SLATON ENJOYING GOOD CONDITIONS OWING TO COTTON

Sinton, Business conditions in Siaton are at this time in better shape than at any time since the town site was laid out.

More than six hundred thousand dollars are on deposit in the two local banks. Loans have been reduced between 15 and 20 per cent during the last four weeks. A number of business establishments have changed hands recently and all at a premium above invoice. Many substantial farmers from East and South Texas are buying the cheap unimproved land and are now shipping in. Less than 25 per cent of the tiliable acreage in this vicinity has been broken and cropped.

There will be more than ave thousand bales of cotton ginned here this season. The boll weevil has never made its appearance on the Plains and it is only a question of a few years until a big portion of Texas' supply of cotton will be produced on the South Plains, it is believed.




