FmHA plans \$8.8 billion write-down

Managing Editor The U.S. Farmers Home Administration will seek public comment on plans to write-down \$8.8 billion in delinquent farm loans-a move the head of the FmHA says "won't save many farmers."

Vance Clark, head of the agency which is the "lender of last resort" for farmers, testified Wednesday at a Senate Agriculture Committee hearing that "It would be unrealistic to expect a wholesale rescue of our most troubled borrowers."

According to Clark, only about 16,000 of the agency's 128,000 delinquent borrowers would gain from the write-down of their loans. Many farmers and ran-

* Hustlin' Hereford. home of Bea Hutson chers "are in such bad shape that even writing down their debt won't save them," Clark testified.

The write-down comes with the passage of the Agricultural Credit Act of 1987, which requires FmHA to write-down loans to the value of the collateral on those loansmachinery, land, and other items--if the loan were foreclosed and the collateral sold.

To qualify for the write-down, the farmer-borrower must prove he can meet the reduced

"FmHA will look at the farmer's total program," said U.S. Rep. Larry Combest. "They will look at what happens with a foreclosure action, see how much a farmer could hope to get if he sells his land, his equipment.

"Then they'll look at restructuring the loan. If restructuring is cheaper, they'll restructure. Actually, the government is no worse off if the loan is restructured--the government was going to lose that money

anyway. "The market would be better off, because this equipment won't be dumped on the market, and the community will be better off because these farmers will still be in business.'

The write-down, according to FmHA figures, will allow 16,200 farmers to remain in business with \$2.1 billion worth of loan reductions. Clark expects the agency will have to completely write off about \$6.7 billion from another 54,000 borrowers who still

needed to meet the reduced payments.

Not everyone is going to be helped, and not everyone is going to make it, but 16,000 farmers are going to be helped greatly," Combest said.

Clark said another 10,500 borrowers are in a bind but the agency says they can recoup enough from collateral liquidation or other means to repay delinquent

Farmers Home officials will also restructure another 37,000 borrwers without resorting to write-downs or liquidation by rescheduling or deferring notes, or giving breaks on interest rates.

"The write-down is not the first choice," Combest explained, "Ac-

cording to the FmHA there is a software program in place in every county office that will allow them to plug in the numbers, to put the farm on the screen.

"They look at reamortization, more time, everything they can do. If everything else fails, if the farmer just won't qualify, then they'll look at restructuring. It's like any loan-they'll look at every loan, look at what the farmer has, and see where the farmer fits."

Combest, who serves on the House Agriculture Committee, said FmHA officials are to present figures in a hearing next week on the age of the loans and speculated that some of the loans were five years or more old and up to 80 percent of the loans were emergency or disaster loans.

Tax deadline tonight; tax freedom is May 5

WASHINGTON (AP) - The first return-filing season under the broadest U.S. income tax overhaul in history closes out at midnight. But the average American will have to work 20 more days to keep federal. state and local tax collectors at bay for another year.

"Tax Freedom Day" will come May 5, the latest date since the Tax Foundation began counting a halfcentury ago. If the government took every penny you earned until your share of the total tax burden were paid, the foundation reckons, you would have to work the first 126 days of 1988 just to meet those obligations.

Thirty years ago, Tax Freedom. Day fell on April 10.

Several million Americans didn' have time to fret about such fanciful calculations. They were working up to the eleventh hour on their 1987 returns, and many were sure to be standing in line in front of mail drops as the midnight filing deadline approached.

Any return not postmarked by

filing penalty.

The Internal Revenue Service cautioned taxpavers not to ignore the deadline, even if they can't afford to pay all the taxes they owe. Although failure to pay on time can result in one penalty, failure to file can bring reduced or eliminated a number of an additional one.

The IRS estimated that about 6.2 million couples and individuals would apply for an automatic fourmonth extension of the filing deadline by mailing Form 4868 with a check for their estimated taxes. That is up about 20 percent from last year

due in large part to all the tax-law changes that must be reflected on individuals pay all taxes - including returns being filed this year.

Congress' 1986 overhaul of the tax law changed more than 2,700 provisions and led the IRS to create 48 new forms. But the typical individual was unaffected by the great majority of those changes and has to use few if any of the new forms.

Four youths killed in San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) Four members of a family were found stabbed to death early today in a mobile home, and the bodies were so brutally mutilated that police didnot recognize at first that one victim

was a male "It resembles the Charles Manson thing. It's the worst I've seen in 28 years on the department," Sgt. George Wilson told the San Antomo Express-News

"It's unbelievable. All of them were savagely staboed. There are knives broken off in their necks." said Wilson.

A former neighbor identified the victims as Jennifer Mann, 19; Shannon Mann, 17: Martha Mann, 14, and Ernest Mann, 13.

The former neighbor, Janice Pope, identified the victims' parents as Ernest and Becky Mann, who are separated. Mann is an independent contractor.

Officers were searching for a man who was seen leaving the mobile home in a car belonging to one of the

Police first reported that four girls had been killed, but the mother of the victims later confirmed that one was

The mother collapsed after identifying her children, police said.

The killer used an entire set of kitchen steak knives, police said. Broken knife blades were scattered around the mobile home and some knives had been broken off and left in

Freed hostage says conditions 'grim'

ALGIERS, Algeria (AP) 70-year-old diabetic freed by Arab hijackers described conditions aboard the seized jumbo jet as grim, with handcuffed hostages herded together near bomb-rigged doors, an official

Djurna Abdallah Chatti of Kuwait was released late Thursday after two days of negotiations between the Shiite Moslem hijackers and a Kuwaiti delegation through Algerian mediators. The ordeal is in its 11th

The gunmen, who have killed two Kuwaiti hostages, issued a statement when they released Chatti, saying they would not budge in their demand that 17 pro-Iranian bombers jailed in Kuwait be released. They said they stood by their demand "even if the price we have to pay is very high.

We are not highway bandits. they said in the statement, radioed to the control tower in Arabic and English. "We are men of principle."

According to the Kuwaiti official, who insisted on anonymity. Chatti reported that the hostage worst affected was Fadel Al-Sabah, 33, cousin of the emir of Kuwait, regarded as the hijackers' most valuable captive. Al-Sabah's two sisters also are on board.

Chatti said Al-Sabah suffered from a severe nervous disorder even before he boarded the plane, and the experience of the hijack "seems to have put him over the brink.'

Al-Sabah had continuous violent shakes, could not speak and "just cries all the time," Chatti said. The hijackers brought a microphone to him and tried to force him to make a statement, but he was unable to do

Earlier Thursday, a Kuwaiti passenger pleaded with his government to meet the gunmen's demands, saying if it didn't, all aboard the plane would be killed.

Chatti said there were eight hijackers. Other freed passengers have said there were between five and eight. Stumbling and visibly weak, Chatti

was led from the aircraft by a doctor and a hooded gunman. The gunman then dashed back up the gangway and into the plane. Praise to God, I am fine, but they

had me tied all the time and I am tired." Chatti told reporters in the airport lounge. "They are not good people. They beat me.

The blue-and-white Kuwait Airways jet sat on the tarmac about 400 yards from the terminal at Houari

Boumedienne Airport. Outside the jumbo jet, near the cockpit, a sign in Arabic had been hung reading, "The plane of martyrdom.

The Kuwaiti official quoted Chatti as saying all hostages had their hands handcuffed behind their backs at all times and were not allowed to speak or move.

The official said Chatti had deep. bleeding cuts on both wrists from the handcuffs he said he was forced to wear since Mashhad, Iran, where the plane first landed after being commandeered April 5 on a Bangkok-

Kuwait flight Fifty-seven of the 112 people aboard were released in Mashhad. At Larnaca, Cyprus, the jet's next stop, the hijackers killed two Kuwaitis and released 13. Early Wednesday, the jet landed in Algiers.

Texas talking with OPEC on how to boost oil industry

WASHINGTON (AP) — The state of Texas is talking with the folks who brought you the oil embargoes of the 1970s, looking for ways to cooperate with the OPEC cartel in a bid to revive its struggling oil industry.

By itself, Texas is still the seventh largest producer in the world, but its oil, real estate and banking industries have been devastated since a 1986 oil price collapse.

Texans "cannot continue to bury our heads in the sand and hope everything is going to be OK," says Kent Hance, one of the three members of the Texas Railroad Commission, which regulates oil production in the state.

Hance met earlier this month with Rilwanu Lukman, the president of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, and discussed the possibility that his state and the cartel would cooperate. More contacts are planned.

Hance told Harte-Hanks newspapers on Tuesday that cutting Texas production to hold up prices "is one of the things that has to be considered. It would be one of the items we would discuss" at OPEC's April 23 meeting in Vienna.

'We can do it to prevent waste," he said in an interview Thursday from Austin.

From the 1930s to the early 1970s, Texas played the role that Saudi Arabia can play today — acting as the world's swing producer, whose production stabilizes the price of oil. The commission, by controlling the amount of Texas oil produced, thus had a significant degree of control

That influence dissipated with the rise of the OPEC cartel and since 1972, the Texas commission has allowed wells in the state to produce at 100 percent of capacity.

OPEC demonstrated its clout in 1973, when 11 Arab member nations, angered over the Arab-Israeli conflict, slapped the United States with an oil embargo that produced gasoline lines all over the country.

Hance said that in the discussions with OPEC, "we are not trying to seek an alliance or cartel. We just want input. ... Our goal is one of

But OPEC head Lukman, who is Nigeria's oil minister, told AP-Dow Jones in Vienna last week after meeting with Hance in London, "Exchanging information isn't going to do the trick, is it?"

Last week, Hance said he had discussed a more effective output monitoring system for OPEC, which has been plagued for several years by member cheating.

That point struck John Lamont, oil specialist in the Washington law firm of Lobel, Novins, Lamont & Flug.

Noting that the commission for four decades had effective control over oil prices, Lamont said, "I don't want Texas going over there and showing them how it's done.'

Lamont said cooperation with the cartel by the commission would be "probably illegal" under antitrust laws, but that was disputed by William Baxter, a former head of the Justice Department's antitrust division who is now a professor at Stanford University Law School.

The economic harm resulting from higher prices and reduced output "is precisely the evil that the antitrust laws are aimed against," said Baxter, but he added that it is "fairly standard doctrine" that the laws apply only to private action, not action by states.

States also can file antitrust suits, and eight did so recently against insurance companies. One of the attorneys general involved, Robert Abrams of New York, was asked about the chances of a suit against Texas should it cut production in concert with OPEC.

His spokeswoman, Nancy Connell, replied, "OPEC price-fixing has cost U.S. consumers billions, maybe trillions of dollars, and we wouldn't want to see a state of the United States participating." But she said Abrams' office "would want to know more about Texas law" before commenting on any legal challenges.

Mark Sheehan, spokesman for the Justice Department antitrust division, declined to comment.

But a State Department official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said: "You can imagine what the Reagan administration thinks about it. It's a cartel that does not operate in U.S. interests.'

On the record, Doug Elmets, press aide to Energy Secretary John Herrington, said, "It's the department's belief and the government's policy that assistance to OPEC in its effort to manipulate the price of oil is not the correct approach.'

NAPLES, Italy (AP) — Police said today that a member of Japan's Red Army terrorist group was the prime suspect in a car bomb explosion outside a U.S. military club that killed an American servicewoman and four Italians.

Investigators said they were searching for Junzo Okudaira, 39, who is also suspected in rocket and bomb attacks on the U.S. and British embassies in Rome last June.

At least 17 people, including four U.S. sailors, were hurt in the Thursday night blast outside the United Services Organization club in

The Pentagon identified the slain

sailor as 21-year-old Angela Simone Santos, a radioman 3rd class from Ocala, Fla. She had been stationed at the Naval Communications Area Major Station in Naples since March

A man called a French news agency office in Rome today and claimed the attack in the name of a group calling itself the Organization of Jihad Brigades.

"The American imperialists must die today, two years after their barbarous attack against the Libyan Arab state," the caller said in accented English. "Jihad" means "ho-

ly war" in Arabic. At 2 a.m. on April 15, 1986, the

United States bombed the Libyan capital in retaliation for alleged Libyan involvement in the bombing of a West Berlin nightclub. Two U.S. servicemen and a Turkish woman died in the nightclub blast.

The Libyan ambassador to Italy, Abdulrahman Shargam, told the AN-SA news agency that attempts to link Libya to the bombing were disinfor-

Romano Argenio of Italy's antiterrorist police said investigators believed Okudaira had accomplices and that they were taking the claim

Three polls show Dukakis leads pack in New York presidential primary

NEW YORK (AP) - Michael Dukakis, his position as front-runner in the New York presidential primary confirmed by three new polls, was meeting with Gov. Mario Cuomo while Sen. Albert Gore Jr. was hoping an endorsement from Mayor Edward Koch would lift him into contention.

Democrats Dukakis, Gore and Jesse Jackson held a low-key debate Thursday night, the only clash occurring when Gore continued his criticism of Dukakis on the issue of use of nuclear weapons.

Republicans George Bush and Pat Robertson - their presidential rivalry reduced to a pro-forma contest Bush is certain to win - were addressing the annual Washington convention of the American Society of Newspaper Editors today.

Cuomo has refused to endorse any of the three Democratic contenders, saying he will wait until after the last primaries on June 7.

Earlier in the week, Jackson met with Cuomo and the governor was generous in his praise of the former civil rights activist. On Thursday, however, Cuomo

said Jackson's lack of experience in elective office could hurt him if he won the nomination.

"I could make a better case for

him if he had been a public official," Cuomo said.

Before Cuomo decided to hold off any endorsement, Dukakis had been considered the odds-on favorite to win the governor's backing. The Massachusetts governor also

had hoped to get the support of Koch, but the New York City mayor surprised many observers by announcing his backing of Gore, whom he described as "a man of intellect, courage and integrity.'

Koch said that on the issue of support of Israel, Gore was "head and shoulders" above the other two Democrats.

The mayor said Jackson was never

in contention for his endorsement, but that he would back him if he became the party nominee. He added however that his support of Jackson would be based "not

because of his positions but because

he would be less destructive of the

country than George Bush.' Gore needed all the help he could get in New York, which holds its primary next Tuesday with 255 delegates at stake.

Dukakis led Jackson by 45 percent to 28 percent in a CBS News poll, 46 percent to 34 percent in a Marist College poll and 49 percent to 34 percent in an ABC News-Washington Post

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Cuban leader Fidel Castro has been honored by the World Health Organization for giving up his famous cigar and setting a smoke-free example for his countrymen, Cuba's official news agency says.

Castro was given two medals by Carlyle Guerra de Macedo, director general of the Geneva-based organization, in a ceremony Tuesday at Havana's Palace of the Revolution, said Prensa Latina in a dispatch received here Wednesday.

The WHO announced the honor on April 7, the first worldwide "No Tobacco Day." Castro, whose cigars were almost as much a trademark as his beard, was cited for pledging in 1981 never to smoke in public and subsequently quitting.

Thompson, 48, who lives near Aspen, Colo., has received numerous telephone threats in the past week, agent Greg Werckman said Wednesday in New York City.


Thompson, creator of so-called "gonzo" journalism, has written several books, including "Fear and Loathing in Las Vegas" and "The Great White Shark Hunt."


Thompson has developed a reputation for rowdy behavior and drinking on the speaking tour, and his appearance initially had been opposed by student leaders.

The point I want to make is this: Even if you don't agree with your parents, listen to them. They have been your age but you have never been theirs. If you make a mistake, don't try to lie out of it. Take the consequences. When people who care about you tell your someting, listen to them. I now realize I was wrong about all the important things. If I could live my life over, I'd sure do things differently.

If just one person learns something from this letter I will have done some good in the world.Laugh if you want to, but who is the joke on when you are inside looking out or just looking because you're in?-Former Fool in Lexington




