"I would just be shocked if it wasn't Bork," a senior administro wasn't Bork," a senior administra- tion official said Monday, speakin only on condition of anonymity. White House spokesman Marli Fitzwater acknowledged Bork was still in the running still in the running after Reagan met with advisers in the Oval Office to with advisers in the Oval Office to eview candidates' names and their egal opinions. "Some preliminary judgments were made today, some winnowin However, the spokesman insisted hat no final decisions were made


and that more than one candidate re mained under consideration to succeed Justice Lewis $\mathbf{F}$. Powell, who
