#### **Gets probation**

## **Bautista** guilty of sexual abuse

A former Hereford school teacher was found guilty of aggravated sexual assault of a child and sentenced to eight years' probation by jurors in the 222nd District Court in Hereford Monday.

The teacher, 26-year-old Ana Marie Bautista, may also face revocation or suspension of her teaching certificate according to the Texas Education Agency.

Defense attorney Sam Ogan said he had not yet consulted with his client concerning an appeal but he expects that they will probably file an appeal on the verdict.

Ogan said that at one point jurors had advised that they were hung 11-1 on reaching a verdict, but that after further deliberation returned the guilty verdict. He complimented jurors on their attentiveness throughout the trial and expressed surprise at the light punishment handed down. "I was surprised they came back with probation. This was a first degree felony and this is the first time I have seen that happen in Hereford," he said.

Ogan added that other aspects of the case had been unusual in that it was the first case he had seen in which a woman was accused of raping a male child. "It is usually a man who has been charged with sexually assaulting a little girl and that aspect made this case different for me in that the usual medical evidence proving or disproving the charges was lacking," he said.

No action has been taken to remove or suspend Bautista's teaching certificate, according to George Dugger, director of programs for teacher certification with the Texas Education Agency.

"There are procedures for persons in the profession to report behavior which is in violation of our standards," he said. "Revocation or suspension of a teaching certificate is not automatic but the law does provide for denial of certification when a person has been convicted of a felony. The certification could be permanently revoked or suspended for a period of time as determined by the commissioner of education."

Dugger commented that the appropriate action would be for the school district to report the matter to the agency so an investigation could be conducted and a decision made concerning the future teaching career of Bautista.

## Hopper is Tech inductee

Those who see Dave Hopper this week may notice a changehe is proudly sporting a new belt buckle, awarded him Saturday as the newest inductee into the Texas Tech University Rodeo Hall of Fame.

Hopper was inducted into the hall at a ceremony held Saturday during the third round of the intercollegiate rodeo at the South Plains Fairgrounds in Lubbock.

Hopper's fame in Hereford is in relation to his success as president and manager of Champion Feeders, Inc., and his prowess on the tennis court; however, his past caught up with him on Saturday night.

Hopper was honored for his championship wins in 18 years of competion in junior, amateur, college and professional rodeo circuits as well as his community, civic, business and church involvement. He is the fourth former member of the Tech Rodeo Association to be honored. Others were Alvin Davis of Lubbock, B.F. Yeates of Bryan and Jack W. Buchanan of Big Spring.

"My first rodeo was the Post Junior Rodeo in 1951," Hopper said. "I had two or three friends that rodeoed some and I just decided to try it." Though he rode his first horse, he didn't win a prize in the first competition.

By his third competition Hopper said he was beginning to win and the wins continued. Hopper competed in the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA) and the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association

As a member of the Tech rodeo team he competed in Texas, New Mexico and Arizona. He earned three all-around titles and 14 championships in regional competion in bareback bronc riding, bull riding, and steer wrestling.

Hopper was the 1955 champion bareback bronc rider at the

NIRA finals and the NIRA southwest region champion bull rider in 1956. The next year he became the national intercollegiate champion bareback rider.

For 15 years Hopper competed on the PRCA circuit. Though he was a winner, Hopper said he couldn't have succeeded without the support of his wife of 29 years. "Joan has good staying power," he said. "It can't have been easy to follow me all over the country."

PRCA events carried Hopper to California, Alabama, Wyoming and most of the states between. He won bareback bronc riding championships in New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas and garnered top honors in bull riding in those states as well as Arkansas and Nebraska.

Hopper also judged a few rodeos in his time. Judging, he says, was not an honor. "It is not really a privilege to judge a rodeo because when you get hurt you can't compete and so you judge."

Injuries were not uncommon to the rodeo champion. He lists various broken bones, ruptured vertebrae, discs and concussions among the price he paid for his rodeo wins. The injuries finally caught up with Hopper and he decided to retire to a less hazardous career. "Rodeo is a young man's sport and I just got too old," he said.

A native of Marathon, Hopper grew up in Lubbock, and moved to Hereford to work for a feed processing plant. He then became a mill supervisor for Easley Feedyards and learned the cattle business through various other jobs in the industry.

He and his wife, a teacher at Tierra Blanca Elementary, have one daughter, Robin, who is a junior at the University of Texas where she is a pre-med major.

Hereford, Hopper has been an ordained deacon for over 20 years. He has also served as a director for boards of the local YMCA and Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce.

Hopper was a charter member of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association and has served on the board of directors as well as a committee member for the National Cattleman's Association. He has also served on the board of directors for the Red Raider Club and on the advisory board

for the Tech Rodeo Association. He is a member of the Century Club of Texas Tech Ex-Students Association.

Though he doesn't ride broncs anymore, Hopper is still an active athlete. He traded his spurs for a tennis racket and is enjoying some success as an amateur competitor. He and partner Jerry Morgan recently were the area winners of the Volvo Tennis League tournament and competed in the Texas Sectional tournament in Dallas.

Raps allegations in Amarillo articles

## Deaf Smith D.A. defends actions

"Hereford and the Hispanics" is the title of an eight-part series being published in The Amarillo Globe-News and Amarillo Daily News, and the introductory statement Sunday pointed to "simmering resentment over alleged discrimination against Hispanics in Hereford."

Thanks to the articles so far, says Mayor Wes Fisher, the resentment is no longer simmering and much of it comes from local citizens-Anglo and Hispanic-who are tired of reading the same complaints over and over again from a minority of citizens who are upset because of the stiff penalities and fines assessed as the result of a big drug bust in January

The articles "serve no purpose other than to encourage discrimination," Fisher said Monday afternoon. "I don't believe that it's the people of Amarillo, as such, who are constantly trying to do a number on Hereford.

I think it's totally the responsibility of the Amarillo Globe-News using young, ambitious, liberal reporters who don't live in our community."

Fisher said the only way he knows to strike back is to "cancel my subscription to The Globe-News, and it will be interesting to see how many other citizens of Hereford do the same."

Roland Saul, criminal district attorney, was the prime subject of the articles Tuesday. "For some reason, the Amarillo paper has seen fit to drag it all up again," said Saul. "Not only are they talking about allegations that I have been fully cleared of, they are very inaccurate and even reporting some things that I was never even accused of."

Saul said the Amarillo media "blew some allegations out of proportion four years ago and made a big deal out of some unsupported allegations. A McCarthy-like in-

# Clements' popularity fading

Gov. Bill Clements, his image tarnished by a record tax increase and an athletics pay-for-play scandal, received a 72 percent disapproval rating in a poll published today that showed he also fell from favor among many Republicans.

Of those Texans who have an opinion on Clements' performance, only 26 percent think he is doing a good or excellent job, the telephone survey conducted for the Dallas Morning News and the Houston Chronicle

Sixty-one percent of Republicans who responded also gave Clements a poor or only fair rating.

Poll results were published in opyright stories in both

pected candidate for governor in 1990, is well-known among voters. But the poll also showed his negative image to be higher than his fellow Democrats in the survey.

State Treasurer Ann Richards, another possible Democratic can-didate for governor, is not as well-known as Mattox, but is more lar among those who know her,

Both of Texas' U.S. senators, Republican Phil Gramm and Democrat Lloyd Bentsen, are well-known and well-liked, the poll shows.

The telephone survey is based on interviews with 1,017 registered voters and has a margin of error of clus or minus 3.5 percentage points. It was conducted by political scientists Richard Murray and Kent L. Tedin of the University of Houston's

Those surveyed were asked to rate the job performance of 11 national and state elected officials. Respondents were given a choice of rating their performance as excellent, good, only fair or poor.

Clements fared worst among politicians rated. Of the 95 percent who rated his performance, 4 per-cent said the Republican has done an excellent job since taking office in January and 24 percent said he was

doing a good job.

"Gov. Clements was elected to solve problems, not to win popularity contests," his press secretary Reggie Bashur said. "When the problems are solved, the governor will be held in high esteem by the people of Towns."

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## Market still correcting

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan is persisting in characterizing the stock market plunge as a correction despite another steep tumble in the Dow Jones industrial average.

Reagan, in an interview with foreign television correspondents. said the 157-point plunge in the Dow on Monday — 8.4 percent of its value - simply may have been a case in which "the market overpriced itself and is now making a corrective change."

On the previous Monday, when the Dow plunged 22.6 percent of its value in the worst one-day drop since 1914, Reagan said it must have been "some kind of correction" and speculated that the panic had been triggered by people who saw "a chance to grab a profit."

"Profit-taking" and "correction" are terms used by investors to described a downward swing in a generally rising market. The Dow has lost about a third of its value since its peak in late August and investors have lost about \$1 trillion.

In other developments Monday:

-House Banking Committee Chairman Rep. Ferdnand J. St Germain, D-R.I., said he intended to look into why the government-owned Continental Illinois Corp. was permitted to become a major lender to stock options traders in Chicago.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., the agency that insures deposits in commercial banks, rescued Continental in 1984 in the largest-ever government bank bailout and still holds about 60 percent of its stock.

The bank announced on Monday that it may report a moderate loss in the fourth quarter because of a special provision of about \$90 million for large losses suffered in the market plunge by a subsidiary, First Options of Chicago Inc.

-The Securities and Exchange Commission issued a statement in support of the exchange's decision to close two hours early for the rest of the week. In response to extraordinarily heavy volume, the exchange curtailed trading hours Friday and Monday and had previously announced an early closing for today.

Despite the truce, Reagan again blamed Congress for huge deficits.

"I set out to try and eliminate the deficit when I first came here, but unfortunately the Congress has the last word about spending money and they have been more willing to spend than I would have been." he said.

Reagan took office promising a balanced budget but has never submitted one to Congress. The \$1 trillion fiscal 1988 budget he submitted in January would have left an estimated \$135 billion deficit next

MIAMI (AP) - Brokers fatigued by a frantic week of trading during the stock market crash said they paid little attention to the familiar, friendly face of Arthur Kane, a longtime market player.

Kane, who reportedly lost millions in last week's plunge, walked into the manager's office Monday, and minutes later pulled a pistol from his briefcase and opened fire, killing the manager and wounding his broker before killing himself, police said.

deficit-reduction tax increase that Congress approves this year is likely to resemble bills already written by House and Senate committees, a Democratic-flavored stew that would take about \$12 billion out of the economy without giving anybody heartburn.

One thing is certain: there will be no increase in individual income-tax rates, which are scheduled to drop again next year under the 1986 tax

Because of President Reagan's unwavering opposition, the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee avoided even considering raising rates when they developed their competing revenue-raising bills earlier this

Most other ways of raising taxes are at least open for discussion. But because both committees are controlled by Democrats, the final package probably will place most of any new tax burden on corporations and upper-income individuals.

That is a trait common to the pending bills, the Ways and Means version, which would raise about \$12 billion from next January through September, and the Finance Com-mittee plan, which would bring in about \$11.5 billion.

The boy's attitude, behavior and school work are suffering. He has become extremely reckless, indulging in foolish risk-taking and self-destructive antics.

Our entire family is at war because of this problem. The boy's parents feel that it is his lot in life and he should face it like a man. (Remember, he is only 11). Never mind that a great many men wear toupees, have hair transplants and so

Do you know if there are any alopecia clinics that treat this disease? Where does one go to find a decent hair piece for a child?

I've never needed to write to you in the past, but it is certainly comforting to know that you are there for people who have no place else to turn.-No Name, No City

DEAR N.N.N.C.: There are about 2 million people in this country who are afflicted with this disease. By all means write to the National Alopecia Areata Foundation. The address is 714 C Street, Suite 202, San Rafael, Calif. 94901. This organization is actively involved in research and education.

They will be pleased to provide, free of charge, information on support groups. (There is a support group in almost every state and many in Canada). They will also send information on doctors and clinics that treat this disease.

The Alopecia Foundation can advise you regarding the purchase of a wig for a child. There are several new types of wigs for children on the market that will hold up while swimming. Also available are wigs that children can sleep in.

I'm sure the information you receive from this organization will be helpful to your little nephew. His parents need to be enlightened regarding the alternatives that are open to their son.

CHILDREN NEED EVIDENCE FOR NUMBER

Everyone who applies for a Social Security number must provide evidence of age, identity, and U.S. citizenship or lawful alien status, including young children, Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo, Tx. said recently.

Starting with the Federal tax return for 1987, parents claiming children as dependents will have to show the Social Security number for children 5 and older.

Parents sometimes have difficulty finding the required evidence for their children, Jim said. They especially have trouble with the idea of providing evidence of identity.

Proof of age is relatively easy. An official U.S. public birth certificate recorded before age 5 is preferred. This document will also establish

Documents which will etablish a young child's identity and which are usually available to most families, include a report card, school identification card, newspaper birth an-nouncement, court order for name change, church membership or confirmation record, doctor or hospital record, vaccination certificate, day care or nursery record, or child's membership in youth organizations.

Foreign born applicants will also need the appropriate Immigration and Naturalization Service documents.

Only original documents or copies ceritified by the issuing agency can be used.

### Accent on Health

To parents, it is alarming when a child brings home from the teacher news that the child may have head

According to the Texas Department of Health (TDH), though, head lice can be a problem among any gather-ing, especially of children at school or day care. Teachers are wise to check all their pupils periodically to control the pests.

Bobby L. Davis, director of the TDH General Sanitation Division, said, "People misunderstand what head lice are, who is likely to have them, and what to do to control them.

"A lot of people seem to confuse common head lice with body lice, which are rare in the United States, and pubic lice, ("crabs"), which usually only move from one host to another during sex or in shared bedding," Davis said.

Davis explained that many people wrongly believe that only dirty, neglectful people may have head lice. For that reason, parents often are outraged or ashamed when told their child may carry the pests. The truth is that anyone can have head lice. Pediculus humanus capitis, the Latin name for the parasite, is a gray insect, about an eighth of an inch long, that lives only on the human scalp.

They travel from one host to another when people share hairbrushes, hats, scarves, pillows, etc. They do not transmit disease, but do cause itching and irritation-and embarrassment, according to Davis.

Precautions against head lice outbreaks are simple: avoid sharing brushes, hats, and other items which touch the hair, such as coat collars. Parents should periodically check children's scalps for the insects and their eggs ("nits"). The nits are tiny, oblong sacks, usually attached to the base of a hair.

The treatment to rid a child of head lice is careful washing and combing

with a special shampoo and a fine toothed comb, usually sold together at pharmacies and grocery stores. Davis said parents should follow all directions on the shampoo, repeating the procedure according to recommendations. They also should wash pillow cases, and wash or air for at least two days any hat, scarf, or other head covering which may contain nits.

Head lice die quickly (within 48 hours) in any environment other than on the human scalp. They cannot survive on pets.

Davis said that not only parents, but even school administrators sometimes overreact to outbreaks of head lice among students. "One city made the mistake of contaminating a whole school and library with a pesticide that was not only unnecessary, but dangerous in itself. All they had to do to eliminate the head lice was to advise parents about ridding their kids of lice and to close the buildings for the weekend. We strongly discourage using spray pesticides against head lice."










RESOLUTION 88-1: "TO REGULATE PLUMBING REPAIRS AND FIXTURES WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT."

Summary: Any repairs or installation of plumbing fixtures cannot be undertaken without obtaining a permit from the District. Upon completion of the terms of the permit, a final inspection will be made to determine compliance. Failure to comply shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$200 or confinement in jail for a period not to exceed 30 days or both. This resolution shall become effective seven days after adoption by the Board of Supervisors.

RESOLUTION 88-2: "TO REGULATE AND CONTROL WEEDS WITHIN THE BOUN-DARIES OF DEAF SMITH COUNTY FRESH WATER SUP-PLY DISTRICT NUMBER ONE."

Summary: Weeds in excess of one foot can pose a threat to the health and safety of individuals and thus will not be allowed within the District. Any person, firm or corporation violating the one foot rule will be given five working days to cut the weeds. After notification, if the weeds are not cut, the District may cut the weeds and charge a fee payable to the District. If the fee is not paid with the water/sewage bill, the District may attach a lien against the property owner. Failure to comply shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$200 or confinement in jail for a period not to exceed 30 days or both. This resolution shall become effective seven days after adoption by the Board of Supervisors.

RESOLUTION 88-3: "TO REGULATE AND CONTROL ABANDONED VEHICLES AND UNOPERATIVE VEHICLES WITHIN THE DISTRICT."

**Summary: Abandoned vehicles** and unoperative vehicles pose a threat to the health and safety of individuals and thus will not be allowed within the District. Any person, firm or corporation having an abandoned/unoperative vehicle or vehicles on their property will be given five days to change the status of the vehicle. If such is not done after notification from the District, the District shall cite the property owner for violation of this resolution. Failure to comply shall be punishable by a fine of not more than \$200,000, confinement in jail or both and being charged for

removal of the vehicle(s). This resolution shall become effective seven days after adoption by the Board of Supervisors.

RESOLUTION 88-4: "TO ESTABLISH FOR WEEKEND AND HOLIDAY SERVICES."

**Summary: The District Office** is opened from 11 a.m. - 4 p.m., Monday-Friday. The water operator is available from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. each day to service customers during regular working hours. Because of the requests placed on the District for connection and disconnect services between 5 p.m. on Friday and 8 a.m. on Monday, the Board of Supervisors proposes to charge a maximum fee of \$50.00 per hour and payable with the next water and sewage bill. This resolution does not eliminate emergency services normally provided by a utility district.
