Foster home group could get land

By ANDREA LAMB Staff Writer

The steering committee for the proposed Hereford foster group home learned Thursday that it may receive some donated land west of Hereford on which to build the 12-bed

Committee member Glen Nelson said at the group's meeting that an unidentified person offered to donate six acres of subdivided land two miles west of Hereford to the com-

'He said he wasn't donating it just to obtain a tax exemption," said Nelson. "He just wants us to have

Individual committee members plan to meet with the person to discuss the offer.

After the committee formulates some concrete figures on the shelter's cost and obtains tax exempt status, Buckner's Childrens Home (who is teaming up with Deaf Smith County in operating the home) will start the fund raising needed to defray maintenance costs and to set up an endowment fund, said Bruce Burnett, a representative of Buckner's Childrens Home in Amarillo.

To achieve tax exempt status, the committee must first submit a \$300 fee, and even then, the wait to be tax exempt may last up to six months, according to the committee's lawyer, Terry Langehennig

More school financing plans aired

AUSTIN (AP) - A West Texas legislator has suggested giving the State Board of Education the power to set a state property tax rate as part of the solution to the public school finance problem.

We are, in fact, giving legislative power, in a sense, to a state agency," Rep. Jack Vowell, R-El Paso. testified Thursday.

But he reminded a subcommittee of the Select Committee on Education that the education board is elected and responsible to the voters.

Vowell described school financing as a "social difficulty (that) doesn't have one and only one direct, correct answer - it may have a number of

He said Texans have three options if higher courts affirm a ruling by State District Judge Harley Clark of Austin that the current school finance system is unconstitutional.

They can amend the Texas Constitution to keep the present financing system, which Vowell said is inequitable; or they can allow the state to finance public education totally. which would require very high state

A third option would be trying to scheduled for the next few days. find an equitable system which might discard some cherished concepts but would preserve the most central element - equal treatment under the law for students, school districts and taxpayers. Vowell said.

Dukakis digs at Bush

Democratic presidential frontrunner Michael Dukakis, in a slap at likely Republican opponent George president too timid to speak out on

Bush, meanwhile, was asked about the release of three French hostages and said he would never agree to payments to secure the release of Americans in captivity.

Jesse Jackson, Dukakis' Democratic rival, was chafing at what he called the premature "coronation" of Dukakis. Jackson stepped up his criticism of party delegate-selection rules on Thursday, but Dukakis virtually ignored him, training his fire instead on

Jackson was campaigning today in California, whose primary on June 7 will be the biggest - and last - of the season. Dukakis was home in Boston, with no campaign events

Bush was hustling through a series of stops today in Idaho, Montana and Nebraska. All three states have primaries in the next month, but as Bush already has a numerical lock on the Republican nomination, aides say he is aiming to build Western backing for the general election.

The vice president's comments that France had arranged

Thursday's release of three French hostages by agreeing to pay the outstanding balance on a loan originally totaling \$1 billion made by the late Shah Mohammad Reza Bush, says he won't accept a vice. Pahlavi of Iran. France has denied paying a ransom for the trio's

Bush said he would never agree to such an arrangement "because I just think that will make others be taken

The vice president's role in the Reagan administration's arms-forhostages deal with Iran has been questioned by Republican and Democratic opponents alike. "To the degree that it turned out to be arms for hostages, it was diametrically opposed to U.S. policy." Bush said Thursday of the deal

He conceded that the Democrats are making the Republican armsfor-hostages plan a campaign issue. but claimed they are "devoid of other national issues.

Bush's campaign was engaged in damage control after the vice president's comments a day earlier that he sometimes refrains from speaking up at Cabinet meetings because he is concerned about leaks, and because he doesn't want President Reagan to be forced to choose between him and other officials.

Dukakis, campaigning in West Virginia on Thursday, seized on that, saying that in Massachusetts he has a "Irvely Cabinet, and sometimes

they get loud and contentious. That's the way you get good give

and take," the governor said. "I hope I'll have a vice president who speaks up and speaks out.

Attempting to blunt the criticism, Bush spokesman Stephen Hart said Bush's comments about keeping quiet at Cabinet meetings didn't mean Bush avoids giving the president his opinions. Hart said Bush has ample opportunity to do that private-

He reserves his advice for the president," the spokesman said Thursday as Bush spent a day focusing on education issues.

The vice president visited James A Garfield High School in predominantly Hispanic East Los Angeles. He sat in on a calculus class taught by Jaime Escalante, whose teaching of advanced math to disadvantaged students is the subject of a movie, "Stand and Deliver.

Bush said if he is elected, there will be a "changing of priorities to some degree" to reflect more emphasis on education. However, he cautioned; There has to be a limitation to what the federal government can do."

That stance, too, drew a dig from Dukakis, who discounted Bush's pledge to be an "education president." The White House, he said, must always be a supporter of education - "not just during election

Hospital vote tops Saturday election slate

A crowded nine-person field to fill three spots on the Deaf Smith County Hospital District board of directors highlights Saturday's municipal elections at the Hereford Community Center.

The election includes contested races for two city commission posts and a write-in election for Place Three on the Hereford school board.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Saturday at the Community Center for all three of the elections.

Hospital board

Registered voters from throughout the county are eligible to cast ballots in the hospital board election, where incumbents Margie Ford and Frank Zinser Jr. are joined by on the ballot by Dr. Harold Brigance, Dr. William Benjamin, June Rudd, Raymond Schroeder, Joe Garcia, Craig Smith, and David Baulch for the three available board positions.

All of the candidates were given the opportunity this week to give their reasons for running for the

hospital board.

Ford: "This has been an extremely tough year. We have accomplished a lot of good things, and it is important to keep those of whom have started this and will back Mr. (Gary) Moore (Deaf Smith General Hospital ad-

'We need to continue and improve upon what we've started. This board has faced up to its responsibilities. We're grateful for what we've done, not just financially but in services. We've done the right things, and we want to keep it up.'

Baulch: "I am basically running because I feel, as a former employee, that I have experience that will help the community and the hospital. I feel there are some changes that need to be made. I am willing to work with and for the community to make the necessary changes."

Brigance: "The main reason I am running for the hospital board is that the hospital is very important. We need to ensure that the hospital stays here, and that it makes a profit. I have a fear that if things continue in the same mode that we may lose some of the services at the hospital."

Zinser: "I am running again because we have just spent six months of very hard work getting reforms in place at the hospital on the fiscal side and in management. These changes need to be kept in place. We need people on the board who will see to it that these actions go on to

completion. Benjamin: "I am a concerned citizen of the community, and I have a vested interest in the hospital. I would like to see certain things done, and I would like to see that people are taken care of. I want to bring attention to things at the hospital, and since I am a board-certified family physician I have expertise in treating a wide variety of patients.

"The government sent me here to take care of indigent people and farm laborers, and I would like to see that those people are taken care of.

"I don't feel like I have been treated fairly here by the newspaper or by the hospital. I think if a hospital is to survive it should welcome new physicians. There have been six physicians who have left because they were dissatisfied with the hospital.

"I think the new administrator is doing a fine job, but the board is not doing things to my satisfac-

Schroeder: "I have no particular reason-I'm just interested in having a good hospital. If we're

are going to attract new industries and new people to Hereford, we need a good hospital. If I can help, I will gladly help. I'm not running for or against anything. If I am elected, I will do the best I can to help the hospital."

Smith: "I want to contribute to the community. The hospital is one of the community's biggest employers, and we need a good, strong hospital. Based on my past experience I feel I can contribute. I have been working with the hospital for the past two or three years as its banker, so I understand its strong points and its weak points."

Garcia: "I'm running because I am interested in what is going on. I want to help the entire community understand what is going

"Someone asked me if I am running because I am Hispanic. The answer is no-I am running because I want everyone to know what is going on at the hospital, to make the community aware of everything at the hospital. Like anything else, I think it is time for a change on the board. I feel I can answer the community's questions about the hospital because I am interested in what is going on at the hospital."

Rudd: "Principally, my reason is that I have been involved with the medical community for the past 30 years. I know that I can help straighten out problems that may come up. I don't know all of the answers, but I would like to help. I feel this is something I have some knowledge of and would like to help, to serve the

"I don't have any bones to pick. I worked at the hospital for several years starting in 1958, and I have worked as a school nurse for 20 years. I know we need, as a community, to maintain a good community hospital, and I want to

City Commission

The city commission ballot will be headed by familiar names this Saturday, but a couple of challengers names are sprinkled in with the bunch.

Voters in Place 2 will be choosing between incumbent Emory Brownlow and Irene Cantu while incumbent Bud Eades will butt heads with Pete LaFuente Jr. for the Place 4 position. Incumbents Paul Hamilton and Jerry Walsh are running unopposed for the two at-large positions.

The candidates' responses to questions such as 'Why are you qualified to be on the commission?' and 'What would you like to see changed or happen if you were elected?' are as follows:

Brownlow (co-owner of Brownlow Construction): "I've been on the commission a long time and that's all the qualification I need. I don't need to comment on any of this because the people will vote for me if they want me in there."

LaFuente (owner of Pete's Income Tax Service): LaFuente stated that he had no comment for the Brand concerning the election or why he wants to be on the com-

Eades president of Plains Insurance Agency): "I've been in business in Hereford and I've dealt with figures such as the kind you find on the city budget. I've been on the commission for eight years and I've helped to initiate several of the more progressive things such as revising the zoning code, promoting the building code, and I've helped in hiring the current city manager. I think the city is running smoothly and I would want to continue the relatively low overhead the city has maintained."

Cantu: Cantu could not be reached for comment.




She became my banker, lawyer, homework helper, broken-heart mender, explainer and soothsayer. She did it all so well, filling the shoes of both parents.

Allegations spur probe on Meese

WASHINGTON (AP) - Government lawyers are reviewing allegations of impropriety by Attorney General Edwin Meese III and possible perjury by other officials in the case of a company that says it was pushed into bankruptcy by the Justice Department.

One of the issues is whether Meese interceded with INSLAW Inc.'s law firm and whether that had anything to do with the subsequent dismissal of the lawyer representing the com-

The Justice Department's public integrity section also is reviewing conflicts in the sworn testimony of two former federal bankruptcy trustees and two Justice Department officials during bankruptcy court proceedings involving INSLAW, according to sources who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The testimony dealt with INSLAW's allegations that Justice Department officials sought to put the company out of business by trying, unsuccessfully, to convert its bankruptcy reorganization to an outright liquidation.

Independent counsel James C. McKay, who is conducting a criminal investigation of Meese in several areas, is not probing the INSLAW case but did refer information about it to the public integrity section.

"We are not conducting an investigation with respect to the IN-SLAW matter," said Carol Bruce, McKay's deputy. "Any information we have received relating to it we have referred to the Justice Department's public integrity section."

But the section, after reviewing the material, could return it to McKay's office for a fuller investigation of the Meese allegation, according to a source familiar with the case.

INSLAW attorneys told McKay that the company's original lawyer, Leigh Ratiner, was fired from his Washington law firm after Meese discussed the case with Leonard

Garment, a politically connected partner in the same firm.

The Justice Department acknowledged to INSLAW in pretrial discovery that Meese recalled talking to Garment about the case in the fall of 1986.

The perjury investigation involves sworn depositions or courtroom testimony given by witnesses in connection with INSLAW's allegation that the Justice Department tried to force INSLAW into a liquidation proceeding in bankruptcy court.

Wright warns Sandinistas

WASHINGTON (AP) - House Speaker Jim Wright is warning Nicaragua's Sandinista leaders that Congress will condemn any attempt to take advantage of the peace process to snuff out remaining opposi-

tion from the Contra rebels. Wright, along with the Reagan administration, expressed concern Thursday that the rebels may be winding up on the losing side of an unbalanced equation in talks aimed at reaching a long-term cease fire in their seven-year war.

"The message will be given to the ... Sandinista government that the majority in the Congress would not look with favor at all on any return or resort to military engagement," Wright, D-Texas, told reporters.

Representatives from the rebels' political directorate, the Nicaraguan Resistance, were in Washington this week arguing their case before State Department officials, members of Congress and the news media. They accused the leftist government of dragging its feet in the peace talks in order to stall U.S. "humanitarian"

aid for the rebels. Adolfo Calero, leader of the Contra directorate, said the \$48 million aid

package passed a month ago was intended to keep the rebels alive as a fighting force inside Nicaragua during a 60-day truce, while negotiations went forward on a longer-term cease

"That is being thwarted by the Sandinistas," he said. "It's broken

down. In Nicaragua, there are no steps being taken at present toward reconciliation."

Wright said he had asked State Department officials at a meeting earlier in the day to expedite aid money to the rebels, including at least part of \$10 million earmarked to pay the expenses of a verification commission to oversee the peace

Horses will race at Raton, says chamber Without aid soon, he said, "the pressure would be entirely on the Contras, they would wither on the vine and there would be no incentive for the Sandinistas to negotiate in good faith."

But he said Congress wants equally to avoid giving the rebels the "false impression that we want (them) to rev up the war again," and admonished the Contra leaders to continue peace efforts.

"A near miracle happened at Esquipulas," the town in Guatemala where the original regional peace accord was signed last Aug. 7, the House leader said.

SCHOOL FINANCE CONTROVERSY GROWS

AUSTIN - Every new day seems to bring another development in the debate over how best to finance Texas' public schools, and it appears likely the controversy could continue through next year's regudar session.

Late-breaking developments include a declaration by Gov. Bill Clements that only a constitutional amendment ratifying the current finance system will save local school districts from extinction and an announcement by State Comptroller Bob Bullock that he has a plan that will satisfy the courts and will maintain existing school district boundaries and local financial control.

To review briefly, a state district judge last year declared Texas' current school finance system unconstitutional. The judge said the system, in which the state and local districts share the cost of education, is inequitable because some local districts can raise more money from property taxes than other districts. That inequity violates the clause in the Texas constitution guaranteeing equal access to education for all, the judge said.

The case currently is on appeal. but most believe the district judge's ruling will be upheld. If, indeed, the ruling is not changed, the Legislature will have to come up with a new system by the beginning of the 1989-90 school year or let the judge create a new finance system himself. Most legislators would prefer to keep control over finance rather than turn that control over to the courts. But, how do you overhaul a system in a way that pleases the judge? In several speeches, the judge said he thinks the problem can be remedied by redrawing school district lines. That comment has led some to believe existing district lines will have to be abolished and super districts, at least for taxing purposes, will have to be created.

Such a prospect rightly concerns many educators, and the governor seized on that concern when he said only a constitutional amend-Clements would have the Legislature present to voters an amendment saying the existing finance system is constitutional. If voters approved the amendment, the court case essentially would be dead Clements says he wants the Legislature to address the inequities in school finance, but he says the amendment must be passed in order to wrest control of the

Hints from

issue away from the courts. He even has hinted at a special session this summer to get things moving on the amendment. .

The governor faces a number of problems, though. It is doubtful he could generate the votes in either house to pass such an amendment, and even if he did, there's no guarantee the state's voters would approve it.

This is where Bullock comes on the scene. The comptroller has presented Clements, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Gib Lewis with a plan he says will satisfy, the judge while causing no changes in existing local control over school finance. The plan also would require no constitutional amendment.

Bullock has not made public every detail of his plan, but it apparently would involve the sale of state bonds to finance the program. It also would reward poorer districts that do all they possibly can to raise money locally while giving less state money to the richer districts that have more valuable property within their borders.

Hobby has indicated the plan could be the solution to the problem. Clements and Lewis haven't endorsed it yet, but they haven't rejected it either.

That leaves us in a stalemate of sorts. The appeals court still appears months away from ruling on the case. And, no matter how they rule, the case almost certainly then will go to the Texas Supreme Court. That means a final court ruling may not come until early next year.

Legislators and the select committee that is trying to offer them guidance are left in limbo, not sure of which direction to go in resolving the crisis. Add to this the uncertainty of whether Clements will try to tackle the issue this summer, and it's easy to see how confused things have become.

There still is hope, and it comes in the form of the Bullock plan. It's too early to tell whether crisis, but Bullock has shown that a reasonable plan can be created that maintains existing district boundaries and local control over property taxation.

That is good news indeed. Now we can only hope the situation doesn't change again before the ink dries on this column.




