Democratic members of this Congress at the beginning of the session expressed a willingness to coperate with the Hoover Administration in any or all measures proposed by the latter which in their judgement appeared to be potentially effective in relieving depression conditions and enabling the Federal Government to meet its obligations and maintain its financial integrity. In numerous instances this cooperation has been freely given in a no-partizan spirit, only to result in Administration spokesmen claiming the entire credit for the Administration.

On the other hand, when the sales tax feature of the Revenue bill, as reported out unanimously by the House Ways and Means Committee, was killed, Mr. Hoover himself was reported by a highly reputable citizen, coming direct from a visit to the Executive at the White House, as referring to the sales tax as "a Democratic measure."

This reported and undenied statement of the President was made in the face of the fact that Republican members of the Ways and Means Committee had cooperated with the Democratic majority in making the sales tax an outstanding feature of the bill with the belief that they were rendering a patriotic service by aiding the Government to balance its budget. It also ignored the facts that when the bill reached the House, Democrats and Republicans alike were widely dividd on the sales tax, and that the successful revolt against it was led by an insurgent Republican.

If Democratic floor leader Rainy found his ranks badly broken, Republican leader Snell found his followers—at one time thought to be overwhelmingly in favor of the bill—in a state of wild insurrection against it.

The Democratic House found it even more difficult to get any effective cooperation from th Administratioin in its effors to enact an economy bill. The President insisted upon his demand that he should be given th power to reorganize the Executive Departments and cooperate the various overlapping bureaus, and was givn his own way in part; that is, s were to be subject to the approval of the Congress

The House Committee on Economy had a plan of drastic retrenchment in the various departments and the President had his, and he insisted upon it, with the result that a bill was reported designed to cut down expenses more than \$200,000,000. Because of the insistence of the Administration, the plan of the Executive and the plan of the Committee were incorporated in an Omnibus bill, against the protest of the Chairman of the House Economy Committee. As a result of including many controversial matters in the bill opposition was provoked which eliminated or changed so many items that the bill as passed by the House provided for reductions of only \$43,000,000. It was denounced by Chairman McDuffie as "a hollow mockery, a sham and a farce."

Chairman MsDuffie puts the blame for the failure of the Economy bill squarely upon the President and Secretary Mills of the Treasury Department. Naturally the bureaucrats in and out of the departments resisted every attempt to curtail activities or otherwise reduce expenditures, an dthis opposition was supplemented by propaganda pressure from many sections of the country. All of which indicates how firmly the Federal bureaucracy is intrenched and how desperately it will fight to retain its hold upon the Federal revenues. It also indicates in some measure the extnt to which the people themselves are unwilling to make sacrifices through the postponement of Federal projects in their various localities even in a crisis.

Perhaps in no greater respect has the Administration shown its failure to cooperate with the Congress than in the so-called economy bill which was wrecked by its insistence to overload it with its own proposals.

Not only that, but the President has been quick to take a partizan advantage of the failure of the bill in the House by attempting, as usual, to put the entire blame upon that

Whatever criticism may be made of Congress in connection with panic relief legislation, it must be admitted that there were extenuating circumstances in the facts that the deficit is a Hover deficit, and that President Hoover waited two and a half years before taking any steps for retrenchment Even then the task of evolving a plan fell in major part upon Congress, because most of the suggestions that came from the Executive were neither definite, comprehensive nor convincing.

The action of the County Convention here Tuesday of this week was an encouraging sign that Knox County citizens are forgetting the strife and discord of the past campaigns and centering their eforts on something constructice. While it is true that John Garner made the task much easier, the resolutions drawn up at the Convention call on all patriotic citizens to support the democratic nominees whoever they may be and with the feeling of harmony that now exists in the ranks of the party, we believe that they will.



> ON TEXAS FARMS By W. H. Darrow Extenion Service Editor

The tendency of Texas formers to turn to horses and mules for farm power is noted in Wise county wwhere the county agent reports the acquistion by farmrs of a registered Percheron stallion, a mammoth jack and a "paint" stallion. A county commissioner estimates that 90 per cent of the deplated work stock of the county will be out o fuse within three years.

"Produce cheap milk to get by the depression" says Nelson Gerringer of Jackson county who produced it at a feed cost of 6 1-4 cents per pound in March. Heis a dairy herd demonstrator who weighs and tests each cow's milk and feeds carefully. His 12 cows produced 288 pounds of buterfat that month bringing production receipts to \$100.00. Feed cost

George Scott Madison county farmer who made 11 bales of coton from 22 terraced acres against 8 bales from 20 unterraced near-by acres last year tells the county agent that terracing will do more good the first year than the application of 200 pounds of fertilizer to say nothing of the increased value of the land in later years. He got \$3 worth of cotton per acre for terracing that cost only \$1 per acre.

Since feeding his steers 1-10 pound of limestone flour daily with the grain ration they have eaten more, had less digestive troubles and have apparantly made better gains, says H. N. Hanson of Bosque
