PARTY LAXITY

Temporary alternative offered the state of Texas on August 26 in location of a party candidate for senatorial race has encouraged Texas Republican leaders to believe "the accepted time has now passed" and to even hope that the percentage of Democratic voters in both Messrs. about and state meetings. Perhaps many Democrats do not know of the provisions of Article 246, Penal Code of the State of Texas, adopted at the regular session of the Thirty Second Legislature, 1911, which reads as follows: "Voting at primary elections—Any person who votes or offers to vote at a primary election or convention of a political party, having voted at a primary election or convention of any other party on the same day, is guilty of a misdemeanor." And the statute provides a fine of from \$200 to \$500 for conviction of same.

In other words apparent political security from overwhelming odds has lulled the Democratic leaders in many counties and districts into a sleeping sickness which has let down the party bars and admitted of a perplexing and confusing situation. The Texas Democratic political machine needs an overhauling, within and without, and new nuts and bolts, and plates inserted in spots where the wear and tear of time and neglect has caused wobbliness.

To the Editor

Comparatively few persons using radio sets are familiar with things electrical. The apparatus is harmless enough and consequently amateurs do not consider that there is possible peril in installing the outside aerial. In East Cleveland recently a youth was killed when the antenna of his radio set crossed an electrical distribution set. The boy was killed outright. So was his father in attempting to rescue him. The tragedy was shocking but like most tragedies it carried a warning.
 In the interest of SAFETY and to prevent similar accidents, you are asked to give the radio "fan" this warning:
 Do not string wireless aerials over, under or close to any other wires. They might come into contact with highly charged wires and be dangerous.
 Do not attach wireless aerials to poles carrying wires of any sort. Contact with live wires might result, causing death, injury or fire.
 ALWAYS be sure to attach wireless antennas to substantial supports and remember it is quite practical to operate a radio receiving set with an indoor aerial. Parents especially are requested to cooperate in carrying out these safety suggestions.


