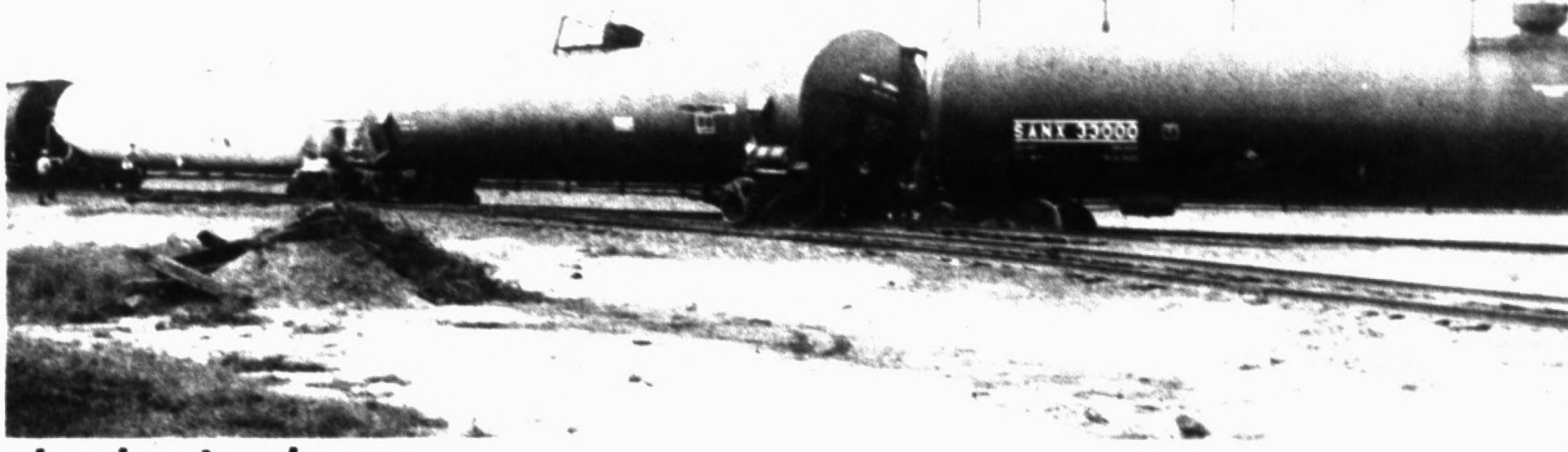

## TEA begins new assessment

Members of a Texas Education Agency accreditation team heard concerns at a public hearing Monday over a report the agency compiled in 1989 that placed the Hereford Independent School District on accredited-advised status and on improvements in the school district since that report.

A larger team conducted a week-long investigation of the local schools last October. TEA officials, using information gathered in the study, placed the district on accredited-advised status and listed 24 areas in which the district had to improve. The areas were to be addressed by the time the nine-person team arrived in the district Monday.

The accreditation team, made up of TEA officials and school administrators, will be in the district most of the week interviewing teachers, administrators and others to determine if problems have been properly addressed and to determine if other problems have cropped up. Pending the team's report, the agency could keep the district on advised status, drop the advised part of the accreditation, or lower the district to accredited-warmed.

Through provisions of Senate Bill 1, the school finance measure passed

by the state legislature last summer. TEA officials could place special personnel within the district if the schools stay on advised status for two or more years. The action could be sending in specialists to removal of administrators and/or board members. That action, team members said Monday, is very unlikely.

The accredited-advised status has no effect on seniors, and would not affect them even if the status is lowered to warned. The only harm would come if the status is lowered to unaccredited, a last-ditch measure by the TEA for districts with very serious conditions.

Of the small number of persons who addressed the team, some said the schools were better, others said the schools were fine before the report, and others felt the 1989 report created more problems.

Kathy Moore, a school board member who resigned last summer, said she did not resign because of the "governance" issue pushed by the TEA report and cited by local administrators as the main reason the district was placed on advised status.

"I resigned because I spent over six years of my time (four on the board) and energy into getting some things changed that needed to be changed," Moore said. She also said that teachers had been "afraid to

speak out" about the mastery teaching system, and she was able to help get that system changed.

She also said she was told she "had a bad interview" with the 1989 TEA team, especially concerning the bilingual program in the HISD. Mrs. Moore said she felt she was questioned at length, during the 1989 accreditation visit, about the bilingual program because former HISD bilingual program director Ophelia Echevarria is now working at TEA headquarters in Austin.

"I challenge you to ask our superintendent and Corky Lockmiller ... if they did not have to prepare over 300 files before a special team came in (to evaluate the bilingual program)," Moore said. "She (Echevarria) was not fired, she resigned. What she was doing was hurting our children."

Mrs. Moore also asked that the evaluators spell out problems they find with the school board. "They never stated exactly what the problems were," Moore said, adding the board was "crucified at the end" for governance issues despite pushing for mandatory tutorials, more counselors and other issues that were cited by the TEA as deficiencies in the district.

"There were several things the board spoke openly about," Moore said. "I am glad to see they got done."

"I still think the system is great," said Dee Anne Trotter, who has a second grader at Northwest Primary School and is president of that school's parent-teacher organization. "There has never been a lack of communication there. I believe it is up to the parents to make as much of a child's education as the teacher."

John Claypool, HHS teacher, pointed out that the high school, northwest and Bluebonnet had been honored by the Governor's Committee on Excellence. "Let's see, that is three of seven campuses. I would bet some other districts would like to have it like that."

Cherie McWhorter said she was concerned about the amount of overtime teachers have had to spend this school year; the panel is likely to hear of other concerns teachers have during interviews through the week. Teachers are expected to air concerns over curriculum guides and documents, documentation of lesson plans and classroom activities, and other issues that have caused many to spend up to 40 hours of overtime per week since September.

## City okays annexation

The Hereford City Commission chamber was packed Monday but unlike the Sept. 17 meeting, the audience left satisfied as the city commissioners voted unanimously to annex land for the Hereford Fellowship of Believers Church.

The city annexed 15,093 acres located on the west side of Kingwood, south of the proposed extension of Moreman Street.

In the same vote, the commissioners changed the zoning of this area, at the request of the church to R-2, which is a two family district that is required for churches.

Dave McReynolds addressed the commission to request the city's participation in the Panhandle Area Alliance.

This organization acts as a clearing house of information for Panhandle economic development. The organization is also able to support legislative efforts in Austin and Washington.

Last year Panhandle Area Alliance worked on the West Texas State University merger with The Texas A&M University System, Texas Highway Trunk System hearings, waste management within the Panhandle, economic analysis of the Panhandle and other issues.

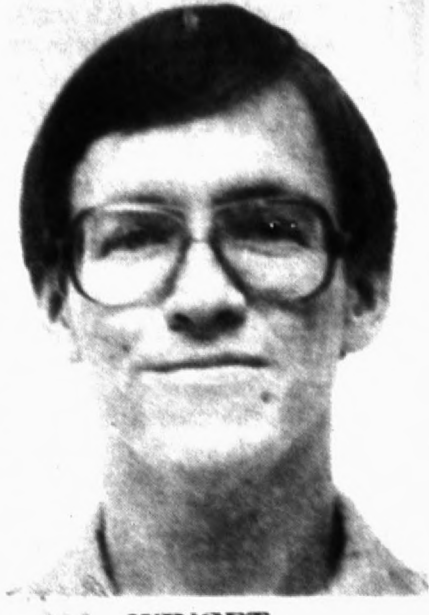
They continued their efforts this year in vocational/technical education development, Texas Water Plan legislation hearings, cooperation with area chambers of commerce and several other continuing projects.

The commissioners voted unanimously to continue supporting the Panhandle Area Alliance at the cost of approximately 20 cents per person. The cost is based on population.

A resolution relating to the proposed Texas Water Development plan was passed by the commissioners.

The Texas Water Plan is a 50-year plan in which the state will set up state controlled water districts where there are presently no water districts.

The resolution the commissioners passed states that the Groundwater Conservation District of the Texas

Panhandle performs a vital function and is effective. It should be included in the 50-year water plan and a representative from the effected agencies should participate in the planning process from the beginning.

In other business, the commissioners voted to change the zoning for property located at 713 S. 25 Mile Avenue, from multiple family to restricted commercial retail district. They also awarded Tascosa Office Machines of Amarillo the bid for a Panasonic copy machine at the cost of \$2,695.

Former City Commissioner Bud Eades was presented a plaque by Hereford Mayor Wes Fisher for his "outstanding contributions as city commissioner."

To consider a replacement for Eades, who resigned, the commissioners broke for executive session.

After reconvening, Mayor Fisher called for nominations to fill the place four vacancy. Commissioner Terry Langehenning nominated Wayne Winget and the nomination was seconded by Commissioner Emory Brownlow.

Winget was appointed by an unanimous vote from the commissioners.

The next City Commission meeting is scheduled for Oct. 15 at 7:30 p.m.

## UWDSC ahead of '89 effort

The United Way of Deaf Smith County is about \$,500 of the same place last year, but still has a way to go before reaching the \$125,000 goal.

At Monday's report meeting, division chairpersons reported \$36,015 in pledges and contributions for the first three weeks of the seven-week campaign. Last year, only \$29,255 had been collected through the first three weeks.

Much of the gain came in the major gifts division, with 8,147 collected toward the \$40,000 goal. That's \$2,809 ahead of 1989. All but one of the 10 divisions are ahead of last year.

Gift certificates from C&L Auto Parts were given to Pat Newton, Pacesetter; Mary Edwards, Whiteface West; Lalean Henry, Agriculture; and Audrey Powell, Golden Age, for gains posted in the campaign. Division chairpersons who attend each Monday's report meeting are eligible for gift certificates from local businesses. The certificates are based on increases above previous weeks and for the year.

UWDSC President Jeryl Baker said the campaign volunteers should be busy making re-calls and picking up packets. Any volunteers who need assistance, or anyone who has not received

a UWDSC pledge card, should call the UWDSC office at 364-5220.

The funds raised by UWDSC help 12 local organizations assist more than 10,000 Deaf Smith County residents each year. The programs range from scholarships for children at the Hereford YMCA to meals for shut-ins provided by the Hereford Senior Citizens Association. Other programs include Rape Crisis/Domestic Violence, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Campfire, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Family Services, Salvation Army, Red Cross, High Plains Epilepsy Association and Childrens

Rehabilitation Center. Persons may also earmark their pledges or contributions to go directly to one or more of the member agencies.

## Germany bracing for reunification

WEST BERLIN (AP) - East and West fade out today as official ways to describe Germany. The power of old military occupiers is being handed over, and scores of foreign diplomats are losing their host country.

Reunification is not, however, coming without rough edges.

The new united Germany of almost 78 million people arising at midnight will have to rely on considerable strengths to cope with difficult tasks. The West is absorbing an alien and ailing economy and rich and poor relations are moving in under the same roof.

The new Germany may also have to contend with stepped up violence by radicals at both ends of the political spectrum.

Such extremists have threatened to disrupt reunification celebrations and are being blamed by police for arson attacks Monday night on two department stores that are the largest in East and West Berlin.

Police said two incendiary devices were set off at the Centrum-Warenhaus store in East Berlin at Alexanderplatz square about 10 p.m. About 30 minutes later another incendiary device exploded

in the Kaufhaus des Westens in West Berlin, police said. There were no reports of injuries.

There was also no immediate indication on who carried out the attacks. Hesse state radio said damage was extensive and the timing of the fires indicated radicals were making good on their threats.

The mass-circulation Bild newspaper said 10,000 leftists were expected to go on a rampage intended to disrupt festivities, and police feared a clash with rightists who have also vowed to march through Berlin.

Beginning today were three days of fireworks, church services, ceremonies and parties to mark the end of 45 years of division entering on Berlin, a city of 3 million people spliced by an infamous wall.

West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl told a convention of his Christian Democratic Union in Hamburg on Monday that Germany now faces three immense tasks: the reconstruction of formerly Communist East Germany, the completion of European integration and the taking on of a greater international role.

"We still have a difficult way ahead of us. And for the huge tasks which lie before us, we will have to make sacrifices," he declared.

"Everyone must know that there is no withdrawing into a comfortable niche of world politics."

### Police arrest five persons

### World, National

WASHINGTON - The challengers President Bush most wants to see elected to the Senate were among the first to break with the president on the budget agreement he negotiated with Congress.

WASHINGTON - President Bush says he'd consider going on television to ask the public to accept the \$500 billion deficit-cutting plan, a boost congressional leaders may need to win enough support from worried lawmakers.

UNITED NATIONS - Should Iraqi President Saddam Hussein choose to grab it, there now is a lifeline in the turbulent Persian Gulf waters to pull him free from an ultimate military showdown with the United States.

NEW YORK - For global economies, an empty barrel of oil could be as scary as the loaded barrel of a gun. War jitters have already doubled the price of oil; markets have dropped in New York, Tokyo and London. So what happens if bullets start flying in the world's richest oilfields? "There is a risk of a real cataclysm for the global economy," says one researcher.

### Texas

WASHINGTON - Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, D-Texas, acknowledges that the home heating oil tax of 2 cents per gallon in the budget deal between the White House and Congress was included at his urging to spread the pain of tax increases to the Northeast.

LUBBOCK - A federal judge, reacting to reports of a profoundly mentally retarded woman who became pregnant after being raped while under state care, has ordered Texas officials to take immediate action to ensure her health and safety.

HOUSTON - Former death row inmate Clarence Bradley wants to go back behind bars. Bradley, cleared of a 1980 rape-slaying of a teen-ager, said he wants serve as a minister for convicts who were once his colleagues.

AUSTIN - Atheist leader Madalyn Murray O'Hair says she's been summoned for jury duty next month. But she's not going, because she lost a U.S. Supreme Court appeal challenging a jury oath that mentions God.

CORPUS CHRISTI - Nueces County Sheriff James T. Hickey says some police officers singled out his wife for arrest at a abortion protest last weekend in retaliation for his outspoken stance against abortion and officers who arrest anti-abortion protesters.

AUSTIN - Lobbyist Nick Kralj has made three times as much money for himself in representing dog racing tracks than the state has made in revenues from pari-mutuel wagering.

## Bush backed challengers criticize budget

WASHINGTON (AP) - The challengers President Bush most wants to see elected to the Senate were among the first to break with the president on the budget agreement he negotiated with Congress.

"Muggers in pin-striped suits," cried Rep. Lynn Martin, the Republican trying to unseat Democratic Sen. Paul Simon. "They're back at your pocketbook again."

"Throw out the leadership of Congress," said Martin, apparently excluding Bush from the gang of "muggers."

Simon left himself a little more room to maneuver, saying, "The more I see of it, the less willing I am to support it."

The plan would enact permanent tax increases while leaving spending cuts up to Congress to enact in the future, complained Rep. Newt Gingrich, one of Congress' leading

conservatives. Gingrich, R-Ga., also was upset that the plan did not contain enough measures to help businesses.

"We can do better for America," said Gingrich, the No. 2 House Republican. "This package will lose jobs, raise taxes and deepen the recession."

The cries of outrage over the compromise were bipartisan on Monday and came with certain swiftness from politicians running for higher office or suspected of harboring such ambitions.

"I'm opposed to it," said Gov. Mario Cuomo of New York, who could be Bush's Democratic opponent in 1992. "Every middle-class person will be forced to pay more for tobacco, gasoline, alcohol while the rich go free because President Bush promised the conservatives we wouldn't tax the rich people."

"Fiscal irresponsibility," said

Gov. L. Douglas Wilder of Virginia, another Democrat.

Only last week, Bush campaigned in Illinois for Martin and in Michigan for Rep. Bill Schuette, who is challenging Democratic Sen. Carl Levin.

"My inclinations and leanings are that this is a bad agreement," said

Schuette, who defended the president as having "gone the last mile" before being forced into the deal by "liberal Democrats."

An aide to Rep. Claudine Schneider, the Rhode Island Republican challenging Sen. Claiborne Pell, said Schneider was "evaluating it, studying it; trying to ascertain that no one group is being singled out."

Rep. Tom Tauke of Iowa, the Republican challenger to Sen. Tom Harkin, also was among those studying the package.

But Tauke spokesman Allen Finch had no hesitation about criticizing the compromise. "Half the summitters sought to protect defense spending, half sought to protect social programs and no one sought to protect the taxpayer," said Finch.

On his campaign swing, Bush threatened to put the blame squarely on the Democrats if negotiators failed to reach an agreement and the government ground to a halt.

"I will take that message to every state in the Union," he said.

But an agreement was reached and this week found the president switching from bashing Democrats to trying to persuade Republicans.

"I think this hurts the Republicans," said Lyn Nofziger, White House political director during President Reagan's first two years in office. "I think it's going to hurt our election chances next month."

Nofziger said the agreement "takes an issue away from the Republicans. How can they go out and say, by golly, we're not going to raise taxes."

## Williams offers reforms backing Texans' concerns

AUSTIN (AP) - Republican gubernatorial hopeful Clayton Williams says that if elected, he will push for ethics reforms to reduce conflicts of interest among state officials.

Williams said he wants to limit campaign contributions, require meaningful disclosure by politicians and tougher enforcement of state ethics laws.

"If elected governor, I want to see a greater effort made in making elected officials more accountable to those they represent," he said.

Texas state government has been rocked in the past year with revelations about the clout of lobbyists on the Legislature. News reports have shown that special interest lobbyists spent more than \$2.2 million during 1989 trying to influence lawmaking.

In addition, criticism has been raised about the state's lack of limits on campaign contributions, including those of lawyers to candidates for judicial seats.

### Among Williams' proposals:

-Prohibiting officials from lobbying or doing business with their former state agency for a year after leaving office.

-Restricting the way officeholder accounts can be used, and requiring any surplus left when an official leaves his post to revert to the state to help fund ethics enforcement.

-Prohibiting payment of honoraria for speeches and personal appearances by officials.

-Requiring lobbyists to report in detail how they spend money, including the name of the officeholder benefiting and the amount of money spent. Current law only requires lobbyists to report a monthly total of their spending, and they don't name names.

-Limiting contributions of lawyers to judicial candidates to \$5,000.

-Limiting political action committees to \$10,000 per candidate during any election cycle.

-Creating a department in the Secretary of State's office to enforce ethics laws.

In other political developments Monday:

-Democratic gubernatorial hopeful Ann Richards picked up the endorsement of a leading Texas environmental group, as the Sierra Club said Williams would be an "environmental disaster."

Sierra Club officials said Richards has a long record of action on the environment, while Williams has all but ignored the issue. "Clayton Williams ... has only recently produced an environmental platform, and so far it seems to be the best-kept secret of his campaign," said club spokesman Ken Kramer.

The Republican's campaign shrugged off the endorsement. "The Sierra Club is a partisan political operation that has a miserable record of understanding the need of balancing legitimate conservation efforts with the legitimate need to maintain economic growth and job creation," said Gordon Hensley, Williams' press secretary.

-Rice University sociology professor Stephen Klineberg released a survey showing most Texans aren't willing to trade environmental protection for economic development, and that they support such proposals as forced recycling.

Despite Richards' endorsement by environmentalists, Klineberg said, it's not surprising she's not the front-runner.

"The most central, immediate concerns that Texans have is crime and drugs and the economy," he said. "What you find is a campaign in which the 30-second spots of Williams are much more directly speaking about, 'I've got a solution to crime.' 'Busting rocks' is one of the best known expressions in the state."

-Democratic U.S. Senate candidate Hugh Farmer criticized the federal budget deal reached in Washington and being supported by his opponent, Republican Sen. Phil Gramm. "The results of the budget negotiations are a series of policies designed to balance the budget on the backs of senior citizens, middle-class consumers and Texans in particular," Farmer said.

Cornelius served the final three points as Binder picked up two kills to put the Herd at game point.

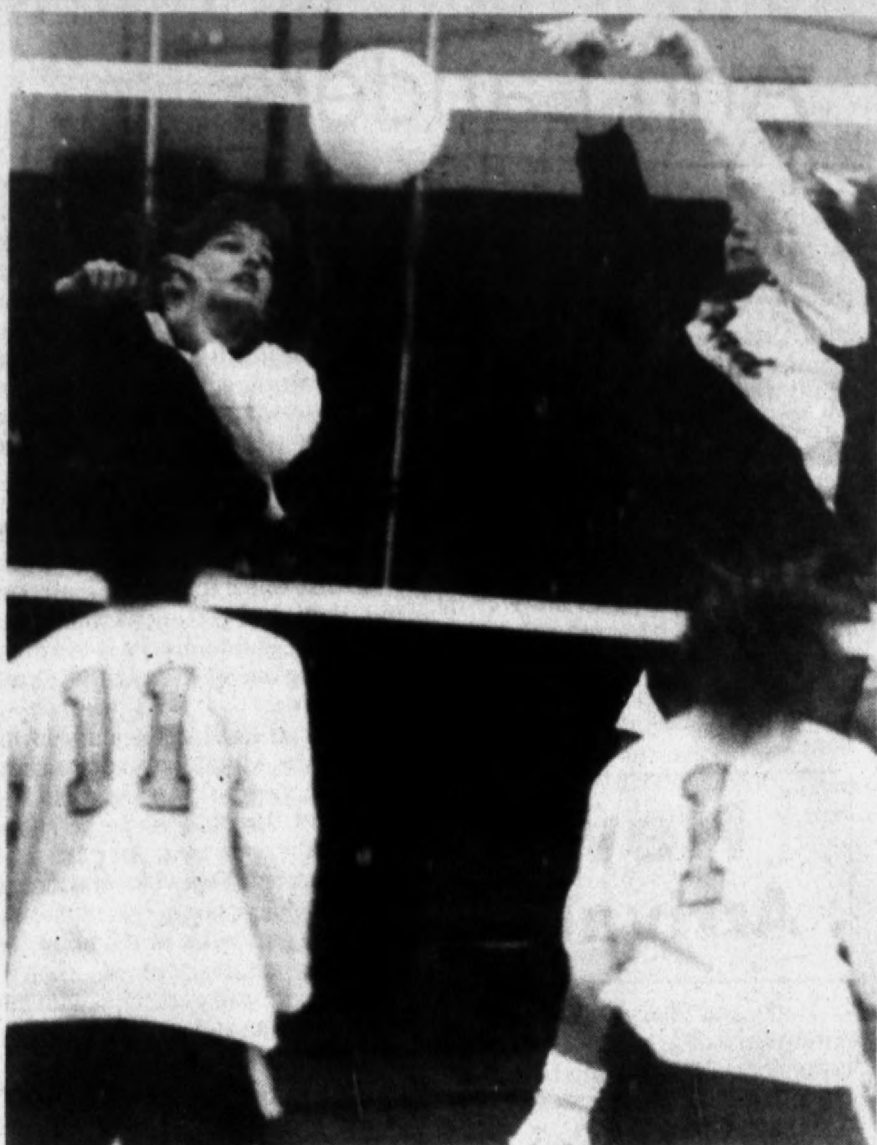

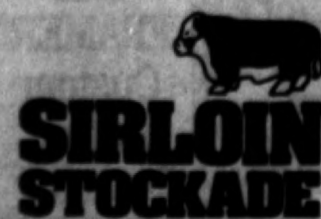

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## Boston defeats ChiSox, clinches tie for AL East

In a lot of ways, Dwight Evans is what the Boston Red Sox are all about.

Evans has been with the Red Sox since 1972. He has played in two World Series and his team lost them both in seven games.

He was around in 1978 when Boston blew a 14 1/2-game lead to the Yankees in July and lost in a one-game playoff on Bucky Dent's three-run homer at Fenway Park.

But Evans is back again, one victory away from being on the American League East champions.

Boston clinched a tie for the East title Monday night as Evans snapped an eighth-inning tie with a run-scoring single to give the Red Sox a 4-3 victory over Chicago.

The win moved the Red Sox two games ahead of Toronto with two games left for each team. The Blue Jays lost to Baltimore 6-3 and will be eliminated tonight if the Red Sox win or they lose.

The Red Sox, with Evans, also won the AL East in 1988, but have not won a World Series title since 1918, when a fellow named Babe Ruth helped them to it.

"This is great, just a great feeling," Evans, 38, said. "But we still need to win one more."

After the White Sox rallied for three runs in the top of the eighth off Dana Kiecker and Larry Andersen, Boston came right back.

Reliever Ken Patterson walked Wade Boggs to start the eighth. Barry Jones (11-4) relieved and was greeted by Ellis Burks with a single off the left field wall. Boggs, however, was thrown out at third by Ivan Calderon, with Burks taking second on the throw.

Mike Greenwell was walked intentionally and Evans followed with his third hit of the game, a ground single to center.

Jeff Reardon (5-3) got the victory by bailing out Andersen in the eighth.

**Orioles 6, Blue Jays 3**  
Toronto moved within one game of elimination in the East as Baltimore beat the visiting Blue Jays

behind the strong pitching of rookie Jose Mesa.

Mesa (3-2) gave up four hits and three runs in 7 2-3 innings. Kevin Hickey got one out and Gregg Olson finished for his 37th save.

Baltimore trailed 3-1 in the sixth before rallying for three runs against David Wells (11-6).

**Tigers 2, Yankees 0**  
Rookie Travis Fryman, not Cecil Fielder, homered for Detroit and Frank Tanana pitched three-hit ball for 7 1-3 innings.

Fielder went 0-for-4 and stayed stuck at 49 home runs. He struck out three times, increasing his major league-leading total to 179, and grounded weakly to the mound. He has gone 16 at-bats without a home run and has just two games left in his bid to become the first player to hit 50 since George Foster in 1977, and the first American Leaguer to reach the mark since Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle in 1961.

California rookie Joe Grahe gave up three hits in 8 1-3 innings to beat Dave Stewart.

Grahe (3-4) walked seven but pitched out of jams in the second and sixth innings. Bryan Harvey got the last two outs for his 25th save.

Stewart (22-11) yielded two runs on 11 hits.

**Twins 7, Mariners 5**  
Rookie Scott Leius had a two-run double in a five-run second inning.

Kevin Tapani (12-8) won for the first time since July 30 despite giving up four runs on 10 hits in six-plus innings.

then grounded a 1-1 pitch out of the reach of first baseman Phil Stephenson to score pinch-runner Jose Offerman.

The Dodgers tied it in the eighth inning when Juan Samuel led off with his 13th home run. Mike Pagliarulo gave San Diego a 1-0 lead in the fifth with his sixth home run.

# A&M film horror movie to Dykes

LUBBOCK (AP) — Texas A&M game films look like horror movies to Texas Tech coach Spike Dykes.

"It scares ya," Dykes said. "The game film doesn't really help you. It puts you to say, 'My gosh these guys are really awesome.'"

Facing two consecutive road games against the No. 19 Aggies and No. 21 Arkansas, Tech does not have time to sulk over a 21-15 loss to Baylor and an 0-2 conference record, Dykes told his weekly press conference Monday.

"You don't have long to have your head down if you lose," Dykes said. "You better get ready to play. Our guys traditionally play at A&M good and I see no reason why we shouldn't (again)."

Tech (1-3) has won two of its last three games against A&M, which is coming off a 17-8 upset loss at Louisiana State.

"We are going to have to ... play a lot better than any time we have played this season," Dykes said.

"They have got great speed at the wide receivers, a super tight end, tremendous running backs, two good quarterbacks and two offensive lines you can't tell much difference in."

"They have got more weapons than Iraq."

The Aggies lead the conference in rushing with Darren Lewis averaging 105 yards per game.

Dykes said Tech will have to eliminate turnovers and execute the kicking game to compete with A&M.

The Red Raiders coughed up the

ball five times against Baylor. Three of them were converted into touchdowns.

One of the turnovers, a blocked field goal attempt which led to a Baylor touchdown, was the back-breaker, Dykes said.

"You can't turn the ball over five times, miss two field goals and have another one blocked and still win a football game," Dykes said. "That's enough to choke a mule."

Quarterback Jamie Gill, who missed the Baylor game with a bruised knee cap, is expected to play against A&M, Dykes said.

"If he is healthy, he will go," Dykes said. "If Jamie is not OK, we will go with Robert Hall."

Hall, a redshirt freshman who guided the Raiders to victory against

New Mexico, was 25-of-47 passing for 328 yards and a touchdown against Baylor. Hall, who started in relief of Gill, ran for another score, but was intercepted three times.

Dykes complimented his defense, which recovered four Baylor turnovers, and freshman wide receiver Lloyd Hill, who grabbed eight passes for 102 yards.

The Raiders escaped injury against Baylor. Backup quarterback Jason Rattan, who suffered a knee sprain two weeks ago, is the only one expected to miss the A&M game, Dykes said.

Dykes also learned that redshirt freshman defensive end Brad Smith, who injured his back during preseason, will be out for the rest of the year.

# Seahawks down Bengals, 31-16

SEATTLE (AP) — The Seattle Seahawks finally have a victory.

"We definitely needed that one," defensive star Rufus Porter said. "It was no fun being all alone in last place."

The Seahawks became the last of the NFL's 28 teams to win a game this season, and they did it in impressive fashion Monday night. Their defense didn't give up a touchdown in a 31-16 victory over Boomer Esiason and the Cincinnati Bengals.

On a night when Porter sacked Esiason twice and broke up three passes, Dave Krieg completed 17 of 24 passes for 217 yards and two touchdowns, Derrick Fenner scored three TDs and Tommy Kane teamed up with Krieg on a 63-yard scoring pass.

"It's been a tough, hard struggle to get that first win," Seahawks coach Chuck Knox said.

"For the last two weeks, we've been playing well enough to win," John L. Williams said. "Now I hope we can win the rest of our ball games."

If the Seahawks (1-3) play as well as they did against the Bengals, they could.

Cincinnati (3-1) started a string of five consecutive road games with a lackluster performance. But Porter and the Seahawks' defense had something to do with that.

"Their pass rush was just tremendous," Esiason said.

The Seahawks think they could be 3-1. They played well in losing in Weeks 2 and 3 to the Los Angeles Raiders in Seattle and in overtime in Denver.

Until the fourth quarter Monday night, the Bengals had to rely on Jim Breech's foot for their points — on three field goals. Then, in the final period, Mitchell Price ran back a punt

66 yards for a Cincinnati touchdown to cut Seattle's lead to 24-16 with 9:49 left.

Porter, a two-time Pro Bowler as a special teams player, is in his first full season as a starting outside linebacker. He rattled Esiason, especially in the third quarter, when he sacked him once and battled down two passes.

In that sequence, Porter grabbed Esiason and threw him to the AstroTurf, drawing a personal foul. Esiason got up swinging.

"I got real pumped up after that," Porter said.

Norm Johnson, who missed field goal attempts of 39 and 44 yards in a 34-31 overtime loss in Denver in Seattle's previous game, set the tone Monday night by kicking a 51-yard field goal in the opening quarter.

Seattle led 10-6 at the half as Fenner ran four yards for a touchdown in the second quarter and

Breech kicked field goals of 34 and 26 yards. The Seahawks made it 17-9 in the third period as Fenner ran three yards for a touchdown and Breech added a 43-yard field goal.

The Seahawks broke the game open on the first play of the fourth quarter, however. Krieg, regarded as a possession quarterback, teamed with Kane on the 63-yard touchdown pass, giving the Seahawks a 24-9 lead.

The Seahawks wrapped up the game by going 80 yards in 11 plays in 5:59 for their fourth touchdown, a 2-yard pass from Krieg to Fenner.

Fenner, who leads the NFL with six touchdowns, refuses to take credit for his success.

"It's kind of easy to get in there when you have the holes," Fenner said. "When the holes are there, it's easy to score touchdowns."

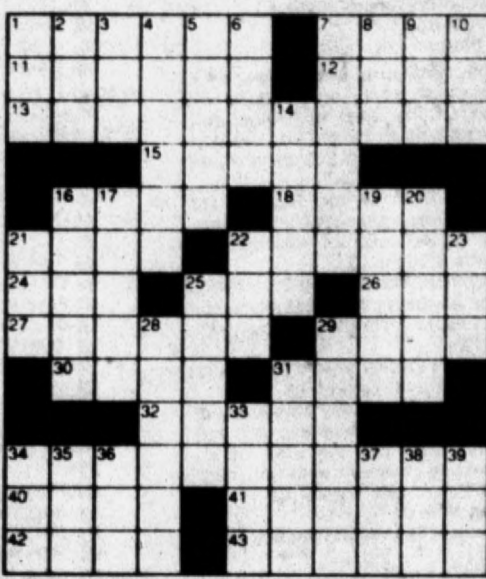

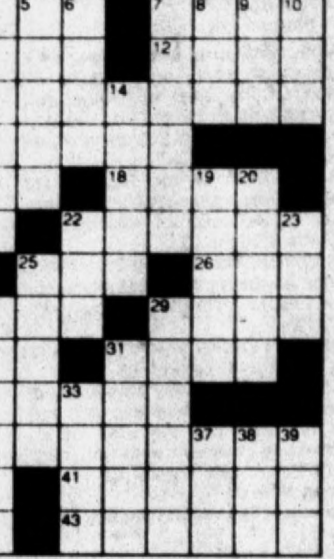

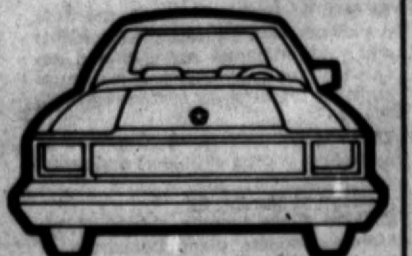

**A.** Yes, it can be made into a beautiful planter. Drill a few holes in the bottom for drainage and remove any rust with a wire brush.

Spray inside and out with a good paint to retard rust. After it is completely dry, put a layer of stones in the bottom and fill with good potting soil and peat moss.

Put in your favorite plants and you're all set!

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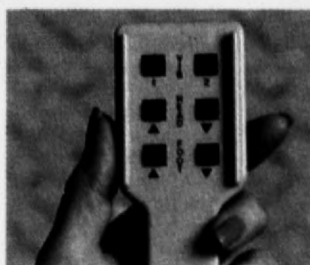
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
