix it up thoroughly before serving.

Hope this perks up your salads! — POLLY

DEAR POLLY — I'm sure we all have favorite recipes that have been cut out of the paper. It's very upsetting when we lose or tear a recipe and it can no longer be read. I take a couple of extra minutes after cutting out a recipe to tape it to a page that fits into a 7-by-10 inch binder. After that, I write the name of the newspaper and the date on which it was printed in the corner. That way, if anything should happen to it, I know where to write or call for the recipe. — BOBBI

DEAR POLLY — Twist ties can be used to hold loose-leaf papers together by threading the twist tie through the holes.

A twist tie can also be used to hold keys, safety pins or paper clips together neatly.

Use a twist tie to temporarily replace a broken shoelace. — MELISSA

DEAR POLLY — Here's a Pointer for the reader who wanted to cook in the fireplace: Slice a scrubbed, unpeeled raw potato ¼ inch thick and an onion ¼ inch thick. Layer the potato and onion slices alternately with a dab of butter and sprinkling of salt and pepper between each slice. Start and end with potato slice. Wrap in aluminum foil and bake in the fireplace about 40 minutes. Delicious!

Tired of cleaning out the kids' bathtub toys? Put in a plastic dish drainer. The kids love it. They can play with and then stack all of the wet toys in the drainer. — CHRIS

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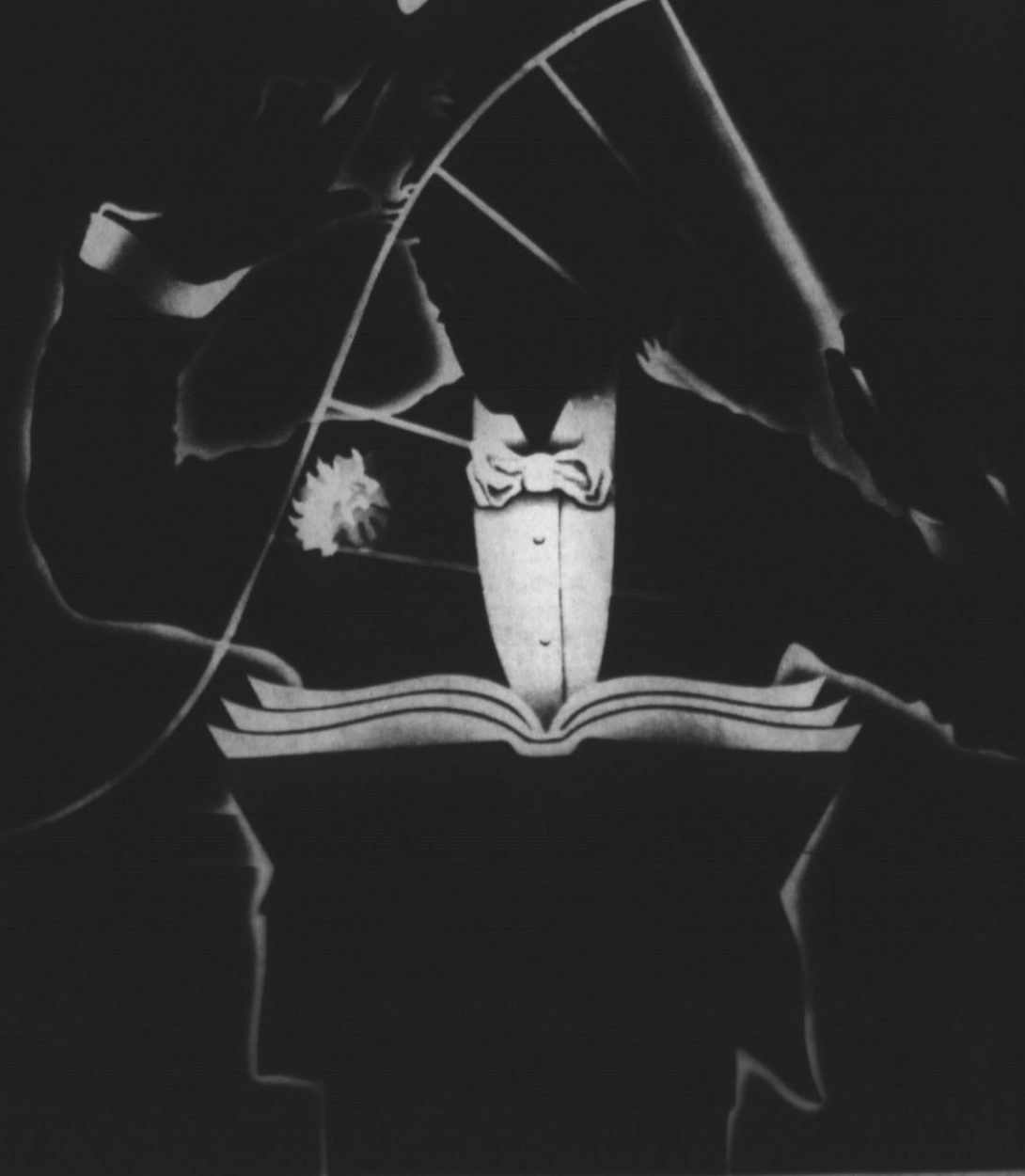

Shawn broke 92 targets in winning his state championship, and Andy broke 94 targets to claim his state title.

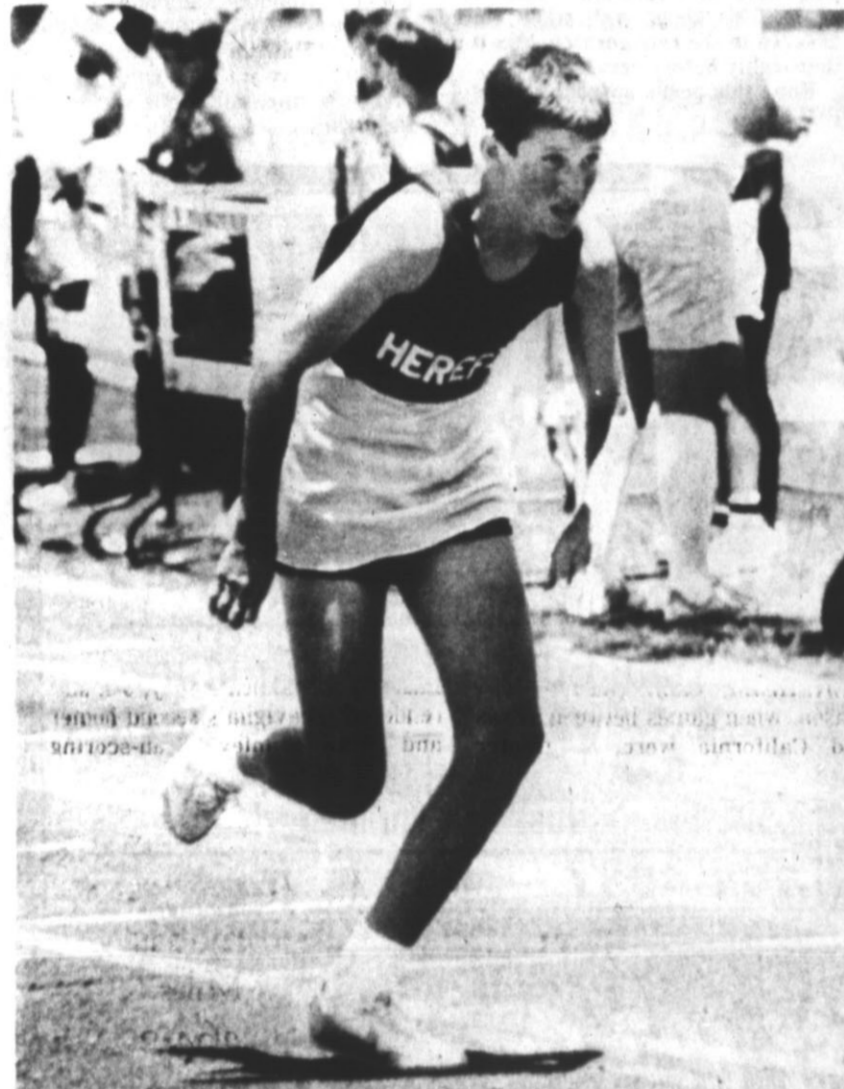

Rangers defeat Angels 9-7

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Last season, when games between Texas and California were of greater significance, the Angels beat the Rangers in their first seven meetings.

Only after clinching the American League West title did the Angels lose to Texas — five consecutive times, in fact.

They haven't forgotten. A 9-7 victory Monday night was Texas' sixth in a row over California.

Never mind that a new season finds the defending champs in fifth place and the Rangers a step behind.

The Rangers at least appear to be heading in the right direction, having played two games above .500 since a terrible 1-10 start.

Monday, they resorted to a familiar script, scoring early and often and then quivering behind an inconsistent bullpen until the last out.

Texas finished its scoring in the sixth inning. Pete Incaviglia drove in three runs with two home runs, giving him 15 homers for the season, and Pete O'Brien homered, No. 16, and doubled for another run.

The Angels chased starter Mike Jeffcoat during a four-run first highlighted by Doug DeCinces' three-run homer, his seventh, and took a 6-4 lead in the second on Dick Schofield's RBI double and a run-scoring grounder by Brian Downing.

But Jeff Russell, 1-1, got the last out in the second and over the next five innings allowed only Wally Joyner's solo homer in the fifth, his 13th.

The Rangers stormed back with four more runs in the third, when O'Brien's double knocked out Jack

Lazorko and Chuck Finley, 0-3, surrendered Incaviglia's second homer and Mike Stanley's run-scoring single.

Scott strikes out 14, Astros beat Reds 4-0

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston's Mike Scott has at last found an opposing manager who doesn't think he's scuffing the ball.

Scott struck out 14 Cincinnati batters, tying a career-high, and combined with Dave Smith for a 7-hit 4-0 victory over the Reds Monday night.

"I don't think scraping the ball had anything to do with it," Cincinnati Manager Pete Rose said. "We had our opportunities to score if we hit a ground ball. We just didn't execute."

Scott, 8-3, shut down the Reds over eight innings and didn't walk a batter before turning his destiny over to Smith in the ninth inning.

Smith, who extended his string to 25 and 2-3 innings without yielding an earned run, then struck out the final three batters to end the game.

Houston's combined 17 strike outs was the most by a team this season in the major leagues.

Smith doesn't expect his personal streak to last forever.

"I know the string can't last but when it's broken, I hope they score one run and we're leading by two," Smith said. "You really feel the pressure to preserve the shutout after Scotty pitched a game like that."

Bill Doran, who had only two hits in his last 26 at bats, broke the scoreless duel in the sixth with a solo homer over the right field fence, his seventh of the season.

Billy Hatcher's single in the seventh scored Scott with the second run and the Astros added two more runs in the eighth on Kevin Bass' triple and a sacrifice fly by catcher

Ronn Reynolds.

Doran's solo homer broke up Reds starter Bill Gullickson's shut out.

"With one run in six innings, you're going to win most of those games," said Gullickson, 7-4. "We've still got a winning record against them. That's the way I look at it."

Scott struck out five batters in a row at one stretch and reached double figure strikeouts for the 15th time in his career.

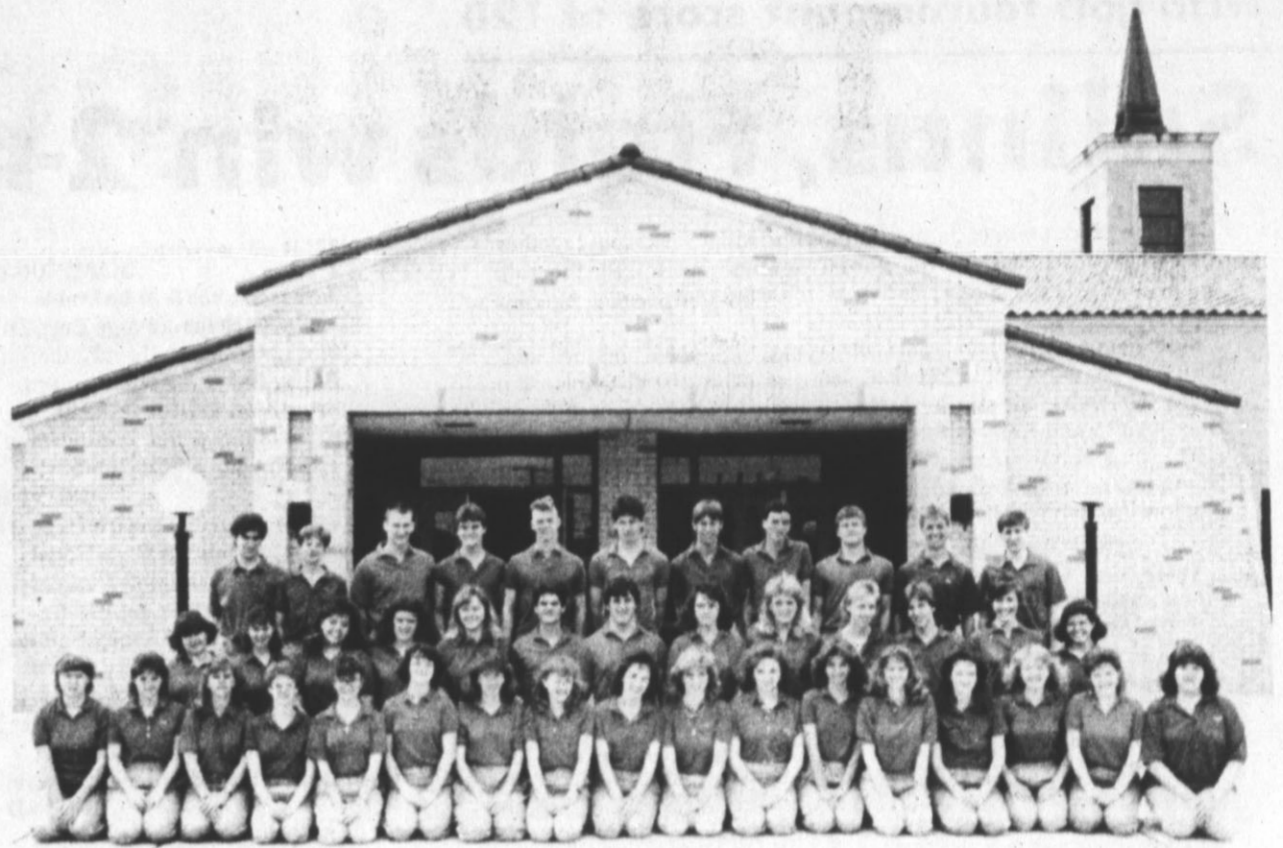

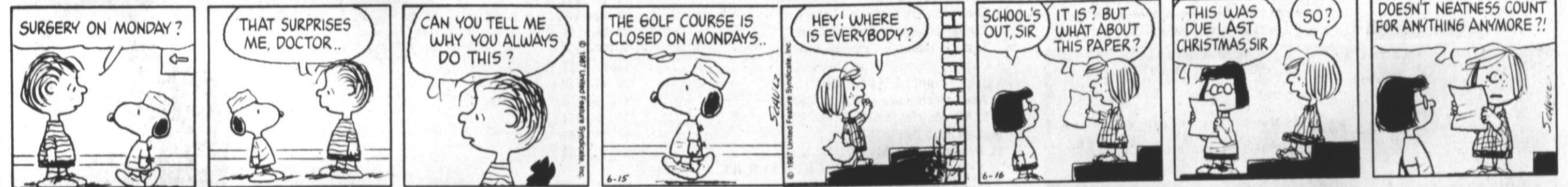

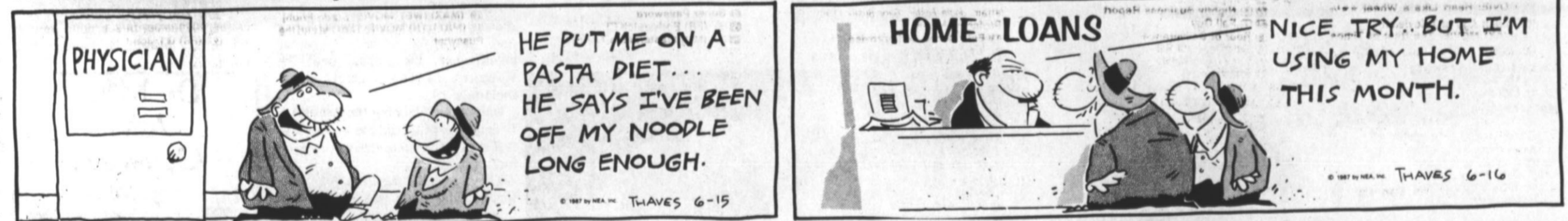

One-minute TV spots Celebrities to narrate vignettes on Constitution

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Barbara Walters talks about the men who signed the U.S. Constitution. Celeste Holm discusses women's suffrage. Dick Cavett highlights colonial travel. George Plimpton recalls the "four-month miracle."

Minutes" made for the 200th anniversary of the writing of the framework of American democracy. "Too much of the information coming out about the Constitution is stuff and pompous. I wanted to generalize it so everybody could learn," said Lou Reda of Easton, Pa., executive producer of the series. "I'm interested in informing the

brown baggers of this country what the Constitution is all about. The people I like to reach are the people who watch "Laverne and Shirley," said Reda.

Reda, the executive producer of the CBS miniseries "The Blue and The Gray," has sold the vignettes to WWOR in New York and RKO General stations KHJ in Los Angeles and WHBQ in Memphis, Tenn. Public broadcasting stations in 187 cities are also airing the "Constitution Minutes."

The vignettes are playing at two visitor centers in Philadelphia, where delegates from the original colonies met 200 years ago to write the 4,543-word document that united a struggling, infant nation.

Reda also plans to sell the soundtracks to radio stations. At WWOR, the vignettes are used as part of the noon newscast during the bicentennial celebration.

"They convey in layman's terms the different parts and important footnotes to the Constitution. The more information we can supply to our viewers the better we are and the better informed our viewers are," said Farrell Meisel, director of programming at WWOR, which reaches 20 million households.

"In an uncomplicated way, these one-minute vignettes will give everyone some insight into what our nation stands for," said Pat Servodidio, president of RKO General.

"This is one of the strongest ways to use television. This will give greater reach and cover a variety of topics," Servodidio said. "There's a need to educate without doing it in a boring fashion."

Richard Morris, professor emeritus at Columbia University, was a consultant to the series and narrated one of the minutes. He was also a consultant to CBS on the "Bicentennial Minutes," a series that aired in 1976 during the nation's 200th birthday celebration.

"These are done as least as well," said Morris.

Foul mail protests FCC crackdown

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some people are hopping mad at the Federal Communications Commission's crackdown on raunchy radio, and they're making their point with some of the same blankety-blank language banned from the airwaves.

ears, said Edythe Wise, chief of complaints and investigations of the FCC's mass media bureau.

The decision also produced an unusually hostile reaction from critics who say the FCC is breaching the First Amendment by regulating what the public can hear on the radio.

"It's that kind of an issue," she said with a shrug. But FCC officials are taking the racy writings in stride, enjoying a chuckle over a few of them.

Some of the crudest were sent to General Counsel Diane Killory, who appeared on ABC-TV's "Nightline" program to explain the commission's position after it approved the new policy April 16.

A critic from Duluth, Minn., wrote: "Do (expletive) yourself. Let the radio DJs go where they want and you (expletive) at the FCC just crawl back under your rock."

Another from Los Angeles was even briefer: "Don't (expletive) with my First Amendment rights. No censorship."

Still another used no vulgarity but offered to buy Ms. Killory a plane ticket to Moscow. On the envelope in a note to the post office, the author wrote: "Sorry I don't know the ZIP (code) ... I believe the FCC is now located in the Soviet Embassy."

Though the FCC has received far more thanks than criticism in letters reacting to its decision on indecent broadcasts, a few of the complainers grabbed attention but not sympathy with their dicey words.

A letter from students running WWQC-FM at Quincy College in Quincy, Ill., told the FCC, "We feel this country was founded on the rights and freedoms which your fascist organization can never take away."

They close by saying, "We have but one thing to say to you ... (expletive deleted) you, we do what we want."

An unsigned postcard from New Jersey used the same obscenity in directing action at the FCC, and went on to say: "What are you trying to prove? What big (another expletive deleted) you are?"

The issue has generated an unusually large number of letters — about 1,300 — and by a margin of about 8-to-1 they applauded the FCC for trying to clear the airwaves of smut and make them safe for children's

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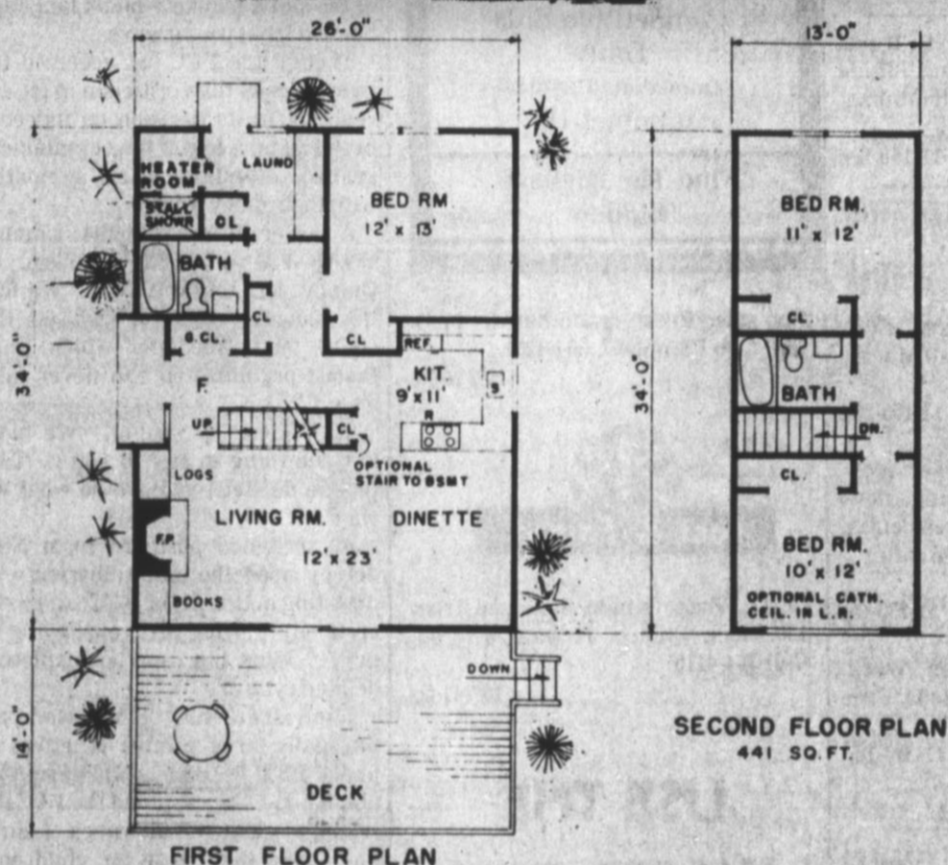
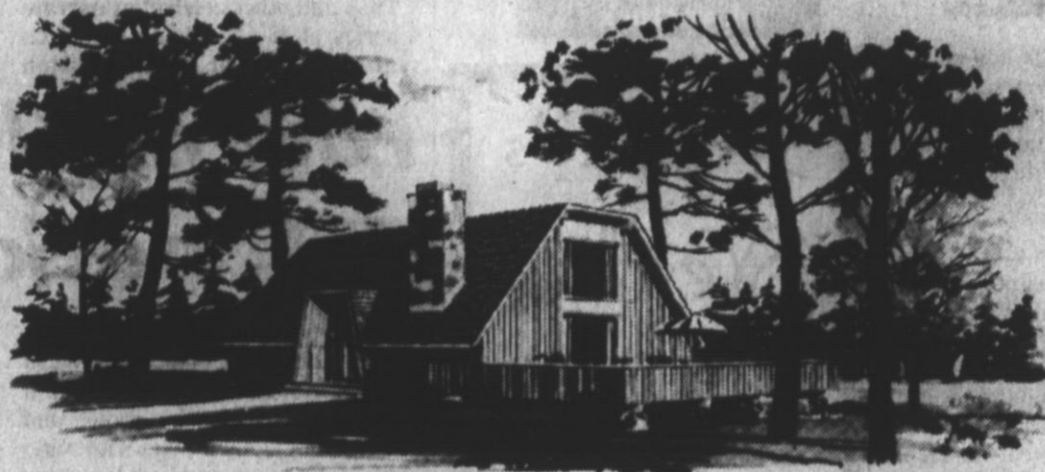


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
