



eriff Jim Crane had been hearing ries about cottton pickers north of he river having a good time drinking the beer and Saturday he decided the time had come to look into the mat-Bert Leslie, J. W. Cochran and County Attorney R. L. Brumbalow, Sheriff Orane made a visit te an old shantle near the Arlie store, whree they found some three dozen negroes and whites having the time of their lives.

Crap games, poker and various other sports were in full progress and the crowd was all kept in hilarious "spirita" by periodical drinks of Choe beer, of which beverage they had on hand an abundant supply. Sheriff Crane and his companions soon made their business known and quickly had the whole bunch under arrest for gaming. When the count was made there was found to be 26 negroes and 8 whites. all very willingly entered pleas of guilty to Attorney Brumbelow and paid their fines with the usual trimmings, except five of six of the negroes who did not have the \$19.70 required. These were lodged in the Childress jail, where they will languish until proper financial propitiation is made to the powers that be.

Nearly all of the men arrested were from Oklahoma, the officers state.

A report of the capture of the liquor has been made to Federal authorities and they are expected to take some ac

tion in the matter. During the excitement of the arrest of his large bunch of malefactors, s number of them who were encumbered with warlike sixshooters decided it would be less expensive to disown their artillery, so they quietly slipped their guns from their persons. As a result, five or six pistols were captured by the sheriff and his party. No one was found to claim these weapons, hence they became the booty of the captors .-Childress Post.
