

40% Of Farms Signed Wheat **Agreements**

USDA announced this week that a total of 254 Muleshoe farmers had signed up for the 1964-5 government wheat program.

The signers will divert a total of 1,399 acres of wheat land to other crops this season. This means that about 8.4 percent of the Bailey County wheat allotment will be diverted.

It also means that 40.8 percent of the areas 622 wheat farmers have signed to join the somewhat ontroversial wheat program. On the broader national scene 15.94 percent of the nations farm-

PATIENCE

The only wise thing to do when some unpleasant situation is forced upon us is practice patience. There are types of endurance which have no right to that honorable title-patience. For instance, some people do not have enough interest in life to be affected by anything good or bad; this is a deficiency in their nature and has nothing in common with moral excellence. Others like the American Indians who showed their captors crueler ways of torturing them so that they could prove their indifference to pain, pride themselves on being stoics who dwell above such things as the emotions; they are really dodging reality and pumping up their own egos.

True patience is the most beautiful and practical answer to the troubles of life and the temptations they beget. It is anything but insensitive. It has nothing to do with vaunting self. The patient man endures evils for a supernatural ideal; penance for sin, resignation to the just decree of God, union with the loving will of God. He feels the pain or loss or fear as much as anyone, but sharper than his suffering is his desire not to let it push or pull him into sin! It has been allowed by God. It therefore has a purpose. God will supply the strength to stand under it. Faith and trust in Gods providence are necessary. To practice patience unflaggingly, a person must have rockfirm conviction that his present sufferings, mental or physical, external, or internal are a part o God's plan for his sanctification and final happiness. He must clearly realize that the human soul is like a newly mined diamond which must be cut and polished to bring out its brilliance or like a block of marble which must undergo a long process of chipping and sanding before the stunning artistry of God becomes apparent. If a surgery patient received no anesthetic his squirming would make a successful operation impossible. Patience is the self-imposed anesthetic that holds the soul motionless while the Divine Physican labors to save its life to restore it to complete health. For whether we like it or not, suffering is an inescapable part of life. The rich and the poor, the strong and the weak, the young and the old-all encounter it. The Son of God had to bear hunger, thirst, weariness, misunderstanding, persecution, betrayal, terror, agony and death. God permits such things in order to draw greater good out of them. Patience is the sickle which reaps the full harvest of divine bounty.






