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

Local man gains acclaim from a variety of talents

Compelled by visions of the past, Bob Baum ignores the hardships of age to pursue his talents with wood, metal and even a needle and thread.

Just past 71 this remarkable man is famous across the country for his various talents. His work can be found as far as Tennessee, California, Montana and even Luxembourg.

"Throughout my life I've always enjoyed being creative with my hands. It's something that comes naturally for me," said Baum.

As a young man, Baum studied the art of woodcarving. The physical limitations of age, however, provided the necessary reasons for discovering other hidden talents.

"With age I lost some use of my hands. Woodworking became more and more difficult so I switched to working with metal and needlepoint," Baum said.

Needlepoint was an ideal way for Baum to exercise his hands during the cold winter months. "It's something that takes a great deal of patience but I've grown to enjoy it. My wife has always sewn and she helped spark my interest," remarked Baum.

Specializing in branding irons, the

artist began this hobby while living in Oklahoma. "For 18 years I worked as a mechanic. Metal is a good material for someone with a little creativity," he said.

Most of the brands created by Baum at that time were sold to ranches including an ostrich farm in Colorado. "It was one of the funniest things I've ever made. The brand even looked like an ostrich," remarked Baum.

In 1962, Baum moved to Hereford where he continued to practice his skills as a craftsman.

"People would see my creations here and there and soon they began placing orders. I still make regular branding irons, but now I also make miniature brands as desk pieces," answered Baum.

Working in his garage, he has made over 170 brands. On average, production time is five hours.

The desk pieces come in a variety of shapes and sizes. Generally, an individualized branding iron is mounted onto a wood background. A magical western scene is created with a yucca plant and a piece of drift wood placed on the background.

"I try to make my work as authentic as possible. Branding irons are a dying art," said Baum. I hope

Former Brand publisher Gillentine dies at age 85

James M. "Jimmie" Gillentine, publisher of The Hereford Brand from 1937 through 1971, died Saturday morning. He was 85.

Gillentine died at 8 a.m. in Tremont Retirement Village in Dallas.

He was associated with the Brand for almost 35 years before selling the paper and Southwest Offset Printing in December 1971.

Services will be at 2 p.m. Monday in First Baptist Church with the Rev. Doug Manning of Fellowship of Believers and Dr. Ron Cook, pastor of First Baptist Church, officiating.

Burial will be in West Park Cemetery under direction of Gilliland-Watson Funeral Home.

Gillentine was born on April 11, 1908, in Fort Worth.

He married Clara Castleberry

in 1934 in Wellington. She died in 1987.

He moved to Hereford on Feb. 15, 1937.

During his tenure at the Brand, Gillentine converted the paper from a weekly to a semiweekly with the first Sunday edition, on July 4, 1949, and under his leadership the paper won many awards.

He purchased a one-half interest in the newspaper a year after arriving here, then bought the remaining interest in 1949.

He was active in the Panhandle Press Association all the years with the paper, and served as its president in 1947.

The association named Gillentine to its Hall of Fame at

Texas health officials facing same virus as in New Mexico

AUSTIN (AP) - Health officials say they are hopeful most of the 16 Texas cases being investigated for the rodent-borne virus that has killed at least a dozen people in the Southwest will end up testing negative.

Texas Health Commissioner David Smith said Friday the 16 reports have come from doctors in 12 counties all over the state who have observed patients with symptoms that fit the mysterious illness known as hantavirus.

Jeff Taylor, an epidemiologist with the Texas Department of Health, said of the 16 possible cases, six people have died, including an East Texas woman who apparently contracted the strain of hantavirus from rodent droppings near her home in Zavalla.

But Beverly Ray, a nurse epidemiologist with the department, said, "Most of the reports are not patients that we suspect will be positive for the virus. But we are taking them all very seriously and investigating all of them."

"We expect maybe sporadic cases, but we don't expect the outbreak situation that is going on in the Four Corners area," Ms. Ray said.

Until now, the rare illness had been found only in New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado and Utah. Most cases were clustered where those states meet, called the Four Corners.

Smith said blood and tissue samples from the Texas cases have been sent to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in Atlanta for testing. However, he said the test results are still incomplete.

This week, the CDC in Atlanta found hantavirus antibodies in the blood of the 58-year-old woman from Zavalla, who died last month. CDC officials said Thursday her death probably was from the virus. However, they are waiting to test tissue samples from the woman before declaring hers a definite hantavirus death.

"It's strong enough (evidence) that we felt it was important to make clinicians aware that this illness may be occurring in other geographic

trimming Japan's trade surplus, both countries agreed to negotiations involving specific products in five broad categories with progress to be monitored at semiannual meetings by the U.S. president and Japanese prime minister.

Products to be covered include autos and auto parts, computers, telecommunications, satellites, medical equipment, financial services and insurance.

To measure progress in opening Japan's market in each of these areas, the two sides agreed to establish sets of objective criteria.

The U.S. side sought to get a broad commitment from Japan that it would slash its worldwide trade surplus in half within three years and boost purchases of imports by one-third.

Japan branded that demand

and said it would never agree to inflexible numerical targets.

In the end, the two sides compromised on language in which Japan pledged to make a "highly significant" decrease in its trade surplus by pursuing a "significant increase" in purchases of foreign manufactured products, allowing both sides to argue over the interpretation of those words.

In their joint appearance, Clinton praised Miyazawa for his "wisdom, determination and genuine leadership" in pushing ahead with the negotiations. Tears welled in Miyazawa's eyes during Clinton's comments. Miyazawa is widely expected to be forced out as prime minister in the upcoming elections.

Clinton blasts North Korea for military development

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - President Clinton denounced North Korea today for raising the specter of "nuclear annihilation" and seeking to develop long-range missiles that could threaten Japan.

He said the United States would be "resolute" in pressuring North Korea to open its fuel storage sites to international inspection and would not engage in endless negotiations with the communist government.

"The nightmare of nuclear annihilation is too real," Clinton said in a speech to the South Korean National Assembly.

In a speech to the South Korean parliament, Clinton also said "America intends to stay" in South Korea with its troops as long as necessary. The United States has 36,000 troops stationed there.

"We'll stay as long as the Korean people want us and need us," Clinton said. "Peace depends on deterrence. Our commitment to an active military

presence remains."

Bringing strong messages to the bitterly divided Korean peninsula, Clinton suggested North Korea risks retaliation if it develops nuclear weapons.

"Our goals remain firm: we seek a non-nuclear Korean peninsula," he told South Korean lawmakers. "North Korea must understand our intentions. We are seeking to prevent aggression, not initiate it."

Clinton said North Korea "has nothing to fear from America" so long as it doesn't build nuclear weapons.

He also accused the communist government of "indiscriminate sales of Scud missiles" like those used by Iraq in the Persian Gulf War.

Clinton's tough words were designed to pressure the reclusive communist government in Pyongyang to open its nuclear facilities so that international inspectors can determine if North Korea is developing nuclear weapons.

He was visiting South Korea four

days before the scheduled resumption of U.S. negotiations with the communist government of North Korea on the nagging nuclear issue.

"No specter hangs over the region more darkly than the danger of nuclear proliferation," Clinton said, adding that North Korea's intransigence posed "a nightmare of nuclear annihilation."

On Sunday, he'll get a chance to look North Korean soldiers in the eye as he visits the demilitarized zone that separates the two Koreas.

Earlier, Clinton said that North Korea's suspected program "is of great concern not only to the United States and the Republic of Korea but to all in this region." He spoke after meeting at the presidential Blue House with South Korean President Kim Young-sam.

"We agreed to consult closely on our joint efforts to achieve a full resolution of this issue," Clinton said after the meeting with Kim. "And we are resolute to take additional steps if they are required."

The Texas Department of Health has announced its July immunization clinic scheduled for Hereford. Vaccines against polio, diphtheria, lockjaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps and HIB (hemophilus influenzae type B) will be offered. Charges are based on family income and size and ability to pay. Funds are used to help keep the clinic open. Regular clinics will be held from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. on July 15, 22 and 29. The clinics are held in the Health Department offices, 205 W. Fourth St., Suite B.

Not only can he transform a stainless steel nut or pipe into an elegant ring, he can also create unique and often complicated puzzles. "People always complain that puzzles are hard. They're not hard, they're just confusing," he said.

Artistic talent can be found in all branches of the Baum family. "My wife loves to sew and she still knits her own socks. My daughter also enjoys Indian beadwork," said Baum.

The next public display of Baum's work will be at the Christmas art show in Hereford.

Red imported ants coming into area

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Red imported fire ants have built their mounds for decades in Texas' humid, warm coastal areas.

Then isolated colonies of the swarming species began turning up in West Texas, though, and the ants still survived.

Are the destructive pests adapting to harsh winters and dry climate? Research at Texas Tech University shows it's possible.

Sherman Phillips Jr., associate professor of entomology at Tech, said his work indicates Lubbock's red imported fire ants are less prone to desicate, or dry out, than are those from East Texas. The species could be developing a thicker wax coat, Phillips said.

Most of the heavy infestation in Texas has occurred east of Interstate 35. But isolated colonies started showing up several years ago in Wichita Falls, Abilene, San Angelo and Midland. Entomologists blame much of the far-flung migration on the transport of infested trees and grass from East Texas.

Lubbock is the northernmost Texas city where the ants have been found so far.

Poll shows discontented people all over the world

WASHINGTON (AP) - In good times and bad, Americans seem to have an overriding, downbeat evaluation of the national condition: They think things were better before and will be worse later, says a pollster who has analyzed years of readings of the national mind-set.

Everett C. Ladd, executive director of the Roper Center for Public Opinion Research at Storrs, Conn., also finds that discontent with the way things are going economically has become rampant in the world's richest economies.

People in Japan, Great Britain, France, Germany, Spain, Italy and Canada, in a variety of polls taken by Ladd's and other polling organizations since last fall, have said that their homelands' economic situations were bad and getting worse, he said.

Ladd offered a theory to explain the widespread pessimism: a bad news syndrome. All those countries, he noted, have similar communications systems "which make large doses of negative coverage a constant in the experiences of their citizens today."

And in July 1963, "before John F. Kennedy's assassination, when Camelot supposedly still reigned in the national psychology, just 34 percent of those polled by Gallup pronounced themselves 'satisfied ... with the honesty and standards of behavior of people in the country today.'

"There is survey evidence that Americans have long been anxious about the status of things that are important to them," Ladd said. In 1948, when his organization asked people whether the next few years would bring better or worse times or little change, nearly twice as many said "worse" than "better."

He was a member of the organizing board of Hereford Country Club and he and his late wife, Clara, were active in First Baptist Church.

Teen activist to continue anti-abortion participation

DALLAS (AP) - An ardent anti-abortion activist, charged with juvenile delinquency for her activities, said today she will participate in a weekend round of protests as part of a national campaign.

Jamie Tellier, 15, said a pretrial hearing in her case was delayed this morning in state district court when her attorney did not appear. The ninth-grader said she will participate in Operation Rescue's protests at Dallas-Fort Worth area clinics.

Protest plans will be finalized in a rally this evening at Metroplex Chapel in Euless, Texas, Miss Tellier said.

"Hopefully, we will have a great turnout," said the teen-ager, who has been arrested up to 30 times in the Dallas area in what she has called civil disobedience for religious reasons.

Protests scheduled Saturday will target three Dallas clinics, she said, with "rescues" planned Monday and Tuesday.

"A rescue is when you physically put yourself in front of the clinic doors, where you go before the law - even if that means being arrested," she said. "You go inside the clinics, pass out literature, sing and pray."

"A protest is when you stay on the sidewalk and obey the law," she said.

Operation Rescue spokesman Tom Cyr says his group plans to target 13 clinics in the Dallas-Fort Worth area as well as the homes of some doctors who perform abortions.

Six other cities around the country are targeted for 10 days of revival-like rallies and street demonstrations, beginning tonight.

"For the actual activists' activities we have planned prayer, protests and rescuing. Part of that effort is sidewalk counseling. That's really where the mothers are approached and presented with the opportunity for the group to help her bring her baby to term," Cyr said, adding that his group has not applied for any permits.

Ed Spencer, spokesman for the Dallas police department, said officers have no special plans. He said permits would depend on the group's activities.

Debi Gilbert, spokeswoman for A Choice for Women in Dallas, said the clinic will take extra precautions. Ms. Gilbert said that protests have increased lately. She said three people who passed out literature recently were arrested and charged with criminal trespassing.

"We really don't take any precautionary measures. We have protesters every Saturday," said the woman who answered the phone at West Side Clinic in Fort Worth.

Ms. Gilbert said security has been hired for the escalated protests and doors at the clinic will be locked. Patients will have to show identification, she said.

Miss Tellier said she's hampered by her judicial proceedings in Judge Catherine Evans' court. If convicted and judged delinquent, she could be placed in a Texas Youth Commission institution until she is 21, authorities said.

\$111 million lottery winner, fiancee in hiding; still must claim winnings

FOND DU LAC, Wis. (AP) - Listening to his fiancee apparently paid off big for Leslie C. Robins. Friends and relatives say the 30-year-old English teacher bought a lottery ticket at his girlfriend's urging and won \$111 million.

"I don't think he has played (the lottery) more than 10 times," said co-worker Joe Sagen, who said he celebrated with Robins at a bar after the winning numbers in the multi-state Powerball lottery were announced.

Robins and his 24-year-old fiancee, Colleen De Vries, reportedly left town Thursday to avoid reporters and are hiding out in Florida while they plan their next step.

"He is very humble. He just wants to be an ordinary guy," said Sagen, a counselor at Sabish Junior High

School who golfs and plays basketball with Robins.

Only one ticket sold in Wednesday's drawing of the Powerball lottery, played in 14 states and Washington, D.C., had the winning number combination. It was sold in Fond du Lac, and under Wisconsin rules the winner has 180 days to claim the prize.

In Tampa, Fla., Robins' parents - Charlie and Carol Robins - confirmed to The Associated Press on Friday that their son had the apparent winning ticket and that he and a friend flew in from Milwaukee the night before.

De Vries' grandparents, John and Alice De Vries of Waupun, said Friday they had yet to hear from her.

"Their lifestyle is going to change so dramatically they won't know

what happened," the grandfather said.

De Vries works as a nurse at a hospital in Hartford, Sagen said.

Without her urging, Robins probably wouldn't have played the

lottery because he had lost money on a recent gambling trip to Las Vegas, Sagen said.

"It couldn't have happened to a nicer person," said Sharon Simon, a teaching colleague.

We're directly affected by it all and most affected by the environment in Mexico due to its proximity. However, other than encouragement, it is not within say-so of any official in this country to do anything about it.

AIDS czar. Drug czar. Czar czar?

One of Washington's latest trends is to appoint a czar to coordinate government efforts in a given policy area. The idea is to make government services more effective. Some seem to think appointing a czar will really make a difference. In reality, it's just another bureaucratic position draining the tax coffers. In reality, it's just another PR move. ...

There is another way to do everything the czar is supposed to do. We know it's a novel idea, and many in the capital will say it won't work, but here goes: Why not centralize like functions, such as drug enforcement, within one agency, thereby reducing bureaucracy rather than adding to it? Yes, it's a radical idea, but it just might work.

To do this way would eliminate redundant positions, end the problems of turf wars, ease implementation of government policy and save the taxpayers money.

Will Washington do this? Not likely. It sounds impressive - imperial? - to appoint a czar. It gives the impression of real power. And who wouldn't rather appoint a czar than a mere agency head? Must those press releases sound impressive, because in Washington the appearance of power is more important than real power, and the appearance of action is more important than real action.

The Monitor, on congressional districting:

If an imperial wizard of the Ku Klux Klan argued that all blacks think alike, he would be rightly criticized for engaging in racial stereotyping. Yet the civil rights establishment in this country insists on defending an electoral system that treats minorities as though they think alike.

The U.S. Supreme Court has struck a blow against such destructive racial stereotyping, ruling last week that a North Carolina congressional district designed to virtually guarantee the election of a black is not constitutionally protected ...

The kind of gerrymandering seen in North Carolina reinforces the stereotype that all black voters think alike. It implies that they are properly represented in Congress only so long as the person representing them is also black. This ignores the reality that diverse political and cultural views exist among blacks, just as they do among whites and any other racial or ethnic group.

By rolling back a form of political apartheid, the Supreme Court has moved us closer to a society where a person's skin color matters less and less.



Perot bloc could be crucial in 1996

The poll also found Perot voters particularly scornful of Congress, and the DLC cited that as backing for Clinton to be more assertive with lawmakers. But that would risk confrontations that could cost Clinton votes on the budget, health care reform and other issues.

From said he wasn't advocating Congress-bashing, but Clinton should push things like welfare reform through even when there's Democratic opposition.

The DLC survey of Perot voters was the most extensive yet, but it wasn't the first or the last. Republicans have commissioned a poll of their own. They've also set up a National Policy Forum program to hold Perot-style town meetings beginning in the fall.


They see some of their ideas mirrored in the Perot camp. When Perot went to the Capitol on June 24

with two truckloads of petitions urging spending cuts before taxes are increased, more than 20 congressional Republicans were on hand. There wasn't a Democrat around.

Perot's former pollster already had urged Republicans to start reaching out to the people who voted for the Texas billionaire. Frank Luntz told them to concentrate on economic and political reforms, to aim their message at the middle class, steer away from ideological labeling, and cast doubts on Clinton's honesty.

"If Republicans can show that Mr. Clinton's new spending programs will come from the pockets of the middle class, they will lay a path for bringing these voters to the GOP," Luntz wrote.

In 1992, Perot's share of the vote was almost evenly split among people who said they would have supported Clinton and those who would have

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Austin prepares for arrival of NFL champion Cowboys

AUSTIN (AP) - Is that Troy Aikman or Elvis? Are they the Dallas Cowboys or the Beatles?

It's hard to tell the way Austin is whirling into a frenzy in anticipation of the Cowboys' arrival at St. Edward's University for training camp beginning July 16.

A Super Bowl championship will bring new fans to St. Edward's and new fences to stand behind. The barricades were installed to give players more freedom getting to and from the practice field.

A narrow path known as "auto-graph alley," where fans traditionally mob the Cowboys for signatures, also has been altered to safeguard the NFL's youngest team.

"I guess it's a lot like protecting rock stars from fans," said John Lucas, vice president of student services at St. Edward's and one of the camp's chief organizers.

"With the number of people expected this year, we became concerned and changed the fencing system to control the crowds. People were always trying to get closer and closer to the players."

It seems like a century since the Cowboys trudged to Austin four years ago for training camp after a 1-15 season.

If the Cowboys weren't worth sweating for in the city's jalapeno-like heat back then, they certainly are now.

These days, America's Team means something again. And true fans, borderline fans and even people who couldn't care less but want to be trendy and spy on the Super Bowl

champs are lining up to melt with the players through drill after drill at the monthlong camp.

Many of the changes have been designed with the fans' best interests at heart, such as added security, more parking and plenty of extra vendors selling food and Cowboys' memorabilia.

"We are anticipating the crowds will be significantly larger," Lucas said. "Specifically, we have put a lot more people on traffic control and security and even added a second off-site parking location."

"I personally can't imagine it getting much worse than it's been in the past," said Super Bowl MVP Aikman, who added that he will attend camp despite a back injury.

Yes it can, Lucas said, noting that Aikman is likely the focus of much of the hysteria.

"Troy is like the lead rock singer," he said. "The crowds tend to move with him. When he practices, they shift with him wherever he is doing his drills."

The shrieks for the blond-haired, blue-eyed quarterback's wristbands, shirt and even his pants are expected to be louder than ever.

Fans also climb over each other to get to offensive linemen Nate Newton, running back Emmitt Smith and wide receiver Michael Irvin.

The vendors can't wait.

"We are gearing up," said Glenn Kelly, owner of Mr. K's Sports Cards and Comics, which is located just a block from St. Edward's.

"We are putting on extra staff and getting as much memorabilia as we can. We have ordered thousands of dollars worth of extra stuff, mainly

Cowboys cards and photographs for people to sign."

Kent Redding, president of Campus Lifestyles, is in charge of merchandising on St. Edward's property during the camp. He has added a second circus-style tent to sell everything from Cowboys potholders to troll dolls carrying a football and wearing a Dallas uniform.

"Before, we carried mostly basic merchandise like caps and T-shirts and shorts," Redding said. "But now we have increased our inventory dramatically with things like aprons, cups, mugs, erasers, pens, pencils and boxer shorts."

"We had to start our planning earlier this year because the Cowboys merchandise is so hard to get," Redding said. "There is a lot of it, but it's in such demand."

Redding is so enthusiastic, he has put up a billboard advertising the camp and installed a hotline, telling fans when the Cowboys are practicing.

"We have gotten some calls from people wondering if Aikman is OK and wanting to know if he will be practicing," Redding said. "We joke with them and say we haven't gotten in on the team meetings yet."

"But the interest is clearly there."

Lucas says the crowds will likely pack the training camp over the first two weeks. He said the crowds will likely dwindle after the Cowboys return from London, where they will play Detroit in a preseason game Aug. 8.

Training camp ends Aug. 20.

"We get tremendous crowd support throughout training camp and we appreciate it," Aikman said.

Former Longhorns find happiness with Canada's Toronto Argonauts

AUSTIN (AP) - Johnny Walker was negotiating to play for the San Antonio Texans - a Canadian Football League franchise in his hometown that ended up folding after only two weeks - when he received a friendly phone call from former teammate Butch Hadnot.

"Hey, Johnny, Toronto needs you," Hadnot told Walker, trying to sell the former University of Texas wide receiver on joining him in Canada.

Walker listened and eventually signed with the Argonauts, one of the glamour franchises of the CFL.

Walker and Hadnot were two stars of the 1990 Texas team that won the Southwest Conference championship but was thrashed by Miami in the Cotton Bowl.

Now, their chances appear excellent of being among the 17 Americans on the club's main roster, or at least making the practice squad when the regular season starts this weekend.

Walker, a sure-handed receiver who owns the UT record for passes caught in a season (55, 1989), desperately needed a team such as Toronto to appreciate his talents. Earlier, Walker had been too talented for his own good. He wasn't able to make up his mind between baseball and football.

He had bounced from playing Class A baseball in the Atlanta Braves' organization to football for the Green Bay Packers and the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Wherever he went, it seemed someone was frowning upon his attempt to be a two-sport star. So he focused on football, but he became a victim of a numbers game in the training camps of both the Packers and Steelers and didn't make the teams' final rosters.

Hadnot, meanwhile, needed a familiar face such as Walker's to keep him focused as he tried to jump the wide gap between college and professional football.

Hadnot, a running back, might have been entering his senior year with the Longhorns this fall, bulldozing his way through defensive lines the way he did in 1990 when he was the SWC newcomer of the year.

Instead, he left Texas last summer after being suspended by Coach John Mackovic for breaking team rules and then flunking out of school. He didn't help himself with Mackovic by inquiring with Texas A&M coach R.C. Slocum about the possibility of transferring from UT to its longtime rival.

Both Walker and Hadnot have found a comfortable niche 1,500 miles from where fans can recall their glory days. Or their disappointments.

This time last year, Walker was anticipating a trip to Latrobe, Pa., where the Steelers conduct their training camp. He had given up on the Braves, who had made him their fourth-round draft pick two summers before.

Walker, who had been told by many scouts that he was too slow for

pro football, made it through several cuts but eventually was waived.

Walker still had enough money saved from his six-figure baseball signing bonus to pay for his schooling. So he contemplated his future and took some classes at Tarleton State in Stephenville, where his fiancee was going to school.

"I guess I was kind of disappointed for a little while," Walker said.

"Like it or not, it comes to a point in an athlete's career when he's faced with having to do something else. I knew I would still get plenty of opportunities; I needed to decide if I wanted to pursue them."

Walker decided the CFL, with its liberal rules on offense, could be to his liking. He was contacted by San Antonio's new franchise. But the Texans almost immediately went bust in late January.

Word of mouth brought him overtures from several other CFL teams. Eventually, Walker signed with Toronto, which knew they would be without the services of former Notre Dame star Raghib "Rocket" Ismail, who did not sign a new CFL contract.

In his first CFL game - an exhibition June 21 against the Ottawa Rough Riders - Walker was named the player of the game. As an outside receiver in the Argonauts' run and shoot, Walker caught three passes for 63 yards and scored a touchdown.

"I love this. I have been dying to play the run and shoot for a long time," he said.

While Walker contemplated his future in Stephenville, Hadnot was going through growing pains in his hometown of Kirbyville in Southeast Texas waiting for the CFL season to start.

Hadnot had spent the final two games of the 1992 CFL season with Toronto before moving back home. He made ends meet by working at a local paper mill. He also found a job selling hamburgers at a McDonald's in nearby Jasper.

A month before camp began, Hadnot's agent set him up with the

trainer of the NBA's San Antonio Spurs to improve the running back's speed and conditioning. The trainer put Hadnot through cardiovascular workouts as well as the typical weight lifting and running regimen.

Once he got to camp, any time Hadnot was feeling down, he'd look to Walker, whose presence reminded him of happier times, when the running back was the toast of Austin for most of the fall of 1990.

"Just him being here brings back memories of when we were in the Cotton Bowl," Hadnot said. "Those thoughts make me practice a little harder, and they make me want to believe in myself more and help my teammates."

Walker saw that Hadnot probably needed some familiar support.

"I think I'm a help to him," Walker said. "He hasn't been through many of these things, and I think he looks up to me like a big brother."

Hadnot suffered somewhat of a setback against Ottawa. His chief competition, a running back from Kansas State, tore a knee ligament in the game's first quarter, leaving the way open for Hadnot.

The first time he touched the ball, Hadnot caught a lob pass from the quarterback and dashed for the sideline. For 39 yards, Hadnot felt like his former self as he galloped into the wide open secondary. And then a defensive back clipped him from behind.

Hadnot limped off the field with a sprained left ankle, the same ankle that hindered him for much of his sophomore season. He was expected to miss only a week of practice.

Hadnot wants people to know he's changed his life by turning to religion. He says he's up every morning by 6:45 for Bible study.

"I like what I'm doing now," he says. "I've turned my life around. I know I can get back on track. I knew if this wasn't meant to be, God wouldn't give me this chance. Everything I do now, I give thanks to Him."

East Texas flooding takes toll of fruit, vegetable crop

AUSTIN -- Flooding and heavy rains recently are taking a toll on East Texas fruits and vegetables, by keeping growers from doing maintenance work and causing problems to the roots.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said that rains of 18 inches at Jacksonville and 12 inches in the Tyler area left fields flooded.

Early blueberries and blackberries are being damaged by soft spots. Though the berries were ready for harvest, workers could not get into the fields. Later berries should be a good crop, said Perry.

Orchards of apples and peaches were in danger of root loss and the East Texas peach crop was threatened by brown rot because farmers could not apply fungicides.

The agriculture department estimated that a 20 percent loss of

cantaloupe would not be unusual because of the rain. The watermelon crop may suffer a 10 percent loss and tomatoes, 18 percent.

Farmers also must cope with an abundant crop of weeds that grew with the rains.

Despite some gloomy news, there is some good news -- the sweet corn crop is described as good and late berries should be plentiful and top quality.

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

ABOUT BIFOCALS

Bifocals are convenient. Instead of having to carry two pairs of glasses with you, you can wear one comfortable pair that does two jobs. In most cases, the top portion corrects distance vision; the lower one corrects near vision.

However, bifocals take some getting used to. Basically, you want to lower your eyes, not your head, when you read, so that you are looking through the lower part of the lenses. Hold the reading matter closer for more comfort. It's easier to read a newspaper if you fold it into book-size quarters and move the page.

The only hard part is stairs. It's important not to look down while you walk, even on stairs.

Make sure the frames are properly adjusted so the near-vision segment is in the right place. If you sense eyestrain of any kind, bring in your glasses to be tested and re-adjusted.

S.S. benefits rise if you don't retire at 65

Reaching 65 years of age may be a significant rung on life's ladder, but it doesn't mean you have to retire and begin collecting your Social Security benefits.

A quarter of a century ago a group of women formed what has become an institution in Deaf Smith County -- the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce Women's Division.

The group will celebrate its silver anniversary on Sunday with a tea.

Special guests will be most of the women who have served as president of the Women's Division. Of the 25 who have held that office, most still live in or near Hereford.

Current president Linda Daniel said she has not heard from two past leaders -- 1977 president Donna VanderZee, who lives in San Antonio, and 1980 president Frances Berry, who lives in Tempe, Ariz.

One past president, 1969 president Clara Gillenstein, is deceased.

There has only been one two-term president of the Women's Division, Lavor Nieman, who served in 1974 and 1975.

The committees are: Animal Action, Beautification, Beauty Spot of the Month, Blood Bank, Christmas Carousel, Christmas Lighting Contest, Christmas Tree Ceremony, Decorations, Finance and Budget, Jubilee, Fine Arts, Little Miss Hereford, Miss Hereford, Membership, Public Affairs and Publicity, Tour, Welcome and Woman of the Year.

Potential members do not have to be part of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce to participate in the women's division, Daniel said.

Dues for the Women's Division are \$20 a year.

Borders give room new appearance

Decorating on a budget doesn't mean you have to settle for less than the best. It does mean that decorating ought to be as economical as it is attractive.

One of the best ways to assure that it is, is to install wallcovering borders quickly and easily. Installing borders is an inexpensive home improvement that results in a custom, high-style look.

"Think of the walls," says the Wallcovering Information Bureau, "as the easiest, yet most effective way to revive the looks of a tired room." Just by adding borders, you can transform the room's entire appearance. Although most borders are designed to coordinate with other wallcoverings, they can be used on plain walls to create a feeling of architectural dimension and visual interest.

Borders needn't be restricted to walls. They can also be used to add a dash of color and style when used to silhouette fireplaces, mantels, kitchen or bath cabinets or other furnishings.

Decorations to emphasize wall or door panels, or to create the looks of panels.


When used as trim around windows or doors, borders can be mitered or overlapped at the corners. To miter a corner, overlap the two borders. With a straight edge and a razor knife, cut the top layer diagonally. Take away what's trimmed and the corner is perfectly mitered.

By overlapping the vertical border, it's possible to visually heighten windows or doors. To create an illusion of wider windows or doors, overlap the horizontal border. Many borders are pre-pasted for ease of installation and washable for easy cleaning. Just follow the manufacturer's instructions.

Decorative borders that are both pre-trimmed and pre-pasted enable do-it-yourselfers to change the look of a room in about an hour. All that's required is to dip the borders in water and smooth them onto the walls.

Borders, like other wallcoverings, can be purchased at paint and wallpaper stores, specialty shops and deco-

rating centers. The sales people at these retail outlets are also good sources of information on colors, styles and patterns and how to use borders to achieve the look you have in mind.

In a child's room, the decor may be updated simply by changing the border as the youngster grows older. Walls should be covered with a contemporary or traditional wallcovering which will coordinate with this year's Teddy bears or next year's bicycles.

Simple checks may save service call

Is your TV picture or sound not what it should be? Here are some simple checks to make before calling the TV repair technician:

- If there is no picture, sound or light, make sure the set is plugged in. Then test the wall outlet with a lamp you know is working. If there is no power, replace the fuse or reset the circuit breaker in your home's main electrical control panel. Also reset the TV circuit breaker, if there is one, on the back of the set.

Check connections and wires. Unplug the power cord and examine it for signs of broken insulation, burn marks or loose prongs at the plug.

- If the picture is not what it should be, look for the adjustment knobs and screws on the front and rear panels. Most are for correcting picture

problems and should be used as instructed in the owner's manual. Allow the set to warm up before making adjustments.

- If the picture is constantly grainy on a set with a mechanical channel selector, jiggle the turner knob. If the picture clears, unplug the set. Remove the channel selector knob. Spray tuner cleaner (available at electronics supply stores) through the opening. Replace the knob. The picture may be distorted for about a half-hour afterward.

- If you have a roof antenna and your TV reception is poor, check out the problem by hooking up a set of indoor rabbit ears for comparison. If this improves reception, you know the roof antenna is the problem.

Check the lead-in wire that connects the antenna to the TV. Loosen and then tighten the connec-

tions at the set, at the signal splitter (if you have your FM radio or a second TV connected to the antenna), and at the antenna.

- Twin-wire antenna lead-ins often become loose and drooping in their projecting standoffs brackets. When the lead-in flaps in the wind, the TV picture flip-flops and color fades in and out. Make sure that this wire is fitted snugly along its entire length.

Unplug the TV set before cleaning it.

- Let the set cool before cleaning the face of the picture tube. Spray the face with a commercial glass cleaner and wipe it with a soft cloth.

- Except for the TV screen, avoid using spray cleaners directly on the set. You may damage the wiring or clog the ventilation or sound-producing holes. Instead, spray the cleaner onto your cleaning cloth.

- TV cabinets are usually made of plastic or wood veneer.

Clean plastic exteriors with mild soap and warm water, using a cloth wrung nearly dry to prevent drips. Dust wood veneer cabinets frequently

with a soft, clean, slightly damp cloth. To clean metal cabinets, chrome or any other shiny trim, use a soft cloth moistened with a bit of rubbing alcohol, white vinegar or window cleaner.

SAFETY PRECAUTIONS:

- Unless you're skilled in electronic appliance repair, never remove the back cover of your TV set or perform internal repairs. An error in reassembly might cause radiation to escape or a fire hazard. Moreover, touching parts inside the set might cause a severe shock, even with the power cord unplugged.

- The power cord plug of some sets has one prong with a widened tip. The wide prong is meant to fit only the wide, or neutral slot of the wall receptacle. Never file the wide prong down or try to plug it into an extension cord or plug rather than the outlet.

- Don't block the ventilation slots in the cabinet or place the set near a radiator or in a small, enclosed space.

- If the cabinet is damaged, there may be a shock hazard. Have a trained technician examine the set.

Cuomo makes court claim



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'Last Flying Boat' takes a risky trip across Africa



"The Last African Flying Boat," airing Sunday as a presentation of ABC's "World of Discovery," re-creates flights by Great Britain's Imperial Airways from Egypt to Mozambique during the 1930s.

In the late 1930s, the Empire flying boats of Imperial Airways linked the British colonies of East Africa, from Egypt to southerly Mozambique. Half a century later, London-based journalist Alexander Frater, producer-director David Wallace and a camera crew made a harrowing attempt to re-create that journey over an Africa that now poses far different challenges.

"The Last African Flying Boat," airing Sunday, July 11, on ABC's "World of Discovery," chronicles their journey with actor Roy Scheider as narrator. A BBC co-production, it is edited from a longer documentary that won a 1990 British Academy Award.

"I joined them in Nairobi," says series executive producer Dennis Kane. "It was great fun and just as scary as it could be. Flying through a war zone in that albatross of an airplane that did 90 miles an hour, top speed, was a little frightening, especially when you know on the ground they had missiles."

Indeed. While the flights of the past were made in posh British aircraft flying over British-held territory, the contemporary travelers found themselves flying over five independent countries and two war zones, where rebels routinely shoot at passing aircraft. The Catalina, the airboat bearing the group on their expedition, is described in the documentary as being "about half a century old and frail as a dragonfly," and the engines frequently threaten to conk out during the trip.

American pilot Jim Ladegard emerged as "a latter-day John Wayne" during the journey, recalls Kane, and the pilot's grimly set jawline becomes

a recurring visual theme during the film, whether he's trying to assess damage from running into a flock of birds or just trying to convey to a grinning but uncomprehending Khartoum merchant specifically what piece of hardware he needs.

Kane, who numbers 25 Emmys among his honors, says he is proud of the British award for "Last Flying

Boat" and has high praise for his colleagues on the trip.

"In fact, we're just finishing one on the monsoon with the same gentleman, Alex Frater. It will be out next year, and it is absolutely beautiful," he says.

"The Last African Flying Boat" shares its setting with last May's "World of Discovery" outing, an examination of the wildebeest migration across the Serengeti Plain. That's not simply coincidence.

"Most of the wildlife stuff we have done comes out of Africa," Kane explains. "So much of Africa is still undiscovered. We're also finishing up a piece called 'The Small World of Africa,' all about those little creepy crawlies that can zap you if they decide to."

That program has been in the works since 1989, delayed by the prolonged drought in South Africa that virtually erased the so-called wet season. "Any time you're dealing with little invertebrates, the weather plays a tremendous part," he adds.

Either the monsoon or "Small World" program probably will launch a new cycle of "World of Discovery" around mid-October or so. For now, Kane is hoping an audience tunes in for "Last Flying Boat."

"It gives a real taste of what's cooking in Africa today, from Cairo all the way down to Mozambique and in-between."

Q: Could you print some information on Arsenio Hall? How old is he, is he married, and where can I write to him? —Cheryl Gale Ficklin, Natchitoches, La.

A: Hall, a 35-year-old bachelor, began his show business career at age 7 with a magic act he performed at weddings where his father, a Baptist preacher, officiated. His love of music, particularly drumming, led to a stint as a disc jockey at his college radio station. He entered comedy on a dare in 1979 and soon relocated to Chicago, where he was given a career-boost by singer Nancy Wilson. A move to L.A. led to opening gigs for performers such as Aretha Franklin, Wayne Newton and Tina Turner. In 1983, he became host of ABC's "The 1/2 Hour Comedy Hour." Four years later, he replaced Joan Rivers on Fox's "The Late Show," where high ratings and strong audience reception led to his role in "Coming to America." Paramount then offered him his own syndicated late-night talk show. It began in January 1989 and recently reached its 1,000th episode. Hall's role as host has brought him numerous awards, including a People's Choice for Favorite Late-Night Talk Show Host and TV Guide recognition as Television Personality of the Year and TV's Best Dressed Man. 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



The Phillies have confidently amassed the best record in the game at the All-Star break behind the blue-collar talents of first-baseman John Kruk, catcher Darren Daulton and a pitching staff led by Terry Mulholland and Tommy Greene. Even the unpredictable Mitch "The Twitch" Williams has been a solid anchor in the bullpen.

"They've done a great job of building from outside their own system," says CBS analyst Tim McCarver, who played in two All-Star games himself. "Only Darren Daulton and Kim Batiste came up through their own farm teams," he adds.

"The Phillies are a mentally tough team," says McCarver. "They have the team chemistry and attitude to hold their lead. When you walk into their locker room, you hear a bunch of guys laughing, which, unfortunately, is very rare in baseball today. They genuinely like each other and have a lot of fun playing the game."
