16 Cases Called In District Civil Court

Tuesday morning, 15th District Court convened to hear 16 civil cases. Judge Pat Boone Jr. presided.

Of the sixteen cases, only two were heard by a jury, one of these being settled before the case went to the jury. Case No. 2008, being Gula Harkey VS.

Flora J. Fyia and W. O. Simpson, suit for damages, both parties agreed on a settlement before the jury was called.

Case No. 2731 being M. D. Cruse Jr. VS. F. O. Masten. A suit on injuries, a jury of 11 men and one woman deliberated nine hours before reaching a verdict that found both parties negligent. This suit was the result of an auto accident June 12, 1964, near Needmore. No judgement was awarded.

Two other cases were settled out of court, these being, case No. 2678, styled Raymond Rainer, VS. Employers Mutual Liability Insurance Company of Wisconsin a suit on personal injury. The other case settled, No. 2698, Densel Jaquess VS Hartley Dairy Inc., suit on injuries.

Twelve cases were left pending, those being No. 2628, Antonio Murillo VS Central Surety and Insurance Corp., Compensation suit. No. 2629, M. T. Grant VS. Morton Spraying and Fertilizer

Triplets Born To Local - 'COW'?

A somewhat rare thing happened at the Hartley Dairy Wednesday at noon. A Holstein milk cow gave birth to triplets. The calves had an average weight of 25 lbs. each. Jim Koeneman, manager for the dairy stated that although they had had 10 to 12 sets of twins born this year, this was the first time for triplets. Koeneman stated that while he was working in Wisconsin, he owned a cow that had quadruplets, born, but that all died soon after birth.

Jerry Gleason, DVM, stated to the Journal that cattle have triplets one-fourth as often as humans. He also stated that the chance of a cow having triplets is 1-150,000. These calves, two heifers and a bull calf were doing fine soon after birth and hopes were high that they would live. Dr. Gleason stated that a high per cent of the time triplets will not reproduce.

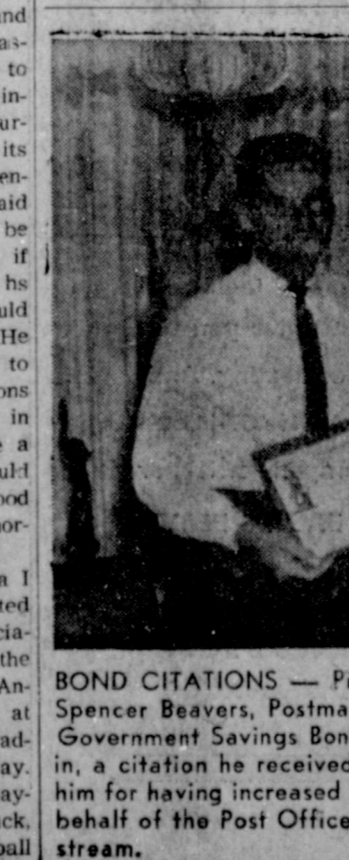

POUNDS ARE MISLEADING
Pounds are often meaningless as a gauge to washer capacity.

Fabrics come in so many different weights - ranging from delicate lace items to heavy denims - making pounds a poor gauge to washer capacity. Regardless of the weight of the load the volume should be such that all items circulate freely in the washbasket during agitation.

Laundry baskets of the same volume can hold 16 pounds of overalls but only three pounds of dacron curtains the specialist points out.

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
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
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J. V. Peeler Gets 30 Year Award

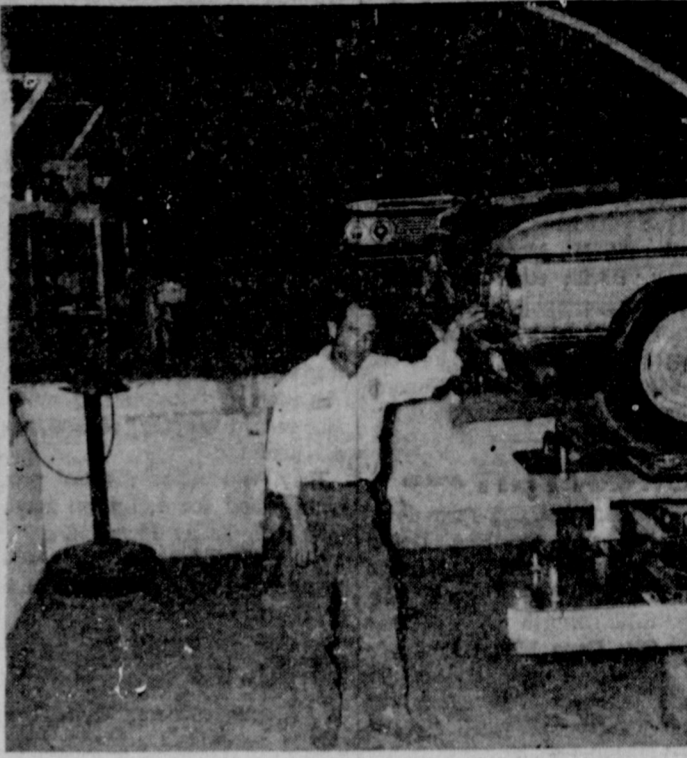
