Suspect flees after shooting

A 21-year-old suspect remained at large Tuesday following the shooting of a 16-year-old in a Sunday night incident at Hereford's Quality Motel.

A warrant for aggravated assault with a deadly weapon has been issued for Felix Salas Rodriguez. Rodriguez is accused of shooting a 16-year-old male juvenile in the right lower groin following an altercation at the motel on East U.S. 60.

The victim was taken by private vehicle to Deaf Smith General Hospital where he received treatment for a wound from what appeared to be a .22 caliber pistol. Hospital authorities said the bullet

lodged in the victim's pelvic bone and would not be removed.

In other police activity over the weekend, seven persons were arrested.

A juvenile was arrested for cultivation of marijuana. A 64-year-old male was arrested for public intoxication and a 22-year-old female was arrested on traffic warrants from Terry County. Two other subjects were arrested for DWI, one for trespassing and one for no insurance and driving while license was suspended.

Assaults were reported in the 700 block of East Third, the 600 block of West Third, the 300 block of West

Close Call

Hereford man drowns in Dimmitt

A 59-year-old Hereford man drowned Sunday when he fell into a playa lake near Dimmitt.

Silvestre Trevino, 59, was attempting to catch fish by hand about two miles southeast of Dimmitt near the Goodpasture fertilizer plant along State Highway 194.

According to Castro County Sheriff's Office reports, the man dove into the lake, a deep holding

pond for the fertilizer plant. He came to the surface once, then sank again.

He was pulled from the lake and members of the Dimmitt volunteer Fire Dept. attempted to revive the man using cardio-pulmonary resuscitation, but rescue attempts were futile. Trevino was pronounced dead at 5:45 p.m. by Castro County Justice of the Peace Marshall Young.

p.m. Wednesday in Rose Chapel of Gilliland-Watson Funeral Home.

Mass will be at 10 a.m. Thursday in La Iglesia de San Jose with Rev. Joe Bixenman, pastor, officiating. Burial will follow in St. Anthony's Cemetery.

He was born in Skidmore and moved to Hereford earlier this year from San Antonio. He married Teresa Gonzales on April 8, 1951 in Lov-

ington, N.M. He was a farm laborer and a Catholic.

Survivors include his wife; his stepmother, Rita Trevino of San Antonio; three sons, Raymond, Silvestre Jr., and Ricardo, all of Hereford; four daughters, Laura Vasquez of Fort Morgan, Colo., and Guadalupe Galvan, Katie Barba and Mary Lee Trevino, all of Hereford; a brother, Ricardo of Lubbock; and 26 grandchildren.

Hundreds pack FDIC Valley auction

WESLACO, Texas (AP) - Hundreds of people packed the high school gymnasium for the first half of a two-night "back to the community" auction where millions of dollars worth of Rio Grande Valley real estate is up for sale by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

Properties on the block in the economically bruised area of the state included agricultural land, various subdivisions and a truck dealership.

The Weslaco High School Gymnasium's scoreboard looming behind auctioneer Asa Marshall III Monday night bore a commercial reminiscent of better times with its message: "Compliments of the First National Bank of Weslaco."

Most of the real estate up for auction consists of assets from that bank, which failed last year.

The FDIC's Houston office hired the Macon, Ga., firm, Hudson and Marshall Inc., to conduct the transactions.

"They're out of Houston, and it's going to be hard for them to manage the properties, so they decided to put them up for auction," said Asa Marshall IV, son of Monday night's rapid-talking master of ceremonies.

The auction had a road-show atmosphere, with one member of the auction team using a synthesizer to play music that punctuated bidding and filled in lulls between property sales. The properties include real estate from South Padre Island to

Mission.

Commercial and agricultural properties and some vacant residential lots were sold Monday night, with other residential real estate to be auctioned off tonight.

"On the second night, we're offering almost two complete subdivisions," the younger Marshall said.

A screen displayed pictures of the properties as they were auctioned. Among the most valuable properties selling Monday night was Carl's GMC Services truck dealership in Alamo, which went for \$161,000.

Many real estate people appeared to be there just to get an idea what property in the area would bring.

No minimum bids were set, but the FDIC has reserved the right to reject final bids.

"If they reject your bid, they'll come back" and try to reach a compromise, the younger Marshall said. "They're real interested in selling,

and they made it clear to us they'll try to strike a deal with you," Marshall said.

The Rio Grande Valley has suffered multiple hardships in recent years from Mexico's economic troubles, Texas' oil and real estate slumps, and a rare 1983 freeze that crippled the multimillion-dollar citrus industry that is slowly coming back.

Still, the more than 600 people showing up for the auction the first night demonstrated that plenty expect land value to rise.

Not all of the property was popular, though. Lots in one subdivided area kept failing to bring a price the auctioneer considered respectable.

"This must be a real good subdivision, boys," the elder Marshall commented during bidding. "Every time I try to get them to bid, they laugh at me."

Family asks governor's help

AUSTIN (AP) - The governor's office has taken under advisement a request from a distraught father who asked for help in finding his son who was washed away two weeks ago by the rampaging Guadalupe River, an aide to Gov. Bill Clements said.

John Bankston Sr. visited the Capitol Monday to request that heavy equipment be sent to the search scene, where volunteers are continuing where officials have left off, said Jay Rosser, deputy press secretary to Gov. Bill Clements.

Bankston said he wanted somebody to "walk over the river and see the brush piles and turn around and tell me in the face that they've done all they can do."

"I want somebody to tell me that," he said. "And until then, you know, I won't be satisfied."

"Everything that he requested is under advisement," Rosser said.

Bankston and a handful of volunteers have combed the banks of the Guadalupe looking for John Bankston Jr., missing since July 17 when floodwaters swept away a busload of Dallas-area church campers returning from the Pot O'

Gold camp in Comfort.

The 17-year-old was last seen helping others to safety during the river's worst flooding in 55 years. He was one of 43 people aboard two vehicles from the Seagoville Road Baptist Church in Balch Springs. The bodies of nine other teen-agers were recovered from the river and 33 people were rescued.

Bankston, 37, of Dallas, said finding out his son's fate is essential for his family's peace of mind.

"We had a memorial service for him, and his body wasn't there," he said. "He's down there somewhere. It's hard going on each day not knowing where your son is."

A search by the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Texas National Guard was called off July 25 by Kendall County Judge Garland Perry, who said officials had done all they could.

But the Bankstons - who have two other children, a 10-year-old son and a 19-year-old daughter - refuse to give up. They search the area from morning until nightfall, helped by volunteers from Dallas and the Comfort area.

Babbling Brooks

I experienced a first Sunday morning: Judging the first-ever "Biscuit Bake-Off" at McDonald's.

At first, I had reservations about getting up at 7 a.m. on Sunday to judge a batch of biscuits, but new McDonald's manager Jim Scott knew just what it would take to get me there: a free breakfast.

Jim explained that the local Golden Arches serves from 300 to 600 biscuits each morning, and they fix them up just like they show on the television commercial.

Jim wouldn't divulge the recipe, but said each batch uses 42 ounces, or just over five cups, of buttermilk.

While we were waiting on the biscuits, Jim, who has been in the fast-food business for a while, told about the whims of biscuit baking.

Jim used to manage the McDonald's in Canyon, and he hired an older woman to be his biscuit baker.

"She started out with fine biscuits," Jim said, "but every day they would get a little flatter and a little flatter. We can't have flat biscuits, because there has to be room for things like sausage and eggs, and the public wants a fluffy biscuit."

"I confronted her one day, and she said, 'Listen, sonny, I have been baking biscuits for 42 years, and no one and no book is going to teach me how to bake biscuits.'"

"It turned out she was using 52 ounces of buttermilk (over six cups) instead of 42. She didn't bake biscuits for very long."

Jim was vindicated by the biscuit bake-off, the five of us who judged sampled eight different batches of biscuits, and the first- and second-place winners followed the recipe from the McDonald's manual—probably called Ronald's Recipes or Kroc's Kookbook or something—to claim victory.

That's because those two guys had, between themselves, baked three

batches of biscuits in their lives. The others, with preconceived notions of how to fix biscuits, had a little less buttery taste. One had way too much baking powder in the mix. Some weren't as fluffy, one was best suited for pancakes.

Judging a biscuit bake-off calls for some originality, some off-the-cuff ideas, but we finally decided that a biscuit should be brown on top, be fluffy but able to handle sausage, egg and cheese, and shouldn't set off a chemical reaction in your mouth from too much baking powder.

Unmixed flour on the bottom, which unfortunately retains its original flavor, led to instant disqualification, as would a raw spot in the middle, had there been one.

Judging biscuits is really a breeze, especially compared to chili.

I have helped judge chili only once. Never again will I judge chili, unless it is my own.

The chili cook-off I helped judge was over in Tucumcari, during part of a celebration. I had to sample over 30 different batches of chili that ranged in heat from Sahara Desert to molten lava.

The taste followed the same descriptions.

Being from Arizona, but with a long Texas lineage of both sides of the family, I have been, basically, immune to chili. I savor the taste and don't mind the hot.

The guy from Pennsylvania, however, was in for an experience.

He was a big, muscle-bound guy. He had attended Penn State, and looked like a Joe Paterno linebacker. "Bring on that chili," he crowed. "I can't wait."

We had to get a case of crackers and a 12-pack of beer to cool his fire down.

He won't be judging any more chili cook-offs, either.

Crew facing charges

MEXICO CITY (AP) — The crew of a cargo plane that crashed on a busy Mexican highway five days ago has a week to answer to allegations of involuntary manslaughter and other charges in connection with the accident.

Forty-one people died as a result of Thursday evening's crash of the 35-year-old Boeing 377, which was carrying 18 competition horses. The plane was operated by Belize Air International, a cargo charter service.

Felipe Flores, a spokesman for the federal Attorney General's office, said Monday that when the crew members were well enough, they would have to appear before a judge concerning a detention order filed against them.

Arrested were pilot Frederick Morr, 49, of Hialeah, Fla.; co-pilot Robert Banta, 61, of North Bay Village, Fla.; and flight engineer Forrest Wooten, 55, of Dade County, Fla. Court officials said they were accused of involuntary manslaughter, bodily injury and damage to private and government property.

The three were hospitalized in the American-British-Cowdray Hospital, where officials said they were in stable condition.

Security was tight around their third-floor hospital rooms. No photographs were permitted.

The men are to appear before Judge Alfredo Munguia Camara of the Federal District Second Penal Court to answer the charges.

Flores said the initial order requires their appearance before the judge within a week, but the order could be extended for another week.

Most of those killed and injured were on the ground. Authorities have not been able to identify eight of the bodies.

Investigators continued to examine the remains of the aircraft to

determine the cause of the accident. Specialists of the Civil Aeronautics Administration focused on two possible explanations: that mechanical failure kept the plane from gaining altitude, or that an electrical short-circuit started a fire.

The plane went down on the Mexico-Toluca Highway a few minutes after taking off from Mexico City International Airport, 13 miles away.

Some witnesses reported seeing the plane's tail on fire, and others said the fire was in the forward part of the plane.

The newspaper Excelsior reported Sunday that Banta and Wooten told authorities in a preliminary deposition that crew members had trouble retracting the landing gear and the plane could not gain altitude.

The plane, chartered by the Mexican Equestrian Federation, was carrying the horses for quarantine in Miami before taking part in jumping contests in Culpepper, Va., and Hamilton, Mass., for junior teams later this month.

District head visits Rotary

Ed Self, Rotary International District 573 Governor from Plainview, made his official visit to the Hereford club Monday and held a club assembly to discuss goals for the new year.

Self, an attorney, was introduced by Ike Stevens, new president of the Hereford Rotary Club. Self was accompanied by his wife, Mary Anna.

The district governor brought a video message from Chuck Keller, Rotary International president from California, Penn. Keller urged Rotarians to support the special "Polio Plus" program this year, which is a goal to wipe out polio and several other diseases. Rotarians plan to raise \$150 million in the next year to fund the program.

Keller announced his theme for the year is "Rotarians—United in Service, Dedicated to Peace." He reported there are more than a million Rotarians in 160 countries.

Self, a native of Brownfield and graduate of Plainview High School, earned his bachelor degree at Texas Tech and then graduated from the University of Texas Law School. He served as a captain in the U.S. Army before returning to Plainview to set up his law practice.

He called on the local club to work harder on membership and announced that "the only reason for a district organization is to help local clubs." Self also announced that a new Rotary News Network is being initiated this year, with taped

WASHINGTON (AP) — More blacks and Hispanics live in Texas than almost any other state in the nation, but the staffs of congressmen who represent the residents are not representative of those figures, according to a recent study.

"They (Texas congressmen) are out of step," said Joe Trevino, executive director of the League of United Latin American Citizens. "It's sad ... to not include these people in their offices is a disservice to their constituents."

Eleven of the 29 Texas congressmen have no Hispanics or blacks in their Capitol Hill offices, according to a Harte-Hanks Washington Bureau study. Only 13 percent of Texas congressional staffers in Washington are Hispanic or black.

But in Texas, approximately 30 percent of the population is black or Hispanic, according to 1980 census figures.

Trevino and representatives from other minority groups say it's not a problem of racism, but that most lawmakers want employees with several years of experience on Capitol Hill and that rules out many blacks and Hispanics.

However, congressmen should go out of their way to recruit Hispanics and blacks because they will be more

sensitive to the concerns of minority constituents, said minority groups.

Texas lawmakers who have no blacks or Hispanic staffers said they try to hire the most qualified people available, regardless of race, color or creed. But they receive few applications from minorities.

"We genuinely want people to come in and talk about either an internship or a full-time position," said Rep. Beau Boulter, an Amarillo Republican who has never had a black or Hispanic on staff. "I want to change that. I have actively recruited" minorities.

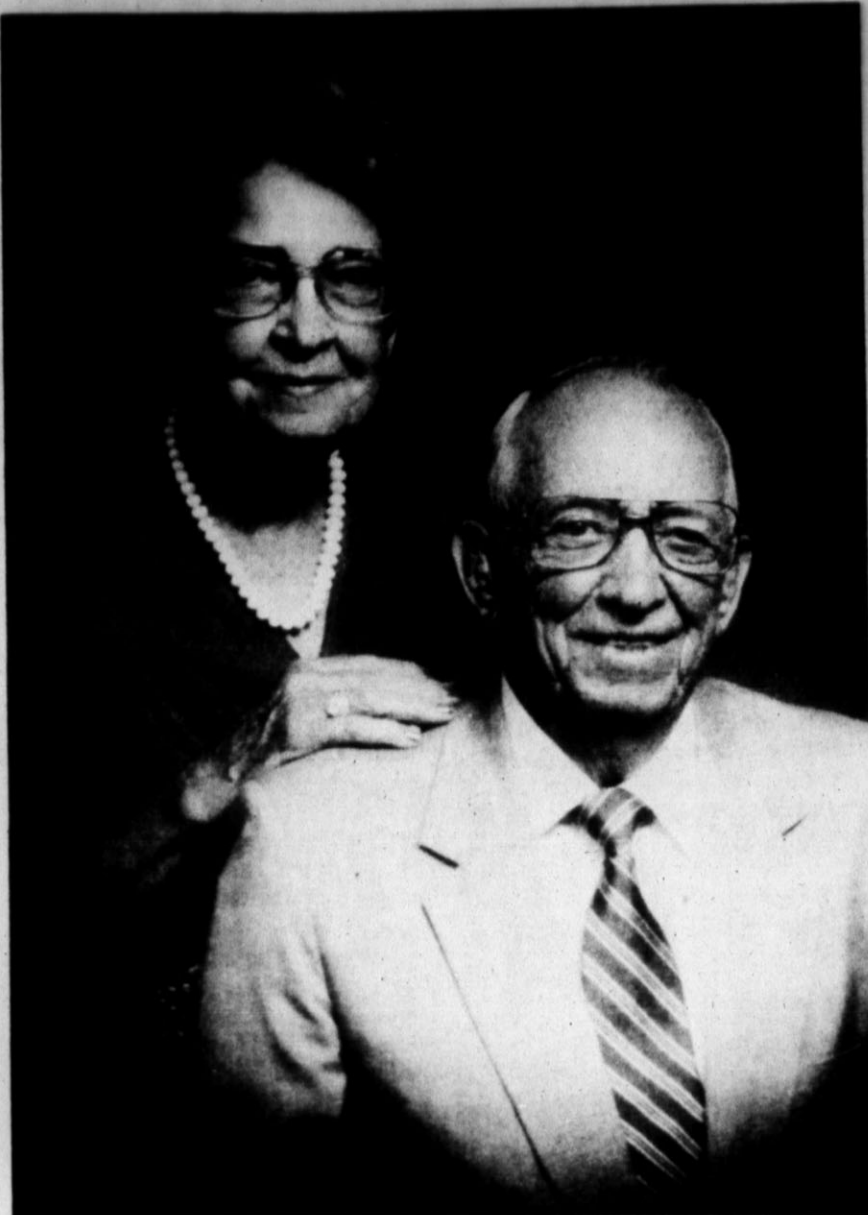
DEAR SHERYL: I would not be so impertinent as to ask the President such a question. If he volunteered the information I would be pleased to print it.

Wisdom teeth may cause headaches

DEAR DR. GOTT — I am 26 and am getting three wisdom teeth. I've been having bad headaches. Could the teeth be the cause?

DEAR READER — Wisdom teeth can cause headaches, particularly if the teeth are impacted or growing in crooked. Check with your dentist.

DEAR DR. GOTT — I remember reading an article about increasing the chances of conceiving a child of a particular gender. It included information about acidity/alkalinity of the vagina. Would diet have an effect or would douching be preferable?

DEAR READER — All that hoopla years ago about determining the sex of a child by douching to alter vaginal acidity at the time of conception has not been scientifically confirmed. Although you can ask your obstetrician about this, I think you'll enjoy relations more fully if you avoid being too scientific, relax and let Nature take its course.

Don't forget that recent evidence has suggested that the use of alcohol, tobacco and drugs can be almost as damaging to a normal fetus before conception — because of the harm

they cause to the woman's body — as they can be during fetal growth.

DEAR DR. GOTT — I'm pregnant with twins. One doctor says to walk a lot, but avoid intercourse. Another doctor says sex is OK, but stay in bed. Who is right?

DEAR READER — Follow the instructions of the doctor whom you have hired as your obstetrician. As a general rule, intercourse during pregnancy is safe, providing there is no high-risk pregnancy (history of premature delivery) and relations are carried out gently. For most women, moderate exercise is appropriate, at least up to the last few weeks of pregnancy, when walking can become uncomfortable.

Harris prediction: Canyon-Herd fight

Canyon and Hereford, just 50 miles apart, are forecast as the No. 1 and No. 3 teams, respectively, in Class 4A football by the Harris Rating Systems.

In its annual Texas Schoolboy Football Forecast magazine, Harris projects Canyon and Jasper in a tie for the state championship, with the Whitefaces being eliminated in the quarterfinals by Canyon.

The Harris Ratings project District 1-AAAA as one of the stronger in the state with three of the pre-season's top 10 being from the league. Lubbock Estacado is ranked No. 10.

With 26 lettermen, including 6 offensive and 6 defensive starters, Canyon is projected as the District 1-4A champ and to continue to the state finals. Listed as outstanding players are tackle Greg Cook (245), who is picked on the all-state team; linebacker Shane Sharke (205) and running back Tim Anusiewicz.

Hereford is rated strong on defense with 8 starters returning among 24 lettermen. "The offense, where only 3 regulars reside, is Coach Don Cumpston's only concern," says the outlook on the Herd. "Tackle Brent Berry, linebacker Michael Phibbs, defensive end Darrell Page, and running back Marcus Brown are some of the talented performers who abound here."

Estacado, district champ last year, is rated a little weaker this season with just 2 offensive and 1

defensive starter, but the Matadors still have speed. Borger is geared to "offer more than token resistance" to the top three, notes the article, while Dunbar and Frenship are rated stronger because of returning regulars.

The Harris Rating Systems goes so far as to project the playoff pairings for each class. According to this forecast, Hereford would defeat Big Spring in bi-district, Fort Worth Everman in region, and lose to Canyon again in the quarterfinals. The projection has Canyon defeating Sweetwater, Wichita Falls Hirschi, Hereford and Corsicana to reach the state finals.

The projected district champs and runners-up in each 4A district: 1-Canyon, Hereford; 2-Big Spring, Sweetwater, 3-Hirschi, Vernon, 4-Everman, FW Brewer, 5-Paris, McKinney, 6-Dallas Lincoln, Seagoville, 7-Wilmer Hutchins, Corsicana, 8-Henderson, Kilgore, 9-Taylor, Waco University, 10-Tomball, Brenham, 11-Jasper, W. Orange-Stark, 12-Columbia, Bay City, 13-Tivy, New Braunfels, 14-Uvalde, SA Alamo Heights, 15-Gregory-Portland, CC Calallen, 16-La Joya, Raymondville.

Aldine MacArthur and North Mesquite are rated as the top two teams in Class 5A. Southlake Carroll and Cuero are tops in 3A; Boyd and Mart are 1-2 in Class 2A, and Bremond and Munday are listed at the top Class 1A.

In the area Class 5A district, Palo Duro and Amarillo High are picked for playoff spots, with Plainview a close third. Midland Lee and Permian are 1-2 in District 4-5A. In area Class 3A, Children and Perryton are the class of District 1, while Littlefield and Friona are rated 1-2 in District 2.

In AA, Panhandle and Stinnett are rated to battle it out in District 1; Quanah and Canadian are rated tops in District 2; Abernathy and Hart in 3, and New Deal and Shallowater in 4. In area Class A, Wheeler and Happy are the top picks.

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Many homes have too much radioactive gas

WASHINGTON (AP) — A fifth of all homes checked in a 10-state survey contained more radioactive radon gas than the level recommended by the Environmental Protection Agency, the agency said today.

"Levels exceeding our guideline were found in each of the states participating in our survey, and in most states we are able to identify radon hot spots," said EPA's deputy administrator, A. James Barnes.

EPA cautioned that the results do not necessarily apply nationwide because the amount of radon depends in part on soil types, because some of the state surveys did not cover enough homes and because the states were not randomly selected.

However, Barnes said radon, which can cause lung cancer, "may be a problem in virtually every state."

Radon is an inert, colorless, odorless gas formed in the radioactive decay of uranium and thorium naturally occurring in the soil. It decays quickly into other radioactive compounds.

Most radon is breathed in and out without effect, but the successor atoms that are formed by decay in the lungs can remain there forever, irradiating the tissues. Those successor atoms also can be carried into the lungs on dust and smoke particles.

The EPA previously had estimated that up to 12 percent of the 75 million homes nationwide contain more radon than the guideline, 4 picocuries per liter.

In the new survey, the highest percentage of homes exceeding that level was found in Colorado, 39 percent, although the agency said that could not be used as a statewide estimate because the 900 measurements were not enough. The lowest percentage was in Alabama, 6 percent.

The other states and their percentages above the guideline: Connecticut, 21; Kansas, 21; Kentucky, 17; Michigan, 9; Rhode Island, 19; Tennessee, 16; Wisconsin, 27; and Wyoming, 26. Overall, the percentage was 21.

Even the low-radon states had

some measurements well above the guideline, the agency said.

Like the Colorado results, figures for Rhode Island and Kansas are based on too small a sample to be considered reasonable statewide estimates, and the Connecticut results cannot be applied statewide because detectors were not placed according to a random sampling plan, officials said.

Rhode Island, Colorado and Kansas will complete their surveys this winter and Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, Minnesota, Missouri, Indiana, North Dakota and Arizona will mount similar surveys. The Indian Health Service also plans to check some reservations in Minnesota, Michigan and Wisconsin.

"In almost every case geology proved to be a good indicator of high-risk areas for radon," EPA said. The agency is revising its maps to reflect the correlation between uranium and similar radon-causing deposits and the radon level in homes.

EPA has found that several techniques are effective in reducing radon, ranging from extra ventilation to

complicated ducting. Some are cheap and some can cost more than \$3,000 per home.

Government concern about radon grew in the 1970s when rising energy prices prompted many homeowners to "tighten" their homes to reduce heat losses, with an accompanying buildup of radon. Radon can seep into basements through foundation cracks and other routes, and can be liberated from water used indoors.

Some homes over the uranium-rich "Reading prong" geological formation in Pennsylvania, New York and New Jersey have been found to contain as much as 3,000 picocuries per liter.

A picocurie is a measure of the pace of radioactive disintegration. It represents the decay of a little more than two atoms per minute.

Four picocuries per liter of radon is about as risky as smoking eight cigarettes per day or undergoing 200 chest X-rays per year, EPA estimates. Of every 1,000 people so exposed, 13 to 50 will get lung cancer who would not otherwise get it.

POLLY'S POINTERS Follow directions when using mixes

DEAR POLLY — With pancake mixes, are you supposed to add eggs? It says on the package to add water. Is milk necessary? When mixing corn bread must one use an electric mixer? Which is the correct temperature to bake it at: 375 degrees or 425 degrees? — **JUST CURIOUS**

DEAR CURIOUS — Learn to trust the directions! If your package of pancake mix says to add water and does not mention eggs, they don't want you to add eggs. Or milk. These ingredients are probably already in the mix in dehydrated form. If you feel like experimenting, additional eggs or milk may make a richer pancake, but you also may upset the balance of the formula and the batter may be of the wrong consistency for successful pancakes.

The corn breads I have made may be mixed or beaten with a spoon rather than an electric mixer. Many corn breads seem to call for a temperature of 350 degrees or 375 degrees. However, there may certainly be exceptions. Again, the best advice I can give you is to heed the recipe directions or the package directions on a mix. Following directions usually leads to baking success! — **POLLY**

DEAR POLLY — My favorite un-sung gardening tool: needlenose pliers. They can root out weeds with

minimal disturbance to neighboring plants. Ease the points into the ground to clamp onto the soil around the roots of the weed. Twist slightly before you pull. — **D.S.**

DEAR POLLY — A recent letter suggested carrying heart medication in a locket. Please advise the woman who wrote the letter to check with her pharmacist about this. If, for example, the medication is nitroglycerin, the pills may lose effectiveness. When they are purchased, the tablets come in a small brown bottle which must be closed tightly and stored in a cool place. Even pills in a bottle with those precautions have a short effectiveness period of three to four months. So please check with the pharmacist. Better safe than sorry. — **T.M.**

DEAR T.M. — An excellent warning, OK, everybody, please check with your pharmacist before storing medication in any way other than in the original container! 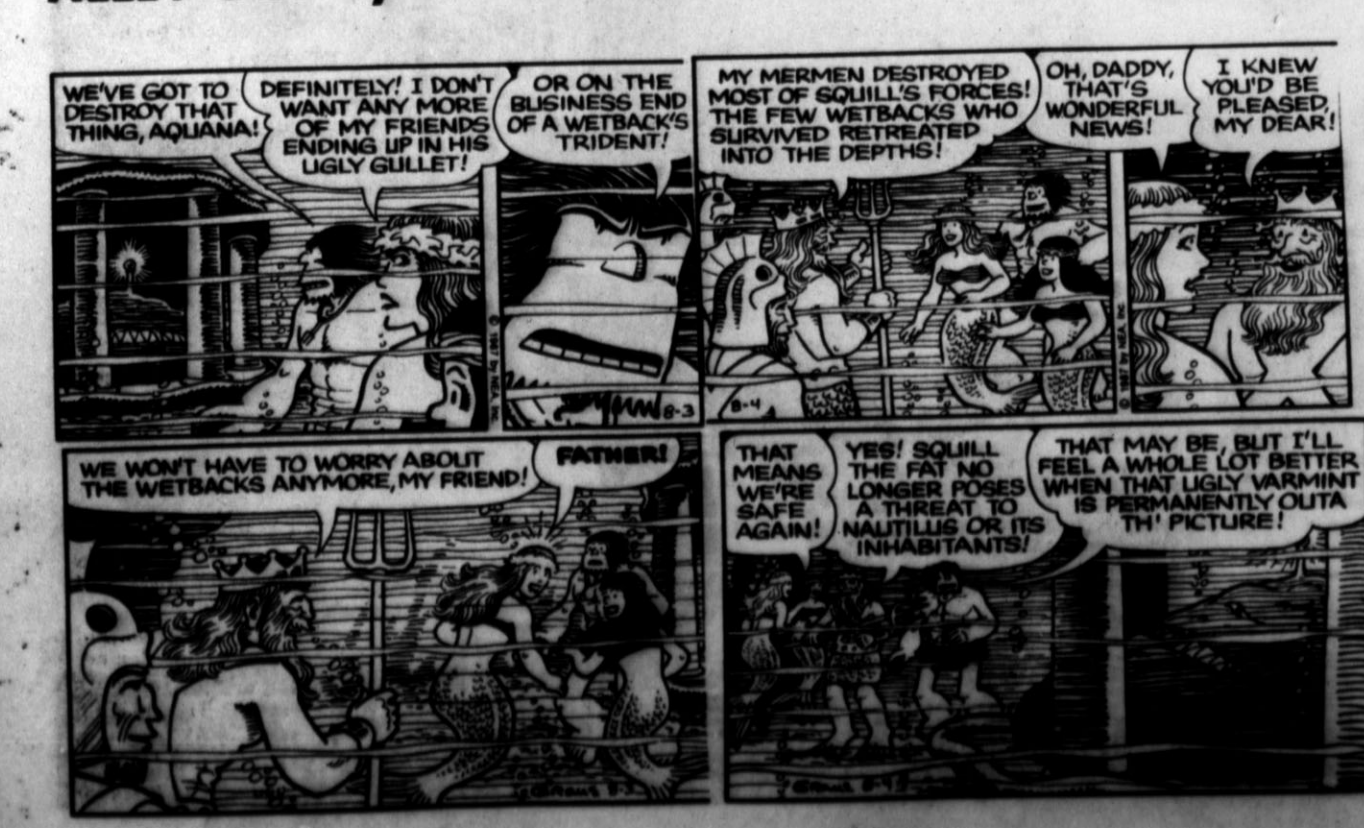

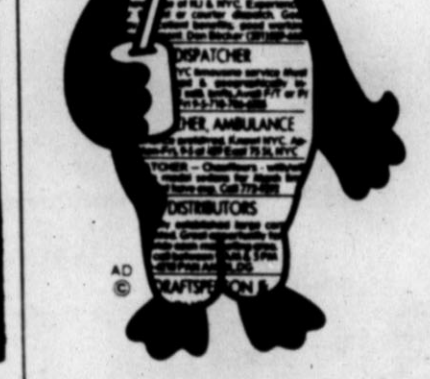

Red Cross Update

1. Can I get AIDS by eating from a plate used by a person with AIDS, by being in a hot tub, swimming pool, bathroom, etc.?

No. The AIDS virus is not spread by air or water. It does not spread on surfaces, such as toilets, sinks, or other bathroom facilities, telephones, or swimming pools. The virus is spread through an exchange of body fluids during sexual activity, or the exchange of blood as occurs through sharing contaminated I.V. drug needles. The only body fluids documented to spread the virus are blood, semen and vaginal secretions.

2. I gave blood a year ago and haven't heard anything. Does that mean I'm negative? Does the American Red Cross always notify you if your test is positive? Are there

different tests?

All donor blood collected by the American Red Cross has been tested for the AIDS antibody since the test was licensed in the spring of 1985. A preliminary test is taken on each unit donated. If positive, a second test is made. If the tests are repeatedly reactive, the Western Blot confirmatory test is performed. All donors are notified if the Western Blot test is positive for the AIDS antibody.

3. Since I'm not homosexual, I'm not at risk am I? Who is at risk? If I only slept with one guy, once over a year ago, should I be worried about having AIDS?

On the basis of studies of AIDS cases in the United States since 1981, the Public Health Service has identified certain high risk behaviors

that put people at increased risk for infection with the AIDS virus. Because having sex with a person at increased risk increases your own risk and because many Americans are carriers of the AIDS virus—it pays to know your sex partner well. If you are a healthy person with no known risk factors for AIDS, your best course for avoiding AIDS infection is a faithful monogamous sexual relationship with a person who is not infected with the AIDS virus. It only takes one encounter with an infected person in order to transmit the AIDS virus. You may consider having the test if you have any question about being at risk of infection.

4. Are you sure you can't get AIDS from donating blood?

All of the needles, syringes, tubing,

and containers used by American Red Cross blood donation centers are sterile, used only once, and thrown away. There is no chance of infection. No one should fear getting AIDS from donating blood. There is no chance of getting AIDS in this way, and the need for blood to save lives is great.

5. If I have a cut, can I get AIDS from touching someone who has AIDS?

The AIDS virus is not spread through normal daily contact at work, in school, or at home. No cases have been found where the virus has been transmitted by casual contact with AIDS patients in the home, workplace, or health care setting. You should however, learn and follow good health and hygiene prac-

tices, as with any infectious disease.

6. Can I get AIDS from "deep" or "French" kissing?

It is not probable. Both partners would have to open cuts or sores in their mouth for the virus to be transmitted by kissing. No cases of transmission have been reported in this way. The AIDS virus is spread mainly by the exchange of body fluids during sexual activity or the exchange of blood through sharing contaminated I.V. drug needles. Less commonly, the virus also can be spread through transfused blood or blood products and to infants born to infected mothers.

7. I hear you can only get AIDS through having anal sex. Is that right?

No, anal sex is not the only way you

can become infected with the AIDS virus, but it is an especially high risk behavior. Scientific studies have shown that the virus is spread from one person to another through sexual contact involving the exchange of blood, semen and possibly vaginal secretions, sharing of contaminated needles and syringes by users of intravenous drugs, transfusion of blood or blood products contaminated by the virus, and transmission from infected mothers to their infants.

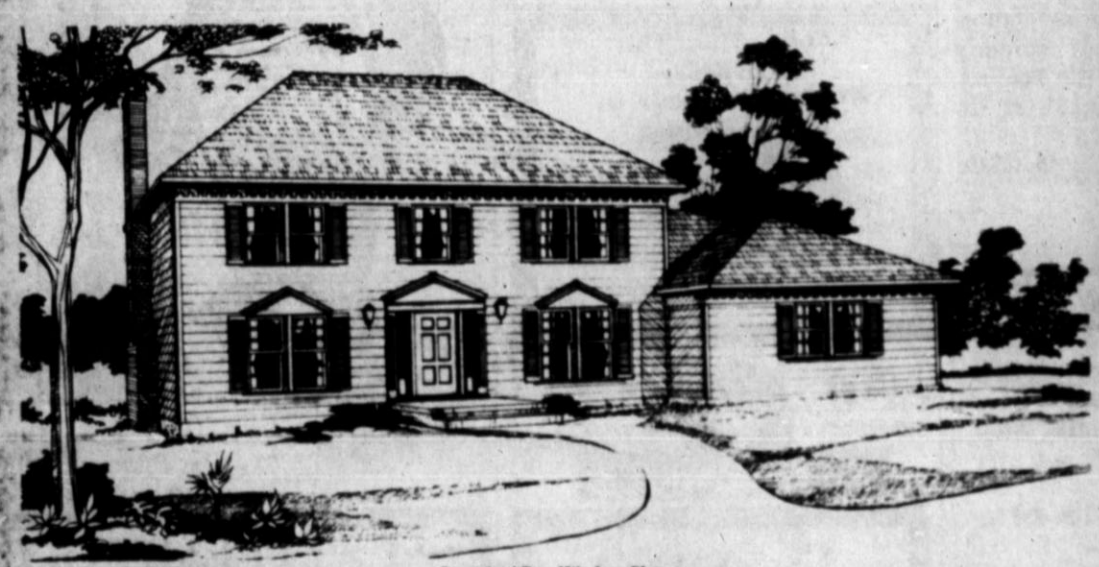
8. I was with a prostitute last night. Where can I go to get the test?

The test is available at a variety of public health test sites in most states. It is also available through private doctors and clinics.

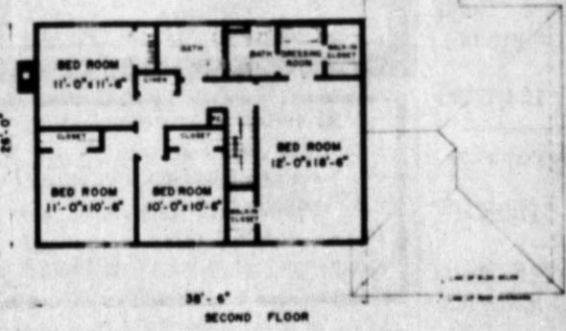
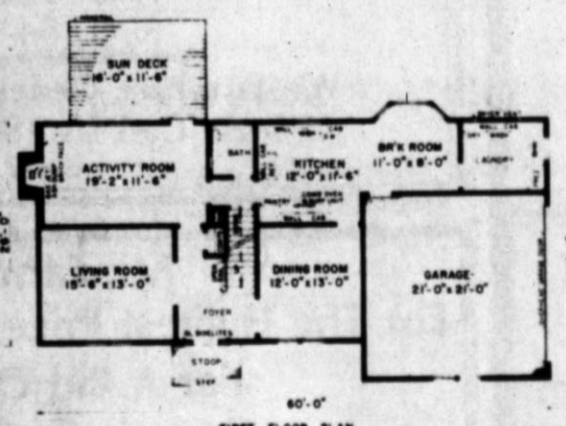
