

24 killed on Texas highways

An 8-year-old boy died in an Austin hospital, bringing to at least 24 the number of people killed on Texas highways over the long Thanksgiving holiday weekend.

John Smithwick died at Brackenridge Hospital in Austin, where he had been taken after a two-car collision Sunday afternoon about six miles north of Schulenburg

Gwen Haught Patterson, 27, of Lancaster died at the scene of that crash. John and Amy Smithwick, 12, were passengers in the car. Amy was reported in serious condition Monday at Brackenridge Hospital.

The Department of Public Safety said Ms. Patterson's car crossed the center of the road and struck a vehicle driven by Louis Joseph Needleman, 21, of Corpus Christi, who was reported in good condition at a Bryan hospital.

Among other traffic victims over the Thanksgiving holidays was Anthony Watkins, 19, of Chesapeake, Va., a reserve defensive back on the West Texas State University football team. He and two teammates were returning from a bi-district high school football game between Hereford and Cleburne at Abilene when their car overturned early Sunday near Tulia.

Casey Wayne Smith, 18, of Hereford, a reserve offensive lineman, suffered head and neck injuries and was in critical condition Monday at Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital.

Brian David Lady, 20, also of Hereford, was taken to a hospital in Canyon, where he was treated and released Sunday.

Drugs a problem for big cities

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - The drug problem is "ripping the heart out of the quality of life" in most American cities, say urban leaders who are moving the war on drugs to the top of their agenda.

Following a call to arms Sunday by New York Mayor Edward I. Koch, a key panel of the National League of Cities agreed Monday to a resolution making the crackdown on drugs a top priority, along with maintaining federal aid programs and fighting adverse changes in the tax laws.

The 6,670 delegates from nearly 1,000 cities will vote Wednesday on the resolution, but its approval in committee was its biggest hurdle.

"There is nothing in my city that is more important than solving the problem of illegal drug use and sales," Philadelphia Mayor Wilson Goode said Monday. "It is simply ripping the heart out of the quality of life in most cities. It's going to destroy the quality of life in America as we know it.'

Several city leaders at the Congress of Cities meeting opposed adding the drug problem to the top of their urban agenda. Pamela Plumb, a Portland, Maine, council member in line to become president of the league in two years, said the cities could be "sidetracked" away from other urban issues, and others warned they were being swept into an anti-drug frenzy.

Richardson authorities issued an aggravated assault warrant Monday for Lowrey in connection with injuries suffered by Adam Wilson, 17, who a police spokesman said was in critical condition at Presbyterian Hospital of Dallas.

The aggravated assault warrant was the second in two days naming Lowrey, who was named in an aggravated assault warrant Sunday after Elder died

A witness said he saw Lowrey pour methanol, also known as wood alcohol, into a 2-liter soft drink bottle and tell people at a party it was moonshine, said Lt. Mark Edwards, a detective with the Del City Police Department.

Temple follower convicted

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Eight years and two trials after the assassination of a congressman triggered the mass murder-suicide of 913 people in Jonestown, an obscure follower of the Rev. Jim Jones was convicted of murder conspiracy

"It brings to a final conclusion a tragic story," Jackie Speier, who was wounded in the 1978 airstrip attack while working as an aide to Rep. Leo Ryan, said Monday after a federal jury reached its verdict.

Larry Layton, the only former Peoples Temple member to be tried in this country, also was convicted of aiding and abetting Ryan's murder and conspiracy and aiding and abetting the attempted murder of Richard Dwyer, a U.S. diplomat wounded in the attack in which four others died.

"Finally, there's been some vindication" for Ryan, said Speier, who learned of the verdict while in Sacramento to be sworn in as a newly elected assemblywoman. She said she was "overwhelmed."

Layton could be given life sentences for the conspiracy convictions and for aiding in Ryan's slaying. Sentencing was scheduled for Jan.

Defense attorneys said the verdict would be appealed. Layton's first trial, in 1981, ended in a hung jury. He has been free

on bail and has been working in a local community under an alias. The pale, slightly built defendant sat without changing expression as the verdict was read after 25 hours of deliberations over six days. He consolingly patted two of his defense lawyers, Tony Tamburello and Assistant Federal Public Defender Marianne Bachers, before



The documents exhibited by the People's Mojahedin of Iran included what resistance leaders said was a roughly \$136 million contract between Israeli arms merchant Yaacov Nimrodi and the Iranian government's ministry of defense, signed July 24, 1981. The documents could not be verified independently.



Herd scores miracle 9-7 victory

ABILENE -- The Hereford Whitefaces got a miracle when they needed one to stay alive in the state class 4A football playoffs.

Hereford defeated Cleburne 9-7 after suffering some bad luck or misfortune in the game. The Whitefaces saw an extra-point attempt ruined by a bobbled snap from center, and a field goal attempt go off to the right.

Cleburne held a 7-6 lead after those Hereford misfortunes. The Whitefaces failed to convert the extra point after scoring a touchdown with 6:19 left in the game, and a 35-yard field goal attempt by Tim Long went just off to the right with 1:20 left.

Hereford had just one time out left after that missed field goal attempt. All Cleburne had to do was run out the clock, or at least run off as much time as possible.

In Cleburne's first down play, quarterback Duff Cunningham attempted to run up the middle, gaining two yards from the Yellowjacket 20 to the 22.

Then in the second down play, apparently under directions from Cleburne head coach Jerry Cunningham – Duff's father – quarterback Cunningham tried to hand the ball off to a running back.

The ball was dropped and an alert Whiteface linebacker, Bobby Medina, recovered the fumble at the Cleburne 16-yard line with 36 seconds left in the contest.

Two pass attempts by Whiteface quarterback Todd Shire fell incomplete. On third down, a Hereford player was called for a false start penalty, pushing the ball back to the 21-yard line.

Hereford attempted another pass, this time from Shire to Chris Johnson who was in the back left corner of the end zone.

Before the ball got to Johnson, he was clearly bumped and interfered with – and he still made an attempt to catch the pass. There was no controversy about this call.

The penalty moved the ball half the distance to the goal line, to the 11-yard line – with six seconds left in the game.

Hereford Coach Don Cumpton called on running back Mark Artho to attempt a 28-yard field goal. Artho made it to put the Whitefaces on top, 9-7, and just two seconds remained in the game.

In the kickoff, the Whitefaces kicked the ball so that it rolled down the field, preventing Cleburne from having any opportunity to set up a touchdown return play.

"That's what you call getting the breaks," Coach Don Cumpton of the Whitefaces said. "We tell our team if you play hard, you'll be in a position to take advantage of those breaks. And we were able to do it."

"We've got all the confidence in the world in Tim. It may be him who kicks a game-winning field goal next time," Cumpton adds.

Coach Cumpton declares that the 1986 Whiteface football team has a

"trademark": "A trademark of this particular group of guy is they will not give up. It shows tremendous character on their part. They believe in themselves and they believe in each other."

The victory puts the Whitefaces in the state quarterfinals against Wichita Falls Hirschi, which beat Sweetwater 14-7.

Hereford will battle Hirschi on Saturday at 2 p.m. at Kimbrough Stadium in Canyon.

The other state quarterfinal games in class 4A will be McKinney versus Wilmer-Hutchins (the winner of that game to play the winner of the Hereford-Hirschi game), Jasper versus West Orange-Stark, and Gregory-Portland versus New Braunfels.

Hereford's touchdown drive in the fourth quarter began from the Cleburne 34-yard line with just under 10 minutes left in the game. During the possession, after Hereford moved to within the 20-yard line, the officials called time out to inform both coaches of the statistics that would be used in case of a tie game, to determine which team would advance in the playoffs.

Hereford used eight plays to drive into the end zone, with Vincent Brown carrying the final yard for the touchdown. Big plays in the possession included a 14-yard run by Artho, a five-yard pass from Shire to Bobby Baker, and a seven-yard pass from Shire to Kyle Streun.

The first statistic used is penetrations within the 20-yard line. Each team had two penetrations at that time. The next deciding factor would be first downs, and Hereford was ahead of Cleburne in that statistical category.

Cumpton said he decided to go for an extra-point kick instead of a two-point conversion because of those statistics. The snap from center was bobbled in the extra-point attempt, and second-string quarter-back Raymond Romo attempted a pass for two points, but it fell incomplete not near any receiver.

After the Hereford touchdown was scored, Cleburne began at its own 20-yard line, and moved to its 37, where the Yellowjackets had a second-and-seven play.

Cleburne running back Mike Jo Fuller fumbled the ball, and Hereford's Robby Collier recovered it at the 36-yard line with 3:52 left in the game.

Artho carried the ball two times for 11 yards in games, giving Hereford a first down at the Cleburne 25. A two-yard gain by Vincent Brown and gains of three yards and two yards left the Whitefaces short of a first down.

With ball snapped from the 18-yard line, Tim Long attempted a 35-yard field goal, only to see the ball go just off to the right of the goal post.

That set the stage for the Cleburne fumble and Mark Artho's gamewinning field goal. Artho had attempted two field goals this season, both against Dumas and missing both of them.

The Whiteface defense did its job

in the second half, with Cleburne getting only two first downs.

"Ths second half was our best defensive performance of the year. When Cleburne gets just 44 yards and two first downs, you can't ask for much more from your defense," Cumpton said.

About the Whiteface team as a whole, he said, "Our kids are playing hard and they seem to be peaking at the right time."

Defensive leaders for the Whitefaces included Rodney Mc-Cracken, Derrell Page and Michael Phibbs with 11 tackles each, Lee Young with nine tackles, Ricky Ruiz and Edward Martinez each with six tackles, and Bobby Medina with five tackles.

Medina and Page were involved in a play that could have been a first quarter touchdown for Hereford, but an official ruled that the Cleburne quarterback was down before throwing a pass.

That play was a third-and-three for Cleburne at the Hereford 40-yard line. Medina was in the process of bringing down Yellowjacket quarterback Cunningham, who got a pass off before Medina got him to the ground.

Page intercepted the pass and had a clear field ahead of him, but before he ran even 10 yards, a whistle was blown, with the official saying the quarterback was sacked before the pass was thrown. That was with 5:51 left in the first quarter.

Hereford failed to move within the Cleburne 20-yard line in the first half. Cleburne used more than three minutes late in the first half to put together a touchdown drive.

The Yellowjackets began from their own 39-yard line. Pass completions of 21 yards, 14 yards and 16 yards, plus a 19-yard run by fullback Jimmy Ray helped Cleburne move to the Whiteface 35-yard line.

Ray carried the ball four straight times, including a five-yard run for the touchdown with 41 seconds left in the half. Larry James' extra-point kick made Cleburne's halftime lead 7-0.

That was the only penetration within the 20-yard line for Cleburne in the first half.


Rodney McCracken recovered a Cleburne fumble in the second play of the second quarter. Later in that period, McCracken tipped one pass away and broke up another pass attempt by the Yellowjackets.

Derrell Page made a key defensive play in the third quarter for the Whitefaces, blocking a 26-yard field goal attempt by James of the Yellowjackets with 5:48 left in the quarter.

With less than a minute left in the third quarter, Hereford was forced to punt from its own 47-yard line. Bobby Baker's 36-yard punt was fumbled by Cleburne, and Page recovered the fumble at the Cleburne 17-yard line.

That gave Hereford its first penetration of the game. The Whitefaces failed to score, however, when three passes fell incomplete from the five-yard line early in the fourth quarter.

Cleburne was unable to get a first (See HERD, Page 5)







Hereford High School's varsity boys' basketball team lost a pair of games Saturday in the Borger Holiday Tournament, but in the eyes of the Whiteface head coach, the tournament games were the played better by the team than other games this season.

Hereford lost to District 1-4A foe Borger 103-80 and then fell to Clovis 67-58. Earlier in the tournament, Hereford beat Sanford-Fritch 71-53 on Friday night.

"In the Borger tournament, we probably played our best three games of the year so far. Against Borger, which is rated in the top 20, were were only eight points down going into the fourth quarter," said Hereford Coach Mike Fields.

'Against Clovis, we were down four or five points with two minutes to go in the game. So it's really encouraging to play close to those teams without our experienced post players, those who are still in football," Fields continues.

'David Manchee, Todd Weaver and Kevin Hansen all played solid throughout the tournament. We've been real competitive, even without our football players. We're averaging 69 points a game and our opponents are averaging 70 points.

"We're gaining a little respect," Fields adds.

Today, the Whitefaces will host Amarillo High, rated No. 2 in the state in class 5A. Game time is 7:45

Amarillo High, the defending state 5A champion, won the Midland tournament last weekend. Amarillo High has three starters back from last year, and also one player, not a starter, who was named to the allstate tournament team last season.

Two other games against Amarillo High will also be played today at the "HHS gym - a sophomore game at 4:30 p.m. and a junior varsity game at 6 p.m.

Todd Weaver and David Manchee combined for 45 points in Hereford's 103-80 loss to Borger. Weaver hit seven of 21 field goal attempts and 12 of 14 free throws for 26 points, and Manchee made nine of 19 shots from the field and one of three free throws for 19 points.

Kevin Hansen and Kent Walterscheid each added eight points for Hereford. The Whitefaces trailed Borger 54-41 at halftime, but closed the gap to 68-60 in the third

Weaver led Hereford in rebounds with eight, and Hansen led in steals with four and also in assists with

Hereford made 28 of 70 field goal attempts against Borger for a shooting percentage of 40 percent.

In the 67-58 loss to Clovis, Hereford was behind by one point at halftime, 37-36. Clovis led after three quarters of play, 55-50.

Manchee was high scorer for Hereford with 14 points. Hansen totaled 13 points, and Weaver was also in double figures with 10 points. Walterscheid scored eight points.

Weaver led in assists with three and in steals with four, and Bobby Robbins was Hereford's leading rebounder with six.

The Whitefaces shot 36 percent from the field, hitting 21 of 58 shots.

Paleontologist, wife turn cotton gin into artists colony

DALLAS (AP) - An abandoned cotton gin is being turned into a foundry for sculptors by a Dallas couple who hope to create an artists colony in the heart of East Texas farm coun-

Juliana Bernier, a French-Canadian, and her husband, retired Southern Methodist University professor Bob H. Slaughter, purchased a five-acre complex of buildings in Ladonia two years ago and are building a foundry where poor, but talented, craftsmen can cast their artistic visions in bronze and glass.

"We got the idea for the foundry together," said Ms. Bernier. "We heard that the cotton gin was for sale and I told Bob to buy it. Then when we saw the space in its buildings, we

thought of all the possibilities."

The art center, appropriately, is being called "Le Cotton Gin."

Both Slaughter and Ms. Bernier had worked in metal before and knew that the only metal art foundry in the area was at SMU. And they also knew that artists often need more than just a casting foundry.

"The idea was to have a place where artists could come and make their pours into molds, stay until the castings cooled and then put the finishing touches on them," said Ms.

Slaughter said they plan to teach artists how to make molds for their sculpture and then provide them with a refuge while their work is being completed.

'Some artists are poor," he said. "But they could put their works in our foundry and then camp out for a few days on the property."

The foundry is being constructed in an open area between the shop and a building housing the cotton gin machinery. The complex will include a furnace from which molten metal is poured into sand molds and a "bur-

nout oven" which prepares the molds using the lost wax method.

The lost wax method involves dipping wax sculpture in a silica slurry. When the slurry is dried and recoated, it forms a mold around the wax. The burnout oven is then used to melt the wax out of the center. The resulting sand mold then can be used for metal castings.

Included in the Le Cotton Gin will be an air compressor which artists, including Ms. Bernier, can use for sandblasting glass sculptures.

A group of artists scheduled to start work at the new colony will stay for several weeks to help complete the opening. "They are full-fledged artists. One

is a painter, one is a ceramist and one a sculptor who paints as well. They will come to help with the first pours in aluminum and bronze," said Ms. Bernier.

Slaughter, 58, a palentologist who retired from SMU in 1983, has completed several castings of bones. He also has created a 6-by-4-foot sculpture entitled "Dead Pan", named for the Greek god of woods and

pastures.

Mrs. Bernier, 36, came to the United States from Montreal in 1971 and opened a stained glass business in Kansas, where she became interested in glass sculpture and then in metalwork.

"I was commissioned by churches and commercial residential developments and gave classes," she said of her Kansas period. "It developed into three-dimensional work with the glass. I started doing windows that had glass expanding out of them. Eventually, it became 3-D all the way."

She has created a number of metal sculptures, including one called "Holy Cow" that was purchased at auction this year by a Dallas Art Museum official. She also produced a sandblasted sculpture shown at a symposium in Houston in October.

Profit is the not the main object of the new art center, said Ms. Bernier.

"When we have the place set up, we will make it available for artists, and not necessarily make money, but not lose money," she said. "We will have to figure out a way to do that."

Perot assumes hostage ransom deals arranged at high levels

WASHINGTON (AP) -Perot said today he assumed higher officials had approved Lt. Col. Oliver L. North's request that he offer \$2 million in a failed attempt to ransom U.S. hostages in Lebanon.

Perot, interviewed on ABC-TV's "Nightline," confirmed an account published today in The Washington Post, which said the billionaire - at North's request - sent \$2 million via courier to Cyprus earlier this year to win the release of five Americans in Lebanon

North, an aide to the White House National Security Council, was fired Nov. 25 for what the administration said was his role in funneling Iranian weapons payments to Nicaraguan Contra rebels. Asked if North was acting

with higher authority in the ransom attempt, Perot said, My sense is always that peo-

ple who do these types of Texas billionaire H. Ross things in the government are very meticulous in getting approval for their activities."

But, he added, "Maybe by the time I started dealing with Colonel North specifically. I had been pretty well programmed in that direction because that's always been the case.

Contacted Monday night, Daniel Howard, a White House spokesman said: "If it happened, according to the National Security Council, no one knew of it and it certainly was not authorized."

According to the Post's account, which it said was based on "informed sources, in cluding people with firsthand knowledge of the transactions described," North asked Perot on May 23 to deposit \$2 million in a Swiss bank ac-

Perot was on the point of telexing the money when North called and asked him to send it by courier to Cyprus for an exchange in "a ship-toship transfer," the Post said.

The courier waited five days on Cyprus, but the deal fell through for reasons that could not be determined, the newspaper said.

Perot said he did not ask North why the deal fizzled but said, "It's my understanding that the people that were supposed to produce, didn't. It's that simple.

The five hostages at the time of the ransom attempt were: Terry Anderson, chief Middle East correspondent for The Associated Press: David Jacobsen, administrator of the American University Hospital in Beirut; Rev. Lawrence Martin Jenco, director of Catholic Relief Services in Lebanon: Thomas Sutherland, acting dean of agriculture at American University; and Rev. Benjamin Weir, a Presbyterian mission

Jacobsen, Jenco and Weir have since been released. Anderson and Sutherland are still captives.

Three other Americans have since been kidnapped.

The ransom attempt directly contradicted President Reagan's stated policy of refusing to negotiate with ter-

But, Perot explained, "As I understand the government's policy, it is they don't want to use U.S. money, but if and when they can find a willing citizen to help him in matters like this, then they can go to great efforts to save the person's life."

About the same time as the ransom attempt, former national security adviser Robert C. McFarlane and North flew to Iran on May 28 with a planeload of arms in an attempt to secure release of the Beirut hostages.

Nixon aides maneuvered president to punish or reward

When he was president, Richard Nixon's aides constantly maneuvered to have him use his prestige to punish or reward, in one case rejecting a proposal to have the Japanese ambassador join the president at the opening game of the baseball season, newly released documents

An aide quashed the idea because Japan was not being cooperative on a trade issue.

Another time, Nixon was urged not to meet with the widow of Martin Luther King Jr. on the first anniversary of the civil rights leader's assassination because "it would outrage many, many people who believe Dr. King was a fraud and a demagogue, and perhaps

And he was asked by a White House aide to consider appointing a senator's choice of an unqualified candidate for a judgeship - just to gain a vote for for a Supreme Court nomination.

These insights into the Nixon White House were contained in 1.5 million pages of documents seized by the government when Nixon resigned in disgrace in August 1974. The papers were made public for the first time Monday by the National Archives, which had tried for years to release them.

Missing from the newly released documents are the most sensitive of the Nixon files - another 1.5 million pages that relate to the Watergate scandal that drove him from office. The National Archives once before tried to release those but was stopped by 29 lawsuits filed by former Nixon associates.

The Archives, which has custody of the Nixon materials, is expected to try again next month to open the papers to public scrutiny by publishing a notice in the Federal Register of its intention to do so. That opens a 60-day period in which objections can be made.

The rest of the 40 million pages were characterized by an archivist as "junk mail" and government documents that flowed to the White House in the 51/2 years of Nixon's tenure.

Nixon sent Robert Finch, then secretary of health. education and welfare, to deliver a personal message to Mrs. King.

The president had made an all-out effort to gain confirmation of G. Harrold Carswell as an associate justice of the Supreme Court.

.Two days before the vote. an aide wrote Nixon that he should offer a deal to then Sen. Marlow Cook, R-Ky., who was wavering about his vote. The note said Cook was interested in nominating a particular candidate for a federal appellate court. although the Justice Department considered the man "too old and very poorly qualified.'

"Cook has mentioned this enough times that a promise to give him the judgeship, if he brings this up, might secure his vote for Carswell,' the memo said. It was not learned if the candidate was nominated. Carswell's nomination was defeated 51-45

-Nixon astonished some aides by meeting with Elvis Presley on Dec. 21, 1970. Presley had written to Nixon saving he wanted to be named a federal drug agent. He got an honorary badge.

-Many celebrities, including movie stars Mickey Rooney, Zsa Gabor and Dale Evans, wife of Roy Rogers, wrote the president during Watergate offering their sup-

To Miss Gabor, and to hundreds of others, went this
