Judge Ed T. Murphy For Railroad Commissisoner Is Best Bet

Not often do we editorally endorse the candidacy of any man for any office but in the case of Ed. T Murphy, an exceptional man, we make the exception. Judge Murphy is making the race for the four year unexpired term of Former Governor Pat Neff, resigned, as Railroad Commissioner. Bor nin Polk County 42 years ago, he got his primary education there later attending Sam Houston Normal and Texas State University. Returning to Livingston, the county seat of Polk County, he entered the practice of law and was elected County Judge, which office he held for four years. He was then sent to the Legislature for three terms from that disrict and although one of the most powerful and influential members in the Legislature is said to have spoken less than six minutes on the floor of the House. He stood for the things that he thought were right and the things that he believed were for the best interest of the state. Honest, fearless, capable and fairminded he personifies the type of man that American people honor with high offices and to our mind is the best qualified man that has offered for the position which he seeks since the Railway Comission was created during the tenure of office of Governor Jim Hogg. West Texans are often accused of being sectional minded but when they are offered an opportunity to support a man of the calibre of Judge Murphy, it matters not from what part of the state he comes. If Judge Murphy fails to carry this section of the state it is because of his inability to see the people out here due to the limited time he had to make the race after the resignation of Governor Neff. We endorse Ed. T. Murphy wholeheartedly.

Separating the Grain and the Chaff

While there are thirty nine names of aspiring office seekers offeerd for Congressman at Large in the three place alloted by the State Executive Committee, of this number there are a great many who are on there just as a gamble that they might be elected to a \$10,00 a year job with trimmings. Many are old and worn out politicians who have run so often and gotten beat so repeatedly that they feel that this is their last chance—and it is. But out of this vast number there are a few good men who have the best interests of the state at heart and are sincere in their efforts to be of some assistance to the people in one of the most trying times in the history if the United States. Our neighbor, Hon. A. H. King of Throckmorton belongs in the latter class. A man of known and recognized ability over majority of those who aspire to the office which he seeks. His work while a member of the Legislature has won him many friends in all parts of the state and shown him to be a man of good judgement, remarkable ability and absolute integrity. Contained in his platform are two outstanding planks, the guarantee of bank deposits which Mr. King believes would restore confidence and abolish hoarding, and an act making illegal the selling of goods on the exchange which one does not have in his possession. This act would do away with bearish manipulations and prevent a handful of men on the stock exchange controlling the price of our agricultural products. Knox County citizens should not be content with merely supporting Mr. King 'at the polls but should use their influence with friends in other parts of the state to support Mr. King actively.

The Outcome of the Democratic Convention

What was the outcome of the Democratic Convention. The Chicago convention was one of the shortest on record. The platform was voted almost unanimously. Four ballots sufficed to accomplish the nomination of Roosevelt and Garner. There was no lack of rivalry and there were half a dozen more or less acute controversies, but on the fourth ballot more than the requisite two-thirds registered the will of the convention and that was all here was to it. The controversies did not assume any greater moment than the ordinary convention differences where there is a variety of earnest partizanship and a week had not expired before every one of the unsuccessful Presidental candidates had announced his allegiance to the Democratic ticket, and their managers and champions were just as prompt in announcing their support of Roosevelt and Garner.

Instead of the shattered ranks of the Republican vision, the Democratic party is more united today than at any period since Woodrow led it to victory.

TEXAS RAILROADS PAY SUBSTANTIAL PART OF STATE'S TAX BURDEN

Taxes is one of the large fixed charges connected with the operation of Texas railroads. From the standpoint of the welfare of state, counties and communities, railroad taxes are of much importance. This annual obligation must be met from the earning capacity of the rail carriers.

In 1931 the railroads of Texas paid a total of \$8,303,108.47 in federal, state, county, municipal and miscellaneous taxes. The distribution of this amount to the various tax funds is shown below:
