POWER forum is Thursday

A farmer from Washington State who lives 11 miles downstream from the world's oldest nuclear waste site will speak Thursday at 7 p.m. at the Hereford Community Center.

The public forum is sponsored by People Opposing Wasted Energy Repositories (POWER) of Hereford. The group has also invited a representative of the Department of Energy to respond to the remarks of Tom Bailey, a third-generation farmer.

Bailey is an outspoken critic of the Hanford Nuclear Reservation and has been a leader in a fight to prevent the siting of a high-level nuclear waste repository at Hanford. DOE is also considering sites north of Hereford and in Nevada for the site.

Bailey, 41, farms in what is known as the "Death Mile"—only one in 10 families have not suffered at least one cancer death since 1943 in the area. The nuclear reservation was established in 1943, and water from 1943 until the late 1960's passed through reactors at Hanford and into the Columbia River.

All interested persons are invited to attend the forum.

Iran acknowledges U.S. attacked ship

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Iran acknowledged today that a ship attacked by a U.S. helicopter gunship in the Persian Gulf was part of its navy, but denied the vessel was sowing mines in the waterway.

State-run Tehran radio said five sailors were killed and demanded that the U.S. Navy hand over surviving members of the crew.

In Washington, the Pentagon said three Iranians were confirmed dead and two were missing. A Pentagon statement said a Navy boarding party found 10 mines aboard the vessel, the Iran Ajr, and that 26 crewmen — four of them wounded — were either picked up in a lifeboat or removed from the water.

"The ship belonged to the shipping company of the Islamic Republic of Iran and had been placed at the disposal of the country's navy," Tehran radio said in its main broadcast at 2 p.m.

The report came only a few hours after Parliament Speaker Hashemi Rafsanjani insisted the United States had attacked an unarmed cargo vessel.

Rafsanjani "categorically denied" the Iran Ajr was laying mines, according to Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency.

"Those who have entered the region by force and embarked on wicked acts will soon regret their actions," Rafsanjani told the Iranian Parliament today, according to an IRNA reported monitored in Cyprus. He said the raid "will not go unanswered."

Rafsanjani said the Americans fired on the ship "to overshadow" Iranian President Ali Khamenei's speech to the United Nations General Assembly today. Khamenei was expected to outline his country's stand on a U.N. cease-fire resolution aimed at ending the 7-year-old war Iran-Iraq war.

An Iranian Foreign Ministry statement said U.S. charges that the ship was laying mines were "a fictitious excuse."

The Foreign Ministry statement added: "The American aggression will certainly receive an appropriate response and the Islamic World."

The attack Monday night was the deadliest U.S. strike against Iran since the Reagan administration began expanding the American presence in the gulf in July in an effort to protect Kuwait's tankers and

keep the oil shipping lanes open.

The Iran Ajr, an amphibious landing craft, was attacked 50 miles northeast of Bahrain in international waters, Pentagon and White House officials said.

The 1,662-ton ship was under tow today by an American warship, witnesses reported. It was not clear where the ship was being taken. Witnesses aboard a chartered television news helicopter said that from a distance of about three miles the Iran Ajr showed no visible signs of damage.

The U.S. strike came shortly after a British tanker reported it was attacked about 100 miles north of Bahrain. The Pentagon said the incidents were not related.

This morning, the Iraqi News Agency said in a report monitored in Cyprus that Iraqi warplanes raided a "large naval target" off the Iranian coast. Iraq uses the term to describe tankers carrying Iranian oil.

Lloyds Register of Shipping for 1982-83 lists Iran Ajr as a 1,662-ton roll-on, roll-off cargo ship, built in 1978 and owned by the Iran National Shipping Lines. The vessel does not

appear in later editions of the registry, indicating it may have been removed from Iran's civilian fleet.

Pentagon spokesman Fred Hoffman said at least two American helicopters were on patrol from the frigate USS Jarrett when they spied the mine-laying through night-vision devices. One of the helicopters opened fire with 7.62mm machine guns and 2.75-inch rockets, setting the ship ablaze, the Pentagon said.

Although the Pentagon indicated one American helicopter opened fire, Pentagon sources said two choppers may have taken part in the assault.

The attack occurred as Iran faces increasing pressure to halt attacks in the gulf and accept the U.N.-sponsored cease-fire resolution. President Reagan opened the general debate session of the 42nd U.N. General Assembly Monday with a call for international sanctions against Iran if it rejects the truce.

The war between Iran and Iraq spilled over into the waterway in 1984, and the two countries have attacked more than 350 ships in the gulf

City okays park plans

Approval of plans to upgrade the playground equipment in city parks and for money to be contributed to the operation of a local domestic violence counseling agency were among the items given attention during a Monday night meeting of Hereford's City Commission.

"If it was up to me we wouldn't have anything out there but a grass lawn," Commissioner Emory Brownlow said in reference to the need for new playground equipment in the city parks. The vote, however, was unanimous to authorize City Manager Darwin McGill to begin seeking innovative playground equipment which is less susceptible to vandalism and which will decrease the chances of an injury suit against the city.

\$5,000 was allocated to begin the needed renovations, a priority of Commissioner Silvana Juarez, and it was decided that hazardous equipment such as merry-go-rounds and see-saws will be removed from the parks.

Also receiving a commitment for \$5,000 was Hereford's Outreach Office of the Domestic Violence Center. Executive Director JoAn Dwyer and Deaf Smith County Judge Tom Simons were on hand to make the appeal.

The outreach office has been operating in Hereford since May. Statistics show that from May 1 through August 31, the local center answered 96 crisis calls, handled 40 cases, sheltered 14 victims of domestic violence in Hereford and 25 victims outside of Hereford, filed 10 protective orders on behalf of victims and trained 15 volunteers.

Brownlow voiced some concern over the city joining the county in financially supporting the service. "What we are doing is taxing the city resident twice. It is unfair for a city resident to pay twice for the service (through city and county taxes) when the county resident only pays once."

Simons countered that county residents who do not dwell in the city

account for only a small portion of use of the service.

"In all candor the county is already providing office space and probably 95 percent of the calls for the service come from referrals of the city police department," Simons said. "I think it is only fair that the city helps bear the burden of the cost."

After lengthy discussion, Commissioner Tom LeGate made the motion that the city contribute \$5,000. The motion, seconded by Juarez, carried unanimously.

The funds will be used, along with a similar commitment expected to pass through County Commissioner's Court next Monday, as matching funds for a \$10,500 grant from the Criminal Justice Department.

In other business commissioners:

-Authorized McGill to submit proposals for the city's group hospitalization and life insurance.

-Approved the appointment of Steve Conway to replace Bill Townsend on the Deaf Smith County Appraisal District Board.

-Approved a request to change the zoning of property located between Ave. K and Blevins and Fifteenth and Sixteenth Streets. The zoning was changed from C-1, commercial retail, to R-1, single family residence.

-Heard a report from Cablevision Manager Lloyd Ames concerning recent improvements on local cable services. Ames said that there are now 29 channels available for local viewers. Areas of town not yet activated to the new system are King's Manor, Blue Water Gardens and those west of Kingwood and north of Park, according to Ames.

-Heard a report from LeGate regarding a recent Waste Deposit Impact Committee decision to take an objective approach rather than backing any specific legislation regarding Department of Energy site characterization studies being conducted north of Hereford.

-Discussed, but tabled, a new service franchise ordinance with Southwestern Public Service Company.

North began plans earlier

WASHINGTON (AP) — An Israeli government chronology and notes from an Israeli official show that Lt. Col. Oliver North was talking about diverting Iran arms sale profits to Nicaraguan rebels earlier than he admitted, according to congressional investigative sources.

Documents obtained by the congressional committees investigating the arms sale and diversion show that North already was thinking about using profits for the Contras in December 1985.

He told investigators the original idea for the secret diversion came in January 1986 from Manucher Ghor-

banifar, an Iranian middleman who also has been described in congressional testimony as an Israeli intelligence agent.

The documents, according to congressional sources familiar with them, say North mentioned a need to generate profits from the Iran arms sales and also talked of the needs of the Contras in a Dec. 5, 1985, conversation with an official of Israel's military purchasing office in New York.

The development was first reported Monday by the Wall Street Journal.

Domestic, juvenile problems top crimes

Problems involving juveniles and family disturbance calls, including some assaults, topped the list of offenses investigated by local police officers over the weekend and on Monday.

Juveniles were reported fighting in the 500 block of Blevins, and were involved in a case of criminal mischief in the 400 block of Ave. D.

Officers were called to Hereford High School to take a report of disorderly conduct involving juveniles, and juvenile problems were also reported in the 800 block of South Schley and in the 800 block of Irving. A missing person report was filed on a juvenile on South McKinley; however, the juvenile later returned home.

Charges were filed in a domestic violence incident which occurred in the parking lot of a convenience store. A woman reported that her husband had hit her in the face, knocking out two teeth.

Assault and violation of a protective order was reported in the 400 block of Bradley. Charges were not filed in a domestic disturbance in the 400 block of Ave. B in which a husband and wife argued and pushed each other around.

Officers were called to the 100 block of Aspen where a husband and wife were arguing and to family disturbances in the 300 block of Gracey, the 200 block of Whittier and the 500 block of George.

Assault was reported at Blue Water Gardens, where a complainant fell down when a suspect grabbed his arm. No charges were filed.

Burglary of a building was reported in the 900 block of South McKinley, with \$27 worth of items taken.

Other offenses reported included dogs fighting in the 800 block of

Brevard; black tire marks left in a driveway in the 200 block of Star; cars racing in the 600 and 700 blocks of Ave. F; disorderly conduct on Main Street and the 100 block of Alamo; a suspicious person in the 100 block of Ave. H and another on West Hwy. 60; a battery stolen from a vehicle at Blue Water Gardens; and harassment in the 600 block of Irving.

Six arrests were made, including a man, 37, for delivery of a controlled substance and criminal solicitation.

A 24-year-old man was arrested for his third offense of no liability insurance and failure to display driver's license. A 22-year-old male was arrested for his third offense of no liability, no seat belt and failure to have a child wear a seat belt.

A man, 21, was arrested for third offense of no liability insurance, and a 19 year-old male was arrested for no insurance, no seat belt and no driver's license.

A 22-year-old female was arrested on a Hereford warrant and charged with disturbing the peace.

Four minor accidents, with no injuries, were investigated and 33 citations were issued.

Welfare plan could cost Texas millions

DALLAS (AP) — Texas could lose at least \$17 million under a federal program because of its decentralized welfare system, which does not accurately reflect the number of illegal aliens in the state, officials say.

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services plans to award grants to states to help lessen the strain on their welfare systems from newly legalized immigrants under the nation's first immigration amnesty law.

The amount to be received by each state is figured by a complicated formula partly determined by the number of legalized immigrants and the amount of social services provided them by the states, the Dallas Times Herald reported Monday.

Under the plan, Texas would

receive the third-largest grant although it is expected to have the second-largest population of legalized immigrants, about 307,000, according to the preliminary disbursement calculations by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

New York, which is predicted to have the third-biggest number of immigrants — 258,000 — would get the second-biggest grant. California, with as many as 50 percent of the nation's illegal immigrants, would receive the largest sum.

Gov. Bill Clements and most of Texas' congressional delegation say the proposed federal formula unfairly penalizes Texas for its decentralized welfare system, which fails to accurately reflect the number of illegal

aliens in the state.

A congressional plan created last fall includes a four-year, \$4 billion federal pot to help states with welfare costs, but is awaiting public comment before it can become final.

Newly legalized applicants will be barred from receiving most of the federal aid for five years, causing them to continually turn to state and local programs for help.

Under the formula, Texas would get about \$38.6 million for the first part of 1988, New York would get \$38.8 million and California would get \$233.6 million, the Herald reported.

The payments for the rest of the year, and for those following, could change depending on how many illegals actually apply before amnesty

ends next May.

Texas officials say the plan should distribute the money on the basis of how many newly legalized citizens the state has. The newspaper said if the payments were figured that way, Texas would stand to get \$17.3 million more for the first part of 1988.

Opponents of the calculating method say it is based on an estimate that Texas had about 9 percent of the nation's illegal population. But as of Sept. 11, the state had accounted for 14 percent of all the applications filed in the first four months of the amnesty program.

Critics also say Texas would suffer from the allocation scheme because it has a less-centralized system of assistance than many other states, with most services provided at the local level and thus more difficult to identify.

Some state officials and immigrant advocates say the state is at fault for the shortfall because of a miserly approach to helping the poor.

"Texas' traditional disdain for social services, in this case, may end up hurting not only poor people but

the entire state budget," said William Beardall, of Texas Rural Legal Services.

Others say the state would capture more of the reimbursement funds if more illegals were encouraged to apply for amnesty.

"It's really very simple," said Mark Helmar, assistant secretary of California's health and Welfare Agency. "The more people who know about the program will become legalized, and the more that are legalized the more money we will get."

since then. Iraq strikes at ships to cripple Iran's oil exports, and Iran retaliates with attacks on neutral shipping, saying if its commerce is not safe, other shipping will not be either.

The Reagan administration agreed to reflag 11 Kuwaiti tankers to protect them from attacks from Iran, which accuses Kuwait of aiding Iraq. Five West European governments have sent forces to the gulf to safeguard commercial shipping.

The United States and Iran have confronted one another in the gulf before. A Navy F-14 Tomcat fighter fired two missiles Aug. 8 at an Iranian jet that was judged to be making a "hostile" approach on another plane. However, both missiles missed their target.

Iran has said in the past that the gulf would be "full of mines" until foreign powers withdrew their forces from the waterway. It has also claimed it sowed mines to protect its waters.

A reflagged tanker, the Bridgeton, struck a mine July 24, prompting the United States to send mine-hunting vessels to the gulf.

Diplomats at the United Nations expressed surprise at the American attack.

"We regret any incident that happens. That's why we're trying to end the war," said Diego Cordovez, U.N. undersecretary-general for special political affairs.

Gulf-based salvage sources and Lloyds Shipping Intelligence Unit in London said a British-flag tanker, the Gentle Breeze, was sailing empty to Kuwait when it was attacked about 9 p.m. Monday about 20 miles southwest of Iranian-held Farsi island.

A Filipino boatswain was killed as the ship was hit by 14 shells, said Aswin Atre, managing director of the ship's operating company, Wallem Ship Management Ltd. of Hong

Kong.

Lloyds said the vessel radioed that it had been attacked by an "Iranian missile boat," but Atre said the captain could not see the attackers.

President Reagan today defended the U.S. attack on an Iranian military ship that had been laying mines in the Persian Gulf, saying that "we did what was authorized by law."

Reagan, in an Oval Office photo session with Costa Rican President Oscar Arias, denied that the United States had entered a shooting war and said he did not intend to notify Congress of imminent dangers under the War Powers Act.

North testified that when Ghorbanifar raised the Contra diversion idea to him during a bathroom conversation at a European meeting, North thought it was "a neat idea."

The congressional committees investigating the affair read a reference to the earlier Dec. 5 North conversation with the Israeli official in a secret chronology provided by the Israeli government last month, said sources who commented Monday only on condition they not be named.

Then, while on a trip to Israel during Congress' August recess, Sen. Warren Rudman, R-N.H., the top Republican on the Senate Iran-Contra Committee, obtained a copy of the official's handwritten notes, in Hebrew, made at the same time the conversation took place.

In December 1985, North, then a White House aide, had been en route to a meeting in London on the issue of the American hostages and the arms sales when he stopped in New York to meet with purchasing officials, the sources said.

In another development, The

Washington Post reported today that North, in a memo last year to President Reagan, tried to discredit a critic of the Contras, Jack Terrell, by calling him a "terrorist threat" under investigation by the FBI.

The Post, citing documents released by the congressional Iran-Contra committees, said the memo adds fuel to allegations that North used the FBI to discredit opponents of Reagan's Central America policy.

Asked whether the Iranians would respond to his demand for an immediate cease-fire in the war with Iraq, Reagan said, "That's up to them." But he also said, "I don't think anyone can predict" how long hostilities will continue in the region.

"Twice Pardoned" film to show Wednesday night

"Twice Pardoned," a film which examines the ways teenagers cope with the pains and pressures of growing up, will be shown Wednesday at 7 p.m. at the gymnasium at the Church of the Nazarene in Hereford.

A part of the "Focus on the Family" series, ex-convict Harold Morris gives his life story and urges teenagers to avoid the snares, including alcohol and drug abuse, that led to his imprisonment.

Part of a two-part series that will

continue Sept. 30, Morris explains the vulnerability that comes from peer pressure and shares the consequences of his choices.

Morris was convicted on charges of armed robbery and murder on the testimony of two "friends" and was in the Georgia State Penitentiary for eight years before his release and full pardon on both counts.

The films are open to all young people.

Doctor with AIDS losing practice

DALLAS (AP) — Medical experts said it is unlikely that patients could contract AIDS from their doctor, but a pediatrician diagnosed as carrying the virus saw his practice virtually wiped out once the word got out.

Dr. Robert Huse said he never told parents of his young patients about his testing positive for the AIDS virus in 1985 because medical research indicated he was of no risk to those he examined.

But since becoming the subject of several news stories, Huse said there is no hope of continuing the private practice he has had for 12 years. His caseload has fallen, and he has decided to salvage what's left of the practice by selling it to another pediatrician by October.

A forum held Sunday by an AIDS expert for parents of Huse's patients failed to allay the fears of some that their children could contract the disease.

Dr. Richard Wasserman told a group of about 40 people that the possibility that Huse had infected his patients with the deadly virus was remote and that patients need not be tested for the virus.

"I can't imagine a circumstance in which a physician could bleed or spit or cry into an open wound," he said.

Huse said he expected word of his condition would ruin his business, so

three months ago, he decided to sell his practice and try to find other work, possibly caring for AIDS patients.

"I was vulnerable, and I thought the only way to protect myself was to get away from this and sell the practice," he said.

While some parents offered letters and phone calls of support, many reacted with a level of fear that surprised even Huse's colleagues in a medical community that has grown used to hysteria over AIDS.

Huse said nearly 70 percent of his appointments last week were canceled, and the office workers were busy with telephone callers wanting their medical records transferred to other doctors.

He was besieged with angry callers who feared their children may have been put at risk of AIDS while they were under the doctor's care.

"It's unheard of, that type of hysteria, panic or whatever you want to call it," Huse said at the end of an arduous day at the office that was filled with more phone calls, dozens of television crew members and only a handful of patients. "It's just so far out to me."

However, Huse said last week he had received more than 60 calls of support,

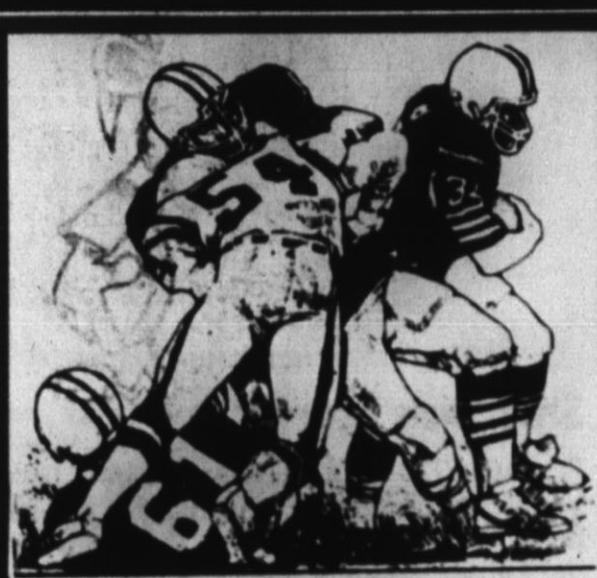

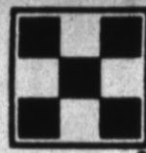

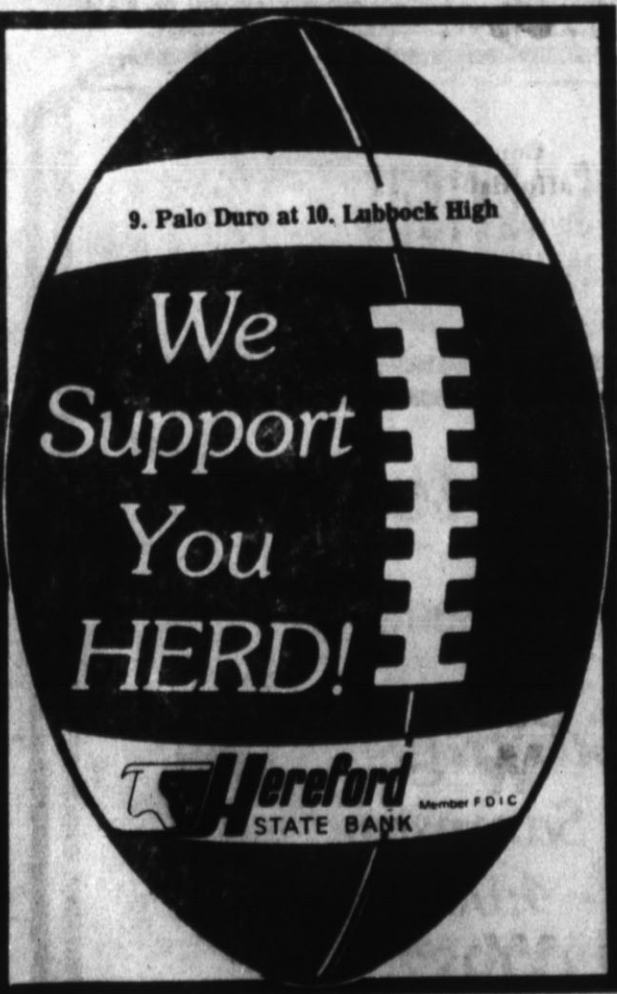

Stains on pans can be removed

DEAR POLLY — How can I keep my aluminum pan from turning black every time I boil eggs in it? — J.V.N.

DEAR J.V.N.: — The black discoloration is a simple chemical reaction and not harmful. However, you can minimize the discoloration if desired. Add a tablespoon of vinegar to the pot for every two eggs. The acid will help keep the aluminum bright and shiny.

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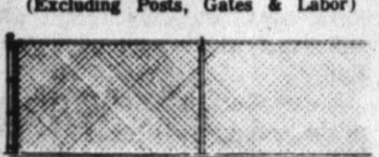
