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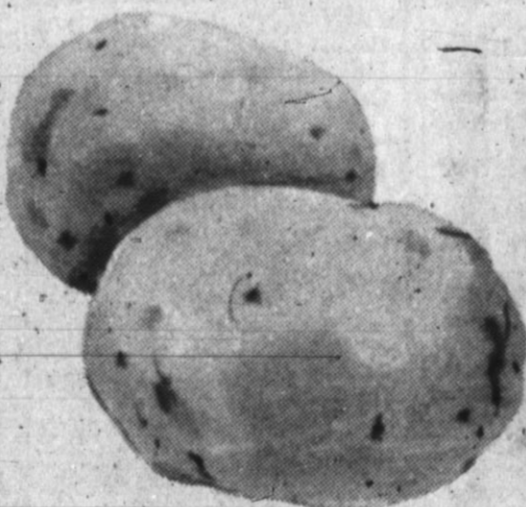

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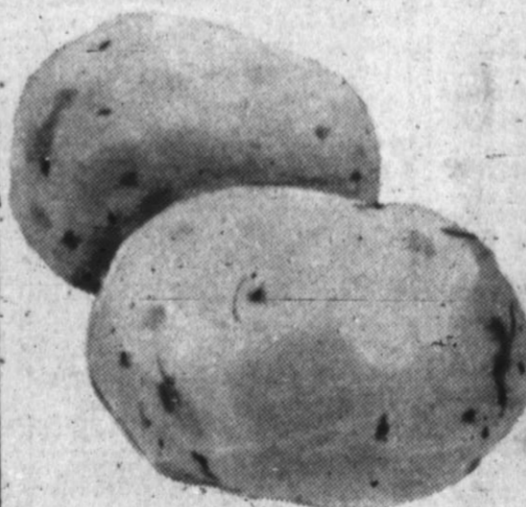

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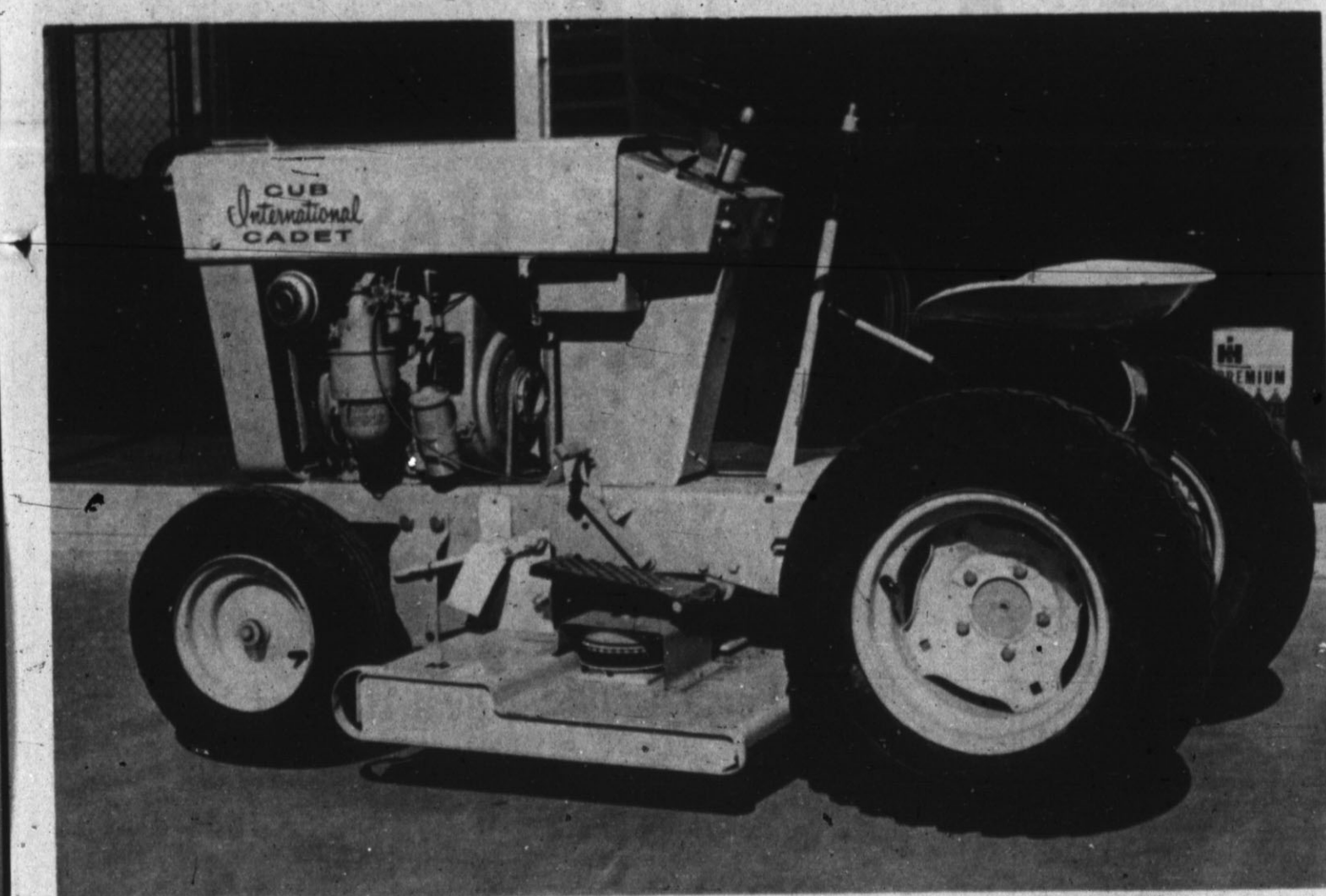

(Continued from page 1) moisture when it comes. The decision on the part of a producer to sell livestock at this time is a hard one, admits Don Newman, head of the Hereford Soil Conservation Service.

But the owner who sells before prices drop and before his grass reaches the point of overuse will be far ahead in the long run, states Newman. "We have proved over and over that keeping grass healthy, vigorous condition, as opposed to overuse, is the more profitable way to carry on a ranching enterprise.

Stubble mulching is another conservation practice that experience is showing to be extremely valuable in successful dryland farming in our area, added Newman. The use of large sweeps in wheat stubble will leave sufficient residues on the soil surface to protect from erosion and to conserve water.

REP. ROGERS WRITES

Admitting Chinese Refugees Could Be Very Dangerous

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT:

Those who advocate opening our shores to refugees from Red China are no doubt prompted by the precepts of the Christian religion in which they were reared. Their attempts to adhere to the Golden Rule are commendable, but could prove very dan-

gerous if followed.

Let me say, in the first instance, that I would **VIGOROUSLY AND UNEQUIVOCALLY OPPOSE** any attempt to admit Red Chinese into this country for any purpose. The Red Chinese are not Christians. If they follow the teachings of Marxism, they have no religion

other than the Communist doctrine. They do not understand the Christian principles by which we live, hence would suffer no remorse of conscience in using our charity to help defeat us.

In fact the evidence is overwhelming that the Communist world has followed a definite pattern for several years to employ our Constitution, our laws and our moral code as weapons against us. There are several excellent examples. They have widely used, in fact abused, the guarantees of the Constitution in the exercise of freedom of speech, freedom of the press freedom of religion.

One of the best examples is their open and defiant use of the Fifth Amendment, both in the courts and before Congressional Committees. These actions, although perhaps within the letter of the law, have certainly not been within the spirit. The exercise of these freedoms by the Communists and the use of the Fifth Amendment as a protective measure have not been for the purpose of preserving individual rights as was intended by the framers of the Constitution, but on the contrary, for the purpose of promoting and augmenting an ideology diametrically opposed to government by law.

These people have long realized that the American concept of fairness presupposes the good faith of the individual. This creates an open invitation to any society that is devoid of a moral code or any group that subscribes to the policy that the "end justifies the means". This has been proven by the actions of the Communist Party members in this country since the decision of the Supreme Court on October 9 last year.

This decision upheld an order by the Subversive Activities Control Board requiring the Communist Party and its members to register. The Party immediately went underground and will unquestionably use every protective device of our Constitution and laws in an attempt to defeat the Supreme Court decision.

On Dec. 1, 1961 the Party as an organization was indicted on twelve counts charging failure to register with the Attorney General as a Communist action organization. The members of the Party also refused and failed to register and ceased to be identified with the Communist Party.

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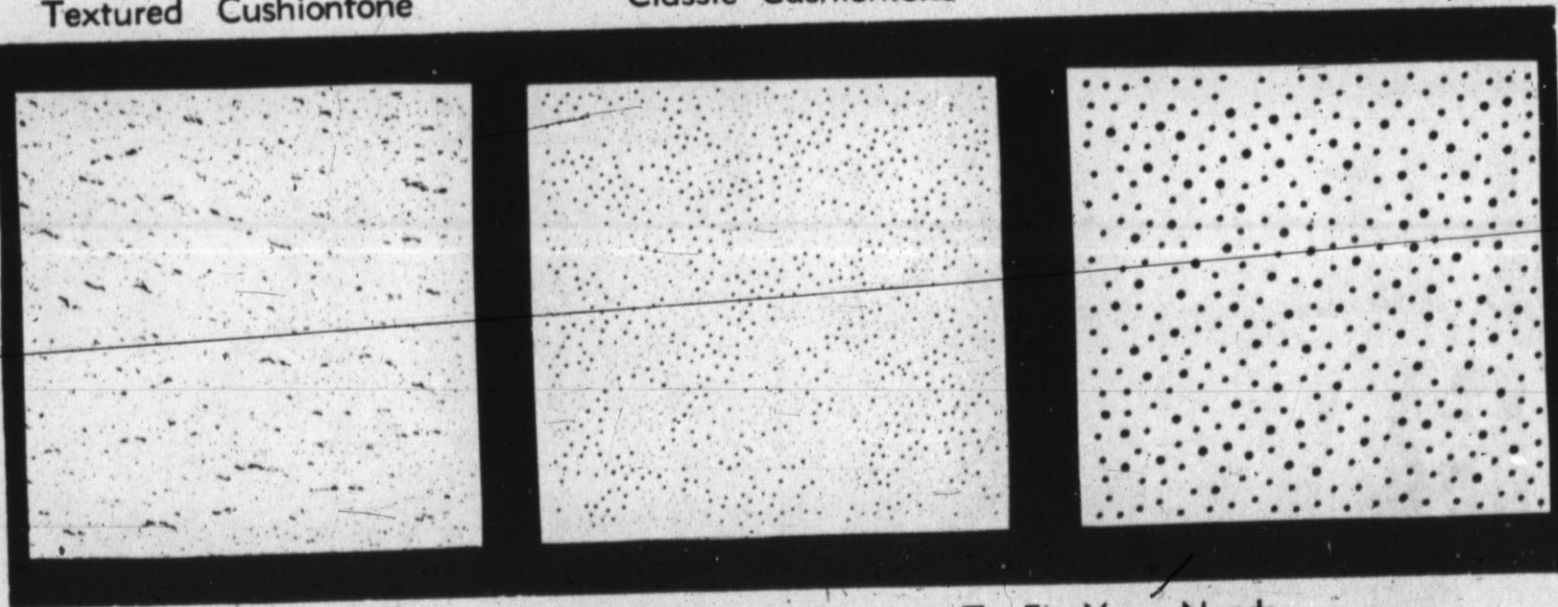

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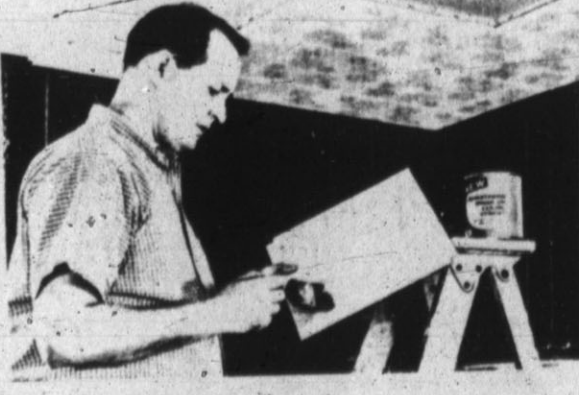

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\$3 Million Penalty Asked In Crooked-Hole Well Suit

BY — TERRY HANFORD
Crooked-hole well-drilling is the big item of the Capitol. More than \$3,000,000 in penalties is asked by Atty. Gen. Will Wilson in the first suit brought by the state following "crooked-hole" investigations in the East Texas Oil Field. The suit contends that the wells were drilled in such a fashion that they would not under someone else's land.

Operators plugged two of them before Texas Railroad Commission engineers could check to see if the holes were straight or crooked.

Suit asked \$3,000 a day for each day of operation of each well. Cover a two-year period, this comes to \$3,600,000.

Commission engineers plan to check more than 1,000 wells. Humble Oil and Refining Company brought a civil suit against another group of oil operators. Humble says that the operators' crooked wells ended under an Humble lease and have been draining off Humble's oil.

SAFETY IN AGE
If you live to be 100, you'll be safe from death by accidents. State Health Department statistics reveal that not a single Texan over 100 years of age died in an accident in 1950.

Statistics also reveal that there's something to what they say about Texas weather. Deaths from extreme heat and cold from freezing both were reported during the year.

Highest killer for all age groups, except those under one and over 75, is the highway accident. In the home, fire and explosion are the biggest killers. Falls are in third place. Home ranks next to the highway as the scene of most accidental deaths.

MENTAL PATIENT CLINIC
Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools is expected to act within the next week or two on whether to select a site in the Lower Rio Grande Valley or in the Beaumont area for an outpatient clinic for discharged mental patients.

Dr. C. J. Rullman, state director of mental health and hospitals, said the Board already had chosen the Fort Worth area for one of the two clinics authorized by the last Legislature.

"Second will be established in South Texas," he added. Sites are being considered at Beaumont and Brownsville-Harlingen.

Such clinics now are operating in Houston, San Antonio and Dallas.

PARK PATRONAGE GAINS
State Parks system is showing substantial gains in patronage as compared with last year.

Bill M. Collins, executive director for the Parks Board, said that increases in the number of visitors particularly were noticeable at Garner State Park in Southwest Texas, Lake Corpus Christi Park, Palo Duro Park in the Panhandle, Bennett Park on the Rio Grande border, and Kerrville and Buschler parks.

Total visitors in April, latest figures available, were 385,277, compared with 366,225 in the same month a year ago.

BOVE HUNTING SEASON
Texas will have representatives at the national dove conference in Washington on June 26 when length and dates of the 1952 hunting season will be discussed.

H. D. Dodges, executive secretary of the State Game and Fish Commission, reports the outlook favorable for a good dove crop in Texas — both mourning and white-wing doves.

VACATION READING STIMULATED
Fourth annual "Texas Reading Club" — designed to encourage an interest in reading among youngsters — during their summer vacation — is under way.

Sponsored by the Texas State Library and participating libraries in 39 cities and towns, the program enrolled more than 24,000 young people this year. Harold J. Marburger, director of rural library service, State Library, described the reading club as the largest of its kind in the nation.

Youths who read 12 books on their reading level before August 31 will receive a reading certificate signed by Marburger and Dr. Norman H. Winfrey, director and librarian, State Library.

In addition, all youngsters who enroll will receive a "reading log" to keep a record of books completed during the program.

Books in many instances are being furnished by the State Library through inter-library loan, bookmobiles, multi-county regional libraries and through the loan of books as an extension service from the library field services.

TOLL ROAD
Only toll road in Texas — the Fort Worth-Dallas Turnpike — seems to be making its way. The Turnpike grossed \$5,267,707 last year, with operating expenses of \$67,500. It paid \$2,661,877 into the fund to pay interest on the \$50,000,000 it borrowed to build the road, and to build up its total reserves to nearly \$5,000,000.

The Fort Worth-Dallas Turnpike is the only place in Texas where it is legal to drive 70 miles per hour.

Legislature allowed the Turnpike Authority to raise the speed limit to that figure.

SMOKELESS PAKE
Cigarette smokers are dropping in more than \$7,000,000 a month to the State Treasury under the 5-cent sales tax on each package.

Treasurer Jesse James reported income from that source to be \$7,700,000 in May.

SCREENWORK CONTINGENT
Fight against the screwworm fly has been extended northward. Reason is because truck-hauled livestock, infested with screwworms, crossed the control line which was being maintained by aerial distribution of sterile male flies.

Texas Animal Health Commission meets on June 11 to adopt a regulation requiring inspection of livestock as they cross the control line, and spraying them to make sure they do not carry the costly worms into clear territory.

A law distribution point was established at Corpus after outbreaks of screwworms were reported in East Texas.

Program is a half effort to control the 200,000,000-a-year pest. It is financed by the federal and state governments and by contributions from livestock owners. Most of the money is federal.

GOVERNOR'S APPOINTMENTS
Governor Price Daniel appointed former Atty. Gen. John Ben Shappard of Odessa to the Texas Industrial Commission to replace Robert L. Raymworth of El Paso, who resigned. Commission has the job of attracting industry to Texas.

Bureau of Business Research at the University of Texas read its business barometers and concluded that April business was at 128.2 per cent of the 1947-49 average, up 17 per cent over April of 1951. Strength in the sales of automobiles was a major factor in the leveling off from the all-time high reached in January with an index of 128.9 per cent.
