

Nan ki at Pentagon

WASHINGTON (AP) - An armed General Services Administration. man who tried to run past a Pentagon security guard was shot today and later died at a nearby hospital, authorities said.

A Pentagon spokesman said the man, identified by CBS News as Duane Wallace, 30, of Youngstown, Ohio, pulled a gun outside a Pentagon entrance and tried to bolt toward the National Command

The spokesman, William Caldwell, said the man was shot once by a guard outside the River Entrance, one floor below the office of Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger.

Caldwell said the incident happened shortly after 8 a.m. The man died less than two hours later at the National Orthopedic Hospital in Arlington, Va., said spokeswoman Beth Ellington.

Just beyond the River Entrance is a main corridor leading to the National Command Center, the heavily secured area of the building where

the Joint Chiefs of Staff meet. According to Caldwell, the incident began when the man was stopped at the security checkpoint by a Federal Protective Service guard of the

"The man produced a gun and proceeded to run past the guard and make a dash toward the National Command Center," said Caldwell.

"The guard ordered the man to stop and he turned around, facing the officer and brandishing the gun in his hand. The guard then fired two shots. one of which struck the man."

"An investigation has been initiated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Federal Protective Service," Caldwell said.

The Pentagon and General Services Administration, which is responsible for overseeing the operation of the Pentagon, declined to identify the guard involved in the shooting.

The GSA assigns FPS security guards to each entrance of the Pen-

Caldwell said no one else was injured in the incident.

Although the spokesman said it was unclear how many people were in the area at the time, the River Entrance is normally quite busy at that hour of the morning.

ty to pay bills immediately.

Union and Iran have agreed to cooperate in large-scale economic projects and have condemned 'dangerous actions" by the United States in the Persian Gulf, Pravda said today.

The Communist Party daily said Soviet First Deputy Foreign Minister Yuli M. Vorontsov held talks with top Iranian officials, including President Ali Khamenei, during a trip to Tehran that ended Tuesday.

Vorontsov is on a three-nation tour of the Middle East and Persian Gulf region that Soviet media say is aimed at helping negotiate an end to the nearly 7-year-old war between Iran and Iraq. Vorontsov has already visited Iraq and Syria.

Pravda published a dispatch from the official Tass news agency that said the Soviet Union and Iran "declared for the implementation of large-scale projects of mutually beneficial economic cooperation." The report gave no specifics.

Both sides expressed interest in further developing political contacts, the report said, without providing any details.

Saudis feared Iran takeover

JIDDA, Saudi Arabia (AP) -Saudi officials say thousands of Iranians in Mecca for the annual Moslem pilgrimage planned to seize the Grand Mosque and force pilgrims to proclaim Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini their religious

The accusations came Tuesday as 2.1 million Moslems marked the end of their violence-marred sojourn to this holiest of Islamic cities with the traditional "stoning of the devil" on the Plain of Arafat.

Meanwhile, a new dispute broke out between Saudi Arabia and Iran, as an Iranian jet sent to retrieve bodies of hundreds of Iranian pilgrims killed in riots last week was grounded in Jidda, 45 miles from Mecca. Arab diplomats said it might be held until four Saudi diplomats were allowed to leave Iran's capital,

According to officials in Mecca, who spoke on condition of anonymity, Iranians interrogated by authorities confessed they planned to take over the Grand Mosque in Mec-

tries gathered for the annual hajj, or pilgrimage.

The Iranians planned to lock the pilgrims inside the huge mosque and force them to declare Khomeini, Iran's revolutionary patriarch, the religious leader of the world's 850 million Moslems, the officials said.

If the trapped pilgrims resisted, the plan called for killing the mosque's prayer leader and setting fire to parts of the building, the officials

Nearly all Iranian Moslems are Shiites, a minority sect at odds for 1,300 years with the Sunni sect that includes the Saudi royal family and 85 percent of the world's Moslems. Khomeini has said the Saudi rulers are unfit to be custodians of Islam's holy sites.

A Saudi newspaper, Okaz, quoted official sources it did not identify as saying only one-fourth of the 157,000 Iranians who came for the hajj were true pilgrims.

It said the rest were Revolutionary (See SAUDIS, Page 2)

"We can draw upon them so we won't have to worry about our needs," Bullard said. The hospital could purchase everything it needs except pharmaceuticals from the Amarillo hospital.

HPBH will not begin billing the hospital for the supplies until Dec. 1, and DSGH could take up to one year to pay for the supplies.

'We're talking about a substantial amount," Bullard said. "It could be about \$85,000 a month for three months. This will help our immediate cash flow, free up some money for us to take care of our payables.

"It will take some of the pressure off of us from dealing with our vendors, some of whom are putting us on hold until we become current. It could also save us some dollars because they can probably buy these supplies cheaper than we could buy them."

"I'm concerned about this," said board member Jim Herbertson. "They'll expect to gain something from this, and I don't want them to take over any of our services."

The board agreed to the plan and agreed to meet with HPBH officials next week to assure themselves there are no strings attached to the

The board also approved a "cafeteria" plan provided by Gilliland-Nieman Associates that could save the district, and hospital employees, about \$15,000 annually in Social Security and federal taxes, and opened bids for a new computer

The board agreed to have an outside consultant look over six computer bids opened Tuesday, which ranged in price from \$87,806 to \$188,039, and heard an update on the district's revenue bond plans.

Board member Frank Zinser will meet with Texas Commerce Bank officials in Amarillo Friday to discuss a plan to sell \$1.5 million in bonds to Bell County Health Facilities.

The board is also considering selling the bonds to the Texas Fixed Rate Pool fund, but is facing an Aug. 31 deadline with that group.

Local Roundup Treadwell conducts meeting

An update on the status of the Department of Energy Salt Repository Project being conducted in Deaf Smith County was provided by John Treadwell during a briefing this morning. Treadwell manages the Hereford office of Battelle Corporation, a

major research contractor for the project.

Treadwell said there are now 129 project personnel working in Hereford. Transfers from the Columbus, Ohio area total 30.

Though 45 project people reside in Hereford only 20 are transfers with the remainder local hires. Amarillo has 46 project people in residence including 36 transfers, a gain of seven over last week's total.

Canyon remains at 13.

Staff increases expected include 46 in August, 45 in September, 35 in October and 35 in November.

A total of \$007,500 have been committed for expenditure in Hereford. This figure does not include the \$1.2 million dollar payroll for staff employees living in Hereford.

Treadwell said there is no formal announcement about the winner of the bid to provide office space for Battelle. The building has been selected but headquarters approval is pending.

IRS changes mind on kids' savings the rights to an account bearing the numbers for their children and to

WASHINGTON (AP) - A redfaced Internal Revenue Service is taking steps to ensure that it never again grabs a child's savings to pay a parent's overdue taxes. "We don't take money from people

who don't owe us money," IRS Commissioner Lawrence B. Gibbs said Tuesday in outlining new procedures for seizing bank accounts to settle a Furthermore, Gibbs said, if any

person can "show us where we have taken an account that does not belong to a taxpayer who owes us money, we will move quickly to give

The new safeguards are part of Gibbs' campaign for "trying to treat taxpayers like customers," an effort to rid the IRS of what some lawmakers have called a bully im-Gibbs acknowledged in an inter-

view that even his friends have pressed him to explain how the IRS could seize a child's savings to pay a

bill the child did not owe. Several

such cases have been publicized over the last few months.

"This is a situation in which we have been as frustrated as the taxpayers have," he said. "Some of the stories (about such seizures) indicate we are a large, uncaring, insensitive agency but, believe it or not we haven't done this intentionally."

The IRS will continue searching for a permanent solution to the problem of seizing the wrong accounts, Gibbs said. In the meantime, the agency says: -It will not ask financial institu-

balance of less than \$100. -Banks will be asked to freeze temporarily, rather than seize, any account that bears a name in addition to that of the delinquent taxpayer. The IRS then will try to determine the real owner; unless the bank receives directions to the contrary within 21 days, the account will be

tions to seize any account with a

Under the old procedures, the IRS simply told a bank it was attaching delinquent taxpayer. A child's account could be seized if it carried the Social Security number of a parent. "When parents or grandparents

put their Social Security number on a child's account, we and the bank have no way of knowing it until the money is taken," Gibbs explained.

That happened last month to 12-year-old Garry D. Keffer of Chesapeake, Va. He had the foresight to take his complaint straight to the top - President Reagan - and to give his hometown newspaper a copy of the letter he wrote the president. Garry is getting his \$10.35 back from the IRS.

Gibbs noted the new tax overhaul requires any child over the age of 4 who can be claimed as a dependent by a parent to have a Social Security number by next April 15. The commissioner recommended that parents wait no longer to get

name or Social Security number of a begin using the numbers on the children's bank accounts.

In a related announcement, the IRS reminded children who have summer jobs or other part-time jobs that in most cases, their wages are no longer exempt from withholding. Under the new law, the agency

noted, "An employee will not be able to claim exemption from withholding if he or she can be claimed as a dependent, has any unearned income, such as interest or dividends, and has wages and unearned income totaling more than \$500. This would include children who work and who save some of their earnings, for ex-

Teen-agers and other employees have until Oct. 1 to file a new W-4 or W-4A withholding form as a result of all the changes made by the 1986 tax overhaul. The IRS estimates that about 75 percent of all workers already have filed new forms with

Babbling Brooks

It seems that some folks, including consumer advocate Ralph Nader, are upset because the Federal Communications Commission has repealed the Fairness Doctrine, which has been held over the heads of radio and television broadcasters for the past 40 years.

The Fairness Doctrine was a supposedly simple rule. If you aired one side of a controversial subject or had something dealing with a politician that was not in the course of a newsworthy event, you had to give the same amount of time to persons on the other side of the fence.

The Fairness Doctrine is the reason why, after President Reagan's radio talk each Saturday, the stations carrying the President's talk were supposed to carry the Democratic "response."

I use quotation marks around "response" because the response didn't always pertain to what the President had said, but it was equal time and FCC rules required that equal time be granted.

Not all stations aired the response, which could have held grave consequences had there been a complaint. It was a rule by the body, the only body, handing out licenses to run a radio or television station. You break their rules, and you can incur fines or, worse, have your station shut down by the FCC.

You may have noticed that newspapers, magazines, and other media are not covered by the Fairness Doctrine. Well, at least by

That's not to say it has not been requested and suggested and introduced by lawmakers over the years.

Instead, we in the print media have another rule, or set of rules, that apply to us. Rules like responsibility to the reader to fairly present both sides of issues in our news coverage. The rules of common sense also

come into play.

It's time that people in the electronic media be given a chance to display some common sense, responsibility, tangibles that have been there all along.

The Fairness Doctrine is good, to an extent, but it is one of those rules that could become twisted in the mangled mind of some legislator or commissioner and held against us, and you.

The FCC did well.

NASA struggles at crossroads

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Eighteen months after the Challenger explosion, a troubled NASA is at a crossroads. Struggling still toward recovery from that disaster, the agency is also striving to reassert its leadership of the American space program.

Once the proud embodiment of the nation's civilian space effort, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration today lacks a bold vision of what it wants to achieve and is without a comprehensive national policy to guide it.

Critics and historians say the agency has been weakened by a reduced political commitment, indifference in the White House, underfunding, debates over manned vs. unmanned flight, the priority of military space projects and Pentagon assertion of space leadership, the intrusion of other government agencies into space policy decisions, and lack of vigorous leadership.

The result, says the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, is that the United States could become a second-class power in space, with the Soviet Union assuming unchallenged leadership and the Europeans, Japanese and Chinese moving up

That could have economic, political and strategic implications well into the 21st century, according to a recent policy statement by the AIAA, a respected organization of space scientists, engineers and business people.

Others, too, are concerned. "The fact is that currently NASA has lost the will to fly men in space," wrote Reginald Turnill, editor of the British publication Jane's Spaceflight Directory, in the 1987 edi-

The explosion of the space shuttle Challenger Jan. 28, 1986, which killed its seven crew members, ripped away NASA's aura of invincibility. The subsequent investigation spotlighted mismanagement,

sloppiness and other flaws within the agency. NASA has spent much of its time and money since the accident repairing those flaws, making sweeping management changes and correcting faults in the shuttle.

The recovery program is nearing important milestones that will be crucial in determining when shuttles will fly again. Officials recently slipped the target date for the first flight from Feb. 26 to

The shuttle Discovery, set to make that flight, was powered up electrically her Monday to begin the formal checkout for the mission. More detailed flight preparations will begin Sept. 8, with rollout to the launch pad set for March 7 and a static firing of its engines

The power-up of Discovery to ready it for launch will be a major milestone, said launch operations director Bob Sieck.

A key shuttle program test is planned for Aug. 26 when a solid fuel rocket motor will be fired at the Morton Thiokol plant in Brigham City, Utah. It will be the first involving the new joint design featuring a capture latch and three O-ring seals, instead of two. The Challenger accident occurred because of a faulty joint design that allowed hot gases and flame to escape.

Construction of a replacement shuttle for Challenger will begin in August at Rockwell International in Palmdale, Calif., and at the China Lake Naval Weapons Center, tractor rockets will be used to fire mannequins out of the side of an aircraft in a test of a possible shuttle escape system.

Also in August, a study team headed by astronaut Sally Ride will endorse development of a moon base as the nation's next manned space exploration goal after the space station, using the technology

developed on that project to ultimately send astronauts to Mars. The team also will recommend vigorous programs to study the Earth from space and to explore the planets with robot spacecraft.

The report will go to NASA administrator James C. Fletcher, who eventually is to formulate a space policy for submission to the White House. But because of budget pressures, Fletcher said recently, "For the near term, we're not going to be able to start any large, expensive programs."

NASA already is planning its next big project, a permanently manned space station, but it appears to be in trouble. Recent projections increased the cost from an original \$8 billion to \$14 billion and forced officials to delay the start of the project from 1992 to 1994 and to split the construction into two phases, the second coming along years later. A panel of the National Research Council estimated earlier this month that the two-stage station could cost as much as \$32.8

President Reagan two years ago strongly endorsed the space station, but that support could waver because of the costs in this time of huge deficits. The White House, occupied with the Iran-contra affair and other concerns, has said little about space efforts for months, except for the space-based missile defense system known as Star

Many detractors among space scientists feel the space station is a waste of money, that NASA's selling it as a place for scientific research and space manufacturing is not realistic. They would rather use that money to build unmanned probes like the Voyagers and Pioneers that have so successfully explored other planets and

Several expensive space science projects, including the Hubble Space Telescope, a Galileo mission to Jupiter, a Magellan flight to Venus and a Mars Observer have been delayed several years by the ger accident. But these are projects whose planning began in the 1970s, and scientists complain NASA is initiating no new major grams and is now spending about 25 percent less on science than

Iran-Contra hearings succeeded

BEAUMONT, Texas (AP) - U.S. Rep. Jack Brooks thinks the Iran-Contra investigation succeeded in fleshing out the main facts in 14 weeks of sometimes numbing testimony and in the future may prevent a similar government within a government.

Brooks says

"I think the hearings accomplished a great deal," Brooks, D-Beaumont, said in a telephone interview with the Beaumont Enter-Tuesday evening.

Among the main accomplishments he cited: "It exposed the government within a government that Adm. (John) Poindexter, Col. (Oliver) North and CIA Director (Wiliam) Casey had created.

"(The hearings) showed the president rejected the counsel and advice of his long-trusted advisers, Secretary of State (George) Shultz and Secretary of Defense (Caspar) Weinberger, and they were essentially frozen out of the most serious foreign policy decision of the nation.

"The hearings exposed just how deeply involved the nation was in shipping weapons to a terrorist state in negotiation for the release of

Tax cuts followed

Such tax and pricing practices have come to be accepted as forces against which protest is futile. But there will be protest nevertheless, and some of it is likely to come this fall from students and academics.

The reason: Taxes for scholarship students are going up, thanks to the 1986 tax cut. A largely overlooked provision of the new tax law now requires federal taxes to be paid on portions of scholarship awards.

Under the old law, the entire amount of a student's scholarship was excluded from taxation. Under the new law, only amounts used for "qualified tuition and related expenses," such as books and supplies, are excluded.

Specifically not excluded, says Richard Shapiro, a tax accountant, is the money used to pay for room, Prices, too, seem to be on the same board and other personal living exrepeated and highly publicized price

"Tax reform has set a trap for the unwary," says Shapiro, who is director of taxes for the accounting and consulting firm of Oppenheim, Appel, Dixon & Co.

He observes that besides handling their basic course work, students will also ahve to consider tax planning "or they will wind up with a possible penalty for failure to report income.'

When news of the violence broke in Tehran on Saturday, angry mobs attacked the Saudi Arabian Embassy and captured four diplomats. The Saudi government said one diplomat is still being held.

Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency said Tuesday that armed Saudi guards surrounded the airliner that flew to Jidda to pick up the dead and wounded Iranian

Arab diplomats said privately the Saudis were refusing to let the plane leave until it won the release of the detained diplomat and permission for all four Saudi diplomats to leave

The diplomats said Syria, Pakistan and other Moslem nations were trying to mediate in the dispute.







ENDURING IDEALS By Bob Wear

Idealism, as generally understood, probably means different things to different people; but is of some interest to most of us. We know that it is a source of inspiration and uplifting behavior, and that it is, at times,

difficult for all of us to handle. We are usually disappointed as we begin to understand the disparity between reality and the ideals by which we would like to live. To some folk, this may be very disillusioning; others may try the compromise of giving up their ideals; and some may

ty finally breaks them. There is no reason why any of these things should happen.

Ideals will work for us in the world of reality, unless we try to reach a degree of perfection which is beyond our capacity. We must have ideals, or be forever something less than we were created to be. Without ideals, there can be no significant accomplishment, no improvements of any kind. In fact, if our ideals are discarded, we will be unable to sustain any kind of meaningful living experience. When ideals are lost or

make themselves so rigid that reali- forgotten, the very life of the dynamic human spirit is lost.

The life spirit which comes from a sensible set of ideals must be kept alive in us. Once it is lost, it may never be regained. "The life-giving flame of idealism, when suddenly quenched, cannot often be rekindled." The turbulent winds of reality will always threaten the lifegiving flame of idealism, but, if we wish to do so, we can provide idealism the protection it must have

We must relate our ideals to the conditions of reality in such a way

that the ideals will continue to serve their rightful purpose. This is a lifebalance that can be attained, and working to attain it is far better than the alternatives. We must not give up our wisely chosen ideals, and we must not mishandle them so that

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Garden pesticides can come out of clothing

When you're dusting the roses or spraying the trees, it's easy to get peticides on your body as well as the plants. Taking a shower removes the pesticides from you-but what about your clothes?

"Spills and spray from common garden pesticides contaminate clothing, so it must be specially treated to avoid potential health hazards," says clothing specialist Dr. Ann Beard.

"It's best to change clothes in the garage, if possible, and put contaminated clothes aside before going inside to shower," advises the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

"Don't put the clothes in the hamper to wash with the family laundry," she cautions. "Research shows that pesticide residues are transferred from contaminated clothing to other clothing, especially when laundered together."

Pre-washing will help remove pesticide particles from the fabric, advises the specialist. You can prewash clothes outdoors by hosing them down or soaking them in a bucket, or bring them inside to machine wash on the pre-wash cycle.

She emphasizes that pre-washing is highly recommended when a wettable powder-type pesticide concentrate spills on clothing, because it clings to clothing fibers.

"Pesticide residues from less toxic or dilute pesticides can usually be washed out in one machine washing," says Beard. "However, use both pre-washing and several

machine washings on spills from wettable powder or concentrated liqui pesticides."

According to the specialist, how you machine wash the clothes is important too. Washing them in hot water will remove more pesticide than washing in warm or cold temperatures. Cold temperatures in particular, are relatively ineffective in removing pesticides from fibers.

Use either a liquid or powder heavy-duty detergent containing phosphate carbonate to wash clothes. Laundry additives such as bleach can be added, but they don't help remove the pesticide residues.

Beard also advises using a full water level on your machine, even if you have only one or two contaminated garments. That will allow the water to thoroughly flush the

The heat from either line-drying or machine-drying will provide further chemical breakdown of pesticide residues, she adds.

"After you've washed the clothes. a pesticide carry-over to other laundry loads is possible," notes the specialist. "Rinse the washing machine with an empty load using hot water and detergent, just as you did the contaminated clothes."

"Exposure to garden pesticides can cause skin rashes, headaches, nausea and a number of other problems," says Beard. "It just makes good sense to adequately wash gardening clothes so these hazards are minimized."

Vinegar will clean **POLLY'S** your coffee maker **POINTERS**

DEAR POLLY - My coffee maker (an automatic drip model) used to work perfectly. But now it takes a very long time for the water to drip through -more than half an hour. Is there some way to fix it without taking it to the repair shop? - L.G.

DEAR L.G. - Mineral deposits and coffee residues have probably clogged the mechanism, slowing it down. Automatic drip coffee makers, percolaters and other coffee-making appliances should be regularly cleaned to remove mineral deposits and tougher coffee residues not reery week or so, run a pot full of vinegar through the coffee maker just as if you were making coffee. This should remove all calcium deposits and other accumulations. After this, wash with sudsy water and rinse thoroughly to remove any trace of the vinegar or detergent, or rinse by running several changes of clear water through the machine. The vinegar can be saved and reused for the next several cleanings.

Vinegar is an extremely useful product for many cleaning chores, as is baking soda. Oxygen means DR. GOTT 'no smoking'

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

DEAR DR. GOTT — With so many people being treated at home with oxygen, will you please explain the dangers of smoking around oxygen? Is it safe to smoke in another room, with

the door closed?
DEAR READER — Combustion in the form of rust, tarnish or fire - is an oxidative reaction: Oxygen is added to the process. The more oxygen, the faster and more intense the oxidation. Therefore, fire is a hazard in the presence of home oxygen-delivery systems primarily because the added oxygen will accelerate the burning of a substance. There are rare reports of oxygen tanks exploding in the presence of a large electrical discharge.

Although smoking in an adjoining room is safe, I would discourage that practice for health reasons. A patient who requires supplemental oxygen to breathe is going to be harmed by any air pollution. It would be extremely inconsiderate - and unhealthful for a patient to breathe cigarette smoke, even from as far away as the next room.

In addition, smoking is a dangerously bad habit in a home that has an oxygen tank. Even the most conscientious, fully aware smoker can unthinkingly carry a lit cigarette outside the "safe area" - perhaps when leaving the house or hurrying to help the patient. To avoid this danger, it's best to have a single house rule: No

smoking — at all, anywhere. In my view, when the oxygen tank comes into the house, the cigarettes and cigars ought to go.

DEAR DR. GOTT — I am male, 65 and in good health. For 12 years I've

been taking 125 milligrams of conjugated estrogens to suppress normal male sex urge because my wife is an invalid. I have gynecomastia to a certain degree. Do I run a risk of developing cancer because of the estrogen, even though I don't have a uterus?

DEAR READER - No, you do not. However, you do have an increased risk of breast cancer, so you should be periodically checked by your doctor.

DEAR DR. GOTT - Once and for all, can eating chocolate cause acne

or pimples? DEAR READER - Once and for all, no. However, medical opinions do change, so stay tuned. Despite current expert opinion that chocolate does not cause complexion problems, some patients certainly are sensitive to chocolate and cocoa. My advice is: Disregard current medical opinion in this

instance and let your skin be the

DEAR DR. GOTT — My husband has recently been diagnosed as having Pick's disease. What can you tell me about it?

DEAR READER - Pick's disease is a form of brain degeneration that produces cortical atrophy and dementia. The cause is unknown and there is no treatment. Patients with Pick's disease become progressively more apathetic, slovenly and forgetful. Eventually, like other patients with advanced dementia, they usually need institutional care.

DEAR DR. GOTT — Is a beer belly sign of cirrhosis of the liver?

DEAR READER - The abdominal protuberance that often appears in eople who drink excessive amounts of beer can be due to liver disease. In heavy drinkers, fat is deposited in the liver and will cause it to enlarge. Fluid also can leak out of the abdominal lining, pool in the abdominal cavity and cause swelling. This is called

Once fatty infiltration occurs in the liver, inflammation may develop, scarring takes place and the liver shrinks. This is cirrhosis and is the end result of alcoholic liver damage.


Most patients with "beer belly" have simply become overweight, and the fat is distributed in the abdominal wall. Beer supplies a lot of unneeded calories. Nonetheless, when I see a beer drinker with a prominent abdomen, I worry about liver disease and will obtain a blood test to assess liver

Social Security

Bad news travels fast. Good news sometimes takes longer and often never catches up. The case in mind is the report of the trustees of the Social Security system is sound.

This is the third year that the trustees reports have been favorable, a direct result of Congressional action in 1983 to strengthen the system. But because the news during the several years preceding the 1983 changes was so dismal, people seem to find it hard to believe that the system is back on its feet.

The trustees indicated that the trust funds assets grew more rapidly in 1986 than had been expected and its ability to withstand any shortfalls in payroll tax collections continues to improve. Trust fund assets consist primarily of Social Security taxes paid by employees, their employers, and the self-employed. During 1987, some 124 million persons were paying into the system.

Over the 75-year projection period, under intermediate assumptions, the program will experience sufficient acturial surpluses over the next 30 years to balance out deficits in the remainder of the period, so that the program as a whole is said to be in close actuarial balance.

Income to the retirement, survivors, and disability insurance trust funds in fiscal 1986 was \$215.5 billion, while outgo was \$198.7 billion. In addition, \$10.6 billion was transferred from the retirement and survivors

insurance trust fund to the Hospital Insurance Trust Fund as final repayment of interfund loans made in 1982. Thus, assets of the trust fund increased 6.1 billion during the fiscal

The 1983 legislation, the result of a bipartisan commission, makes the program less vulnerable to temporary economic fluctuations of the sort that occurred during the 1970's. At that time, high unemployment depressed income into the trust funds and high inflation boosted benefits and increased trust fund expenditures. The legislation provides for borrowing between the trust funds, if necessary, and for basing the cost-of-living increases on increases in wages rather than increases in prices, whichever is lower, under certain conditions.

Medicare's Hospital Insurance Trust Fund, which helps pay hospital bills and related expenses to people 65 and over and the long-term disabled improved over last year, but is still in need of additional financing around the turn of the century. The Board recommended that the Congress take early corrective action to avoid the need for more drastic changes later.





Pittman appeals ruling

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) - University of Kentucky basketball recruit John Pittman has appealed a ruling that made him academically ineligible under NCAA guidelines, but UK officials say a successful appeal won't ensure his enrollment at the school.

Officials at Terry High School in Rosenberg, Texas, have asked the NCAA to rule that a course the 7-foot-1 center took called "Fundamentals of Math" is a core curriculum course. The NCAA requires

that an athlete pass 11 core cur-riculum courses, including two in mathematics, to be eligible.

Ironically, it was Terry principal Harry Wright who did not certify the course as one of the 11 core curriculum that Pittman was required

But now Terry officials have appealed, contending that the course contained algebra and geometry instruction, as required by the NCAA. NCAA officials in Shawnee Mis-

sion, Kan., said Monday that the high school's word is often taken in such cases, and if algebra and geometry were included, the course probably would be accredited.

"As long as it's not a remedial course, it sounds like it meets the definition," said Nancy Walker of the NCAA's legislative services depart-





Owners, dogs aid with therapy | TELEVISION SCHEDUL

DALLAS (AP) - Justin McAden, 9-year-old kid, met Lady, a mostly miniature schnauzer with a pink hat, who might enjoy a little hairy comon a recent afternoon, and the relationship bloomed.

Justin is from Denison. He's a chubby guy with a burr haircut. Lady has white hair and likes to chase whatever someone will throw for her. They look like ordinary boy and dog, but in truth neither is ordinary at all.

Justin is recovering from a head injury he suffered April 24 when a car crashed into his bicycle as he rode to school. And though he appears to be physically sound, his mind plays strange tricks on him.

And Lady, owned by Virginia Hyatt of Arlington, is one of only a few dogs in the Dallas area trained to take part in recreational therapy for patients of nursing homes, hospitals and other medical facilities.

Ms. Hyatt founded Paws Across Texas, an organization of owners and dogs willing to help with therapy. Recently she and other members of the group were at Dallas Rehabilita-

To become members, dog owners must have put their pets through obe-dience school and met other requirements, mostly health-related.

The dogs are "used as tools to motivate, stimulate, help decrease depression and boost morales" at the more than 30 institutions they visit, Ms. Hyatt said. Response from medical personnel has been encouraging, she said, and the group is seeking new members, especially in the Dallas area.

Patty schaller, manager of recreation and leisure services at Dallas Rehabilitation Institute, says the dogs have been a welcomed addition to therapy programs.

"I've seen those patients recovering from head injuries responding," she siad. "They respond to the softness. They'll reach out and touch them, or maybe they'll draw away when the dog licks them in the face. They may not respond that way to humans.

"Dogs have an unconditional love for people. It doesn't matter who they are. There's a warmth of feeling from the animal.

Money may not be conservation motivation

WASHINGTON (AP) - A new Agriculture Department appraisal of the nation's non-federal soil and water resources says money alone may not be enough to induce some farmers to carry out conservation

One school of thought is that subsidies or "cost-sharing" are necessary to attract enough land into USDA conservation programs, to help pay for terraces, dams and other structures used to keep soil from eroding.

The long-term Conservation Reserve Program, under which farmers take highly erodible land from crop production for 10 years in return for payments, is another example.

But the report said, "Although economic factors are certainly significant in the decision to adopt conservation practices, they fail to account for all adoption behavior."

It added: "Sociological factors are also significant and, for some farmers and landowners, even outweigh economic considerations."

A great deal is known about the characteristics of farmers and landowners who are most likely to adopt conservation practices, but that's not the problem.

"What we do not know very much about is how to motivate farmers who are not likely to use conservation practices without some kind of incentive," the report said. "Sociological research tells us that this incentive is not always a monetary one."

The report said more information is needed about "the values and attitudes of the many different clienteles with whom we work" and the kinds of motivation that is required to get them into conservation.

"When we have this information,

we can develop implementation strategies and marketing techniques that will meet the needs of the target clientele as well as meeting agency goals for the application of soil and water conservation practices," the report said.

The report, "The Second RCA Appraisal," is a preliminary draft and was released Monday for 60 days of public review and comment. In its final form, probably early next year, the report will provide updated information for use in designing USDA conservation policy.

Congress required the appraisals in the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977. The first was issued in 1980, to be followed at fiveyear intervals. However, Congress subsequently changed the updates to 10 years. The next report will be due

One problem in developing 'special strategies" for reaching farmers not now in conservation programs has been the change in the general character of U.S. agriculture.

"The research confirms that the American farming community is less and less the homogeneous group of full-time family farmers that comprise the popular American image of 'farmer', and more and more a heterogeneous group that includes corporate farmers, part-time farmers, professional farm managers and absentee landlords," the report said. "Each of these groups has unique values, needs and attitudes that influence their conservation decisions."

Spider mites increasing

CORN Spider mite activity has increased this past week. Some fields are requiring treatment; however, many more have only isolated, small colonies. We will likely continue to see an increase in spider mite infesta-tions, for the hot, dry weather is predicted to stay with us for a while and spraying for borers will trigger a rapid increase in many mite infesta-

The use of Azodrin for spider mite control in corn is still forbidden. Labeled miticides like Cygon and Metasystox-R have not consistently provided effective control of spider mites; however, in the Texas Panhandle, they have performed better in the northern corn growing area than in the southern corn growing area.

Pheromone traps in Dallam and Moore Counties are catching southwestern corn borer moths again. The number of moths caught increased dramatically on July 21, and witha heavy flight predicted, many fields are likely at the economic threshold. An insecticide application is suggested when 20 to 25 percent of the plants are infested with eggs or newly hatched larvae.

SORGHUM Greenbug infestations have increased, but are still very spotted throughout the Panhandle. Many of the fields I have been to in the past week are at the boot to heading stage. In sorghum this size, the death of one functional leaf as a result of greenbug feeding can justify an in-

secticide application for greenbug control.

No parasitic wasp activity has been detected at this time.

Some very isolated colonies of spider mites have been observed on lower leaves of a few sorghum plants.

Sorghum that is headed can be infested with headworms. Begin routine checks for this pest when

Cotton looked surprisingly clean this week in the southeast Panhandle area. A few fleahoppers could be found, but the cotton appeared to have a very acceptable fruit load. Although we have reports of increased bollworm and cotton aphid activity in the Rolling Plains, none were detected in the Collingsworth County area. Continue to check cotton on a

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TCFA begins computer program

Cuppy Graham sat down at the keyboard, tapped a few commands and watched the future flash across his computer screen.

Graham, owner of H&H Feedlot, Inc., near Roscoe, was looking at market information transmitted by a new computer system that links his feedyard by satellite with the Market Department of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TCFA). The system, called M-NET for Market Network, sends market information at the speed of sound, allowing him two-way communication via computer with TCFA and with other feedyards.

The M-NET system has been tested in 25 feedyards in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico, the area served by TCFA. Upon completion of a successful pilot program, TCFA began installing computer hardware in member feedyards this month. Graham was the first to receive and produced nationally.

access market information now that the system is available to all TCFA members.

'Basically, what we send is factual historical information," says Jim Gill, TCFA Market Director. "The difference is that we now send it automatically every hour on the hour. Also, we send tick-by-tick information on the cattle futures, grain futures, meat trade, industry news and special messages."

To coordinate and further develop the new system, TCFA has hired Bill Carrothers, a former feedyard manager, as Market Information Systems specialist.
