Short Snowstorm Sends Temperature Tumbling

A mighty blast of Arctic air this week gave the county its first storm of the year . . . and its first

Snow started falling about noon Tuesday and continued with some interruptions until noon Wednesday. But the forecast calls for more snow flurries through the weekend.

From spring-like readings in he middle 60's, the temperature plunged to a shivery nine above Wednesday morning with only slight warming predicted.

Deaf Smith County got from 2-4 inches of snow from the storm as it sat right on the edge of a huge storm area that covered the South Plains and Central Texas.

Winds that accompanied the front whistled across the Panhandle at rates up to 60 miles

Stockmen fear the type of storm which blasted its way from the north. Continued high winds would have caused the cattle on pastureland to drift before the wind. But the storm's relatively short duration prevented any such major losses as have occured in the past when the winds continued for onger periods.
