

Incidentally there is a further provision in the law providing that "no recommendation as to how the revenve needs of the government should be met shall be submitted to Congress or any committee thereof, by any officer, or employe of any department or establishment unelss at the requet of either house of Congress." This would apear to bar from the commission suggested by the President anybody now in the government employ and he would therefore have to go outside for his commissioners, which would of course mean that his lay representatives would have to make an exhaustive study of the whole governmental system in order to qualify themselves to contribute anything worth while to the deliberations of the body. This, in turn, suggests that it might be a year or more before the commission is even ready to sit. Taken altogether, the commission sugested by President Hoover would bid fair to be as successful in accomplishing reforms in the government as the Wickersham Commission was in getting anything done about prohibition, or the Farm Board was in relieving the farmer. The President's course in regard to the reorganization of the government has been rather puzzling all the way through. When, as President, he came to the point of asking Congress to do this thing, he merely offered that they should give him blanket authority to alter things any way he pleased. His only response to the Congressional request for a bill of particulars is the suggestion of this commission. Congres naturally wants to know before it turns the government upside down just what the intended process is to be, just what is sought to be accomplished, just how it i to be done, before it takes the responsibility of authorizing unresticted rebuilding of the governmental machine.
