## HEREFORD AT CHICAGO

Will Make Exhibit at Great Land Show from November 4 to 28. Farmers Bring in Stuff.

That Hereford will have a good exhibit at the Tribune's Great Land Show to be held in Chicago from November 4th to 28th is an assured fact.

The Brand office is now receiving samples and already a good variety of products have been received. Maize, Kafir, 3-varieties of onions, 3-varieties of ground cherries, 2-varieties of beets, pepper, peanuts, pumpkins and jelly. We want a whole lot of other good products. Those who have perishable stuff, please do not bring that in until the day before packing and shipping, which will be Saturday, October 29. All dry or cured products can be brought in at any time.

Each sample will be marked with the name of the grower and as such will be placed in the exhibit. The farmer or trucker will get credit first, the county second, Hereford third and The Brand fourth for gathering, packing and shipping.

T. B. Gallagher, assistant general passenger and freight agent of the Pecos Valley, will have charge of the exhibit at Chicago. The Santa Fe is taking special interest in securing a good exhibit from along its line in Texas and especially from the Panhandle.

The Brand begs those who have a few good samples to bring them in on time. Deaf Smith and Castro county should be well represented if cooperation is had, we will get it. The cost will be nothing except a little troublesome pleasure in gathering the exhibits and getting them ready for shipping. Members of the recently organized institute are invited to assist in securing a good exhibit.

The Tribune Land Show will be attended by thousands of people from every state in the Union. No such exhibit of land products has ever been placed on display that will excel this show in size or extent. Not only will the products of the farm, garden, orchard and dairy be there in overflowing abundance, but the various methods of farming will be visibly displayed. Machinery and farm aids will be in evidence.

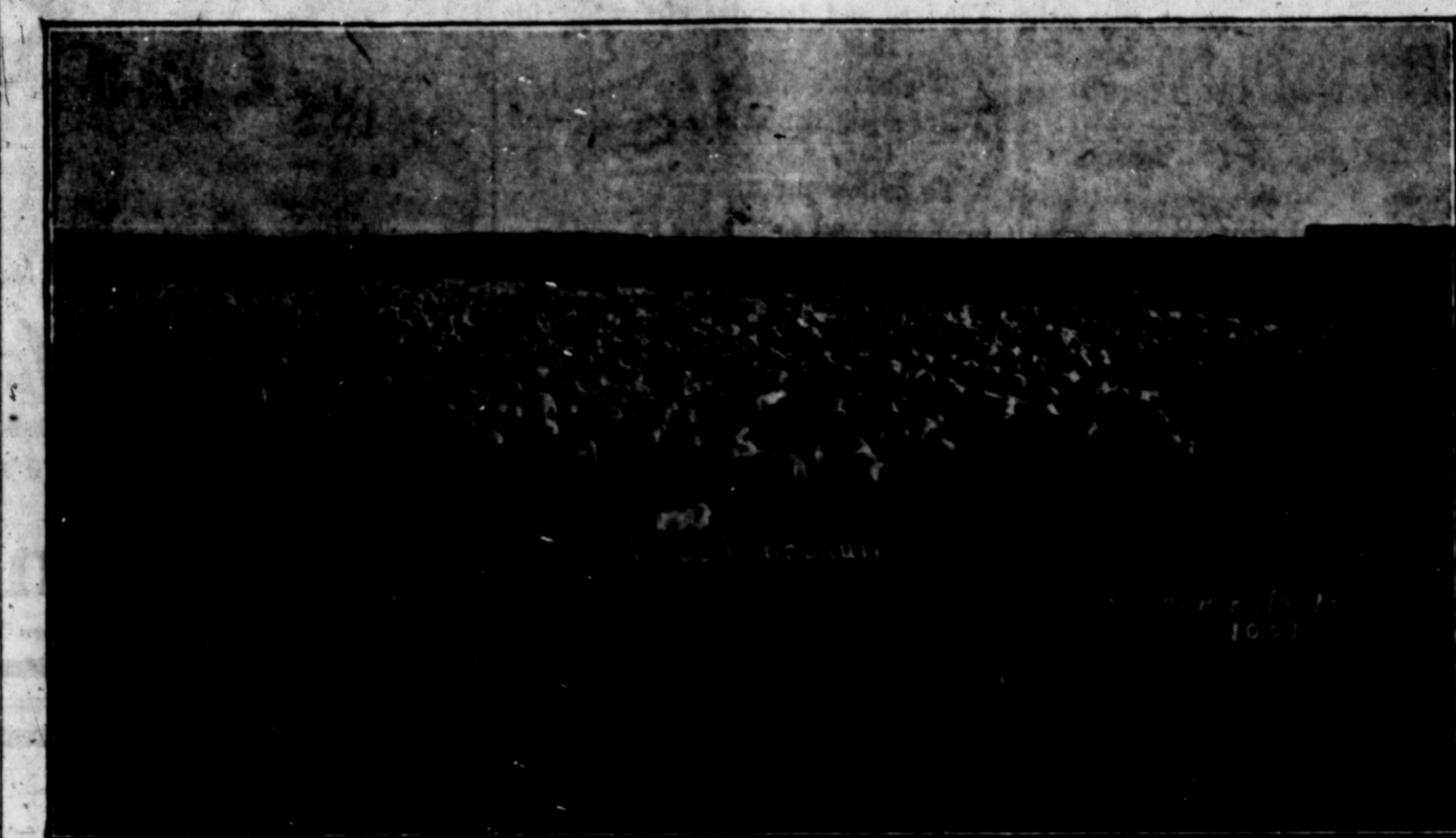
For this reason a good exhibit is desirable, but it will require the combined efforts to accomplish this. Bring your stuff to The Brand office.

### Dairying in the South.

Dairying is growing in popularity among the farmers of the southern states. They are learning that the dairy cow can do for the cotton grower of the south what she has done for the wheat grower in the north, i. e., increase the fertility of the soil in addition to making satisfactory returns for labor and money expended for feed.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has been giving particular attention to this question in the southern states the past few years and a great service has been rendered. A great impetus has been to the dairy movement until now there are thousands of influential dairymen singing the praises of the dairy cow and demonstrating by actual experiments that dairying is the salvation of that section of the country.

Certain politicians, in order to create an issue by which they might retain office, have greatly retarded the development of the dairy industry in the cotton growing states by creating the impression there that the interests of the cotton grower are opposed to those of the dairyman. It has been brought about in this way: Cottonseed oil is used in the manufacture of some kinds of oleomargarine. This has been used to prejudice the cotton producer against any and all kinds of legislation which was used in the manufacture of oleomargarine; last year, the cotton growers of the south actually received one and one half cents for every acre planted to cotton!

For every dollar's worth of cotton seed oil used last year in making oleomargarine, one hundred and seven dollars' worth of butter was produced in these same cotton growing states.

These are facts which every cotton producer should consider before lending his support to any movement which is intended to retard the growth and development of the dairy in the south.—The National Dairy Union.

### Some Potatoes.

The stork and Immigration Agent have been running a neck and neck race in Texas during the past decade and the increase in population due to the combined efforts of these mighty agencies of development will place Texas near the 5,000,000 mark when the present census is announced, says the Texas Commercial Secretaries Association. So far, the government has reported on 56 counties and a number of large cities and the average increase in the figures reported 58 per cent, and if the increase is maintained throughout the state, our population will be 4,800,000 for the present census. All sections of the state are represented in the count so far announced and these figures may be taken as a reliable estimate of our population.

The statistics collected by the State Health Department justifies the conclusion that 1,000 people will give a net increase in population of 2400 in the course of ten years and on this basis, we should have a natural increase of 800,000 during the last decade and reliable statistics on the work of the immigration agent places their increase at 15 per cent in advance of the stork, making a population increase through immigration of over 900,000, giving us a total population for 1910 of 4,800,000 which further verifies the estimate given above. Of course there are some people born in Texas foolish enough to leave the state, but we had a bumper crop of babies last year and the immigration agent brought us settlers by the trainload and the final count will give us some surprising increases in sections worked by the immigration agent.

The stork has already made Texas famous, as we have the largest families of any state in the union and this great utility bird becomes more and more popular among our citizenship every day. We have already passed Missouri and are now hotly contesting third place with Ohio and another ten years of progress and prosperity will place Texas at the head of the list in population of the states.

### Texas Census Talk.

One of the sensations of the Federal Census is the growth of Texas in population during the last decade. The reports so far indicate that Texas will have a population in excess of 4,000,000 and will "Show Missouri," taking from that state its position as fifth largest state in the union. The state will have gained in population approximately one million people during the past ten years.

"There's a reason," says the Texas Commercial Secretaries Association. Texas has something to advertise and she has advertised. The state organization of Commercial Clubs has flooded the densely populated sections of the United States with literature in pamphlet form, illustrating the opportunities of Texas and newspaper articles have constantly appeared in the public press of the north and east. The three hundred Commercial Clubs of the state have each advertised extensively in newspapers and magazines and numerous write-ups have been given the respective committees. The reports on file at the headquarters of the association in Ft. Worth indicate that the local commercial clubs of the state have spent half a million dollars during the past year advertising Texas and this amount is largely augmented by railroads, colonization agencies, etc., and it is safe to estimate the amount of money spent per annum in advertising Texas at one dollar per capita or \$4,000,000 per annum during the last decade.

No reports have been made public concerning the material growth and development of the state during the past decade but the general indications are that the results will be equally as satisfactory as the increase in population.

**First Bale of the Season.**

Quite a crowd was attracted Monday by the whirl of the cotton gin and a number went down to see the ginning of the first bale of the season.

1,550 pounds of seed cotton was brought in by Daniel Garrison who has another bale ready for the gin and who expects to bring in several others before the season is over. This bale will class above middling.

Mr. Garrison has demonstrated what he can do here with cotton in a dry year. His seed are acclimated and will probably give better results next year than this. About two years ago the gin turned out eleven bales, but last year there was no cotton brought here. It is thought that a heavier acreage will be planted next season than any previous year.—Claude News.

Your wife and mother has gone to Heaven.

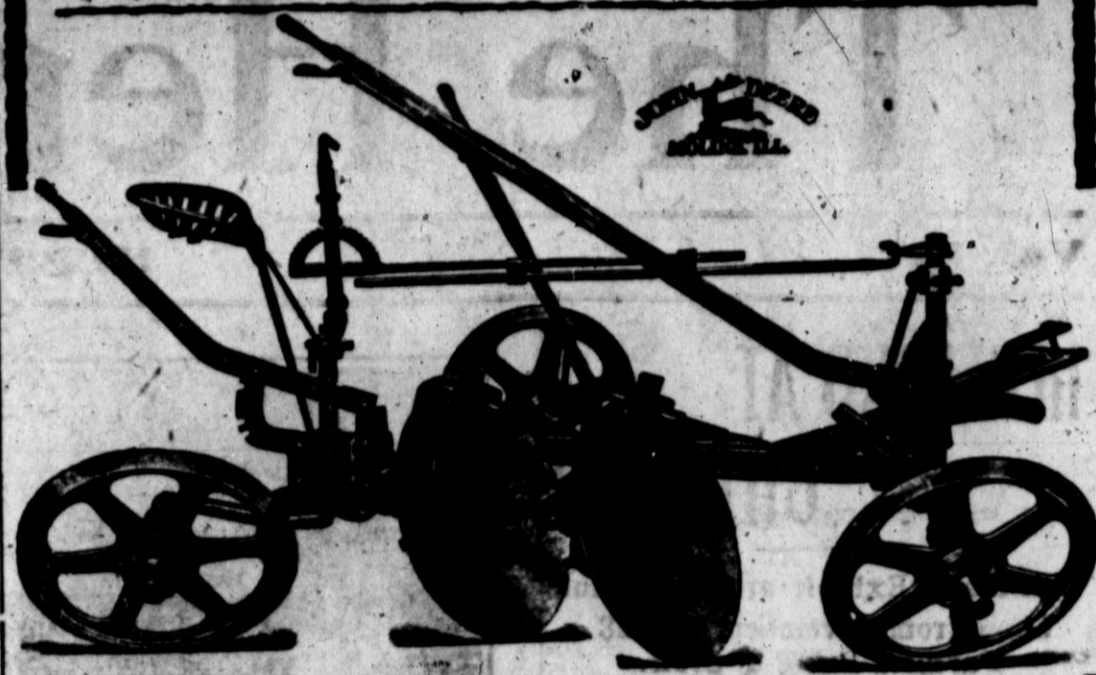
Now she is happy—happier far,

### BOLTING THE PARTY.

Texas has never supported a bolting candidate. When a convention of any party nominates a candidate and endorses a platform, or when a candidate is nominated by a primary election, those who enter that election and pledge to support the nominee are honor bound to support by their vote the nominee of the primary. Is not a political pledge as sacred as a financial or religious pledge? Will the theory that fraud may be evident in some locality absolve the entire membership of the party from the compact. Not at all. There may be evidence of fraud on both sides and then what? Can any set of men take unto themselves the "only honest men in the party."

Now this is just what is trying to happen. A whole lot of good prohibitionist, state-widers, honest men, went into the Democratic primaries, pledged themselves with this—"I am a Democrat and will support the nominee of this primary." But now a few would-be leaders are making every effort to get these good honest voters to bolt the party to whom they had pledged their support and and go off with the Prohibition Faction. What are we going to do about it? As for The Brand it will keep its pledge. The writer as well as thousands of others voted in the Democratic primary, knowing that his candidate did not have a ghost of a show to be elected.

The Brand had even published a statement, giving the forecast in figures, showing that Colquit would be elected by a large plurality, yet the writer voted for a man that fell far behind.

But now Mr. Colquit is the legal nominee of the party and shall receive the support he has justly won. The Brand believes there is honor in defeat as well as in victory, and no sort of political jugglery can move it one iota from the pledge of honor.

For this reason, The Brand has refused and does now refuse to publish political matter sent out from the prohibition headquarters, all of which should be paid for just like other political matter. The Brand does not accept ready written and ready made editorials from any party. The writer is a Democrat and has been all his natural life, and as a prohibitionist aided in the state campaign of '87, when he was a mere boy. But a pledge of honor is a pledge of faith.

If, however, a voter did not enter the primaries of July he is free to vote any opposition ticket in November. Let's be fair in war and in peace.

### COMES 1000 MILES TO FAIR.

Two men from Iowa came all the way from their homes in Iowa to see the Hereford Fair this year, but, alas! They did not. The Brand has been severely censured for announcing the fair and then not having one. While the Brand was not the "whole cheese" it did favor the usual fair. The reason assigned by the committee was that the material

on the courthouse yard had spoiled the place for holding the fair and that the expense of building a temporary place was too great.

A FARMER in the central portion of Texas this year produced \$900.00 worth of cotton on 22 acres of land, on 5 acres of land he produced 300 bushels of corn besides plenty of hay to feed his stock the entire year; also potatoes and other vegetables for home use. He raised hogs for bacon and had little to buy to furnish his table. This illustrates what can be done by intelligent effort on Texas land and is only one of the many examples of the fertility of Texas soil.

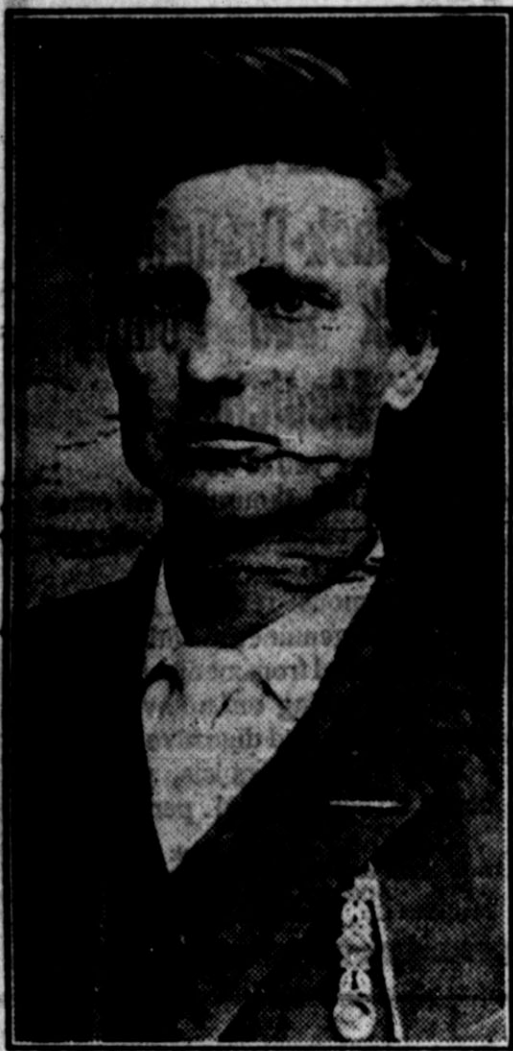
**The Irrigation.**

J. L. Johnson who, sometime ago, invented a machine for making tile for sub-irrigation, has since had some very good tests of his system. Good results have been obtained and much has been learned from the demonstrations. In one case where the tile was placed 30 feet apart, the water came together and saturated the surface between. Even at 20 feet, the system has a great advantage over surface irrigation.

1st. Because the tiles are so constructed that nothing can get into them. The perforations for the outlet of water are on the under side and every drop of water can get out, thereby making it a self-cleaning tile. Frost nor freeze will not affect them.

2nd. The tiles are easily laid. They are 2 feet long and 300 can be hauled in the box of an ordinary wagon right to the ditches. After the ditches are covered, plowing, driving and cultivating can be carried on all over the field. No ground being wasted for ditches. The laterals are attached to the main by a specially made "cut-off" so that water may be turned into any one of them or many of them at pleasure.

3rd. Because the water works automatically from the supply tank, so that when the tiles are filled, the water stops running until the ground

will take more water. Hence there is no waste of water. In the meantime the water is being stored in the main tank or reservoir or being used in other lateral tiles.

4th. Because a tank of 100 to 200 barrels can supply water for 5, 15 or 20 acres, by keeping the pump running. A 3, 5, or 8 H-P engine will run a 4" by 16" or 6" by 18" cylinder. A good sized tank, placed but 2 feet above the ground and covered to prevent trash of any kind from getting into the system will be needed.

5th. Because you can use the same system for smudging your orchards. An extra tile leading from the laterals to each tree and left with an open end will be needed. A big smudge pot at your engine house with a small fan attachment will deliver the smoke to all parts of the orchard in a few minutes.

6th. Because the tile system may be used as a drainage system simply by opening the rear ends of the tiles.

There are many advantages in favor of the tile subirrigation system. In about two weeks, he will give a plan for tanks and pipes, and how a system should be installed. For further particulars call upon or write, J. L. JOHNSON, Box 214, Hereford, Texas.
