Mattox is barred from rate hearings

AUSTIN (AP) - Attorney General Jim Mattox and his staff cannot participate in rate hearings at the Public Utility Commission, the threemember panel has decided in a unanimous vote.

The PUC ruled Wednesday in favor of a proposal made by General Counsel Lambeth Townsend, who noted that the attorney general's office is required to defend PUC decisions that are challenged in court.

"Such bizarre situations can be avoided by properly construing the statutes to prohibit ... the representation of the state agencies by the attorney general in these (rate cases)," Townsend wrote in a petition to the commission.

But Assistant Attorney General Scott McCollough, who has represented state agencies in PUC rate hearings, said there was no conflict because another division of the attorney general's office handles the defense of PUC decisions.

"This means the commission has opened the doors of the state treasury to the monopoly utilities in this state," McCollough said of the decision ending his representation of state agencies in PUC cases.

Commission spokesman Bill Dunn said the decision allows state agencies to be represented at rate hearings by their own lawyers or hired lawyers, but not by the attorney general's office.

Mattox previously has lost battles to defend consumers before the Texas Railroad Commission and the State Board of Insurance.

representing ratepayers supported Mattox in the PUC battle.


Don Butler, a lawyer for Texas cities, said consumer interests will be weakened in their efforts to combat "the massive resources of the utility companies."

"I think Mattox has played a very important role. I think it will hurt consumers in the long run that he's not participating," said Carol Barger, regional director for Consumers Union.

"The process is designed so that if all sides are represented the best decisions are going to be made and it seems this creates a void."

McCollough said his efforts in PUC hearings have helped save state agencies \$42.6 million in utility bills. He said no decision had been made on whether to ask a state court to overturn the PUC decision.

If such an appeal is filed, the attorney general's office would also have to defend the decision.

Iran strikes Japanese tanker; war escalates

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) - An Iranian gunboat fired a missile at a Japanese-owned vessel off Saudi Arabia's coast today, setting it ablaze and injuring three crewmen, marine salvage experts reported.

Iraq said its warplanes raided a ship off Iran's Kharg island oil ter- An Iraqi military spokesman saidminal five minutes after the Iranian strike. There was no immediate con-Consumer groups and lawyers firmation of the raid from gulf-based shipping agents or Iran.

Meanwhile, Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency said today that a U.S. warship attempted to force an unarmed Iranian reconnaisance plane to change its course Wednesday "but the plane successfully carried out its mission."

Iran and Iraq have attacked scores of ships in the waterway during their 7-year-old war.

The raid on the Panamanianregistered Tomoe-8 occurred a day after Japanese shipowners lifted a ban on their ships sailing in the Persian Gulf. The ban was imposed a week ago, after Iranian attacks on

two Japanese tankers. The experts said the raid on the 9,400-ton Tomoe-8 took place about 60 miles east of the Saudi port of Jubail at 9:25 a.m. There was no immediate information on casualties or

damage, they said. The Tomoe-3 was about 65 miles south of Iran's Farsi Island, a staging point for the Revolutionary Guards who launch speedboat attacks on shipping.

Maritime executives have expected Iran to launch speedboat attacks to retaliate for Iraqi air raids Monday on Iran's oil installations and shipping. The Persian Gulf nations have been at war since September 1980.

warplanes attacked a "very large maritime target," its term for an oil tanker, at 9:30 a.m. today south of the Iran's main Kharg Island oil terminal, the official Iraqi News Agen-

There was no immediate confirmation of the attack from gulf region shipping sources or Iran.

Iranian commandos fired on a Saudi tanker in the Persian Gulf Wednesday about 300 miles from today's attack on the Japanese ship. Minor damage was reported, but there were no injuries. Radio monitors picked up reports of another speedboat attack, but it could not be confirmed.

Iraq also said Wednesday its warplanes bombed a radio station at Elam in western Iran. Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency said a civilian was killed and others were

Both Iran and Iraq have attacked foreign ships in the seven-year war. The United States began to escort 11 Kuwaiti tankers in July to protect them from Iran, which considers Kuwait an ally of Iraq.

Saragosa relief

Wednesday that the Japanese government would finance a \$10 million navigation system to help guide ships through danger zones in the Persian Gulf.

Prime Minister Yasuhiro Nakasone said after meeting with President Reagan last month that Japan would aid U.S. efforts to protect gulf navigation, short of a military commitment prohibited by the constitution proclaimed after World War II.

About 55 percent of Japan's oil imports come from the gulf, through which roughly one-fifth of the noncommunist world's oil passes.

Reports were circulating in the gulf area that Iran was massing armed speedboats off Kharg Island. U.S. military sources in Bahrain said they could not confirm such activity.

Demos seek replacement

Robert H. Bork's opponents at the brink of victory, the Senate Judiciary Committee is combing the backgrounds of possible replacement candidates to fill the vacancy on the Supreme Court.

The number of senators declaring against Bork's nomination to the high court reached 48 Wednesday night, while 34 said they would support the nominee, according to a survey by The Associated Press.

The 51st announcement of opposition would ensure Bork's defeat unless a senator changes his or her

President Reagan continued to boost his nominee.

"I urge you to keep going," Reagan told Bork. Fifteen Senate backers met with Bork privately, and then walked him to the Capitol plaza, where they applauded as he entered a limousine.

"If he were on the fence when he walked in, I think he's a little more determined to hang in there," said Senate Republican leader Bob Dole of Kansas.

Still, Bork's supporters made clear

WASHINGTON (AP) - With that the appellate judge was at least considering asking the White House to withdraw his name.

Leonard Garment, a Washington lawyer who is advising Bork, said the judge would continue his quest for the nomination only if the president and the Republican Party agree to wage a full-scale national campaign in support of his confirmation.

"He's not willing to conduct a solitary crusade because that would quixotic and pointless," Garment said late Wednesday.

Ten more Democrats on Wednesday said they would oppose confirmation: John Breaux of Louisiana, Lawton Chiles of Florida, Kent Conrad of North Dakota, Alan J. Dixon of Illinois, J. James Exon of Nebraska, Wyche Fowler Jr. of Georgia, Albert Gore Jr. and James Sasser of Tennessee, Bob Graham of Florida and Richard Shelby of Alabama.

Wright says Congress won't okay Contra aid

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congressional leaders are telling President Reagan he cannot expect them to approve any request for renewed military aid to Nicaraguan rebels as long as Central America's peace effort remains on track.

"I don't believe there is any disposition in Congress to pass any military money at a time when we are negotiating for peace," House Speaker Jim Wright, D-Texas, said Wednesday following Reagan's speech to the Organization of American States in which the president vowed to seek \$270 million for the Contras.

But Wright said Congress does feel a responsibility, if the peace process succeeds, to provide any humanitarian aid needed to help the rebels reestablish lives as Nicaraguan civilians or relocate to

other countries.

Wright and other members of the bipartisan leadership of Congress were scheduled to meet with Reagan oday to discuss Contra aid and other asues, and it was expected the presi-lent would lay out a timetable for ormally requesting aid from Con-

enough aid will be given to maintain the rebels as "a viable force," and that aid gradually would be decreased as the Sandinistas open up the political process to opposition par-

"The Congress of the United States has made a moral commitment to these men. It cannot just walk away," Reagan said, referring to past Contra aid.

Reagan said the Sandinistas have a long record of "deceit and broken promises," and that the United States would therefore scrutinize their actions under a five-nation Central American peace accord to make sure elections are free, civil rights are fully restored and political prisoners are freed.

Those elements are among the con-

ditions set in the peace agreement signed in August by Nicaragua, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala and Honduras, Reagan noted, and said he was making no new demands of the Managua regime.

Police plan to test open container law

DALLAS (AP) - The traditional Friday night romp before the Texas-OU football game could become a testing ground for the state's new open container law, which took effect Sept. 1, police say.

Deputy Chief W.L. Cannaday of the Dallas Police Department, who is leading crowd control and security preparations for the annual bash. said officers will issue citations to drivers they see drinking. .

"It'll be just like a traffic citation," Cannaday said of the law, which made drinking and driving a Class C misdemeanor.

Pedestrians, however, will be permitted to drink and walk, so long as they do so in the right direction, with the proper frame of mind and without stopping.

Everyone in the rally "parade" must walk in the same counterclockwise direction, and dawdlers will be encouraged to move along by the 450 police and reserve officers who will be on duty downtown, Cannaday said. Foot traffic will move west on the north side of designated streets and east on the south side, he said.

The "moving sidewalk," as the

continuous-motion plan has been dubbed, was created by police several years ago to reduce confrontations among celebrants.

About 15 or 20 years ago, arrests approached 1,000 the night before the University of Texas-University of Oklahoma football game in the Cotton Bowl. In recent years, Cannaday said, only about 100 people have landed in jail on that particular Friday night.

"We're expecting about 100 arrests again this year," Cannaday said. Most of those will be for being drunk and disorderly.

In the years before police and lawmakers got involved, the pregame rivalry was far more raucous and dangerous.

When the old Baker Hotel at Commerce and Akard streets (since replaced by the Southwestern Bell Towers) served as mayhem headquarters, it was not unusual for guests to dangle such objects as chairs, lamps and each other from the windows to incite the mob below.

Police officers, whose white helmets made ideal targets, sometimes took direct hits from falling bottles.

Now the police are in place every few feet, the Baker is gone, the crowd is less frantic and, at midnight, the city's street department rolls out the water wagons and begins washing down Commerce Street and anyone who is left, thus signaling an end to the celebrating.

Merchants along Commerce Street no longer seem to fear the Friday night crowd. Several, including the downtown Neiman-Marcus store and the Adolphus Hotel, said they are taking no extra precautions.

And at the Adolphus Barber Shop, owner Joe Bob Henderson was at a loss for a promotional gimmick this

Against Levelland Lobos in road game

Whitefaces continue uphill climb Friday

The Hereford Whiteface varsity football team continues its uphill climb Friday when it plays a District 1-4A game at Levelland.

Kickoff for Friday's game is 7:30 p.m. Each game is a must-win game for the Whitefaces after the discovery of a player's ineligibility resulted in a forfeit of a district win.

Hereford enters the game with a 1-2 district record and a 1-4 overall record. Levelland is also 1-2 in the district, and is 2-3 overall.

'We've had a good week. I felt our team showed a lot of character under all the adversity," Hereford Coach Don Cumpton said. "We made some mistakes, but the effort was there to overcome them.

"If we play with that same intensity, we can overcome those mistakes and become better and better each week. We're still in the hunt. We've got to win one game at a time," he

Levelland's district victory was 20-17 over Dumas - a team that game on Friday, Oct. 16. Levelland has lost to Canyon 27-14 and to Lubbock Estacado 32-7.

The Levelland Lobos used the wishbone offense last season, but Cumpton says the Whitefaces need to prepare to defense a Lobo squad that uses the I-formation this year, as well as relying on the passing game.

"Their team is probably as good as they were last year at the skill positions. They don't have as much size in the line," Cumpton said.

Last year, Levelland had a 6-3-1 season record, including a 4-3-1 district record. The tie game was against Lubbock Estacado. Hereford defeated Levelland 8-3 on a rainy, muddy night.

Sixteen players from the 1986 Lobo team are gone because of graduation. Leading the way this year are quarterback Teddy Latham, split end Dennis Cunningham, and runn-

ing back Jay Fortner. Latham has completed 24 of 50 passes for 471 yards and three touchdowns, but has also been intercepted seven times. He has connected with Cunningham for 10 completions for 186 yards.

Fortner had his biggest game of the season so far in a non-district contest against Snyder. Fortner scored three touchdowns - 69 yards, 16 yards and one yard - to lead Levelland over Snyder 41-6. He has 191 yards rushing.

The Hereford Whiteface offense, led by running backs Marcus Brown and Kyle Andrews, will go against a Levelland defense that uses both the 4-3 defense and the 5-2 defense.

Brown has 418 yards rushing in 59 attempts with three touchdowns scored, and Andrews has 221 yards in 49 carries with two touchdowns scored.

Quarterback Jason Scott has completed 25 of 56 passes for 397 yards and six touchdowns, with three interceptions. The leading pass receivers for the Herd are Fidencio Cantu with nine catches for 186 yards and two touchdowns, and Rodney McCracken with eight catches for 112 yards and three touchdowns.

McCracken, who scored a touchdown on both offense and defense last week in Hereford's 25-13 win over Lubbock Dunbar, is now the leading scorer on the team with 24 points, four touchdowns.

For the Hereford defense, the leading tacklers in the Dunbar game were three linebacker, each with eight tackles - Michael Phibbs, Lee Young, and Joe Medrano.

Medrano is one of two Herd players who suffered injuries in practice Tuesday. Medrano's injury is his knee, and Richard Castillo suffered a sprained ankle. Castillo, a defensive tackle with 34 tackles in

five games, may be questionable for Friday's game.

Young and Phibbs are the Whiteface team's season leaders in tackles with 48 each. Medrano has 39.

The Herd is making a mark as a pass intercepting team. Eight players have combined to pick off 14 opponents' passes, including Keith Brown and Robby Collier who each have three interceptions, and Johnny Beltran and Rodney McCracken who each have two interceptions.

"We're proud of our whole team. We're looking forward to playing again. We hope people will stay with us. We plan on giving a great effort this week," Coach Cumpton said.

Levelland will aim to rebound from a poor rushing effort last week. The Lobos had only 16 yards rushing in the loss to Lubbock Estacado, and had 155 yards total offense. Levelland trailed by just six points at halftime, 13-7.

In the all-time series between Hereford and Levelland, the Lobos hold a 10-5-1 advantage over the Whitefaces. Hereford, however, has a three-game winning streak against Levelland, with victories in 1965, 1966 and last year.
