THICK PLANTINGS PROTECT LOCUST TREES FROM BORERS

Plantations of the locust tree ean be successfully protected from the borer and grown profitably on a commercial scale if the trees are planted in thick stands or mixed with other trees, so as to produce a densely shaded condition during the first 10 to 15 years. Investigations of the United States Department of Agriculture showed that more trees were destroyed by borers in tracts which had been pruned occasionly or closely grazed or in which fire had killed out the underbrush, thus destroying the natural shade produced
by weeds and shrubbery.

The denser the underbrush

less is the damage done by borers. Trees growing from 2 to 3 feet apart were seldom injured, while

BANDING TREES PROTECTS FROM DAMAGE BY MOTHS

Stubbs.

Banding the trunks and larger limbs of apple trees with strips of cloth, says the United States Department of Agriculture, has been practiced extesively for the control of the codling moth. This method consists of fastening a band of cloth around the trunk, from which the loose bark has been removed. Usually a band made from burlap, folded to three thicknesses 4 to 8 inches wide, is used. The codling moth larve, crawl beneath the band to form their cocoons and should be destroyed by hand at intervals of 10 days throughout the season.

Keep Egg Basket Full.
Where a full egg basket is desired, it is essential to provide the dock with plenty of fresh air and sunshine during the summer as well as an abundance of shade, as hens can not withstand excessive heat. It is necessary to provide plenty of green feed, such as beet, turnip, carrot and onion tops, as well as waste leaves from cabbage and lettuce and also such material as potato peelings, water-melou and cantaloupe rinds and grass elippings. Bread and cake crumbs make desirable filling food for the hens. The suburban housewife whose neighbors do not maintain flocks should request them to save their cake and bread crumbs as well as their table scraps for her bens. In the main, the small flock can be maintained in this manner at slight expense while the fowl will be provided with plenty of essential food.

Meat scraps from the table, with such bugs and worms as the range provides, supply plenty of animal food. It is preferable to run the meat scraps through a meat grinder and then to mix them with three parts of corn meal and one part of wheat bran. Laying hens, during the period of hot weather, require plenty of fresh, clean water which should be kept in a clean fountain or pair placed in the shade.

Such provisions for the comfort and convenience of the flock are usually responsible for a steady and continuous flow of eggs during the period when eggs can be produced at the minimum ex-





The first thing taken into consideration was the facilities for To accomplish this I found first county. that it was very necessary to get into communication with the people. With this idea in view, w began accumulating a mailing list to add to the good work already being done by Dr. H. C. Hall, Director of the Bureau of Venereal Discases. We are now compiling from the birth certificates the name, age, race, occupation and address of the father of each new born baby, beginning this list with the birth certificates of January 1918, and when completed up to the present time we will have a list from this source alone of approximately 160,000 families. This list will be increased by approximately 12,000 per month. When this list is completed to date we will begin sending literature to the mothers of nearly every baby in the State teaching her how to protect the health of her baby and prevent disease in her family. With this literature we will send a questionaire requesting her to furnish us with the names, ages and conditions of health of each member of her family and also the names and addresses of all expectant mothers who reside near her, explaining to her that the object of this request is to be able to send to these expectant mothers at the expense of the State wholesome literature which will be helpful to them, and at the same time all doctors will be circularized and requested to send us the addresses of all expectant mothers coming to their

We estimate that this procedure will add to our mailing list more than 100,00 families. Under this system we will have accumulated a list of more than 300,000 families, and in less than one year we expeet the list to reach one half mil lion families, or more than 2,000. 000 people.

Being able to directly communicate with such a large per cent of the people of this State furnishes us a basis for a system by which to conduct the work of each of the several Bureaus in the Health Department.

A 14-year-old girl in a Bruns wick County, Va., club cleared over \$100 on her summer's work in canning. She is saving her money to pay her way throng school.

A club in Bradentown, Fla., canned 4,000 cans of vegetables in one month. A girl club member in the same county canned and sold during the season 1,800 cans of vege-tables. She used her own brand and has a reputation for fine products. She pays her mother \$1.50 and her little sister \$1 a day for the time they spend assisting in the canning. Her profits have been most satisfactory. Another girl in Bradentown made \$150 from her garden plot and canned 700 cans of vegetables.

Last year was the first year of club work for a 12-year-old club girl of Bay Minette, Ala. Her tenth-acre garden was planted with tomatoes only. She sold \$60 worth, and her work totaled less than \$8.
