Holly still seeking sale

Holly Sugar Corporation announced Friday that it had increased the size of its board of directors and appointed two new directors-Walter S. Grossman and S. Edward Moore.

Gorssman and Moore are principals in Brookehill Equities, Inc., and Moore, Grossman & deRose, companies which beneficially own approximately 12 percent of the outstanding common stock of Holly. The two new directors were appointed as a result of recent discussions between Brookehill and some members of the Board which occurred subsequent to last week's termination by the Board of the approval of the agreement relating to the acquisition of Holly by Arcanum 1 Partners.

Holly intends to pursue vigorously a transaction which will seek to maximize shareholder value, either

through a sale of Holly, a leveraged buy-out, or a recapitalization or similar transaction, although the Board currently has no proposal before it relating to such a transac-

Charles Azarow, president and Chief Executive Officer of Holly, said, "We welcome the Brookehill representatives to our Board. We believe that they will make a substantial contribution in our ongoing attempt to actively explore the most likely means to maximize the value of shareholders' investment, as well as providing valuable input in the management of Holly's business." However, Mr. Azarow noted that "there can be no assurances that an acquisition or other transaction will be consummated or, if a transaction is consum-

In Hereford murder trial

Jury deciding Carbajal's fate

A seven-man, five-woman jury began deliberations at 11:10 a.m. today in the murder trial of Florentino Carbajal in 222nd District Court in Hereford.

Carbajal is charged with murder in the Dec. 29, 1986 shooting death of his wife, Marina, at a Hereford trailer court.

Testimony in the trial began last Wednesday and ended late Monday evening after Carbajal was questioned throughout the day by District Attorney Roland Saul and defense attorney Jerry Smith.

The attorneys made their closing arguments this morning.

In his charge to the jury, District Judge Wes Gulley instructed the jury they could find Carbajal guilty of murder; involuntary manslaughter if the jury determined Carbajal acted in a fit of passion; innocent by reason of insanity; or innocent.

Carbajal testified that his wife and her mother, Soyla Tamez, practiced witchcraft and that he had witnessed various acts of "worship" which involved the burning of black candles and sacrificial burning of chickens after their blood had been drunk.

He said that he meet Marina when she was 10 years old and that at that time she was still drinking milk from a baby bottle. He told jurors that he was 13 at the time, and when they were 12 and 15 years of age, respectively, they were living together.

Carbajal testified that Marina had a hot temper and they fought often about her involvment with another man. He also said that Marina often threw pots and pans at him and that she once told him that her mother had cast a spell on the couple to cause them to fight and break up the

"Marina told me that not only could her mother do witchcraft but she could do it to and that she could fight witch against witch to break her mother's spell," he said.

Carbajal said that he continued livtion to the practice of witchcraft seen the bones of bodies buried there. because he loved her. He said that the .38-caliber handgun, determined to be the murder weapon, was an early Christmas gift to him from his

Carbajal's 15-year-old sister, Esmeralda, testified that she was present when Marina gave the gun to Florentino. "She (Marina) said it was something to save the marriage and if he ever got mad at her just to let her have it,"she said.

The teenager also said that Marina had told her about witchcraft. "She told me her mom practiced witchcraft but I didn't believe it," she

Prior to Esmeralda's testimony, Carbajal told jurors that he got mad when his wife gave him the gun, and she told him "it was going to be the destruction of our love.'

Detective Mike Ahrens of the Hereford Police Department testified that Carbajal told him that the gun had come from a burglary involving himself, Marina and her brother Alex Tamez. Carbajal responded that he doesn't remember the conversation with Ahrens and that Marina and her brother "used to steal a lot."

About his 1985 conviction for theft of a microwave oven and a television from a local business, Carbajal said Marina and a friend had actually committed the thefts but he told officers he had done it to protect his wife. "I'd rather take the rap for her

because I loved her," he said.

Carbajal was also indicted in 1985 for aggravated assault. Officers testified that Marina had reported she had been violently raped, gagged, tied and concealed under the floor boards of Carbajal's home and ing with Marina in spite of his opposi- that while under the home she had

A subsequent investigation revealed that the bones were not human bones and the charges were reduced to those of aggravated assault, a felony, and sentencing was reduced to a Class A misdemeanor.

Carbaial testified that he had only struck Marina once, in self-defense, and that they were separated at the time and she had arrived at his home already beaten.

Soyla Tamez took the stand in the afternoon and testified that she had never engaged in nor does she believe in witchcraft. She also testified that she came to Hereford on numerous occasions to pick up Marina when Carbajal had beaten her, although she had only witnessed one beating.

"He was dragging her by the hair, she was holding the wall and he was pulling her. She was screaming real bad," Tamez said, "Three or four times a year I would come get her for a few days and he would come get her back. The last time I came to get her was at the hospital in Amarillo, she was real sick. She had overdosed and she told me he put the pills in her mouth and made her take them. The doctor called me and asked me to come take care of her."

Carbajal testified that Marina had taken the pills on her own following his discovery of an affair she was having. He said that Marina told him her mother had cast a spell to make her do things to break up the rela-

He also denied beating her. "She used the excuse of me beating her up so she could leave with her parents.'

Though he testified to details of events surrounding the days prior to the December 29 shooting, Carbajal denies he has any memory of the actual event.

At one point during crossexamination by District Attorney Roland Saul, Carbajal said, "You're trying to say that I killed her.

"I'm telling the jury that I don't remember what happened." Later, he testified, "I couldn't admit that I did it because I loved her too much."

Carbajal was charged in aiding his son's New Year's Day escape from Hereford. Victor Carbajal had been charged with picking up his son near Big Daddy's Truck Stop in Hereford at about 8 p.m. New Year's Day and driving him south out of Hereford.

Hereford native top Navy pilot

He comes speeding out of the

sky, a mile high and a mile away, with 35 tons of flying machine making more than 200 mph.

"Cowboy" gets final clearance to put his \$45 million F-14 fighter jet down on a pitching, hurling flight deck, which is bobbing like a cork in the middle of the ocean.

He watches the ship go up and down, times things just right, and slows his F-14 Tomcat from 165 mph to zero in less than two seconds on top of a ship in the middle of nowhere.

Sometimes, he does it in the dark.

He's never had an accident, never failed to grab onto the cable that prevents him from plummeting into the ocean.

He's a Top Gun-Hereford's Top Gun, Lt. Cmdr. Tom Koelzer of the U.S. Navy.

"We're not paid enough to land those planes at night," Koelzer told his graduating class, Hereford High School's Class of 1972, at their 15-year reunion Saturday at the HHS cafeteria.

"In the daytime though, it's the best ride at Disneyland."

"Cowboy" was popular Saturday, autographing copies of the "Top Gun" videocassette and movie soundtrack.

Koelzer worked his way up the Navy ranks, entering as an ensign and graduating from ground school in Pensacola, Fla., in 1978, flying a T-28 prop plane in Corpus Christi and graduating from flight school in Kingsville, where he learned to fly jets, on March

"That's when I received my wings and reached my first and hardest goal," Koelzer said. "My father was there and he pinned his original wings on me-the ones he got in 1943."

Koelzer then went to San Diego, where he first flew an F-24 off a flight deck as the ship cruised to Hawaii, the Philippines, the Indian Ocean-and through the Persian Gulf, during the original Iran hostage crisis of 1980.

"We were out there on the ship and we really didn't know what was going on in Iran," Koelzer said. "We'd find out more in Newsweek and letters from home than we would from the Navy."

After eight months at sea,

"We would cram in the morning and fly in the afternoon, and the rest of the time we would work with our squadron.

"It was not all flying and having a good time. There is a lot of Hollywood in Top Gun-they dreamed up some of the manuevers."

They didn't dream up all of the manuevers, though. In the summer of 1982, everybody was trying to see who could get "Rabbit," the school's executive

"Rabbit was a California dude," Koelzer said, "and when he wasn't busy he would always have a surfboard over his shoulder. We all wanted Rabbit, and one day he had to put his A4 down over by Yuma, Arizona, and had to jump. I thought they were using real bullets, and Jungle was excited-'I got Rabbit! I got Rab-

After Top Gun School, Koelzer then boarded the Ranger for what he thought was going to be another tour through the Pacific. Instead, the ship went south from San Diego and anchored off the coast of Nicaragua.

"We spent six weeks there and didn't know the reason why," Koelzer said. "We found out why a few weeks ago, because Lt. Col. Oliver North was running the show. We were watching the

hearings and he was talking about sending the Ranger down there, and I said, 'That was me!'

"We had dignitaries from various Central American countries visit us, and we'd fly and shoot missiles and bullets into the water. One day we had a general from Guatemala visit us, and the next day the president of Guatemala was supposed to visit "We sat in our jets-100 degrees

and 100 percent humidity-for six hours waiting for him, and they finally got a call saying the exercise had been cancelled. "They said there had been an

abrupt change of command, and the general had taken over the country."

After another eight-month tour, Koelzer entered Empire Test Pilot School, where he studied intensely for a year, and got married so his girl friend, Gay, could get her pots and pans and other belongings from the school's post

"Empire teaches a pilot to fly objectively, because we have a tendency to compensate for deficiencies in our equipment, whether it's a car or a fighter," Koelzer said. "Our job was to find out if the deficiency was in the plane or the pilot.

Girl survives plane crash

ROMULUS, Mich. (AP) - A 4-year-old girl emerged as the miraculous survivor of the nation's second-deadliest air disaster, and reports surfaced of repeated engine malfunctions in the Northwest Airlines jetliner that crashed, killing up to 162.

Cecilia Cichan, who was listed in critical condition today with thirddegree burns over 29 percent of her body, was identified as a passenger on Flight 255 by her grandfather, who recognized her chipped tooth and purple nail polish, officials said.

John Lauber, of the National Transportation Safety Board, said 152 aboard the plane died. Northwest spokesman Kevin Whalen said 155 people might have been aboard, and

at least 154 people died. "The infant count is going up," he said. Infants generally are not ticketed on commercial airline flights if they are carried by adults.

Wayne County officials reported that two people died on the ground. Late Monday, County Medical Examiner Werner Spitz said five or six bodies were pulled from three vehicles destroyed when the plane smashed into them or showered them with blazing fuel and debris.

State begins **S&L** investigation

HOUSTON (AP) - Federal authorities in Houston are investigating allegations that some savings and loan officers received kickbacks and bribes from developers in order to get laons for risky and often unsound real estate projects, a federal prosecutor says.

Assistant U.S. Attorney John P. Smith said Monday that developers in Houston and other Texas cities routinely paid bribes and cash kickbacks to the thrift officers during the early 1980s.

The allegations are being investigated by the FBI and the U.S. attorney's office, Smith said.

Since 1984, it has been a felony for a bank officer to accept gifts worth more than \$100 in exchange for loans,

The new statute, along with an expanded bank fraud law enacted in late 1984, will likely be the basis for indictments that may result from the Houston probe, he said.

Since most of the real estate deals financed in this way were economically unsound, many of the projects later became foreclosures and added to Houston's glutted

As the loans went bad, some Texas thrifts were crushed under the strain and were closed by federal regulators. Others remain open, but are financially insolvent.

The going rate for kickbacks to thrift officers willing to complete the illegal deals was about 10 percent of the loan amount, three industry sources who requested anonymity told the Houston Chronicle.

Beiruthostage Glass escapes from captors

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) -American journalist Charles Glass fled to freedom today after two months as a hostage by sneaking from a Beirut building while his captors slept, officials said. He was later turned over to a U.S. diplomat in

Foreign Minister Farouk al-Sharaa handed Glass over to American Charge d'Affaires David Ransom, the senior U.S diplomat in the Syrian capital.

Glass appeared to be in good shape but looked tired.

He said he wanted to fly to London, his home, "as soon as possible to meet with my family and folks."

Glass was spirited out of Moslem west Beirut under the protection of Syrian troops, who police several areas in Lebanon. Before Glass was driven to Damascus, a Beirut doctor examined him and pronounced him

The bearded Glass, wearing a blue track suit and no shoes, walked into the seaside Summerland Hotel in west Beirut at 2:30 a.m. Tuesday (7:30 p.m. EDT Monday), and told the hotel receptionist, "I am Charlie Glass. I need a place to hide," said a Lebanese police spokesman.

The police spokesman said today that Glass told the receptionist that he escaped through the window of a 10th-floor room where he was being

"My captors were asleep. I slipped through the window and climbed down the staircase to freedom," the spokesman quoted Glass as telling the receptionist.

In California, the journalist's father called his son's escape 'wonderful news."

"I love every minute of it," Charles Glass Jr. told The Associated Press.

Roone Arledge, president of ABC News, called Glass' freedom "a matter of immense joy and relief to the people at ABC News."

Last month, Glass' captors issued a videotape in which the journalist read a statement saying he was a CIA agent. U.S. officials said the statement was false and Glass had apparently been forced to read it.

Glass earned prominence for his coverage of the June 1985 hijacking of a TWA jet to Beirut, during which 39 Americans were held hostage for 17 days and a U.S. Navy diver was killed.

Glass had been researching a book on the Middle East when he was seized. Glass' escape leaves 24 foreigners missing and believed kidnapped in Lebanon since March 1985. Among them are eight Americans.

The longest-held hostage is Terry Anderson, chief Middle East correspondent for The Associated Press, who was seized on March 16,

Heat alert hits Dallas, North Texas high for the next several days,

DALLAS (AP) - An excessive heat alert was issued through today as temperatures over 100 degrees combined with humidity resulted in conditions pinpointed as factors in at least two deaths.

Highs above the century mark and humidity ranging from 35 to 45 percent made it feel like 115 degrees across much of North Texas Monday, the National Weather Service said.

"What we base it (the heat index) on is a combination of the actual temperature and the humidity," said Ed Delgado of the weather service's Fort Worth office. "The heat index factor is what it actually feels like out there."

The Dallas County medical examiner' office ruled Monday that the Saturday deaths of two men, ages 82 and 43, primarily resulted from hyperthermia, or elevated body temperature.

William Hicks, 82, was found dead in his bed in South Dallas. He was in a back bedroom with all the doors and windows shut and a box fan on the dresser blowing air that police estimated was heated at more than 100 degrees.

The medical examiner ruled that heart disease contributed to Hicks'

death. Warren Ray Harris, 43, also apparently died in his sleep, authorities id. One fan was blowing, and police said the temperature in the room was about 100. Contributing to his death was diabetes and myotonic dystrophy, a degenerative muscle disorder, the medical examiner rul-

Although a weak front spawned some thunderstorms along the Red River, cooling temperatures near Wichita Falls Monday evening, those storms drifted to the east and were not expected to bring relief to the rest of the state.



Baryshnikov dances, delights audience By GAYE B. REILY

What does the Texas Panhandle have that Burmingham, Ala., Tallahassese and Pensicola, Fla., New Orleans, La., and Dallas don't? Recent live memories of Mikhail Baryshnikov, the world renown ballet dancer.

Breathless anticipation swept this area when it was announced in early May that the Russian-born star would make an appearance in the Amarillo Civic Center auditorium on Aug. 15, courtesy of that city's Lone Star Ballet.

Season ticketholders of the organization had first call on tickets for the event; as a result, by the time sales went public in early June, tickets sold out the first day. Ticket prices ranged from \$25 to \$125; this reporter couldn't even wrangle a press pass, so appearing on a waiting list provided a farfetched hope of seeing the famed dancer.

Two weeks prior to the performance, the call came; this writer could attend this historic event! The excitement lasted only a few days, however, as nationwide news told of an ankle injury plaguing the star, who was forced to cancel performances in the aforementioned cities. Gloom descended upon the Panhandle; the dancer's doctor predicted that ankle might be well by Aug. 12. Elsewhere, ticket money was being refunded to disappointed patrons.

Yet last Saturday night arrived and the versatile dancer performed before a sold-out Amarillo audience estimated at 2,500-2,600 people, including this writer. Men dressed in everything from blue jeans and T-shirts to tuxedoes and ruffled shirts accompanied women dressed in cool, cotton seersucker frocks to backless, strapless designer originals at the event.

Thunderous applause greeted Baryshnikov as he joined 10 accompanying ballerinas on stage during act one's suite of dances from the full-length ballet, "Don Quixote." Choreographed by the multi-talented dancer, the spirited number was set before a backdrop featuring a Spanish bullfight.

The pace changed dramatically as the second act, entitled "Apollo," featured a dreamlike dance sequence with the star and three ballerinas performing against a night sky full of stars. Two 20-minute intermissions provided fans the chance to discuss the danseur's techniques.

The final act, "Who Cares?" utilized the music of George Gershwin. In modern dress before a big city skyline, the tour group obviously enjoyed their ballet routine bordering on modern dance as they danced with wild abandon to a standing ova-

The main thought that occurred to this writer when the Russian defector first appeared was "phenomenal!" Such an observation via binoculars was maintained throughout the two-and-a-half hour event, although the performer's advancing age was, at times, evident. Yet the recent ankle problem did not seem to trouble the star as he performed complex, technical ballet steps with the greatest of grace and

According to Kay Kennedy, board president of Lone Star Ballet, Baryshnikov was quite reserved,

very gracious and courteous. He was very protected by a large entourage. He graciously accepted an honorary commemorating beltbuckle Amarillo's upcoming centennial celebration, a gift which has only been presented to President Reagan. Governor Clements and two other recipients."

Amarillo was the only stop the veteran dancer made in Texas during his 1987 summer tour. Whether the event was attended by ballet enthusiasts or Baryshnikov groupies is unclear; yet for whatever reason, it was an event many Texans will always hold dear, as they know they witnessed one of the world's most famous ballet performers.



Anton Urbanczyk was three years of age when he came to America from upper Silesia, Poland with his parents and 100 other families in 1854. They reached Galveston on Dec. 3, a 9-week voyage. Those who were physically able, went by boat to Indianola further down the Texas coast and walked 200 miles along the oxcar road toward San Antonio. They were met by Father Leopold Moczygemba.

He led them to a spot 50 miles southeast of San Antonio, arriving there on Christmas Eve, when they had a midnight Miss of Thanksgiving. Only Father Leopold could speak the English language. He was working among German colonists in 1852 when he persuaded relatives and friends to come to Texas to escape the Prussian rule and find a place where they could worship and educate their children as they pleas-

Being fluent in several languages he was much in demand to help all nmigrants who came to Texas and he stayed only a short time with the immigrants. Because their language, customs and culture were strange to the other people living in the area, communication was virtually impossible but the colonists helped each other and survived the many hardships.

Anton Urbanczyk moved his family to Rhineland in 1905. But the three brothers and their sister Adela moved furthe rnorth; John in 1910, Ben and Felix in 1911, and Adela in 1921. Felix moved his family to Hereford

The new environment was reminicent of early times in Panna Maria. They too slept in hastily built housesoftentimes two families to a building. They slept on feed sacks spread on the floor and endured Panhandle blizzards as best they could, burning cowships for fuel since there was no wood. But the settlers helped each other just as the first colonists did in Panna Maria and today are an asset to the White Deer community and

surrounding area.

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


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

HOUSTON (AP) - Billy Hatcher and the scuffed ball controversy heated up as the Houston Astros completed a four-game sweep of the Atlanta Braves, a sweep that Braves manager Chuck Tanner says may have ended any playoff hopes the Braves had.

Hatcher, the Astros left fielder, had four hits, including his 10th homer of the year and scored three runs Monday night to lead the Astros an 11-2 victory over the Braves.

"They sure pounded our heads in," Tanner said after the Astros outscored the Braves 33-8 in the fourgame series. "This probably knocked us out of it."

The scuffed ball controversy began when both benches cleared after Rick Mahler, pitching in a rare relief role, hit batters Kevin Bass and Glenn Davis to lead off the Astros'

The pitch to Davis was a fast ball up and in that hit him in the neck.

"I was not throwing at him," said Mahler. "I'd never try to hit anyone in the head. The pitch just got away because it was one of the scuffed balls (Astros pitcher Mike) Scott had used the inning before."

In the top of the sixth, the Braves asked home plate umpire Bob Davidson to check Astros starting pitcher Scott's baseball.

"It was definitely the same ball Scott had used," echoed Braves catcher Ozzie Virgil. "It was scuffed."

Tanner added, "I think he was scuffing it, at least early on, but he's an excellent pitcher and he had to do what he had to to win."

Scott, who defeated the Braves for only the third time in 13 previous decisions ran his record to 13-9 with a six-hit, 10-strikeout performance over 8 innings. He had last defeated the Braves on April 29, 1984.



DEAR DR. GOTT — Fourteen months ago I was in a motorcycle accident. I fractured my arm (which was pinned with a 6-inch screw) and developed osteomyelitis. The fracture appears to be healing, but I was told that this was impossible because of the myelitis. What is the truth, and what is the outlook for keeping my arm? How should I monitor it?

DEAR READER - Osteomyelitis (bone infection) is a troublesome complication of surgery to repair fractures. In most cases, the infection is introduced either during the injury or during the operation. A foreign body (such as a pin, a screw or an artificial joint) can act as a reservoir of bacterial contamination, because the synthetic material has no way of cleaning itself once it is in the body.

Ordinarily, an infected screw would have to be removed in order for the infection to be eradicated; bone healing may be delayed until the in-fection has been cleared up with antibiotics. However, in your case, the osteomyelitis appears to have been controlled, allowing the fracture to

Infection hampers repair of fracture

Your orthopedic surgeon can best monitor your progress. To do'this, he or she will require serial X-ray ex-aminations to document the formation of new bone at the site of the inju-ry. In addition, the surgeon probably will base much of his or her judgment on whether your arm is gaining strength and whether you are free of

Sometimes doctors use special blood tests, such as white blood cell counts, to assess whether osteomyelitis is persistent.

DEAR DR. GOTT - Could my acne rosacea be caused by the three cups of coffee and two large diet colas I drink

daily?
DEAR READER — Rosacea is a chronic form of acne in adults that causes dilation of blood vessels in the skin of the cheeks, forehead and - especially - the nose. It is not related to the consumption of coffee and cola drinks, except in the rare person who may be allergic to substances in these

Severe rosacea on the nose causes a peculiar and disfiguring redness and

overgrowth of tissue called rhino-phyma — the W.C. Fields type of puffy, bulbous nose. Some heavy drinkers seem to be predisposed to this unfortunate skin condition. Acne acea can be treated with antibiot-

rosacea can be treated with antibiotics; for rhinophyma, plastic surgery may be necessary.

Windows must be replaced

By Polly Fishe

DEAR POLLY - My hu orks in a little "gate house" such a film on them that it is hard to see out. We've tried all the cleaners we can find, including one made especially for Plexiglas, but nothing seems to help. Have you any suggestions?

DEAR MRS. J.C.W. - I'm afraid those windows need to be replaced if those inside want to have a clear view of the outside world! If the plastic can't be cleaned by washing with a mild detergent solution or special plastic cleaner, the windows are probably scratched. Many tiny scratches over the entire surface of the window leak like a film on here. (This is similar to the control of the window) look like a film or haze. (This is similar to glassware that is "etched" by chemicals and harsh detergents.) According to my sources, the scratches can't be cleaned away. - POLLY

DEAR POLLY — For the past 50 years of sewing, I have found my way of fabric marking very easy. To transfer pattern markings to fabric, I take a small stitch wherever a mark needs to be made. I don't knot the thread, but take a stitch, then clip the thread leaving an inch or so of thread on either end. A series of these can mark a dart or tuck line, while single stitches mark dots, centerlines, etc. The thread can be quickly pulled out when the mark is no longer needed. Everything is clearmarked and there are never any lasting markings on the fabric. -

DEAR ADELE — Although at first glance your method looks like more work than other fabric marking methods, I found that it is really very quick and easy. The little thread "tacks" take only a moment to do and they pull out leaving absolutely no marks. I POLLY really like this method.

DEAR POLLY — I have a recipe for coconut cream frosting that calls for one cup of toasted coconut. Do you have a recipe for toasting coconut? I looked through all my cookbooks and couldn't find anything. — MABEL — Nothing could be together coconut. Just


simpler than toasting coconut. Just spread the coconut in a thin layer in a shallow pan, then toast it in a 325-degree oven until golden brown. This can take from 10 to 20 minutes, depending on how dry the coconut is to start with but keep a close eye on it at all times. Stir the coconut every few minutes so it browns evenly. Remove the coconut as soon as it is golden, as it will darken

quickly once it starts to change color.

Toasted coconut adds a delightful new flavor when added to custards, new moon (Aug. 24). used as a cake or pie topping, or sprin-kled on frosted cookies. It's easy to make and fun to experiment with. -
