## Easier rules leading to 'bankruptcy boom'

DALLAS (AP) — Experts say more people, including many formerly wealthy Texans, are filing for bankruptcy because of a change in the law which made filing easier and removed many provisions considered punitive by corporations.

Last year, 38,809 bankruptcy cases were filed in Texas and 561,278 nationwide, according to the U.S. Bankruptcy Court. In 1981, 10,295 cases were filed in Texas and 360,329 nationwide.

A change in federal bankruptcy laws in 1978 made bankruptcy a haven that allowed businesses to renegotiate debts rather than fail at the majority vote of creditors.

The list of people who have filed bankruptcy papers in Texas includes such high-profile people as former Texas Gov. John Connally; the Hunt brothers — Nelson, Lamar and William; Fort Worth industrialist T. Cullen Davis and Houston surgeon Denton Cooley.

"A lot of wealthy individuals are not afraid to file bankruptcy," said Andy Jllson, a lawyer with Jenkins & Gilchrist in Dallas. "And certainly the more they hear about bankruptcies, it removes some of the concern that they will be thought of adversely in the community."

### Excel to close plant at Friona

FRIONA—Excel Corporation will close its slaughter and fabrication plant here Feb. 29, laying off 1,250 people, it was announced Monday.

Excel, a subsidiary of Cargill Inc., is the largest employer in Friona, which has a population of about 3,000. Cargill officials say the plant will be closed indefinitely, but local employees are hoping the closing will last only a week.

Greg Lauser, Cargill spokesman from the Minneapolis, Minn., headquarters, said poor operating margins at the plant make the action necessary. "It's strictly economics," Lauser said.

The plant has a slaughter capacity of 3,600 head and fabrication capacity of 3,500 head daily. The facility was acquired by Cargill in 1979 from Missouri Beef Packers.

### Man jailed on marijuana charge here

Hereford police confiscated 1 1/4 pounds of marijuana worth \$1,000 Monday afternoon when police arrested Martin Soto on charges of possession of marijuana under 5 pounds.

Arresting officers Mike Ahrens and Sammy Sanchez reported they approached the suspect from behind while he was making the sale. "He had two big freezer bags full of marijuana stuffed under his jacket," said Ahrens.

Ahrens said this arrest was Soto's third felony, and he is currently in the county jail with bond set at \$5,000.

Robert Enriquez was arrested at the scene for an outstanding city warrant for allowing his dogs to run loose.

A proposed process for completing an economic development plan for Hereford and Deaf Smith County will be the subject of a work session at 7 tonight at the Deaf Smith County Library.

The session, hosted by the Waste Deposit Impact Committee, will bring the process for completing an economic development plan.

"WDIC has been seeking the opportunity to help the community look to its economic future prior to the phasing out of WDIC on May 31," said Phillip Niedzielski-Eichner, WDIC executive director.

WDIC has developed a proposal for completing a Comprehensive Economic Development Plan for the community that seeks a community-wide consensus and requires participation from many county residents.

Troy Don Moore, WDIC chairman, emphasized that the work session is open to the public. In discussing the need for participation, Moore said, "The community is at one of the most significant crossroads in its history. The choices made now regarding its future will have long-

standing impacts, even into the 21st century."

Moore said the felt strongly that these decisions require broad-base community input and support. Due to the deadline of completing a plan by May 31, when WDIC's contract terminates, the committee will act on the proposal tonight after the work session.

Moore pointed out that the proposal is not a foregone conclusion. "If it becomes apparent from the work session that the ideas proposed for completing a strategic plan do not have widespread support, then I personally would recommend tabling the plan for a few days to allow it to be adjusted as needed."

The work session will be in the Heritage Room, located in the basement at the library.

A discussion outline for the process developed by WDIC explains what economic development means; how to develop an effective "sales" pitch for the community; the ED planning process; establish goals for agricultural, industrial, commercial, retail, and residential economics and the quality of life;

Establish how to get where the community wants to be in the future; the role of WDIC, its liabilities and how to overcome those; and establishment of a structure to come up with the final plan and begin implementation.

The plan calls for a Community Resources Steering Committee including:

—A 50-person advisory committee that includes representatives of all economic and political interests in the county;

—A strategy design team including public officials;

—Process facilitation by WDIC and state agencies;

—The general public;

—And a 15-member Economic Development Planning Council that would give policy direction for plan completion.

During the next three months, several meetings concerning all facets of the plan will be held, ranging from high school students to special-interest groups. At least two general public meetings will be held between now and completion of the plan's final draft.

## Shultz claims progress but no superpowers' accord

MOSCOW (AP) — Secretary of State George P. Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze said their talks moved the superpowers closer to a strategic arms agreement and a spring summit in Moscow.

While the first of three planned visits between the two officials failed to resolve any of the major issues between the two countries, Shevardnadze and Shultz characterized the exchange as a positive step in U.S.-Soviet relations.

Shultz was to fly to Brussels, Belgium, today to brief America's allies on his visit with Shevardnadze and leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

At a news conference Monday night, Shultz said he would give "a good mark" to his two-day negotiating session on arms control, regional conflicts, human rights and other issues that divide the super-

powers.

Shultz said the State Department and the Foreign Ministry would instruct their negotiators at the strategic arms talks in Geneva to put together three documents essential to an eventual accord in time for the next Shultz-Shevardnadze meeting, in Washington on March 22-23.

The measures are to be aimed at verifying compliance with an agreement to cut strategic arsenals in half and to specify how the weapons should be disposed of, Shultz said. Strategic, or long-range, nuclear missiles have a range of more than 3,400 miles.

Negotiators also were instructed to try to resolve "some misunderstandings" about the U.S. program to develop a defense in space against ballistic missiles.

Assurances against cheating are "an extremely important thing to get

nailed down" if a treaty is to be ready by the time President Reagan comes to Moscow for his fourth summit with Gorbachev, Shultz said.

No specific date for Reagan's visit to Moscow was agreed to, but Shevardnadze told reporters at a later press conference that both sides want the summit in late May or early June.

Shevardnadze said the talks focused on "the pivot of Soviet-U.S. relations" — the pursuit of a strategic arms treaty.

Shultz, however, said humanitarian issues were his first priority.

"We got some helpful clarifications, particularly on emigration policy where we were assured there would be flexibility on applications requiring potential immigrants to have first-degree relatives abroad," Shultz said.

### On GOP primary ballot

## Leader pitches 'English First'

AUSTIN (AP) — Making English the nation's official language will bolster U.S. unity and security, says the leader of a group that supports a non-binding "official English" referendum on the GOP primary election ballot.

"It is vital to preventing the division of our country along ethnic or language lines and the ultimate resulting fragmentation," Lou Zaeske, chairman of the American Ethnic Coalition, told the Republican Forum of Austin on Monday.

"Here in this country, if we don't

have something to unite us, we have the real seeds for ethnic squabbling ... we've got people here with brown faces, white faces, black faces, yellow faces and red faces," he said.

The non-binding language referendum on the March 8 Republican primary ballot asks whether English should be the official language of Texas and the nation. It has no legal effect, but supporters hope that it will create momentum for action by lawmakers.

Zaeske, of Bryan, questioned spending tax dollars on bilingual

education programs, which generally are English-Spanish.

"All of us, of whatever ethnic background, are being taxed to enrich one foreign ethnic language and ethnic culture at the expense of enriching our American culture and our American language, which is English," he said.

"Not that people shouldn't celebrate their ethnic heritage, but it ought be done at private expense, not at public expense," Zaeske said.

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## Escobedo highlights amnesty push

WESLACO, Texas (AP) — With a television commercial under her belt, 98-year-old Clara Escobedo de Martinez will ride a festival float to urge others to join the parade of successful amnesty recipients. Mrs. Escobedo, the oldest person in the nation to receive amnesty under the new immigration law, spent Monday morning taping a television commercial that encourages other immigrants to follow suit. In the spot for the Immigration and

Naturalization Service, the agency's best-known alien tells those eligible for amnesty not to miss out on the opportunity before the May 4 deadline. Her next appearance will be live, when she rides on the INS float Saturday during the Charro Days festival in the border city of Brownsville. The Spanish-language commercial shows the diminutive great-grandmother sitting in a rocking chair flanked by two towering U.S. Border Patrol agents. "Are you afraid of the Border Patrol?" asks Mrs. Escobedo, who never learned English. "I used to be, but not any more. My name is Clara Escobedo Martinez and I waited 98 years to become a legal resident of the United States." Later, she adds, "Don't let this great opportunity pass by. 'It was the first and last time' she will do a television commercial, Mrs.

Escobedo joked after finishing the taping Monday at KRGV-TV in Weslaco. She said she went through the videotaping "con mucho gusto y mucho susto" (with much pleasure and much fear). "I'm thankful the Lord has blessed me enough to be able to do this," Mrs. Escobedo said. In Saturday's parade, some of the entries will cross the bridge into Mexico, but the INS float will not. The agency prefers to stay on this side of the border, said Charlie Perez, the INS' chief legalization officer in Harlingen. The public service announcement is part of a new, aggressive promotional campaign to attract more applicants before the May 4 deadline. "I think one of the things we're contending with is that there is some discussion out there that there are people who are eligible for amnesty

who aren't coming forward because of fear," INS spokeswoman Virginia Kice said. "We felt that Clara would be an excellent person to help us try and assuage some of those fears." Most aliens eligible for legalization under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 were given a one-year period to apply for legal residency if able to prove they lived in this country illegally since before Jan. 1, 1982. The application period began May 5, 1987, but because fewer have applied than anticipated, some, including members of Congress, are calling for an extension of the deadline. The INS is fighting the extension proposal. The widow, who lives in Brownsville, first came to the United States in 1927, and lived here legally until 1962, when immigration officials revoked her legal resident status because they thought she had been living in Mexico.

## Man surrenders after shooting

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — A man who officials say shot two plainclothes policemen, then took refuge in an office building and held hostages, was a transient with mental problems, the city manager said. The gunman, whose name was not released pending the filing of charges, had taken up to six hostages at an office building Monday night, released all of them and surrendered to police shortly before 10 p.m., said police spokesman Sgt. Paul Buske.

"The hostage negotiators just spoke to him and he eventually just gave up," Buske said. The man is accused of shooting two officers after a struggle on a downtown street at about 6:30 p.m., before fleeing into the Travis Park Plaza, Buske said. The man took two people hostage on one floor, released them, and then took three other people hostage on the third floor. The three escaped when the gunman walked into another area to take another hostage,

Buske said. The last man was released at about 9 p.m. and the gunman surrendered about an hour later and was taken to police headquarters. City Manager Lou Fox said the suspect apparently was a transient. "He's a black male, apparently described as a street person," Fox said. "My understanding is he had some mental problems and it's your typical downtown problem that we've been faced with."

## Church leaders tell Swaggart to lay off preaching 3 months

ALEXANDRIA, La. (AP) — Repentant television evangelist Jimmy Swaggart must stop preaching for three months and undergo a two-year rehabilitation and counseling, church leaders decided after questioning him about his sexual misconduct. "We accept his confession of specific incidents of a moral failure," Cecil Janway, Louisiana District superintendent of the Assemblies of God said late Monday night. "Based on his detailed confession and the evidence we observed of true humility and repentance, we have offered him rehabilitation." Janway made the announcement after Swaggart met here for more than 9 hours with the state council of the nation's largest Pentecostal denomination. The Executive Presbytery of the 2 million-member denomination in Springfield, Mo., can approve or modify the rehabilitation plan, said Everett Stenhouse, assistant general superintendent. Swaggart made no comment as he left Alexandria late Monday nor as he arrived in Baton Rouge on his twin-engine plane. The evangelist, whose Sunday church services are videotaped for distribution in more than 100 countries, will be relieved of his duties as co-pastor of the Family Worship Center in Baton Rouge, Janway said. Co-pastor Jim Rentz confirmed earlier that he would take over as chief pastor of the church, where Swaggart tearfully confessed his sin Sunday before a crowd of more than 7,500 people. Swaggart did not describe his misconduct, and the state council urged him not to. Janway said Swaggart would be counseled and supervised weekly by three members of the Louisiana District Presbytery during the two-year rehabilitation. He will be required to submit quarterly and monthly reports to church officials, Janway said. "Again no doubt, much speculation and rumor will find its way into the secular media, but for the church, the body of Christ, such speculation and rumor has no place," he said. "We urge Brother Swaggart and his associates to resist the request of those outside the church to respond to questions. Brother Swaggart has been in complete cooperation with the Assemblies of God and has

pledged to work within the structure of the church," Janway said. The Rev. James Robison, a TV evangelist for 26 years, said early today on ABC's "Nightline" that he expected Swaggart could weather the crisis. "I believe that he can have a greater ministry than he's ever had due to the strengths that he can draw from having gone through a crisis and a fall which is tragic, but it's not the end of the world," Robison said. Photographs allegedly showing Swaggart with a prostitute reportedly were given to church officials by New Orleans evangelist Marvin Gorman, who had once filed a \$90 million suit charging Swaggart with unjustly accusing him of numerous affairs. Gorman's attorney Hunter Lundy said of the photographs, "I know they exist and they're relevant." The Washington Post reported Monday, quoting a source who spoke to a Jimmy Swaggart World Ministries board member, that Swaggart said he did not engage in sexual intercourse with the woman but "paid her to perform pornographic acts."

One church official said Swaggart had confessed that his sexual misconduct had continued for years. "He tried and tried and tried through prayer and fasting and everything he could do to lick it and it beat him," the Rev. Glen Cole, pastor of the Capital Christian Center in Sacramento, Calif., told a Sacramento television station Sunday. Cole is one of 13 denomination officials who examined Swaggart's case last week. Janway told reporters that Swaggart will be prohibited from preaching a minimum of three months, "except in fulfillment of present commitments involving foreign governments during that period." He did not elaborate. Swaggart, a cousin of rock 'n' roll pioneer Jerry Lee Lewis and country singer Mickey Gilley, combined his singing and piano playing with old-fashioned, fire-and-brimstone preaching to build a ministry with an income estimated at \$142 million in 1986. Figures from 1986 showed that Swaggart donated \$12 million to the Assemblies, and more than \$10 million went to a foreign-missions program, making up about one-fifth of its budget, Assemblies spokesman Julien Turnage said.

Hereford is open this week and will play in the Andrews Invitational Tournament on March 4-5. The Hereford Invitational Tournament is scheduled for March 11-12.

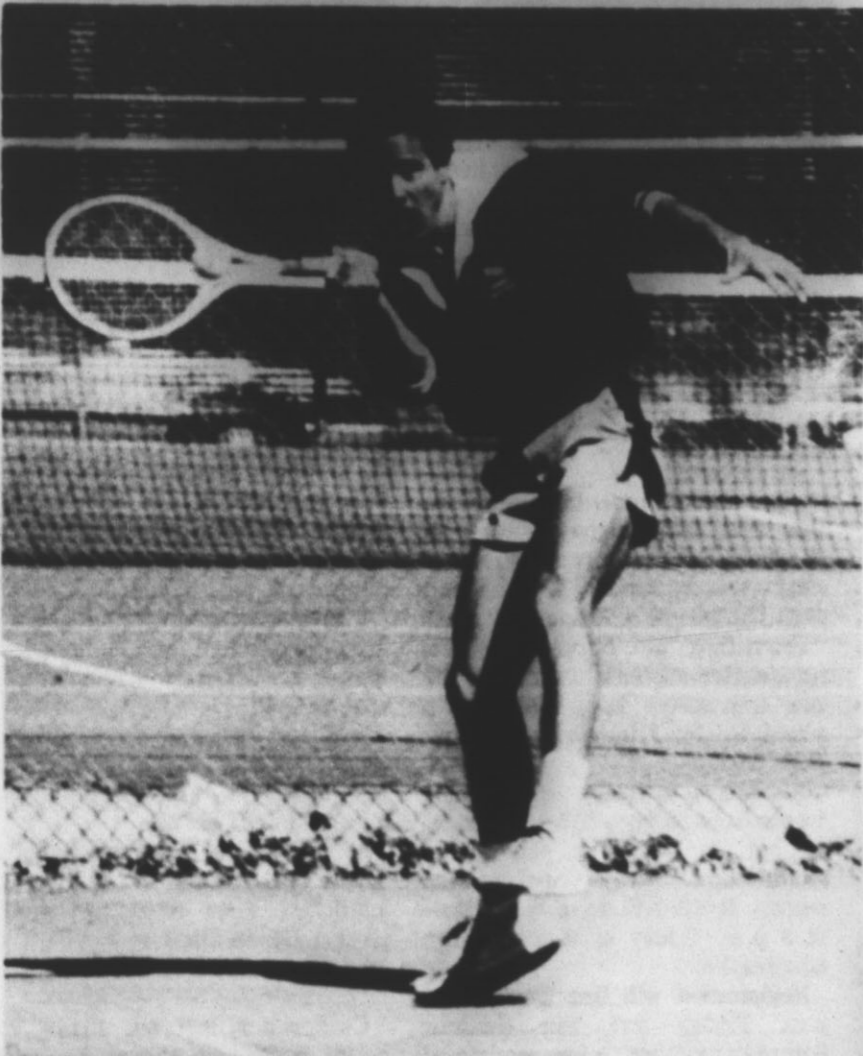

# Blair sets world speed skating record

CALGARY, Alberta (AP) — She is The Little Engine That Could, a feisty, freckle-nosed kid who just won't quit.

She's America's child, sponsored by the local cops, skating her heart out, winning on guts, singing the national anthem with tears in her eyes then celebrating at a beer bash with her family.

Bonnie Blair, who took her first wobbly steps on ice at 2 as the youngest of six skating children, Monday night glided to victory in world record time and captured the second U.S. gold of the Winter

Games.

Wearing a sleek silver and orange racing skin, Blair's 500-meter race shattered the relative quiet of a day that saw the Soviets and East Germans forge farther ahead of the other countries in total medals with 18 and 14, respectively.

Fierce, frigid winds again caused the postponement of the 90-meter ski jump and prompted one official to complain of the "psychological torture" on the jumpy jumpers.

Host Canada played Sweden to a 2-2 tie in a hockey game that pleased neither team and hurt both as they

enter the medal round against the favored Soviets.

Austria's Sigrid Wolf won the new women's super giant slalom and kept her country in third with three golds and seven medals overall. Neighbor and rival Switzerland, which was expected to dominate the Alpine events, has only one gold among its seven medals.

Wellington plays Morton in a class 2A area playoff at 6 p.m. Wellington has a 20-5 season record, and Morton is 26-6.

At 8 p.m., a class 3A area playoff contest is set between Dalhart and Slaton. Dalhart's season record is 16-10, and Slaton is 20-10.

Sweden finally won a cross-country ski race, the 4x10-kilometer relay, and joined the United States, Finland and the Netherlands with four medals each.

For the Americans, though, the shortest event of the day was the best.

"When I crossed the finish line, I think it was the happiest moment of my life," Blair said. "When they played the national anthem, I think it was the second."

"You try telling yourself it's just another race," she said, "but the jitters, the thrills, the crowds, the hype of the Olympics means it's a lot different."

Her time of 39.10 seconds was faster than any Olympian, man or woman, until Eric Heiden's winning mark of 38.03 in 1980. She was faster than Soviet Yevgeny Kulikov when he won the men's 500 gold in 1976, and less than a second off Soviet winner Sergei Fokichev in 1984.

Blair, smaller than her rivals but with a smile worthy of a cereal box,

felt going into the race she could beat East Germany's Christa Rothenburger, who set the previous women's world record of 39.39 here in December.

"This past week, I had gone a lap that I knew would be good enough to beat her," Blair said. "That's what I kept telling myself, that I could go faster. When I opened up faster than

she did, I almost knew there that I had it."

When she finished she knew she'd been fast, but didn't really grasp it until she saw the numbers on the board.

"It brought tears to my eyes," she said of the flashing world record. "I think I just got it on guts."

Guts or talent, Blair ripped by two-hundredths of a second the world record set a few minutes earlier by Rothenburger. East Germany's Karen Kania won her sixth Olympic medal by finishing third in 39.24 seconds.

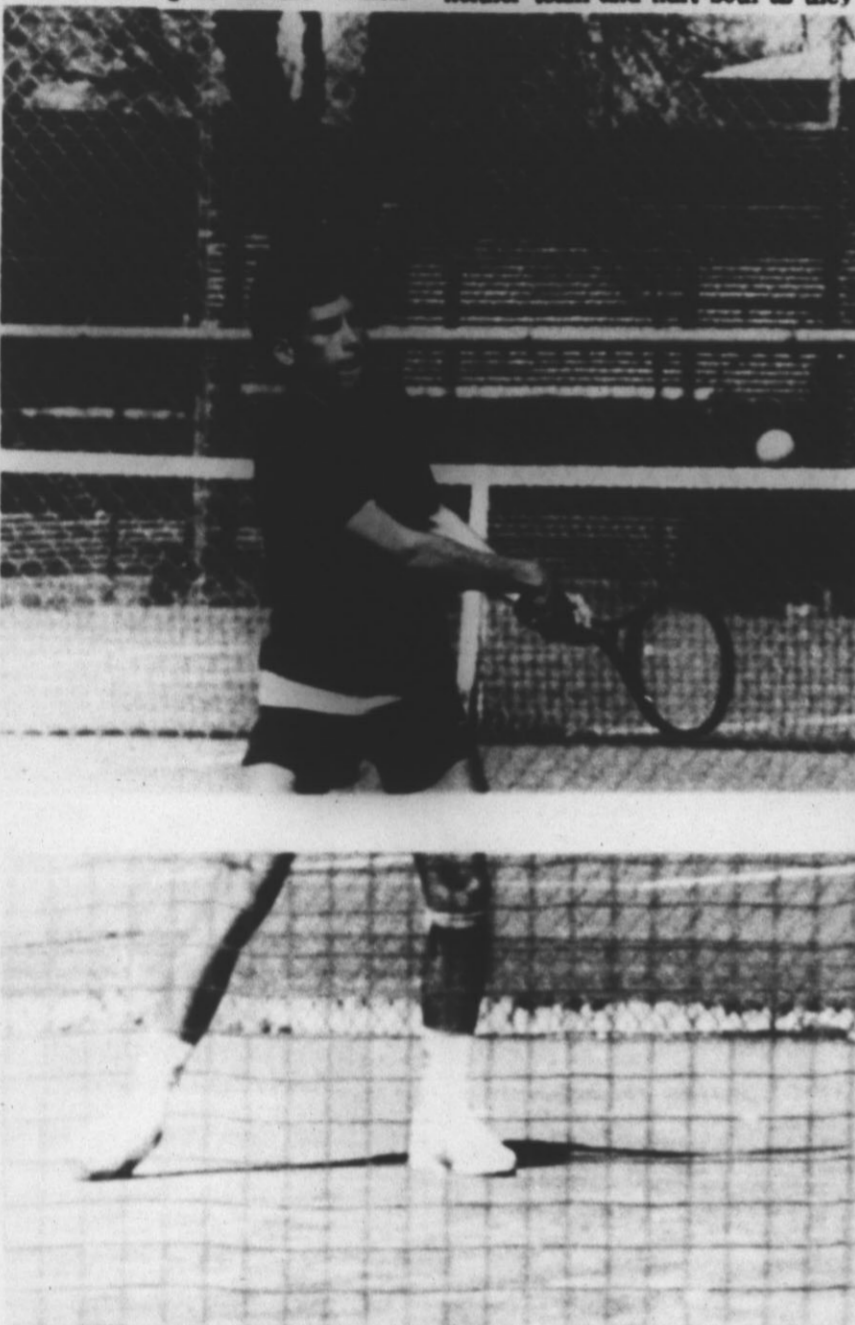

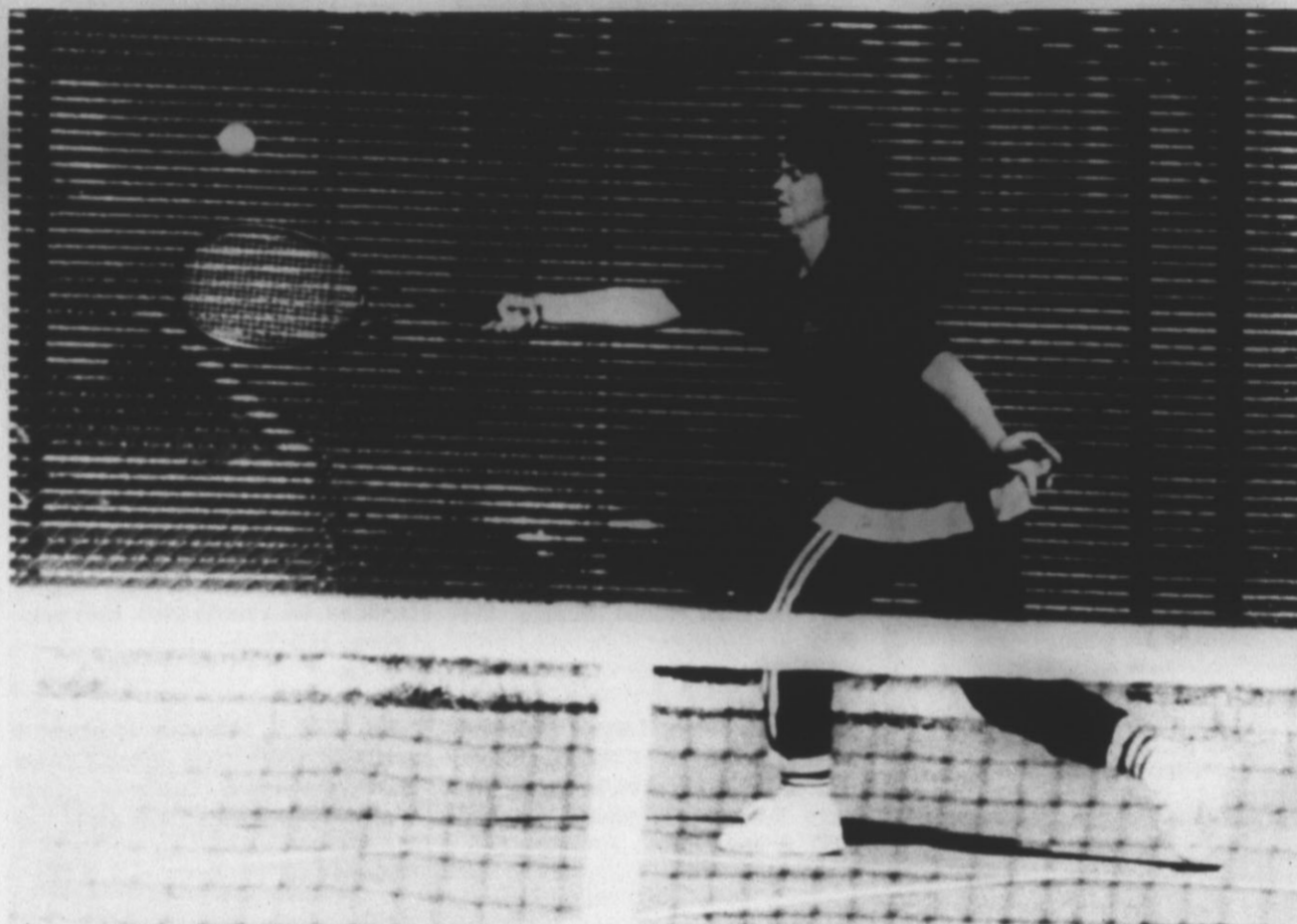
Watching Blair from the stands were her parents, including a brother who has a brain tumor and her father, who missed her birth 23 years ago when he had to serve as a timer at a skating event.

## FOUND HOPE AT HOPE

HOLLAND, Mich. (AP) — It's a long way from the village of Halan in Vietnam to the football field in Hope College here but Duy Dang made it. Dang is the place-kicker for the Hope team and is beginning to be noticed for his skill and consistency.

In 1980, he was a small boy in Halan when his father decided to send him to the U.S. He sent young Duy to Saigon. Twice the boy was arrested and twice he escaped. After 12 attempts to leave the country, 13 turned out to be his lucky number.

He got on a boat designed to hold 85 people. More than twice that many crowded aboard. Six hours later the boat's engine died and the craft could only drift. After a week the boat floated to the Philippine Island of Pagasa where the refugees found shelter. Eventually, Dang made it to Michigan where he moved in with a Vietnamese family.

## WATCHING OUT FOR SODIUM

WATERLOO, Ontario (AP) — Salt watchers should be on the lookout for the prime sources of sodium, which you'll often find by reading food and drug labels," says Lou J. Smith, executive director of the Canadian Water Quality Association. Smith says, "They are monosodium glutamate (MSG), sodium bicarbonate, sodium propionate, sodium benzoate, sodium hydroxide and sodium alginate." The average person consumes 5,000 milligrams of sodium a day," he says. "Drinking and cooking water (three quarts), softened from a 10-grain hard supply, may contribute 222 milligrams to the daily total, but a simple plumbing bypass can provide hard water for drinking and cooking, if desired."

## ASK DR. LAMB

### Heart and Exertion BY LAWRENCE E. LAMB, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I had a heart attack 10 months ago. They had to shock me several times. I am still having pains in my chest and get very tired and weak if I do very much. About how long does it take for a person to start feeling better? I had an angiogram and it came out good. It showed some blockage, but by watching my diet and medication there should be no further trouble. I have been told I could return to work, but I become very weak and tired just working around the house. Is there a time frame that is followed for recovery?

DEAR READER: If you are having that much trouble 10 months after your heart attack, you should have an exercise test monitored with an electrocardiogram to see how your heart responds to work. You may need additional tests to determine just how well your heart is functioning. There are all degrees of recovery after a heart attack.

A lot depends on how much heart muscle was damaged during the acute episode. If a lot of heart muscle was really lost, then your heart will not have the ability to pump an increased amount of blood needed for exercise or physical work. I think physical activity should be limited for three weeks after a heart attack involving a small amount of heart muscle and five weeks for larger areas of damage.

Pathology studies show it takes that long for a scar to form in the area of muscle injury. It is a lot like an injury to skeletal muscle. If you had a large area of muscle damage from an accident, it would not heal completely in a few days. Too much activity too soon can be as harmful or more harmful than not enough activity.

With severe damage to the heart, it may be difficult to walk down the hall. The heart can be so badly damaged that a person has congestive heart failure with the least exertion. But I have seen other patients with little damage return to competitive skiing without trouble.

Too much inactivity for too long can also lead to a loss of physical strength and the ability to work. You need some answers, and to get them you will probably need additional testing. DEAR DR. LAMB: Two or three times a week my husband comes home from his office around 5:00 p.m. and his speech is slurred. He has a problem carrying on a conversation or understanding what others are saying, and sometimes he is clumsy. His parents had a history of alcoholism. I am very worried about him and need your advice as to what to do.

DEAR READER: There are several neurological disorders that can cause intermittent slurring of the speech. There is no way I could tell you if he

is hitting the bottle or has one of these. But in either case you need to know what is happening. Have him make an appointment with a neurologist and be sure you accompany him and hear what he tells the neurologist. If he has a neurological problem he needs and deserves help. If not, you both need to face the real problem.

DEAR DR. LAMB: We read with interest your comments in THE HEALTH LETTER concerning the different methods used to determine cholesterol values. My husband watches his cholesterol very carefully and inquired of the method used to check his. He was told it was the American Monitor Analytical System and enzymatic method. Since that is not one of the methods you mentioned, he is eager to know how this compares with the Lipid Research Clinics (LRC) method.

He participates in a cardiovascular program and has his blood checked through the program. The people in charge of the program are also interested in how their test compares with the LRC method.

DEAR READER: Most research that has been done in recent years, as by the National Institutes of Health, has used a standard method to measure cholesterol levels. The results must be standardized to compare one population with another. Their standardized method is called the Lipid Research Clinics (LRC) method. When doctors read (in medical journals) the acceptable levels, or the levels associated with increased risk, the values are based on the LRC method.

Sometimes, the patient goes to his doctor, has his blood drawn, and it is sent to a laboratory that uses an entirely different method. Usually those methods give results that are 10 to 15 percent higher than the risk levels referred to in medical journals based on the LRC method. The doctor then uses the result from this other method and interprets it in accordance with what he has read.

As a result, he and the patient think the cholesterol level is higher than it would have been if measured by the LRC method. That means both become alarmed when in fact the values may be within normal limits. The doctor cannot properly interpret the cholesterol test on his patient unless he knows how it compares with the LRC values that the risk factors are based on.

I wish I could answer all the requests for different methods used, but I can't. However, every doctor using cholesterol tests, or any laboratory doing these tests, should know how the results of their test method compare with the LRC method. They should check with the laboratory or the company that provides the system for the test to find out. Then they should use that information to correctly interpret the tests on their patients.

As I mentioned in "Is Your Cholesterol Level Misleading?" in THE HEALTH LETTER 29-5, two of the most commonly used methods provide results considerably higher than those done by the LRC method. I don't often do this, but on this occasion I would recommend taking a copy of this issue to your doctor and asking him to find out how the test he is using compares with the LRC method. He may already know. But if he doesn't, he will be able to use the information to his advantage in evaluating his patients' risk of having a heart attack and how effective the various things are that he uses to control high levels of cholesterol. No harm is done by treating people or taking measures to lower cholesterol (since the lower it is, the less the risk), but it makes good sense to really know what your test means rather than being misled.

This is a heavy decision that is sure to have serious repercussions for years to come. We can't afford to make a mistake. You are a twin, Ann Landers, what do you think?—Anonymous in Houston

DEAR ANON: You must treat your children like separate individuals.

Forget that they are twins. Let each one move along at his or her speed with no regard to what the other is doing.

Holding the girl back when she is clearly ready to go to kindergarten is patently unfair. And face it, you'd be doing it to spare her brother's feelings.

It appears at this stage that you daughter is going to be the leader and you cannot protect her brother against that reality. She will not excel in every area, however, and this is where parental judgment can be crucial.

Find out what the boy does best and encourage him to move along in those areas. Praise and encourage him. Urge both children to develop their own special talents. Never make comparisons.

Let his thing be his and her thing be hers. In this way you will have two well-adjusted children who will experience normal sibling rivalry, but there will be little mean-spirited jealousy between them.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: In response to "No Dolly in Connecticut": I, too, was "The Other Woman" and her head is full of hot

air. If she gets her "gem" she can look forward to becoming just as unpleasant and unhappy as his wife.
