Brooks, LaVette, Powe cross picket lines

Nearly one fourth of Cowboys defy union

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Nearly a fourth of the striking regular Dallas Cowboys have crossed the picket line to join the unbeaten subs who wear the blue star on their helmets.

If Dallas Coach Tom Landry so wished, he could field four starters on defense and three offensive starters against the Philadelphia Eagles on Sunday.

Three more Cowboys ignored the NFL Players Association picket line Wednesday, including starting defensive tackle Kevin Brooks, who said he could have lost \$250,000 in deferred payments if he stayed away.

Reserve running back Robert LaVette and backup wide receiver Karl Powe, who had been on injured reserve, also joined the non-union ranks.

To make room for the additions, the Cowboys cut quarterbacks Ben Bennett of Duke and Stan Yagiello of William & Mary, running back Antonio Rice of Virginia, defensive tackle Darryl Lee of Ohio State and wide receiver Clay Pickering of Maine.

"I couldn't toy with my future," Brooks said. "I have to play to make a certain amount of deferred money (\$250,000). It was a hard decision and I still respect the union and what it is trying to do. I put off coming in for a

week. I just wish the issues were resolved."

Meanwhile, Tony Dorsett — who for financial reasons crossed the line earlier with Randy White, Danny White, Don Smerek, Ed Jones and Mike Renfro — said he would never be comfortable playing for a replacement Cowboys team.

He told the Dallas Morning News Wednesday he would "beg" Landry not to use him in Sunday's game, although Landry said he would have to monitor the situation before making a decision.

"For me to step out and play against scabs will always be tough," said Dorsett, who didn't play last weekend in Dallas' 38-24 victory over

the New York Jets. "That will never change. I'll just make a plea. If they want me to beg, I'll go out on the 50-yard line at Texas Stadium and beg them not to play me. ... That's how serious I am about this."

"I don't want to be here. I want to be with my teammates," he said.

LaVette said he had hoped the union would settle with management last week.

"I don't think anything is going to happen this week and I have financial obligations to take care of," LaVette said. "I have to come across."

Safety Bill Bates, who had indicated he might cross, refused to do so Wednesday, blaming manage-

ment "pressure ploys."

Club President Tex Schramm said he wasn't being unfair with the Cowboys' players by holding them to their contracts.

Team representative Doug Cosbie said, "We're one of the worst teams

in the league. We had two guys cross (Randy White and Don Smerek) 15 minutes after our first meeting. It was embarrassing."

He said the Cowboys "are not a team anymore and it's going to come back to haunt us when we take the field."

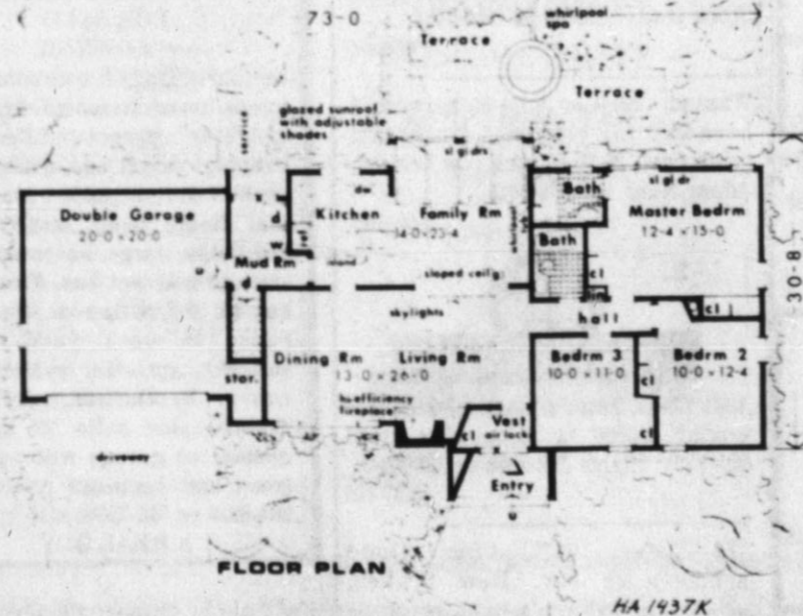

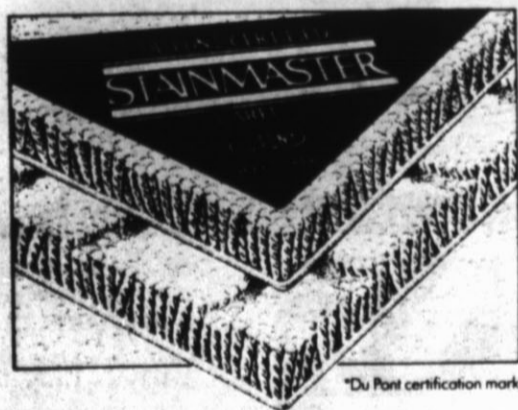
