Jury selection begins in sexual abuse trial

Jury selection was scheduled to begin today in 222nd District Court in Hereford in the aggravated sexual assault case of a former Hereford school teacher.

Ana Marie Bautista, 26, of Hereford, is on trial for aggravated sexual assault stemming from incidences involving an 11-year-old boy who was a former student of Bautista.

Bautista, who had been a fourth grade teacher at Shirley Elementary School, resigned her position last May when the boy's mother complained to Texas Department of Human Resources workers.

Shirley principal John Dominguez, at the time of Bautista's arrest on the charges, said he had been contacted by Barbara Geiger, a former TDHR worker in Hereford, who said "she had a mother in her office who was complaining about a teacher who had written some notes to her son."

Dominguez said he had not seen the notes and was not told what they contained. Dominguez said that when he questioned Bautista, his sister-in-law, she told him the notes were "just asking him how he liked school this year."

Dominguez advised the teacher not to write any more notes to the boy

and to stay away from the boy. Dominguez said he was not aware of the rest of the allegations until he received a call from then-Superintendent Dr. Harrell Holder.

Jury selection was scheduled to begin at 9:30 a.m. today, and District Attorney Roland Saul said several pre-trial motions will be heard today, which may delay the start of testimony until Wednesday.

Saul also said the child will be called to testify in the case.

Originally, the boy's testimony was going to be videotaped and played back in the court, but a recent Court of Criminal Appeals decision ruled the practice unconstitutional.

WDIC scrambling for contract renewal

Members of the Waste Deposit Impact Committee will travel to Austin Oct. 28 to visit with members of Gov. Bill Clements staff in an attempt to revive funding for WDIC as soon as possible after its contract was terminated by the Texas Department of Public Safety last

week in a "logistics move" by Clements.

While the Texas Nuclear Waste Programs Office handled most of the state's work concerning the possible siting of a permanent, high-level nuclear waste repository in northern

Deaf Smith County, the NWFO and contracts were a part of the DPS Division of Emergency Management.

NWFO is being transferred to the governor's office on Nov. 1, and contracts with WDIC and other groups, including the Swisher-

Castro-Parmer Repository Assessment Commission, will be terminated effective Nov. 13.

In a letter to Deaf Smith County Judge Tom Simons, Robert Lansford, state coordinator for the Division of Emergency Management, said that a "thorough management review of the nuclear waste program is underway and that all future contracts with the governor's office will be renegotiated on a case-by-case basis."

WDIC has been requested to submit a report on the work it has already accomplished, and will be required to re-submit its 1988 work plan and budget to the Governor's Director of State Affairs, Rich Thomas.

Phillip Niedzielaki-Eichner, WDIC's executive director, said that the "governor's office was not aware

of the structure of WDIC, and we need to impress them with documentation of our work plan."

The work plan will contain a more detailed description of WDIC's plans for the coming year, a preliminary draft of an agricultural study being prepared by Gerald McCathern, and an outline of socioeconomic studies to be performed by Dr. Steve Murdock, a Texas A&M University professor who has performed similar studies for nuclear-related areas in the past.

Most of WDIC's work plan is unchanged from the plan submitted to the state in September, when a \$470,000 contract was finally approved after considerable paring by Danny Smith, acting chief of the NWFO.

The original contract was for \$975,000, but Eichner said Smith was

"not comfortable with parts of the work plan. We had originally intended to seek additional grants for those studies after preparing more detailed descriptions of those parts of the work plan."

WDIC member John Fuston said he was concerned with the contract cancellation and shift in the program because "we already had a contract in hand. I hope this is not a political ballgame by Gov. Clements at the expense of the citizens of Deaf Smith County."

"We are going to try to get this handled as smoothly as possible," said WDIC Chairman Troy Don Moore. "They have said it was a 'logistics thing.' I would hope they would pick up from where they were because there has been a lot of money already spent to collect data from several areas."

City okays SPS franchise reading

On the third try, the Hereford City Commission approved Monday the first reading of a proposed new franchise agreement with Southwestern Public Service Company.

On the advice of City Attorney Ernest Langley, the commission had declined to approve the proposed new franchise because of problems with some of the provisions of the new franchise.

Langley met three times in the past two weeks with local SPS manager Troy Waddell concerning the three percent gross receipts tax collected by the company that is, in turn, remitted to the city, and language concerning indemnity to the city in case of an accident in-

volving utility poles and other equipment owned by SPS.

Waddell received approval for the changes from SPS division manager Larry Fuller of Amarillo, and the commission approved the first reading of the amended agreement.

The franchise agreement must be read twice more before going into effect. The new agreement will be good for 10 years.

The commission also adopted a resolution urging Hereford voters to support Proposition 19 in the election on constitutional amendments on Nov. 3.

The proposition would allow the state to issue \$500 million in bonds to pay for land and improvements if Texas lands the Superconducting

Super Collider.

The resolution points out that the SSC, if a site in Texas southeast of Hereford or in Ellis county is the final choice, would bring 4,500 construction jobs, 2,500 permanent jobs, 5,600 jobs at businesses related to the SSC, and 14,500 jobs in the retail and service sectors.

It could bring \$20 billion a year in federal funds and economic impact to the state.

The commission also accepted a bid of \$12,423.50 from Stevens Chevrolet-Olds of Hereford for a new, four-wheel drive pickup for the water production department; awarded the annual janitorial service bid, for \$550 per month, to Martha Nation of Hereford; re-elected Tom LeGate to the Deaf Smith County Appraisal District Board; and named Bill Liles and Bill Bookout to the Board of Adjustments and Bill Bankston, Doug Bartlett, Mark Andrews and Arturo Gonzales to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

All but Gonzales and Bookout are reappointments. Gonzales will fill out the unexpired term of Bill Johnston, and Bookout will replace Jimmy Roberts.

They are members of the First United Methodist Church.

Jeryl Baker, a Hereford resident for eight years, has worked as an insurance agent and claims representative since 1983 at Lone Star Agency. Baker is chairman of the Chamber's Legislative Affairs Committee, vice president of the Hereford Lions Club, communication chairman for United Way of Deaf Smith County, supervisory chairman of the Hereford Federal Credit Union, and is a member of the choir at the First Baptist Church. He and his wife, Judy, have three children.

Jeff Brown, who moved to Hereford in 1982 to assume a position as vice president at Hereford State Bank, is a graduate of West Texas State University. He is active in Rotary, Big Brothers-Big Sisters, and the American Heart Association. He and his wife, Patti, are member of the First United Methodist Church.

Doug Josseland, a Hereford resident since 1971, is a vice president at First National Bank. He graduated from West Texas State University in 1982. 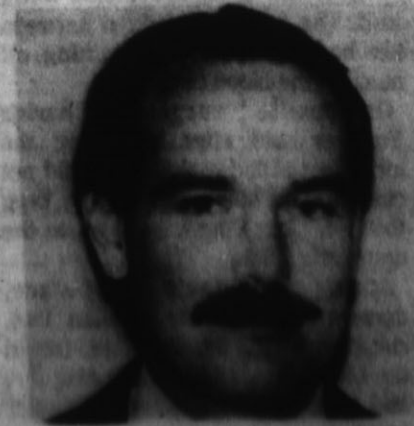

DALLAS (AP) — Paul Weisberg figures he's seen it all in the stock market. Easy come, easy go. That's how it works. He lived through 1929 as a teen, when his father lost everything. Now he's watching 1987 as a 73-year-old investor, confident it's not his turn.

Up the market runs, down it falls. Weisberg and his friends watch it all in a local brokerage office, playing checkers while peaking at the ticker. "It doesn't shake me up one bit," Weisberg said of Monday's violent 508-point plunge of the Dow Jones Industrial Average. "Every morning

I pinch myself and say, 'Made it to another day.' Tomorrow will be no different." "The market will come back." Easy come, easy go, indeed.

Around town, office workers tracked the fall Monday and traded tales of selling out at just the right time, or resisting the temptation to buy at what would have been the wrong time.

Some small investors said they expected the slide; some said they didn't care. Others just shrugged their shoulders and laughed at the losses. There was more black humor and bravado than crying in the streets. "You better watch out — people may start jumping out of those windows," said Jack Cook, who sold all his stock last January, joking to his friends at a downtown plaza. "I think this means times are going to be bad for another year and a half."

Bank failures should slow

DALLAS (AP) — U.S. commercial bank failures are expected to decline by about 25 percent during 1988 after reaching record levels this year, the head of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. says. About 200 banks are expected to fail by the end of 1987, costing the FDIC more than \$2 billion, L. William Seidman said in remarks prepared for a news conference today during the American Bankers Association annual convention.

So far this year, there have been a record 148 bank failures while 11 banks have needed federal assistance to stay afloat. That surpasses all of 1986, when 138 banks failed and seven needed assistance. "Our economy is in its 59th month of continuous expansion — the longest sustained period of peace time growth recorded in 133 years," Seidman later told a general session of the ABA in prepared remarks.

Seidman said Texas and Oklahoma banks represented about half of all failures this year, while banks in the Northeast were generally the healthiest. The FDIC, which insures deposits of up to 100,000 in federally chartered financial institutions, is expected to end the year with about \$18 billion, he said. In predicting a decline in bank failures next year, Seidman expressed optimism about economic growth. "The underlying factors in the economy show considerable strength," he said. "We don't see any near-term bursts of inflation. Unemployment is low. "We see nothing in the economy that gives us concern ... in the overall financial system."

Rescue helper fired from job

MIDLAND, Texas (AP) — A cook says he spent hours to help rescuers free 18-month-old Jessica McClure from an abandoned well and then found out he had been fired.

"When I called my boss Saturday morning, she told me I was fired," said Dave Kelly, who had been a cook for a Midland catering company called Foods Fantastic. "She told me not to bother to come back."

Kelly, 40, said Monday he received several other job offers, including one from a hamburger restaurant chain. He said Foods Fantastic owner Charlene Bunnell told him, "I understand your feelings at what was going on, but you don't care enough about the business."

Kelly said that Ms. Bunnell had arranged to cater an Exxon Corp. function for 60 people during the rescue drama, and he was the company's only cook. However, Douglas C. Bunnell, the husband of the Foods Fantastic owner, denied Kelly was fired because he took time out for the rescue work.

"His termination has nothing to do with his participation with the rescue," said Bunnell, a certified public accountant who described himself as the catering company's assistant manager.

A spokesman for the company, who refused to be identified, told The AP by phone that Kelly was terminated for cause.

"That termination for cause was confirmed with the Texas Employment Commission," said the spokesman. "The decision for termination was made prior to his participation in the rescue of (Jessica) McClure. But he had not been informed" before Saturday.

The rescue efforts involved as many as 200 police, paramedics, fire officials and other emergency personnel who worked for 58 hours before the toddler was rescued Friday evening. Some officials worked around the clock, but a police spokesman said Monday no overtime has yet been claimed.

"I understand none of the officers is putting in for any overtime," Midland police spokesman Cpl. Jim White said, adding that he worked 47 hours overtime and will not claim it.

"That's what little we could do for Jessica and it's hers. I imagine if the city wanted to give it to us, it would all go to the Jessica McClure fund," he said. Paramedics Robert O'Donnell and Steve Forbes who pulled Jessica from the narrow well shaft where she was wedged have said they will not claim their overtime. Both were on the clock when they were called in, so they will be paid for part of the time they were there, officials said. The Foods Fantastic spokesman said Kelly was invited to come into the office Saturday to discuss his

interest in continued employment but he did not show up. "He had told two employees here that he did not like his job here but was going to wait until he was fired to get unemployment compensation," the spokesman said.

Kelly, employed at the company for three months, said he recently received a \$1.50-an-hour raise and had heard only praise from his boss previously. Attached to his last paycheck was a note that read: "Thanks Dave," said Kelly.

He said that, at the well site last week, he passed signals to various crews and handled the air hose pumping fresh air into the cavity from Thursday through the rescue on Friday night. He was greeted at a Civic Center meeting Sunday by Forbes, the paramedic who brought the child to the surface.

At the gathering, Vice President George Bush congratulated Jessica's rescuers. Kelly approached the Republican presidential candidate to explain his plight but Bush apparently didn't hear a word the fired cook said, he complained.

"I briefly suggested I was the one tragedy — that I was over there working and lost my job as a result," Kelly said. "I don't think he really grasped what I just told him," he said. "He had his mind going in another direction."

MIDLAND, Texas (AP) — Doctors trying to save toddler Jessica McClure's injured right foot say her youth may be their biggest asset. "Children, babies like Jessica have great recuperative powers," vascular surgeon Shelton Viney said Monday at a news conference at Midland Memorial Hospital.

"Doctors have to learn to slow down and let the baby heal herself."

The 18-month-old's right foot was severely injured during her 58-hour entombment in an abandoned water well. The foot was wedged between her body and the well, cutting off much of the blood circulation.

Orthopedic surgeon Charles Younger said after inspecting the girl's foot Monday that he would not die odds on her being able to keep the foot, "but I think we're all on the optimistic side."

During Monday's procedure, doctors looked at the swollen foot, cut away a little dead skin and tested the blood circulation by injecting dye and using a device called a Doppler laser. Blood flow in the big toe and the

Reagan says Iran 'not stupid'

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan says Iran is not "stupid" enough to go to war with the United States after the Navy destroyed an Iranian military facility, but Senate Democrats are still pushing for a formal vote on Reagan's Persian Gulf policy.

The Democratic-controlled chamber was scheduled to vote today on a motion to halt a filibuster which has blocked floor action on a binding resolution which could set up a vote early next year on Reagan's gulf policy.

The Democrats, holding a 54-46 margin, need 60 votes to invoke cloture, the parliamentary device used to end a filibuster. Reagan said Monday the Iranian facility, a former oil platform standing in two separate sections, was "a command and control tower with radar and the ability to track shipping through the gulf."

He said the platform's destruction by U.S. ships was "an appropriate and proportionate response to their missile attack on a freighter, which wounded some of our people."

His reference was to Iran's Silkworm missile attack last week on one of the 11 Kuwaiti tankers flying the U.S. flag. The attack injured 18 crewmen, including one American, the ship's captain.

U.S. commandos on Monday also boarded another Iranian platform about six miles away from the first after seeing it being abandoned, the Pentagon said.

The commandos destroyed some radar and communications gear found at the platform, originally used for oil drilling and converted to military use, but made no effort to destroy the structure itself before leaving, officials said.

Fred Hoffman, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, disclosed the action about 6 1/2 hours after Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger announced that four U.S. Navy warships had destroyed the other Iranian sea platform.

Burrus was sixth in bull riding with a score of 83. McConnell placed fourth in pole bending with a time of 23.27 seconds, and Lewis finished 13th in goat tying in 14.379 seconds.

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
