## Holly stressing quality

Imperial Holly Sugar President Bob Hanna brought good news to Hereford at the annual Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association meeting at the community center. Hanna told the crowd of 300 growers the Holly plant in Hereford will be the sole supplier of sugar for the new General Mills plant being constructed in Albuquerque. Hanna didn't give a dollar figure on probable sales.

"We all know they use a lot of sugar in a year's time," Hanna said. "General Mills is one of the country's biggest consumers of sugar."

Hanna said the business was Imperial Holly's, and Hereford's, as

long as Holly's production is based on quality. Hanna expanded on the company's Total Quality Management program during his speech Friday afternoon.

He said it was based on a new idea. "If it ain't broke, break it."

After the audience of area farmers quit laughing, Hanna explained.

"If it ain't broke, break it. Then put it back together so it runs better than it did before, and runs better at less cost," he said.

The TQM program was developed to provide a standard. "Sometimes the quality was excellent, some pretty good, some fair and some poor quality. You either have it (quality) or you don't. It's not a variable.

"We were pretty good before. After the exercise we went through in Hereford this past year we came out a lot better."

Hanna was referring to the 1991 harvest which was virtually destroyed by an early season snow storm and bitter cold temperatures beginning Oct. 30 and running for almost a week.

"We know the best ingredient we have a Holly Sugar are 1,900 of the best farmers in the United States, and that starts right here in Hereford," Hanna said. He pointed out the company's commitment to not only the sugar business but to farmers through its development of a research

## Cattle Cop Chambers chases modern-day rustlers chasing same old prize

Cattle rustlers aren't hanged on the spot when caught with the fruits of their thievery these days, but a man who brings them to justice feels good everytime he sends one to jail.

Kenneth Chambers has worked as a field inspector for Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association for 18 years. He and his colleagues also are commissioned by the Texas Department of Public Safety as Special Texas Rangers.

"I like convicting cow thieves," Chambers said about his work. "I think one of the best parts is getting restitution for people who have losses."

Before joining TSCRA, Chambers worked two years in the Amarillo Police Department and four years in the Potter County Sheriff's Department.

"I handled all the cattle theft reports for the sheriff's department," he said, "before I went to the association."

To do his job effectively, Chambers works closely with sheriff's departments, DPS and Texas Rangers.

"We have to rely on them a lot," he said, adding that information is exchanged among the law enforcement agencies.

Chambers knows his territory and is familiar with the different ways cattle are stolen,

whether from a feedyard or a ranch.

"We know the kind of people who steal livestock and the ones who traffic in stolen cattle and horses," he said. "But, sometimes it's the first-time thief that's the hardest to track down."

Some cases stand out in his career. One started with the theft of three semi-trucks in Clovis, N.M. The thieves proceeded to a feedyard just west of the Texas-New Mexico state line where they loaded and hauled off 300 head of cattle.

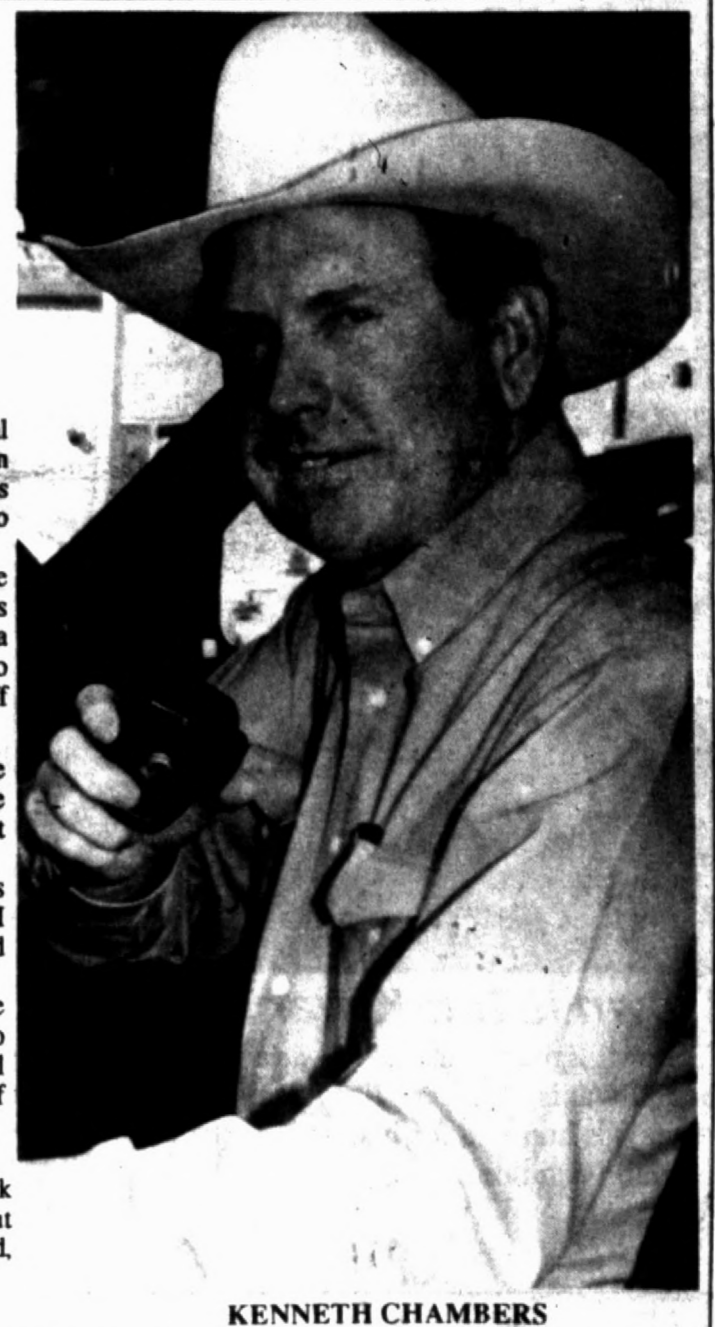
A brand inspector identified some of the cattle at a livestock auction in Vernon. Some of the cattle also were located on a wheat pasture in Oklahoma, said Chambers.

Over a period of three months, Chambers and other cattle raisers inspectors, the FBI and Texas and New Mexico authorities worked the case to a successful conclusion.

"A Vernon doctor and a pharmacist there hired truck drivers from Fort Worth to do the job," he said. "They went to the federal penitentiary for interstate transportation of stolen cattle."

Normally, TSCRA inspectors do not work on cases outside Texas and Oklahoma, but association members owned the cattle involved, said Chambers.

## DSGH Home Care makes house calls



**DSGH Home Care ready for house calls**

Directed by Sharon Johnson (left, top row), the staff of Deaf Smith County Home Care takes medical treatment out of the hospital and into the patient's home. The service has recently been revamped to become a profit-making enterprise for the hospital while improving the services it provides in the community.

Deaf Smith Home Care, a department of Deaf Smith General Hospital, has offered a service for several years, and has seen increasing in just the last few months. Under the supervision of Sharon Johnson, RN, director of Deaf Smith Home Care, the service offers intermittent care in the home.

Johnson is responsible for the overall department as director. She has been a nurse at DSGH for 10 years, serving in the emergency room for the last three. Other registered nurses who work for the service are Mary Ann Warren and Jan Watts. Licensed vocational nurses in the program are Donna Parker, Mary Salley and Kathy Whipple. Aides are Rachel Cruz and Elida Lara.

The agency provides skilled nursing, home health aides, physical therapy and nutritional counseling in the patient's home throughout Deaf Smith County and surrounding areas. Johnson said the program allows a patient to return from the hospital sooner, with health care services provided in their home.

"Most patients would rather be home than in the hospital, if possible," Johnson said. "When the physician thinks the individual no longer needs acute care, the physician can order home care and let the patient return to their own environment. It costs less than prolonged hospitalization, and often recovery is accelerated when the patients are in familiar surroundings."

Hospital Administrator Ron Rives said that DSGH contracted with Hospital Home Care of Dallas to assist in growth and development of the home health program for Hereford. "Home health care is a highly regulated and federally mandated program," he said. "It is so specialized that we wanted to bring in the experts to enhance our program. We have a great deal that we wish to accomplish with the program, and we want to do it quickly."

The Dallas firm has been in the consulting business for seven years, and has a variety of clients in California, Texas and Oklahoma. According to the company's vice president, Ruth Norton, the company specializes in rural health, swing bed and skilled nursing units with hospital based programs.

DSGH is the base for the home care service because it extends the continuity of care beyond the hospital walls, "This is another part of our total comprehensive delivery of health care," Rives said. "Home health is one

of the trends in health care that can help the hospital stay financially healthy."

Rives explained that home care is a Medicare Part A service and is available to patients at no cost, if the patient meets admission criteria. "The program makes good financial sense to hospitals now because of the federal government pays," Rives said.

Rives explained that Medicare pays a set amount (A DRG) for each hospitalization.

"If it costs us more to treat than we receive, then we lose money. By allowing the patient to go home even though he still needs some care, the hospital can be more efficient," he said.

The service is available to patients of all ages. Payment for the services may be made through insurance, Medicaid, Medicare, Veterans Administration, or private payments.

The program has been in existence since 1982. Since DSGH joined the Lubbock Methodist system, however, the average number of patients being served has nearly doubled, Rives said.

"We feel this is a trend that will continue in the future as more patients choose this option," he said.

Working closely with the physicians, Home Care staff provides nursing procedures, nursing assessment and evaluation, health teaching, nutrition counseling and physical therapy.

## New grand jury indicts 7 persons

Seven indictments against six individuals were returned Friday in the first session of a new Deaf Smith County grand jury.

Two indictments were handed down against Robert Lancon, 18, of 508 Jackson. Each charge is aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. He posted bonds of \$5,000 on each.

A Friona man, Lorenzo Sierra, 44, and a Dimmitt man, Ernest Chance Jr., 59, were each indicted for felony driving while intoxicated. Each posted a \$1,000 bond.

Paul Don Campbell, 33, of Amarillo, is free on \$5,000 bond after he was indicted for theft over \$750 and under \$20,000.

Mario Flores Jr., 23, will be returned to Deaf Smith County from Blackfoot, Idaho, to answer charges of criminal mischief, over \$750 and under \$20,000. He is in jail in the Idaho city.

Name of the defendant in a seventh indictment was not released, pending arrest.

## Sentences handed in district court

Fifteen-year sentences in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice institutional division were imposed Thursday on a defendant who entered guilty pleas to three charges of aggravated sexual assault of a child.

During the session in 222nd District Court, Judge David Wesley Gully also placed three defendants on probation and modified probation of three others.

Cruz Barrientez Jr., will serve the three fifteen-year sentences concurrently in the penitentiary.

A defendant sentenced to 10 years probation on four burglary charges and deferred adjudication with 10 years probation on a fifth burglary indictment, Fred Gonzales, is being held in Deaf Smith County jail after Judge Gully denied bond on a new burglary charge filed Feb. 1.

Gonzales appeared in court on Jan. 29 to answer the five burglary charges, but the cases were continued until Feb. 6. He was arrested Feb. 1 on the new burglary charge.

Guilty pleas were heard from Jesus "Jesse" Maldonado on a pair of burglary charges. He was sentenced to 10 years probation on each. He also will be required to pay \$300 restitution on each offense.

A five-year probated sentence and \$1,500 fine were pronounced on Jimmie Hugh Wood who pleaded guilty to felony driving while intoxicated.

An eight-year probation period given Mary Castillo in March 1989 was extended one year by Judge Gully. She was convicted of aggravated assault on a peace officer.

Probation of Robert Riojas Abalos was modified. Convicted of possession of marijuana in 1986, he was assessed five years deferred adjudication. Judge Gully changed the terms to 10 years probation and a \$1,000 fine.

A sentence for felony driving while intoxicated given Claude Delbert Merritt in 1989 was modified to include 160 hours of community service, in addition to five years probation originally assessed.

Another case started with the theft of a truckload of cattle from a feedyard in Deaf Smith County. Chambers felt that the size of the animals dictated their destination.

"I knew they were pretty big and would probably go to a livestock auction in San Antonio, Fort Worth or Oklahoma City," he said.

Soon after the loss was discovered, Chambers was on the telephone. A brands inspector in San Antonio reported that the cattle were there and went undercover to identify the thieves.

"In less than 24 hours we had those cattle back," said Chambers with satisfaction. "One of the thieves had escaped from prison -- he was serving sentences of 70 years for cattle theft."

Chambers once climbed up in a tree to photograph a man he believed was moving cattle around in the pens of a sale ring. "He was swapping his poor animals for good ones," explained the inspector. He also got caught.

Tracking down rustlers is not Chambers' only job. Investigators are often called about loss of animal health supplies, especially from feedyards.

Prevention of cattle theft is a major part of his job. He also helps cattlemen keep their herds in order.

"From about mid-September until November, I work with ranchers, inspecting brands, because they want

to be sure the cattle they're shipping belong to them."

In late February and early March, he does the same thing, checking on livestock coming off winter wheat pasture.

"In a year's time, I probably check 20,000 or so head, because ranchers are honest people. They don't want to get cattle that belong to someone else," Chambers said. He does most of this part of his job on horseback.

One of 33 inspectors in the two-state area, Chambers works in nine counties of the lower Texas Panhandle, including Deaf Smith, Potter, Oldham, Randall, Swisher, Parmer, Castro, Bailey and Lamb.

"There probably are as many cattle concentrated in this area in the winter as any place in the United States," Chambers said about the magnitude of his territory and his responsibilities.

The Cattle Raisers Association of Texas, the ancestor of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, was organized in 1877 because of a need for better control of range crime.

"The regular Texas Rangers couldn't do it all in those days -- they were involved in so many other duties -- so inspectors were commissioned Special Texas Rangers," he explained. "The Rangers still call on us on cattle rustling cases."

The association has a strong organization for ferreting out cattle

rustlers. Besides the 33 inspectors, a brand inspector is assigned to every livestock auction when sales are conducted.

Cattle feedyard thefts account for more losses than rustling from ranches, Chambers said, simply because the thieves can haul off 100 head at a time from the feedyard and probably only 10 or 12 from the range.

He said most stolen cattle go to the auction ring from feedyard thefts, in part because ownership may not be as easily detected by brands. However, the association maintains a master list of all brands registered in counties in Texas.

Brands in Texas are registered by county, not statewide, and each county submits a roster to the association.

Chambers and his wife, Pat, live a Dawn. He works from his home, rather than an office, and his pickup is as well-equipped as an office, with a radio and telephone. He's ready to go at a moment's notice when called by an association member.

"We're on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week," he said. "When a member calls, we go."

and development facility in Colorado Springs, a new pathology department in Tracy, Calif., and a disease control task force.

"We also established an information services program which allows us to cut through time to come to a solution to a variety of problems.

"We want to become stronger in our business and partnership, if that's possible," Hanna said. "We are already bonded with you because our growers are our most important supplier we have, bar none."

Luther Markwart, executive director of the American Sugarbeet Growers Association, reviewed the latest on the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) and ongoing talks in the Western Hemisphere.

Markwart said his biggest worry about GATT was "an uneducated Congress" could pass the GATT package.

"If GATT passes, the U.S. farm program will be a thing of the past within 10 years," Markwart said. "Ten years from now loan rates, deficiency payments and target prices won't mean much if GATT passes. The government could just write you a check and tell you to grow what you want. That's where you're headed with GATT."

"You won't feel the pain (from GATT) today or tomorrow, but project what could happen 8-10-12 years. Once you're locked into the rules you can't change them, and that's very scary."

Sugar producers are especially worried because that could wreck the sugar market for United States growers.

Also of concern to Markwart is the possible fall of Cuba (it could be within a year, Markwart said) and the impact its sugar crop could have on the U.S.

"Cuba is the sole cancer in the Western Hemisphere and the United States wants to get rid of it," Markwart said. "We have spent billions to offset Castro's mischief around the world, and the U.S. will do anything to get Cuba to become a democracy."

"What happens is the Soviet Union effected Cuba, and what happens in Cuba will effect Hereford, Texas. We are putting together a SWAT team to look at issues with Cuba when Castro falls."

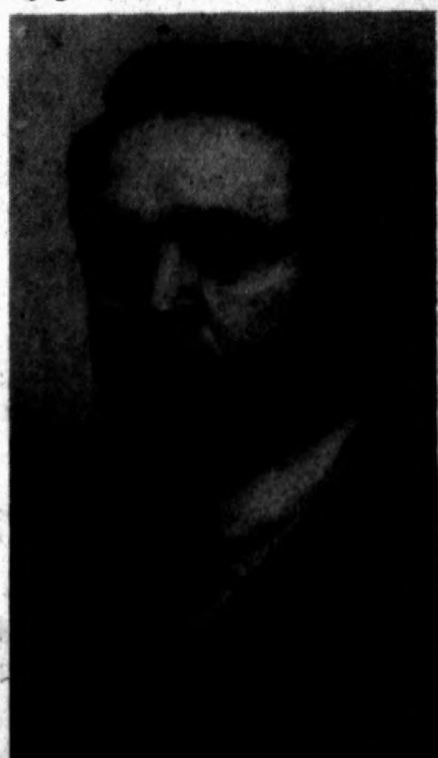
Markwart said the federal government is working on negotiations not only with Canada and Mexico but with other countries in the Western Hemisphere on trade. That could create a situation much like the European Community. Markwart said a huge block of South America is ready to join the alliance, with Central America countries next on the agenda.

"They are getting it set up so in 1997-98 they will be ready to join," Markwart said. "That all has an impact on the sugar outlook."

Bill Cleavinger, long-time TSBGA president, was re-elected to the board of directors. Incumbents Dave

Thompson and Troy Christian were also re-elected.

I have never written a serious column before but I'm going to give it a shot. So, if you're hoping to read this for laughs, you better stop here.

It occurred to me this past week after a visit at the Brand from a very dear lady that it doesn't really matter how long we live, it's what we do with the time that has been allotted to each of us.

I have been acquainted with Mrs. R. for several years. Although we have never socialized, I have always felt a kindred spirit with her. We both have had cancer, not once, but twice. The difference between us is that she is currently fighting the disease after having been "cured" for many years.

What is amazing about Mrs. R. is her spirit, her zest for life, her selflessness. Although she is facing a frightening time, she isn't dwelling on the negative aspects of the next few months. Instead she is living her life as best she can and still puts the concern of others before her own. How many of us are doing that under

the best of circumstances?

I hadn't realized it until I started writing this week's column that I have been blessed by knowing several remarkable individuals. One of them is my brother-in-law, Gary. He had a heart transplant three years ago this Mother's Day. He was also facing a very traumatic experience and an uncertain future. But through it all, he maintained a sense of humor and worried more about how his family was dealing with the situation than agonizing over what might happen to him. Today, he is a picture of health. I'm sure his positive outlook on life attributes to his well being.

As I reflect on people who have had a tremendous impact on my life I have to mention Berta Ottesen and Gene Brock. Like me, they, too, had cancer. Unfortunately, they lost their battle but they put up one heck of a fight. Their miraculous spirit never diminished.

Berta and I became acquainted through my work at the paper. We were only casual friends until one

night she and I had a wonderful visit during a meeting of the Circle of Friends (an organization that was established to help cancer patients). I had been cancer-free for 10 years but Berta was just beginning her ordeal. She asked me if I ever felt afraid of the disease recurring. I answered, "Yes, every day of my life. And you, Berta, are you afraid?"

She looked at me with those beautiful, expressive eyes for a moment before answering. "Yes, I'm frightened but I can't dwell on my sickness. There is still too much living to be done and I don't have a minute to waste."

Many months later I had the pleasure of visiting with her again at the office. She had come to place a birth announcement in the paper. She and her husband were new grandparents. She was thrilled. I marveled at her strength of character and told her so. Although she was weak from the chemotherapy she had been enduring, she gave me a hug and said something I'll never forget, "Sandy, in a way you and I are lucky."

"What? Having had cancer? I'd just as soon not be so darn fortunate, Berta," I said.

"No," she explained. "You and I have developed a special bond that we would not have shared otherwise. Remember, there are no guarantees in life. We just do the best we can for as long as we can." That's the last time I saw my friend.

Gene Brock was another wonderful human being. Like Berta, I became friends with Gene through the paper. This man had a heart of gold. There was just never enough time in the day for him to help others. Just weeks before Christmas, I spotted Gene at the Chamber of Commerce parking lot. He was sitting in a pickup looking very frail. I thought to myself that I wasn't going to let this opportunity go by, I wanted him to know just how very special I thought he was.

I visited with him a few minutes

and gave him a hug through the pickup window. "Gene, you don't know how many people are praying for your health. Many, many people care very deeply for you."

"Well, I guess God has been listening because I'm still here," Gene whispered. "Always remember two things. God has a hand in each of our lives and there is a reason for everything that happens to us." We said our goodbyes, each knowing this would probably be our last conversation.

Perhaps if we all could learn from exceptional people like the ones I have mentioned, someday someone will remember us by saying, "It was a privilege to have known them."

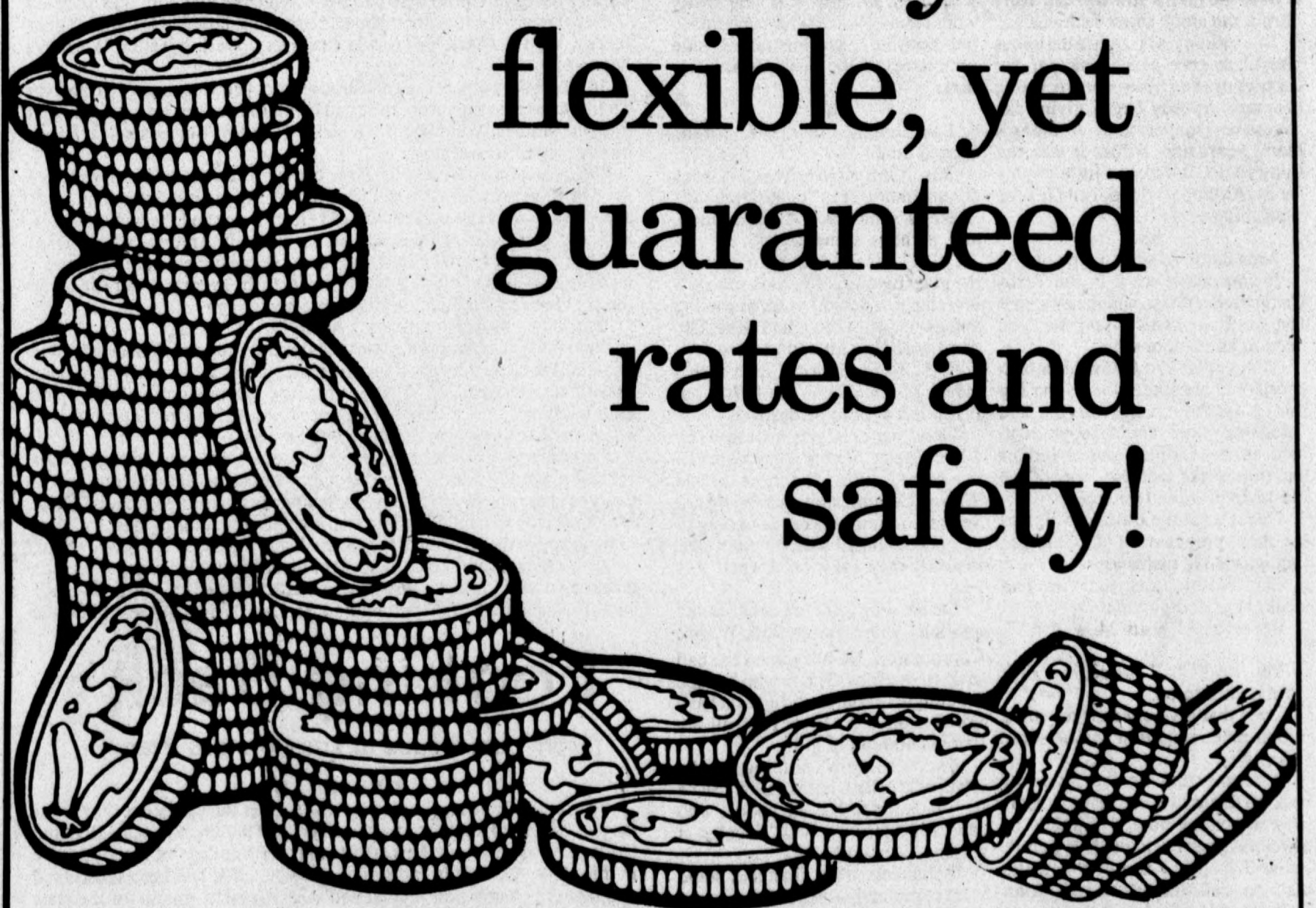

A curfew for youngsters may be a new trend being established by city law. The Vernon City Commission will consider an ordinance and hold a public hearing next week on a curfew for youngsters 16 and under.

The law would prohibit youngsters 16 and under from being on the streets or in public places in the city from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. on weekdays and from midnight to 6 a.m. on Saturday and Sunday. The law covers virtually every possible reason for a child to be out during the curfew hours.

A Vernon official says the law is not aimed at penalizing anyone, but to give law enforcement officers some control over juveniles who are out during the late night or early morning hours.

The proposed law states the purpose is to protect the welfare of children by (1) reducing the likelihood that children will be the victims of

criminal acts during the curfew hours; (2) reducing the likelihood that children will become involved in criminal acts during those hours; and (3) aiding parents, guardians or other responsible persons in carrying out their responsibility to exercise reasonable supervision of the children entrusted to their care.

The Vernon document states that statistics for the past five years indicate "an unacceptable and alarming level of juvenile crime and juvenile victimization." The Vernon ordinance is patterned after one recently adopted by the Fort Worth City Council.

They were both wrong. They both paid a price.

My greatest concern about re-baiting is the example it sets for students. They can believe it's the right thing to do. A constant harangue not only isn't kosher, it falls on deaf ears. Pick your spots. Do it in good taste. Don't get personal ("Hey, you bald so-and-so won't work; Neither will 'Hey, fat boy'") If you really want results, voice your concerns to the coaches, administrators, and secretaries of the officials associations.

Last Sunday, I saw "JFK" for the second time.

Yes, it is a movie. Yes, it is not a documentary. It is "entertainment." There is some fact, some opinion, and, perhaps, some fantasy.

"JFK" has done more to open up the investigation of John Kennedy's investigation than 25 years of wailing and gnashing of teeth had done. Oh, there had been a little something done with the House Select Committee's investigation back in the 1970s, but it still left a lot to be desired.

Now, thanks largely to a movie by Oliver Stone, there is a cry to unseal the sacred files. The files of the Warren Commission and the House Select Committee were not going to be opened until I was 83 years old. Instead, they may be opened this year.

Gerald Ford, the ex-prez, is the only surviving member of the Warren Commission. He has joined the call to open the files. Those who headed the congressional investigation have asked to open the files. They all say there is nothing to hide.

Of course there's nothing to hide. If we are to believe not just Oliver Stone or Jim Garrison but the people who saw JFK's murder, what's sealed is a bunch of malarkey.

Statements were changed; some were completely falsified. Evidence was lost or dummed or manufactured. If we are to believe the hundreds of people who have been interviewed by not just Jim Garrison but many hundreds of researchers, opening the files won't get us a bit closer to finding out who murdered JFK.

I watched the movie with my very best friend and her two girls. After the movie we went out to eat and talked about what we saw and what we thought.

I told the girls that one reason why people my age were so attached to the Kennedys was that Caroline and John John were our age.

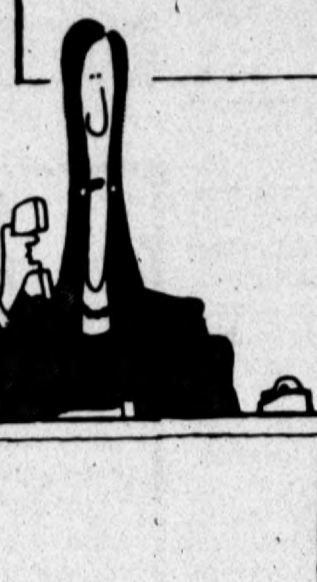
"But they were little kids," said one of the girls.

## Ex-speaker advises President

Dear Mr. President: You probably want another dose of advice about as much as you'd like another bout with the flu. I'm sure there's no shortage of savants and seers plying you with clever ideas for sound bites and photo opportunities, places to go and points to make on the campaign trail.

Here, for what it's worth, is a different perspective: Ignore the campaign. Give Air Force One a rest. Be president. Take up the command post in the Oval Office and vow not to leave until we've whipped the recession. That's the enemy. It's a lot worse than official unemployment figures indicate. Bad as they are, those numbers don't count hundreds of thousands of skilled workers who've lost good-paying industrial jobs and are struggling to make half as much pay serving hamburgers or delivering newspapers.

They don't count many thousands more whose corporate employers plan layoffs in the coming year. Bankruptcies, business failures, home foreclosures are the worst since the Great Depression.

Americans understand this. They reject passive acceptance. It's against their nature. They're upset because they think their government is floundering with no clear-cut plan of action.

One year ago, Mr. President, you were riding the crest of a wave of popularity. Even those who had not wanted the war with Iraq admired the resolute skill with which you undertook the task and marshaled your forces. We did what it took to win decisively. We didn't stint. We didn't hesitate.

In the 43 days of that brief conflict, we dropped more tons of explosives on Iraqi targets than were dropped by all the nations on all the targets in all the years of World War II. Overkill? Possibly. But we surely couldn't be accused of irresolution.

We spent more in 43 days of all-out bombing than the federal government invests all year in American education. We spent as much in one week as we invest all year in clean air and clean water and the war on drugs, as much in one day as we spend all year to help America's homeless.

Today the problems of our stagnating domestic economy are every bit as urgent --and of much greater concern to the average American--than the problems of the Persian Gulf were a year ago.

Don't they deserve the same priority?

Here is my suggestion: Call in the bipartisan congressional leadership and make it clear that you're willing to support an honestly bipartisan assault on joblessness. This is the key. Democrats will join you enthusiastically once they're convinced you're sincere. The aim is to put Americans to work, ideology be damned.

Call for an accelerated local public-works program, with generous federal matching grants. Give priority to those worthwhile projects in every community on which construction can begin in three months. There are thousands of needed public improvements gathering dust for want of financing in the backlog of the United States' long-starved public sector.

As for the private sector, instead of pleading with the Japanese, let's do our own thing. Make it attractive for Americans to buy American-made cars. How about a \$1,000 tax credit for any family buying a new domestic

auto during the first six months of 1992? Add a tax credit equal to 20 percent of the purchase price for any major American-made appliance.

This one sure way to boost orders, cut inventory and put people back to work.

Challenge the Democrats to meet you halfway. You've been wanting a capital-gains tax to stimulate investment. They want middle-income tax equity to stimulate buying power. Wed the two.

The United States needs investment in new job-creating enterprise. Give favorable tax treatment not for stock purchases in general but for new issues that finance new jobs in the country. And revive the investment tax credit for industrial improvements that modernize aging plants and processes, promote productivity and make American industry more competitive.

Foreigners are not going to do these things for us, Mr. President. But with leadership and direction, we'll do it for ourselves.

The one indispensable key is to give the same sense of urgency to jobs and economic revival that you gave one year ago to the Persian Gulf War.

What of the thousands of our work force, military and industrial, who will be displaced as our war machine tools down? It isn't as though we've had no prior experience.

We've simply been underinvesting in the United States for the past 15 or 20 years.

Arguably the best investment this country ever made was the G.I. Bill of Rights at the end of World War II. An entire generation of Americans got a college education. That program paid for itself 40 times over in the taxes they rendered.

Revive and expand upon that idea with guaranteed job skills training for everyone uprooted by the nation's demobilization and by the loss of jobs to international competition.

Make no small plans, said Tycho Brahe. They have "no magic to stir men's souls."

What I suggest is not a partisan argument for use in the campaign but a positive demonstration of presidential leadership. Who'll get the credit? Everyone will get some. You'll get the most if you make the economy start perking again on your watch.

More to the point, you'll deserve it.

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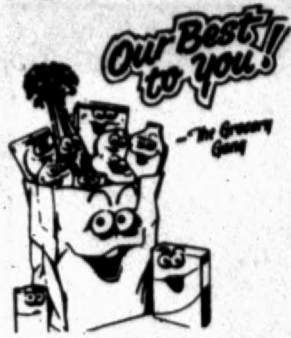

## 77th annual meeting set by oldest livestock group

The Panhandle Livestock Association - the oldest such organization in Northwest Texas - will hold its 77th annual meeting Feb. 22, 1992 at the Harvey Hotel in Amarillo.

Nancy McIntyre, president of the organization, said the convention will begin at 9 a.m. with registration in the atrium. At 10:30 a.m. the Board of Directors will meet. At noon there will be a luncheon and fashion show, by Images in Pampa. Models will be Association members' wives. The guest speaker will be Jack Moreman, Director of Clarendon College Ranch and Feedlot Management School.

The Panhandle Livestock Association was formed in 1915 when 18 well-known Panhandle cattlemen got together to form the Buyers and Sellers Livestock Association. The Association began when rail service came to Amarillo.

In 1908, the Santa Fe Railroad made application to the Texas Legislature for permission to abandon its line from panhandle to Washburn and construct a shorter line from Panhandle to Amarillo.

The attorney for Santa Fe appeared before the lawmakers in support of the Panhandle-to-Amarillo route, but the

proposition was voted down by a large majority of the legislators.

A prominent cattleman, J.H. Avery, then asked 187 Amarilloans to write legislators to request reconsideration of Santa Fe's application. On the second vote the proposition passed by a large margin.

With the coming of the rail line, it was necessary for the cattlemen to organize. Mr. Avery wrote of the situation at that time:

"From 1901 to 1909 the livestock shipments over the Santa Fe Railroad from West Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and Oklahoma was in a deplorable state, and most cattlemen were held p from a few days to two weeks at shipping points, waiting for stock cars, and a small percent were unable to get shipments out and had to return to their ranch, resulting in a long list of lawsuits."

Finally, the area cattlemen formed the Buyers and Sellers Livestock Association, soon changing its name

to the Panhandle Livestock Association. Since then, the PLA has served the interests of Panhandle cattlemen, including through conventions.

This year a new purpose seemed appropriate for the Association. A scholarship will be started at Clarendon College Ranch and Feedlot Management School for a young man or woman interested in the ranching industry. A silent auction, held during the cocktail party, will fund this scholarship. The cocktail party and auction will begin at 6:30 p.m. A dance will follow beginning at 7:30 p.m. The Khiva Shrine Western Swing Band will provide the music. Breakfast will be served at 11 p.m. ending the day's events.

## HP water district accepting irrigation loan applications

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 is now accepting applications from producers wishing to obtain agricultural water conservation equipment loan funds to upgrade their current irrigation systems to more-efficient Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) Systems.

The Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) approved the Water District's application for a \$1 million loan to fund the program on January 15th.

The funds available for use in the District's Agricultural Water Conservation Equipment Loan Program are from repayments to the state on previous loans made during the pilot ag loan program.

Because funds are limited, priority will be given to producers who have not yet obtained an agricultural water conservation equipment loan from the District. Also, new loans are limited to 75% of the purchase price of the above-ground equipment of LEPA center pivot sprinkler systems. LEPA systems are the only equipment that will be funded under this new ag loan program.

To apply for a loan, producers must complete an application, a financial statement, have an irrigation dealer contract, and pay a non-refundable \$250 application fee. Applications are available from the Water District's County Secretary in your area or by contacting the District headquarters in Lubbock.

Loans will be secured by a first lien on the equipment. In addition, the landowner will either sign a Deed of Trust giving the District a lien on the land, arrange for a letter of credit, or assign assets as additional security for the loan.

### CRP firebreaks are permitted

Firebreaks can be installed on Conservation Reserve Program contracts as long as they are modified into the contract and meet all Soil Conservation Service specifications.

A firebreak is normally a cultivated strip along the edges of a field to keep a wildfire from burning the field. The firebreak must be designed and maintained to prevent soil erosion.

All firebreaks must be modified into the contract, before the firebreak is installed, or the contract will be out of compliance and subject to a penalty.

During the pilot ag loan program that operated from 1986 to 1990, 11 of the 15 counties within the High Plains Water District had borrowers participating in the program. Approximately 165 borrowers received 284 loans totalling \$5,409,664.21 for purchases totalling \$7,696,848.18.

A total of 208 quarter-section center pivots and six full section pivots were purchased. Of the quarter-section pivots, 47 or 22.6 percent were true LEPA systems.

With an average purchase price of \$36,000 per center pivot system, the 208 quarter-mile pivots added about \$7.5 million to the area economy. Using a total of \$500,000 for the rest of the equipment purchased, the total economic infusion into the area is about \$8 million. With a multiplier of three, the pilot ag loan program pumped about \$24 million into the High Plains economy during its 46 months of operation.

Converting to center pivot sprinkler systems helped eliminate 21.5 miles of open, unlined ditch which saved an estimated 1,491 acre-feet of water per year. The purchase of surge valves and other equipment during the pilot ag loan program eliminated tailwater waste and saved approximately 1,967 acre-feet of water per year. Water savings due to improvement in system efficiencies saved about 14,713 acre-feet of water per year.

Cumulative water savings form the beginning of the pilot program through September 1990 amount to about 43,880 acre-feet—enough water to supply a city of 200,000 for year year!

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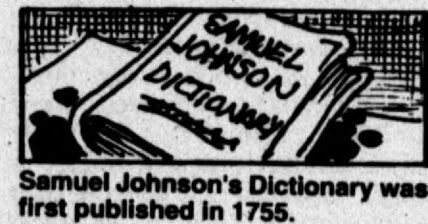

The Whitefaces made three last second shots to force three overtimes, but with only five players left after foul trouble throughout the game, they couldn't find the magic in the third extra period and lost 77-72 at Caprock.

"It was a game you wouldn't want to miss," Herd coach Jimmy Thomas said. "It was a hard game to lose, but it was a game where you got your money's worth."

The first game of Friday's varsity doubleheader wasn't bad, either, as the Lady Whitefaces beat Caprock 52-49.

The Lady Whitefaces led most of the way, leading 18-16 after a quarter, 26-25 at halftime and 40-37 after three quarters.

The Lady Longhorns took a 45-44 lead with 3:30 left in the game. Hereford coach Dickie Faught called a timeout and set the offense back up, and Jennifer Bullard hit a jump shot to regain the lead. Caprock couldn't score on its possession, but Kara Sandoval nailed a three-pointer to give Hereford a 49-45 lead.

"That took the air out of them, and we took back the game," Faught said.

In the boys' game, the difference may have been free throws. Caprock shot 35 free throws to only 20 for Hereford, irritating Thomas.

"We never got into the bonus until the third overtime," Thomas said. "I was really upset the way the game was called."

In crunch time, Caprock got to shoot on every foul and Hereford didn't. Adding to that problem was that Hereford only suited up eight players, and when three fouled out, the others couldn't play as aggressively.

For the first three supposedly final buzzers, last-second heroics by Herd players balanced out the free throw disparity.

With three seconds left in regulation and the score tied at 54-54, Hereford's Kyle Hansen was called for a foul (he fouled out) and Caprock hit two free throws to take the lead. On the inbound pass, Derek Mason threw a length-of-the-court strike to Mark Kuper, who put it in for a tie.

The lead went back and forth during the first overtime, but Caprock had a three-point lead as the end neared. With one second left, Hereford's Leo Brown hit a three-pointer with a man in his face, Thomas said, making it 61-61.

In the second overtime, Brown fouled out, so Richard Sanderson hit a three-pointer at the buzzer to tie at 68-68.

In the third overtime, Mason fouled out. Sanderson and Jason Tatarovich both were playing with four fouls, and no one was available on the bench. Hereford could score only four points in the third overtime, while Caprock scored nine, all on free throws.

"It was one of those miracle games, but we couldn't win the miracle game," Thomas said.

Brown led the team with 24 points, Sanderson had 14, and Tatarovich added 12.

In the girls' game, free throws were a key to Hereford's win.

"We were 8-of-11 from the free throw line," Faught said, "which I thought was big when you win by three. We've lost some games like that when we didn't shoot well from the line."

The Lady Whitefaces had "good, balanced scoring," Faught said. Sandoval led with 14, Kyanne Lindley had 12, and Bullard scored 10.

Both of Hereford's junior varsity teams beat their Caprock counterparts Friday. The boys' team won 57-55, and the girls won 55-20. The girls led 21-10 at the half, then crased any doubt with a 18-2 third quarter. Misty Peabody scored 12 points, and Jenifer Holmes and Jill Walser each added 10.

The sophomore boys' game was canceled.

## Freshman girls fall in Hereford tourney

The Hereford freshman girls' basketball A team lost in the first round of their district tournament Friday in Hereford. The team lost the lead in the final two minutes, and Dumas took a 41-38 victory.

## SWC basketball misses Arkansas

DALLAS (AP) - It's time for all flatlanders to admit it. The Southwest Conference already is missing the Arkansas Razorbacks in basketball.

We're talking national respect and the SWC can't buy a drop of it. While Arkansas flies its new Southeastern Conference colors in The Associated Press Top 10, Texas Christian and Houston can't crack the top 25.

TCU's scalps included Iowa State, Texas, Tennessee and Houston, yet would have been 39th in the AP poll - if it went that far.

Somehow Houston (which still has lingering national respect from the old Guy V. Lewis days) was 28th despite having lost convincingly to the Horned Frogs.

TCU had four losses yet Michigan, Kentucky, Florida State, and Georgia Tech with five or more losses each rank in the top 25. Three other schools had four losses and were in the top 25.

Houston also had just four losses to go along with 15 victories.

So what's wrong here? Perception and impressions, says Texas A&M coach Tony Barone, who is seeing the conference closeup for the first time. Barone coached last year at Creighton in the Missouri Valley Conference and got the Blue Jays into the NCAA playoffs.

He said the perception of the SWC as a mediocre league is wrong.

"Being an outsider looking in I had an open mind," Barone said. "The impressions I had were what people said about the league that it was a football conference or something. Well, I think it is very underrated."

He said every team he has seen has talent.

"There is a great player on everybody's team except for us," he said. "Each team has a big time college player and some have more."

He said there isn't a league in the land that plays better defense.

"The league is absolutely underrated," Barone said. "I've heard people say nobody guards anybody in the league. Well, I want to see 'em play Houston's matchup and TCU's man defense. Teams down here get after you."

"I saw Syracuse and Connecticut (of the Big East) play great defense the other night. But I can tell you there isn't a shot in the Southwest Conference that goes uncontested. Nobody in this league is shooting 50 per cent because of it."

"It's an athletic league and a talented league," he said.

At this point, TCU and Houston appear headed to the NCAA tournament, and Rice, at 14-6, is still alive for a spot in the 64-team field.

But the poor start by the Texas Longhorns, who have lost nine games, probably means they'll have to win the SWC post-season tournament to get into the NCAA tournament for the fourth year in a row.

The SWC has only two victories against Top 25 opponents this year. Texas Tech's recent victory over previously unbeaten Tulane was a big help to league prestige. Obviously, the league needs to play better when it's up against the top dogs. It's the best way to improve impressions and perceptions.

The SWC teams in the NCAA playoffs this year have to make a big splash. If not, the SWC won't be floating out there with the Top 25 big boats again next year.

## Olympic organizers fight Mother Nature

ALBERTVILLE, France (AP) - Fog, blizzards, high winds. Welcome to the Olympic Zone - French organizers' recurring nightmare of what could ruin the Albertville Games.

"It's a strange dream, isn't it?" press attache Jean-Marc Eysseric said with a nervous chuckle Friday during the final hours before today's opening of the Albertville Games.

Millions of francs have been invested in high-tech snowplows, Alpine military battalions and the stationing of troops in the Savoie region to help ensure the success of the 16th Winter Olympics.

But all the French horsepower and all the French men won't be able to put the Games together again if there's a deja vu of the storm that blitzed the area seven weeks ago.

In a Dec. 21-22 blizzard that dumped several feet of snow on the Alps, a middle-of-the-night avalanche buried a chalet and killed two people at La Plagne, site of the Olympic bobsled and luge competition. Some 7,000 people were stranded and movement throughout the entire region halted.

"We are watching the sky," said Eysseric. "That's the only thing we

can't do anything about."

Some of the most painstaking preparations in the last four years have gone into the design and upkeep of the new men's downhill course at Val d'Isere - so steep and fragile that traditional machines can't operate on it.

The course debuts Sunday in one of the Games' glamour events, and organizers have their fingers crossed: Forecasters say the area will cloud up in the afternoon and could receive some snow.

This week, the man who traced the course into the Belvedere Face is employing a small Alpine army to conduct final priming operations. "Everything's going very well right now, but we've certainly had our moments of anguish, our fears over the last four years," Philippe Drevon, the Olympic committee's director of sites for Val d'Isere, said Friday.

Drevon ordered 250 workers into action at 5:30 a.m. Wednesday after a few inches of snow fell.

After erecting anti-avalanche barriers above the trail, they set off three explosions on the other side of La Face to blast away excess snow. The most sophisticated methods were

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# Spurs play with new attitude under Bass

SAN ANTONIO (AP) - The San Antonio Spurs may have lost a coach, but they've gained a new attitude.

Now the team is trying to use its fresh approach to produce victories and maintain the Midwest Division stature the Spurs have enjoyed the past two years.

"We've been playing with a lot of effort and a lot of intensity and a lot of emotion," said All-Star center David Robinson. "We're trying to get something rolling."

What was a tumultuous season early on turned into a promising year for San Antonio just before the four-day All-Star break. With one game left before the break, the Spurs stood at 27-18, closing in on Utah and chalking up victories.

"We're gaining confidence every day," forward Sean Elliott said.

San Antonio began the season without holdout point guard Rod Strickland and with players grumbling about the team's travel conditions.

Robinson even wrote an "open

letter" to Spurs owner Red McCombs that appeared in both daily San Antonio newspapers. It criticized McCombs for refusing to charter flights for the team's out-of-town games and said flying commercially put the team at a competitive disadvantage to other NBA teams that charter.

Strickland eventually agreed to a one-year contract in December. McCombs agreed to start chartering flights to avoid airport waits and flight connections.

Then, Jan. 21, came the apex of the rocky year. A long-simmering dispute between McCombs and coach Larry Brown finally exploded.

McCombs and Brown disagree on the details, but the result was Brown was fired, ending his 3 1/2-year stint with a team he guided to two consecutive Midwest Division championships.

Bob Bass, Spurs vice president of basketball operations, took over as coach for the rest of the season and quickly made one noticeable change.

While Brown had intensely paced the sidelines and yelled instructions at his players, the veteran Bass - at 63, the oldest coach in the NBA - told his young team to relax and enjoy the game.

As the Spurs battled the Chicago Bulls, Bass even gave one of his bench players a high-five, then quivered with excitement after the victory.

Bass' have-fun strategy seems to be working. The Spurs won five of the first six games under Bass, including the defeat of Chicago that snapped the Bulls' 13-game winning streak.

Bass, though, is quick to guard against overconfidence.

"Before I talk about momentum, I've got to talk about a lot more wins," he said.

Some players say their new determination began with a bare-your-soul team meeting and practice the day before Brown was fired.

"With all the things that have

changed with our team, all the players really have made the decision to say, 'Hey, it's up to us,'" Robinson said. "We've got to get out there and play regardless of what's going on. We've got to win."

It was no secret Brown had trouble dealing with key players during his tenure, although the coach and the players tried to keep their disagreements private and said reports of their problems were overblown.

Brown's first year it was Willie Anderson, then it was Elliott his rookie year. Brown reportedly was at odds with Terry Cummings last season, and had problems with Robinson this year.

After the Spurs lost on the road to Chicago, the coach wasn't pleased with Robinson's performance. Then after San Antonio beat Chicago at home following Brown's departure, Robinson alluded to a rift, responding to a reporter's question about "people" criticizing his earlier play against the Bulls.

"People?" Robinson asked. "Larry Brown criticized my effort in Chicago."

Adding to Brown's problems was the fact the Spurs were losing close games and blowing early leads. His firing came after two particularly disappointing road losses.

But with the team winning regularly again and the starters free from major injuries, the Spurs may well be poised to make another serious playoff run. The team has hovered in second place behind the Utah Jazz most of the season in the Midwest Division.

The San Antonio defense continues to be among the league's best.

At mid-season, the Spurs averaged 46.9 rebounds, to their opponents' 42, and the Spurs averaged 8.32 blocked shots, to their opponents' 6.24. San Antonio was 9-0 when they held opponents below 90 points.

Robinson averaged 23.1 points, 12 rebounds and 5 blocked shots for the first half of the season, while Elliott averaged 16.3 points, Strickland

averaged 13.7 and Anderson averaged 14.3.

Cummings, sidelined with injuries much of last year, was playing the solid basketball he demonstrated two years ago, when the Spurs advanced to the Western Conference semifinals. He averaged 13.2 points and 7.7 rebounds the first half of the year.

"I've been feeling good lately and not trying to force things," Cummings said. "By just shooting the ball and not thinking about it, good things will happen."

Just what will happen the rest of the season is yet to be determined, of course, but the players hope it will be less turbulent than the first.

As for next year, the Spurs will get a new coach, and among the names circulating as top contenders are former Spurs coach Stan Albeck and University of Texas coach Tom Penders. Spurs assistant coach Gregg Popovich is a local fan favorite.

For now, though, Bass is at the helm. And this spring promises to be, at the least, an interesting few months.

# Angelo State coach approaches 600 wins

The way Ed Messbarger sees it, being the first college basketball coach in Texas to earn 600 victories would be ample reward.

Off-n building programs from scratch at small schools several full-court drives from the glitz of Division I, Messbarger has earned victories the hard way.

There has never been a big-name university contending in a lofty conference to help lure a prize recruit. There were sometimes only long bus rides, a musty gymnasium and a strong belief in playing aggressive defense mixed with a sophisticated, motion half-court offense.

But that has been enough over 35 years for the 59-year-old coach. And to be closing in on 600 triumphs amidst such Texas coaching legends as UTEP's Don Haskins is an honor, but a well-deserved one, Messbarger adds.

"You never set out to do these kinds of things, especially in the company you're in," said Mess-

barger, who is midway through his 14th year as coach at Angelo State.

"I have been at the small college level a long time, and I tell everyone this is where the best coaching is. I have played the Division I teams and I have had to win without their talent."

"That's a fact of life from a coach who knows,"

Messbarger (598-418) could get No. 600 next week when Angelo State (8-15) plays at Eastern New Mexico Saturday and Texas A&I on Feb. 15.

Haskins has 596 victories heading into Saturday's game against Air Force.

ASU was picked to finish near the top of the Lone Star Conference, but has been struggling lately.

Messbarger said he hopes the drive for 600 is not putting undue pressure on his players.

"I thought it was going to be easier than this, only needing 10 victories heading into the season," Messbarger said. "But it's been a problem."

"It's driving me crazy, and you try to erase it out of your mind. I never talk about it with the kids, but I know they are aware of it."

Messbarger's first stop as coach was tiny Benedictine Heights in Tulsa, Okla., a school that no longer exists. Messbarger amassed a 57-37 record from 1957-1960 before the school closed due to financial problems.

"When they dropped the program, there was a coach in Pittsburg, Kan., who gave me the ultimate compliment. He asked if he could have all five of my starters," Messbarger said.

Longtime colleague Lou Henson, head coach at Illinois, said Messbarger has overcome significant odds to rack up so many W's.

"I tell you one thing, he is one of the top coaches in the country," said Henson, who faced Messbarger twice while coaching at Hardin-Simmons.

"I've known Ed for 30 years and nobody knows the game better or knows how to teach the game better than he does. Some of the great

coaches like Ed haven't gotten the recognition they deserve."

Another friend, Oklahoma coach Billy Tubbs, also gave credit to Messbarger.

"I certainly made a contribution to his win total," said Tubbs, 0-4 against Messbarger while coaching at Southwestern (Texas) and 2-0 at Oklahoma.

"He's as good as anybody I've ever coached against. When I was at Southwestern and Ed was at St. Mary's, he was the king."

In 1963, Messbarger took over at St. Mary's in San Antonio after coaching briefly at the University of Dallas. He left San Antonio in 1978 to take over at Angelo State.

In his first year at St. Mary's, he helped lead the school to a Big State Conference championship and a birth

in the national tournament in Kansas City.

St. Mary's knocked off undefeated Central Connecticut in the first round and then upset top-ranked Grambling, led by Willis Reed, in the second round before being ousted in the quarterfinals.

"We just played great team ball," Messbarger said. "We had a 6-2 post player named Kenny Sampson who just tore Willis Reed up. That was quite an exciting first season."

St. Mary's won 13 of 15 conference championships under Messbarger, including 12 straight. Four times the Ratliffers reached the District IV National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Championships, twice each to the quarterfinals and semifinals.

Angelo State has won the Lone Star Conference twice and has won the LSC

Tournament three times under Messbarger.

Messbarger said he has no plans to slow down.

"I still enjoy coaching. I still get fired up," Messbarger said. "As long as I have the desire, I will continue to coach. I guess it's fair to say I was born to coach."

used; Cable machines that carry explosive charges lit by slow-burning fuses, and underground pipes that eject gas under pressure.

Then skiers, volunteers and soldiers from the 7th Battalion of Alpine Guides smoothed out the trails and threw soft snow into nets to leave a hard, slick course suitable to Franz Heinzer's or Paul Accola's liking. Thirty-four snow cannons sprinkled extra flakes on the bottom 1,100 feet of the course to even out the base.

Drevon contends that with the application of modern technology, the

risk of an avalanche at an actual Olympic competition site is negligible: "The more time passes, the less it's a problem."

But no matter what precautions are taken at Val d'Isere and elsewhere, the organizers always will be vulnerable to the caprices of the weather.

At the 1988 Winter Olympics in Calgary, warm Chinook winds played havoc with the training for skiing and ski jumping and blew sand onto the bobsled and luge tracks. In an unrelated accident, a worker who was

skiing on an Olympic slope after the competition was run over and killed by a tracked vehicle.

As a Paris newspaper put it: "The weather conditions have always been a sword of Damocles hanging over the head of the Olympics organizers."

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# Darrouzett girls hold their own against boys

**DARROUZETT, Texas (AP)**—For Kristin Wheatley and Lori Kemp, playing against the boys is nothing new. After all, they've been doing it in practice since grade school.

But with only four girls enrolled at Darrouzett High School when classes started last fall, the two found themselves playing for the boys.

First-year coach Darren Carter said the predicament was clear the first day of school in this community of 360, located near the Oklahoma border in Lipscomb County.

"We knew right off we didn't have enough for a girls team," Carter said. "The superintendent and the principal visited with me about them playing and I didn't have any problems with it. Then we made sure everything was square with the UIL."

According to Bonnie Northcutt, assistant to the director of the UIL, the school really didn't have much say in the matter because of the league's non-discriminatory policy.

"It's section 384 of the UIL constitution," Northcutt said. "If a school district does not provide a girls basketball program corresponding to its boys basketball program, then any girl desiring to participate may try out for the boys team."

Carter said this season has had its share of experiences which he would remember for a long time.

"It's been real unusual," he said. "I never expected to be involved in anything like this, but it's been a blast."

Wheatley, the lone senior on the team, earned the starting point guard spot; Angela Babitzke, who later transferred out of the school district, was the first player off the bench. Carter said having two girls getting so much playing time created a little friction at first.

"I can understand some of the guys taking it a little hard," he said. "How would you like to go home and say 'Dad, I got beat out by a girl?' I know I wouldn't have liked it if it happened to me."

On top of bruised male egos, Carter had other problems in handling a co-ed team.

"Facilities and dressing rooms have been about the biggest problem we've had, especially when we go on the road," he said. "At a lot of the schools we've played at there wasn't a separate dressing room for the girls, so they had to get dressed in the women's restroom a couple of times. Lately they've gone ahead and dressed before we leave home and ride the bus suited up."

But overall, the season - except for a 1-17 record - has been without many headaches.

"We could have had some boy-girl problems real easy, and I tried to stay on top of things so that wouldn't happen," Carter said. "But all these kids are just like brothers and sisters. They've known each other all their lives and get along with each other."

Wheatley, who is averaging 3.2 points per game and is tied for the team lead in three-point goals, said playing on the boys' team was really no big deal.

"We've worked out with the boys since I was in the fourth grade, so I was used to that," she said. "But the game is a lot quicker. The guys try to steal the ball a lot more."

Kemp, who has seen action in 10 of 18 games, echoed Wheatley's ho-hum view of playing on a boys team, but also acknowledged some major differences from the girls game.

"It's hard playing against the guys, but it's just like scrimmaging with them, really," she said. "We've

been scrimmaging since the sixth grade with them and it's really not that much different. The first time I played in a real game I was nervous, but I've gotten used to it now."

The Longhorns lost to Miami, 81-33, on Tuesday in the District 10-1A opener. But Carter has seen steady improvement - and that's made the losses a little easier to take.

"Our first game was an 80-point loss and that kind of brought us all down to earth," he said. "But they have really had a great attitude about it all. Since the first of January we have really come together and improved as a team."

Tommy Harris, the team's leading scorer at 11.5 points per game, said the team's major goal was to improve on last year's win total.

"It was only two games and we didn't have girls," he said. "I think we're going to beat it. That's the main goal we have. We've had a few goals other this year, like breaking 50 points, that we've done a few times. And we have some individual goals, like getting double digits."

Among the 17 defeats were two December games against Kelton, whose roster includes freshman Kelli Crockett, the only one of seven girls in that school to go out for basketball. The wins over Darrouzett have been the only games Crockett has played in.

Along the way, Darrouzett's Lady Longhorns have been the subject of curiosity, disdain and humor.

"They really couldn't believe that we play for the team," Wheatley said

of opposing crowds' initial reactions. "They think we have to be pretty bad, I guess you could say, for us to do it. And some of the fans would kind of say stuff, but it doesn't really bother me about it."

Team manager Carol Meier, the only girl in school not playing this season, said opposing players quickly got over the novelty, but there have been instances where the officials didn't.

"Some of the other boys don't mind, but we've had refs that do mind that the girls are playing," Meier said. "And I don't like that."

But Todd Keith, a sophomore forward, said the girls have gained acceptance from the opposition during the season.

"At first it was like 'Are there really girls on your team?' " Keith said. "Now it's not anything because everybody knows about it."

In spite of whatever objections opponents and officials might have to co-ed basketball, Wheatley and Kemp have been able to take care of themselves.

"I've had referees come up after the game and tell me those two girls play rougher than any of the boys do," Carter said. "Early in the season everybody ran a press against us trying to get turnovers. Kristin did a good job of getting the ball up the floor, but every once in a while I'd see her slip an elbow in there and just knock the snot out of some guy." Wheatley has also gotten a few silent jabs in with her driving layups, which

Carter said left opposing players disbelieving and embarrassed.

"When they try to play real tight on her, she can just put this little spin on them and go right on in," he said. "That's something that really gets the team and the crowd into the game."

Keith said it was easy to empathize with the opponents when that happens, but, "I think still it's pretty funny when you get burned by a girl."

"And every time that happens all the boys from the other high school go 'Ooooooh,'" freshman Quentin Terrel said. "There was one game where she just burned one of their starters and the whole crowd went 'Ooooooh.'"

This year's Darrouzett team, while its most unusual, will also be its last. School trustees voted in July to close the junior high and high school following this school year with students attending either Booker or Follett. Darrouzett will keep its elementary school.

So when the Longhorns notched their first win of the season, a 55-53 road win at Wheeler Christian on Jan. 14, it may have also been their last. And it wasn't treated lightly either.

"You would've thought we just won state," he said. "Everybody was jumping up and down all over the place. We went out and ate steak that night."

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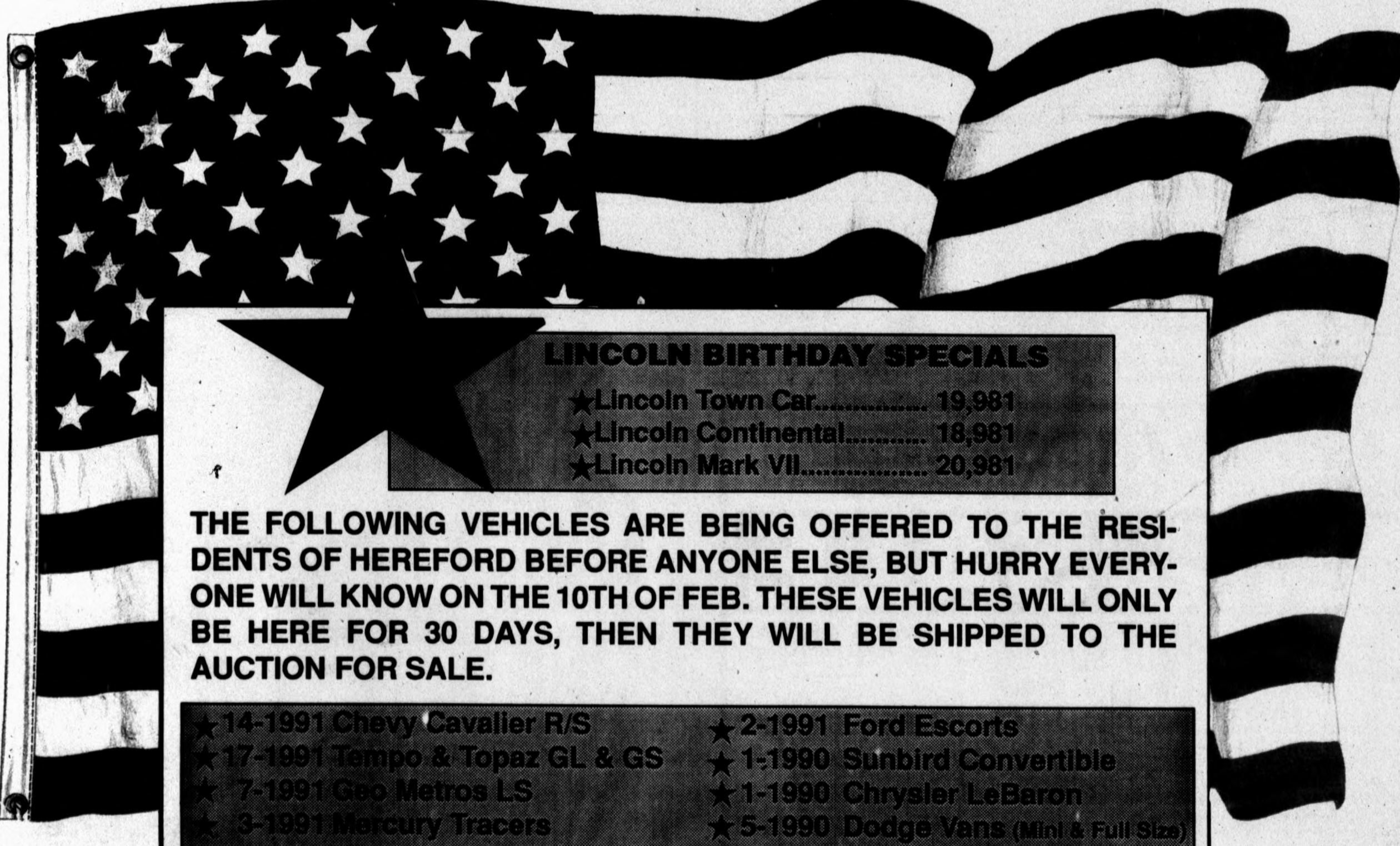
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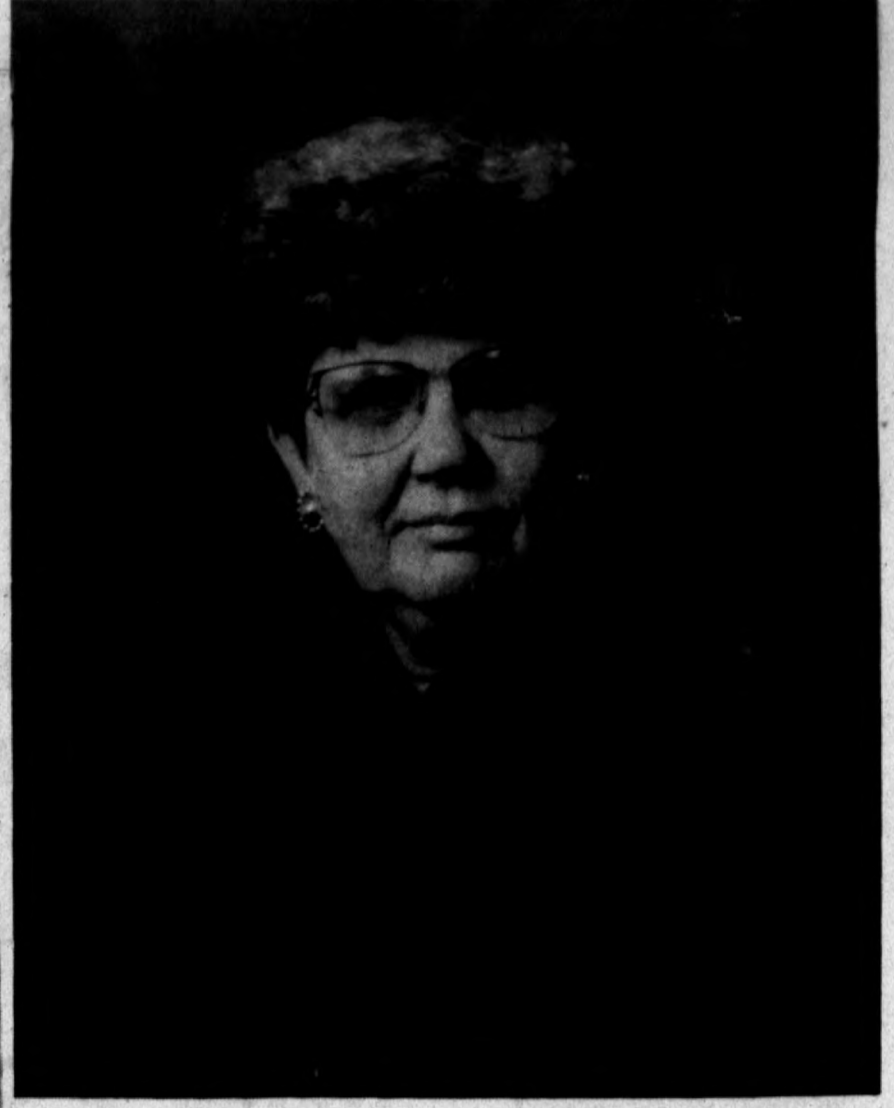

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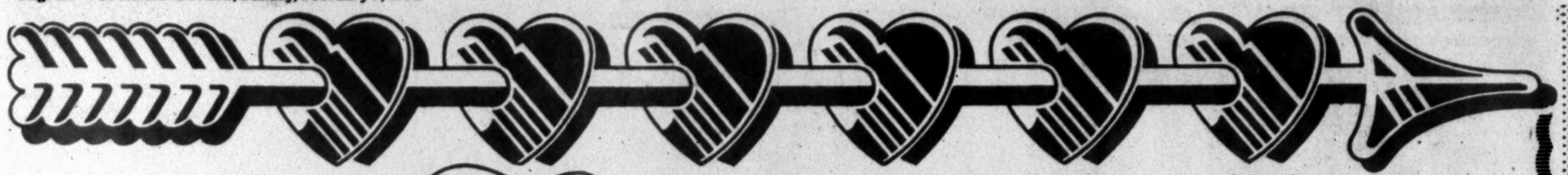

**COMPUTERS WITHOUT STRAIN**

More and more people today use computers for work and for playing games. And many of those people experience eyestrain, along with headaches and burning or itching eyes. This doesn't have to happen if you set up your video display terminal properly and use it with care. First step is to adjust the viewing angles. The top edge of the screen should be no higher than eye level as you sit, the bottom edge no lower than about 40 degrees below eye level. To control on-screen glare, shade nearby windows and direct lamps away from the screen. Screen hoods and antiglare filters will help. Adjust image brightness to avoid too much contrast with the surroundings. Take breaks. Rest your eyes by doing something else for 10 to 15 minutes — once an hour after strenuous work periods, every two hours otherwise. Consult with your optometrist about glasses fitted with a middle-distance prescription or with special tinted lenses that reduce glare.

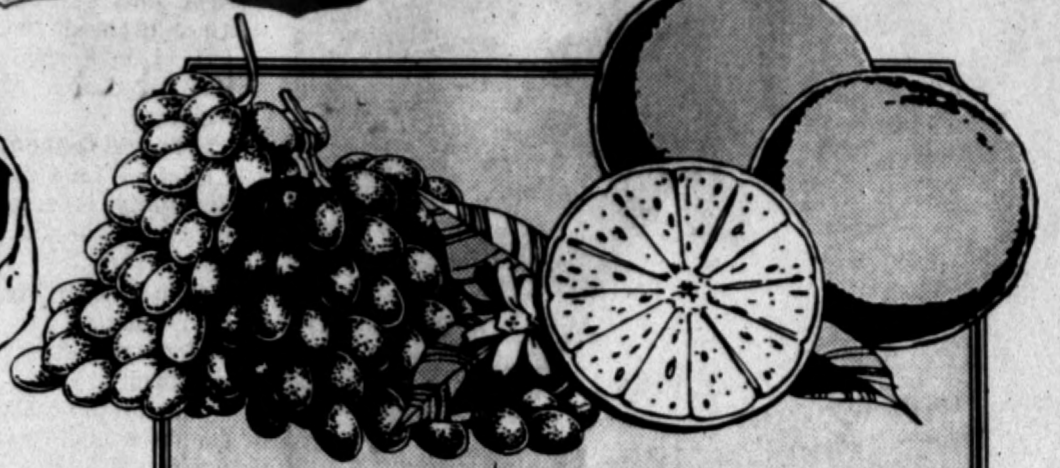

My hearing is poor. I walk with a cane. I am a bit forgetful but still live alone. When I can no longer do that, I want to go. No one looks forward to death, but it is as natural as birth and I believe most of us prefer it to being a burden. Don't you?--P.T.M., Seattle, Wash.

**DEAR P.T.M.:** I do, indeed, and I applaud your good sense. You've done a big favor to your children by planning in advance and I'm sure they appreciate it.

I hope your letter will encourage others to follow your example of preparing a living will NOW when they are of sound mind. It's the last gift they can give their loved ones, and I might add, the best.

## MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

### Managing Inventory Part 2 of 2 Part Series

Last week we discussed Joe and Mary's appliance business. Their inventory level was increasing and the backroom was filling up with merchandise that hadn't sold. We shared a personal example of a bargain deal on inventory that wasn't a bargain.

We also pointed out that the goal of successful inventory management is to reduce the time it takes to sell the merchandise. Reducing the inventory age and increasing the turnover rate makes more cash available to the business. This week we want to share five effective strategies for managing inventory.

**Count It**  
The first management strategy is to know your inventory level.

I've worked with many of small business owners who were having cash flow problems without knowing why. Often the culprit is a growing inventory. They were buying more and selling less. Gradually the level of inventory increases to a point where all of the needed cash is sitting in the warehouse or on the shelves.

If you count your inventory once each year, you need to change your tracking procedure. Some of your competitors count inventory every day. I would recommend that you know your inventory level at the end of each month.

Today, inexpensive electronic cash registers are available for under \$500 that will help track inventory level. Some offer as many as 10 or 12 different departments.

Strategy number two is to calculate your average monthly inventory and your turnover rate. You can obtain norms for your type of business from trade publications, journals or associations.

For example, if you are in the hardware business, the National Retail Hardware Association publishes information that would be very helpful. Statistics that the association published in 1989 show that the average inventory turnover was two and one-half times per year. The top performing third of the nearly 700 stores surveyed turned their inventory nearly three times.

If you are operating below the average for your industry, you may need to work on managing this part of your business. If you are performing well above average, there may be other areas where you could manage more effectively.

**One Bite at a Time**

How do you eat an elephant? The answer is one bite at a time. Managing inventory requires a similar approach. The first two strategies we mentioned are macro strategies. They offer a look at the big picture - the

whole elephant if you will.

If you perceive you have a problem with inventory after going through the first two steps, you may need to break the problem into smaller elements. Strategy number three requires you to divide the inventory into categories or classes. Analyze each line or category separately. One bite at a time. Weed out slower moving items or categories. If you feel you must carry some slow moving items, use your sales history to determine the stocking level.

Strategy number four is to analyze each of your categories for profit potential. The objective is to eliminate low profit inventory that has a low stock turnover rate. These are the true losers in your lineup. Get rid of these lines as quickly as you can. This is an ongoing process. Every month look at your inventory and phase out the losers.

The fifth strategy concerns buying. Careful consideration should be given to what you buy, how much you buy and from whom you buy. Many inventories become over stocked simply because the buyer got carried away by the excitement of "going to market." As rapidly as retail conditions are changing, constantly being aware of new suppliers and buying sources is necessary. Your ability to sell value is directly tied to how well you purchase.

One final point should be made in summary. Inventory problems usually develop over time. Solutions will take time as well. Buy right; then count it, track it, analyze it and weed out the losers.

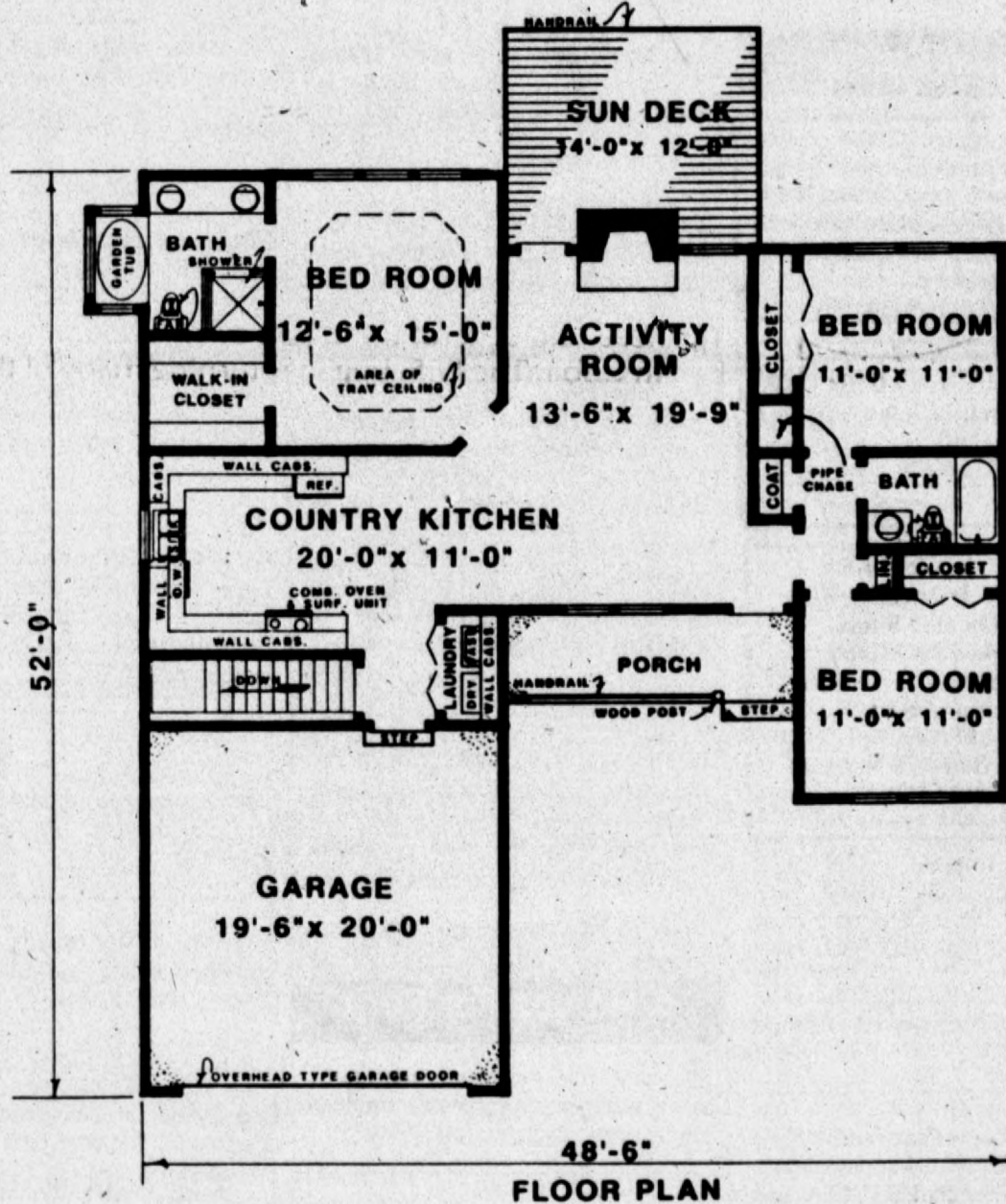

## Extension News

The term "empty nest" surfaced in the 1950s when parents experienced the loss of children leaving home. Mothers seemed particularly devastated.

In recent studies, researchers are dispelling the notion of the "empty nest syndrome" as applicable to a majority of today's mothers. The research does not support the description as being typical of today's middle-aged mothers.

Today many women have careers, which may be well-established before they ever consider parenthood. Family satisfaction is likely to be fulfilled through other means, in addition to children. Also, the trend toward adult children returning to their family of origin refills a nest.

Women most likely to suffer or mourn the departure of the last child are those who have been full-time homemakers and have been identified as nurturers of children. Loss of this role often results in an identity crisis. Another group that experiences empty nest syndrome are those who have poor spouse relationships.

It's normal to mourn briefly the loss of children from the home. Most parents take great pride in helping their children achieve independence and competency so they can be responsible young adults and comfortable in the world today.

When parents raise capable, intelligent, successful children who are scattered all over the country, they never expected to be alone with no family nearby. Parents experiencing similar situations say they feel "orphaned"--shut out of the everyday lives of their long-distance children.

Parents who have had a very close relationship with their children want to accept the fact that a close relationship may be a thing of the

past. Yet, some are really depressed about it. When families are estranged because of geography, parents still miss their children terribly. Even parents who were busy, career-oriented people felt the same loss as single, older parents.

Parents of distant children have formed a new support group called "orphaned Parents." Members learn to realize that they can't be together to hold their children's hands anymore, that it may not be how it used to be, but their children still care about them.

Older adults who are hurt, saddened or angry that their faraway children and grandchildren are out of their lives except on occasional visits can learn to cope. Support groups of other adults in the same situation can help such parents realize that distant children do care and may be experiencing some of the same sad thoughts as their parents.

The traditional way for a young man to show his intentions was nerve-racking for the girl of his choice.

Once he had picked his future wife, convention demanded that every night for a month he had to visit her parent's house. If he missed even one visit, the romance was over.

## 'Burden of Proof' carried by ABC



### Lawyer learns what he don't know can hurt him

If the concept of an honest, naive and successful lawyer doesn't send you into fits of cynical laughter, then ABC's *The Burden of Proof* might be your cup of cappuccino. The two-part drama begins Sunday, Feb. 9, and concludes the following Monday night.

*The Burden of Proof* is drawn from the No. 1 best-selling novel by Scott Turow. A former Assistant U.S. Attorney in Chicago, Turow wrote *Presumed Innocent*, another yarn of lawyers in trouble which became a movie starring Harrison Ford in 1990. The adaptation of *The Burden of Proof* by John Gay (*Fatal Vision*) spends very little time in the courtroom; rather we are immersed in the private life of a forthright defense attorney who finds his world both crumbling and rebuilding itself in the midst of a personal and legal quandary.

Hector Elizondo is 'solid as the champion of justice Alejandro "Sandy" Stern (the defender for Ford's character in *Presumed Innocent*), a man who has done the right thing for his entire life, but still must deal with skeletons in his family closet. The film begins with the unexpected suicide of Stern's wife and the serving of papers against his brother-in-law, Dixon Hartnell (Brian Dennehy), a commodities broker accused of insider trading. While Stern struggles with unanswered questions and a mysterious medical bill concerning his late wife, he is losing ground to his legal adversaries, led by Sonia Klonsky (Mel Harris).

Sandy Stern uncovers more questions than answers, and he reaps more complications as the story progresses. He is first seduced by one of Hartnell's executives, played by Victoria Principal with an Oklahoma twang thicker

than crude oil (the 50-something widower's confession to her that he had only slept with one woman in his life seems to call them all out of the suburban woodwork), then by family friend Helen Dudak (Stephanie Powers). But the woman he really wants is the married and pregnant Klonsky. (Note to wannabe scriptwriters: How do you get an innocent and honorable lawyer naked in a hot tub with his expectant, yet desirable legal opponent? You have her small son beg the noble attorney to accompany him, but send the kid to bed before Mom comes out and takes his place.)

Dennehy is marvelously wicked as the bon vivant who laughs in the face of the law, making an excellent counterpoint to Elizondo's stoic yet sensitive Stern. Together they play a gripping game of truth or consequences with both their futures at stake.

Arnold Schwarzenegger had just finished directing his first feature-length film, and he wasn't headed to Disneyland. Instead, he and the cast of his upcoming TNT movie, *Christmas in Connecticut*, went to meet the press. Asked if his physical size and media image made it hard to work closely with his actors on the romantic comedy, the former Mr. Olympia and once-and-future Terminator didn't understand the question. If that sounds like a different Schwarzenegger from Arnold the on-screen automaton, it is. "You run (the set)," he says, "not in a dictatorial way, but in a very democratic way, so everyone can put their minds together."

Though he's still looking for his next on-screen role, Schwarzenegger isn't in hibernation. He's currently playing the part of restaurateur at an upscale cafe, Schatzi on Main, that will open once the city of Santa Monica grants him a liquor license. When the cameras stop rolling, even Arnold Schwarzenegger has to play by the rules. □ TV Listing Inc.

**Up the mountain from Albertville**

**Winter Olympic venues among world's finest**

Though the 1992 Winter Olympic ceremonies will open and close in the French resort town of Albertville in the western Alps, only the ice-skating events will have their champions crowned there. The remainder of the competition will be scattered across the many hamlets nestled high above Albertville, which combine to form an unequalled venue for winter-sports competition.

Perhaps the most impressive of the sites is Val-d'Isere, to whose already highly technical alpine ski runs will be added the "Face de Bellevalde," a thrilling new downhill run designed by Olympic champion Jean-Claude Killy. With the exception of a giant slalom

event being held at Les Menuires, Val-d'Isere is the place for men's alpine action.

The women's alpine skiing events are slated to run in Meribel, centrally located in the region the French call the Savoie. Meribel will be the site for hockey competition as well, with a rink on the village outskirts — just a trolley ride away from the Olympic village in Brides-les-Bains.

Near the popular Vanoise Nature Reserve is Pralognan, the site of 1992's curling competition, which takes place in a newly built rink. The complex is linked to a popular water-sports center by a bridge over the beautiful Doron River. A little further down the mountain is Courchevel, where the ski jumping and Nordic combined events will take place.

Speed and more speed will be the order of the day at Les Arcs, where the demonstration event of speed skiing will be held, and La Plagne, where bobsled and luge competition promise to scorch the ice. The more artistic freestyle skiing competition takes place in the rarefied atmosphere of Tignes.

North of Albertville, the mountain-pass village of Les Saisies offers level terrain for the cross-country and biathlon events. In all, it's a fairy-tale setting for a once-in-a-lifetime event.

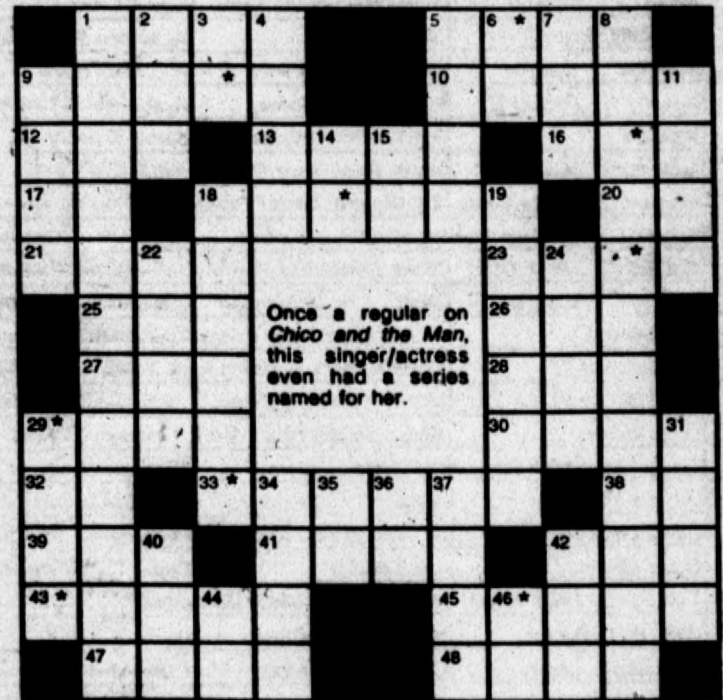

## SOAP TALK

### Soap writer creates 'Bold' characters

Will Nikki and Victor marry again? Will Jill ever convince John to give her another chance? Is Faith going to cause big problems for Ridge? There's one man who knows the answers to these questions and much, much more. He's William J. Bell, executive producer and head writer of the highly rated CBS series *The Young and the Restless* and *The Bold and the Beautiful*.

Bell, one of the most respected men in daytime television, isn't afraid of controversy. He's tackled tough and sometimes taboo subjects such as AIDS, date rape, incest and crack-addicted babies. While he listens to his audience, he has his own ideas about what's going to happen on his shows. "Very often the people who write in will tend to react negatively to what you are doing," Bell says. "What you ultimately have to do is follow your own judgment. That is what I've done since I first started writing. I'm not going to do what someone else suggests, I'm going to do what I believe in. If I'm wrong, then I won't stay in the business. If I'm right, I'll save myself a lot of money in psychiatric bills."

The formula seems to have worked for Bell, as he has written over 10,000 episodes of daytime drama since 1957. He began his career writing for *The Guiding Light*, with the great Irna Phillips. (The pair also co-created *Another World*.) Bell has served up stories for *As the World Turns* and *Days of Our Lives*, pulling both soaps up from the bottom of the Nielsen. Not one to rest on his laurels, Bell went on to co-create *The Young and the Restless* and *The Bold and the Beautiful* with his wife, Lee Phillip Bell.

The strength of his stories, as Bell explains, comes from well-developed characters. "You want characters that the audience can relate to, in some cases be furious with and at the very least be interested in. But in most every case, you want some strong emotional involvement between the audience and your character. Then you need good stories to support them," says Bell. He must be right, for *Y&R* and *B&B* stay in the No. 1 and No. 5 five spots on a consistent basis.

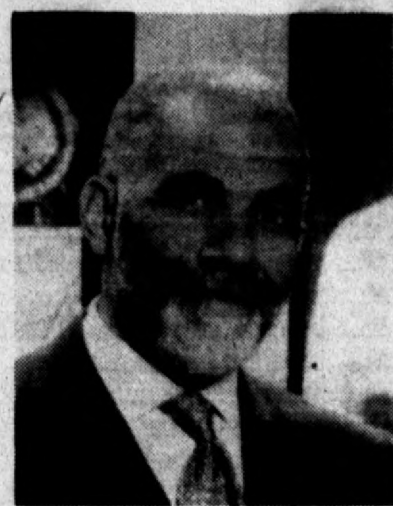

**Blue-collar skaters ready for Games**

Each Olympics has its darlings, those athletes so outstanding that they capture the imagination not only of their own countrymen, but the entire sports world. This week, when Olympic competition begins in earnest, the world will meet a U.S. figure-skating team with a story so American you can almost smell the apple pie.

Two years ago, almost no one had heard of Calla Urbanski and Rocco "Rocky" Marval, but their graceful, free-wheeling style is expected to impress the Olympic judges and delight viewers around the globe.

In an age where figure skaters, like tennis stars, are pampered and groomed for early stardom, Urbanski and Marval are an anomaly. Urbanski, who at age 31 is almost twice as old as many of her rivals, is a part-time cocktail waitress, and Marval is a 26-year-old trucking company owner. Both toiled in relative obscurity with a series of partners until they hooked up in 1990, then exploded onto the international scene by upsetting 1988 Olympic bronze medalists Natasha Kuchike and Todd Sand at Skate America in September of last year.

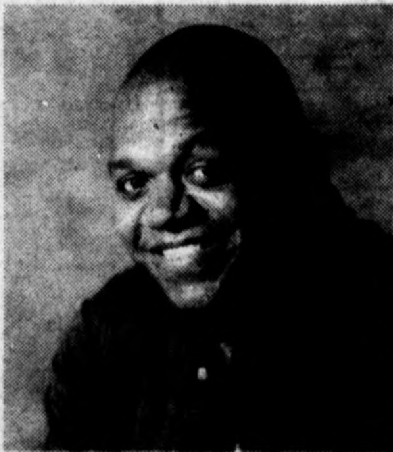
While there are those who feel that their blue-collar image could hurt the team's chances with tradition-conscious judges, Urbanski confidently predicts they will emerge as victors at the Games.

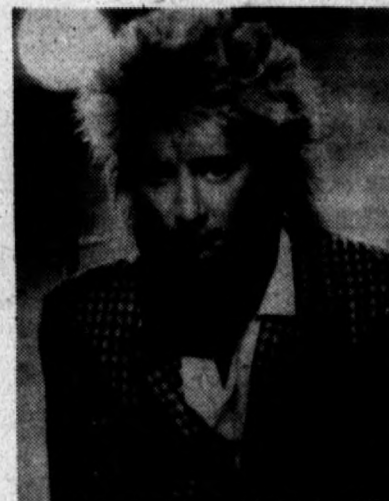

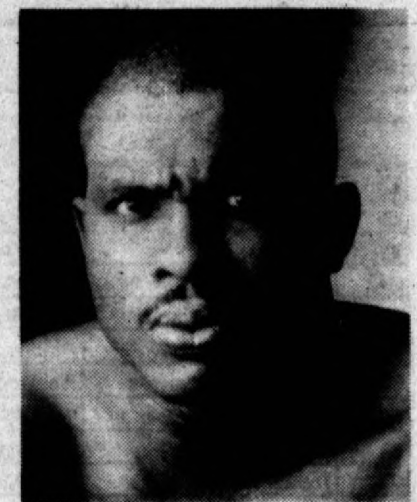

**WILD HEARTS CAN'T BE BROKEN:** (1991) Starring Gabrielle Anwar and Cliff Robertson.

A rather good Walt Disney film that was overlooked by many when first released. The story concerns a famous carnival act during the Depression. The place is Atlantic City, New Jersey. Sonora Webster (Gabrielle Anwar), who was blind, dived on horseback from a forty-foot tower into a tank of water. While never overselling the feat or losing control or the sentimentality, Steve Miner's film tells this story in a crisp, G-rated fashion. (Isn't that nice for a change?)

Gabrielle Anwar makes a fresh, innocently sensuous Sonora and Cliff Robertson is solid as the carnival man who trains her.

The film's most touching moments dramatically evoke the wordless understanding that seems to develop between the demanding taskmaster and his equally strong-willed student. Rated G.

**SUMMERTIME:** (1955) Starring Katherine Hepburn and Rossano Brazzi.

A love story set in Venice about an American "schoolmarm" and a handsome Italian merchant. You'll seldom see as perceptive, or touching a rendition of a woman tentatively searching for affection as Hepburn delivers. This sensitive portrayal is one of her best. The cinematography is outstanding. Not rated. Would be a PG.

**DOCTOR ZHIVAGO:** (Great Britain/1965) Starring Julie Christie and Omar Sharif. From the prize-winning novel by Boris Pasternak about life in Russia before and during the Revolution. (The first one.) Directed by David Lean, this mammoth spectacle is too long and episodic but still impressive. The sub-text is the beautiful story of star-crossed lovers caught up in the turmoil of the events. Five Oscars including one for script, music (the haunting *Lara's Theme*) and cinematography. Not rated. Would be a PG-13.

**A MAN AND A WOMAN:** (French/1966) Starring Animee Anouk and Jean-Louis Trintignant. A visually stunning, superbly acted, and very moving, contemporary love story about a young widow and widower who fall in love. Animee Anouk makes this seeming soap opera become art, not artifice, and she is aided by good direction and inventive camera work. Oscars for Best Foreign Film and Best Original Screenplay. Dubbed into English. Would be a PG-13.

**JUST THE WAY YOU ARE:**

(1984) Starring Kristy McNichol and Michael Ontkean. A crippled flutist (Kristy McNichol) falls for a photographer (Michael Ontkean) while vacationing in France. The movie has elements of sharp comedy, escapist romance and travelogue. The results are extremely pleasant. Rated PG.

**TOUCH AND GO:**

(1984) Starring Michael Keaton and Maria Conchita Alonso. A romantic comedy about a Chicago hockey player who falls in love with the mother of the young delinquent-in-training who mugged him. Michael Keaton is appealing and Maria Conchita Alonso is rather fiery. The script contains sharp dialogue, a few good laughs and enough sweet moments to make it a very contemporary Valentine. Rated PG.

**CHANCES ARE:**

(1989) Starring Cybill Shepherd, Robert Downey, Jr. and Ryan O'Neal. A generally charming and effective romantic comedy. Robert Downey, Jr. plays the reincarnated soul of Cybill Shepherd's late husband. As the result of a mistake in the soul-recycling center in heaven, very-much-alive Downey has retained a dormant memory of his past life. It's good silly fun. Rated PG.

**GREEN CARD:**

(1990) Starring Gerard Depardieu, and Andie MacDowell. A prim, health-obsessed botanist (Andie MacDowell) seeks a partner for a marriage of convenience so she can qualify for tenancy in a tree-filled apartment. A raffish Frenchman (Gerard Depardieu), a consumer of

beef and cigarettes, needs a wife in name only for the purpose of obtaining a Green Card. They marry, but when an Immigration and Naturalization Service investigation forces the couple to actually live together and act married, the film turns into an airy, high-concept, romantic comedy. Rated PG-13.

**ROMANCE FROM THE ARCHIVES**

**CASABLANCA:** (1942/Black & White) Starring Ingrid Bergman and Humphrey Bogart. "Of all the joints in all the towns in all the world, she walks into mine." As time goes by . . . Would be a PG.

**THE GHOST AND MRS. MUIR:**

(1947/Black & White) Starring Gene Tierney, Rex Harrison and a very young Natalie Wood. This is lovely, romantic comedy at its best. It's a heartwarming tale about a young widow (Gene Tierney) who decided to live in the lighthouse home of a long-dead sailor. Naturally, she and he become soulmates, setting the stage for a perfect love story. A charming, beautifully-made fantasy. Not rated. Would be a G.

**TO BE OR NOT TO BE:**

(1942) Starring Jack Benny, Carole Lombard and Robert Stack. The story of a Shakespearean troupe in Poland fleeing from the Nazis is one of the greatest film comedies. Jack Benny leads the troupe, and he is as funny impersonating Hamlet as he is impersonating Hitler. Lombard, who died shortly after the completion of the film, plays one of her richest roles as his wife. Not rated. Would be a G.
