TEXAS BAPTISTS CONVENE

Convention Now Being Held at San Antonio-Blg Attendance Reported.

San Antonio, Nov. 5 .- Hundreds of ministers of the Baptist denomination from all over Texas are here today for a ministerial conference, preceding the general convention of the church, which opens Thursday. Rev. Jeff D. Ray of Waco, who has been chairman for many years, will preside over the conference. The principal matters to be brought before the general convention will relate to state, home and foreign missions, and the educational institutions of the Baptist church in Texas.

Of these there are many, including Baylor university at Waco, Baylor Female college at Belton, Howard-Payne college at Brownwood, Decatur college at Decatur, Burleson college at Greenville, East Texas institute at Rusk, Canadian academy at Canadian and Goodnight college at Goodnight. All these institutions are under the direction of the Baptist educational commission. A report will also be made upon the Baptist memorial sanitarium at Dallas, which will soon be completed at a cost of \$150,000. About 2,500 delegates are expected at the general convention, and it is expected that the unofficial visitors will swell the number to at least 5,000.



How to Get Into an Upset Cance. Many a boatman's life has been saved because he has been able to get back safely into a boat or canoe after an upset. The recovery of an overset canoe is a delicate process, but one that can easily be learned.

In the group of pictures illustrating this column the various steps in the



recovery of the canoe are shown, perhaps much plainer than could be done

The first diagram shows how to grasp the canoe for the jump. No. 2 illustrates the little leap by which the canoeist puts his weight evenly on the boat. In No. 3 he is rolling gently into the bottom of the craft. No. 4 shows the canoeist in full possession and ready to ball it out.


