Industrial board works on masa mill

Boasted by letters from 145 farmers who indicated support of a corn meal plant, the industrial development committee of Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce is still answering questions "almost daily" for an international milling company that is considering Hereford as a site for a new plant.

Ken Rogers, committee chairman, said the response "was beyond our expectations." Potential contract growers indicated they could produce some 40,000 acres of corn for the plant, which cited a need for at least 30,000 acres.

The company has not formally announced if it has narrowed its site selection, but we feel very strongly that we are a top candidate," Rogers said Thursday following an industrial development committee meeting at the chamber office.

The proposed milling plant would employ approximately 150 people and use 250 million pounds of corn per year. Four other Panhandle cities, including Dimmitt and Plainview, and an Arizona site have been competing for the new industry.

The company would produce corn masa meal—a high-quality meal used to make corn chips, taco shells, tortillas, nacho chips, etc. Jerry Walsh,

the local Frito-Lay manager, says his company is highly supportive of the new industry. He added that they are not in direct competition.

Rogers said community support for the new industry had been "great." Mike Carr, C of C executive vice president, said his office has been sending additional information "almost daily" to the company. The plant is projected as an \$18 to \$20 million facility, and the company would need about half that amount in longterm financing.

During the committee meeting here Thursday, members discussed possible incentives that might be offered if the company narrows the choice down to Hereford and another site or two. The committee also heard Rogers and Carr report on several other industrial prospects.

Two of them are considering the Swift plant as a site and both are involved in producing packaged frozen foods.

Wall defends bailouts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The top federal savings and loan regulator is defending his agency against congressional charges that it is overstepping its authority in issuing billions of dollars in notes to rescue insolvent institutions.

In just the last three weeks the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, which regulates the nation's 3,000 S&Ls, has pledged more than \$12 billion to prevent the failures of 48 savings institutions, most of them in the oil-dependent Southwest.

Half of that assistance was in interest-paying promissory notes, bringing the total of notes issued by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp. to \$10.7 billion.

Members of the House Banking Committee have expressed fear that regulators will pile up so much debt that a taxpayer bailout of the FSLIC, which gets its money through an assessment on the industry, will be inevitable.

"It was never the intent of Congress to give an open checkbook to any governmental agency," said Rep. Toby Roth, R-Wis., who vowed never to vote for tax money to bail out the industry.

Rep. Stan Parris, R-Va., complained that other types of assistance offered by the bank board, including various guarantees against loss, are too open-ended.

"It's like giving my kids my credit card," he said.

However, bank board chairman M. Danny Wall told the committee Thursday that the notes are the most cost-effective way of assisting insolvent institutions. They are tax-free and thus the bank board has to pay less interest than on its other borrowings, he said.

"These are costs that will have to be paid by someone somehow," he said. "A couple of months ago we were being criticized for not being fast enough."

Wall was backed by Rep. Richard H. Lehman, D-Calif., who said, "I think you find yourself here today somewhat in a 'damned if you do, fanned if you don't' type of situation."

Other members of the committee accused the regulators of trying to postpone the resolution of the savings and loan crisis until after Reagan administration officials have left office.

The plan "seems to be nothing more than a massive shell game," said Rep. Charles E. Schumer, D-N.Y. "Many of these institutions will ultimately have to be bailed out again at even greater cost to the taxpayer."

Schumer said the strategy would only "postpone the day on which the bill for this crisis becomes due until long after the members of the current administration have left Washington and are sitting on a beach somewhere."

Rep. Fernand St Germain, D-R.I., chairman of the committee, and Rep. Henry Gonzalez, D-Texas, criticized Treasury Undersecretary George D. Gould, in particular, for maintaining that the FSLIC needs no new money, at least through next year.

Gould bristled at the criticism and noted that when the administration in early 1986 proposed a plan to bring \$25 billion into FSLIC from the industry, Congress delayed action and finally allowed less than had been requested.

Wall has estimated the cost of cleaning up the savings industry at \$31 billion, well within FSLIC revenue projections of \$42 billion over 10 years.

However, Wall said Thursday that the bank board in the next 30 days to 45 days would be increasing its estimate of cleaning up problems in Texas, where most of the industry's problems are concentrated. As of the end of last year, it estimated the cost at \$7 billion, but since has increased that to \$15.2 billion.

Wall is asking Congress to put the full faith and credit of the U.S. government behind the FSLIC notes. He maintains that his agency has the legal right to issue as many notes as it wants, but he said it would not issue more than \$16 billion.

He also indicated that before the end of the month, the bank board will issue more notes. In September, he said, the bank board intends to resolve the cases of another 65 insolvent institutions, bringing the agency's case resolutions to about 100.

NTSB questions Delta 'protection'

DALLAS (AP) — Officials with the National Transportation Safety Board say the Air Line Pilots Association and Delta Air Lines have been overprotective of the crew of Delta Flight 1141, and want to interview the pilot soon.

The pilot, Capt. Larry Davis, is recuperating from facial and back injuries in Dallas' Parkland Memorial Hospital.

Investigators trying to find out why the plane crashed Aug. 31 at Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport, killing 13 of 108 people on board, haven't yet spoken with Davis. But he has spoken with visitors from his hometown of Greenville, including members of his church.

"It seems like everybody's been able to talk to him except us," the Dallas Morning News today quoted

an anonymous safety board official as saying.

The Wall Street Journal reported Thursday that several government officials were frustrated that officials from both Delta and the ALPA were with 1141 co-pilot Carey Kirkland and flight engineer Steven Judd from the day of the accident, while investigators were kept away for several days.

But Delta officials said they were not trying to prevent the NTSB from interviewing the crew and confronted the federal officials in a conference call Thursday.

High-ranking officials at the NTSB said they are aware of no complaints or problems with Delta's cooperation, but they're going to the field people, investigators and see if there is a problem," Delta spokesman Bill Berry said.

Quayle unwelcome at Ohio steel plant

Steelworkers say they want to jerk the welcome mat from an Ohio plant that Republican vice presidential candidate Dan Quayle is visiting today, while Democrat Michael Dukakis was giving his opponents 60 days' notice that the White House would lock its gates to Republicans.

Quayle's visit to the Mercury Stainless Corp. plant in Massillon, Ohio, follows a day in which he, Vice President George Bush and Dukakis laid out their foreign policy and defense outlooks to a variety of audiences.

Quayle, the Indiana senator, was using the trip to the former Republic Steel plant to demonstrate how the Job Training Partnership Act he co-sponsored with Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., helped a depressed steel industry.

Since reopening in 1986 after Republic's bankruptcy, the company has rehired 88 workers under the act, said Gerald Parker, Mercury's

manager of labor relations and personnel. The bill provides government funding for up to half an employee's salary for 12 weeks to 16 weeks.

But Joe Coyle, director of United Steel Workers Local 1124 in Massillon, said, "Members of this community are outraged about his coming here. Quayle is in opposition to everything working people stand for."

Coyle said Reagan administration policies promote mergers and unfair competition from foreign competitors and caused the bankruptcy of the previous operator of the mill, Republic Steel's Enduro division.

"We think he should continue to address Rotaries and women's clubs but stay out of our plants," said spokesman Gary Hubbard from the union's national headquarters in Pittsburgh.

Dukakis received a friendly greeting when the Massachusetts governor visited a General Motors Corp. engine plant in Tonawanda, N.Y., near Buffalo.

The Dukakis campaign had prepared pink slips for today to show that the election is 60 days off, the notice period required under legislation opposed by the Reagan administration that would require notification of plant closings.

Dukakis, visiting Texas today on Bush's heels, was in Manhattan on Thursday night with his running mate, Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, for a gala fund-raiser. The event yielded more than \$5 million for the Democratic Party, Dukakis money raiser Robert Farmer said.

The vice president flew to Illinois after witnessing the first destruction of a set of Pershing missile rocket engines under the new U.S.-Soviet agreement to ban intermediate-range nuclear weapons.

At a rally later in Tyler, Texas, Bush criticized Dukakis for his past support of a freeze on nuclear weapons. "He wanted to restrain us, not the Soviet Union," Bush said.

Firefighters' hopes raised

YELLOWSTONE NATIONAL PARK, Wyo. (AP) — A chance of rain and snow raised firefighters' hopes in matchstick-dry Yellowstone National Park, but high winds threatened to spread fires that have charred 1.2 million acres and all but closed the tourist mecca.

"A lot of acreage could burn" over the weekend, David Freeland, a command staffer on a 221,000-acre fire, said Thursday as firefighters extinguished flareups near Old Faithful geyser in the oldest national park.

Residents of Cooke City and Silver Gate, Mont., just northeast of the park, who were among 150 townspeople evacuated Tuesday, were told to leave again Thursday night for fear of flareups in the 119,000-acre Storm Creek-Hellroaring fire.

"They knew when they came back in that this could happen," fire information officer Craig Flentie said in Cooke City. A fire along U.S. 212, the

main road into town, forced authorities to close the highway.

All but a small section of the 2.2 million-acre park was closed to visitors to ensure an open path for fire trucks and to protect tourists from roaring flames that have blackened 1.2 million acres in and around Yellowstone.

Elsewhere, near the eastern Utah town of Whitehocks, a 12,000-acre brushfire destroyed five homes and cabins and forced the evacuation of more than 20 families, officials said.

Fires also burned in Alaska, Idaho and Washington. Wildfires have blackened 3.65 million acres, an area larger than Connecticut, in what federal officials have called the worst fire season in 30 years.

President Reagan directed Agriculture Secretary Richard Lyng, Interior Secretary Donald Hodel and Deputy Defense Secretary William H. Taft IV to visit the western states this weekend and

assess the situation, said White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater. They were to leave for Yellowstone today.

Congress passed a bill Thursday clearing the way for Canada to help battle wildfires with firefighters, aircraft and other equipment. Reagan was expected to sign the bill allowing the U.S. Forest Service to reimburse Canada for its help today, according to the office of Rep. Dick Cheney, R-Wyo.

Canada has 35 planes ready and available, said House Agriculture Committee staffers.

The weekend forecast for Yellowstone called for winds increasing to 40 mph by Sunday, with gusts up to 50 mph.

Freeland said the result could be worse than Aug. 20, when winds whipped blazes over thousands of acres in the worst day of the year for firefighters.

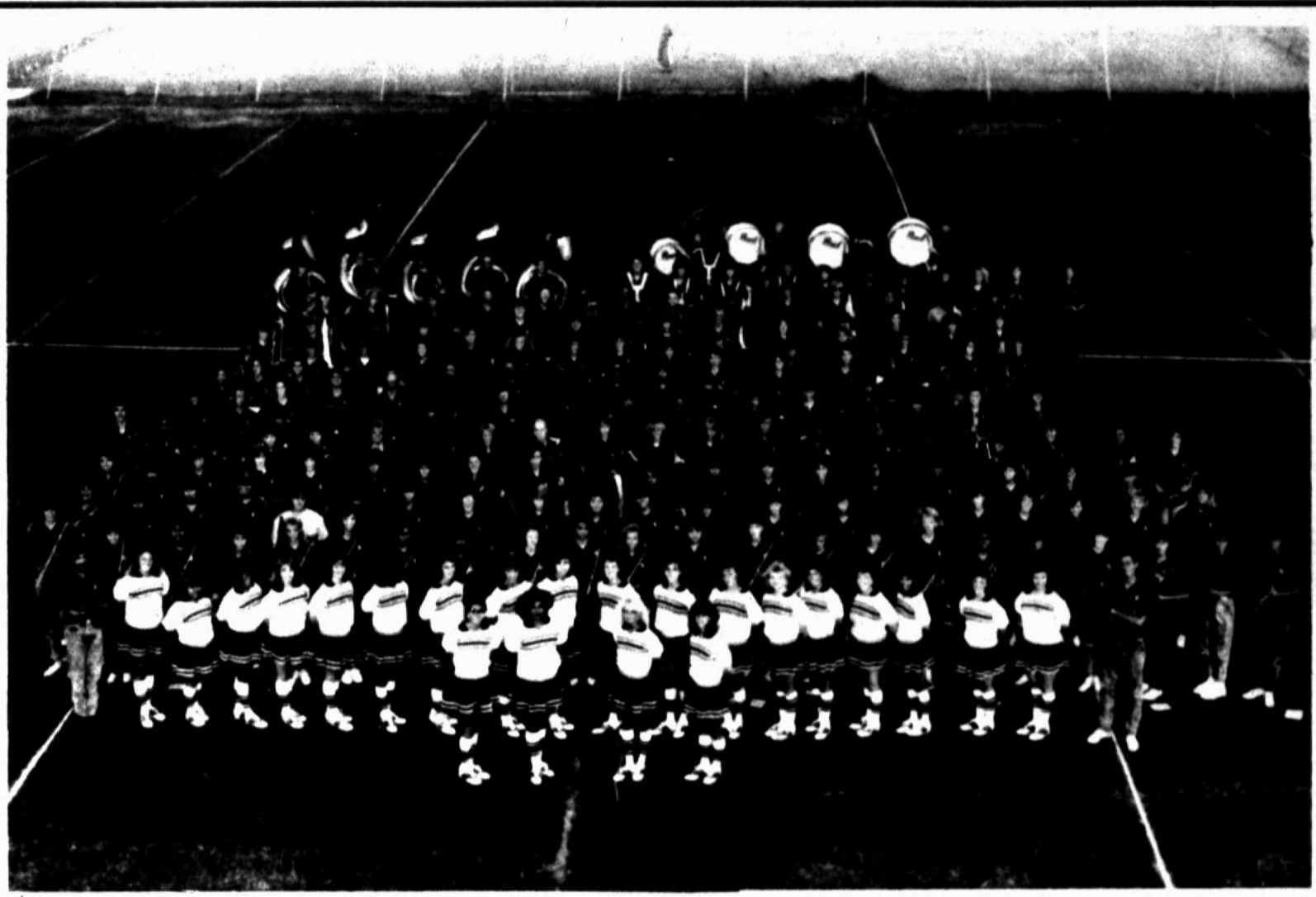

Iraq using poison gas on Kurdish

US pointing finger

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States is accusing Iraq of staging "horrifying" poison gas attacks on Kurdish civilians, and Congress is being asked to cut off all U.S. aid and military sales to the Middle Eastern country.

Despite Iraqi denials, Secretary of State George P. Shultz on Thursday threatened to reverse the recent improvement in U.S. relations with Iraq.

On Capitol Hill, the chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee moved for a broad range of sanctions against Iraq, including a cutoff of U.S. aid, military support and oil purchases.

Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., introduced a resolution calling for the sanctions and accusing Iraq of "an act of genocide, a crime abhorred by civilized people everywhere and banned under international law."

Until Thursday, the State Department had said it could find no evidence to substantiate reports that the Iraqis had used poison gas against the Kurds, a non-Arab minority group inside Iraq.

But at the daily press briefing, spokesman Charles E. Redman declared in a tough statement that the allegations were true and called the Iraqi campaign "abhorrent."

Shultz then held a 50-minute session with Sadoon Hamadi, the Iraqi minister of state for foreign affairs who called to provide an account of spurring negotiations to end the Persian Gulf war with Iran.

Redman issued a statement afterward saying Shultz had accused Iraq of an "unjustified and abhorrent" military campaign against Iraqi Kurds. A U.S. official, who demanded anonymity, said Shultz also accused Iraq of "horrifying" behavior.

Pell's resolution would ban all U.S. aid to Iraq, sales of U.S. military equipment and provision of credit or credit guarantees. It would prohibit the transfer of sensitive technology to Iraq and bar the import of Iraqi petroleum products into the United States.

It also would instruct the U.S. representative to the United Nations to vote against all loans to Iraq.

Redman declined to say whether the State Department was prepared to take action against Iraq in the commercial field.

Bush helped found halfway house

AUSTIN (AP) — Republican presidential nominee George Bush, who portrays Democratic opponent Michael Dukakis as soft on crime for granting furloughs to prison inmates, provided key help in the founding of a Houston halfway house for parolees, a newspaper reports.

The halfway house has admitted hundreds of felons each year after they receive parole or early release from the Texas Department of Corrections, the Houston Chronicle said in a copyright story published Thursday.

The operation, which was praised by Vice President Bush when it received a presidential award for volunteer service in 1982, apparently is well-managed and well-regarded in the community, the paper said. But one of its residents raped and

murdered the wife of a Pasadena minister the year before the citation from the White House, the Chronicle reported.

The overcrowding crisis that has turned the state prison system into a revolving door developed years after Bush, then a U.S. House member from Houston, helped respected ex-convict J.D. Sonny Wells obtain seed money in the late 1960s to establish the non-profit organization, New Directions. The organization, now a United Way agency, operates three facilities for former prisoners.

New Directions, started in 1968 and chartered in 1970, initially accepted only individuals who had been discharged from prison after completing their sentences, executive director Pat McCoy said. But in 1971, it started accepting parolees, the

numbers of whom have increased because of a U.S. court order to ease overcrowding in state prisons.

Bush was so committed to helping Wells in 1969 that he wrote two letters urging that the River Oaks Rotary Club help him start the home.

In a letter to club officer Fred W. Melcher Jr., then a Houston bank executive, Bush said Wells was "extremely interested in the rehabilitation of convicts, particularly Negro convicts."

"It seems that when they come out of the pen, they have very little money in their pockets and there are very few good places for them to stay," Bush said in the letter.

Bush said he met Wells working on a Christmas fund drive. "He is vitally interested in helping the poor. He is a wonderful man with stars in his

eyes," wrote Bush, who followed up with June 30 letter to repeat his request that the club help Wells.

Dukakis, as governor of Massachusetts, administers the state's prison furlough program, instituted by a Republican predecessor, that allows the temporary release of convicted felons, some of whom aren't yet eligible for parole.

Halfway houses such as New Directions were designed to provide a place for parolees and other offenders to live under limited supervision while obtaining jobs and otherwise making the transition back to society.

McCoy acknowledged that some of New Direction's residents, who average only 65 days in the facility before being discharged, probably

should still be in prison and aren't because of the pressure on state officials to keep the prison population within TDC's capacity, the Chronicle reported.

"Knowing their behavior once they left here, I would say, Yes," he said. "But I don't know how anybody can set themselves up as God."

Bush has criticized Dukakis for granting furloughs to murderers, rapists and other violent criminals, including a convicted killer named William Horton who failed to return from his 10th furlough in 1976 and terrorized a couple in Maryland.

"As governor, Dukakis gave murderers, drug dealers and other violent criminals weekend passes to get out of prison," states a brochure mailed to 300,000 Texas households by the Republican campaign this week.

First Hispanic in Cabinet

Ex-Tech president likely to be education secretary

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional officials say Texas Tech University President Lauro F. Cavazos should have no trouble winning Senate confirmation as the next education secretary, which would make him the first Hispanic ever appointed to the Cabinet.

The Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee was scheduled to take up Cavazos' nomination this morning.

"I don't think it's going to be controversial at all," said Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, who will introduce Cavazos. "You're talking about the dean of a major medical school, the president of a great university, who has served this nation on numerous boards and commissions around the world. He is clearly loved by everybody that knows him. This (confirmation) is a certainty."

Adds a Senate education subcommittee staff member: "I don't anticipate he'll have any trouble. There's a very good chance it will be unanimous."

The staffer said that a strong vote

would likely herald a quick and easy confirmation in the full Senate, possibly next week.

President Reagan announced in August he was nominating the 61-year-old son of a foreman at the fabled King Ranch of South Texas to replace Education Secretary William Bennett, who leaves office later this month.

Cavazos would only serve until January when the next administration takes over, unless the new president reappoints him to the post. He is the first Hispanic to serve as president of Texas Tech, a 24,000-student university in Lubbock. He also serves as the president of its medical school, but is not a medical doctor.

Rep. Larry Combest, a Lubbock Republican, says Cavazos is a hands-on educator who understands the administrative side of education and is used to grappling with tight budgets,

while at the same time seeing things from the students' point of view.

A registered Democrat, Cavazos is on the record in support of student aid and opposed to cuts in assistance. He is described as a skilled administrator, a delegator and a consensus-builder.

"His leadership in education on a nationwide basis is well known," Gramm said. "He's a great man from a great family. He was born on the King Ranch, his daddy was a cowboy and he has gone to become one of the great education leaders in America. It shows you the American dream is alive and well. I never have once doubted that, but I always love seeing proof."

Known informally as Larry, Cavazos is one of three brothers who left the King Ranch to attend what was then Texas Technological College.

Songwriters put talents into photos

LUBBOCK (AP) — Driving endless miles of highway, staying up late after a honky-tonk gig and waiting for fame and fortune have long provided fodder for country music songwriters.

But five products of Lubbock's storied music scene have drawn on that imagery to create art to be seen instead of heard.

Their photographs, paintings and drawings are appearing in a show called "West Texas Homecoming," examples of country kitsch that also reflect the artists' travels abroad, where they're more widely known than in their native country.

Joe Ely, Jimmie Dale Gilmore, Butch Hancock and Terry Allen all grew up together in Lubbock during the 1960's and now reside in Austin. The fifth musician-artist featured in the show, Sonny Curtis of Nashville, is a product of an earlier era of Lubbock music and played with Buddy Holly's band, the Crickets.

Rough pen-and-ink drawings in a grouping called "Guitar Case Journal" marks the first public exhibition for Ely, a critically acclaimed artist whose commercial success in the United States hasn't yet matched that in England. The drawings, most of people he's met while rambling, were taken from small notebooks carried in his guitar case and sandwiched between scribbles of songs.

"A lot of it was for my own entertainment in the endless hours that you're stranded somewhere."

Hancock, one of Ely's principal collaborators, contributed "Crossroads," a composite of 72 black-and-white photographs taken while driving down the road to pass the hours.

"I don't recommend anybody trying this in their own car. It should be attempted only by deranged professionals," he said, grinning.

Allen, a songwriter and artist whose visual works have been displayed internationally, explores the link between songwriting and art in his mixed media piece "Secrets," in which jottings of dos and don'ts for aspiring songwriters surround an abstract central image.

Curtis, famous for writing classics such as "I Fought the Law" and "Walk Right Back," exhibits a color photograph of his daughter, perched demurely on a swivel chair.

A musician blending traditional country music with folk, Gilmore painted a primitive watercolor self-portrait surrounded by a frame decorated with guitar picks, flowers and candy bars, constructed by Ely.

Allen, Gilmore, Hancock and Ely are longtime friends from nights spent playing Lubbock honky-tonks.

"Probably the common thread between me, Butch, Jimmie and Terry is growing up here, kind of breaking through it all and keeping our sanity just by either writing or drawing or playing music," he said.

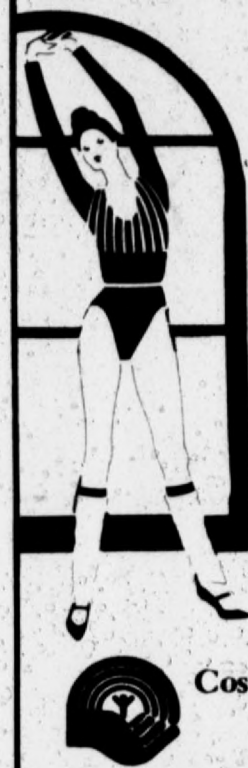

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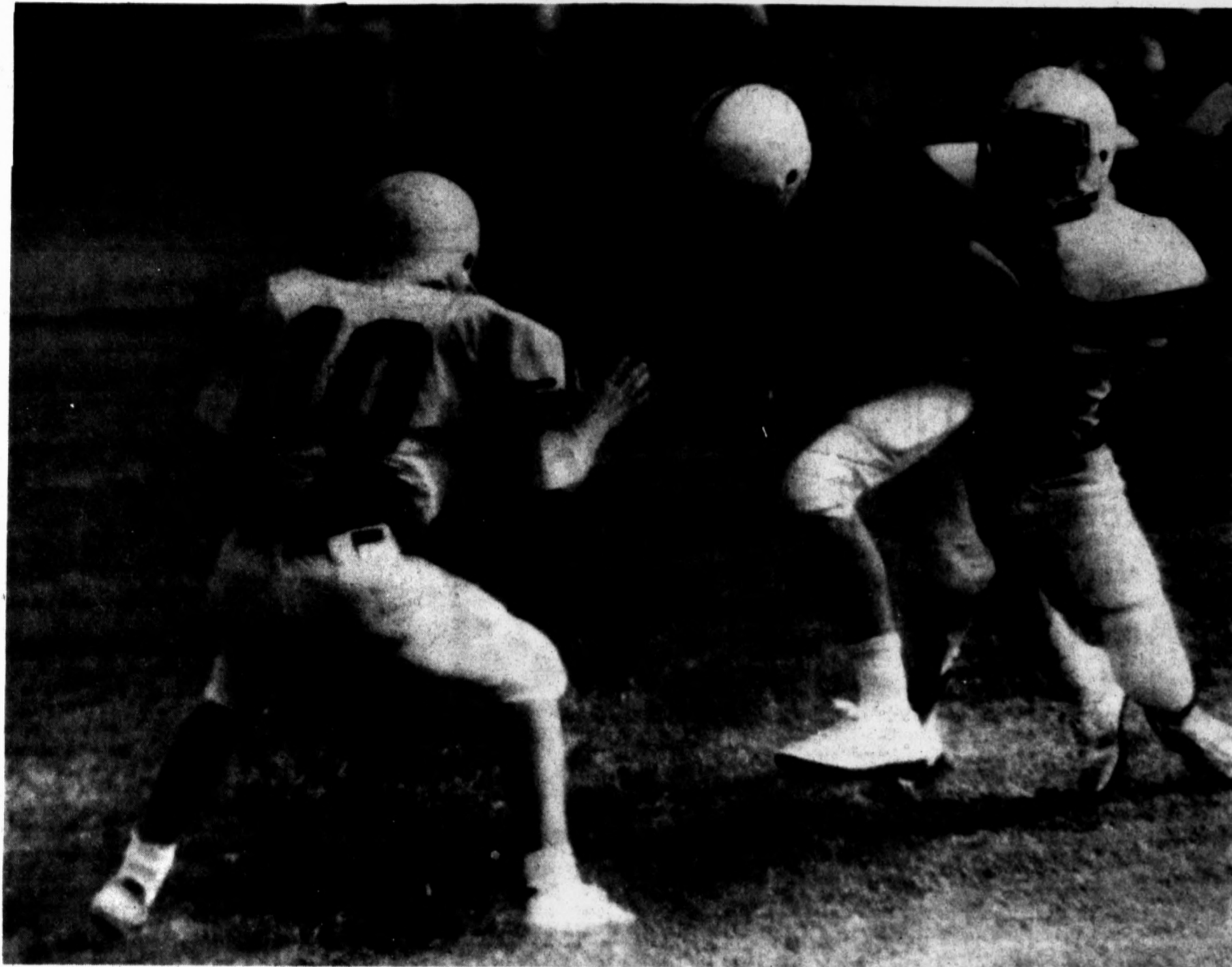

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Texas A&M gets two years

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Texas A&M University's football program today was slapped with a two-year probation and a ban on post-season bowl appearances this year after the NCAA found violations in the school's football operation.

In a 12-page, single-space order, the NCAA also limited Texas A&M to 20 new scholarships for next year — a decrease of five, limited to 75 the number of on-campus recruiting visits this academic year and said only eight football coaches would be allowed to recruit off campus.

The Aggies join a list of five other Southwest Conference schools the National Collegiate Athletic Association has investigated in recent years.

Texas A&M was accused by the NCAA of 31 rules infractions and seven procedural violations in a letter released April 4. The NCAA Committee on Infractions met with A&M officials last month in Syracuse, N.Y.

After the NCAA withdrew several allegations, A&M admitted guilt to four charges and had been awaiting word from the collegiate governing body on possible penalties.

Among the charges was an allegation that a coach lied to NCAA investigators.

No academic violations were cited in the 38-point letter that listed no names of players and coaches who were found at fault.

But the investigators concluded that the nature of the violations "demonstrate a lack of appropriate institutional control and monitoring in the administration of the institution's intercollegiate football program."

The NCAA cited an unnamed coach who acted unethically and showed a "knowing and willful effort" to operate the football program

contrary to NCAA requirements.

It also said that during interviews with NCAA enforcement officials on June 12, 1985, and Dec. 16, 1987, that coach gave false and misleading in-

formation about involvement in and knowledge of an alleged violation.

Texas A&M released an 850-page report last year that told of players selling complimentary tickets in

violation of NCAA rules.

In Dallas, Southwest Conference commissioner Fred Jacoby said "the second place team will represent the league in the Cotton Bowl this year."

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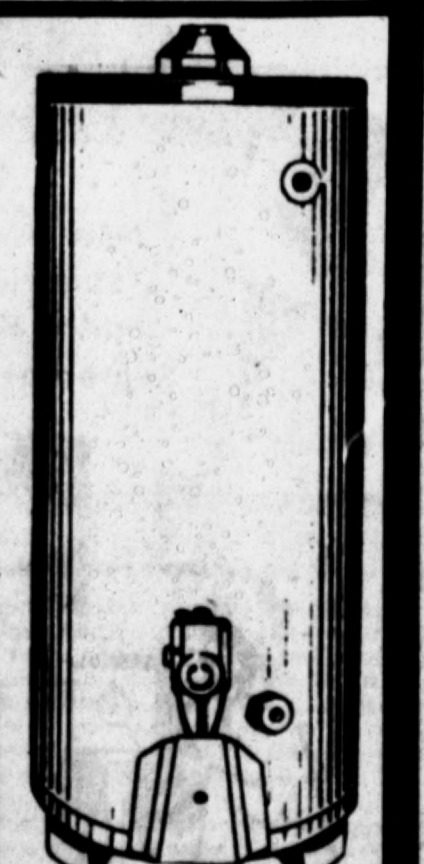

Ryan, Astros win

LOS ANGELES (AP) — When Nolan Ryan burst upon the National League stage 19 seasons ago, he had a blazing fastball that sailed all over the place. Hitters would strike out in self-defense.

But Thursday night, perhaps showing signs of settling down in his "old age," Ryan didn't walk a single batter — for the first time in his 31 starts this year, and for one of the few times of his career when he's pitched a complete game.

It was truly a red-letter accomplishment for the Houston Astros' 41-year-old right-hander, who has struck out more batters and walked more than any pitcher on major league history. Ryan has allowed only eight walks in his last six starts — a span covering 42 innings.

"I felt good, and if I feel that I can still be effective late in the game, I

want the complete game," said Ryan, who retired 17 of the last 19 batters and was rewarded for his efforts by Buddy Bell's tie-breaking single in the eighth inning.

Ryan, who helped the second-place Houston Astros cut the Dodgers' West Division lead to five games with a 2-1 victory, won for the first time in five decisions against Los Angeles.

"My fastball was good early, and it got better toward the end of the game," said Ryan, 11-11. "The key was that I got ahead of the hitters and had command of my pitches: It was a must-win game for us. That's the difference between two games in the race."

While Ryan was keeping the Dodgers' hitters on a leash, the umpires spent the night pulling John Tudor's chain — in more ways than one.
