"Russan Roulette" is a game in which a person takes a revolver, loads one of the six chambers, spins the mechanism and, without looking, places the gun against his head and pulls the trigger. Frankly, we never could understand why people choose to play the game — and this opinion covers political ammunition as well as real bul-

Nevertheless, we hear rumbles of a few people who indicate that they will play the risky game at the polls next Saturday. These people are the ones who say that they are going to vote for Don Yarborough for governor for the sole reason that they believe Yarborough will be easier for GOP nominee Jack Cox to beat in the general election next November.

If people want to vote for Mr. Yarborough because they think he will make the better governor, or because of the things he represents — namely organized labor and ultra liberal thinking — certainly it is their business and their American privilege. The "reverse twist" of voting because Yar-borough might be easier for Cox to defeat in November is another matter.

Without question, such a decision must inevitably come from those people who would basicly prefer Connally, the conservative candidate of the two, over Yarborough. Where will these same conservatives be if Mr. Yarborough goes ahead and defeats Connally to occupy the governor's seat in Austin? In addition, we would argue with their conclusion that it would be easier for a Republican to defeat a liberal. We base this thinking on the recent senate election in which GOP Tower defeated Bill Blakely to represent Texas in Washington. Blakely, the incumbent appointee, was one of the most conservative men Texas has ever sent to Washington.

And take a look at the other side of the picture. Ralph Yarborough, a true lib-eral if there ever was one, defeated the same conservative element to sweep into this senate post in Washington a few years

In a nutshell, it looks as if the liberals may also have tendencies to jump party — a fact which the conservatives seem to completely forget. To say the least, statistics and experience point definitely to the fact that a conservative candidate has or greater odds of losing to a Republican than does a liberal candidate.

We don't know where this idea of "reverse voting" started, but it does appear extremely dangerous — and just about as profitable as the game of Russian Roulette. Many people who voted for Marshall Form-



#### Alfalfa Irrigation Set For Green Valley Ranch

One of the largest of the big cattle ranches yet remaining intact in this section of the Panhandle is the Green Valley Ranch owned by Chas. E. Harding of Chicago. The ranch is located beginning about seven miles east of Hereford and extends along the Tierra Blanca river for a distance of nine miles, taking in 32 sections of land, that is 20,480 acres. On this ranch may be found at most any time 2,000 or more head of fine Hereford cattle. In the spring and summer, the number is augmented by the presence of 1,500 or more fine, young calves. Last season this ranch sold on the market something like \$12,000 worth of calves. Besides cattle raising, the ranch raises mules and horses and recently shipped two cars of horses and one car of mules at good prices. But grazing is not all the source of revenue from the ranch. A feed farm of 1000 acres is regularly cultivated, the feed stuff being given the stock as occasion of the winter weather demands, but often no feeding is done and the stacks remain untouched. Albert D. Smith and his eight or ten assistants look after all the details of the ranch. Mr. Smith is the foreman and deals with the matters as a business man. Since the talk of irrigation has been so common, the owner or this ranch has decided to test out the matter in his own way. A small well of some 250 gallons capacity will be put in and a small patch of alfalfa tried. If this proves satisfactory, several hundred acres of the fine valley land will be put under alfalfa, the needed water to be supplied by big pumps. The contract for the first well has been let to Luther Hough of the Hereford Hardware Company. Work will begin at once. With the open range for cattle, horses and mules, the feed farm of 1000 acres and as many more acres in alfalfa under irrigation, the Green Valley Ranch will be the ideal of the Panhandle. Mr. Harding is to be congratulated in being the owner of such a fine opportunity that this ranch

States Post Office Department has ruled that the typical chain referral sales plan has the three essential elements of a lottery prize, chance and consideration, and is fraudulent in design and

In a recent typical chain re-ferral case, the Post Office Department ruled that the purchase of an article constitutes "consideration," and the promised commissions represent 'Prize." The element of chance is present in the chain referral scheme because the amount of reward available to participants depends upon the efforts of others over whom the participant has no control, and is therefore a matter of chance. Hence the chain referral sales plan is a lottery.

Although the Post Office Department is required to establish that a promoter has intent to defraud, it may infer that a promoter is aware of the fact that some participants in a chain referral scheme will be unable to realize the commissions promised because of the unavailability of enough propects to keep a chain going endessly. When promises of large rewards are made to induce participation, in the full knowledge that they cannot be realized by some participants, a reasonable inference is that a promoter's representations to the contrary are fraudulent within the meaning of the postal stat-

Thompson warned that persons contacted on such chain referrals or other promotions of like nature should contact the Chamber of Commerce, which will check on the legality of the offer. The local Post Office can also provide information.

"If you are in doubt about the matter . . . or about any type of business offer, please check before you invest," Thompson said. "It can save you time and money in the long

STATE RULING AWAITED ON VOTE

Whether Mayor M. T. James Jr. legally may cast a vote on issues where there is no tie in the city council remained in question Wednesday. The mayor interprets the law to say that he can. City Attorney Andy Stroebel isn't to sure. Stroebel said Wednesday he is awaiting word from the Texas Municipal League, whom he wrote a week ago.

The question came up 10 days ago at a regular meeting when Mayor James Vote threw the council into a 3-3 stalemate. "The whole distinction in whether the mayor can or cannot vote," Stroebel said, "stands on whether you have a commission or aldermanic form of government." Under the commission form, Stroebel said, there are two commissioners and a mayor and each has a vote. Olton adopted the aldermanic form in 1958, the city attorney said, switching from the commission form. Under state statutes, he said, "it can be interpreted to mean that the mayor can vote only in case of a tie." THE OLTON ENTERPRISE

GARRISION NAMED CONSERVATION FARMER

Shirley Garrison, who lives near the Easter Community was named the Outstanding Conservation Farmer for the Year Tuesday at the Lions Club Luncheon. This annual award goes to the farmer, who by his own farming practices, demonstrates the best conservation principles in the county. Garrison was cited for his outstanding job of irrigation; bench leveling around a lake for erosion protection and to facilitate the application of irrigation water, and control of irrigation pipeline and a system of ditches and varying row lengths to prevent undue loss of irrigation water. He was also cited for having a minimum of tailwater loss on his farm. Among the practices used by Garrison is a cropping system for wind and water erosion control as well as for maintenance of soil fertility. Under the division of management of crop residues, Garrison was cited for using a modified system of stubble mulch farming. On land that was clean tilled in low residue crops, the Castro County farmer applies cotton burrs to increase organic matter content of soils.

SUMMER WATER RATES CONSIDERED

The City Commission considered but took no action this week on the possibility of lower summer water rates for Canyon customers. "If we lowered the rate by, say 10 per cent," Lowes said, "it wouldn't help the individual user much — but it would cost the city a lot of money." Lowes told the governing body several citizens had approached him on the matter because of the lack of rain this year. "I'm not convinced," Commissioner Clarence E. Thompson said, "that if we lowered the rate by 10 per cent enough people would use enough water so we could get our money back." The city lists some 1650 active water accounts and City Manager Bill York later estimated the average summer bill between \$8 and \$12. Based on these figures — and a 10 per cent discount for three months — the city would lose some \$5,000.

Rain and hail, accompanied by a small twister, added needed moisture to Lamb County and surrounding areas late Wednesday afternoon and again Thursday night. In most cases the moisture was welcome, but several acres of young cotton will have to be replanted. The small tornado or large whirlwind destroyed a storage shed belonging to Dutch Higgins, local building contractor, located on West 4th just off Sunset Ave. The building was completely demolished and debris from the shed was scattered over a three block area. Dear editar: I was talking with a neighbor of mine the other day

and he said there was a problem puzzling him. He said he'd been reading some figures on how much candidates spend in a big campaign and what he wanted to know was, how can a man afford to spend four or

five times as much running for an office as the office pays? "You take when a man runs for some big office, Governor or Senator, say, why some times he'll spend more getting elected than the office will pay in fifteen or twenty terms, and nobody has ever held on that long. This doesn't


make sense to me," he said. Now I'll admit it doesn't seem to make sense, to spend more money getting a job than the job pays, but on the other hand, farmers do it all the time. Frequently, farming is like running a post office. It's a public service institution, you're not supposed to make a profit at it.

But the difference between a farmer spending more on a crop than he makes and a politician spending more on an office than it pays, is that for some strange reason most successful politicians wind up in better financial shape than farmers. Some of them wind up in better shape than before they got elected, which only proves they must be financial geniuses. When a man can spend \$100,000 running for a job that pays \$50,000, and still come out ahead, you can see he's got something that you and me haven't.
Of course, what he's got may have all belonged to you and me once, but I don't have the facts to go into all that.

Of course, politicians explain their knack for spending more to get a job than the job pays, by emphasizing that their friend put up the money, without, they always say,

any strings attached. - I don't know about this. But if there aren't any strings attached, they sure get hold of plenty of it from some place, to string us along with.

The Billie Sol Estes "can of worms" is still squirming . . . and so are a lot of people in high places who are suddenly squeamish about worms . . . though a number of these people apparently weren't squeamish about taking the hook when the worms were used for bait.

We hope the Senate Investigating Committee will go into the case thoroughly, and give it a thorough airing . . . and that this investigation will be marked by discharge notices wherever due and by prosecution wherever justified.

But we also believe that it is important to withhold judgment until guilt is established . . and to avoid the "guilt by association" tag which has sometimes turned investigations into witch hunts.

Some high-ranking politicians who accepted campagn contributions from Billie Sol undoubtedly wish, by now, that they hadn't; and if accepting campaign contributions is the extent of their involvement, they will be sufficiently punished by the public embarrassment of disclosure.

The non-elective government officials who were touched by Billie Sol's cash without having a campaign account to deposit it in are considerably more embarrassed . . . and deserve to be.

All of them have a right to explain fully, just how and why they were involved . . and the Senate Investigation Committee should give them this opportunity. The public has a right to hear these explanations, too.
