



A. Grind equal parts of nuts. dates, figs, and raisins, mix them thoroughly, and knead on a board covered with powdered sugar. Pack in a deep pan and allow it to stand for about twelve hours. Then cut into bars and roll in powdered sugar.

Q. How can I place flowers in a vase, making them stand properly, when there are only a

A. Place a few corks in the water and they will hold the flowers in place.

Q. Is celery beneficial to the nerves? A. Yes. It is claimed to be a valuable food for the nerves, and a nervous person should' form the habit of eating as

much celery as possible. Q. How can I keep corduroys soft and fluffy after washing? A. After the corduroys have been washed carefully, rinse until the water is clear. Do not squeeze out the water at last rinsing, but throw the garment over the line in a shady place

A. Try using two ounces of borax in two quarts of water and one teaspoon of ammonia. Use about half this quantity to each bucket of water and no soap will be required. Q. How can I wash a rain-





Last year, county agents in 204 Texas counties assisted producers with various phases of seven-step program. Elliott says that special emphasis was placed on the use of cotton burs for soil improvement and also to reduce gin fire hazards.Burs were spread, he says on 9,735 farms in 129 counties. A few years ago most of the burs were burned as waste.

Cotton followed phosphated legumes on 20,326 farms in 151 counties; barnyard manure was used on 7,685 farms in 151 counties to increase yields and defoliants or desicants were used on 37,885 farms in 162 counties. as an aid to mechanical harvest-

In posting the \$64 million plus savings in labor, cotton producers used 26,662 stripper harvesters and 1,831 spindle pickers in 133 and 78 counties respectively. The weed and grass control savings were made through the use of 44,496 rotary hoe equipped tractors in 157 counties and the use of spot treatment for Johnsongrass control in 148 counties. Lateral oiling with post emergence chemicals for weed control was used in 47 counties. Elliott gives full credit to the Sevn-Step Cotton Committees and the county agricultural agents for the achievement record made under the program: The economy of the entire state has materially profited from the results of this cooperative effort, Elliott said.

A precedent - setting venture nursing home operators in pron chronic disease management viding higher standards of care. nas been launched by the State pepartment of Health. Immedite beneficiaries are 12,000 paients housed in Texas' 587 licensed nursing and convalescent are homes.

Built around nutritional and nursing needs of oldsters, the program promises to be the biggest boon to their health and comfort since passage of the rursing home licensure law in 953. It works like this:

On request of county health officers and local health department directors, a nutritionist, a chronic disease nurse and two sanitarians instruct 4ocal health department staffs and hursing home operators in proper care of elder citizens, many of them disabled by chronic illness to the point of being bedfast.

A physio-therapist will be added to the team later. Many people are lying helplessly in bed. dependent on others for every need. With help they might learn to feed and bathe themselves making the difference between optimism and despondency.

The program is purely edulocal communities meet their responsibilities toward aged and nfirm citizens.

Half the course is spent in explaining and demonstrating to local health department staff members what their tasks are regarding nursing homes in the county, and in detailing how those tasks can be accomplish-

Standards which homes must meet before being licensed are carefully discussed. Nurses are taught how to handle chronic disease patients. Sanitarians are encouraged to make frequent inspections, and to impress on home operators the importance of scrupulous personal and premise cleanliness and improved

The object of such instruction is to help local health department personnel become proficient in assisting and advising
