Time for the Music

Dancing to all types of music from the United States and around the world is one of the highlights of Up With People's all-new show, "Time for the Music." The

show begins Saturday at 7:30 p.m. at the Hereford High School auditorium.

'Up With People' is Saturday

An international cast of over 100 young people will arrive in Hereford this evening for Saturday's performance of "Time for the Music" by Up With People at 7:30 p.m. at the Hereford High School auditorium.

Tickets for the performance will be available at the door Saturday for \$6 for students and senior citizens and \$7 for adults.

"Time for the Music" is a powerful, contemporary two-hour show featuring the cast's diverse talents and features some of the home flavor of some cast members. Up With People is well known for its style of energy and excitement that grips the audience.

During the first half of the show, the audience will go on a "world tour" featuring popular and traditional songs, dances and costumes from around the world. Show-goers will also experience a turn-of-the-century deep South revival, and a circus big top with international clowns and magic tricks, with children celebrating birthdays invited on stage for a special surprise.

The second half of the show begins at a 1950s street corner to help trace the roots of rock 'n' roll, with songs like "Tutti Frutti," "Jailhouse Rock," and "Shout."

The second half also features

"Junk Jam," using everything from hub caps to garbage cans to make music, and "Black and White," a funky urban rap.

The show will also feature "Up With People" and "What Color Is God's Skin?" which was inspired by Up With People's first deaf student.

Up With People's buses and trucks will roll into the Hereford Community Center at 6 p.m. today, with a police escort. The group will be officially welcomed to Hereford by Mayor Wes Fisher. After details are cleared with the cast and crew, the young people will leave with their host families—

about 40 Hereford homes have been opened up for a two-night stay.

Saturday morning, about half of the cast will begin setting up the HHS stage while the other half will tour Hereford and part of the surrounding area. They will view operations at Hereford Bi-Products, and get an up-close look at and explanation of the cattle feeding business.

The group will go through the show in a mid-afternoon rehearsal, then prepare for the show.

The cast will leave Hereford at 11:30 a.m. Sunday for the trip to their next show in La Junta, Colo.

Bush begins open season

HOUSTON (AP) — Republican George Bush has shifted his self-proclaimed underdog presidential campaign into a frontal, "look-at-the-record" attack on Democratic candidate Michael Dukakis.

Saying it's time "to start swinging" now that the party nominating processes are all but finished, Bush leveled a broadside against Dukakis, accusing him of camouflaging left-wing views with "moderate tones."

Bush's hard-driving speech Thursday to a receptive Texas state GOP convention marked the first time this year that the vice president has taken on the Massachusetts governor in a point-by-point recital of their differences.

En route to Texas aboard Air Force Two, campaign manager Lee Atwater had billed the Bush speech as signaling a major change in strategy. Although Bush had often spoken negatively of various Dukakis stands in recent weeks, the vice president had not gone to such lengths to show where the pair part company.

Bush's campaign aides said the time had come for the vice president to say where he and Dukakis differ on issues.

"If the public doesn't see any difference between the two by election day," said one high-ranking campaign official, "then the 'time for a change' thing is going to benefit Dukakis."

Atwater indicated that the emerging Bush strategy between now and the August nominating convention in New Orleans will involve the vice president holding almost daily news conferences and "make his position clearer on a number of issues."

Bush, trailing Dukakis in public opinion polls and leading the Democrat by only seven percentage points in a Texas Poll of his adopted home state, told reporters that he wanted "to begin spelling out the differences."

"I will do it factually. I will do it fairly. I want to get it all together," he told a news conference here.

"And I'll begin with five words that are an underlying theme of this campaign: 'Let's look at the record.'"

Both Bush and Atwater indicated the vice president will give little thought to choosing a running mate until Dukakis makes his choice in Atlanta in July.

"He wants to see the Democrats throw their card on the table," Atwater said.

The campaign manager also said the Bush camp believes that President Reagan will prove a great campaign asset, although Atwater said there has been no decision yet on just what specific role the president will play in the fall campaign.

In the meantime, Bush said he was happy with his campaign organization, despite negative poll results, and Atwater suggested publicly that Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III might soon be named campaign chairman.

In his speech, interrupted frequently by applause, Bush attacked Dukakis on several fronts, accusing the Democrat of favoring tax increases, aggressive IRS audits of taxpayers and being soft on crime. Bush also said that Dukakis would undermine U.S. military strength and weaken America's ability to wield influence around the world.

Bush was traveling to Denver today to carry the same message to a meeting of Western-state Republicans.

Leslie Dach, a Dukakis campaign spokesman, reacted to the Bush speech.

Almost 25 years ago an idea

became a reality when King's Manor Methodist Home opened its doors in a building with 20 rooms. The dream survived and today King's Manor is a multi-building complex, situated on a beautiful 18-acre campus, offering independent retirement living and nursing and child care.

The facility for older adults was opened Oct. 11, 1962, but there were times when it seemed the dream would not survive. Financial difficulties persisted but the tough-minded church and community founders kept working to breathe new life into the dream.

While most residents pay the full cost for the services of King's Manor, 25 percent receive some financial assistance. With a continuing policy that paying residents are never charged more to help offset costs for those unable to pay the full cost, the Manor must rely on funds received from churches and the Founder's Association.

The need for financial assistance will increase as the residents of King's Manor live longer and have more acute health care needs. Continued support of the community is needed to assure the residents that basic needs will be met.

The ninth annual Founder's Association Barbecue provides an opportunity for citizens to share in this ministry. The barbecue is scheduled Saturday, July 9 and serving hours will be from 5 to 9 p.m. Tickets are \$10 each or \$25 for a family of four.

Reps voted for Oshkosh, b'gosh, after breakfast pay, paper says

DALLAS (AP) — Seven congressmen were paid \$2,000 each as guests at a Wisconsin company's breakfast shortly before a vote ordering the Army to buy 300 trucks from the firm, the Dallas Morning News reported in a copyright story today.

Rep. Marvin Leath, D-Texas, and six other members of the House Armed Services Committee attended the April 1, 1987, breakfast hosted by the Oshkosh Truck Corp. according to 1987 financial disclosure statements filed by House members this May, the newspaper said.

Later that day, an Armed Services subcommittee approved a Leath-sponsored amendment ordering the Army to boost its purchases of the \$130,000 Oshkosh 10-ton trucks and drop a plan that would have jeopardized company sales, the newspaper said.

"It looks kind of funny, doesn't it?" said V.P. "Pres" Grove, Oshkosh vice president for government affairs, referring to the scheduling of the breakfast. "But it really was a sheer coincidence."

Grove said the honorariums weren't designed to preserve Oshkosh's 10-ton program. Leath did not immediately return a message left by The Associated Press at his Washington home Thursday night.

He told The News he believes Oshkosh's 10-ton trucks are an excellent product and the Army "wanted to spend an enormous amount of money to invent a new truck" to supplant the Oshkosh vehicle in hauling ammunition.

Leath and five of the other House members who attended the breakfast are among the 19 members of the House Armed Services Procurement Subcommittee, which adopted Leath's Oshkosh truck amendment. The other subcommittee members at the breakfast were Reps. Ike Skelton, D-Mo., Roy Dyson, D-Md., Norman Sisisky, D-Va., and Republicans Larry Hopkins of Kentucky and Robert Badham of California.

Leath's amendment was approved by voice vote, meaning no record was kept of the voters, but Badham confirmed through an aide that he voted for the measure.

Aides to the other four members told The News they could not ascertain whether the congressmen attended the subcommittee meeting or

voted for Leath's amendment.

Skelton, Dyson and Hopkins voted at an April 22 procurement subcommittee meeting for another amendment by Leath to restore \$75 million that had been cut from the Army budget for Oshkosh trucks. House records show Les Aspin, the Wisconsin Democrat who chairs the full Armed Services Committee, had proposed the cut to meet a defense spending target.

Sisisky opposed Leath's April 22 amendment, but an aide said she was unable to determine whether or not Sisisky may have voted on April 22.

Rep. Bill Dickinson of Alabama, the seventh member who received \$2,000 for the Oshkosh breakfast, does not sit on the procurement subcommittee but is the senior

member of the subcommittee.

Criminal activity light

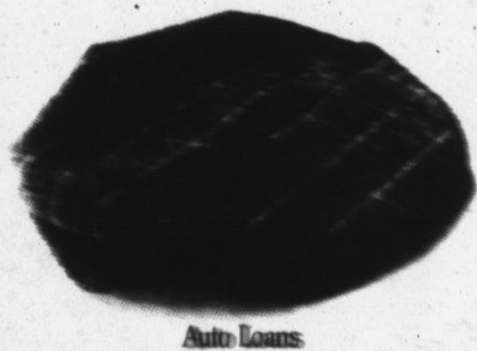

All-district 1-4A baseball selections

Whiteface coach, seven players are honored

Hereford Whiteface senior catcher Robby Collier was honored as the player of the year in District 1-4A this season, and Hereford Coach T.R. Sartor was named the coach of the year.

The all-district baseball team was announced after Canyon lost to Brenham 6-4 Thursday in the state 4A semifinals in Austin.

Four other Hereford players - junior Jason Scott, pitcher; senior James Hernandez, third baseman; senior Rodney McCracken, outfielder; and junior Roger McCracken, designated hitter - were

first team selections.

Second team honors went to Hereford outfielders Michael Phibbs, a senior, and Keith Brown, a junior.

The Whitefaces won the District 1-4A championship for the second year in a row with a 14-2 record. Hereford defeated Pecos in the bi-district playoffs, beat Everman in the regional playoffs, and lost to Canyon in the state quarterfinals.

Collier led Hereford in seven offensive categories, including batting average with a .516 average. His other team-leading statistics were

.648 on-base percentage, .731 slugging percentage, 48 hits, 12 doubles, 29 bases on balls, and 41 runs scored. He tied Phibbs for the team lead in runs scored, and was third on the team in runs batted in with 36.

On defense, Collier led the Whitefaces in fielding, for those with 10 or more chances, with a .954 fielding percentage.

District coaches voted Sartor as the coach of the year for the second season in a row.

Scott had an undefeated record through the regular season and finished with a 12-2 record. He led the

Herd pitching staff with 87 innings pitched and 100 strikeouts. His earned run average was 2.66 and he had two saves.

Rodney McCracken led the Whitefaces with seven home runs. He had a .359 batting average, .431 on-base percentage, .650 slugging percentage, drove in 32 runs, scored 38 runs and hit eight doubles.

McCracken had a fielding percentage of .912 with 56 putouts in 31 games.

Roger McCracken was second on the team in several offensive categories - .405 batting average, .474 on-base percentage, and 40 runs batted in. He hit four home runs and had a slugging percentage of .643.

Hernandez, who played at both the third base and pitcher positions, led the Herd with 46 runs batted in and three triples. Hernandez batted .396, hit five home runs, and had a .448 on-base percentage and a .688 slugging percentage.

Phibbs, a right fielder, batted .343 with three home runs, three triples and 30 RBIs. He had an on-base percentage of .458, a slugging percentage of .535, and a fielding percentage of .833.

Brown, a left fielder, batted .361 with seven doubles and 21 runs batted in. He also had a fielding percentage of .833, and had an on-base percentage of .421 and a slugging percentage of .454.

Hereford and Canyon each had four individuals on the first team. Estacado dominated the second team with six players honored.

Brenham defeats Canyon 6-4

AUSTIN (AP) — Brenham pitcher Jon Peters, whose consecutive win streak earned national attention this spring, rallied his team at the plate to give the Cubs a chance to defend their 3A state championship.

Brenham beat Canyon 6-4 in a 3A semifinal game at the UIL state tournament Thursday as Peters, a junior righthander, extended his winning streak to 42 consecutive games and improved his 1988 record to 14-0.

After Sean Cooper hit an inside-the-park home run to knot the score in the seventh, it was Peters, a .324 hitter, who ignited his team in the eighth with a leadoff single on a hanging curveball.

He eventually scored the winning run on Todd Maass' fielder's choice. Peters' team was behind 4-0 going into the sixth.

Canyon made four errors that led directly to Brenham runs. While Peters was struggling, Canyon pitcher James Ferguson kept the Cubs off the base paths with a tricky changeup. Ferguson, 11-3, had allowed Brenham three singles before the sixth and finished with seven strikeouts after being pulled in the eighth.

For the game, Peters struck out six and walked three.

For Canyon, Jason Roach had three hits and one RBI, Walt Garrison and Kevin Dewey each had two hits and one RBI, and Brad Byrd had one RBI.

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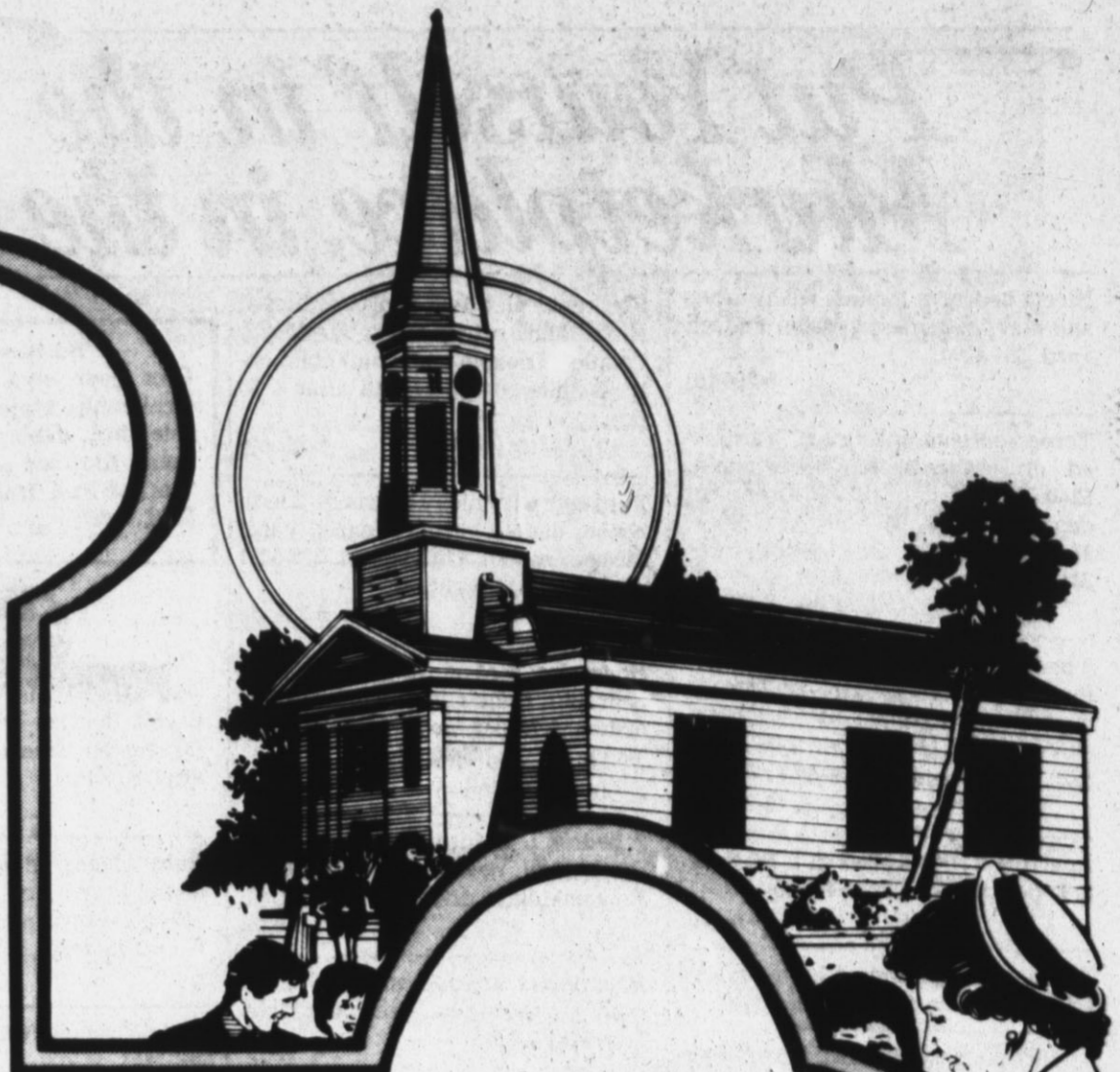
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
