NRC reports could eliminate Hanford

A Feb. 3 memo and a March 16 report, both prepared by members of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, have cast huge doubts on the suitability of a site near Richland, Wash., for a possible high-level nuclear waste dump.

The NRC is responsible for ultimately licensing a site for storage of commercial, high-level nuclear waste. The Washington site, along with sites in Deaf Smith County and Yucca Mountain, Nevada, are undergoing site characterization work to determine their suitability to safely store waste for at least 1,000 years.

"... I do not believe (the Hanford site) represents a practical, safe option," F. Robert Cook, the NRC's on-site representative at Hanford, said in a Feb. 3 memorandum that was disclosed Friday.

In a March 16 report, Robert Browning, director of NRC's Division of Waste Management, said Hanford would probably fail to meet the requirements to isolate radioactivity from ground water in the Hanford area.

Cook's memorandum and Browning's report each cited concerns over numerous earthquake fault zones in the region and discoveries that ground water, running toward the Columbia River 30 miles away, moves faster than previously believed.

The rapid flow and extensive seepage from the surface was discovered by using iodine 129, a radioactive substance used in geotechnical work to trace the flow of underground aquifers.

The iodine, which has a half-life of two weeks and considered only mildly hazardous, seeped between the ground and the aquifers, more than 1,500 feet below the surface.

Cook said the information shows there are virtually no barriers between the aquifers and ground level. Browning, Cook's supervisor in Washington, said the iodine information by itself would not rule out the Hanford site. "It's just one piece of a very complicated puzzle we have to put together," Browning said.

In a memo to the Department of Energy, the agency responsible for selecting a final site for NRC approval, Browning said the NRC had hired Nuclear Waste Consultants, who Browning said were nuclear

waste experts.

NWC "concluded there is a significant likelihood that the site will fill the 1,000-year ground water travel-time criteria," Browning said.

The iodine tests were an unscheduled part of site characterization work at Hanford. The tests were done prior to drilling shafts to test the suitability of the host rock, 3,200 feet below the surface.

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The US Department of Energy, as was reported last Saturday, has selected Stone and Webster Engineering Corp., of Boston, to provide technical and field services for the Salt Repository Project in Texas.

Stone and Webster will carry out site characterization and related support activities at a site in northern Deaf Smith County for a possible permanent, high-level nuclear waste repository. DOE is also characterizing sites in Nevada and Washington.

The Stone and Webster work will

cost up to \$320 million over an initial three-year contract period, with seven, one-year optional extensions.

According to a DOE news release Monday, Stone and Webster will plan, organize, conduct and report on studies of the site. The studies will include geotechnical, environmental, socioeconomic and engineering studies.

DOE expects Stone and Webster to locate "several hundred employees in Amarillo during the peak of site characterization activities."

Stone and Webster employees should begin moving to the region in late summer.

Stone and Webster has already done some work in the area in connection with the project, and beat out Westinghouse for the site characterization work.

Westinghouse is the contractor for the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant, a repository for low- and intermediate-level military nuclear waste near Carlsbad, N.M.

New mines are found

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Four mines were discovered today in the Gulf of Oman, fueling fears that mine attacks may spread beyond the Persian Gulf. The United States agreed to join in an urgent search for the explosives, sources said.

A diplomatic source said the Sultanate of Oman had appealed for Washington's help in clearing the coastal waters just south of the Strait of Hormuz.

The Americans "have agreed, and are already helping," said the source, who spoke on condition of anonymity. He offered no details of what actions were being taken.

In a related development, a convoy of three Kuwaiti tankers escorted by U.S. Navy warships resumed its voyage through the Persian Gulf following a 24-hour delay to allow mine-search teams to check its intended route. Barring any new delays, the convoy was expected to reach Kuwait later today, shipping sources said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

Reagan administration sources and published reports said a U.S. Navy jet in the Persian Gulf area fired two missiles at a suspected Iranian jet fighter that appeared to be threatening a U.S. surveillance plane last weekend. The missiles did not strike anything, they said. Iran did not comment on the incident.

A ship anchored offshore near the United Arab Emirates port of Fujairah reported sighting a mine in the water today, according to gulf-based shipping sources. Hours earlier, an Oman navy scout helicopter had spotted three other mines nearby.

The 274,347-ton supertanker Texaco Caribbean struck a mine on Monday near Fujairah, the first mining of a ship in the Gulf of Oman.

The discovery of mines in the busy waters leading to the Persian Gulf indicated a new peril for shipping companies. It also appeared to raise the stakes for Washington's reflagging operation, since the U.S. Navy assembles its convoys of Kuwaiti tankers in the Gulf of Oman.

The Reagan administration agreed to reflag 11 Kuwaiti tankers to protect them from Iranian attacks. Tehran charges that Kuwait aids Iraq, Iran's enemy in the 7-year-old Gulf war.

At least five ships have been damaged by mines since the Iran-Iraq war spread to the Persian Gulf 3½ years ago. More than 300 ships have been attacked in attempts by the warring nations to hurt their foe's economy.

The origin of the mines was not clear. Some shipping experts said they may have been planted by Iran, or drifted from the Strait of Hormuz, where Iran conducted military exercises last week.

However, a shipping official based in Kuwait said coastal currents move from the Gulf of Oman toward Hormuz in this season.

The voyage of the first U.S.-escorted convoy was marred when a mine near Iran's Farsi Island damaged the tanker Bridgeton last month.

As many as 50 tankers, plus several foreign warships, were in the anchorage off the United Arab Emirates Monday when an explosion tore into the 274,347-ton supertanker Texaco Caribbean in the first known mine attack in the area.

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County opens computer bids

Deaf Smith County Commissioners Monday opened bids for a mainframe computer system, approved a Hereford Senior Citizen Association request for funding, approved a Precinct 1 request to cross a county road with a gas line, and discussed warrants on jail construction.

Bids on the computer system ranged from \$58,960 to \$83,516. Each company offered options on the systems, and each quoted a monthly lease-purchase figure. On a five-year payout, bids ranged from \$1,430 a month without maintenance contracts to \$2,850 with the contracts.

Commissioners decided that courthouse personnel who would be using the system should study the bids and make a recommendation. County Judge Tom Simons appointed David Ruland, county clerk; Nell Miller, tax assessor-collector; Vesta Mae Nunley, treasurer; Alex Schroeter, auditor; and Paul Mason, consultant, to the committee. Simons anticipates the commissioners could make a decision in September.

The court had discussed putting the county clerk's office and the tax assessor-collector's office on the computer system, while installing a

system that could later be expanded to add other departments. The county is currently spending about \$1,500 a month for outside computer support.

Margie Daniels, Senior Citizens' director, appeared at the meeting to request funding support for a bilingual worker at the Senior Citizen Center. Commissioner Austin Rose made a motion that the center be given \$2,500 from interest accrued on revenue sharing funds. Bill Brady seconded and the court approved the action.

Judge Simons reported that several problems had arisen at the new jail building and the contractors had not responded to his inquiries. The roof is leaking in several places, and the overhead garage doors are not operating properly, explained the judge. Commissioners asked Simons to have the district attorney send a letter to the contractor, and that estimates on repairing the garage doors be sought.

In other business, the court approved payment of bills and regular monthly reports. An agenda item on industrial foundation funding was tabled. All four commissioners were present for the meeting, which adjourned at noon.

The agenda includes an auditors report, current operating report, an update on bonds and an executive session to discuss personnel.

Local sales tax decreases

The state comptroller's office Friday sent checks totaling \$99.7 million in local sales tax payments to the 1,034 cities that levy the one-percent city tax. Hereford's payment for June was \$59,849, a decrease of about \$6,000 over the same month a year ago.

Comptroller Bob Bullock said the monthly allocations were down 7.4 percent from the same period a year ago. Houston received the largest check, \$16 million, and Dallas was next at \$11.5 million. Both totals for the year-to-date have decreased over the 1986 totals—Houston's by 8.4 percent and Dallas' by 7.5 percent.

Hereford's 1987 payments total \$369,933 as compared to \$416,974 a year ago. That represents a decrease of 11.2 percent.

Other area cities, with year-to-date totals and difference from a year ago: Dimmitt \$98,890, down 22.7 percent; Pampa, \$799,083, down 18.5 percent; Plainview \$769,746, down 4.5 percent; Borger \$600,539, down 11 percent; Levelland \$414,832, down 19.6 percent; Littlefield, \$163,629, down 4.6 percent; Dumas \$382,770, down 11.5 percent; Perryton \$341,228, down 17.5 percent; Amarillo \$7.7 million, down 4.7 percent.

Area gets welcome rains

The first beneficial rainfall in a month fell over the region Saturday night and Monday morning, with some portions of the Hereford area getting over three inches of rain.

Officially, Hereford picked up two inches Saturday night and another .11 Monday at KPAN.

Unofficial reports from the area included three inches just east of Dawn; 1.5 inch Saturday, .30 inch Monday and .50 inch Tuesday morning at Easter Grain; an inch Saturday and .60 inch Monday at Bruegel Brothers Gin and Elevator at Frio; 2.3 inches recorded by Dan Hall in Walcott; 1.5 inches at Northwest Grain and Fertilizer in Milo Center; and 3.3 inches six miles south of Milo Center.

The forecast is calling for a 30 percent chance of thunderstorms tonight with a low of 68. South winds will be 5 to 10 mph.

Wednesday should be partly cloudy with a 20 percent chance of thunderstorms and a high of 92. South wind will be 5 to 15 mph. Tuesday's low was 83 in Hereford after a high Monday of 83.

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There are many things we use and do in the newspaper business that you might find interesting. If it's not interesting, don't read it. Remember new math? Remember how we all thought we'd never use it, especially counting in different bases? Wrong. We count in base 6 and base 12 every day in the newspaper business. In newspaper mathematics, we use picas and points. If you want to make a traditional newspaper man gag, just talk to him in inches. There are six picas in an (kaff, kaff) inch, and 144 points in an inch. If you measure something in (garg) inches, you just use base six to determine picas and base 12 for points. I didn't understand it in the seventh grade, and I don't understand it now, but I can make it work. Of course, inches are also base 12, so it's easy, but there are never any one-sixth marks on a ruler. As many of you have already surmised, there are dummies, in abundance, at all newspapers, whether it's the Earth Weekly News or the New York Times. The most widely-used dummy is a page dummy. Bork claims Baker didn't question views

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supreme Court nominee Robert H. Bork says no one in the Reagan administration asked him about his legal views or his positions on specific issues when he was interviewed for the high court's vacancy. Responding to a questionnaire from the Senate Judiciary Committee, Bork said he was interviewed by President Reagan, chief of staff Howard Baker and the counsel to the president, A.B. Culvahouse. Bork's responses, released Monday, also show he was a member of an all-male club in New York City until 1965. Bork said he resigned after a dispute arose over whether the club was practicing sex discrimination.

law firm was not involved in such activities. The American Bar Association's Code of Professional Responsibility calls for "every lawyer, regardless of professional prominence or professional workload, to find some time to participate in serving the disadvantaged." —His typical clients while in private practice were business organizations, varying from nationally known companies to small local firms. He specialized in constitutional law and antitrust cases. —He tried no cases to verdict or judgment, because his work was almost entirely arguments of legal motions or arguments before appellate courts.

The Judiciary Committee begins hearings Sept. 15 on Bork's nomination to succeed retired Justice Lewis F. Powell. In other answers to the questionnaire, Bork said: —As a Yale Law School professor, solicitor general of the United States, and his current position as a U.S. appellate judge in Washington, Bork acknowledged he hired few blacks. Women were mostly in clerical or support jobs. —While in private practice from 1964-62, he did not participate in programs for free legal representation of the disadvantaged, because his

Describing his meetings at the White House, Bork said Baker telephoned him July 1 and asked him to meet with the president. "At the White House there was a discussion about procedures with Sen. Baker, A.B. Culvahouse and others. No substantive issues were discussed," Bork said. "I then had a meeting with President Reagan in his office. Sen. Baker and others were present. Again, no substantive issues were discussed." Bork also was asked whether anyone involved in selecting him discussed any specific case, legal issue or question that could be interpreted as seeking "implied assurances" on his position in future court cases. "No one involved... has discussed any case, legal issue or question in any way that could be interpreted as seeking any express or implied assurances concerning my position on such matters," Bork said. In a financial net worth statement, Bork and his wife, Mary Ellen, listed assets of \$1,185,610, of which \$569,000 was in real estate and \$500,000 the market value of Bork's pension plan. Liabilities totaled \$205,126, all in real estate mortgages.

Saragosa scars won't heal soon

AUSTIN (AP) — It could take a long time to heal the emotional scars of the survivors of the Saragosa tornado, says an Austin child psychiatrist. A May 22 tornado killed 30 of the town's 350 residents and injured 160. Dr. Robert Dobyns said people in disasters routinely "walk around wondering what to do next. And, the last thing they're worrying about is mental health." Dobyns, who grew up in the Saragosa area, is helping the Catholic Church train lay ministers "who can help the community heal from the inside out," according to Texas Medicine. "People need to be aware of this for the next 10 to 15 years," Dobyns said. "There is going to be a school of thought that says I'm making a mountain out of a molehill...People who play like it never happened will pay a terrible price." Teresa Gonzales, a coordinator with the Reeves County mental Health Center, agrees the "coming down period has not happened yet." The tornado, with estimated wind

speeds of 207 to 260 mph, touched down about a mile southwest of the Reeves County town and proceeded directly through its heart, according to Texas Medicine. The magazine of the Texas Medical Association reviewed the medical response to Saragosa in its August issue. It said the injured and dying were taken 30 miles north to the Reeves County Hospital at pecos, a 62-bed facility. The doctors' lounge became a temporary morgue. Two doctors came from Monahans and six from Odessa to help local physicians, said Dr. Won-Joo Bang, a surgeon who has practiced in Pecos for 13 years. Patients began arriving at 8:30 p.m., and the hospital staff administered emergency care until 3 a.m. the next day. Niney-three victims sought assistance at the hospital. Iris Rives, assistant hospital administrator, said, "Teamwork by all" is the best way to describe how we were able to help the victims of the Saragosa tornado.

Delta jet just misses small plane

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A Delta 727 jet narrowly missed colliding with a small plane about 20 miles northwest of Fort Worth, the Federal Aviation Administration says. FAA spokesman Mitch Barker said Delta Flight 124, enroute to Dallas-Fort Worth Airport from Albuquerque, N.M., was at an altitude of 7,000 feet over Rhame, Texas at 1 p.m. Monday when it came within about 100 feet vertically and 300 feet horizontally of hitting a single-engine Cessna 172. "According to the information we have, the Delta jet took evasive action with a hard right turn to avoid a collision," Barker told the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

Delta spokesman Jim Lundy said there were no injuries. He said he did not know how many people were aboard the jet with a seating capacity of about 150 passengers. Barker said both planes were flying under visual flight rules because visibility was relatively good. Jim Howden, manager of the FAA Fort Worth Center, said the small plane was not in contact with air traffic controllers. The Delta jet was being directed toward the airport at the time of the incident. "We don't have a whole lot of the particulars right now, but from listening to the tapes of the conversations, we (controllers) had told the Delta pilot that he had traffic in his area," Howden said. The jet was at a transition point, Howden said, meaning that control of the jet was being handed from Fort Worth Center controllers to airport controllers. The Fort Worth Center is responsible for handling airplanes over much of the state, but the D-FW tower and radar approach controls the airspace within a 20-mile radius of the airport. Control of the jet had not yet been turned over to airport controllers at the time of the incident, an airport tower spokesman said. There have been about a dozen incidents in recent weeks in which Delta jets and flight crews experienced malfunctions, mistakes and near mishaps.

condition he was not identified. Pentagon sources said the U.S.-escorted convoy halted off the coast of Saudi Arabia Sunday after a mine was spotted. After an investigation did not turn up more explosives, the convoy resumed its 550-mile voyage Monday, the Pentagon sources said, speaking on condition of anonymity. Correspondent Bruce Sadler of the British Independent Television Network said in a telephone report that the convoy had formed a single line about 6 miles long, led by the guided missile frigate Crommelin. It was followed by the 81,283-ton tanker Sea Isle City, the frigate Jarrett, then two more tankers, the 79,999-ton Ocean City and the 46,723-ton Gas King. A third warship

brought up the rear and a fourth was moving in circles around the convoy, he reported. Observers said helicopters were leading and following the procession, apparently scanning the waters for mines. Reagan administration sources provided few details about the Navy jet's firing on the suspected Iranian plane, which apparently took place in or near the Persian Gulf. The sources said a Navy P-3 Orion surveillance plane reported several planes were approaching it. Navy F-14 jet fighters attached to the aircraft carrier Constellation were immediately sent to the area and "it appeared that the targets were threatening the P-3," the sources said.

Verity says his ideas won't hurt

WASHINGTON (AP) — Retired steel executive C. William Verity Jr.'s outspoken advocacy of closer U.S.-Soviet economic ties should not hamper his chances for quick Senate confirmation as Commerce secretary, say national business leaders. President Reagan on Monday announced his intention to nominate Verity, 70, to succeed the late Malcolm Baldrige. "Mac's boots will be tough to fill, but I have every confidence that Bill will ably pursue the policies this administration has developed over the past 6 1/2 years," Reagan said. Baldrige died July 25 after he was thrown from his horse while practicing for a rodeo on a friend's ranch in northern California. While Verity declined to answer reporters' questions on specific issues, Reagan said the former head of Arco Inc. "supports ongoing efforts to keep vital technology from falling into the hands of our adversaries."

Verity has been active in efforts to expand trade with the Soviet Union, complaining in the past that U.S. restrictions on East-West commerce have harmed U.S. businesses. He is past co-chairman of the U.S.-U.S.S.R. Trade and Economic Council, a private organization of American and Soviet executives formed to bolster trade. Verity, who retired as chairman and president of Arco in 1982, drew strong support Monday from the nation's business community. Richard Leshner, president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, said he does not believe Verity's calls for liberalized trade with the Soviets will interfere with his Senate confirmation. "That's really the policy of this country, opening markets. It's in the best interest of this country," said Leshner. He called Verity "a friend of the chamber and a friend of business." Verity was chairman of the chamber in 1980-81.

ULCER MYTHS

WEST POINT, Pa. (AP) — Myths about ulcers can lead people to avoid seeing doctors and instead to diagnose and treat themselves, sometimes delaying needed medical help, according to Merck Sharp & Dohme Research Laboratories.

The firm, developer of Pepcid, a new drug approved to treat the most common form of ulcers, says it's a myth some people have "ulcer personalities." In fact, all kinds of people get ulcers. And, while it was once widely believed that mostly men get ulcers, in the 1980s, women in about equal numbers get them, too.

Further, the commonly held notion that spicy foods cause ulcers has never been scientifically proven. And, though many people think milk and bland foods are good for ulcers, while they may ease ulcer pain temporarily, they can also stimulate production of excess stomach acid.

Also, it's not necessarily true that when pain is gone, an ulcer is healed. Treatment may ease pain in days. But ulcer healing usually takes four to eight weeks.

Graham crackers are easy to make

DEAR POLLY — Do you have a recipe for making graham crackers at home? — ALICE

DEAR ALICE — Here, from the pages of "Country Journal," is a recipe for Maple Graham Crackers. If you like, you may use an equal measure of honey for the maple syrup.

Combine 1 1/2 cups whole-wheat flour, 1 1/2 cups unbleached flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt, tossing together with your hands. In a separate bowl, lightly beat together 1/2 cup maple syrup, 1/2 cup melted butter and 1 egg. Make a well in the dry ingredients, then add the liquids. Work with your hands until the dough sticks together. Dust dough and work surface lightly with flour, then roll dough 1/4 inch thick. Cut into desired shapes. Transfer the crackers to an ungreased baking sheet using a spatula or baker's scraper. Bake approximately 15 minutes in a preheated 375-degree oven.

It was followed by the 81,283-ton tanker Sea Isle City, the frigate Jarrett, then two more tankers, the 79,999-ton Ocean City and the 46,723-ton Gas King. A third warship

brought up the rear and a fourth was moving in circles around the convoy, he reported.

Reagan administration sources provided few details about the Navy jet's firing on the suspected Iranian plane, which apparently took place in or near the Persian Gulf.

The sources said a Navy P-3 Orion surveillance plane reported several planes were approaching it. Navy F-14 jet fighters attached to the aircraft carrier Constellation were immediately sent to the area and "it appeared that the targets were threatening the P-3," the sources said.

Verity says his ideas won't hurt

WASHINGTON (AP) — Retired steel executive C. William Verity Jr.'s outspoken advocacy of closer U.S.-Soviet economic ties should not hamper his chances for quick Senate confirmation as Commerce secretary, say national business leaders.

President Reagan on Monday announced his intention to nominate Verity, 70, to succeed the late Malcolm Baldrige.

"Mac's boots will be tough to fill, but I have every confidence that Bill will ably pursue the policies this administration has developed over the past 6½ years," Reagan said.

Baldrige died July 25 after he was thrown from his horse while practicing for a rodeo on a friend's ranch in northern California.

While Verity declined to answer reporters' questions on specific issues, Reagan said the former head of Armco Inc. "supports ongoing efforts to keep vital technology from falling into the hands of our adversaries."

Verity has been active in efforts to expand trade with the Soviet Union, complaining in the past that U.S. restrictions on East-West commerce have harmed U.S. businesses. He is past co-chairman of the U.S.-U.S.S.R. Trade and Economic Council, a private organization of American and Soviet executives formed to bolster trade.

Verity, who retired as chairman and president of Armco in 1982, drew strong support Monday from the nation's business community.

Richard Leshner, president of the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, said he does not believe Verity's calls for liberalized trade with the Soviets will interfere with his Senate confirmation.

"That's really the policy of this country, opening markets. It's in the best interest of this country," said Leshner. He called Verity "a friend of the chamber and a friend of business."

Verity was chairman of the chamber in 1980-81.

Bork claims Baker didn't question views

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supreme Court nominee Robert H. Bork says no one in the Reagan administration asked him about his legal views or his positions on specific issues when he was interviewed for the high court's vacancy.

Responding to a questionnaire from the Senate Judiciary Committee, Bork said he was interviewed by President Reagan, chief of staff Howard Baker and the counsel to the president, A.B. Culvahouse.

Bork's responses, released Monday, also show he was a member of an all-male club in New York City until 1965. Bork said he resigned after a dispute arose over whether the club was practicing sex discrimination.

The Judiciary Committee begins hearings Sept. 15 on Bork's nomination to succeed retired Justice Lewis F. Powell.

The Reagan administration often has been accused of applying a litmus test to judicial candidates by seeking out those who oppose abortion and favor such conservative-backed issues as prayer in the schools. The administration has denied such a test exists.

In Bork's case, however, his positions are well-known through hundreds of articles, speeches, and — since 1982 — his opinions as a judge on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia.

In other answers to the questionnaire, Bork said:

—As a Yale Law School professor, solicitor general of the United States, and his current position as a U.S. appellate judge in Washington, Bork acknowledged he hired few blacks. Women were mostly in clerical or support jobs.

—While in private practice from 1964-62, he did not participate in programs for free legal representation of the disadvantaged, because his

law firm was not involved in such activities. The American Bar Association's Code of Professional Responsibility calls for "every lawyer, regardless of professional prominence or professional workload, to find some time to participate in serving the disadvantaged."

—His typical clients while in private practice were business organizations, varying from nationally known companies to small local firms. He specialized in constitutional law and antitrust cases.

—He tried no cases to verdict or judgment, because his work was almost entirely arguments of legal motions or arguments before appellate courts.

Describing his meetings at the White House, Bork said Baker telephoned him July 1 and asked him to meet with the president.

"At the White House there was a discussion about procedures with Sen. Baker, A.B. Culvahouse and others. No substantive issues were discussed," Bork said.

"I then had a meeting with President Reagan in his office. Sen. Baker and others were present. Again, no substantive issues were discussed."

Bork also was asked whether anyone involved in selecting him discussed any specific case, legal issue or question that could be interpreted as seeking "implied assurances" on his position in future court cases.

"No one involved ... has discussed any case, legal issue or question in any way that could be interpreted as seeking any express or implied assurances concerning my position on such matters," Bork said.

In a financial net worth statement, Bork and his wife, Mary Ellen, listed assets of \$1,185,610, of which \$569,000 was in real estate and \$500,000 the market value of Bork's pension plan.

Liabilities totaled \$305,126, all in real estate mortgages.

In 6-5 win over Houston Astros

Giants' Clark continues killing blows

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Will Clark might have reached his power potential with his 25th home run of the season, a killing blow against the Houston Astros.

Candy Maldonado opened the bottom of the ninth inning with a homer, his first since coming off the disabled list on Friday, to tie the score and Clark gave the San Francisco Giants a 6-5 victory three pitches later Monday night.

"That's the longest homer I've ever hit. To hit one like that, you've got to have the adrenalin going and hit it just right. That's the kind of thing you dream of, winning like that in your last at-bat," Clark said.

The San Francisco first baseman, who hit only 11 homers last year as a rookie, swung at a pitch from reliever Dave Meads, 5-3, and took two steps toward first base before stopping. He joined the Giants' ecstatic fans in watching the baseball climb into Candlestick Park's upper deck in right field, then rounded the bases.

He got a big hug from Maldonado after touching home plate for the run which stretched the Giants' winning streak to five games and kept them one game behind first-place Cincinnati in the National League West. Houston, with a fourth straight loss,

fell four games behind.

"Before I went up to hit, I said to myself that I had to get on base so they wouldn't be able to pitch around Clark," said Maldonado, who now has 13 homers. "I knew if I got on, I would create a lot of pressure."

He created a tie, instead, and Manager Roger Craig remarked later, "What can I say? Candy is back."

Meads was trying to protect a 5-4 lead the Astros assumed on Billy Hatcher's double and Bill Doran's RBI single in the eighth.

"They both homered on fastballs. I

was behind on the count on Clark (2-1) and felt I had to come in with the fastball," Meads said.

Clark's game-winning drive, which probably would have gone 500 feet if the seats hadn't stopped it, was his sixth homer in eight games. The first five helped him win the National League Player of the Week award for the Aug. 3-9 period.

"That was a great honor in itself," Clark said. "But it was something I stopped thinking about once this game started."

Ken Caminiti, the Houston rookie from nearby San Jose, drove in three

runs with a double and his third homer as the Astros built an early 4-0 lead.

The Giants pulled into a 4-4 tie with a run in the fifth and three in the seventh. Eddie Milner homered in the seventh and Maldonado and Bob Brenly had RBI doubles.

Lendl has had an easy time of it at the Volvo so far, advancing to Friday's quarterfinals by defeating Robert Seguso, Jim Pugh and Marc Flur.

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — A judge considering a community service sentence for actor George Kennedy for drunken and careless driving charges found the actor a real gentleman.

"He's gonna come back at his own expense," Judge Tom Florina said Wednesday, when he deferred sentencing to review the case. "Kennedy says he'll come back whenever we want him."

"The one thing I can say is that he's a hell of a guy. He's just a gentleman."

Kennedy, 63, was arrested July 14 while he was in Santa Fe filming a made-for-television movie, "The Gambler III," with Kenny Rogers.

Kennedy refused to take a blood-alcohol test when he was pulled over that night while driving a car without headlights, authorities said. Nine days later, he entered a no contest plea to drunken driving and a guilty plea to careless driving.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Archie Campbell, a regular on the "Hee Haw" television show, has been moved from the coronary care unit and into a regular hospital room, officials said.

Campbell, 72, is recovering from a June 15 heart attack and was listed in

serious condition Thursday at the University of Tennessee's medical center, said spokeswoman Lisa McNeal.

Campbell's family has asked that there be no visitors or flowers, but said that the country musician-comedian appreciates the cards he has received, Ms. McNeal said.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn. (AP) — Miss America Kelye Cash is defending the pageant's swimsuit competition, saying the contest is designed to show self-discipline in diet and exercise, not to display skin.

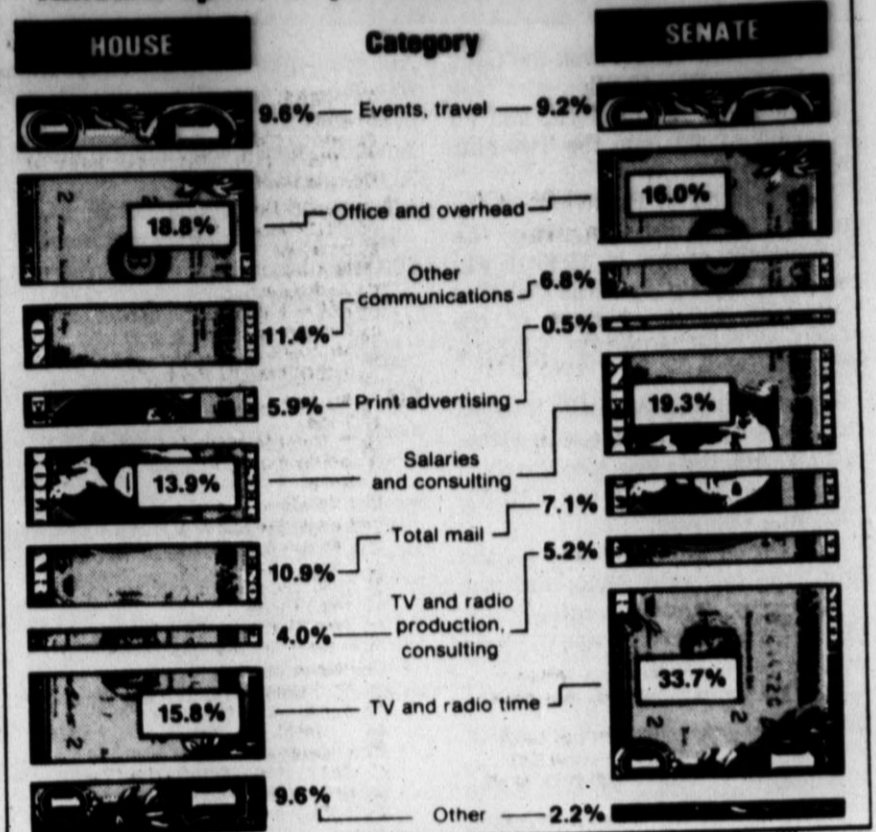
"The swimsuits worn in the pageant are very conservative. I'd never wear one on the beach," she told a news conference Thursday.

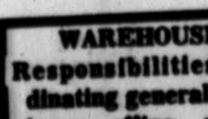

DR. GOTT Surgery can help end hand problem

DEAR DR. GOTT — The middle finger of my right hand has pulled down into the palm. One doctor said it was carpal tunnel syndrome. Another doctor said it was Dupuytren's contracture. Who is right? What is the appropriate treatment?

DEAR READER — I believe that you have Dupuytren's contracture. This is a disorder of unknown cause in which tissue contracts around the finger-flexing tendons of the hand. As the contractions progress, the tendons themselves become foreshortened, causing the fingers to flex on the palm. The fourth and fifth fingers are most commonly affected, the third less often, the index finger and thumb never.

Dupuytren's contracture is a harmless but bothersome condition. If the finger flexion advances, a standard operation to release the tendons can be performed.

Carpal tunnel syndrome, the presence of a constricting band which pinches nerves at the wrist, almost always causes pain and tingling in the hand. To prevent muscle weakness from nerve malfunction, surgeons usually advise patients to have the wristband severed. This, too, is a fairly standard operation.

In your case, the simple flexing of one finger is most likely due to Dupuytren's, so you can elect to have it repaired at a time convenient for you and your doctor.

DEAR DR. GOTT — When I was in school, learning how to write, a favorite teacher remarked, "Every time I see you write, my stomach does a flip-flop." You see, I'm left-handed. Seldom do I write my name but someone makes a comment like, "Oh, a south-paw" or "a lefty." I'm getting increasingly sensitive to these observations and my writing is suffering. Do you have any suggestions?

DEAR READER — I never thought much about the name-calling to which left-handed people are subjected. As a "rightie," I was never exposed to this type of condescension.

Although our society is geared to right-handed individuals, there seems to be less criticism of the perfectly normal biological preference of left-handedness today. Years ago, parents made quite an issue out of changing left-handed children into the more "socially acceptable" right-handed variety. This doesn't happen much anymore — and I'm glad, because

trying to change handedness to the non-dominant side produced children with a wide range of behavioral abnormalities, including feelings of isolation and shattered self-confidence.

People are often insensitive about criticizing others. Since left-handedness is completely normal, your best approach is to ignore people who comment about something that's normal for you. Don't let their observations get under your skin. It's OK to be left-handed; their insensitivity is their problem.

You can improve your writing by practice, or you may wish to enroll in a penmanship class. Such programs are often available through high schools or colleges. How you write is less important than making what you read legible. Most doctors are right-handed and have lousy handwriting. With a little perseverance — and confidence — you can refine your script.

A typical nurse's day

Mr. B is having a reaction to his blood transfusion. Mrs. C has a blood pressure of 220/160. Mr. D has a blood sugar of 700. Mr. and Mrs. E and F are two new patients who I haven't even begun to admit. Mrs. G has to be prepped for emergency surgery. Mr. H has a newly discovered pulmonary embolism and must be started on an IV. Mrs. I and

Mr. J's IVs both infiltrated and they must be restarted. Mrs. K and L are lying in soiled beds.

Meanwhile, doctors are giving me new orders, families are calling to inquire about relatives and Mr. M., who is 95 and confused, has gotten out of his restraints and is wandering around the hospital somewhere.

To anyone who is tempted to complain about a nurse, keep in mind that this is a typical night. Please give us a break. We do the best we can. Unfortunately the most stable patients get less time. If I had had five extra minutes I would have loved to visit with you. Your letter complaining about my performance made me feel awful. I truly am sorry you felt I gave you less than my best. Thanks for listening, Ann. I feel

better now.—Akron, O.

DEAR AKRON: Happy to give you a platform. I hope the Mr. X's all over the globe see your letter and learn something.

It will come as no surprise to you that the nursing profession is in trouble. Small wonder. I know of no career that pays so little and demands so much. Any honest physician will tell you that the nurses are the backbone of the medical services in this country. God bless them.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: I read that line in your column, "When an old person dies, it is like a library burning down," and knew at once that I had to write.

A reader suggested that instead of

complaining about garrulous old people repeating the same tiresome stories, the children or grandchildren should take out a tape recorder and preserve, for all time, those wonderful tales.
