Hold First 'Tail Water' Hearing

County Farmer Stops Mis-Use

In the first action of its type against a Deaf Smith County irrigation farmer, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District board of directors Tuesday censured and then commended the operators of Chalmar Company, Inc., in a "tail water" hearing.

Directors of the district held the hearings in their offices in Lubbock Tuesday morning. The hearing grew out of a complaint which had been filed against Chalmar Company, Inc., of Hereford, which is owned and operated by Al and Charles Trautman.

The complaint alleged that the company permitted to escape from land being operated by the company approximately six miles north of Hereford. By-laws of the district prohibit such waste.

Clear Burglary After 13 Months

Shades on a 13-month-old school burglary were lifted last week when a convict at Huntsville Penitentiary told Police Chief Henry Aycock he forced entry to Hereford High School and took \$150 in cash and a borrowed coin collection. The burglary took place Oct. 24, 1957.

Thomas Edward Pate, 40, sentenced to a five-year term for burglary in Randall County, said he burglarized the local school one week before the theft in Randall County.

Aycock transferred Louis Drepur, sentenced for incest in a District Court session here last week, to Huntsville Friday, and while at the prison, Aycock questioned Pate about the school burglary. Pate then admitted burglarizing the school.

Pate said he buried the stolen money southwest of Amarillo, but he said he was not sure of the exact location. He told Aycock that he would direct officers to where the money was hidden after he completes his term of imprisonment.

Burial was in City of Lubbock Cemetery. Mrs. Steckman, who lived at 2021 26th St. in Lubbock, died Thursday, Dec. 4, in Mercy Hospital in Slaton following an illness of several weeks.

She was the widow of the late W. R. Steckman, who was a co-owner of the Hereford Brand for several years with Mr. and Mrs. Seth Holman. The Steckmans came to Hereford in 1919 and moved to Lubbock in 1928.

She was a member of the First Christian Church and was active in church and civic affairs in Hereford and Lubbock. Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Arthur Lawrence of Lawrence, Kan., and Mrs. Carl Lewis of Slaton; three grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

County To Participate In Full-Time Welfare Worker

The Commissioners Court of Deaf Smith County, in a meeting Monday in Commissioner's Court, agreed to pay one-third of the total additional salary required for hiring the local State Welfare Office secretary on a full-time basis.

At the present time, the welfare office secretary is on duty on the half-day basis.

Two other counties, Swisher and Parmer, also are served by the local office, and officials in those counties have agreed to pay one-third each for obtaining the secretary on a full-time basis.

Under the new salary plan, which will begin after Jan. 1,

each of the three counties will pay \$35 a month for full-time service. Total additional cost of the plan is \$105.

Under the state plan, a secretary is hired on a part-time basis only.

County Judge Holmer Henslee said the new plan will be installed next month and that the welfare secretary will be available at the office throughout the day.

In other business, commissioners outlined estimates to be presented at a board hearing of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, which was held in Lubbock Tuesday.

In the outline, the commissioners estimated that excess tail water is costing the county approximately \$25000 annually. Causes were broken

Lenderman Resigns C of C Manager

W. M. "Bill" Lenderman, manager of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce, Wednesday tendered his resignation to the C of C board, effective Jan. 1, 1959.

Manager of the county chamber for the past four years, Lenderman told the board that he would become general manager of the Llano Cemetery in Amarillo as soon as his resignation became effective. The post which Lenderman has accepted was opened by the death of the previous manager, Kenneth C. Miner, about four months ago.

"It is with deep regret that my wife and I leave Hereford," Lenderman told the board. "This has been the finest place we have ever lived and the people here are the best we have ever known."

Lenderman, 54, was graduated from Denison High School, attended Draughon's Business College and was graduated from the Southwestern Institute for Chamber of Commerce Executives.

From 1923 to 1939 Lenderman was employed by the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad, the last ten years in labor relations duties. From 1939 to 1950 he was employed by the Department of Labor and the Department of Labor and the Department of Labor relations and public relations work.

From 1942 through 1945 he was company commander of a railway operations company for the United States Army in India. He was engaged in sales and promotion work for the Denison Poultry and Egg Company until

Wyatt testified that as soon as the matter was called to Trautman's attention, the wells were cut off immediately and that a border was on the west side of the land. He also stated that since that time no further water had escaped from the land in question. Trautman testified that he was unaware of the situation when it was called to his attention, but admitted that the road had been made impassable due to the tail water. He assured the board that he immediately had placed a border along the west side of the field where the water was escaping and that there would be no further violations of the rules and regulations prohibiting waste. Trautman stated also that he was in complete accord with such rules and regulations and realized the necessity of the prevention of tail water. He said that it was his feeling that the regulations prohibiting waste were passed for the benefit of all irrigation farmers and that they should be complied with. After deliberation, the water district's board of directors concluded that Chalmar Company, Inc., has violated the Statutes of the State of Texas as well as the rules and regulations of the District prohibiting-waste and advised Trautman. Virgil E. Dodson of Hereford, president of the board, commended Trautman for taking immediate action after the matter was called to his attention but warned him that further violations would not be condoned. The board determined that no court action would be taken against Chalmar, since all the testimony showed that the situation had been temporarily corrected. The district has the power to secure an injunction against the use of an irrigation well, if it can prove continued and deliberate waste or mis-use of irrigation water. Tuesday's hearing was the first since the district manager, Tom McFarland, met recently with Deaf Smith County Commissioners and promised more rigid enforcement of district regulations. The county had estimated it cost an additional \$25,000 in maintenance and repair costs along county roads because of irrigation tail water.

She's Happiest On Sea Floor

Young, blonde and shapely Zale Parry is the world's only under-water secretary, so far as anybody knows.

"I just love the water," says Zale, who is secretary to Ivan Tors, producer of the TV series, "Sea Hunt," and who also doubles for all actresses in the series in underwater scenes.

Zale holds the women's world's record for depth in ocean diving, having gone to 209 feet in a test dive off the coast of Catalina Island, beating the

former record of 80 feet.

"I started skin-diving when I met the man who is now my husband," says Zale. "He is Parry Bivens, then an engineer but now a medical student. Our first date was spent under water." His first name happened to be the same as her last name.

Zale and Parry were married above water, but much of their life since has been spent under it.

"Whenever we have time, we go skin-diving and spear-fishing," says Zale. "Parry still loves the under-water world, though he doesn't have so much time for it any more, with his medical studies.

"I got this job because of my living record, but I do regular secretarial work besides. You see, diving assignments are only now and then, but being a secretary is a regular job, and I need my salary until Parry gets through medical school." Zale attended UCLA, where she was a swimming champion and also studied dramatics. She recently has taken up under-water photography, and is a member of the board of directors of the Under-water Photographic Society.

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — A precocious 12-year-old boy, who doesn't hesitate to go to the top when he wants information, has completed an international survey of teachers' pay.

He says teachers in many other countries get much better treatment than in the United States. They have a higher social status, better comparative salaries and more liberal pension plans.

Claremont F. Carter, an honor roll eighth grader who speaks Spanish and German, said he decided to make his study after he Russians fired their first Sputnik.

He wrote 100 letters to foreign countries, got replies in a number of languages quoting wage scales in a bewildering variety of currencies.

Why did he tackle the massive job?

"Teachers have been good to me all during my studies," he said. "All that I know, I owe to them and their skills. I believe this report will be helpful to them and so I'd like to repay them and to show them that I have greatly appreciated their efforts."

The youngster hasn't let his report lie idle in his files. He sent copies to the White House, to Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt and to Gov. LeRoy Collins of Florida.

"I received the most wonderful letters," he said.

Some of the information he gathered:

The average U. S. teacher is paid \$4,650 a year in comparison with \$12,000 earned by physicians, \$10,400 by lawyers, \$8,700 by engineers, \$5,000 to \$7,000 by skilled craftsmen and \$4,580 by factory workers.

German teachers can get as much as \$3,264 yearly against \$720 for unskilled laborers. A French teacher can earn \$5,280 in comparison with \$996 for street cleaners. In England, a teacher can earn \$2,810 against a typical laborer's wage of \$1,400.

A Russian professor gets an average of eight times as much as a factory worker.

The cost of living in most of the countries Claremont cited is less than in the United States.

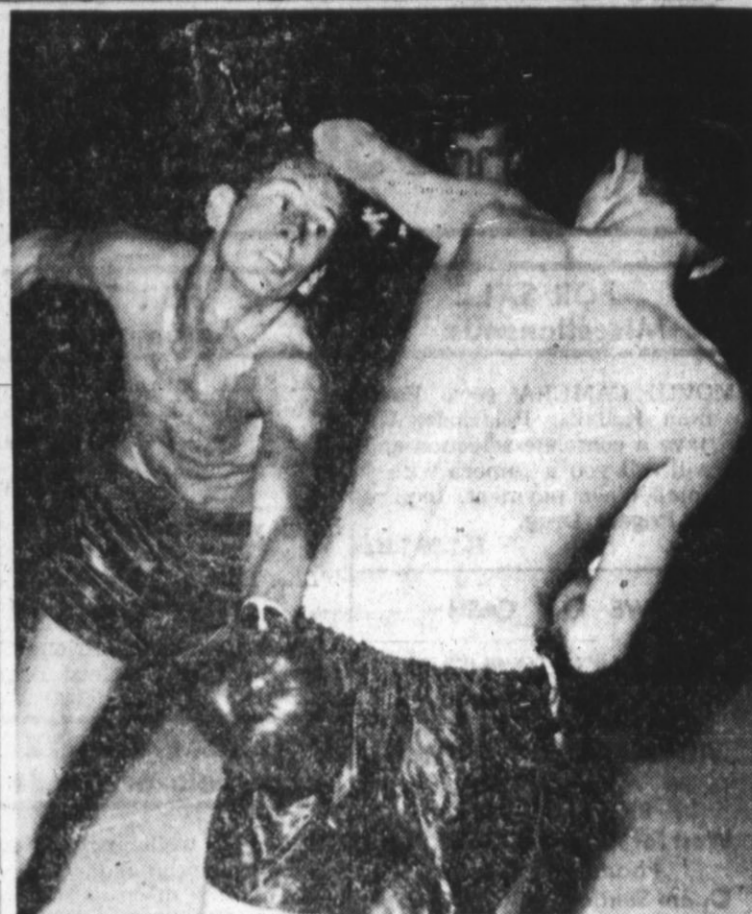

Strike Heaven On The Face, by Charles Caltri, is a book on juvenile delinquency. It is not a book that has any direct bearing on our local situation (our local non-existent situation, that is), but it is a book that will perhaps give adults a little more understanding of the many and varied difficulties of growing up.

It concerns a school in an average American town. The main character is Walter Davis, the new dean of the high school.

The story begins when Davis hears rumors about what is going on in the high school - talk of clandestine love affairs, violence, whispers of a sex club.

Davis is determined he will find out about it and do what he can to correct it, and his main interest is to protect the students. He feels as responsible for them as he does for his own daughter and sons.

But when Davis assembles the shocking facts, he runs into a stone wall of opposition from those whose attitude is: "It's none of our business; they didn't do it in the locker-room. We're not a social welfare agency."

With the lines drawn, the conflict explodes, and before it is over, parents, teachers, students, school and county officials have taken sides. The roots extend deep into the heart of the town itself and in one way or another almost everyone is involved.

The book presents a very thorough study of what makes a youth turn wrong - his family, his friends and his school.

The book makes clear that the real tragedy is not the degrading club, but the utter disregard of the parents and school officials. The lack of understanding is portrayed vividly.

Of all the high school characters the reader does not finish the book with any dislike for them at all - only profound pity.

It is interesting to see how Davis handles the situation of putting an end to the club and any hinting ever on the paper's headlines. Davis is a shrewd character, a man who does as he thinks he must, and a parent who is not afraid to admit he is wrong.

Strike Heaven On The Face is a shocking book with a very clear moral. Read it, and then go and put your children on the back for being the kind of persons they are.

As stated earlier, the book has no relation with our city. We have never been seriously bothered with the problems many cities of the nation are bending under. For this we can thank our youth - they get little enough thanks for the way they have chosen to grow up. And, if anyone will look back with complete honesty, growing up is the most difficult period of a person's life.

Indelible Pencil Stains
Indelible pencil stains can often be removed from a garment by rubbing with denatured alcohol and soaking for about five minutes. Then rinse in mild soapsuds, again in clear water.

Preserve the leather on furniture and card tables by going over them occasionally with a soft cloth dampened with glycerin. Let the glycerin remain on the leather for a few hours, then remove any that has not been absorbed by rubbing with a clean cloth.

Hot Plates
If you decide that the weather is too warm to light the oven in order to heat plates, place the dishes in a pan of boiling water for a few minutes before serving the meal.

Apple Pie
The next time you serve apple pie lather it with whipped cream, and sprinkle with chopped walnuts. It will be a delicious change.

Curtains
New curtains should be soaked overnight in salt water before washing. They are usually full of lime and it is difficult to get them clean. They will be much easier to handle after their salt bath and it will not be necessary to use so much soap powder.

Scorched Milk
If the heated milk has a slight scorched taste, remove it by putting the pan into cold water and adding a pinch of salt to the milk.

Bluing Streaks
Soak the garment that is streaked from a strong bluing solution in strong ammonia water.

The Fern
Eight parts of sodium chloride, four parts of potassium nitrate, and two parts of magnesium make a good fertilizer for the fern. Mix thoroughly and put into a bottle. Dissolve one teaspoonful of this solution in a quart of water and water the fern about once a week.

About Your HEAL

Nature uses many devices to protect us from disease - especially infants. When children are born, there is usually a built in protection from many of the childhood diseases such as measles and mumps.
However, there is one disease, generally associated with children, which takes its toll from earliest infancy. This disease is pertussis (whooping cough).
This year there have been 3-720 cases of pertussis reported to the State Department of Health as of Nov. 15. But many cases of the disease go unreported. So there is no accurate count of the number of times that pertussis strikes during any given year.
We do know that it is a serious disease under the age of four. It may be fatal in over 10 per cent of the cases in this age group. In very young infants, however, complications such as pneumonia may occur, and the fatality rate varies between 15 and 30 per cent.
Ninety-two per cent of all pertussis cases occur in children under age two. Sixty-five per cent strikes youngsters under one year of age.
Whooping cough was first described in 1578 by Bailou. The typical symptoms, even as they are today, were outlined. The disease occurred in epidemic form in England during the 17th century.
The disease has a world-wide distribution. Pertussis is a constant threat in larger cities, but occasionally epidemic proportions are attained.
In Scandinavia and Denmark, there is an epidemic every four or five years. However, during the interepidemic years only a few cases are reported.
Whooping cough is generally more prevalent in colder climates than in warm or subtropical climates.
The incubation period of the disease is usually seven days. Some people contract it up to 40 days, and rarely up to 21 days.
Whooping cough derives its name from the fact that the patient during the early catarrhal and paroxysmal stages coughs spasmodically with a "whoop". The "whoop" is produced by a deep inspiratory

STATION — But out a trace. That's when Andrew bid good-bye to his parents and little sister and fled from his beloved homeland. He had some narrow escapes, however, before he crossed the border to freedom. When the uprising began in October, 1956, Andrew had completed one year of study at the University of Budapest and was employed as a tool designer. He was 19 years old.

Asked if he took part in the revolution, he replied "Everybody did." He was a member of a group of partisans who stormed a building housing a Hungarian military unit under Communist control. He and a friend were side by side. A tank rounded a corner — fired pointblank — and Andrew's friend lay withering on the street, his leg severed. He told of treachery during the fighting. The besigned defenders waved a white flag but as the crowd surged forward the Communists lobbed grenades from the windows. The toll of dead and wounded was high. Andrew was arrested on Oct. 28 while delivering papers in a

Returning to Budapest, he discovered that his parents had been searching for his body in the cemetery. "Thousands of people had been killed and their bodies were taken to the cemetery and laid on the frozen ground. Families would seek out and bury their own dead," Andrew said.

It was at this time that he learned of the disappearance of his friends. His life in danger, he left his parents in tears and began the 150-mile trek to Vienna. His route was through the woods. The Russians kept to the highways because the woods were teeming with armed Hungarians. Tiring, he made the mistake of stopping at a hotel in a small town for a few hours of sleep. He was rudely awakened and hauled off to jail at 2 a.m.

It was then that fate took a hand. There wasn't room in jail for Andrew so the guards confiscated his identification card and released him. He said they didn't believe he would try to escape for anyone caught near the border without an identification card could be shot as a spy. Fearful that he was being watched, Andrew remained in the village until just before dawn. Hours later, the near freezing and hungry young man came to the outskirts of a small town just inside the Austrian border. He was fed at a mobile Red Cross unit and then left for a Vienna camp to join thousands of other Hungarian refugees. A month later he received a

AUSTIN HIGHLIGHTS

Much Debate Predicted On School Improvement Issue

By VERN SANFORD

AUSTIN — Foreshadowing many hours of debate in the next Legislative session is the steady build-up of proposals and counter-proposals for improving public schools.

Texas State Teachers Association has voted to push a 19-point legislative program. TSTA will go along on most of the Hale-Aikin Study Committee's recommendations, though its own program omits a few H-A proposals and is lukewarm on others.

Most notable difference is that TSTA calls for larger teacher salary raises. Present minimum starting salary is \$3,204. Hale-Aikin Committee recommends hiking this to \$3,800. TSTA is asking for \$4,000 for bachelor's degree holders, \$4,200 for those with a master's degree.

TSTA's salary increases would cost some \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000 a year more than the Hale-Aikin plan. Overall, enactment of the Hale-Aikin school improvement plan would cost the state an estimated \$10,000,000 a year more than is now being spent.

Other planks in the teachers' legislative platform are specific changes to expand or enrich school programs — driver education, special programs for gifted children, more funds for small schools, etc. TSTA approved the Hale-Aikin proposal for lengthening the school year, but indicated it would not go all-out for it.

Because they call for new spending at a time when the state already is in the red, no one expects smooth sailing for the school proposals. Governor Daniel warned teachers that he could not foresee available money for all the program. Many legislators are haunted on the one hand by the need to dig up new money just to keep the state in business and on the other by campaign promises not to vote for certain kinds of new taxes. They're inclined to view new spending plans like small-pox germs.

On the other hand, advocates of school improvement constitute a large and very active group. And all such efforts gained tremendous new leverage when Sputnik I whizzed into orbit.

Texas Industrial Commission is asking the Legislature

for a \$100,000-a-year appropriation to be used in attracting new businesses to Texas. Commission voted not to go into tourist promotion unless asked to by lawmakers.

Proposed budget allocates \$16,500 annually for an executive director's salary and \$75,000 a year for advertising in national publications. All this activity will be brand new to Texas, made possible Nov. 4 when voters removed an 82-year-old constitutional ban against spending state money for advertising.

Commission also announced that it is opposed to any plan for offering temporary local tax exemption as a sort of "prize" to new industries.

For the first time in 1958,

Texas non-farm employment broke the three-million mark in October.

Christmas rush and other gains may bring the number of workers to a new record high in December, according to the Texas Employment Commission.

Settlement of 13 labor-management disputes involving 9,749 workers contributed to the October employment peak of 3,001,400.

December's bright hopes are based on expectation of the usual retail job increases, more employment in cotton processing due to a high per-acre yield, plus gains in manufacturing, transportation and school employment.

Number of Texans receiving old age assistance payments dropped during the past year, but Texas still has a greater percentage of its population on state old age pensions than most other states.

State Welfare Department's report to the governor notes that an increase in the number of elderly persons receiving Federal Social Security payments is apparently causing the shrinkage in the state welfare rolls.

Despite this trend, Texas has 33.6 per cent of its 65-and-over population on the state pension rolls compared to a national average of 16.2 per cent. Texas' average payments are lower — \$47.08 per month compared to the national average of \$61.39.

During the past fiscal year the State Welfare Department paid out \$125,353,296 for old age pensions. Of this, 30 per cent was state funds, the rest federal.

Persons unhappy with State Water Board decisions may appeal to the courts, but not for a new trial starting from scratch.

State Supreme Court ruled that appeals from Water Board rulings may be considered only in the light of the evidence presented in the original hearing. In so ruling, the high court invalidated a provision in the water code providing for trial de novo (or anew).

At issue was a Water Board decision denying Southern Canal Co. of Houston permission to take water from the Trinity River. An Austin district judge had ruled that he did not have jurisdiction. Now the case can go back to district court for judicial review under the "substantial evidence" rule.

Effect of the Supreme Court decision could be far-reaching if applied to appeals from other administrative decisions. Heretofore, trial de novo has applied to appeals from the State Board of Insurance.

REP. WALTER ROGERS WRITES:

Regulations Proposed For Safety In Space

To the people of the 18th District:

It is likely that nothing in our lifetime has caught the imagination of all the people of the world as has the world's entry into the space age. This imagination has manifested itself in many ways in every age group of our society and, inevitably, in the building, testing and firing of rockets by amateur and professional scientists.

This is a wonderful thing, I believe, and is a demonstration of the old adage, "we learn to do by doing". Like everything else, however, there are certain hazards in these practices, and it is recognized that precautions must be taken to protect life and limb.

For this reason the Civil Aeronautics Board is considering proposed regulations for the operation of rockets and missiles. It is pointed out that these proposals stem from the increasing number of instances of potential hazards to aircraft in flight rather than any determination to destroy or unduly suppress any scientific endeavor, since the educational benefits to be derived from an organized experimental rocketry program are of great importance to all the nation.

CAB points out that launchings of missiles have been conducted within the confines of airport traffic patterns, civil airways, and in such manner that they have penetrated other controlled air space areas. They have occurred at times when weather conditions prevented observation of aircraft in flight, thus creating a hazard to planes operating under instrument flight conditions.

Certainly, the continued and ever increasing use of air space will dictate extremely efficient and precise use of this space. The Board's concern with these potential dangers has been shared by state and municipal authorities who have, in many instances, enacted ordinances providing that no rocket, other than for military or industrial purposes, shall be fired within the areas of their authority without prior approval and issuance of a permit.

This concern has been enlarged by recent large scale production of rockets which are available to the general public through hobby shops and department stores.

I point out that these regulations are not final and that they may be amended or altered after consideration of views and opinions of citizens all over the country. The initial proposals are, however, these:

"That, no rocket or missile shall be fired so as to be at any time at an altitude of more than 500 feet above the surface, unless the site utilized and the firing are approved by the administrator of the Civil Aeronautics Board.

"That, no rocket or missile shall be fired from within or into any control zone, or so as to be at any time within five miles of any airport."

It is also pointed out that, in event these proposed regulations are adopted, holders of or applicants for a permit issued by the Administrator of CAB are not relieved of their responsibility to comply with any state or local (police, fire, aviation) ordinance, law or regulation.

The hearing to consider the adoption of these regulations will be conducted by the CAB here in Washington, probably sometime in February. As in all such proposals, interested persons may submit their views

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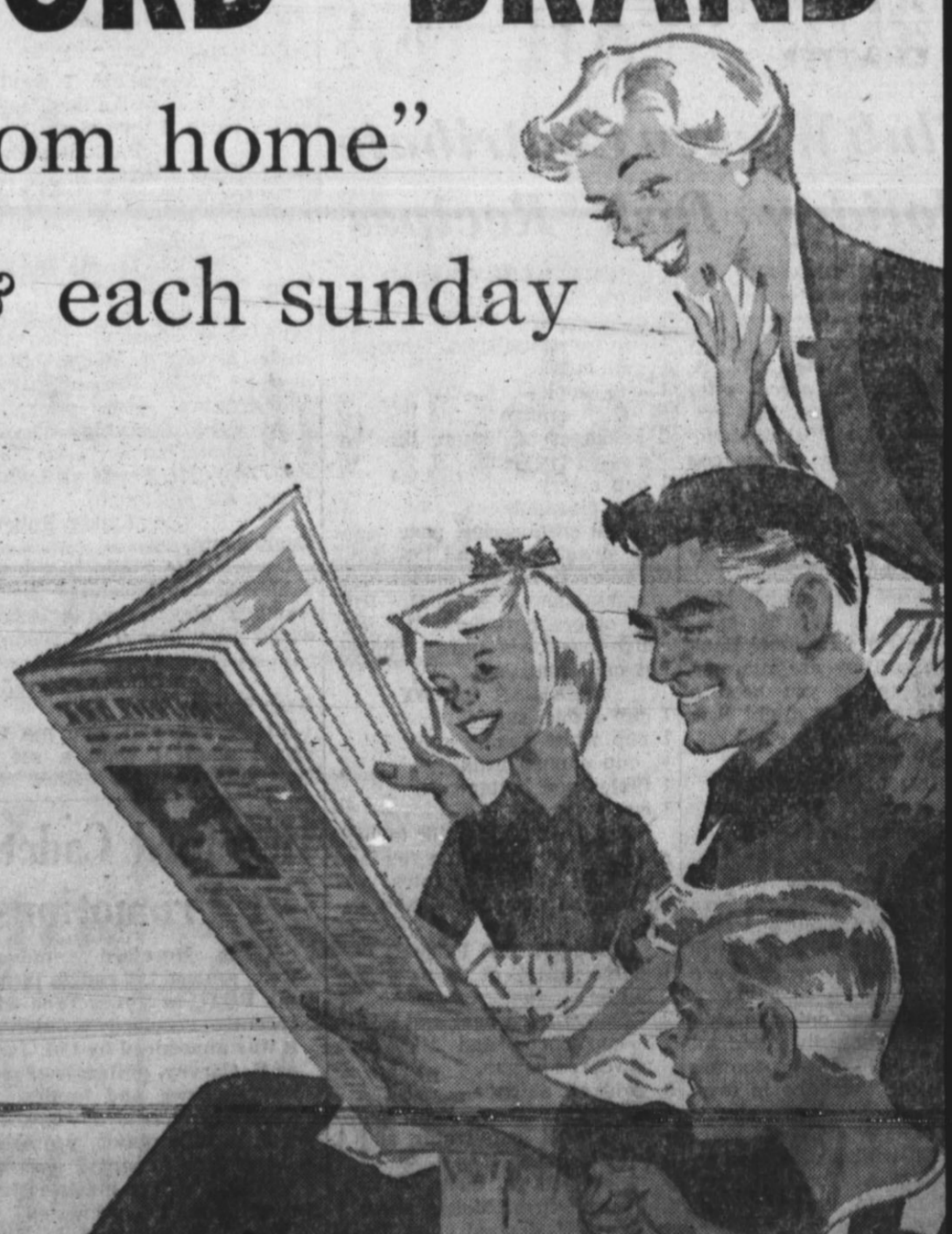
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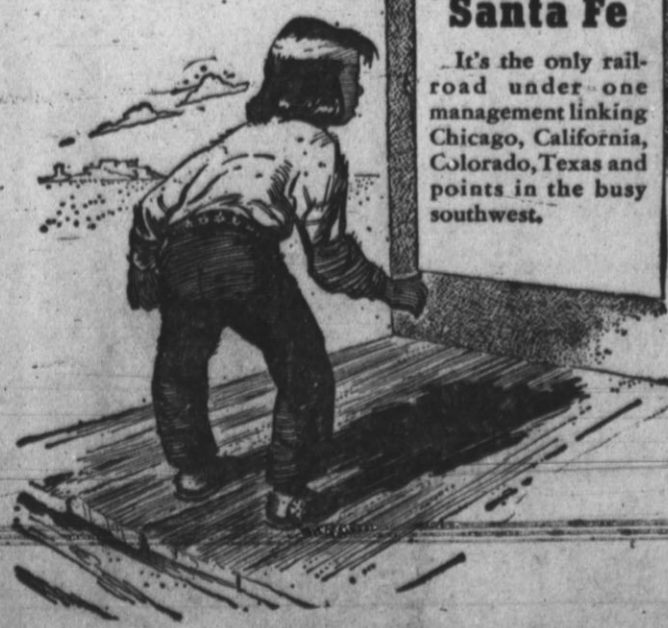

Dept. of Agriculture is recommending a 12 per cent cut in 1959 acreage allotments for spring potatoes in Texas. This would be 7,875 acres for next year compared to 9,000 in 1958. . . Texas Heritage Wakefield has petitioned President Eisenhower for a full pardon for one of Texas' most famous sons, the late William Sydney Porter, better known as short story writer O. Henry. Porter was convicted in federal court of embezzlement and served a prison term, but Wakefield declared there is "abundant proof of his innocence." . . Wayland C. Rivers Jr. has resigned as an assistant to Attorney General Will Wilson and entered private practice in Austin. . . Texas draft quota for January will be 359 men, the lowest monthly call since December, 1957. It is to be filled with men who are 22 years or more by Jan. 1, except for volunteers and delinquents who may be younger. . . Graduates will be assigned to the Highway Patrol, Drivers License Patrol and Weight Patrol, all of which are undermanned.

Brown Patch Hits Lawns In Texas

College Station — Brown patch, a rather common lawn disease in Texas, is especially active in the warmer sections of the state at the present time. According to Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist, most lawn grasses are susceptible but San Augustine lawns are most often attacked.

The disease starts as a small spot in the lawn. The circular brown spot spreads rapidly and the grass soon takes on a dead appearance. Infected areas often regain their green color following changes in the weather, said Smith. The disease is most prevalent during humid weather on lawns with a dense turf and when temperatures remain above 70 degrees Fahrenheit.

Smith said that recent tests in Louisiana have shown that Terraclor (P.C.N.B. 75 per cent wettable powder) gave practically 100 per cent control of the disease. He recommends that P.C.N.B. be used at the rate of one pound per 1,000 square feet of lawn and that the material be watered down immediately

after it is applied. This practice may prevent possible leaf burning and will get the chemical down in the turf where it is most effective.

Puratized 177 also gave excellent control when used at the rate of three-fourths of a pound per 1,000 square feet of lawn but Smith points out that this material is not readily available. The fungus which causes brown patch is the same one which is responsible for several serious diseases in cotton, Irish potatoes and other crops. It lives in most soils regardless of the plants grown and when conditions become favorable the out-breaks occur, said Smith.

How Can I?

Q. How can I remove ink from a piece of linen that has been sent to the laundry and returned with a number on it?

A. Apply a saturated solution of cyanide of potassium with a camel's hair brush. Wash in cold water immediately after the mark is removed.

Q. How can I harden the gums?

A. Gums can be hardened and the breath sweetened by rinsing the mouth every day with a little tincture of myrrh.

Q. How can I hold linen

smoothly when marking it with indelible ink?

A. Stretch the material tightly in embroidery hoops. This gives a firm, smooth surface on which to work.

Q. How can I prevent clothing from sticking to the varnish of a chair?

A. Rub the chair with a cloth dampened with turpentine, and follow with a cloth wet with linseed oil. Rub thoroughly with both applications.

Q. How can I renovate old yarn?

A. Instead of winding old yarn into a ball wind into a skein, place in a colander over a kettle of boiling water and let

it steam for an hour. Then hang up to dry.

Q. How can I be sure of removing all small insects when preparing greens?

A. By sprinkling some baking soda on the greens before pouring water on them for the first washing.

Q. How can I prevent an unpleasant, leathery odor on gloves, caused by the hands perspiring?

A. This can be prevented by dusting rice or talcum powder into the gloves as soon as they are removed.

Q. How can I prevent the window screens from rusting when storing them for the winter?

A. Paint them with kerosene before packing them away and they will not rust.

Clarendon College Reunion Is Attended By Hereford Residents

 The same spirit that motivated the founding and enabled the school to flourish at its beginning, was evidenced again among the old-timers who gathered in a reunion of Old Clarendon College held in Clarendon Saturday.
 The reunion was held in observance of the 60th anniversary of the college which opened its doors Sept. 5, 1898, and closed them for good at the end of summer school in 1927. It was organized by the Methodist Church Conference and the citizens of Clarendon and classes were held in the Methodist Church the first year. In 1920 it became the foremost Junior College in the state. Third year work was added in 1926 and it was made a senior college, just before it was decided that Clarendon was too small to support the school.
 It was a sad day in Clarendon when word was received that the school would close for there were few citizens who had not contributed materially to its welfare. A reunion was held in 1938 and again in 1939.
 At the one-day reunion held Saturday, former members of the faculty were honored. A tea in the afternoon held at the Clarendon Press opened the day's program and memories began to live again. There were a few tears mingled in with the fun too as those missing were remembered as pictures, lining the walls, brought back the student life of the school.
 Introduced at the tea was Ethel Harvey's new book, "The Athens of the Panhandle," which was a factual, year to year story of Clarendon College that tells some of the determination, loyalty, drama and humor that went into the building of the oldest college in the Panhandle of Texas.
 At 7:30 in the evening, a buffet supper was held in the American Legion Hall. There was no set program, but an informal get together for reviving memories of the past. Only two of the first graduating class were present. They were Jess Stanford of Hereford and Fletcher Isbell of Fort Worth. Roll call of classes was held and in conclusion the old college songs were sung again and loyalty, love and good will reigned once more.

Cotton Bowl Game Amounts To Great Deal Of Money

 If you don't think the bowl business is big business, consider the money involved in putting on one of the Jan. 1 football extravaganzas.

The Cotton Bowl, Dallas' 23-year-old post-season gridiron show, is a good example.

The total is \$552,472, which is quite a bit of money for one football game. There are 75,504 seats in the big saucer. There have been few of them vacant in the past 15 years, although officials fear they are going to be if television continues.

Each ticket is \$5.50; thus the gross receipts from spectators runs \$415,272.

The radio-television contract pays \$125,000 a year.

The program brings in \$8,200. The concessions realize \$4,000. What becomes of the money? Well, the competing schools get \$350,000 — that's \$175,000 each. There's rental on the bowl and many other expenses involved in putting on the football show.

The Southwest Conference sponsors the Cotton Bowl, giving its football champion as host team. That team — this year it's Texas Christian — keeps only \$60,000 plus \$7.50 per mile for travel — one way. In the case of TCU the travel expense would be only \$225.00.

The remainder of the \$175,000 goes into a pot for distribution to the Southwest Conference members, with TCU sharing again. The cut will be seven ways since Texas Tech, while a member of the conference, isn't yet eligible for any of the bowl money. Tech doesn't start competing for the football championship until 1960.

There's \$115,000 to be divided

seven ways — giving each conference member about \$16,500. TCU thus will receive better than \$76,500. That's not bad for traveling just 32 miles to play in a big game.

About this television business: all the bowl games are televised and many fans have gotten around to the plan of staying home on Jan. 1 and watching them. They switch from one to the other when the games are being televised at the same time.

In the case of the Orange Bowl, they can usually see it all because it starts earlier than the Sugar Bowl and Cotton Bowl due to the time difference. Then when the fan has finished with those three the Rose Bowl will just be starting so he will wind

up seeing it without having to switch.

There are parties where a group will spend the afternoon eating and drinking and watching the games on TV. It's doubtful that the crowds ever will be materially reduced at the bowl games because of television, however. There are too many dyed-in-the-wool fans who want the atmosphere and the color and the excitement of being on the spot.

Also, if a portion of the fans stay away from the games to watch them on TV the bowl games won't be hurt financially. The television contract brings enough to make up for an absence of paying customers. Also, pay television may eventually be used.
