### 'Deaf' Smith Says

TO: The Spirit of General Sam Houston

FROM: The Spirit of Erastus "Deaf" Smith

SUBJECT: Scouting Report on a Human Relations Problem

Human Relations, Sam, is a respectable way of labeling the age-old problem of people getting along with each other. This is a problem that a committee of the Chamber of Commerce is attempting to honestly face and to solve before it disrupts the orderly and healthy conditions that now exist.

The people of Mexican descent in our county are a most valuable asset to our economy. The vegetable industry could not exist without the manual labor that these people provide.

Agriculture of many different kinds employ people of Mexican descent for a variety of jobs. They are cowboys, field hands, irrigators, equipment operators, dairy hands. To serve their needs, many have been employed in the retail and service establishments of the community. While a very few years ago there were no permanent residents of Latin American blood in the county, more and more each year are leaving the migrant ranks and making their permanent homes with us.

These people face tremendous problems in adjusting to a predominantly Anglo community. They also create problems. The problems that they face and the problems that they create were quite frankly discussed in the committee meeting and solutions are being sought.

First and basic to all of the problems is one of education. Following the crops from area to area these people have given their children little opportunity for formal education. Schools in many areas have not enforced the school attendance laws. In other areas the language barrier has prevented attendance. Some migrant families have feared social discrimination because their

economic condition has not permitted them to cloth their children as well as the other children. They have proportionately as many brilliant and as many slow children as the general population average and they rate high in artistic and manual dexterity skills. They have lacked opportunity.

They often have lived relatively isolated from cultural exchange with the Anglo-American community. Their whole culture, experience and background is different from the Anglo. The problems they create, then, are basically ones of communication — the ability to express themselves to Anglos, to exchange ideas and information, of sanitation — simple lack of exposure to sanitary facilities and sanitary education, of health — again a lack of knowledge or education, money management — an educational failure again, and law enforcement — still a matter of education.

After looking at the problems that the community has, the committee then, with the help of the Latin American members of the committee, tried to see the problems that the Latin has. In his efforts to better his position, to leave the migrant status, he faces a lack of education and training in skills that will enable him to get a better paid job. He faces the problem of people and human nature in the tendency to generalize. He faces a real problem in securing housing. He faces recreational and social problems. In short, he faces discrimination because the migrant for many reasons listed above has created an atmosphere of fear which leads people to assume that all people of Latin-American descent will cause the problems listed above if permitted to move freely in our Anglo society.

Sam, the people here in Hereford and in the county bearing my name are not burying their collective heads in the sand and

Many other people from the community will be called into the meeting to advise on particular problems. While the committee studies the problem and attempts to find practical solutions, the community as a whole gains in every way.
