City considers building code

The Hereford City Commission affixed its first brick Monday night in its design to adopt a city building code because of substandard construction throughout Hereford.

"In no way would this building code hinder growth in Hereford, but it would eliminate some of what we've experienced in the past," said City Manager Darwin McGill, referring to such problems as people using crates to construct carports. "We're not trying to punish anyone, we're just trying to enhance life by raising the standard of construction in Hereford."

The building code, which has not been formally adopted, will be a southern standard code which is used by most other rural communities in Texas. Building inspector Marvin Gaddy will enforce the code which will complement the plumbing and electric codes.

"Marvin's opinion is that the southern standard code is easier to

interpret than the uniform code which the metropolitan areas use," stated McGill. "He has worked with the southern standard in Dalhart and he recommends it."

Commissioner Emory Brownlow expressed disdain about adopting a building code because of its complexity and length.

"You're gonna have a heck of a problem when people go to reading that code," said Brownlow. "When you get people wanting to build their own home, you're (Marvin) going to have to sit down and explain it. We should condense the original code and put it in plain language—black and white. Plus, you're gonna have people wanting to build who've been doing things when they want to and where they want to."

McGill retorted that this was obvious by "just driving down the road and looking at the construction." He further explained that the code was rather lengthy, but for most builders, the specifications were common knowledge.

The commission's next step after formally adopting the code will be to appoint a building code appeals board.

In another matter concerning buildings, the commission voted to condemn former residences at 333 Ave. J, 206 Whiteface Ave., 133 Ave. E, and a building in the 500 block of George Street.

"We've selected only ones truly and totally unsafe which the fire marshal and building inspector have said can't be rebuilt," said McGill. "Most of these buildings have received complaints from neighbors, saying they are eyesores to the community."

Melvin Weber presented the commission with plans to subdivide the Weber Estate approximately one mile north of the city limits on U.S. 385.

"I'm just wanting to see if I'm going in the right direction before paying an engineer \$5,000 to draw up plans that won't pass," said Weber.

Pet tattooing is best for identification

Pet detective Karen Green offered several reasons for dog snatching at a meeting Sunday of concerned pet owners in Hereford, but pet tattooing, she said, is the best mode of reuniting a dog owner with his dog.

Green, who is co-owner of Pet Finders in Amarillo, was brought here by Edith Coffman to investigate what Coffman says is an outbreak in

dog thefts. Green is so vehement about tattooing's advantages that she is setting up a tattoo clinic from 2 to 6 p.m. Saturday at Coffman's grooming salon, Belles and Beaus, at 311 N. 25 Mile Ave.

"Each tattoo, normally priced at \$30, will cost \$15," said Green. "Five dollars of that will be placed in a reward fund for lost dogs to be set up at a local bank."

Green said she will tattoo the last

four digits from the pet owner's social security number on the dog's right hind leg and will register the number with Pet Finders.

"A lot of dogs around Hereford have been stolen lately, and we just don't know what's happened to our babies," said Coffman, referring to the recent theft of her two Pomeranians worth \$650. "So we brought in a professional to help us out."

Green has had two bull mastiffs worth \$500 to \$1,000 each stolen, too, and she relayed to the audience how tattooing the third bull mastiff helped her locate the pet.

"I found a man in north Amarillo who was breeding pit bull dogs with bull mastiffs, and my tattooed dog was there. I said it was my dog, but he said it was his. Then I showed the police my social security number which matched the number on the dog's hind leg, and the police said it was my dog without a doubt."

The detective has noticed that many dog owners in Hereford haven't been so lucky.

"You have more than the normal amount of dogs lost in Hereford that haven't been found," said Green. "Many pure-bred puppies are taken for monetary reasons, or many times middle-size dogs are taken for research purposes. Too, dogs have been stolen to train greyhounds for racing or pit bulls for fighting."

Whatever the reasons for the missing dogs, Green plans to set up a base at Green's grooming salon where information may be given about lost pets. Green said she will aid in finding the missing pets by placing posters around town with a picture of the dog, a description, and phone numbers to contact if the dog is located. A reward will be offered for any information leading to the whereabouts of the pet.

"Since the case is so different here in Hereford because of so many dogs being lost, we'll get lots of pertinent information. Therefore, we can't give the whole \$500 to everyone with information, but we'll give part of the reward to that person," said Green.

Schlabs is top farmer

Raymond Schlabs was named Hereford's "Man of the Year in Agriculture" Saturday at the annual banquet of the Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association at the Bull Barn in Hereford.

Schlabs received the award from Hereford Brand Publisher Speedy Nieman. The Brand has presented the award annually since 1978.

Schlabs was born and raised near Hereford and began farming south of Summerfield. He now farms about 3,000 acres north of Hereford and produces sugarbeets, corn, cotton, milo, wheat and vegetables.

Schlabs has provided land and materials for conducting wheat variety demonstrations for the Extension Service for 20 years, and has conducted numerous other on-farm demonstrations. He has also provided land and equipment to the Extension Service.

He is vice president of the Texas Corn Growers Association and vice chairman of the Deaf Smith County Extension Program Council, chairman of the County Extension Crops Committee, serves as an ASCS community committeeman, and is an active member of St. Anthony's Catholic Church, where he is currently the Grand Knight of the Hereford Council

of the Knights of Columbus.

He and his wife, Mary, have three sons and four daughters. His three sons and two of his sons-in-law are involved with him in his farming operation.

Also recognized at the banquet were members of the "10,000 Pound Club," growers who had top tonnage and sugar percentage in their 1987 beet harvest. Farm programs outlined

Provisions of the 1988 farm program, the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and conservation compliance were detailed Monday in a meeting at the Bull Barn in Hereford.

Most of the meeting dealt with CRP, a program that allows farmers to promise not to plant on land for 10 years, planting natural grasses on it, and getting annual payments from the federal government.

"CRP is a voluntary program," said Extension economist Dr. Bill Harris. "A farmer can offer a bid on it or not offer a bid on it." The program now includes 23 million acres and 209,000 farmers of a goal of 45 million acres and 409,000 farmers in the two-plus year of the program.

In Texas, 2.8 million acres of the

eligible 13.9 million acres is in the CRP. Texas farmers are receiving \$110 million a year from the program, which is paying over \$1 billion to farmers across the nation.

A program with more potential impact is conservation compliance.

Conservation compliance will require all farmers who have fields consisting of 33 percent or 50 acres of "highly erodible soil." That designation is made by the Soil Conservation Service from looking at soils maps and individual fields.

If a farmer has highly erodible land, he has until 1990 to formulate a plan with the help of SCS personnel, then must have the program in place by 1995. "A farmer must comply, plant a permanent cover (by successfully bidding the land into the CRP), or continue to farm the land but be ineligible for farm program

benefits," Harris explained. "A lot of highly erodible land will go back to native grass because it will be expensive to farm it. Renters may give some land back to owners, and some land will be abandoned by absentee owners because of higher costs. We expect to see more land bid into the CRP."

Some farmers are waiting to see if the program becomes more economical for them. Harris said some preliminary studies by Texas Tech and Texas A&M universities indicate there could be a large negative impact from the program, but those studies are not yet final.

Farmers who decide not to develop and implement a conservation plan on highly erodible cropland would lose price and income support, crop insurance, Farmers Home Ad-

Spelling bee set March 10-11

The Deaf Smith county Spelling Bee has been scheduled for March 10-11, it was announced today by County Bee Chairman Speedy Nieman.

Elementary and junior high school winners must be determined and reported to The Brand by March 7, said Nieman. The junior bee, for fourth through sixth grade students, will be held March 10 at 3 p.m. in the Heritage Room at Deaf Smith County Library. The senior, or county, bee will be held the following day at the same time and place.

The junior bee will be open to the top four winners from each elementary school. The winner of the junior bee and the three runners-up will be eligible to compete in the county bee.

The county bee will be open to the top three winners from each junior high, as well as up to four winners

from the junior bee. Only the county bee winner will advance to the regional bee.

Bera Boyd will again give out the words for the bees and all will come from the 1988 issue of "Words of Champions," prepared and printed by the national sponsors, the Scripps Howard Newspapers.

The student who takes first place on March 11 will be one of 45 county finalists competing in the regional bee on the West Texas State University campus on April 11. The regional winner will go to Washington, D.C. in late May to represent the area in the National Spelling Bee.

Sponsors of the regional bee are the Amarillo Globe-News and WTSU. This is the fortieth year the educational program has been made available to students in the eighth and lower grades.

ministration loans, CCC storage payments, farm storage facility loans, CRP payments and, potentially, other program payments.

"We want to get you (farmers) more aware of the programs," Harris said. "We encourage you to get specific publications from your ASCS and SCS offices for applications and implications for individual operators. Learn all you can about these programs and do it now."

"The greatest concern we have is that everyone will wait until 1989 to get started and our offices aren't going to be able to handle the rush."

Deaf Smith County ASCS Executive Director Ted Peabody and ASCS District Executive John Fuston outlined details of the 1988 farm program.

Sign-up for the program will run from Feb. 16-April 15, and some changes have been made as a result of budget deficit reduction legislation.

Target prices were lowered 1.4 percent, while loan rates were reduced only 3 percent compared to the 5 percent announced earlier. Feedgrain producers will be offered an option 10 percent paid diversion, with a diversion payment rate for corn at \$1.75 per bushel.

The program will include mandatory advanced apyments of at least 40 percent for wheat and feedgrains, with a maximum of 50 percent for all crops.

A 0-92 program will be offered to wheat and feedgrain participants,

meaning they would be paid for 92 percent of their historical yield without planting. The program will have guaranteed minimum deficiency payments.

Wheat program participants will receive 75 percent of the projected "Findley" payment by next Dec. 31.

More information on the program will be available at the ASCS office here, and at the Extension office in the Deaf Smith County courthouse.

Experts also detailed ways to make CRP land more attractive to wildlife, but urged producers to check first with ASCS and SCS personnel before implementing wildlife-enhancing strategies to make sure those plans don't run afoul of the CRP provisions.

Presidential polls favor Bush, Gore

Texas survey reveals voters distrust election 'theatrics'

Vice President George Bush and Senator Al Gore Jr., are currently favored to receive the most votes for the Republican and Democratic nominations for President in the March 8 Texas Primary Elections.

Both Bush and Gore enjoy 2-to-1 leads over their nearest rivals, the Republicans' Senator Bob Dole and the Democrats' Gary Hart and Governor Mike Dukakis.

On the other hand, millions of Texans registered to vote will probably not even go to the polls during either the Primary or General Election this year. Many voice disillusionment with today's campaigns, and the lack of published information about the candidates.

These were among the findings of a statewide survey commenced in November and updated this month by the Texas Newspaper Advertising Bureau, an affiliate of the 108-year-old Texas Press Association.

Survey respondents also voiced strong resentment toward the "campaign theatrics of TV commercials," and the lack of in-depth campaign information in newspapers.

The survey was conducted by a questionnaire in 60 Texas newspapers.

All responses were in writing, and included hundreds of strongly worded criticisms of today's campaign methods. Newspaper readers were selected for the survey because they represent some 90 percent of the voters in Texas.

Following Gary Hart's re-entry as a candidate, the respondents

were re-contacted in writing and asked for an update to include Hart. A postscript also asked respondents for their selection of New York Governor Mario Cuomo, too, should he have become a candidate.

The study was principally conducted to identify the reasons for the public's increasing lack of interest in election campaigns and other important governmental issues of the day.

Some 4,509,908 Texans registered to vote didn't go to the polls during the 1986 General Election. This is compared with 1,298,709 not voting in the Presidential Election ten years earlier, in 1976.

Some 75.8 percent of Texans registered to vote turned out for the 1976 Presidential Election, while the 1986 Gubernatorial Election attracted only 43.2 percent.

Meanwhile, survey respondents were overwhelmed in selecting newspapers as their favorite source of election information. Typifying those findings were the following:

60% of the voters trust Newspapers the most; 8% trust Radio; 25% TV, and 7% trust other sources of information.

43% use Newspapers for election information; 7% use Radio; 38% TV, and 12% use other sources.

42% favor election campaigning in Newspapers; 5% favor Radio; 27% TV, 24% door-to-door visits, and 2% like phone soliciting.

Respondents selected the Republican candidates as follows: Bush 49%; Dole 26%; Robertson 11%; Kemp 7%; duPont

4%, and Haig 3%. Bush's overall strength included 1,152 first place counts, to Dole's 600. And although Robertson's first place counts moved him into third place over Kemp, he received 43% of all last place votes to double the last place votes received by Haig.

Democratic candidates prior to Hart's re-entry into the race ranked as follows:

Gore 34%; Gephardt 20%; Dukakis 16%; Simon 13%; Jackson 10%, and Babbitt 7%. Gore's overall rating was 456 first place counts, as compared to Gephardt's 264.

Democratic rankings after Hart had re-entered the race (based on approximately 50% of the original responses) were:

Gore 32%; Hart 18%; Dukakis 16%; Simon 13%; Gephardt 10%; Jackson 7%, and Babbitt 4%. Few respondents selected Hart for second through sixth place. But he led in last place votes with 45%, as compared to Jackson's 32%. Gephardt had the biggest drop.

Meanwhile, 24% of the respondents indicated they would have changed their first place votes to Cuomo had he entered the race. Cuomo received extremely few second through seventh place votes, however.

Overall candidate strengths were based on accumulated totals of 6,715 Republican and 4,247 Democrat.

Campaigner revolted by politics

HOUSTON (AP) — A former campaign worker for Democratic presidential candidate Pete du Pont says controversy surrounding forged petitions will dissuade her from politics in the future.

"I don't think I'll ever be involved in politics because of this one. I am absolutely disappointed," Rosanne Robertson, 24, told a news conference Monday. "I found out politics is no place for a romantic. I am really ashamed of the whole political system."

Meanwhile, the campaign of the former Delaware governor denied Monday its national political director, Tim Hyde, was involved in any apparent forgeries on petitions needed to get du Pont on the ballot in the Texas primary.

Ms. Robertson's father, Guy Robertson, claims he has a tape recording in which Hyde admits coming to Houston, forging

signatures on petitions and teaching Ms. Robertson how to do likewise.

On the tape, the elder Robertson claims Hyde said he tore up the signatures he forged. Robertson also claims Hyde attended a forging party Jan. 2 at Robertson's Houston home.

Dan Swillinger, a Washington D.C. attorney representing the du Pont campaign, said he was outraged by the reports, and challenged the existence of the tape. Swillinger said that if such a tape does exist, it may have been part of a setup initiated by Ms. Robertson in an early morning telephone call Sunday morning.

"He (Hyde) was asleep and groggy and she was trying to get him to implicate himself or unimplicate her or something," Swillinger said. "And after she finished with him she called the campaign manager and did the same thing about 1:15 a.m."

Swillinger said Hyde does not

remember details of the phone call, and wasn't sure if it was being taped.

Robertson claims a copy of the tape is with attorney Steve Shaw, who is representing his daughter. Shaw would not comment about the tape, and would not confirm or deny its existence.

Shaw and Houston private detective Clyde Wilson, hired by Shaw, have alleged in the past that other people in the du Pont campaign were directing the activities of Ms. Robertson.

During the news conference, Ms. Robertson declined to say whether or not she forged signatures, but said that she did not know that forgeries would have been illegal.

"No, I didn't know that," she said. "I found out when Mr. (Clyde) Wilson told me. He told me what laws it violated."

Robertson campaign may battle decision to terminate verification procedure

AUSTIN (AP) — The Pat Robertson presidential campaign is considering a legal challenge of the Texas Republican Party's decision to give up on its verification process aimed at checking signatures on ballot petitions that include apparent forgeries.

State GOP Chairman George Strake announced Monday that all six presidential candidates, including four whose petitions apparently bear the forged signatures of Democratic and dead Texans, would be allowed to earn delegates at the March 8 primary.

"We have now determined that this verification process has become impossible," Strake said. "After 11 days of headlines and stories about the FBI investigation, an increasing number of the voters we contacted were refusing to discuss the petitions with our callers."

The verification began after news reports of apparent forgeries on petitions. The verification ended after the party had spot checked petitions submitted by Robertson and Vice President George Bush, the only two GOP candidates whose petitions were not in question.

"I think it's a slap in the face to the people who went out and did it the right way," said Richie Martin, Robertson's campaign director in Texas. "If they were going to do that, why did they make the rules in the first place?"

Martin said he would "look into the legality" of the party's decision.

Bush's Austin campaign office said in a statement, "While we do not condone the fraud that has taken place, we believe that the primary must go on. George Bush welcomes all contenders."

Until Monday, the GOP had planned to check the petitions submitted by candidates Pete du Pont, Sen. Robert Dole, Alexander Haig and U.S. Rep. Jack Kemp in an effort to verify the required 5,000 signatures for each. Any candidate who did not have 5,000 verified signatures would have been left on the ballot, but would not have been allowed to earn Texas delegates.

Robertson submitted about 9,000 signatures and Bush turned in 35,000.

The FBI, which is investigating the petitions submitted by Dole, Haig, Kemp and du Pont, has said it is looking at a political consulting firm hired by some of the campaigns to collect signatures.

Du Pont on Saturday said he was withdrawing from the Texas primary because of forgeries on his petitions. But Strake said the du Pont campaign had not contacted GOP headquarters here and du Pont is still considered an active candidate in Texas.

Meanwhile, the campaign of the former Delaware governor denied Monday its national political director, Tim Hyde, was involved in any apparent forgeries on petitions need-

ed to get du Pont on the ballot in the Texas primary.

Strake said a Republican Party panel overseeing the matter voted unanimously to make all six candidates eligible for Texas delegates, despite the petition uncertainty.

"The voters of Texas are informed, intelligent voters and they are entitled to the opportunity to consider the platforms and ideas of all six of our presidential candidates. All six candidates are men of integrity," he said.

Strake said it would be "grossly unfair to the candidates themselves

and especially to the voters of Texas to let the misguided actions of a few individuals deny the voters' rights to make their judgment."

"I'm not so sure we will ever run a petition process in the future," Strake said, adding that he would recommend changes.

He said the petition process was an effort to counter the Republican's image as the party of the rich that allows anyone to run for president if he or she can pay the filing fee.

"The intent, I'm sure, was to go out and get volunteers to sign up for you if you want to run for president. But when you go out and to hire people, that somewhat aborts the system," Strake said.

He also said the Texas GOP would ask the state to cover the \$7,000 spent on the aborted verification process. Under state law, the state government pays all legitimate expenses incurred by the parties in running primaries. Secretary of State Jack Rains, a Republican, will decide whether the verification is a legitimate expense.

State Treasurer Ann Richards, a Democrat, said Monday it is not.

"I would have a hard time justifying signing (a state check for the verification) unless our lawyers or the Supreme Court assured me that we were responsible for some else's fraudulent behavior," she told Rains in a letter.

TDC's mixup on amount of cells to build may ruin plans for Amarillo facility

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — A local task force official is worried that confusion about how many cells the Texas Department of Corrections can build may scuttle plans for a 2,250-bed maximum-security prison here.

If Attorney General Jim Mattox determines that the Texas Department of Corrections is building too many cells, the TDC may not be able to build facilities for all the beds initially planned, said Jim Simms, who was co-chairman of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce task force that lured the prison to the city.

Mattox was to inform prison board officials today whether both planned maximum-security units can be built or either the Amarillo unit or one in Gatesville should be scrapped, officials said.

"It's hard to second guess, but it could be back to the drawing board," Simms told the Amarillo Globe-News Monday.

Simms said he is angry that the confusion has arisen after the sites were awarded.

"The attorney general's staff has been acting as legal counsel for the TDC all the way through this and it is coming up now?" Simms said.

Kevin Knapp, an aide to state Sen.

Bill Sarpalius, D-Amarillo said if a unit is scrapped, it will probably be the Amarillo site.

But Potter County Judge Elisha Demerson said he believes Amarillo has a better chance of being the unit built. Demerson said that the state is committed to ending the practice of locating all its prison facilities in one area.

In 1987, the Legislature put a cap on the number of beds the TDC could build.

A state bond review board, which has to approve bonds before they're issued, has asked Mattox if a 2,250-bed unit in Palestine should be included in the number of beds built by the state, Simms said.

The Mark Michael Unit was built a year ago with bond money raised by Anderson County residents. The state now leases the unit from the county.

If Mattox says the Michael Unit leaves TDC with 2,250 fewer beds to build, the unit awarded to Amarillo might not be built, Simms said.

"If he says 'yes,' then something's going to have to give," Simms said. "They can't build all they approved back in the November election. It doesn't mean Amarillo is cut out, but it could."

Astronauts want 3 more tests for booster rocket

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Senior astronauts are concerned about booster rocket flaws found during a test last month, and are asking that the space shuttle not be cleared to fly again until at least three more successful tests are conducted.

NASA's return-to-space plan calls for at least two more successful tests of the redesigned solid rocket booster, but Daniel Brandenstein, chief of the astronaut office at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, said he and some other astronauts don't believe that is good enough.

"We are proposing that we do three more (mandatory) tests, but that is still in review," he said in an interview. "They were planning two, but with the (launch date) slip and the failure, putting a third in there is possible."

Navy Rear Adm. Richard H. Truly, a former astronaut who heads the shuttle program, announced earlier this month that the failure in the December rocket test will require a delay in resumption of space flights until late July or August. Flights had been scheduled to resume in June.

A spokesman for Morton Thiokol Inc., manufacturer of the rocket, confirmed on Monday that "discussions are under way" about adding another mandatory test-firing of the rocket. No decision has been made, he said.

Two full-scale firings have been conducted and two more were planned before verifying the redesigned shuttle rocket for flight. Still another test was to be conducted, but officials said this fifth test did not have to precede the first mission. It is this fifth test that Brandenstein now wants to be conducted successfully before shuttle flights resume.

The first full-scale test, called DM8, was conducted successfully in August. It was followed on Dec. 23 by the DM9 test in which a new nozzle boot ring design was used for the first time. The boot ring came apart.

City

The commission saw no problems with Weber's plan and gave him the green light to proceed with plans.

"The DM9 outer boot ring test was not a success, so that should not count as one of our 'get ready to fly' tests on the nozzle," said Brandenstein. "My feeling is that we ought to redo the nozzle part of that" and test it three full times again before certifying it for flight.

Truly announced earlier this month that the new boot ring that failed on DM9 would be replaced with the boot ring that worked on DM8. He said it then would be tested twice more to certify it for flight.

Brandenstein said he wants at least one more full-scale test of the whole system before astronauts again ride the rockets into space.

The space shuttle Challenger accident, which killed seven astronauts on Jan. 28, 1986, was blamed on a flawed joint in the side of the solid rocket booster. The side joints have been redesigned, along with parts of the rocket booster nozzle.

Skelton served as county sheriff here in 1958-60. He later joined the U.S. Border Patrol. He was a former hand-gun editor for "GunSport" magazine and published a number of free lance articles on guns.

His father, C.A. Skelton, came to Hereford in 1911 and owned and operated Skelton Variety Store, and later was the Case Implement dealer. He died in 1939.

John W. Thomas, chief of the shuttle rocket redesign team, said that full-scale tests have shown that a flaw that destroyed Challenger has been corrected.

The new joint design includes the addition of a third O-ring, or rubberized seal, a flange to strengthen the metal joint and a new arrangement of insulation to keep hot rocket gases from reaching the joint.

Thomas said the insulation worked so well in the test firing that the new O-ring design is still unproven.

Bronchitis turned to pneumonia. There were prostate problems. The final blow was a heart attack at 39.

Bill was scared. He thought he was going to die and sought counseling. The counselor told him that he was in serious trouble.

Two days later Bill checked into an alcohol recovery center, heavily indoctrinated with the A.A. principles. It saved his life.

To "Jerry's Wife" I say, learn as much as you can about alcoholism. It's a disease, not a character defect. Go to Al-Anon. It can save your sanity.

And now for the good news: Next month Bill will celebrate one full year of sobriety. He is a new man, physically, mentally and emotionally. The magic is back in our marriage. We can laugh and love again. I wish the same for you.—Babe in Kansas

DEAR BABE: So do I. Thanks for a great letter of encouragement. If I hear anything from Jerry's Wife, I'll let you know.

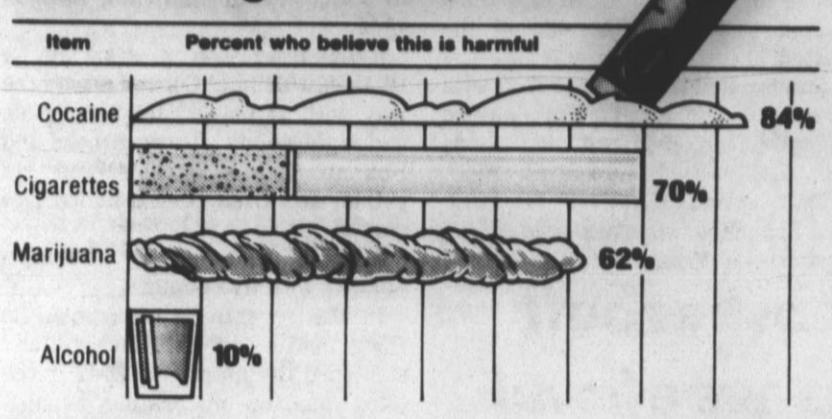

Woman's Health

TESTING YOUR UNBORN BABY

Chances are excellent that your pregnancy will be normal and happy. Yet, you may worry about your unborn baby's health anyway. Relax—your doctor will test you if he or she feels there is any cause for concern.

Today's doctor has many tools at hand to find out how a pregnancy is progressing. For instance, if you are over 35, your doctor may offer you the opportunity to have amniocentesis. This test is given around the 16th week of pregnancy to see if your baby has certain genetic defects.

The procedure is simple, and usually done on an out-patient basis. By using ultrasound to find the exact location of your fetus, the doctor inserts a long thin needle into your abdomen into the amniotic sac enveloping the fetus. Your doctor will withdraw an ounce or so of fluid then send it to a genetics lab for testing. You will get the test results several weeks later. Amniocentesis can tell you if your baby has a genetic defect such as Down syndrome, spina bifida, and numerous other genetic disorders and what your baby's sex is. It cannot, however, detect such problems as cleft palate and clubfoot, and most heart defects.

You will be a likely candidate for an amniocentesis if you are over 35, have had three or more miscarriages, already have a baby with a defect, or have had extensive problems getting pregnant.

Like any medical test, amniocentesis does carry certain minor risks. You may have mild cramps, bleeding and leaking of the amniotic fluid. Only in very rare instances does amniocentesis cause a miscarriage or injure the baby.

If amniocentesis does find that your baby has a birth defect, your doctor may refer you to a counselor so you can find out what your options are—either to prepare to care for the baby or to decide whether to terminate the pregnancy.

A normal amniocentesis is not a guarantee of a perfect baby. But, before amniocentesis, thousands of women were afraid to have children because of the possibility of passing on a genetic disease in the family. Today, by using amniocentesis and other prenatal tests, women have more of a chance to learn about their baby's health, and their own well-being long before they actually deliver the baby.

WHEN IS A BABY "LATE"

Everyone knows that it takes nine months for a normal baby to develop in its mother's womb and be delivered healthy and lively. But...nine months from when? On what day do you start counting? And on what day should you stop?

Even though you might know exactly—to the hour—when you conceived, it is not the key date for estimating when your baby is due to appear, or your "due date." For that, you need to calculate back to the first day of the menstrual period just before the time you conceived. That's the date on which your egg begins the maturation process in the ovary.

That process takes two weeks, after which the egg is released into the Fallopian tube and travels to the uterus. Sometime during this six-day

journey it may be fertilized by a male's sperm. If that happens, the fertilized egg will go on to the uterus, where it will implant itself in the nourishing wall of the uterus (called the endometrium), and slowly becomes a fetus and then a baby. The moment of childbirth will usually happen some 280 days—or 40 weeks—after the first day of your last period.

Ninety percent of pregnancies end at the reckoned due date at about the 39th or 40th week. But sometimes a pregnancy continues on into the 41st or 42nd week. At that point, your doctor will want to see you more often and may perform tests such as stress testing and ultrasound to check on the baby's health. As long as the baby continues to be healthy and normal, you and your doctor will wait for labor to begin on its own. If there are problems, your doctor may want to either "induce" or start labor.

Past the 42nd week, problems can arise for both the baby and mother. The baby may become too large to pass through the birth canal, the fluid surrounding the baby may decrease and cause the umbilical cord to become pinched, or the baby may inhale "meconium," a substance that builds up in the fetus's bowels. Also, the placenta, which feeds the baby, may begin to function less effectively. Again, if problem arise, labor may be induced or a cesarean delivery performed. Remember 95 percent of babies delivered after 42 weeks are delivered safely.

If your "due date" comes and goes and your baby doesn't appear to be ready to make his or her debut, don't worry. Chances are you will have a safe delivery of a reluctant but healthy baby.

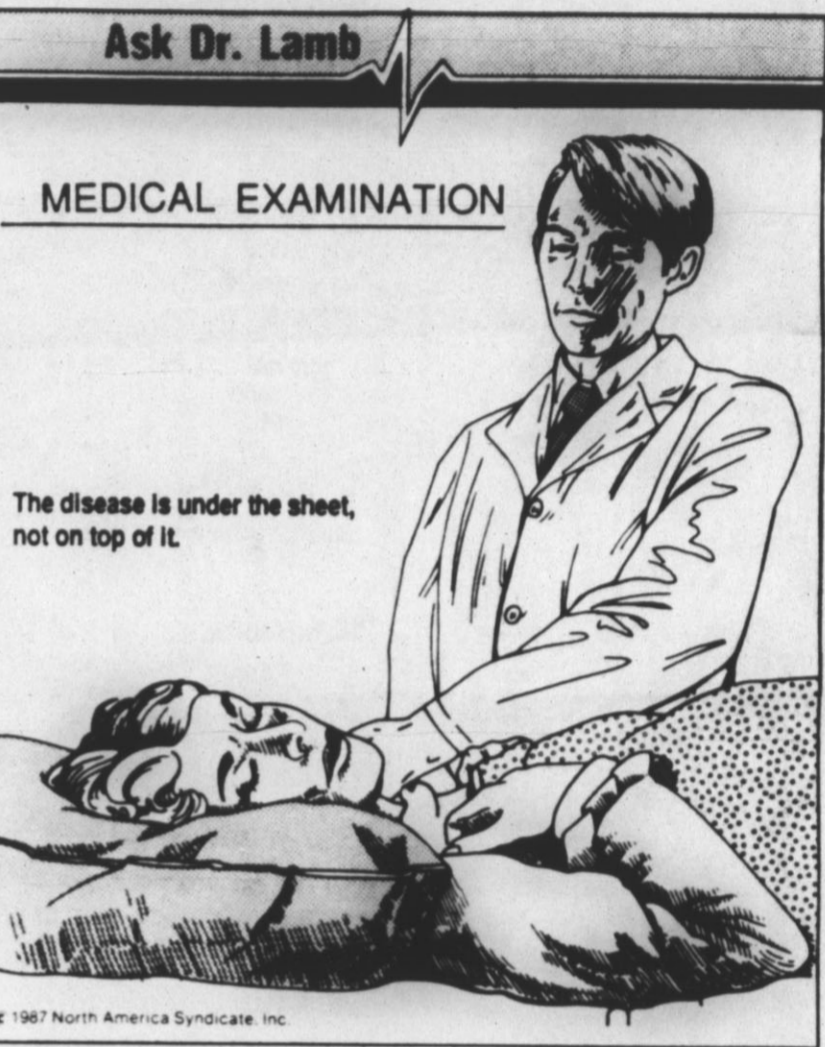
Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: Is it necessary for a woman to be nude from the waist up to have her heart checked? Is a nurse required to be present?

DEAR READER: It is good medical practice, not a law, to have an attendant present when a doctor is examining a person of the opposite sex, if for no other reason than to protect the doctor from false charges by opportunistic individuals. Some unscrupulous individuals have tried to blackmail doctors if they can get the doctor in a situation where his actions cannot be verified. The only good way to examine the heart is with the chest bare, whether the patient is a male or female. The heart commonly lies under the left breast and the breastbone. It is important to see the pulsations, feel the pulsations and listen directly over the heart. Anything less than this is an inadequate examination. I am reminded of a celebrated case over a century ago when a doctor was sued for removing the sheet over his patient. His defense was that the disease was under the sheet, not on top of it. How true.

DEAR DR. LAMB: My husband has a high cholesterol level, and his doctor has recommended a low-fat diet to bring it down. I find it very difficult to eliminate fat entirely from the diet. I have heard that you can use polyunsaturated fat, which is not harmful.

Is that true? If so, can I use corn oil in cooking and not be so concerned about the total restriction on fat? Other than decreasing calories, just what does a low-fat diet do that lowers the cholesterol level, anyway? DEAR READER: Try to stick to the diet your husband's doctor has recommended for him. You might also discuss some of your options with the doctor or with a registered dietician he may recommend to you. Limiting calories is important in people who are overweight. A significant loss of excess body fat often helps lower the total cholesterol. Beyond that, I suspect that the real culprit is saturated fat as found in dairy fat in whole milk, cheese and butter, in the fat in red

meats, and in coconut oil, palm oil and palm kernel oil used in making many baked goods and other prepared foods. These three oils may be a great deal more important in causing a high total cholesterol than the amount of saturated fat found in red meats. There was a nice study done by the Department of Clinical Nutrition, at the University of Gothenburg, Sweden, and recently reported in the American Journal of Clinical Nutrition (Volume 45, 1987). For a short-term diet, both a low-fat diet and a diet with 98 grams of fat a day but high in polyunsaturated fat had about the same effect. The one feature both diets had in common was being low in saturated fat. This supports the idea that it is the

saturated fat, not just the total fat, that is of the greatest importance. In both diets, there was a significant loss of bile salts and cholesterol through the colon. Since bile salts come from cholesterol, such a loss is a means of lowering the total cholesterol. That is how many of the cholesterol-lowering medicines work.

Hints From Heloise

DEAR HELOISE: I always need help in cleaning stains from clothes, but I wish the instructions you give would be more specific.

When the advice states to use an enzyme presoak or detergent, exactly what do you mean? Also, where do I buy dry-cleaning fluid? Can you be more specific and give brand names and a little more information as to where to purchase them? — Liz Wanger, Midlothian, Va.

The reason I don't use brand names is because it would be considered an endorsement and Heloise does not endorse products or recommend one brand over another. The descriptions I use in the column are usually found on the packaging, where it describes the product.

Most products we refer to are found in the supermarket. Some can be found in drug stores or hardware stores. You can usually find dry-cleaning or spot-removal fluid in the grocery store or drug store.

Product descriptions are also used in the place of trademark names. These descriptions are referred to in their generic terms. With trademarks, there are laws protecting the rights of the manufacturer and therefore the trademark name cannot be used without proper credit.

Either way, the column attempts to give the reader the most accurate description without using a brand name. If you think it is hard determining what the product may be, try figuring a product description in just a few words without using the brand or trade name. — Heloise ASHES

Dear Heloise: How do others keep ashes from spreading everywhere when they clean out their wood stoves or fireplaces?

I am desperate for a way to clean my fireplace without dirtying the rest of my house at the same time with flyaway ash.

Keep up the good work. I love your column. — Edna Stairret, Jetmore, Kan.

Here are a few suggestions that might help. First, fill a plant mister (or any type of clean pump spray container that you have on hand) with water. Lightly spray the ashes with the water to dampen them before trying to clean them out of the fireplace.

Use a shovel to remove the ashes and place them in a box lined with newspaper. Cover the ashes in the box with damp newspaper to keep it in place until you have filled the box and are ready to remove it from the house. I hope these suggestions help avoid extra cleaning afterwards. — Heloise
