Two arrested in drug bust

Two Hereford residents were arrested and 32 individually wrapped doses of heroin were seized during a raid by Hereford Police Department officers on Monday night.

Roy Mendoza, 26, and his 27-yearold wife Rebecca were arrested as they were exiting a car parked near a home in the 400 block of Ave. H.

According to a report by a member of the local Special Reactions Team. As the pair exited the car, officers, assisted by the SRT, swarmed the area and called for the couple to surrender. An officer grabbed Mendoza as he was reaching back into the car for his jacket. A .32-caliber gun was found in the jacket.



Pesina appeal is denied

Yet another in a lengthy series of appeals of sentences in a 1985 Hereford drug bust has been denied by the Seventh District Court of Appeals in Amarillo.

The 17-year, \$1,500 fine sentence handed down by a 222nd District Court Jury to Martin Richard Pesina was upheld by the court.

Pesina's attorney, Sam Ogan of Lubbock, argued unsuccessfully that Judge David Wesley Gulley erred in four different areas of the trial: admitting evidence of an unjudicated extraneous offense; admitting evidence that he offered to commit an extraneous offense; excluding evidecne alleging that undercover agent Raul Sanchez used drugs; and overruling Ogan's objection to District Attorney Roland Saul's final

In each case, Gulley's decision was

get prisons

AUSTIN (AP) - The state prison board has selected six sites for new penitentiaries that will hold 8,500 inmates, but a lawyer for inmates says the board picked the wrong cure for overcrowding.

Board members voted unanimously Monday to build maximum security prisons, each holding 2,250 inmates, in Gatesville and Amarillo. Also approved were medium security prisons, each holding 1,000 inmates, in Liberty County, Snyder, Marlin and Woodville.

"It's a prescription for disaster," said Bill Turner of San Francisco, attorney for the inmates who filed the lawsuit that sparked prison reform in Texas. "They are not going to be able to manage all those facilities in far-flung locations. They are stretched way too thin already.'

A better solution, he said in a telephone interview, would be to incarcerate fewer non-violent of-

The board acted Monday after hearing final pitches in the Senate chamber from the six communities awarded prisons and from Childress, the only finalist not given a prison.

TDC spokesman Charles Brown said each of the 2,250-inmate prisons will cost about \$60 million to build. The 1,000-bed prisons will cost about \$13 million each to build, he said.

Board Chairman Al Hughes said the prisons at Gatesville and Amarillo could be built within 30 months. The others could be completed in 16 months, he said.

Leaders of the communities seeking the prisons were frank in their pitches.

"We can use the jobs," Childress County Judge Dean Decker said in a (See PRISONS, Page 2)

County sets septic hearing

Septic tanks and recommendations concerning the county jail were among the topics of discussion during Deaf Smith County Commissioners' Court on Monday.

Commissioners set a public hearing on Dec. 14 to view the adoption of septic tank standards for county residents. The standards must be set in compliance with the state's Private Sewage Facility Act which will be enforced by the Texas Water

"If we do not set the standards the state will step in and do it for us and that will cost us (the county) a bundle," Commissioner Bill Bradly said.

County Judge Tom Simons reported that the county jail passed a recent inspection pending followthrough on the recommendation that four employees be added. "We have 90 days to take action on the recommendation that we add three more jailors and a cafeteria supervisor,"

It was estimated that the additional employees will cost the county \$100,000 and, since that additional amount was not budgeted for the fiscal year which began Oct. 1, the commissioners instructed Jail Ad-

ministrator David Castillo and Sheriff Joe Brown to check into the possibility of raising the revenue by taking overflow prisoners from other area jails.

Sales tax receipts dip

Hereford will receive a check this month for \$55,725.63 from State Comptroller Bob Bullock as the city's share of the state sales tax.

That is down from the \$64,188 received a year ago. to date in 1987, Hereford has received \$515,937, down nine percent from 1986 figures through the first 11 months.

Several area cities are showing small increases in sales tax rebates, according to figures from Bullock's office. Other area cities checks this month include Dimmitt, \$16,939; Friona, \$13,423; Canyon, \$35,281; Amarillo, \$1.276 million; Borger, \$110,060; Pampa, \$137,160; Dumas, \$54,366; and Levelland, \$68,145.

All but Canyon and Dumas are higher than the checks received last November. For the year, only Friona and Canyon are showing small increases.

Arab summit struggles over strategy to end war

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) - Arab leaders will negotiate for as long as necessary to forge a common Arab approach toward ending the Iran-Iraq war, Jordan's foreign minister

Taher Masri said the leaders discussed the war behind closed doors for nine hours at the Arab summit on Monday. They also discussed moves to end Egypt's diplomatic isolation, calls for an international peace conference on the Arab-Israeli conflict and Lebanon's economic crisis.

Summit delegates have expressed doubt a unified position could be reached on the 7-year-old Iran-Iraq war, but Masri said at a news conference that the leaders would continue talks "until they reach decisions. There's no deadline for the summit."

No schedule was announced for today, but Jordanian Crown Prince Hassan told reporters Monday that "we are still talking about these issues and still threshing them out with a great deal of seriousness."

Leaders of the 21-nation Arab League are attending the summit conference, which opened Sunday.

The emergency gathering was called to rally support for a ceasefire between Iran and Iraq. Both are Moslem nations, but Iran is predominantly Persian and most Arab countries directly or indirectly support Arab Iraq.

In Jerusalem, Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir said Monday the Arab world remained as hostile towards Israel as it was 40 years ago when the Jewish state was established.

Speaking to an international conference of Jewish journalists, Shamir said, "Less than one hour's drive from here, in Amman, Jordan, a large gathering of Arab leaders is now taking place.

"I watched this scene yesterday evening on television and I noticed that much is being said about Arab unity against Israel. It seems that, in rhetoric at least, nothing changed in the past 40 years.

Eight Arab leaders, including feuding presidents Saddam Hussein of Iraq and Hafez Assad of Syria, met for four hours Monday night. Syria supports Iran against Iraq.

That session followed a five-hour meeting of all 21 delegations earlier in the day.

Among others attending the late Monday talks were King Hussein of Jordan, President Ali Abdullah Saleh of North Yemen, Sheik Jaber al-Ahmed al-Sabah of Kuwait and Saudi Crown Prince Abdulla Bin Abdul-Aziz. They have been pressing for possible sanctions against Iran for rejecting United Nations resolutions calling for a cease-fire and negotiations to end the war

Also present were Syria's Assad. who is Iran's strongest Arab ally; President Chedli Benjedid of Algeria and Sheik Zayed Bin Sultan al-Nahayan of the United Arab Emirates. They opposed punitive actions against Iran.

Hassan said the Arab world must reach a common stand on the Persian Gulf war and other conflicts or risk being carved into spheres of in-

"I refer specifically to the naval presence in the gulf waters, which of course bears very little relation to the justification for that presence," he said

The United States and some of its Western allies have warships in the gulf to protect international shipping from war-related attacks.

Breast self exam training presented at study club

L'Allegra Study Club met Nov. 5 at the home of Karen Payne with Sylvia Khuri serving as co-hostess.

The business meeting was called to order by President Jody Skiles. Correspondence was read and announcements made. Members heard progress reports from standing committees and other club matters were discussed

Cathy Guseman, program chairman, introduced Liz Gifford and Barbara Gray, both of the Breast Screening Center of the Amarillo Diagnostic Clinic. They presented the program entitled "Breast Self Exam Training." Discussing the history of the center, Gifford noted that the need for such a facility was apparent in view of the statistics of women who have breast cancer sometime during their lifetime. coupled with the fact that there was no other "low dose" mammography unit in the Panhandle.

Mammography, she explained, is a breast X-ray which is the most effective test for detecting breast disease in its early stages. Gifford also said that in the past, higher dosages of radiation were used for mammography, limiting the diagnostic procedure to high risk patients. At the present time, however, and with the utilization of almost negligible dosages of radiation, the procedure is safe and simple. It is used as an

Gray described actual steps and procedures followed upon a woman's visit to the center. She explained that screening consists of three steps of equal significance as follows: a mammography, visit physician to discuss results of mammography, and a monthly self breast exam, best performed one weeka fter menstrual flow ends.

It was noted that mammography can detect cancers too small to be felt by hand, yet most breast cancers are first discovered by women themselves. She added that other than screening, one of the major purposes of the center is to teach women how to effectively perform the breast self exam. Members viewed a film on the proper technique of performing the exam on themselves.

Gifford and Gray ended the program with the clear message that early detection through breast screening is the key to saving a woman's life from breast cancer. While the majority of breast disease is not malignant, breast cancer does strike one of every 11 women. In those few cases where cancer is present, it is important that it be detected and trated in its earliest stages while potential for cure is

Quality care depends on patient, doctor

A partnership in which patient and doctor share the responsibility for maintaining or restoring health can contribute to quality health care, according to a health education expert.

"Becoming an active partner in your health care starts by choosing a doctor you can communicate with," says Dr. Mary Ann Heussner. "Select a doctor who will listen, ask questions and thoroughly explain a diagnosis or treatment.'

She emphasizes that patients have equal responsibilities to communicate by giving complete and accurate information to their doctors and asking questions when they don't undertand.

"Since you're paying for expert medical advice, never hesitate to question your doctor about anything you don't understand." Heussner advises. "Don't be reluctant to ask the doctor to translate medical jargon into plain language or to take notes if you wish."

Heussner, who is a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program, notes that it may be especially important to ask questions about diagnostic tests, medications and the costs, risks and benefits of treatment alternatives.

To take a more active role in your health care, the specialist advises the following steps:


-Keep a record of your personal health history. It will be helpful in providing information the doctor may need for a diagnosis. A Family Health and Medical Record is available through county Extension

-Prepare in advance for a doctor's visit. Be prepared to provide the doctor with specific information on your current problem, symptoms, family medical history, current medications and personal habits.

-Read labels on over-the-counter medicines and take pescribed medicine according to directions. Make sure you know how and when you should take the medicine and for how long. Ask about side effects, and if there are any foods, beverages, medicines or activities that should be avoided while taking the medication.

Most products in food stores have dates and handling directions on them, even though manufacturers are not required to put this informa-

tion on packaging.

"The date stamped on product packages can indicate product freshness and serve as a guide to safe storage time, if you know how to use it," says Marilyn Haggard, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service nutrition

She explains that the "sell-by" date is the last day the product should be sold, the "use-by" date indicates how long the product will retain top eating quality after purchase, and the "expiration date" tells the last day the food should be

eaten or used. "Reading handling directions can also help you make sure food re-

Know how to use guides

All perishable products must give handling instructions, such as "keep frozen" or "Keep refrigerated," notes Haggard. Some meat and poultry products may be labeled 'ready-to-eat" or "fully cooked", which means no further cooking is necessary.

The specialist advises checking the labels of aseptically packaged products, since many will require refrigeration after opening.

"Although some product labels carry directions on how long and at what temperature to cook a product, the directions are not required or verified by the U.S. Department of Agriculture," she remarks.

When cooking instructions are not included on the label or you have some doubts about them, the safest course is to cook the product mains safe to eat," says the thoroughly," Haggard adds.

Sound financial plan can benefit remarried couples

A budget and spending plan can benefit any family, but for remarrieds it may be critical, says a consumer economcis specialist.

"Finances, children and childrearing have been identified by researchers as the major problems in many marriages," says Bonnie Piernot, "with finances often ranking the highest.'

People entering a remarriage often have assets-and debts-to bring to the new marriage. When couples share this information prior to the wedding, it will make it easier to develop a financial plan, says the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist.

"Fluctuating income from child support can be a major strain on the new family's budget," Piernot says.

One recent study of remarried couples in Kentucky found that when child support was awarded, 36 percent either never received it, received it irregularly or regularly received it but not in the full amount, she

According to the specialist, a financial plan for remarrieds can involve saving ahead for large annual or semi-annual bills and unexpected expenses, so they won't be caught short by fluctuating income.




