Farmers Vote On Cotton Marketing

Dear Smith County cotton farmers went to the polls here Tuesday to cast their ballots in a marketing quota referendum for the 1962 crop of upland cotton.

A total of 98 ballots were cast at the three polling places in the county. However, 36 were

challenged as some voted in the wrong boxes, said Faust Collier, manager of the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office.

The challenge of these ballots is just a routine matter, he added.

Results of the election are to be announced Thursday afternoon following a canvass of the ballots by the County Committee, Collier stated.

All farmers who produced cotton on their farms in 1961 were eligible to vote in the referendum.

The vote was described as light by Collier and was attributed to the bad weather here Tuesday. The vote, however, was heavier than the ones recorded during the two previous elections.

This was the ninth consecutive

School Counseling Program Designed For All Students

In order to aid students in finding solutions for their own individual problems, a new service has recently gained importance and support in the Hereford Public Schools, with concentration on the junior high and high school level.

Under the direction of Robert L. Thompson and B. H. Baldwin, student personnel service programs have reached full-time operation in Stanton Junior High, and will soon operate on the full-time basis in Hereford High School.

Often referred to as "Student Counseling" and student "guidance" services, the program is now almost two years old. Students are rapidly becoming more aware of its benefits and taking advantage of them, according to the two guidance counselors.

Robert Thompson is in charge of student guidance and counseling activities carried on in Hereford High School, while B. H. Baldwin is the student personnel advisor in Stanton Junior High School.

The two work together as a team in the recently organized student relations program.

"We are here to help average kids with average problems," explains Thompson. "Contrary to popular belief,

"student counselors," as they are often called, are not "problem solvers."

Baldwin and Thompson stressed the fact that their only purpose is to "get teenagers to think about themselves." To do this, many tools are employed, such as tests and interviews.

An extensive library of information concerning colleges and details of virtually any specified career or vocation has been collected for the purpose of helping the teenager to plan his future.

All this information is placed at the disposal of all students so that they may explore the possibilities of their chosen occupation, learning expected wages, employment, and job requirements.

For those who are not sure what their ambition in life is, the service is also a great help by revealing their special aptitudes and interests.

Another main job of the Hereford student personnel service is to aid students who are having problems in making satisfactory grades, or succeeding in other phases of school life.

"One cannot separate personal and educational performance," according to Thompson. "When a student makes bad grades, there is usually a problem causing his failure, other than a mental shortcoming.

"To an outsider, the problem may appear trivial," continues Thompson, "but it might make all the difference in the life of that individual, although he perhaps does not realize what the problem is himself."

Students gain the most benefit from the school counseling program as teenagers can often discover exactly what the cause of their difficulty is through it, and then take measures to correct it through their own initiative.

"Each student has problems," states Thompson, "most of which he can solve himself, but sometimes help is needed. This is where we come in."

For the most part, the program is strictly a voluntary service for students. Certain group tests are given, such as the Iowa Test of Educational Development, which is used as a basis for comparing individual and school achievement on a nationwide basis.

Many students take individual tests in various fields to learn of their special aptitudes, capabilities, and interests.

Face-to-face interview and testing are two of the most important tools used in the student counseling program. Tests are used to show the student his intelligence, aptitudes, achievement, interests, and personality.

An early winter snow and ice storm sent temperatures plunging below the zero mark for the first time as Deaf Smith County encountered its worst weather of the year.

A low of three below zero was officially recorded here early Tuesday morning after skies cleared Monday. The low temperature Wednesday was again flirting with the zero mark with a low of 10 degrees.

The storm hit the Deaf Smith County area Saturday, but the full impact of the arctic blast was not felt until late Sunday as ice began collecting on streets, telephone and power lines and shrubbery.

As late as Tuesday morning, power and telephone lines in Hereford were threatened. However, clear skies and rapidly warming temperatures melted most of the ice from lines.

Strong winds which had been predicted for the Panhandle region failed to develop as the storm moved toward the northeast.

A definite threat existed to power lines here and in rural areas Monday as freezing precipitation continued to build up on the lines.

Traffic conditions in the area steadily worsened Monday as snow fell on the ice covered streets most of the day. Crews from the city had sanded intersections in the downtown area.

County roads and all highways leading from the city were described as slick and hazardous. However, ice and snow melted Tuesday as the temperature climbed to 25 degrees.

Most roads, highways and some streets in Hereford and Deaf Smith County were clear of ice. However, some ice still remained on many streets throughout the city in spite of the thaw.

Being conditions were at least partly responsible for seven accidents in the city ranging from fender benders to major wrecks. Two collisions on county roads were investigated by the Texas Highway Patrol.

An accident at 3 p.m. Sunday at the intersection of Park Ave. and Avenue K did an estimated \$165 worth of damage to a 1956 model four-door sedan, driven by Alvin H. Janssen, 203 Irving, and \$225 to a vehicle

School Discusses Two Items Due More Research

Discussion occupied much of the regular meeting of trustees of the Hereford school board Tuesday night.

Assistant tax collector Orpha Click, superintendent Paul Stevens and business manager Kendall Williams were detailed to draw up a proposed board policy on handling of delinquent school taxes. The board now has no such policy and has handled delinquent taxes in several different ways.

There was considerable discussion on the possible merits of adapting the school to a "5-3-4" plan instead of the "6-3-3" plan now used.

At present, students are in elementary school for six years, and junior and senior high schools for three years each.

The board emphasized that such a change is only in the discussion stage, and that a more detailed study will be made in the near future.

Advantage of such a change would include a better transition of students from the sixth grade to the seventh and possibly would mean a better utilization of teaching skills with semi-departmentalized classes for the sixth grade.

It also would allow more flexibility for scheduling of classes for junior high, which now must adapt its schedule to the demands of the ninth grade.

Stevens said many schools are discovering a difficult period for children going from the one-teacher system in elementary school to the department teaching system in junior high. He said that the particular skills of many teachers in a particular area — such as mathematics or science — might be better used by having them teach more students in a particular field at the lower grade.

He further explained that moving the ninth grade into high school might allow better instruction for them in specialized areas, such as languages and science.

AUSTIN HIGHLIGHTS

Objections Being Raised Over Legislative Session

Objections are being raised over the specially called session of the Texas Legislature, scheduled by Gov. Price Daniel for Jan. 3.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson says he hopes the Governor will reconsider his call for the third special session.

Actually, the attorney general doesn't object to the session nearly as much as he does the selection of bank escheat legislation as the prime object. Wilson feels that loan shark legislation should be the first order of business.

Sen. Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo contends that the special session is unnecessary and will cause "undue expense" to the State.

Hardeman doesn't think that the session's purpose — which

is escheat enforcement, maintenance of farm-to-market roads, and small loan legislation — will get acted upon in a 30-day session.

Rep. W. T. Oliver of Port Neches claims the Governor called the special session strictly for "political reasons and publicity."

However, Governor Daniel has indicated that if his program isn't passed he will be running

again in 1962.

Taxes not for Teachers
Teachers are not to blame for the 2 per cent sales tax, as many claim, says the Texas State Teachers Association.

According to the teacher's organization a sales tax would have been necessary to meet other needs.

Only \$140,000,000 out of the \$360,000,000 to be raised in new revenue will go for teacher pay

raises, says the Association. Of the remaining \$220,000,000 a total of \$70,000,000 will be used to retire the state deficit while \$50,000,000 will finance services other than schools.

Education Committee Named
Speaker James A. Turman has appointed five legislators to a Special Interim Committee on Education to serve as a consulting group to the Legislative Council. They will make a study of state teacher certification.

Rep. Herman Yezak of Bremond heads the committee, of which consists H. O. Niemeyer of Knippa, Miss Maud Isaacks of El Paso, Pete Snelson of Midland and Vidal M. Trevino of Laredo.

Textbook Picking Lengthy Process
Texas Education Agency says school boards must select local

textbook committees by December 15.

Samples of selected texts are mailed to the committees about Jan. 1, and they must ready their reports for local boards by March 1.

This step in state textbook selection is one of the quickest in a process that begins every May and ends sixteen months later.

By the time a local committee is selected, publishers have submitted bids and books to the Commissioner of Education; the texts have been studied by the 15-member State Textbook Committee, assisted by about 1,500 advisors; and the State Board of Education has passed on the committee's recommendation.

Approximately 11,000 school

teachers will assist the local committees in picking school books to be published in time for pupil consumption next fall.

Farm Roads in Sight?
Texas' \$15,000,000 Farm-to-Market road fund, vetoed by Governor Daniel earlier in the year, may be freed for construction spending during the special session.

Restrictions which would prevent proper maintenance caused the veto.

Now it appears that the Governor and the State Highway Commission have worked out a road program comprise with organized interests.

Underwater Land Sale Questioned
Attorney General Will Wilson has asked the Navigation District at Rockport to postpone sale of 127 acres of submerged

land "until the Attorney General and the Land Office can check out certain facts which raise questions as to the legality of the sale."

It's possible that the Navigation District acquired some of the land from the state for \$1 per acre. It now proposes to sell this land to Carl Krueger & Associates of San Antonio for \$67,000.

Asst. Atty. Gen. Houghton Brownlee says there's a question as to whether land purchased at a nominal sum for public purposes can be resold for private development.

Short Snorts
Associate Justice Jake Tiry of the 10th Court of Civil Appeals in Waco has filed with the Secretary of State for reelection. District includes Bosque, Brazos, Coryell, Ellis,

Falls, Freestone, Hamilton, Hill, Johnson, Leon, Limestone, Madison, Navarro, Robertson and Somervell counties.

W. D. (Bill) Noel of Odessa has been reappointed by Governor Daniel to membership on the Liquor Control Board.

Appointed by Governor Daniel to the Surveyors Board were Clifford Cool of Midland and Perry Thompson of Longview.

U. S. Army Engineers estimate an initial cost of \$33,000,000 for hurricane protection in the Port Arthur Area. This would include raising and enlarging about 17.2 miles of existing levees and floodwalls; construction of 18.7 miles of new levee work to protect about 37,000 acres of land; and separate ring levees for industrial areas south of Taylor's bayou.

ROUGH, TOUGH BATTLE

Herd Slips To Dons Again In Third Period, 83-71

Once again the third quarter was the downfall of the Hereford Whitefaces Saturday night, as the Hereford quintet stumbled in the last half to lose to the Palo Duro Dons 71-83.

After keeping the cords red hot with 30 points during the second quarter at the Palo Duro gym, the Whitefaces faltered to hit only two field goals in the fatal third round as the Dons poured in 26 points to take a 61-54 lead. Their fourth loss in seven outings, the Whitefaces slipped from a halftime lead to lose

for the fourth time.

After playing at Dimmitt Monday and Pampa Tuesday, the Herd is slated to play at Amarillo High School Friday night in their tenth game of the season as the cagers reach the mid-way mark.

Amarillo Sandies lost all starters via graduation from last year, while Chester Dunavan, 6-2 senior center, is the lone letterman returning. Coach Johnny Ethridge, in his first year at Amarillo, fields a starting quintet who are all over the six-foot mark.

Jerry Curtisinger, Mack Cansler, and Dennis Hodges paced the Whiteface scoring, as **Tobie Hall of the Dons ripped the cords for 25 points, and Bruce Francis racked up 26 for the Dons, who now sport a 4-1 record, for the season.**

Curtisinger netted eight field goals and two from the free throw line to total 18 for the Herd, while Mack Cansler tallied 13 of 16 free throws for the majority of his 17 points. Dennis Hodges hit six from the field for 12 Whiteface markers.

Coach Tom Gilley's Dons jumped off to a 5-0 lead during the first two minutes of play before the Whitefaces got into operation. Slipping into a full court press, the Herd swiped the ball and fed to Curtisinger who scored twice after Cansler's free throw to catch up after three minutes of play.

Turning into a point-for-point battle, Dwight McGee slipped in a final two points before the buzzer as the Whitefaces claimed a 15-13 advantage entering the second round.

In the fastest moving quarter the Herd has seen this season, the Whitefaces chalked up 30 points to take a seven-point halftime lead. Four field goals by Jerry Curtisinger while Hodges and McGee hit three each led the Herd's scoring rampage.

Palo Duro's Bruce Francis and Darrell Shrew launched a campaign of their own during the thrilling second round, while leading the Dons to a 26-point quarter, but were unable to keep the pace set by the Whiteface sharpshooters. In the hair-raising third quarter, the Whitefaces were allowed only nine points as tempers flared in the Don gym. Curtisinger and Cansler sneak-

ed in the Herd's only field goals, while Cansler hit for four free throws and Austin Hodges contributed another.

Tobie Hall and Bruce Francis hit the mark with six field goals each to account for most of Palo Duro's 26 points during the third stanza, as the Dons took claim to a 61-54 lead.

Don coach Tom Gilley was charged with a technical foul following a mid-court pile-up with 1:58 remaining in the period. Austin Hodges received a free throw in a ruling which was very unpopular with both the Don bench and spectators.

After the third quarter setback, the Whitefaces got back on their feet with 17 points during the rough final round, but were unable to catch the hot squad.

Dennis Hodges fouled out with 6:16 remaining in the game, before Dwight McGee left via the foul route only one second later. Don Darrell Shrew left along the same route with 3:24 remaining, and was followed by the Herd's Jerry Curtisinger with one second left in the game.
