The recent visit of Hereford business men to Clovis to consider plans for a local swimming pool has but added impetus to the growing idea here that some steps ought to be taken to provide at least a temporary "swimming hole" for the populace. The custom of going down to the Tierra Blanco and holding swimming parties is rapidly growing in popular favor, among all ages of people. Queries have begun to arise as to why a regular place cannot be fixed up.

Mayor Knight said Thursday that Mrs. George Garrison, the original advocate of a swimming pool for Hereford, suggests that there is a number of places close in on the creek where dressing rooms could be thrown up at small expense for the accomodation of the public.
