

## Court rejects dump's water guidelines

The Department of Energy's nuclear waste repository project north of Hereford may shut down as the result of a judgment handed down in Boston late Monday, according to Ron Dusek in Texas Attorney General Jim Mattox's office.

The U.S. First Circuit Court of Appeals invalidated some of the Environmental Protection Agency's standards for determining the means and site selection for disposing of high-level nuclear waste. "Basically the court said EPA standards do not protect ground water and invalidated all the standards used to select the sites being characterized," Dusek said.

The Deaf Smith County site is one of three sites undergoing characterization studies to determine its suitability for the highly controversial government project. The other proposed sites are in Washington state and Nevada.

The EPA standards relating to the release of radioactive waste into the environment from underground disposal sites were established as a result of the Nuclear Waste Policy Act in 1982.

Under the guidelines of the act DOE officials are responsible for selection of a site for nuclear waste disposal. The EPA is responsible for setting the requirements for the site selection and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission is responsible for overseeing the actions of DOE.

A second point of the lawsuit decided Monday is that not enough time

was given for public comment on the standards set by EPA. Robert Wunderlich, DOE's deputy manager for the Salt Repository Characterization Project, stated that it is not unusual for a federal agency to run afoul of the public comment guidelines.

"An agency may give the required amount of time for public comment and then, as a result of the comments received, change the plan significantly and so foul up by not giving adequate time for public comment on the revisions," Wunderlich stated.

Local DOE officials, including Project Manager Jeff Neff, were meeting with their legal counsel this morning and had developed no clear concepts regarding the impact the court decision will have on their program.

Dusek says Mattox is pleased with the decision, since he has contended that the site selection process was politically motivated and that the Deaf Smith County site is an inappropriate location for nuclear waste storage. "Based on the court ruling it (the DOE project) will go away for a while because they obviously have to come up with some new standards," Dusek stated, "but if the Deaf Smith County site meets those new standards, it will be back."

During his Monday afternoon announcement, Mattox commented that his view of the ruling is that DOE's actions are invalid and that he is convinced that the Panhandle site, which requires drilling through two aquifers, will drop out of contention as a result of the court ruling.

## INS says alien applications average

WASHINGTON (AP) — Some 305,400 aliens have sought legalized status under the new immigration law, according to federal officials who deny that applications are down and that people are fearful of seeking legalization.

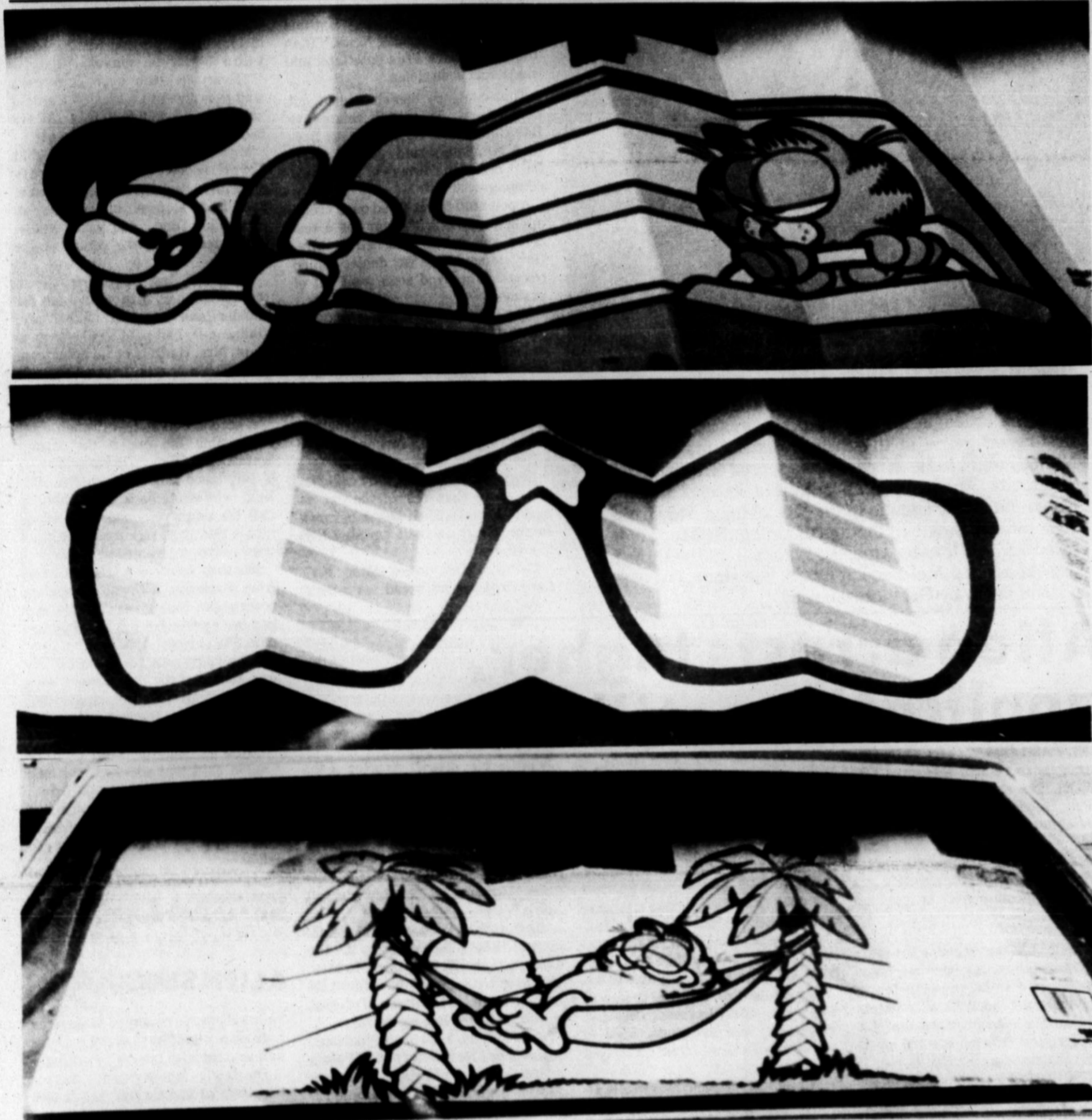
"We stand by our previous estimates of 2 million applications during the one-year eligibility period" which began May 5, Alan Nelson, director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, said Monday at a news conference. He said there is "no basis" for sug-

gestions from some in Congress and opponents of the new immigration law that legalization applications have been slower than expected.

Nelson also said the fact that more than 300,000 aliens have come directly to INS in 2½ months "should once and for all rebut ... allegations" that people are reluctant to seek legalization because of a fear of deportation.

Border apprehensions rose 35 percent in June, but Nelson denied that the increase, coupled with the

## Bus driver thankful for return to home

BALCH SPRINGS, Texas (AP) — The driver of a bus that was washed away by floodwaters says he is relieved to be cleared of wrongdoing in the tragedy that claimed the lives of nine teenagers.

"I'm glad I finally made it home," Richard Koons said Sunday.

On most Sunday nights, Koons would help lead members of the Seagoville Road Baptist Church in a regular prayer service. But on this Sunday, he arrived when the service was almost over.

He rushed to the front where he sobbed at the altar and prayed.

Koons, 26, youth pastor at the 240-member church, and several of his young campers survived the raging Guadalupe River by climbing into trees and waiting more than five hours to be rescued Friday.

"We talked about what we had done at camp, and we talked about what heaven was like," he told the Houston Chronicle.

On Sunday, Coons refused to talk about the nine campers who drowned

and the one still missing today. National Guardsmen and volunteers resumed their search today for the youth, who is presumed drowned.

Koons said he was relieved the Texas Department of Public Safety officials on Saturday corrected early reports that he and the driver of the van also washed into the river had been attempting to cross the river but were attempting it anyway when the vehicles were struck by the water.

On Saturday, DPS officials said a re-examination of the accident scene and descriptions by the drivers had determined that the vehicles were not on a low-water river bridge, but were attempting to detour to a higher, alternative route.

"Even though I was accused of things, I was secure in the fact that our kids knew what happened, that our parents were supportive, and our parents were with us," he said.

"Actually we never got to the river. The river came to us."

AUSTIN (AP) — A new bid to complete work on the state budget and a tax increase failed in the House today, continuing to deadlock action on the special session's final day.

After repeatedly failing on Monday to find enough votes to immediately enact the largest tax increase in state history, House leaders today sought to soften a "doomsday" plan that had raised the ire of Republicans and some conservative Democrats.

But that tactic angered other Democrats who insisted that lawmakers whose districts benefit from higher taxes should be required to vote for them. The House rejected the amendment plan on a 106-36 vote.

If action isn't completed on the \$38.3 billion budget and a \$5.7 billion tax increase by midnight, lawmakers would be forced into another special session.

"I don't know what went wrong," House Speaker Gib Lewis said Monday night after a chaotic day in which the House failed repeatedly to ratify a compromise tax plan to pay for the \$38.3 billion budget compromise.

"I think its down for the session," Lewis said. "I don't see how we can ... solve this Tuesday (today)."

Senators voted 26-5 in favor of a \$4.8 billion increase in the state sales tax, which would rise from 5½ percent to 6 percent, and other levies.

Both the House and Senate also had approved a \$889 million increase in the gas tax, which would remain at 15 cents a gallon instead of rolling back to 10 cents on Sept. 1 as currently scheduled.

But 100 of the 150 House members were required to vote for the big tax bill so it could take immediate effect. That was the catch. The closest the House came on a series of ballots

was 91, as Republicans and some conservative Democrats balked.

Rep. Mike Toomey, R-Houston, said many of those lawmakers were upset by a so-called "doomsday" clause Democrats put in the state budget that would strip away spending increases for universities in the conservatives' districts if the 100 vote total wasn't reached.

"If they're going to rape us ... we're going to fight," Toomey said. "The whole process is being stalemated by some other members trying to get 10 more conservatives to vote for a tax bill that their districts don't want them to vote for."

Lewis, the House speaker, said the failure to act could mean lawmakers will be summoned into another

special session when the current one ends tonight.

"... I don't see any effort for anybody to change their vote. So therefore, I don't see where we can progress any further," Lewis said.

Failure to pass an immediate tax hike, Lewis said, would reduce the total tax haul by \$313 million and keep the budget from balancing, as required by the Texas Constitution. That means the sales tax that would take effect later in the year would have to be 6¼ percent, he added.

"Those people who have voted against putting it into immediate effect have, in reality, voted for a (even larger) tax increase," Lewis said.

The doomsday plan so angered Gov. Bill Clements that he vowed to

withhold his promised support for the tax and spending bills until it was removed.

"It's punitive. It's discriminatory. It's inappropriate and it's in very poor taste. That's wrong," Clements said. "Doomsday's going to come out and then I will go to work."

But the spending-cut plan was retained. Supporters defended it, hoping their weapon would make it clear to tax opponents that they would suffer a direct consequence of failing to vote for the increase.

"They've voted for the spending, but they've never voted for the funding because it's unpopular to vote for taxes. What this does, it allows them to realize that if they don't vote for it, they don't get it," Lewis said.

"There's been proposals and counterproposals flying all day long," said Rep. Dan Morales, D-San Antonio, House sponsor of the major tax measure.

House members voted to send the tax plan back to a House-Senate negotiating committee, but since the Senate passed the plan that action had little immediate effect, Morales said.

**Persistency pays off in Cadillac's return**

GARLAND, Texas (AP) — It took Vickie Hatfield a year to do something the police said couldn't be done — retrieve her beloved 1985 Cadillac Eldorado after it was stolen.

In the quest, Mrs. Hatfield, 31, a clerk at a loan company, spent hours on the telephone, sometimes running her phone bill up to as high as \$700 as she tracked the car thief for a year before bluffing the man into returning it.

The Hatfields decided to sell their car and turned it over to Bavarian Motor Sports in Dallas to sell on consignment, asking \$29,000 for the car.

"First, the company called and said the car had been sold," Hatfield told the Dallas Morning News. "Then they called back a few days later and said it had been stolen."

That company has since gone out of business. It is not related to Bavarian Motor Sports Inc., a Bedford company, said John Lauterbach, one of the owners of the second company.

A potential buyer filled out a credit application, took the car for a test drive and never returned it, Mrs. Hatfield said. The car dealer denied responsibility and soon went out of business.

Mrs. Hatfield said police told her the theft was a civil dispute between her and the car dealer. However, she testified before a Dallas County grand jury, which resulted in an indictment against Albert Harry Coyne, the man who had filled out the credit application, for theft over \$20,000.

After police told her they could do little more than record the car as stolen, Mrs. Hatfield began her own search, which lasted from May 1986 to a year later.

Dallas Police investigator E.E. Carol told her he would bet a thou-

sand dollars she would never see the car again.

"I should have made it a million," Carol said. "I just really didn't think she could do it," he said. "But she sure did." Carol said. "It took a lot of guts on her part. It took a lot of tenacity."

After discovering that the Texas drivers' license number on the credit application was actually the number for an expired Louisiana drivers' license issued in Albany, La., Mrs. Hatfield began calling relatives, bail bondsmen and law enforcement officers.

She learned that Coyne, 41, was a would-be country singer with a long history of drifting and was traveling with a 40-year-old woman.

"Everyone who ever saw them said they lived like kings," Hatfield said. "They said that they always had thousands of dollars on them."

Mrs. Hatfield discovered that Coyne received Social Security disability checks at a Louisiana bank and had a post office box in Nashville, Tenn., and wrote him a letter demanding the return of the car.

In a reply last November, Coyne threatened her with a lawsuit for slander and invasion of privacy, claiming he had paid \$3,000 down, a claim Mrs. Hatfield could never confirm. The man said he would return the car only if she returned his \$3,000 plus \$650 for new tires he bought.

A second demand, with the threat of burning the car if the money wasn't sent, followed in early May.

"My blood boiled," said Mrs. Hatfield, who wrote back threatening to call his employers and his companion's relatives, reporting that they were harboring wanted persons.

She then received a telephone call from a relative of Coyne's traveling companion, telling her that the car had been parked at the Fort Lauderdale, Fla., airport.

"The radio was gone, the battery was gone and the door locked were jammed," Mrs. Hatfield said. "But other than that, the car was in A-1 condition."

Coyne is still at large and the woman said that although she had told him she wouldn't prosecute him if he returned the car, she would prosecute him if he is ever arrested.

Mrs. Hatfield says she won't try to sell her car again.

"I guess because of all the trouble I went through to get it back," she said. "It's part of me now."

for changing what was in there." The tax plan under consideration would be raised from 5 1/4 percent to 6 percent. In big cities, where both a city and a mass transit tax also are levied, the rate would be 8 percent.

The tax increases must raise enough new money so the controller can certify that the \$38.3 billion budget will be balanced. It won't certify, it is unconstitutional and lawmakers have to try again.

Besides raising the sales tax rate, the tax plan called for expanding the 6 percent sales tax to a variety of new items and services, raising the corporate franchise tax, boosting cigarette taxes, the hotel-motel tax and imposing a \$110 annual occupation tax or fee hike on doctors, lawyers, dentists, accountants and other professionals.

**Alien arrests higher, applications still low**

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Despite immigration reform measures that impose fines on employers of illegal aliens, more aliens are being arrested in the El Paso area, officials say.

The number of people applying for amnesty under the Immigration and Reform Act continues to be less than expected.

Two groups that monitor the law's implementation say the increased number of arrests, plus the fewer-than-expected number of amnesty applications, demonstrate that the immigration reforms are not working.

Jose Rodriguez, chairman of the El Concilio de El Paso organization, said Mexicans will continue to come over illegally because the United States is where the jobs are.

"They will risk everything to work," Rodriguez said. "The bill does not address the reason people come over, and that's why it won't work."

But Al Giugni, district director for the Immigration and Naturalization Service, said illegal crossings have not gone down yet because employer sanctions are not yet being enforced.

The "education phase" of the sanctions will not be complete until June 1988, Giugni said, adding that he expects the number of illegal crossings to go down after that month because employers who hire undocumented workers will face fines and jail sentences.

The employer sanctions were intended to dry up the availability of jobs in the United States for illegal aliens and encourage them to stay home, but they're not working, said

John Garcia, district director of the League of United Latin American Citizens.

"We said all along that new immigration reform law was not going to work," he said. "We knew people were going to continue coming. Now there's proof that the law doesn't work."

Last month, Border Patrol agents caught 19,046 aliens crossing the Rio Grande in the El Paso area. In May, the number was 16,777. And 10,806 were arrested in the first half of July, according to the Border Patrol.

As of July 14, 5,856 people had been interviewed for amnesty at El Paso's center since applications were accepted beginning May 5. Immigration officials have said they expect 50,000 people to apply for amnesty in the El Paso area by the May 4 deadline.

**Prison cowboys sad about cancelled rodeo**

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — Many convicts are unhappy about the demise of this year's prison rodeo, which fell victim to mounting costs, dwindling attendance and a deteriorating stadium.

"It's the only good thing I'll remember about prison," said Raymond Clinton Smith, 29, who placed second in last year's competition at the Texas Prison Rodeo.

"It just won't be the same this October," he said. "For a lot of guys, it was something special to look forward to, like parole."

Last week, the Texas prison board voted to cancel the rodeo this year, and only a slim chance remains that it will be revived next year. A private donor must provide \$800,000 to underwrite repairs to the rodeo arena before any October 1988 rodeo takes place.

Many convicts were saddened by the news, but not necessarily surprised.

"I got a letter last year saying we may not have it because of financial problems, and we had it anyway," said Anthony Graves, 30, who participated in the last four rodeos.

Graves, serving 17 years for a Harris County auto theft, won \$300 last year. He won first place in saddle bronc riding and his team of four inmates finished first in wild horse racing. He also finished third in bull riding.

"I hated to see it happen," he said of the canceled rodeo. "I was hoping to be part of it again this year. It meant a lot to the inmates. It gave

them a chance to do something special. Many people who know me go to the rodeo just to see me ride."

The dilapidated 30-year-old red-brick arena where the convict cowboys tested their skills also was the location for scenes in the movie Urban Cowboy.

The rodeo, which began in 1931, reaped big profits and attracted large crowds in the 1970s. But both the crowds and profits have dwindled in recent years.

railroad boxcar deaths of 18 Mexican nationals, signifies that the nation's new immigration law isn't working.

The newly implemented Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 attempts to stem the flow of illegal aliens crossing the border. It seeks to accomplish this through employer sanctions, amnesty provisions for aliens who have been here continuously for the past 5 1/2 years, an agricultural workers program allowing migrant workers to enter the United States during harvest season and allocating increased resources for border patrol.

The June apprehension level of 93,790 illegal aliens was up more than 24,000 from May, but was below the June 1986 figure of 133,400 apprehensions. The June numbers followed two months of sharp decline that marked the lowest level in at least five years in border apprehensions for the spring months.

"We believe this upturn most likely resulted from information which mistakenly led people to believe that the employer sanctions law will not be enforced," Nelson said.

In addition, some growers in the Northwest have been complaining of labor shortages, which Nelson said "may have contributed to the recent upsurge (in apprehensions)."

"Indications of agricultural shortages, whether true or not, have been a certain magnet," the INS director said.

The professional dancers, teachers, a student, a caterer and word processor kicked down their old Guinness Book record of tap-dancing 5.4 miles, set in 1985.

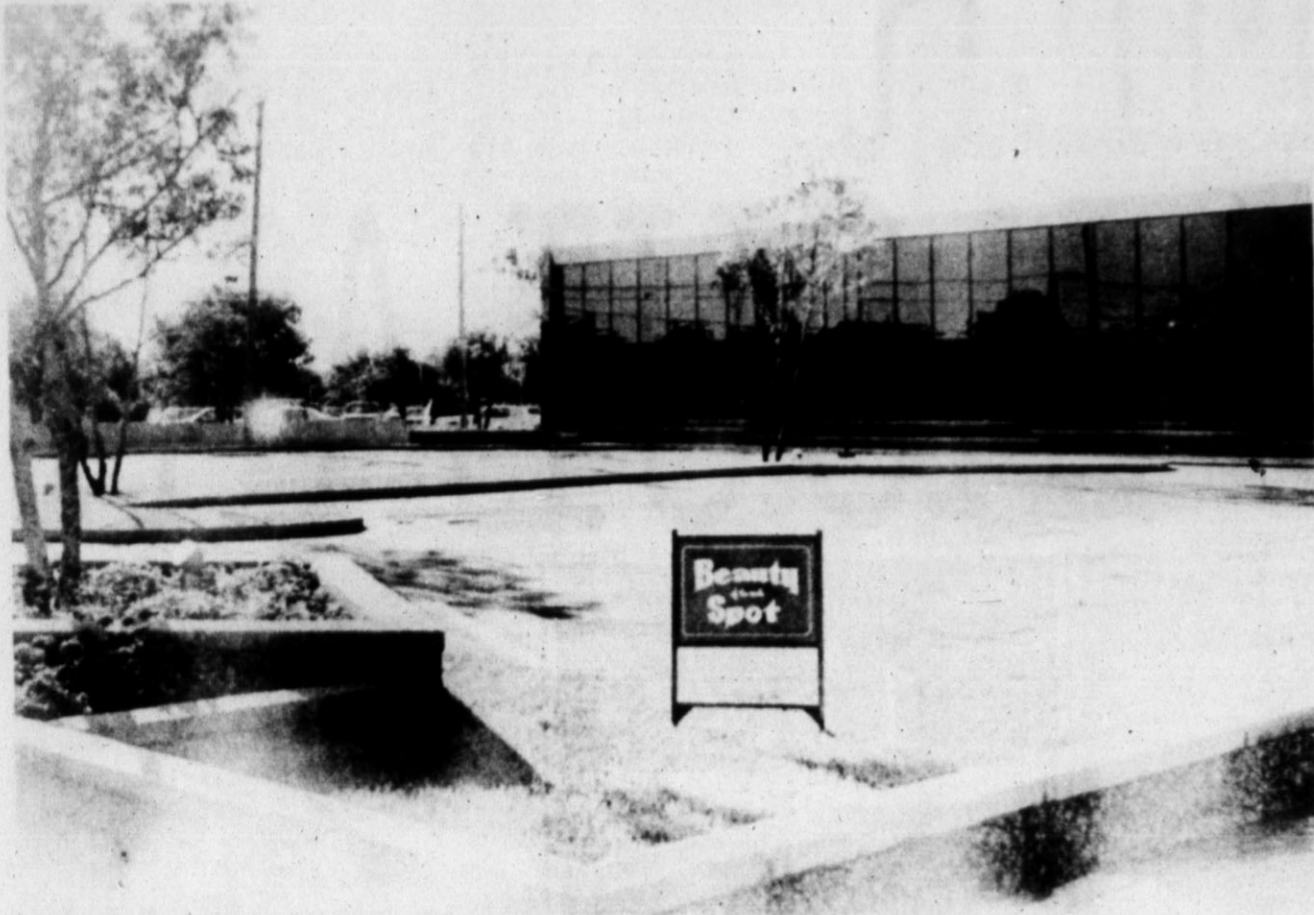
**Former resident sells business ownership**

After their second child was born, Hal stopped this shocking behavior for several months. I was able to be civil to him, but it didn't last long. He began to talk dirty and I let him know how I felt about his vile language. It burned me up that he laughed and never took me seriously.

Now the problem: Yesterday Hal phoned and asked me to run over for a few minutes to discuss plans for a surprise party for Jane. I agreed. For about five minutes he was a perfect gentleman, then he began to talk dirty. As I headed for the door he called my name. I turned around and he had exposed himself. I have never been so furious in my entire life.

Something should be done about this creep, but I don't know what. It would kill Jane if she knew what her husband has been doing. I don't want him coming to our home to pick up his kids and I am afraid to allow our kids to play over there when Jane isn't home. Please give me some advice immediately.—Frantic in Va.

**DEAR FRAN:** According to Zigmund M. Lebensohn, chief emeritus, department of psychiatry, at Sibley Memorial Hospital in Washington, D.C., exhibitionism is a sexual perversion in which the primary satisfaction is derived from exposing the genitals (usually male) to the opposite sex.

The typical exhibitionist has been unable to establish a satisfying sexual relationship with a woman. He feels a need to exhibit himself in order to assert his masculinity.

According to Dr. Lebensohn, exhibitionism is one of the least dangerous of the sexual perversions.

These men rarely commit rape or molest children. Since exhibiting oneself is against the law, the offenders are sometimes put in jail, which is counterproductive. These people need psychotherapy.

You must go to Jane, tell her about this incident and the others, and you may say I suggested joint counseling at once. Hal is sick and unless he gets help he could get in trouble with the law. Moreover, according to Dr. Lebensohn, Jane may be part of the problem.

**DEAR ANN LANDERS:** You really bombed out when you told the police officer's wife to take the bullets out of her husband's revolver and put them in the gravy boat on top of the shelf, out of the reach of the 2-year-old. (The man has a habit of leaving his revolver in the kitchen drawer every night and often forgets to remove the bullets.)

As a former police officer I can tell you that my revolver is my only protection on the job. Lord be with that man the day something happens on his beat and he forgot to take the

bullets out of the gravy boat. (Remember, his wife said he was forgetful.) A policeman without bullets in his gun may as well stand on the corner naked.—Experienced in Pa.

**DEAR EXPERIENCED:** Yup — I goofed. It seemed like a good answer when I wrote it but readers in every state, plus Bermuda, Puerto Rico, Mexico City and Tokyo, suggested that I get out the wet noodle. (Color me pink). Still, the safety of the child must be taken into account. If the officer forgets again, his wife should leave the cartridges in the revolver but put it somewhere out of the child's reach.

## Prepare for home food preservation

Many fruits and vegetables are beginning to ripen, and home canners should be getting prepared for the harvest. Preplanning before home food preservation can make the process easier and safer.

"It's a good idea to check out any questions you have before beginning any home food processing," says Marilyn Haggard, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. "County Extension agents can tell you if your preservation methods are safe, and will provide you with the latest research based processing times and procedures."

"Using the correct procedures in home food preservation is important," the specialist main-

tains. "Incorrect methods can allow bacteria growth in the food, which may cause food poisoning or lead to spoilage."

If you have any doubt about the safety of your home processed food, don't hesitate to call a county extension agent, she says.

"Food can sometimes be saved if you act quickly. Tell the agent what you think went wrong. Review the exact steps you followed when pro-

## Artery test poses risks

**DEAR DR. GOTT** — My brother, age 55, had an angiogram due to constant headaches. After the test he was told to lie flat on his back for eight to 10 hours, which he did. Why was this necessary? For three weeks after the test, his voice was garbled and he lost the hearing in one ear. Is this a normal side-effect?

**DEAR READER** — By performing an angiogram (X-ray study of arteries), your brother's doctors probably were trying to discover if a tumor or malformed blood vessel was causing his headaches. This test involves placing a tube into an artery and injecting material, called contrast medium; therefore, patients often are required to remain supine for several hours after the procedure until the contrast medium has dispersed and the puncture wound in the artery is sealed off.

Unfortunately, angiograms of the head can sometimes cause strokes or temporary neurological events that resemble strokes. These are called transient ischemic attacks, or TIAs, and are among the most common complications of brain angiography. This apparently is what happened in your brother's case. Although your brother's TIA was hardly "normal," it was a recognized side-effect of the procedure.

Of course, his garbled speech and loss of hearing may have had another cause. For instance, certain forms of migraine headache can cause symptoms that mimic TIAs.

**DEAR DR. GOTT** — Since I retired, I no longer take daily showers; no dirt, no sweat. How often do I need to bathe?

**DEAR READER** — The frequency with which one bathes is a highly individualized decision. Years ago, in rural New England, parents used to sew their children into long johns in November and take them out for a bath in May. Cleanliness was relative and took a back seat to warmth.

Our modern society has become preoccupied with cleanliness and body odor. The pendulum has swung to an extreme, in contrast to the medieval kings of France, who bathed a few times a year and relied on perfume at other times.

If you are inactive in your retirement, you probably do not need a daily shower. How often should you bathe? Ask those around you to let you know when you need a shower — or take one on Saturday night whether you need to or not!

**DEAR DR. GOTT** — To avoid costs,

I've been taking a friend's birth control pills, since she doesn't need them anymore. What's wrong with doing this?

**DEAR READER** — Oral contraceptives are prescription drugs, and it is unwise for a person to take medicine that is prescribed for someone else. This practice is risky because you may be allergic to another person's medicine or it may not be right for you.

In addition, women on birth-control pills should have Pap smears performed at periodic intervals, at least annually. By taking your friend's pills, you are depriving yourself of necessary medical supervision and followup.

Finally, oral contraceptives are far from harmless; they can cause hypertension and blood clots in certain women. While on birth-control pills, you should be evaluated for complications of this treatment.

Rather than saving money by using your friend's prescription, you should see your own gynecologist. Be frank in discussing your financial situation and I am sure that the doctor will make an adjustment in fee; he or she might even be willing to provide you with free samples of birth-control pills. Further, birth-control clinics, such as those run by Planned Parenthood, often give free or very low-cost care to patients who cannot afford private medical services.

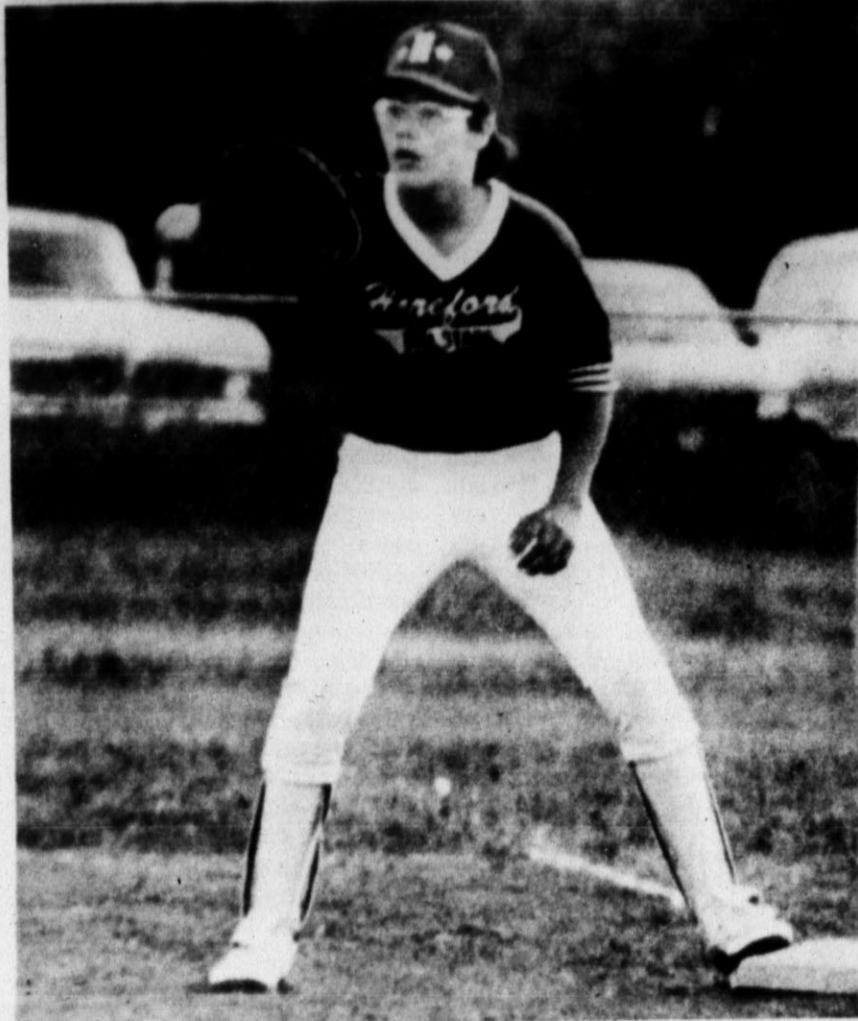

# Accent on Health

No other modern health threat has so captured the public's concern as has the spread of AIDS.

Almost daily, officials at the Texas Department of Health answer inquiries from the media and the public at large. Christie Reed, AIDS Surveillance Coordinator in the TDH Bureau of Epidemiology, answers many of those questions.

"Despite all the publicity about AIDS," Reed said, "many people still need to know the basics."

In laymen's terms, AIDS (acquired immune deficiency syndrome) is a disease caused by the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), which attacks the body's

ability to resist a wide variety of infections and cancers. The virus is found in blood and semen, and can be transmitted to others through sexual contact. Even without showing AIDS symptoms, a person who has been infected with HIV can transmit the virus to others.

The majority of infections produce no symptoms for the first year or two and in many cases much longer. And not all infected persons develop AIDS. But, in one study, 36 percent of infected persons developed AIDS after more than seven years (88 months) from the time they were infected.

"The risk of infection increases ac-

ording to the number of sexual partners one has, male or female," Reed said. "Unless it is possible to know with absolute certainty that neither sexual partner is infected, protective measures, such as condoms, should be used."

In little more than six years since it was first identified, AIDS has been reported in all parts of the world. No vaccine, or consistently effective treatment for AIDS has been found.

"A person can contract the virus through sex, or by sharing dirty drug syringes or needles. Also, an infected woman can pass the virus on to her unborn child. Although the majority of cases to date have occurred among homosexual and bisexual men, the virus can be spread through heterosexual contact," Reed explained.

Some 112 countries have reported nearly 52,000 AIDS cases to the World Health Organization in Geneva, Switzerland. Among them, the United States is the leader, reporting more than 36,000 cases—20,000 of whom already have died.

Meanwhile, medical researchers around the globe are intent on fin-

ding vaccines and treatments for AIDS. At the Third International Conference on AIDS held recently in Washington, health and medical officials from 50 countries exchanged their latest research and methods of preventing HIV transmission. Controlling AIDS also has become one of the most urgent issues for government leaders.

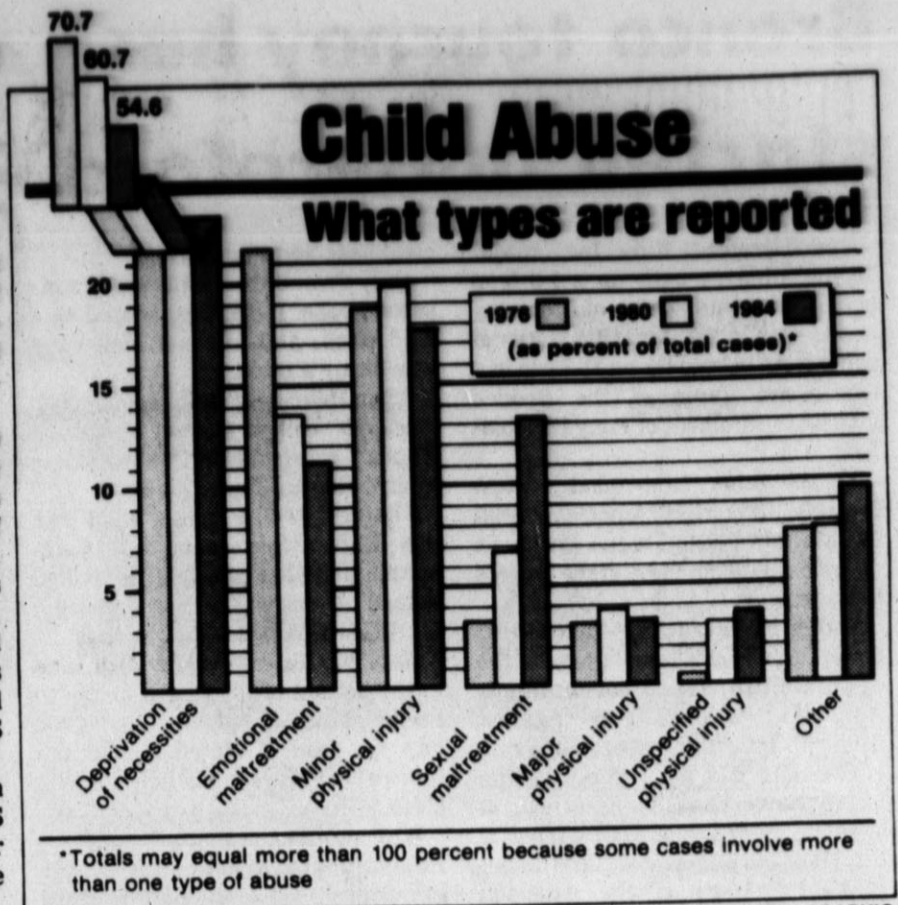
Reed said the Texas, with 2,500 cases of AIDS reported, has the fourth largest number of cases among the states. Sixty percent of those cases already have died. Presently, as many as 90,000 Texans may be infected with the virus.

Working primarily through local health departments, Reed and others at TDH monitor the number and distribution of confirmed AIDS cases.

TDH is the statewide agency with coordinates efforts to provide AIDS counseling and testing, and for educating the public to control the spread of AIDS.

Safety programs may accompany some films and are designed to increase public awareness on a variety of subjects.

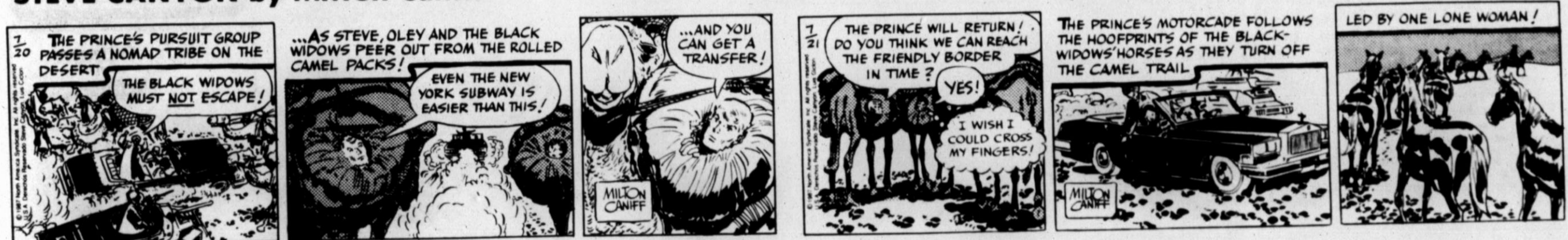

# Alcoholics, drug abusers need to have intervention

To appease his wife after his second drunk driving arrest, George reluctantly agreed to accompany her to an alcoholism treatment center for a consultation.

George figured that after letting the therapist slap his hand, he'd promise to be a good boy and be on his way.

But when George arrived at the center, he was surprised to find more than a therapist waiting for him. In addition to his wife, were his two grown sons, his boss and Bert his, long-time friend.

Those present calmly told George exactly how his drinking had affected their lives.

His sons recalled how they'd avoided bringing friends home for fear they would find him drunk. His boss detailed George's declining work performance. Bert told of how he and other friends were excluding George

from social functions because of his unpredictable behavior.

But his wife described the most painful incidents of all—the hurtful arguments, their declining sex life, her constant fear he would drink and drive once too often and kill himself.

George listened with teeth clenched, feeling he'd been ambushed about a problem that "just wasn't that bad." But after brooding for a week over what he'd heard, he decided that maybe he did need to seek help and entered the treatment program the same day.

George is only one of countless alcoholics and drug abusers for whom the downward spiral of substance abuse has been reversed through intervention.

An intervention is a way for people concerned about someone's drinking or drug problem to join together and confront that person in a loving, but

firm manner.

Usually it's a family's last desperate attempt to get the substance abuser to seek help after angry accusations and empty ultimatums have failed.

An intervention usually begins with a family member—most often a spouse—reporting to a treatment center therapist that a loved one with a problem with drugs or alcohol has resisted seeking help.

The therapist will then assist in assembling the people most affected by that person's drinking or drug use. Those experiencing their own substance abuse problems are excluded.

Each person is then carefully instructed on how to describe specific examples of how the alcoholic or drug abuser's problem has affected his or her life. Accusations or generalizations are prohibited.

For instance, instead of blaming him or her for always being late, group members should cite examples of when he or she missed an important meeting or forgot a child's birthday because of drinking or drug use.

Each group member must also be willing to clearly state what the consequences will be if the alcoholic or drug abuser won't seek help. Those repercussions could include forcing him or her to leave home or firing him or her from a job.

Substance abusers' reactions to such confrontations are usually mixed.

Some admit they're having problems and agree to enter treatment immediately.

Others, like George, are extremely angry. But even when someone initially refuses to seek help, many will enter treatment within a short time,

particularly if the family has adhered to its ultimatums.

But even if the substance abuser refuses treatment, an intervention is never a failure.

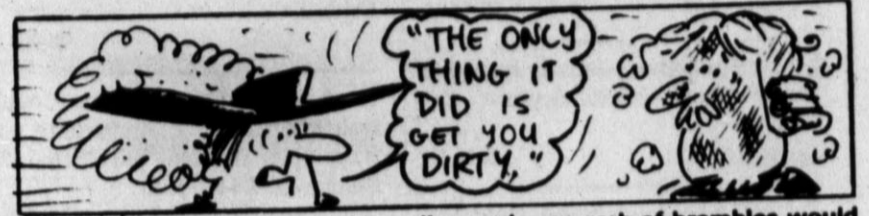
Family members who may have been too afraid to speak up can take comfort in the fact they did everything they could for the alcoholic or drug abuser. They then can begin rebuilding their own lives with the aid of support groups such as Al-Anon.

While some people are reluctant to

confront an alcoholic or drug abuser through an intervention, it's important for them to consider whether they'd allow that person to suffer from another life-threatening illness such as cancer.

Intervention then is a vital step anyone close to the alcoholic or drug abuser should consider because without help, that person will never get better.

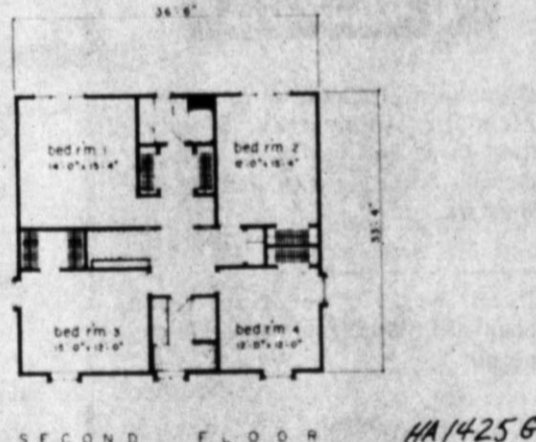
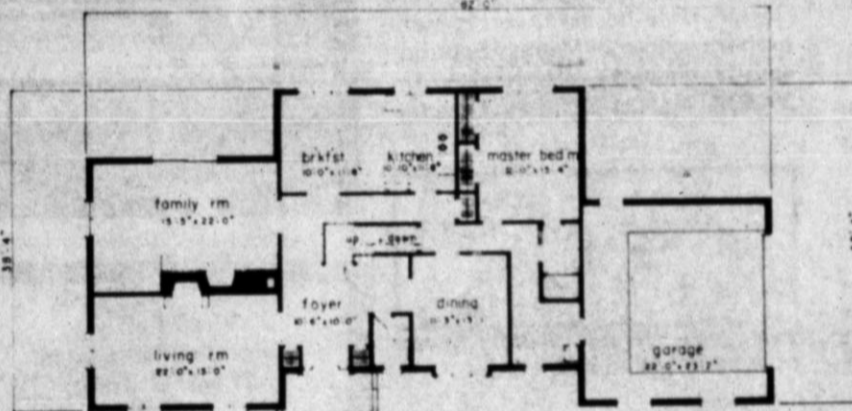
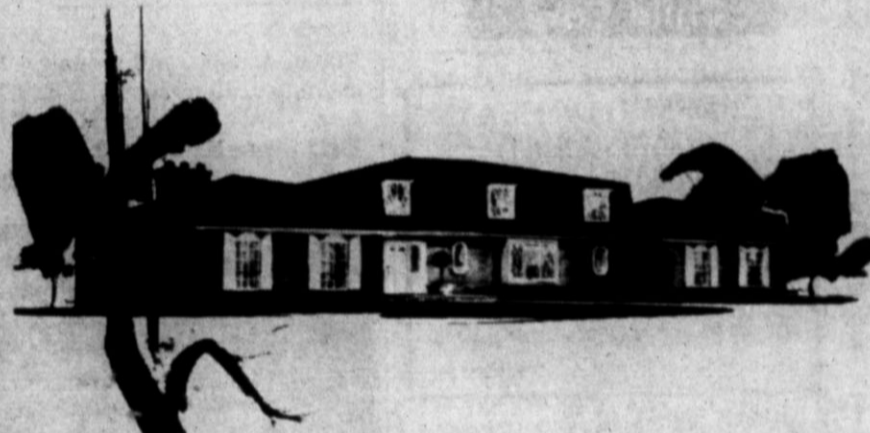
