Man killed in stabbing

A Dawn-area man was killed Monday night when he was stabbed to death by his wife's ex-husband at a rural Deaf Smith County trailer house.

John Price, 66, of Friona, was arrested at the scene Monday night by Deaf Smith County sheriff's deputies and is in jail today, in lieu of \$50,000 bond, on charges of assault with a deadly weapon.

Virgil Widmier, 36, died Monday at 9:22 p.m. while undergoing emergency surgery at Deaf Smith County Hospital.

According to reports, Price had gone to Widmier's residence, a mile west of the intersection of FM 809 and FM 1052, just north of Dawn, to help his ex-wife remove her belongings from the trailer.

Widmier returned to the residence and the two began fighting, according to reports.

Investigations are continuing in the case today.

Services are pending for Widmier at Rix Funeral Home in Hereford.

Four arrested overweekend

Four persons were arrested over the weekend and Monday by Hereford police.

The arrests included a man, 33, arrested on public intoxication charges at E-Z Mart on W. Park Ave.; a woman, 78, for theft under \$20 for taking hair spray and a can of Spam; a man, 23, for no liability insurance and defective equipment; and a woman, 51, remanded to jail for failure to pay fines on no seat belt and failure to appear charges.

Reports included a woman who declined to press charges against her husband after he beat her, then sexually assaulted her. Police referred her to case workers at the Domestic Violence Center.

Police also covered prowler reports at 242 E. Third and 422 Sycamore Lane; two slashed tires at 507 Ave. G; a clerk at an Allsup's

store filed charges against a woman for cursing at her; criminal trespass at Hereford High School; a beer bottle thrown through a pickup window at 328 Ave. J, causing \$50 in damage;

Two youths allegedly took some soft drinks from WAC Seed after breaking into the building, causing \$100 in damage; a man who entered an Allsup's store and starting eating a 70 cent honey bun. The man told the clerk he would go out to his car and get the money, but the man never returned; an attempted burglary at the Bell gas station on West U.S. 60; burglary of a motor vehicle on New York Street, across from the Bull Barn, with items valued at \$50 taken; and a burglary in the 600 block of E. Third.

Police issued 46 citations from Saturday through Monday.

Reagan abandons Bork attack

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan today abandoned plans to launch a harsh attack on tactics used to derail the nomination of Robert H. Bork to the Supreme Court, dropping language from a speech that accused Bork's opponents of waging a "sophisticated campaign of smears and lies."

White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said Reagan's remarks, planned for delivery in a speech to the New Jersey Chamber of Commerce in Somerset, N.J., were being rewritten to reflect Bork's own desire for a less strident debate.

"We want to restrain the language and de-politicize the process and set a dignified tone for this debate," Fitzwater told reporters minutes before flying to New Jersey.

Fitzwater's announcement came about an hour after Senate Majority Leader Robert C. Byrd suggested to reporters that Reagan's public statements are not helping the apparently doomed nomination.

"With the president speaking out now on it, it just politicizes the nomination more," Byrd told reporters.

In his surprise announcement Friday that he was staying in the fight, Bork had asked all sides to lower their voices and restraint the debate.

Fitzwater said today that Reagan's tough attack on the critics had been written before Bork made that statement.

Hours earlier, the White House press office distributed an advance text of Reagan's speech in which he complained of "a sophisticated campaign of smears and lies" and vowed to continue fighting the seemingly hopeless battle for Bork's confirmation.

In that text, Reagan said that

"some have told me to throw in the towel" on Bork's nomination, and that "the special interests have won. It's a lost cause."

It was unclear, following Fitzwater's announcement, how much of Reagan's initial speech would be rewritten and how much retained.

As first released, Reagan acknowledged the overwhelming odds against Bork and recalled the movie "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington" in which Jimmy Stewart, playing a senator, said the only causes worth fighting for were the lost causes.

DSC workers face insurance rate increase

Deaf Smith County employees face a 42 percent increase on their health insurance premiums after county commissioners voted Monday to keep their health insurance with Blue Cross-Blue Shield of Texas.

The insurance for the 1987-88 fiscal year will also lead to fewer benefits for covered employees.

Commissioners said that because of the number of claims historically filed by the county, only one other provider, Gilliland-Nieman Associates, bid on the health insurance. Gilliland-Nieman's proposal, though, would have cost the county more money, about \$300 a month, while not increasing the employee's share.

Commissioner Austin Rose said he felt it was the commissioner's job to save the county money, and said, "I'm sure several of our employees will look elsewhere for individual insurance for their families."

Rose's motion to remain with Blue Cross-Blue Shield passed 3-1, with Commissioner Troy Don Moore voting against the proposal.

The commissioners unanimously approved the members of the Deaf Smith County Tax Appraisal District Board, including Earnest Brown, Steve Coneway, Frank Zinsler, Tom LeGate and Moore.

Commissioners accepted the 1985-86 audit prepared and presented by Donna West of Brown, Graham and Co., of Hereford, and accepted her recommendation that the county improve the accessibility of certain departmental financial records.

The commissioners also agreed to advertise for audit proposals for the 1986-87 fiscal year, with those proposals to be opened at the next meeting, scheduled for Oct. 30 at 8 a.m.

The county also granted an easement to cross a county road to Contel of Texas for a telephone line, with the condition that Contel follow the same guidelines that have been set for West Texas Rural Telephone.

RRC to scramble chairmen

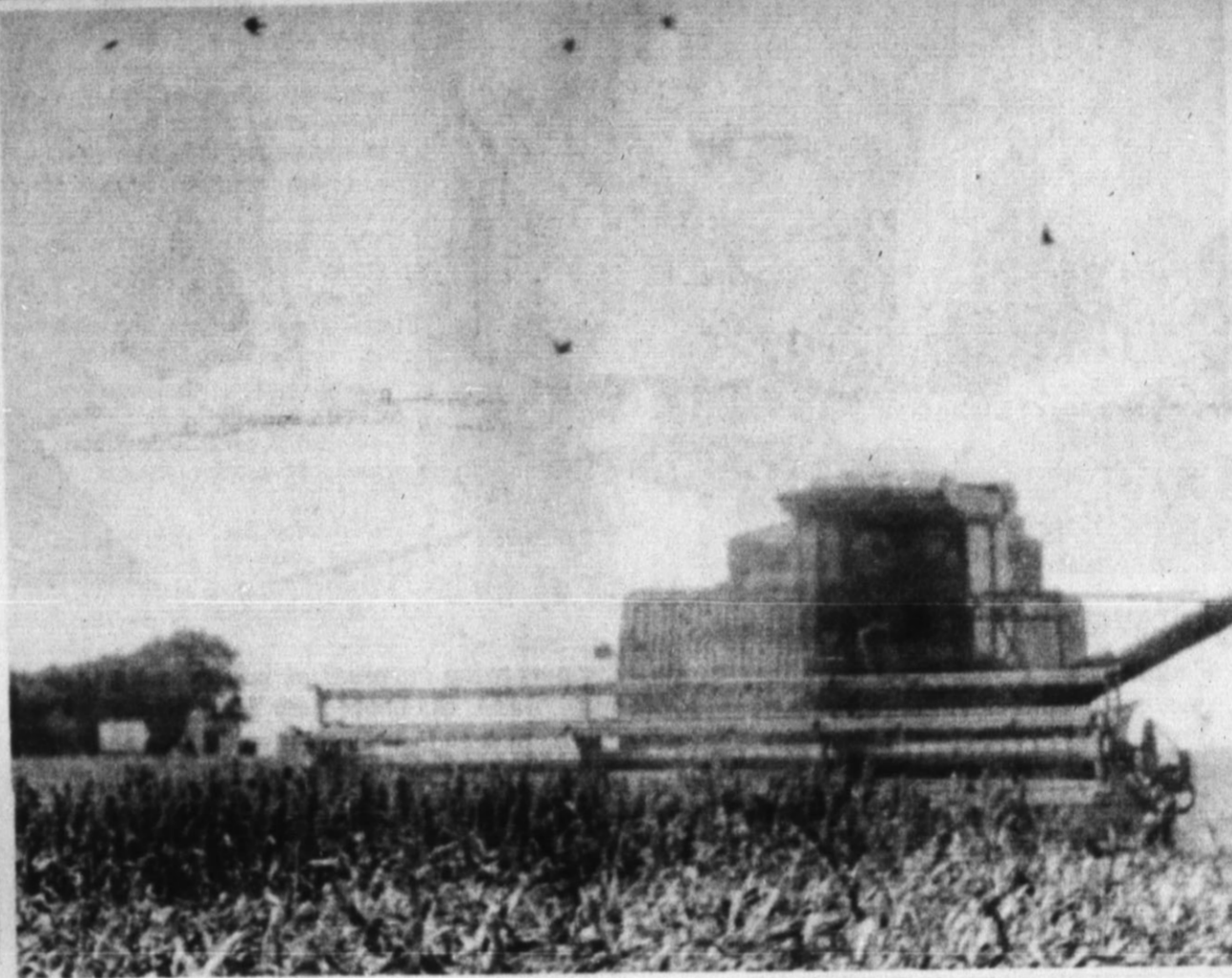
DALLAS (AP) — Because they have been unable to determine who should lead the three-member board, Texas railroad commissioners have decided to take turns serving as chairman for the remainder of 1987 and 1988.

The commissioners voted 3-0 vote Monday to rotate the chairmanship on a monthly basis.

Commissioner Jim Nugent will continue as chairman through October, under the action, and John Sharp will take over in November. Hance, a Republican recently appointed by Gov. Bill Clements, will be chairman in December.

Nugent and Sharp are Democrats. "It certainly does not bruise anyone's feelings, and it gives us time to concentrate on the problems facing the energy industry in Texas," Hance, who made the motion, said.

Imperial makes sweeter offer

SUGAR LAND, Texas (AP) — Imperial Sugar Co. made a \$108.7 million cash-and-stock takeover proposal amounting to about \$97 a share for Holly Sugar Co.

The Imperial offer, announced Monday, comes a week after a New York investment partnership offered \$91 per share for two-thirds of Holly's outstanding stock.

Imperial President Robert C. Hanna confirmed Monday his company's bid for Holly, but he declined further comment on the offer, which expires at 11 a.m. CDT Wednesday.

Imperial is based in Sugar Land, a few miles southwest of Houston. Holly is based in Colorado Springs, Colo., where an annual stockholders' meeting is scheduled for today.

On Monday, a telephone operator said the company was closed to observe the Columbus Day holiday.

Imperial, a privately-held company, processes raw sugar from sugar cane at its Sugar Land refinery, the fourth largest in the country.

Holly is the leading processor of sweetener from sugar beets. It had \$317 million in sales and earned \$4.9 million for the fiscal year 1987 ending March 31.

Analysts said it is unclear whether Holly invited the Imperial bid to thwart the \$91-a-share offer from Plum Associates, a Melville, N.Y., partnership which owns 7.4 percent of Holly.

The Imperial offer proposes that each share of Holly be converted into the right to \$68 in cash plus one share of common stock ownership plan for about \$29 per share.

Shares in the combined company also would be sold to an employee stock ownership plan for about \$29 per share. Holly shareholders then would own about 23 percent of the combined company and the stock ownership plan would own a like amount.

Number of Billionaires doubles

NEW YORK (AP) — U.S. billionaires nearly doubled in number this year to 49, including a 31-year-old computer whiz and a Campbell's soup heir, according to Forbes magazine's list of the 400 wealthiest Americans.

With an average worth of \$550 million, the total value of the Forbes 400 is \$220 billion, 41 percent more than last year and enough to erase the 1986 U.S. budget deficit of \$205 billion, the magazine said Monday in releasing the list.

The list will appear in the magazine's Oct. 26 editions.

No. 1 for the third year is retail king Sam Walton, whose assets from his Arkansas-based Wal-Mart Stores discount chain nearly doubled to \$8.5 billion.

Walton's estimated wealth is more than the gross national product of many Third World countries, and if laid end to end in dollar bills would circle the earth more than 32 times.

The list of 49 billionaires includes 23 newcomers, such as Jacqueline Mars Vogel, who Forbes said it recently determined was an heir to the Mars confection company's family fortune and is worth \$1.15 billion.

At 31, William H. Gates won the title of youngest new billionaire. A math genius and Harvard dropout, Gates founded the Microsoft Corp. computer software company 13 years ago. His 40 percent stake in the company is worth \$1.25 billion.

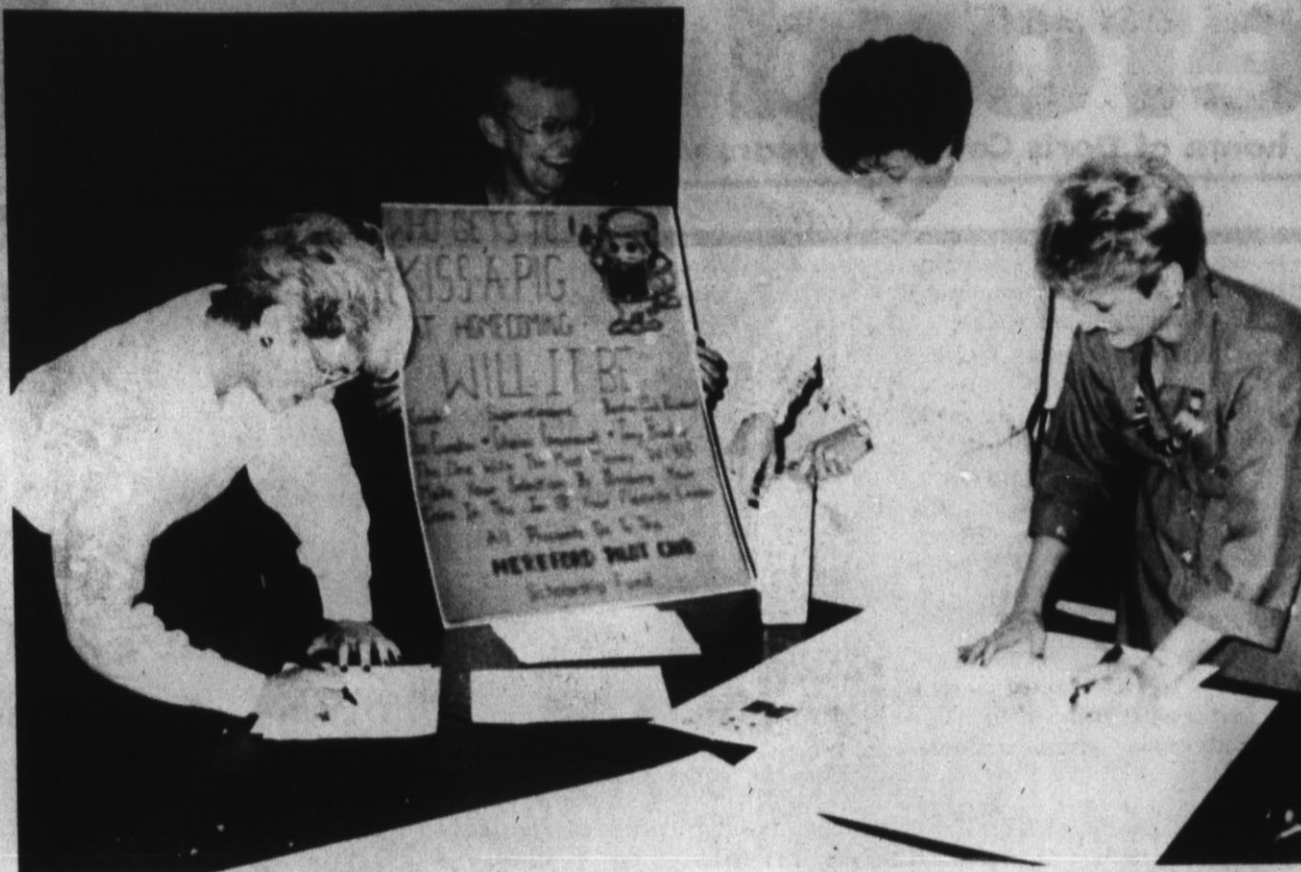
Also on the list for the first time is Campbell Soup heir John Dorrance at \$1.3 billion; Budweiser brewmaster August Busch, \$1.3 billion; and Ted Arison, an Israeli ship owner's son who built Carnival Cruise Lines and last year took it public, quadrupling his worth to \$1.8 billion.

Rising stock prices and real estate values played key roles in swelling the ranks and fortunes of the wealthy, meaning that much of the wealth of the super-rich is only on paper and would be realized only by selling their holdings.

The soaring value of Wal-Mart stock particularly benefited the holdings of Walton, whom Forbes estimated to be the world's third wealthiest person after Japan's Yoshiaki Tsutsumi, worth at least \$20 billion, and Taikichiro Mori, worth \$15 billion.

After Walton, the Forbes top 10 include John Kluge, 73, German-born head of Metromedia Co., worth \$3 billion; H. Ross Perot, 57, Texas investor, worth \$2.9 billion; David Packard, 75, co-founder of Hewlett-Packard Co., \$2.87 billion; publishing-empire brothers Samuel Newhouse Jr., 59, and Donald Newhouse, 58, each worth about \$2.35 billion; industrialist Lester Crown, 62, \$2.1 billion; publisher Rupert Murdoch, \$2.1 billion; investor Warren Buffett, \$2.1 billion; and retailer Leslie H. Wexner, \$2.1 billion.

Some well-known members of the list include Denver oilman Marvin Davis, \$1.45 billion; New York real estate developer Harry Helmsley, \$1.4 billion; financier David Rockefeller, \$1 billion; Los Angeles investor Kirk Kerkorian, \$950 million; Maryland poultry king Frank Perdue, \$500 million; designer Ralph Lauren, \$350 million; and entertainer Merv Griffin, \$300 million.

Bush begins campaigning

CHICAGO (AP) — Vice President George Bush says he's his own man and is opening his presidential campaign by emphasizing several themes that have drawn scant attention during the Reagan years.

But Bush on Monday exhorted reporters against jumping to conclusions about how far he would go in distancing himself from President Reagan.

"I wasn't trying to sound moderate or conservative," he said. "I was trying to sound like me."

On the first day of what Bush promised would be a "full-bore" campaign, the vice president formally entered the race for the 1988 Republican presidential nomination before a crowd of some 2,000 enthusiastic supporters in his hometown of Houston.

He was joined on stage by three figures likely to loom as keys to his electoral chances: Govs. John Sununu of New Hampshire and James Thompson of Illinois and retired Sen. John Tower of Texas.

Thompson presented Bush late in the day with his endorsement, and then, to the chuckles of some in the Illinois press corps, declared, "I wouldn't be standing next to George Bush and endorsing him if I thought he was a wimp."

The question came up during a news conference as local reporters grilled Thompson about an old Illinois issue of yesteryear — the question of whether the Republican governor unfairly attacked former Sen. Adlai Stevenson, a Democrat, with repeated suggestions that Stevenson was a wimp.

Thompson said he had done no such thing, and Bush — speaking of his own image — said, "I don't think it is a problem at all."

Bush had a busy second day of campaigning ahead of him today, including a mix-and-mingle with Chicago area commuters, and stops in Cedar Rapids and Des Moines, Iowa, and in Atlanta.

Missile hits Iraqi schoolyard

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — An Iranian missile slammed into the edge of a crowded schoolyard in the Iraqi capital today, killing at least 25 people and wounding 228 others, an official announcement said.

The announcement by the state radio said at least 24 children and a woman were killed.

The 7:55 a.m. blast shook the foundations of the school building and within seconds it collapsed, sending a huge cloud of dust into the air, witnesses said. It was not clear how many people were in the building at the time.

The Baghdad Radio announcement said the school and 16 other buildings in the area were "demolished."

The explosion started a fire and sent shrapnel, glass shards and concrete chunks flying into the playground, said witnesses, reached in Baghdad by telex from Nicosia, Cyprus.

Iran has fired missiles at Baghdad several times since the nations went to war in 1980.

Earlier today, shipping executives said Iranian gunboats sprayed a Saudi-flagged tanker with machine-gun fire in the Persian Gulf off Dubai, the United Arab Emirates, causing minor damage and no casualties.

The ship raid and the missile attack were in apparent retaliation for a string of recent Iraqi attacks on Iranian shipping and cities. Iraq launched nine attacks on ships trading with or chartered by Iran in the past week.

Iran's official news agency said today that an infantry unit of the Revolutionary Guards Corps fired the missile into Baghdad in retaliation for an Iraqi air raid Monday that damaged a school in the western Ira-

nian province of Lorestan on Monday.

Baghdad Radio quoted an unidentified military spokesman as saying the Iraqis have "declared it a war of cities, and so it shall be."

"It is our right and duty to respond to this ugly crime," the radio quoted the spokesman as saying.

In other developments, Western ship owners said they have been told by their governments that Iran's air force may use new fighter-bombers to attack merchant vessels in the gulf.

And four Kuwaiti tankers, flying the American flag and under U.S. Navy escort, were reported to have reached Bahrain, the halfway point on the 550-mile route from the Persian Gulf entrance to Kuwait.

The U.S. Navy started escorting reflagged Kuwaiti vessels through the oil shipping lanes in July to protect them from attack by Iran. Tehran accuses Kuwait of siding with Iraq.

Shipping executives identified the ship raided by Iran off Dubai as the 39,915-ton Petroship B, a chemical products carrier. It was hit at 7:05 p.m. Monday, they said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

The Petroship B was loaded with gas oil and was sailing from the Saudi Arabian port of Ras Tanura. It later continued toward its destination, Jidda, Saudi Arabia.

The Petroship B was also attacked by Iranian ships on Sept. 20, sustaining slight damage.

Shipping agents in Dubai said Monday that Western intelligence reports show Iran has acquired a supply of U.S.-made optically-guided air-to-sea Maverick missiles over the last few weeks which can be launched from its newly equipped Phantom

F-4 fighter bombers.

The missiles were used with devastating effect against neutral gulf shipping until 1985. When gulf Arab countries improved their air defenses, Iran curtailed its air raids, switching to hit-and-run attacks from speedboats.

Iranian speedboat attacks have taken place mainly at night, and crews on merchant vessels have halted or steamed at slow speed after dark. If the Iraqis return to air attacks, the war could move back into daylight.

U.S. Navy officials in Bahrain released pictures Monday of two Iranian boats captured by the United States in an attack last week. The pictures, taken by a Navy photographer, showed the crafts aboard a U.S. warship, apparently the landing ship USS Raleigh.

Lt. Col. John Head, a spokesman for the U.S. Central Command, said "operational security" was the reason for denying the journalists permission to see and take pictures of the boats themselves.

The United States said U.S. helicopter gunships sank one Iranian patrol boat and captured two in the clash, which it said started when Iranian ships opened fire on a U.S. helicopter.

Four Iraqis wounded in Thursday's shootout are to be returned to Iran, along with the bodies of two Iraqis killed in the confrontation.

The Washington Post reported today that the U.S. military command in the gulf is seeking approval from Washington to attack any Iranian gunboat firing on merchant vessels that call for assistance.

The decision breaks a tradition of choosing the next commissioner to face re-election as chairman for two years.

When commissioner Mack Wallace recently resigned, however, both Sharp and Nugent sought Hance's support for the chairmanship and no agreement could be reached.

"This is a stabilizing move that gives us a chance to know each other better and see where we stand on the issues," Hance told the Dallas Morning News, adding that the post is more symbolic than anything else.

Sharp agreed it isn't necessary to have a chairman, whose job it is to call the docket of cases heard by the commission. He also said his disagreements with Nugent are not personal.

"We have differences over commission policies and how we believe the agency should be structured," Sharp said.

Nugent said he favors the current arrangement, in which several department heads answer directly to commissioners. Sharp wants to appoint an executive director.

"We need to have one administrator who can direct the entire staff based on our policy decisions," said Sharp, who added he will propose the hiring of an executive director next week.

Mr. President!

Reporters yelling for answers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Grown men and women are shouting at President Reagan at the top of their lungs. They do it for a living.

Demonstrators? No, reporters. It's become the standard closing scene at Reagan's infrequent news conferences.

The good-natured chief executive gets the official closing, "Thank you, Mr. President," from a wire service correspondent, but before he can retreat out the door of the East Room at the White House, the reporters are on their feet, shouting, badgering Reagan for one last word.

It even takes place at ceremonies. He may enter the Rose Garden or the Roosevelt Room to the strains of "Ruffles and Flourishes," but he often beats a retreat to a chorus of questions from the folks behind the ropes with the cameras and boom microphones.

Reporters themselves wince at the negative image created by such scenes, beamed into millions of American living rooms. But they say the blame rests with Reagan and his

aides, who have sharply curtailed opportunities for the press corps to engage the president under more civil circumstances.

George E. Reedy, press secretary to Lyndon B. Johnson in 1964-65 and now Lucius W. Nieman Professor of Journalism at Marquette University, said, "I very definitely put the blame on the White House."

The press corps acts the way it does because "all the regular channels of access to the president have been cut off," Reedy said.

But Stephen Hess, a Brookings Institution senior fellow who has written extensively on media-government relations, said that "doesn't excuse the behavior of the reporters" who act "like unruly children."

The problem, Hess said, is largely confined to the White House, where "television sets the tone. When people talk about the Washington press corps rudeness, they're really just talking about the White House press corps."

Lou Cannon, White House cor-

respondent for The Washington Post, said, "We print journalists rely on these TV shouters. It's easy for us to stand back and criticize, but the fact is sometimes that's the only Reagan comment we get."

"This is a president who makes a deliberate practice of communicating through snippets, one- or two-minute photo opportunities, who doesn't hold news conferences, as almost all his predecessors in the modern era did," Cannon said.

"If he were readily available, there wouldn't be a need to shout questions," he said.

Terence Hunt, White House correspondent for The Associated Press, said, "I don't think anybody likes shouting at the president. What we would like is more opportunities to talk with him than we now have."

Reagan, enveloped by controversy over the Iran-Contra scandal, has held only two news conferences this year and a total of 49 in 80 months. The last was in Venice at the end of the economic summit in June.

"When the news is bad, they don't want him out there," said Bill

POLIO VACCINE RECOMMENDED

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans planning to travel to developing nations should be vaccinated against poliomyelitis, according to Family Practice News.

The medical journal reports that although there is a worldwide downtrend in the incidence of the disease, the trend toward more frequent international travel by U.S. citizens may lead to an overall increase in exposure to wild polio virus.

The only countries considered free of wild endemic polio virus circulation are the United States, Japan, Canada, Australia, New Zealand and most of Europe, the publication says.

It adds that travelers to other countries should have received the complete primary series of vaccinations prior to departure, if time permits. The series requires 12 weeks in children and eight months in adults.

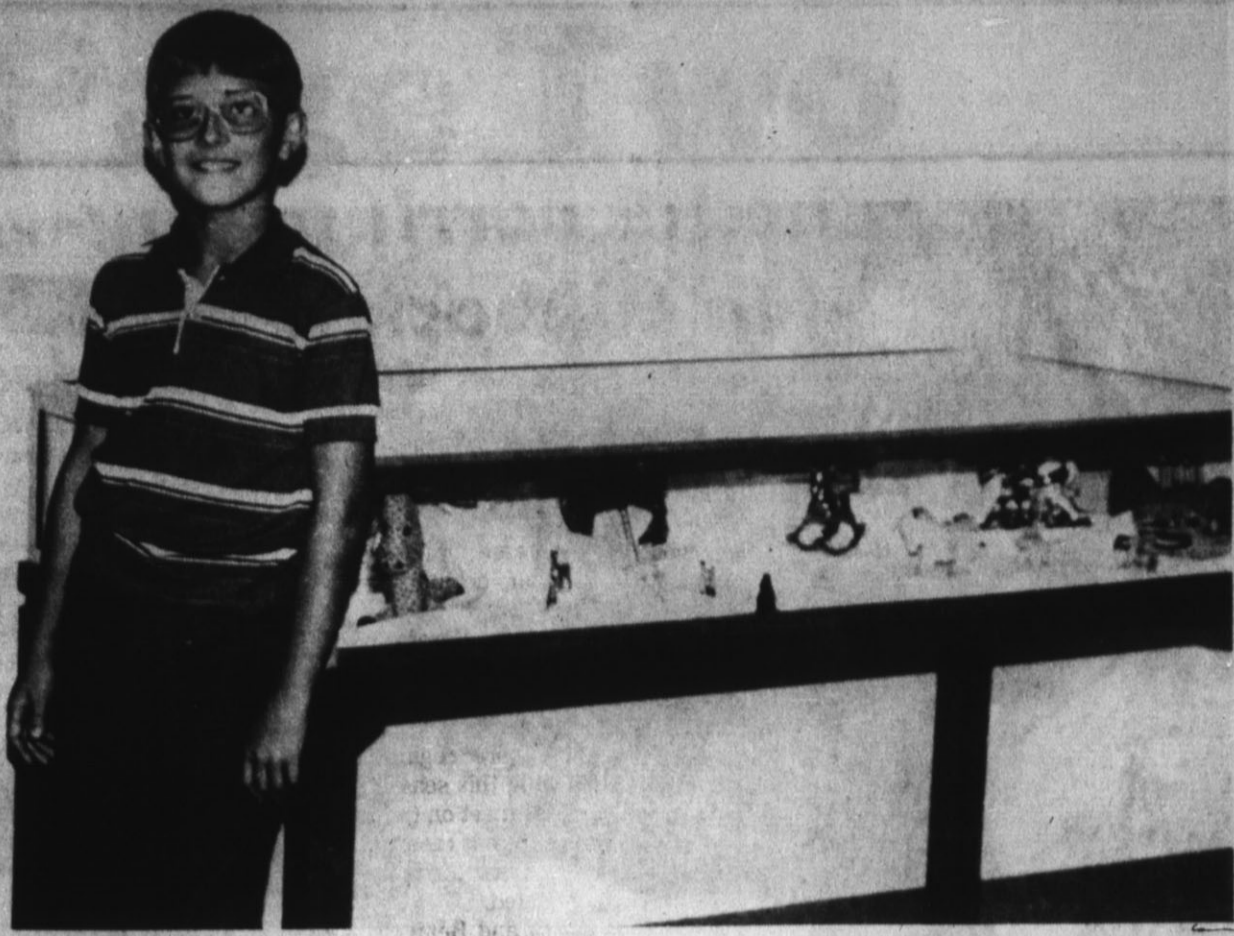

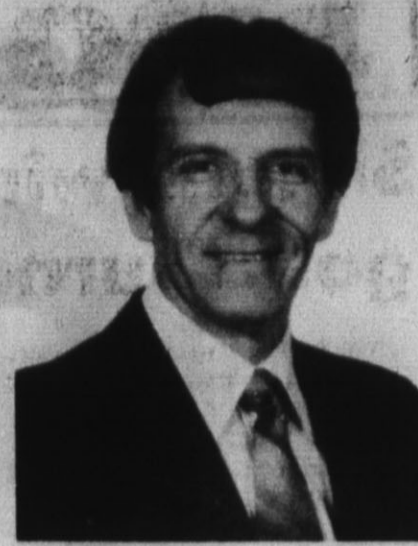

LASERS CUT COSTS FOR AIR FORCE

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Laser beams will soon help cut a hole in the cost of storing information needed to service America's fighting aircraft, reports MIS Week.

Pit bulls should not be pets. If needed as guard dogs, properly controlled, they'd be fine. There ought to be a law.—B.J. in California

Smart shoppers read food labels for facts

To be a smart shopper, consumers may need to read and analyze food packages and labels, according to the Texas Medical Association.

Most foods must have the ingredients listed on the label but some, called "standardized" foods, do not because they are made according to a Food and Drug Administration recipe that sets the concentrations of various ingredients.

When ingredients are listed, they appear in order according to weight with the "heaviest" ingredient listed first. This does not tell shoppers how much of any ingredient is actually used, says TMA.

An important nutrient that labels tell little about is fat. To reduce your intake of saturated fats, look for foods that use vegetable oils such as corn, safflower, sunflower, sesame, and soybean oils. Also, try to limit your intake of food containing

coconut, palm, or palm kernel oil.

In addition to interpreting a food product's label, keep in mind these words (and what they may or may not mean) that frequently appear on food packages: Natural products can contain preservatives, may be loaded with sugar, and can be highly processed. Light, or lite, can be used to describe not only calorie level but color, sodium level, taste, texture, or alcohol level as well. Fortified foods have added vitamins and minerals. A sugarless food does not contain sucrose (table sugar) but may contain other forms of sugar such as glucose, fructose, or sorbitol, which may have just as many calories.

TMA suggests if you need more information about an ingredient listed on a package or label, write to the manufacturer. Many will be happy to send you additional information.

Ask Dr. Lamb Proper Exercise Helps the Heart

BY LAWRENCE E. LAMB, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I have started an exercise program because I believe you when you say it will help decrease your risk of having a heart attack. My father had a heart attack when he was only 48 and I think it was because he didn't exercise. He was an accountant, so he didn't have to do any physical work either.

Can you tell me how exercise affects your heart? My heart rate speeds up a lot and I can even feel it pound if I really exert myself, but what else happens? I'm still concerned that when some people have heart trouble they are told to take it easy, yet others claim exercise is good for you.

DEAR READER: There is a right time and a wrong time for exercise. Immediately after a heart attack, it is important to be very careful and increase your exercise gradually. It takes time for the area of damaged heart muscle to heal. Other patients have so much damage or disease to their heart that they must indeed limit their exercise.

For the healthy person who does not have evidence of heart disease, a sensible exercise program does many things that decrease the risk of a heart attack. As your training progresses you will find you can do more work without increasing your heart rate so much. That means your heart muscle is becoming stronger and

more efficient. The way blood is distributed to your body is improved too, so you can use the blood the heart pumps more efficiently.

Since exercise means your body needs more oxygen, it means your heart has to pump more blood—the only way more oxygen can be delivered. That is why the heart rate increases. In well-trained individuals, the amount of blood the heart pumps with each beat is also increased.

Often, the heart is the limiting factor in how much exercise a person can do. As it is trained, you can do more. Exercise also opens the small blood vessels in the heart muscle. This is important because it can improve the blood flow to the working heart muscle. That also helps to prevent a heart attack caused by lack of blood flow to part of the heart.

Billy Stephens of Hereford teamed with Larry Trimble of Wheeler for third place in team roping. Their time was 9.145 seconds.

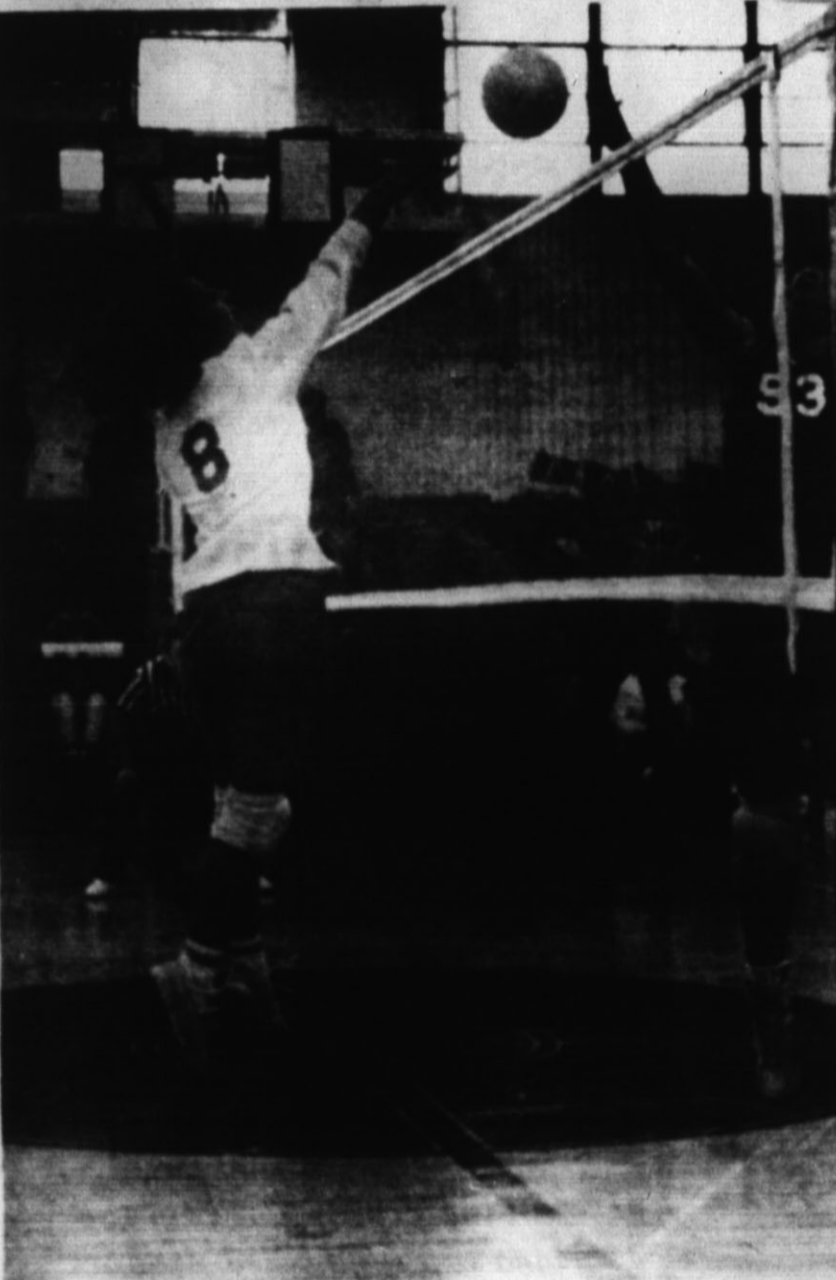

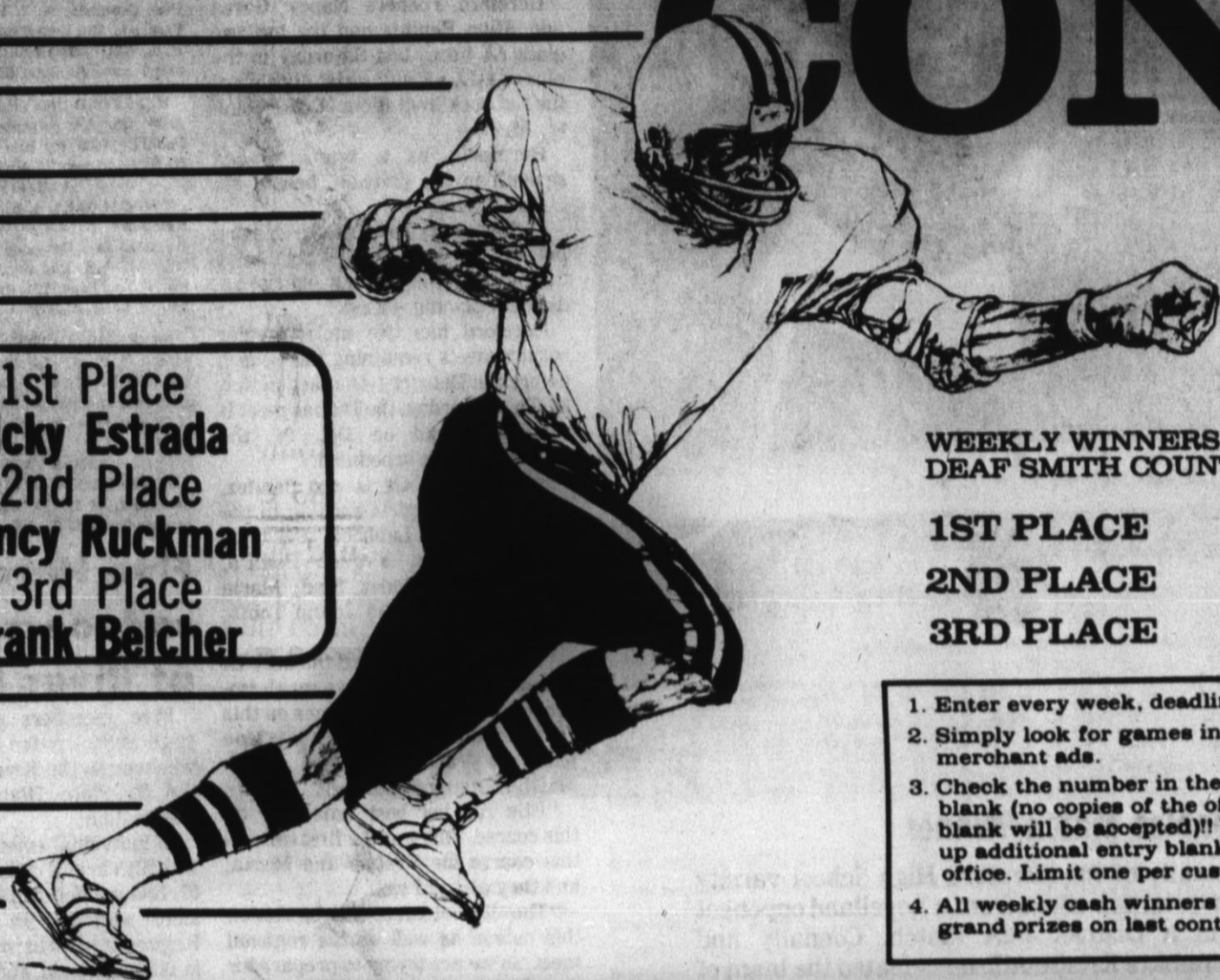

October designated as popcorn month

There's no better way to celebrate October than by enjoying one of the country's most popular and great-tasting foods—popcorn!

Americans have reason to dive into batches of this ever-so-tasty snack since the Popcorn Institute has declared the entire month of October "National Popcorn Poppin' Month."

What makes popcorn the munching favorite among young and old alike? William E. The Institute chose October for the celebration, Smith said, since the fall is traditionally popcorn harvest time, and the biggest eating season.

Popcorn munching, however, is not just limited to fall. Popcorn lovers are known to satisfy their urge for tempting white and golden kernels year-round, as consumption averages almost 11 billion quarts. That's 45 quarts per man, woman and child yearly.

Here are some quick facts that have earned popcorn its number one status.

Popcorn, like other cereal grains, has one important nutritional function—to furnish the body with heat and energy. Popcorn is high in carbohydrates, fiber, and gram for gram has more protein, phosphorus and iron than potato chips, ice cream

cones, pretzels, and soda crackers. It's low in calories (26 per cup air-popped; 33 per cup popped in oil), and if lightly drizzled with butter or oil, still is only 126 calories per cup.

The National Cancer Institute (NCI), the federal government's cancer prevention agency, recommends popcorn as a moderately high source of fiber to include more of in the diet to reduce the risks of some forms of cancer. The recommendation is cited in NCI's booklet, *Diet, Nutrition & Cancer Prevention: A Guide To Food Choices*.

The American Dental Association includes popcorn on its list of recommended sugar-free snacks. The American Diabetes Association and the American Dietetic Association permit popcorn as a bread exchange on weight-control diets; the Feingold Diet for hyperactive children permits popcorn because it contains no artificial additives. And, many USDA Extension Home Economists suggest popcorn as a low-calorie, no-sugar, family food because it's economical and fun to make.

Popcorn doesn't hurt the pocketbook. A quart of home-popped popcorn costs between 4 and 9 cents to prepare; 17 cents for a bowlful for the entire family to snack on.

Anyone can be a popcorn popping expert. Whether you choose a heavy covered pan, skillet, air or oil popper, innovations in proper manufacturing offer consumers a wide variety from which to choose.

The Institute's "Seal of Quality Performance" program was designed to help answer "which popper does the best popping job?"

Poppers awarded the Seal have undergone stringent laboratory testing for volume and waste. The popper must perform up to program standards on all varieties of popcorn.

Today's popcorn continues to improve with advances in new hybridization, harvesting and processing. Modern popcorn pops up nearly double the size of the corn our grandparents enjoyed.

Popcorn is the only corn that pops, and is one of five varieties of corn including sweet (corn on the cob), dent or field (used for animal feed), flint, Indian or pod (used mainly for decoration.)

The 'popability' factor also continues to improve with advances in technology. Since moisture is the key to popped kernels, controlling moisture content allows popcorn processors to guarantee 98 percent of the kernels pop to maximum potential if stored and prepared properly.

There are many different hybrids of popcorn. Two popular varieties are snowflake and mushroom. Snowflake produces large, cloud-like kernels, commonly available for home and theatre eating. Mushroom varieties pop smaller into a ball-like shape, and are perfect for confections and coated popcorn treats.

In addition to white and yellow kernels, popcorn comes in a variety of ears, including black, multi-colored, strawberry, and blue corn. All varieties, however, no matter what the color, pop up white.

Hereford volleyball varsity suffers heartbreaking loss

Hereford High School's varsity volleyball team lost out of second place in the District 1-4A standings when it suffered a heartbreaking loss to Dumas on Saturday in Hereford.

Hereford lost game one of the match, 15-13, and came back to win game two, 15-11. Hereford held a 12-10 lead in game three, but failed to score another point as Dumas posted a 15-12 game win and match victory.

Hereford is now 5-3 in district matches and 7-9 overall.

Dumas also won the junior varsity match, 14-16, 15-7, 15-13. The Hereford junior varsity team's record is 11-4.

"We're real proud of the way we played this outing. Our improvement is obvious since we played such a close match this time," Hereford Coach Brenda Reeh said.

"Although we played well the last time we met Dumas we did not play them nearly so close. Each match from here on out is critical for us. Five out of our next six are on the road and that won't make it any easier," she continues.

"The attitudes are still high though and the girls are ready to work hard each and every match from here on out," Coach Reeh adds.

Game one of Saturday's varsity match was tied five times — 3-3, 4-4, 6-6, 7-7, and 13-13. Dumas held a 12-7 lead during the game before Hereford chipped away at the lead on the serving of Nikki Self, Candie Robbins, and Tricia Kahlich, and with kills by Libby Kosub and Wisty Mars.

Mars' kill tied the score at 13-13, but Dumas went on to win the game, 15-13.

The early part of game two went on a long time with just a few points being scored. Kristi Wells, Mars, Jean Diller, and Mandy Gonzales all had kills that won back the service for Hereford during a stretch in which Dumas out scored Hereford 5-4, and a block by Robbins also resulted in a side out.

Among Hereford's points were a dink by Mars and a service ace by Self. Later, another ace by Self tied the score at 5-5.

Hereford fell behind 8-5, but a power serve by Kelly Wells scored a point for Hereford. Later, with Hereford trailing 9-8, three straight service points were scored by Kahlich to tie the game, with Kosub recording a kill for one of the points.

Dumas again got the lead back, 11-9. A kill and a dink by Kristi Wells moved Hereford into an 11-11 tie, and a service ace by Mars put Hereford ahead, 12-11. Mars served for those three points and also two more points — scored on a block by Robbins and Kristi Wells, and a dink by Stacy White.

Hereford lost the service with its 14-11 lead, but a kill by White brought the service possession back to Hereford.

Candie Robbins then blocked a Dumas spike for the game-winning point, 15-11.

Game three was a game of streaks. Dumas rolled to a 9-1 lead before Hereford got possession of the service. Robbins served an ace and served for four more points, slicing Dumas' lead to 9-6.

A dink by Mars put Hereford within two points, 9-7, and the game was tied, 9-9, when Dumas made a pair of mistakes.

Dumas once again held the lead at 10-9, but dinks by Mars and White, plus a good serve by Mars, put Hereford ahead 12-10. Nothing went right for Hereford the rest of the way as Dumas scored five straight points to win the game and match.

Wisty Mars led Hereford with eight kills and had 22 good spikes in 27 attempts. Tricia Kahlich and Nikki Self each had three aces, and Kahlich led in points served with 12.

Service reception statistics showed Mars with 26 good ones in 29 attempts, Libby Kosub with 22 good ones in 24 attempts, and Stacy White with 26 good ones in 31 attempts.

For the Hereford junior varsity, statistical leaders included Jill West with 11 points served, four service aces, and 19 good service receptions in 21 attempts; Poppy Richardson with six kills and eight points served; Linda Cera with five kills, 11 good spikes in 15 attempts, and 21 good service receptions in 24 attempts, and Jessica Dearing with 22 good receptions in 24 attempts.

Hereford plays at Lubbock Dunbar tonight. The junior varsity match is scheduled for 6:30 p.m. and the varsity match is set for about 7:30 p.m.

On Saturday, Hereford plays at Canyon, with match times of 2 p.m. for the junior varsity and about 3 p.m. for the varsity.
