Ice cream vendor, Lopez sentenced

An ice cream truck vendor was sentenced to 10 years at the Texas Department of Corrections by 22nd District Court Judge Wes Gulley on Monday after being found guilty of indecency with a 5-year-old child, but the man says he will appeal.

Joe P. Chavez, 50, of 509 Grand Ave., was found guilty March 3 by a jury of engaging in sexual contact with the child on March 30, 1987.

District Attorney Roland Saul asked that Chavez be restricted from selling ice cream while he is out on a \$25,000 bond because of possible contact with children.

Chavez's lawyer, Sam Ogan, stated that he thought this was illegal to cite this as a stipulation on his bond, so Gulley called a hearing for May 26 at 2:30 p.m. concerning the possible stipulation.

A woman on probation for assaulting a police officer last year was sentenced Monday in 22nd District Court to seven years in prison for possessing heroin and intent to deliver.

Lisa Lopez, 20, pleaded guilty to a possession of heroin charge, which resulted in the revocation of her probation for assaulting a police officer May 1987 after police and firefighters attempted to extinguish a trash can fire at Lopez's residence.

Cantu wins council seat

Smith, Schlabs are new faces

Irene Cantu defeated incumbent City Commissioner Emory Brownlow 102-81 to claim a seat on the Hereford City Commission in Saturday's city, school and hospital board elections.

Craig Smith joined incumbents Margie Ford and Frank Zinser Jr., as hospital board winners, and Raymond Schlabs edged Juan Jackson, 125-111, in a write-in election for Place 3 on the Hereford school board.

"It was great," Cantu said after her win. "I worked hard and it paid off. I was flabbergasted—it is a great feeling."

"I was really excited with the turnout. It was great compared to the last election in that precinct. There were a lot of first-time voters, and I am really grateful they took the time to vote—it got me elected."

"I have a great feeling of accomplishment. I was nervous all day Saturday even though I had worked and planned very hard. It's just a really great feeling to be elected."

Cantu said she will "go back to the people who elected me to see what they want me to do. I don't really have any concrete plans—I just want to go back to those voters and see what they want me to do."

The first Hispanic elected to the Hereford City Commission was Paul Abalos, first elected in 1973 and elected to a second term in 1975. The second was Silvana Juarez, elected in 1987 and still on the commission.

Zinser led a nine-person field with 619 votes to reclaim his seat on the Deaf Smith County Hospital District board. Smith was just behind Zinser with 613 votes, while Ford was a close third with 594 votes.

Raymond Schroeder led the six other candidates with 390 votes. June Rudd, in her second successive try for a board seat, was fifth with 315 votes. Harold Brigrance was next with 218 votes, followed by Joe Garcia, 198, David Baulich, 117, and Dr. William Benjamin, 74.

Schlabs claimed his seat in the unique Place 3 school write-in election. No one filed for the seat formerly held by Bud Patterson, who was transferred from Hereford in April, and Schlabs and Jackson were the only announced write-in candidates.

Steve Coneway, who was unopposed after Belia Aguilar officially dropped out of the race, was re-elected to his Place One school board seat.

Noriega questions dog Bush

Democrats Jesse Jackson and Michael Dukakis squared off today in the West Virginia and Nebraska primaries as an impassioned Jackson insisted it's not too late for a comeback. Dukakis, meanwhile, called on Republican rival George Bush to detail his knowledge of drug allegations against Panamanian strongman Manuel Antonio Noriega.
Dukakis' comments came as aides to Bush fielded mounting questions about when the vice president first became aware of the allegations against the Panamanian strongman, who was indicted on federal drug charges in February. Bush did not

campaign Monday and had no campaign appearances scheduled today.

Jackson staged a primary-even scramble for votes in Nebraska and West Virginia, while Dukakis, who has taken the last few days off from campaigning, spent the day at the Statehouse in Boston.

"This is a live race... Every voter counts," Jackson declared Monday as he campaigned in Omaha, Neb. In Martinsburg, W.Va., he told supporters: "I'm coming to the last lap. I'm running longer and running stronger because my mind is made up... Press on! Press on!"

Dukakis campaigned in the two states last week.

Today's contests do not offer an

especially large share of Democratic delegates — 37 in West Virginia and 25 in Nebraska. Of the 2,081 delegates needed to nominate, Dukakis has 1,519.7 to Jackson's 933.1 according to the Associated Press' count.

But two more victories would help cement Dukakis' grip on the nomination, which aides have been saying he could clinch in the season-closing primaries June 7 in California and New Jersey.

For Jackson — who won last week's District of Columbia primary but notched no primary victories in the six weeks prior to that — a strong showing in either state would be a welcome respite.

Even before today's contests were

decided, Jackson was heading for the next battleground: Oregon, which holds its primary a week from today, with 45 Democratic delegates at stake.

Dukakis met Monday with New Jersey Sen. Bill Bradley, and aides said the two talked about U.S.-Soviet relations. Bush has already made Dukakis' lack of foreign policy experience an issue.

Bradley said he did not think Dukakis was vulnerable on the issue. "Experience is no substitute for ability and he's got real ability," Bradley said.

Dukakis, meanwhile, zeroed in on a foreign-policy matter that is

Regan on Reagan: Laid-back

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ronald Reagan is hesitant about bothering the people who work for him — so much so that he once let smoke pour from the fireplace in his office rather than call for help, Donald Regan says.

Regan did not want to make any demands on anyone, the president's former chief of staff says in "For the Record," the newest collection of out-of-school tales by White House departees. So he did nothing when a fire, caused by a clogged chimney in the president's study in the West Wing, broke out.

"He stayed at his desk," Regan wrote, "reading his documents with smarting eyes, until the guards asked if he wouldn't like to move to another room while they put out the fire and the place aired out. He hadn't wanted to bother anybody."

In his book, Regan offers contradictory portrayals of Reagan — on one hand picturing the president as disengaged and indecisive, a leader who "laid down no rules and articulated no mission," and on the other hand drawing him as involved and interested.

In contrast to his harsh depic-

tion of first lady Nancy Reagan, he describes Reagan as judicious, eager to hear both sides; a formidable reader who carries thick folders of reading material under his arm when he leaves the office for the family quarters around 4 p.m. daily; incapable of uttering an unkind word about others and in love with his job.

So Regan's Reagan: — Is aware of what he doesn't know. "He hesitates to ask questions or confess to a lack of knowledge in the presence of strangers," Regan wrote, "and thanks to the way his staff operated, nearly everyone was a stranger to this shy president except the members of his innermost circle."

— Would apologize for asking a basic — sometimes ever a startlingly basic — question about an arcane subject.

— Has a good working command of economics. "His grasp of basic economic theory as it had been taught in his time (Eureka College, class of '32) was excellent and he had kept abreast of later theory," Regan wrote. "He had no trouble understanding the leading ideas of the day, or in making reasonable judgments about the effects produced by policies based on Keynesian theory, of which he was deeply suspicious."

— Is a formidable reader and a talented conversationalist with a

gift for listening," and a man who, at heart, "is an old-fashioned, small-town American who believes what he reads in the papers."

— Gets in trouble because of his capacity to remember — and believe — everything that is told to him. "If someone told him (to use a wholly fictitious example) that there had been 35,987 hairs in Stalin's mustache, this fact would go into the presidential memory bank, possibly to emerge weeks or months later in the middle of a press conference," Regan wrote. "It never seemed to occur to him that anyone would give him incorrect information. His mind was a trove of facts and anecdotes, something like the morgue of one of his favorite magazines, Reader's Digest, and it was impossible to guess when or why he might access any one of these millions of bytes of data."

— Loves the routine of his job. Wrote Regan: "He regarded his daily schedule as being something like a shooting script in which characters came and went, scenes were rehearsed and acted out, and the plot was advanced one day at a time... If he was scheduled to receive a visitor at 10 o'clock, he would finish whatever else he was doing at 9:58, clear off his desk, clear his mind of whatever had gone before and prepare himself for the next scene."

Book could hurt U.S. image abroad

WASHINGTON (AP) — Foreigners, like Americans, are titillated and amused by revelations in former White House official Don Regan's book, but some experts say the out-of-school memoir is more than a laughing matter for the United States abroad.

"There is no doubt that his type of so-called revelations are harmful because... they give foreigners the impression that U.S. officials are not to be

trusted," says Richard Helms, the former CIA director. "This tends to erode their credibility."

Regan was White House chief of staff until he was forced out in early 1987, reportedly after a feud with first lady Nancy Reagan. His book, "For the Record," depicts President Reagan as a passive president loathe to make decisions and manipulated by a wife held hostage to the stars.

Walesa and 700 strikers sticking it out for Solidarity labor group

GDANSK, Poland (AP) — Lech Walesa said he and hundreds of striking workers at the Lenin shipyard are determined to hold out for their demands, and he told his comrades he still has a "couple of beautiful cards" to play.

"We'll win! We'll win!" 700 strikers shouted during a rally Monday at the shipyard led by Walesa, founder of the outlawed Solidarity labor movement.

Meanwhile, in Warsaw, opposition activists and workers reported a strike starting Monday at the Ursus tractor factory on the outskirts of the capital. But officials denied there was a strike and the report could not be verified.

Strikers at the Gdansk shipyard rejected a management offer of pay raises and reinstatement of some fired activists because the deal did not include a legally recognized chapter of Solidarity.

The independent union, the first in the Soviet bloc, was suppressed and then outlawed after martial law was declared Dec. 13, 1981.

Walesa spoke to the workers

before they were asked whether they wanted to continue the strike that began May 2. "I was afraid we were broken," he said. "But the mood is changing. People are coming back" to the strike. "Their wives are saying, 'You can't abandon them.'"

At a prayer meeting earlier Monday, Walesa told the strikers: "We're in good shape. Those who wanted to leave are gone. Only the tough ones are here."

Walesa, a shipyard electrician who founded Solidarity in the summer of 1980 and won the 1983 Nobel Peace Prize, and strike committee leader Alojzy Szablewski spoke at the 45-minute afternoon rally.

Szablewski said late Monday that Tadeusz Goculowski, the Roman Catholic bishop of Gdansk, was trying to get talks with management started again but there were no signs of resumption.

State television reported the workers' rejection of the management offer and said in an official commentary:

"The hint of hope for a positive

solution ... turned out to be illusory. The organizers of the illegal strike are rejecting every initiative for a conciliatory and humanitarian settlement."

Poland's communist government has not ruled out using force to end the strike. A pre-dawn police raid last Thursday crushed a 10-day strike by steel workers at Nowa Huta in southern Poland.

Western reporters who were at the 11,000-worker Lenin shipyard late Sunday said about 300 strikers remained. Their number appeared to have more than doubled by the time Walesa spoke at midafternoon Monday.

"If I can find a way to win this strike, I'll have a second Nobel in the pocket," Walesa told the rally. He added: "I have a couple of beautiful cards in my hands that I haven't played yet."

Rejection of the settlement offer came after talks that lasted more than four hours and ended soon after 8 a.m. A morning rally ended with the crowd chanting: "There is no freedom without Solidarity!"

The second rally was held because the strike committee said it wanted the workers to give the matter more thought. A mediator, lawyer Wladyslaw Sila-Nowicki, also advised them to reconsider the proposal, but the strikers again rejected it.

Sila-Nowicki said he had spoken several times with Gen. Czeslaw Kiszczak, the interior minister. The lawyer said Kiszczak assured the workers they would not be prosecuted or fired for striking if they took the offer.

Sila-Nowicki said management had agreed to a joint commission of strike committee members and management to oversee implementation of the agreement. Management had rejected that point Sunday.

Management agreed to a \$38 monthly pay raise, but the total included some raises already promised, and said Solidarity activists fired after the imposition of martial law in 1981 would be rehired as needed. Martial law was lifted later, replaced with tough new regulations.

Pay at the Lenin shipyard averages \$106 monthly.

becoming a sticky one for Bush; Noriega, and the Reagan administration's dealings with him.

"Who was dealing with him and why?" Dukakis said. "Were we paying him and if so why? I can tell you one thing: If I'm the president we won't be doing business with drug-running Panamanian dictators."

Questions about Bush and Noriega flared up anew when The New York Times, quoting unidentified administration officials, said Sunday that the former U.S. ambassador to Panama, Everett E. Briggs, had told Bush in December 1985 about the allegations. But Briggs, now posted to Honduras, told reporters he had not presented Bush with evidence of

a Noriega-drug link.

Bush spokesman Peter Teeley said Monday that Bush was aware of rumors of drug involvement by the Noriega government prior to Noriega's indictment. Teeley said the reports were unsubstantiated, and Panama was one of a number of countries about which there were such reports.

Dukakis' meeting with Bradley was the first in a series of talks the governor has scheduled with Democratic congressional leaders this week. He is scheduled to meet Thursday in Washington with House Speaker Jim Wright of Texas and Senate Majority Leader Robert Byrd of West Virginia.

Books like Regan's "diminish the president's stature, and for the rest of the Western world, so much depends on the president's prestige," said Henry Brandon, longtime Washington correspondent for the London Sunday Times and now a visiting scholar at the Brookings Institution, a liberal think tank.

With a U.S.-Soviet summit in Moscow less than a month away, one Soviet scholar said the book — particularly details of Mrs. Reagan's penchant for astrology — provides fodder for the Russian propaganda machine.

Perhaps more damaging, though, is that the revelations may reinforce the perception Soviets have of Americans as a weird, superstitious and somewhat untrustworthy breed, said Jerry Hough, a professor at Duke University and the author of a just-published book, "Russia and the West: Gorbachev and the Politics of Reform."

Survival rate up for lupus patients

ATLANTA (AP) — Over the past two decades, the 10-year survival rates of people with systemic lupus erythematosus (lupus) have increased from about 60 percent to nearly 95 percent, according to the Arthritis Foundation.

Lupus is a disease in which the body's defense system causes cells to attack the lining of joints and other tissues. If severe, it can damage the joints, skin, kidneys, brain, nervous system or heart. It is one of the few arthritis-related diseases that can be fatal.

The improvement in life expectancy is largely due to researchers identifying various stages of the disease that respond to individualized treatment, the foundation says.

Hereford athletes are honored

Hereford High School's athletes were recognized and honored at the all-sports banquet Monday night at the Bull Barn.

Fourteen athletes received special awards, including Kevin Hansen and Amy Coneway who were named athletes of the year. Hansen received the media awards for both boys' basketball and boys' tennis, and Coneway received the media award for girls' golf.

The "Fighting Heart" award winners were Macros Brown, boys, and Nancy Garza, girls. Brown was the media award winner in boys' track and Garza received the media award for girls' cross country.

Two athletes were honored with the Casey Smith Memorial Award — Lee Young and Elia Hernandez.

The other media award winners, the outstanding athletes in each HHS sport, were: Michael Phibbs, football; Robby Collier, baseball; Tricia Kahlich, volleyball and girls' basketball; Bridget Baker and Wendy Connolly, girls' tennis; Jason Bullard, boys' golf; Daphne Roddy, girls' track; and Benny Carrasco, boys' cross country.

N.R. Jones received the "Fan of the Year" award from the Whiteface Booster Club.

Here is a summary of the achievements of the athletes who received the special awards at the banquet:

KEVIN HANSEN

Hansen, the media award winner for boys' tennis and boys' basketball, will compete in the state tennis tournament in Austin this week.

A varsity tennis player for three years, he helped lead Hereford to district team tennis championships the last two fall seasons. He was a regional qualifier in boys' singles in both his junior and senior years.

The district and regional champion this year, Hansen has a 28-3 record. He won the boys' singles titles at the Hereford, Odessa, and Snyder tournaments.

Hansen was also on the Hereford varsity basketball team for three seasons, starting every game his junior and senior years.

He shot 42 percent from the field and better than 70 percent from the free throw line those two seasons. As a junior, Hansen led the team in assists and averaged 9.8 points, 5.1 rebounds and 2.6 steals per game and was named honorable mention all-district.

In his senior season, Hansen led Hereford with 5.7 assists per game and 4.9 steals per game. He led the team in three-point goals and also in the margin of steals to turnovers with a plus 66. The next highest margin on the team was a plus 24.

The second leading scorer on the team his senior season, Hansen averaged 11 points per game. His honors included second team all-district and the all-tournament team in the Clovis holiday tournament.

"Kevin's great quickness and desire found him guarding the opposition's top scorers in each game. Kevin excels in the classroom also. His 97.4 grade average has him ranked in the top 20 of his class," Coach Mike Fields said.

Hansen was named to the academic all-state basketball team by the Texas High School Basketball Coaches Association. "This is a great reward for many hard years of work Kevin has put into both his basketball and his schoolwork," Fields said.

AMY CONEWAY

Coneway placed first among all golfers in District 1-4A to help lead Hereford to the district championship. She had an average score of 82 in the district rounds.

A three-year letter winner in golf, Coneway was the first place medalist in three tournaments her senior year — Big Spring, Andrews and Hereford. She was second in the Amarillo tournament. Her tournament average

was 82.8.

After finishing third in the regional tournament her junior year, Coneway won the second place medal at the regional tournament this year. As a team, Hereford placed second in the regional tournament this year.

Coneway and her teammates will compete in the state tournament in Austin this week. Hereford won the district 1-4A championship by 108 strokes over second place Borger.

Also a district medalist her junior year, Coneway helped lead Hereford to team titles in both the Hereford tournament and Amarillo tournament this year.

MARCUS BROWN

Brown, a three-year letterman in boys' track, was the team captain his senior year and a member of the 400-meter relay team and 1,600-meter relay team.

Also a sprinter and long jumper for the HHS boys' track team, Brown was a member of the 400-meter relay team which set a school record of 42.4 seconds in the 1987 season.

"Marcus is one of the best athletes in Hereford High School history. He is a dedicated and very hard working athlete," Coach Ron Young said.

Brown was also a varsity athlete in football and basketball. He signed a letter of intent to play college football for Angelo State University.

Coach Danny Haney said, "His heart's as big as Texas. He achieved far beyond his size (5-foot-4). He was a sophomore phenomenon in class 5A football."

Brown has the fourth best average yards per game rushing in school history, 927 yards in nine games for 103 yards per game his senior year. He averaged 6.6 yards per carry and scored nine touchdowns. He also caught seven passes for 86 yards.

In basketball, Brown was a starter his junior and senior years. In his senior season, he averaged 7.5 points, 2.6 assists and 2.3 steals per game and scored 14 three-point goals.

NANCY GARZA

Nancy Garza was the girls' cross country team captain for all three years of her high school athletic career. In eight invitational meets her senior season, Garza placed second four times, third twice, fourth once and fifth once.

She won the District 1-4A championship and the Region 1-4A cham-

ampionship, and placed third in the state meet. Garza was the first Hereford runner to win a medal in the state meet.

"Nancy has had more success than any other distance runner at Hereford High School. She has been a leader, especially this year, in setting the tone for the rest of the team," Coach Martha Emerson said.

Garza was named to the all-state team the last two years, a team of 15 runners chosen by the Texas Track and Field News. The HHS girls' cross country team won the district and regional meets and placed fourth in the state meet.

It was the first time that a Hereford High School team qualified for the state meet.

Garza won three gold medals in the district track meet this spring, in the 1,600-meter run, the 3,200-meter relay and as a member of the 1,600-meter relay team.

At the regional meet, Garza placed third in both distance runs, and the relay team placed fifth.

LEE YOUNG

Young was named to the all-district football second team as a linebacker his senior season. A captain of the Whiteface football team, he competed in field events on the boys' track team his senior year.

He was an honorable mention player of the week, named by the Amarillo Globe-News, during the 1987 season. Young is president of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes at Hereford High School.

Coach Don Cumpton said, "Lee is most qualified for the Casey Smith Memorial Award because he followed in the footsteps of Casey Smith. Neither Casey nor Lee made the varsity football team as sophomores, but this did not deter Lee or Casey, but made them very determined."

"Just as Casey had done before him, Lee set a goal for himself. During the offseason after his sophomore year he began to work harder than he had ever worked before. Lee never once took his eyes off the goal he had set for himself."

"The hard work and long hours paid off when he made the varsity football team his junior year."

Young led the Whiteface football team with 107 tackles his senior season. He had seven tackles for losses, one interception, knocked down four passes, hurried two

passes, cause one fumble and recovered one fumble, and had one quarterback sack.

ELIA HERNANDEZ

Hernandez is a cross country and track athlete. Her coach, Martha Emerson, wrote of her: "Elia has been the backbone of the cross country and track teams this year. Her positive leadership, in a very passive way, has been vital to the success of both programs."

"Elia is a very caring and giving person. The other person always comes first with her. Honesty, integrity, hard work, and doing whatever it takes to get a job done are just an everyday part of her life."

"She helps, encourages, and congratulates each and every competitor to help them improve. Elia is a very positive motivator, by action and word."

Coach Emerson noted that Hernandez "did not contribute any points in either sport her first two years, but she never quit when things got tough or she or someone else was down. It was time to work a little harder to improve. This year Elia was definitely a contributing member of the girls' cross country team."

MICHAEL PHIBBS

Phibbs is a three-year letterman in football who started the last two seasons at the linebacker position. He was the leading tackler for the Whitefaces as a junior and the second leading tackler as a senior.

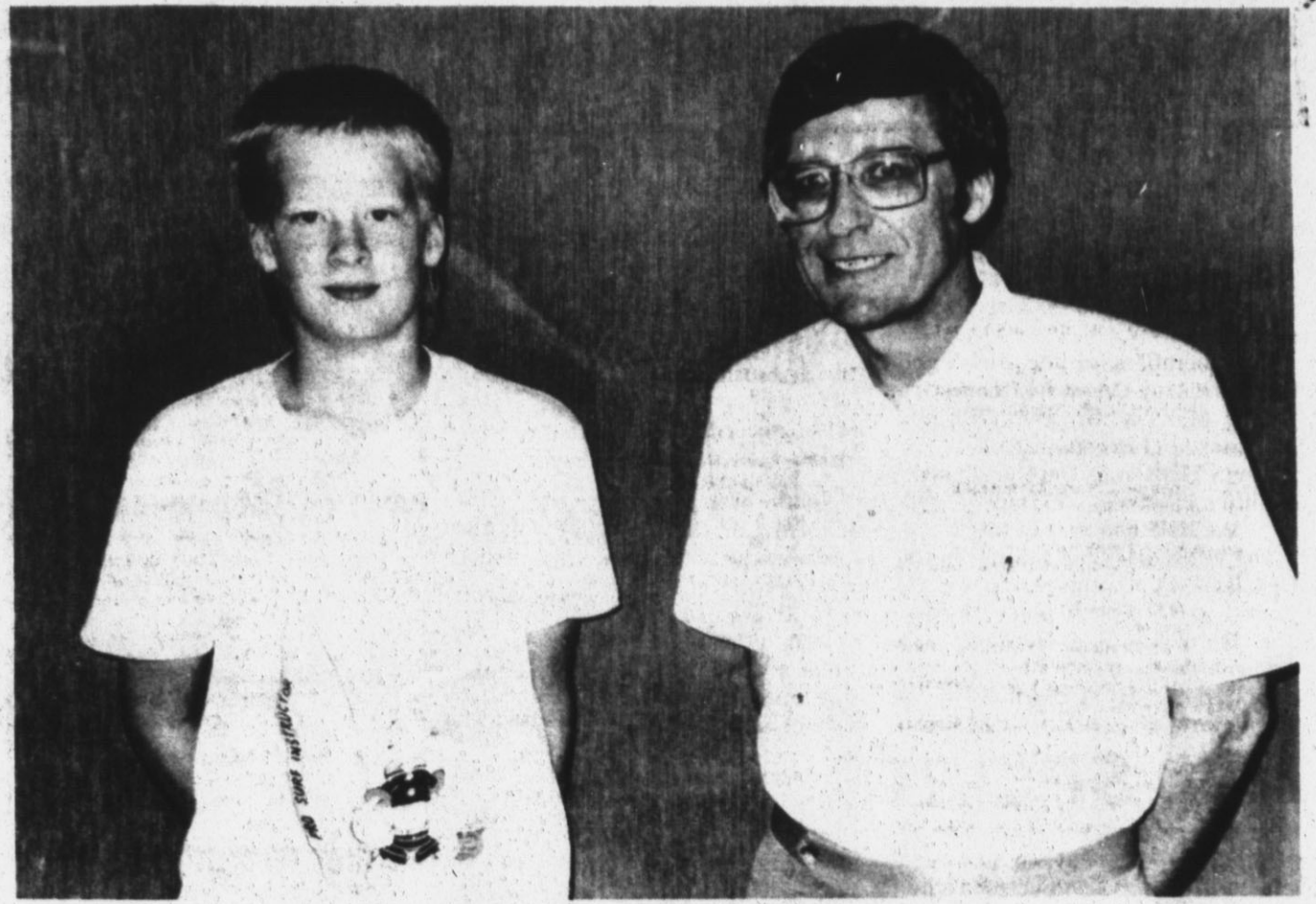

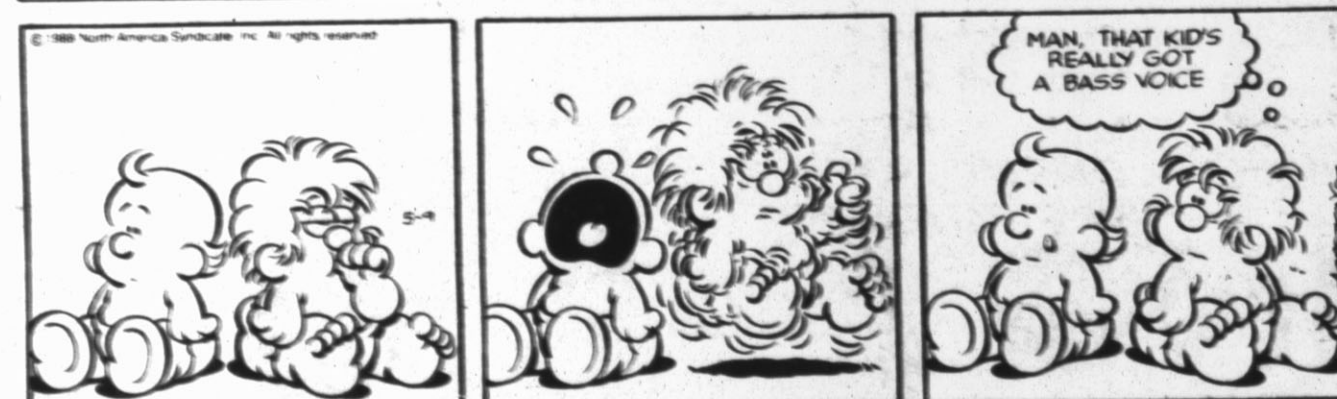

TECH MED SCHOOL APPEARS SAFE

AUSTIN — When those who don't know much about medical education go casting about for a medical school to close, they always seem to find the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center a suitable whipping boy.

Scores of editorials and articles, generally written by the uninformed, point to the high cost of educating students at the Tech Medical School and Texas' alleged surplus of physicians as sound reasons for closing the Health Sciences Center. These critics say that since Texas has too many doctors, medical schools should be closed. And, they reason, if Tech is the most expensive of the medical schools, it should be the first to go.

Well, that argument may be nonsense, but it's widely circulated nonsense. No wonder so many people associated with the Tech Health Sciences Center became concerned last year when the Legislature created the Select Committee on Medical, Dental and Allied Health Education.

We received many letters from people who wondered whether the Legislature actually had begun to listen to the inaccurate criticism of the Health Sciences Center and had created the select committee to help lawmakers justify the center's closing.

Fortunately, we had good news for all those who inquired. The Legislature doesn't base its decisions on flimsy research; it bases them on hard facts. The hard facts show that the Tech Health Sciences Center is performing well beyond original expectations. Here's two reasons why:

*Members of the select committee and the Legislature recognize that while Texas as a whole has a surplus of doctors, rural areas — especially rural West Texas — needs more

doctors. Tech has been more than fulfilling its mission to educate doctors for West Texas.

In 1975, the year before Tech graduated its first medical class, there was only one physician for every 1,100 people in the 22 counties in and around Amarillo. By 1984, the ratio was one doctor for every 760 people. Around Lubbock, Tech's home base, there was one doctor for every 1,000 people in 1975. In 1984, that had improved to one for every 750 people.

*The high cost of educating students at Tech is something of a misrepresentation. True, the cost per student at Tech is higher than other state medical schools, but the structure of the Health Sciences Center is unique among Texas institutions.

When the Legislature created the center in 1969, it decided the center should be split among four locations. Students would study their first two years at the main campus in Lubbock and then spend their last two years — the so-called clinical years — at one of the regional clinics located in Amarillo, Lubbock, El Paso and Odessa.

The logic is that only by having four centers can the medical school adequately meet its mandate to serve the vast West Texas region. To that end, the unique structure has worked well, but it also has increased the overall cost of operating the Health Sciences Center.

It's easy, then, to see why neither the select committee nor the Legislature appear inclined to take any harsh action against the Tech Health Sciences Center. Both have dug beyond the superficial arguments against the center and studied the real facts. Those facts alone should make the center safe.
